Kickoff – Colorado at California (Sat., Sept. 4, 12:30 p.m.)

California (1-0, 0-0 Pac-10) hosts Colorado (1-0, 0-0 Big 12) at Memorial Stadium on Saturday, Sept. 11 (12:30 p.m. PT), with the future Pac-12 member making its first visit to Berkeley since 1968. Long-range forecasts show sunny weather conditions but with a high of only 62 degrees expected. Both teams started their 2010 seasons with victories last Saturday. Cal was a 52-3 winner over UC Davis at Memorial Stadium, while Colorado knocked off Colorado State at home, 24-3.

Sustaining Success

Cal averaged 8.4 wins per season in the first eight years under head coach Jeff Tedford to rank second among Pac-10 teams behind only USC with 68 victories during that period.

Cal-Colorado Series Notes

Cal and Colorado have split the four previous meetings between the schools with the last coming before any of the players on either team were born, exactly 28 years prior to the 2010 meeting on Sept. 11, 1982. Cal was a 31-17 winner in Boulder in that contest. Colorado also hosted the Golden Bears in 1975 and 1972, winning those games by respective scores of 34-27 and 20-10. The only previous meeting in Berkeley was a 1968 game in Memorial Stadium, with the Bears victorious, 10-0.

Cal against the Big 12

Cal has a record of 15-20-1 record in 36 all-time games against schools currently in the Big 12. Here's the breakdown against the 11 teams the Bears have played: Baylor (1-2), Colorado (2-2), Iowa State (1-0), Kansas (3-2), Kansas State (0-1), Missouri (4-2-1), Nebraska (0-3), Oklahoma (2-2), Texas (0-4), Texas A&M (2-1) and Texas Tech (0-1). The Bears have never played Oklahoma State. Cal is 2-2 against Big 12 schools under Jeff Tedford, with wins over Baylor (70-22, 2002) and Texas A&M (45-10, 2006, Holiday Bowl), and losses to Kansas State (42-28, 2003) and Texas Tech (45-31, 2004, Holiday Bowl).

Cal Begins Season Unranked Nationally

Cal started the 2010 campaign unranked for only the fourth time since Jeff Tedford took over as head coach in 2002. The Bears' highest ranking during this time came in 2006, when Cal was listed at No. 9 by AP. The Bears have started the season No. 12 on four occasions: 2004, 2007 and 2009, while they were 19th in 2005. The next set of national polls will be released on Sept. 6, 2010, after games taking place Labor Day.

Cal Picked Seventh in Pac-10 Preseason Media Poll

After being picked to finish second in the Pac-10 preseason poll of media members who regularly cover the league five of the previous six years, Cal was chosen seventh in 2010. Defending Pac-10 champion Oregon narrowly edged USC as the choice to win the 2010 Pac-10 title. The Ducks received 15 of the 25 first-place votes, snapping USC's eight-year run at the top, and were chosen to win the conference for only the second time (also in 2001) in the second-closest voting since the poll began in 1961. USC was tabbed to finish second in the poll and was followed by Oregon State, Stanford, Arizona, Washington, Cal, UCLA, Arizona State and Washington State.

Tedford Passes Waldorf on Coaching Wins Leaderboard

Ninth-year head coach Jeff Tedford recorded his 68th career victory at Cal with a 52-3 win over UC Davis on Sept. 4, 2010, passing the legendary Pappy Waldorf on the school's all-time list. Tedford also equaled Waldorf's all-time school record of games coached in the contest as he walked the sidelines for the 103rd time. Tedford now has both an all-time and Cal coaching record of 68-35 (.660). He ranks third on the school's all-time win list behind Andy Smith (74, 1916-25) and James Schaeffer (73, 1909-15). In addition, Tedford has led his team to a current string of seven consecutive bowl appearances (2003-09) to set a school record and eight straight winning seasons (2002-09) to tie another school mark. He is one of only eight current FBS coaches to have an active string of at least eight consecutive winning seasons. In addition, his teams won a school-record four bowl games in a row (2005-08) and have registered a 7-1 mark in Big Games to equal Waldorf's seven victories over Stanford. His win totals for conference games (41) and road contests (23) are already the most ever by a Cal coach.

Leading Rusher, Receiver, Passer and Tackler All Return

Cal has its leading rusher, receiver, passer and tackler from 2009 all back in 2010 in Shane Vereen, Marvin Jones, Kevin Riley and Mike Mohamed.

After Jahvid Best suffered a season-ending injury against Oregon State, Vereen became the team's primary ball carrier over the final four games of 2009 and rushed for 566 yards and six touchdowns on 108 carries during that stretch, averaging 141.5 yards per game and 5.2 yards per carry. Vereen earned honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors and finished the 2009 campaign as Cal's leading rusher with 952 yards on 183 carries. He also tied for the team lead with 12 rushing scores, equaling the total posted by Best. Among the Pac-10's per-game leaders, Vereen finished sixth in rushing yards (73.23), tied for sixth in all-purpose running (135.15), tied for 10th in scoring (6.46) and 15th in total offense. He was also sixth in the league in kick return average (23.0 ypr), leading Cal in that category as well as with 1,757 total all-purpose yards (952 rush, 244 receive, 10 punt return, 551 kick return).

Jones paced the club in receptions (43), receiving yards (651) and receiving touchdowns (6). He had at least one reception in all 13 games and ended the campaign with four receptions or more in each of the final four contests, including career highs of six receptions and 107 receiving yards at Washington in the regular-season finale.

Riley completed 209 of 382 passes (54.7%) for a career-high 2,850 yards, which ranks as the fourth-best single season in school history. He finished fourth in the Pac-10 in passing average (219.2 ypg) and passing touchdowns (18), as well as sixth in pass efficiency (128.7) and total offense (223.2 ypg).

Mohamed was a first-team All-Pac-10 and postseason Phil Steele All-Pac-10 first-team selection after leading the conference with 112 tackles, 16 more than the 96 posted by USC's Taylor Mays. Mohamed also earned District 8 All-Academic first-team honors from CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine for the first time and Pac-10 All-Academic first-team honors for the second year in a row.

The quartet is part of a total of 19 players returning that started at least five games and 54 letterwinners that return in 2010.

Anger, Miller, Mohamed and Riley Preseason All-Americans

Punter Bryan Anger, tight end Anthony Miller, linebacker Mike Mohamed and quarterback Kevin Riley have been named preseason All-Americans by at least one media outlet prior to the start of the 2010 season to lead Cal's preseason honors. A full listing of all preseason honors and rankings for Cal players can be found on the sidebars of pages two and three of game notes.

Mohamed was the most decorated Cal player prior to the 2010 campaign, having been selected to the prestigious Playboy All-America team, while also earning a second-team nod by The Kickoff, third-team honors from NationalChamps.net, Phil Steele and Rivals, and honorable mention from the College Football Insiders and Consensus Draft Services. He is also on 2010 preseason watch lists for the Chuck Bednarik Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, The Lott Trophy and the Rotary Lombardi Award, in addition to being listed as a preseason favorite for the College Football Performance Awards Linebacker Trophy.

Anger also earned several preseason All-America honors, including a third-team selection from Phil Steele and honorable mention recognition from the College Football Insiders and NationalChamps.net.

Miller was an honorable mention choice of the College Football Insiders, while Riley was picked as an honorable mention selection of Consensus Draft Services. The preseason All-America nods were the first for both players.

14 Pick Up 2010 Preseason All-Pac-10 Honors

Preseason All-America honorees Bryan Anger, Anthony Miller, Mike Mohamed and Kevin Riley were joined by 10 teammates that also notched preseason All-Pac-10 honors, including Sean Cattouse (Jr., DB), Chris Guarnero (Sr., OL), Derrick Hill (Sr., DL), Marvin Jones (Jr., WR), Cameron Jordan (Sr., DL), Mychal Kendrick (Jr., LB), Jeremy Ross (Sr., WR/RET), Mitchell Schwartz (Jr., OL), Matt Summers-Gavin (So., OL) and Shane Vereen (Jr., TB).

Defensive Shutdown

Cal allowed only 81 total yards of offense (14 rushing, 67 passing) in the debut of first-year defensive coordinator Clancy Pendergast in the team's 2010 season opener against UC Davis, marking the first time Cal had held its opponent to fewer than 150 yards of total offense since San Jose State totaled 147 on Oct. 1, 1994. The Aggies managed only four first downs and averaged just 1.8 yards on 45 plays. The Bears surrendered a first down to UC Davis on the first play of the game, then didn't give up another one until the Aggies' first drive of the third quarter. UC Davis' four total first downs tie for the third fewest ever by a Cal opponent and is the lowest total since San Jose State had just one in 1968 against Cal's Bear Minimum defense.

Offensive Production

Cal scored 50 or more points in a season opener for the second consecutive year and for the third time since Andy Ludwig became the team's offensive coordinator in 2009 with its 52-3 victory over UC Davis on Saturday, running its string of victories when the team scores at least 30 points to 29 in a row. It was the 10th under head coach Jeff Tedford the Bears have reached the 50-point plateau. Cal's 517 yards of total offense – equally balanced with 287 passing and 230 rushing – were the most since the Golden Bears amassed 559 against Washington State on Oct. 24, 2009. The 500-plus yard effort marked the fourth time in 14 games over the last two seasons that Cal has reached the mark. In 2009, Cal's fate largely rested on the performance of its offense as the Bears averaged 40.1 points per outing in the team's eight wins, while scoring only 11.4 points per contest in its five losses.

Sparkling Debut for Keenan Allen

True freshman wide receiver Keenan Allen made one of the most memorable debuts in Cal football history. Allen caught four passes for 120 yards, including a 48-yard touchdown reception. His 120 receiving yards were the most by a Cal wide receiver since LaReylle Cunningham had 138 yards at Maryland on Sept. 13, 2008, and only 10 shy of the single-game true freshman school record set twice by DeSean Jackson at UCLA (Oct. 8, 2005) and in the Las Vegas Bowl versus BYU (Dec. 22, 2005). Allen also had three rushes for 38 yards, including one on an option in which he reversed field and went 18 yards for a score after the play had broken down, as well as another on a 17-yarder that was ruled a lateral. He added one kick return for 18 yards.

Riley's Records

Kevin Riley continued to climb in Cal's career record book after completing 14-of-20 passes for 258 yards and three touchdowns in the season opener versus UC Davis. The three touchdown throws gives him 40 for his career to tie Mike Pawlawski (1988-91) for seventh place all-time at Cal, with Riley having now thrown three or more TDs in a game on six occasions. He also notched his sixth career 250-yard game to move into 10th on the school's all-time list, while moving past the 5,000 mark for career passing yards. His new total of 5,031 is only nine short of Justin Vedder in 10th place. Riley continues to lead the Pac-10's active quarterbacks in career victories (16-8 in 24 starts), touchdowns and games played (tied with Washington's Jake Locker at 29).

Vereen Scores Three Times, Extends Catch Streak

Tailback Shane Vereen continued to find the end zone with three touchdowns during the team's season opener against UC Davis, recording a multiple-touchdown game for the fifth time in his career and equaling his previous career game-high of three (all rushing) against both Eastern Washington and Stanford in 2009. Vereen scored a pair of touchdowns on the ground against UC Davis on a pair of seven-yard runs to move into sole possession of eighth-place on Cal's career list for rushing touchdowns with 18 scores. He was also on the receiving end of a 23-yard pass to his all-time totals to 22 touchdowns and 132 points. Last year, Vereen equaled the 12 touchdowns scored on the ground by Jahvid Best and added another two on scoring grabs. For good measure against UC Davis, Vereen also extended his string of consecutive games with at least one catch in all 27 of his collegiate contests, with two grabs for 28 yards.

Mohamed Moves onto Top-10 List for Career Tackles

Preseason All-American linebacker Mike Mohamed has moved into 10th place on Cal's all-time list of tacklers. The 2009 Pac-10 leader paced Cal with a team-high seven stops in the season opener against UC Davis to give him 252 for his career. Eighth place is within reasonable reach for Mohamed during his next game vs. Colorado with Syd'Quan Thompson (257, 9th) and Donnie McCleskey (258, 8th) the next two players in front of him.

Backup Backs Post Career-Bests

Backup tailback Isi Sofele had the biggest rushing game of his Cal career in the season opener versus UC Davis, setting new single-game highs with nine carries and 58 yards rushing. Dasarte Yarnway also rushed five times for 23 yards in his first collegiate contest.

Jones Has Big Day

Marvin Jones, the team's leading receiver last year, started the 2010 campaign with a team-high five catches for 81 yards and a touchdown. One of his catches was of the spectacular variety, when he came down with a career-long 51-yarder from Kevin Riley at the UC Davis 29-yard line despite a pass interference penalty called on defender who was draped on him.

Sweeney's Significant Stats

Backup quarterback Beau Sweeney had his biggest day as a college player after entering the game for the second series of the second half. Sweeney completed 6-of-8 attempts for 29 yards and added six carries for 34 yards and his first career touchdown, all single-game career highs.

Tavecchio Ties Career Mark

Placekicker Giorgio Tavecchio tied a single-game career high by converting on each of his seven extra-point attempt. He added a 23-yard field goal on his only attempt to give him 10 points, marking the fourth time in his career he has reached double digits. Tavecchio's kickoffs reached an average of the five-yard-line, a marked improvement from last season when his average kick landed near the opponents' 12.

Action Spread Around

Cal's stat sheet against UC Davis included nine players that had rushing stats, 11 that caught at least one of the team's 20 completions, 24 tacklers and three quarterbacks that saw action among the 73 players that participated.

Success in Even-Numbered Years

Cal has had big seasons in each of the previous three even years, posting records of 10-2 (2004), 10-3 (2006) and 9-4 (2008). After a victory in its 2010 season-opener versus UC Davis, Cal is now a combined mark of 30-9 (.769) over the last four campaigns occurring in even years. The Bears are a perfect 20-0 at home during the period with a 5-0 record at Memorial Stadium in 2004, followed by 7-0 marks in both 2006 and 2008, and a current 1-0 tally in 2010.

One Rushing Streak Ends, Another Trend Continues

Cal's string of seven straight seasons in which a running back gained over 1,000 yards ended in 2009, but the Bears did have two players rush for 600 or more yards for the sixth time in the last seven seasons in a testament to the program's two-tailback philosophy. Shane Vereen led the team with a career-high 952 yards on the ground, while Jahvid Best added 867 despite missing the final four games due to injury. Cal got off to a good start in making that seven of the last eight years with two backs recording at least 600 yards on the ground as Shane Vereen had 67 and Isi Sofele added 52 in the 2010 season opener against UC Davis.

Bears Coming Off Best Road Record Since 2004

Cal will play twice at home before hitting the road for the first time in 2010 at Nevada on Friday, Sept. 17, in a nationally-televised ESPN2 contest. Last year, Cal posted a 4-2 record in true road games to register its best mark in those contests since 2004. The Bears won at Minnesota (Sept. 19), UCLA (Oct. 17), Arizona State (Oct. 31) and Stanford (Nov. 21), with the two losses coming at Oregon (Sept. 26) and Washington (Dec. 5). The 2004 squad was 5-1 in true road contests. Prior to 2009, Cal hadn't posted a winning road record since 2005, when the Bears were 3-2 in true road games.

Big-Play Bears

The Cal offense was known for the big play in 2009, and the Bears came up with five plays of at least 20 yards in their 2010 season-opener. Quarterback Kevin Riley connected three times on passes of at least 45 yards, with Marvin Jones (career-high 51 yards) and Keenan Allen (career-high 48-yard TD, 45 yards) the recipients. The other two plays of 20 or more yards were a 37-yard punt return by Jeremy Ross and a 23-yard touchdown pass from Riley to tailback Shane Vereen.

On the Tube

Cal has appeared on live television 45 times in its last 46 contests with the lone exception the Bears' home contest vs. Washington State on Oct. 24, 2009, snapping a string of 38 straight games on television. A total of 87 games have been televised over the last nine seasons during the Jeff Tedford era. Cal had every game of a season televised for the first time in 2007 and then repeated the feat in 2008.

Home Field Advantage

Cal has posted an overall record of 34-6 (.850) at Memorial Stadium over its last 40 games dating back to the final two home contests of 2003. In fact, Cal is a perfect 34-0 at home over this period against teams other than Oregon State (0-4) and USC (0-3), who have combined to go 7-0 at Memorial Stadium since the Bears knocked off the Trojans at home in 2003. Cal has been unbeaten at home in a season three times (2004, '06, '08) under head coach Jeff Tedford. The Golden Bears' appeal is shown by a current streak of 38 games with at least 50,000-plus fans in attendance at Memorial Stadium (every contest over the last seven seasons), including 58,040 in its 2010 season opener against UC Davis. Cal just missed averaging a home crowd of 60,000 or more fans per game for the fifth time in six years in 2009 with its average crowd of 59,472 over six dates. The team's best attendance numbers during the Tedford era came in 2006, when the Bears drew 450,223 fans and averaged a record 64,318 spectators per contest. The Bears most recent sellout was a crowd of 71,799 vs. USC on Oct. 3, 2009.

Looking for School Record Ninth Winning Season in a Row

Cal is looking for its ninth consecutive winning season in 2010 to establish a school record. The Bears current run of eight straight winning seasons from 2002-09 has tied an 85-year-old school mark that was set 1918-25 under head coach Andy Smith. The Bears did record 10 straight winning seasons from 1907-16 but those were split between rugby (8, 1907-14) and football (2, 1915-16).

Bowling Bears

Cal has played in a bowl game for each of the last seven seasons to set a school record, recording a 5-2 record in those contests and winning a school record four in a row from 2005-08. Head coach Jeff Tedford is the only Cal coach to have ever won more than two bowl games. Each of Cal's seven bowl appearances under Tedford are listed below.

Being the Best, Beating the Best

The Bears are 15-8 when playing as a top-10 team and 36-20 when the club is ranked in the top 25 of at least one set of rankings since head coach Jeff Tedford took over in 2002. Cal has played 27 nationally ranked teams during the Tedford era and posted a 13-14 record in those contests. In 2009, the Bears recorded back-to-back wins in consecutive weeks over nationally ranked teams – defeating then-No. 18 Arizona (Nov. 14) and then winning at then-No. 14 Stanford (Nov. 28) – for the first time since 1950.

Turnover Margin a Key

Winning the turnover battle has been emphasized since Jeff Tedford's arrival in 2002 and the Golden Bears had another excellent season in 2009 with a +.31 per-game margin (21 takeaways, 17 turnovers). The Bears are 38-4 when committing fewer turnovers than opponents during the Tedford era, compared to 16-9 when tied and 14-22 when opponents win the battle. In Pac-10 games, the stats are even more decisive as Cal is 23-2 with a positive margin in turnovers, 10-6 when the turnover table is tied and 8-19 with a deficit. In the first game of 2010 against UC Davis, both the Bears and the Aggies had a single giveaway.

Coaching Changes

Cal has two new coaches on board in 2010 with the addition of defensive coordinator Clancy Pendergast and special teams coordinator/tight ends coach Jeff Genyk. Pendergast is in his 20th season of coaching at either the professional or collegiate level in 2010, including the last six campaigns as an NFL defensive coordinator with Kansas City (2009) and Arizona (2004-08). He served as the defensive coordinator for the 2008 Arizona team that reached Super Bowl XLIII after capturing the NFC title. Genyk is in his 19th season of collegiate coaching in 2010, most recently having served as a head coach at Eastern Michigan from 2004-08. He previously had a 12-year stint as an assistant at Northwestern from 1992-2003.

Lots of New Faces

Cal had five players make their first collegiate start and four true freshmen play in the 2010 season opener against UC Davis, and a total of 21 players see their first collegiate action. Wide receiver Keenan Allen became the first true freshman to start in his first game at Cal since wide receiver DeSean Jackson in 2005. Others making their first collegiate start were Marc Anthony (So., CB), Ernest Owusu (Jr., DL), Brian Schwenke (So., LG) and Eric Stevens (So., FB). True freshman that played in addition to Allen included linebackers Nick Forbes and David Wilkerson, and tight end Jacob Wark. Others who saw their first collegiate action were Mark Brazinski (RFr., OL), Dan Camporeale (RFr., LB), Austin Clark (RFr., DL), Deandre Coleman (RFr., DL), Ryan Davis (Jr., LB), Sam DeMartinis (Jr., OL), Nico Dumont (RFr., FB), Coleman Edmond (Jr., WR), Tyré Ellison (So., DB), Justin Gates (Jr., OL), Spencer Hagan (RFr., WR), Alex Logan (RFr., DB), Dash Oliver (Fr., DB), Tyler Rigsbee (So., OL), Charles Siddoway (RFr., OL), Steve Williams (RFr., DB) and Dasarte Yarnway (RFr., TB).

More Notes from the UC Davis Game

- Cal led 35-0 at halftime to mark the first time Cal had shut out an opponent through the first half since Oct. 1, 2005, when the Bears led Arizona, 14-0, at halftime in an eventual 28-0 win. The last time Cal led by 35 at halftime was Sept. 6, 2008, when Cal was ahead 42-3 at Washington State during a 66-3 victory.

- Cal scored 28 points in the second quarter, marking the first time Cal had scored that many in a single period since they tallied 28 points in the first quarter of a 49-17 victory over Washington State on Oct. 24, 2009.

Academic Prowess Continues

Cal players have earned Pac-10 All-Academic honors 83 times in the past eight years from 2002-09 under head coach Jeff Tedford, second-most in the conference during that span. Nine Cal players were recognized on the 2009 Pac-10 All-Academic team. Mark Boskovich, Alex Lagemann and Mike Mohamed were first-team selections. Ernest Owusu, Matt Summers-Gavin and Giorgio Tavecchio were named to the second team, while Skylar Curran, Chris Guarnero and Mitchell Schwartz received honorable mention recognition. Boskovich and Mohamed also earned CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District 8 first-team honors, while Syd'Quan Thompson was named one of 22 national winners of the Academic Momentum Award as part of the Scholar-Baller Program, in conjunction with the National Consortium for Academics and Sports (NCAS). After a period on academic probation following his first year at Cal, Thompson's GPA improved to 2.995 during the spring of 2009. In 2008, Alex Mack earned the Draddy Trophy (later renamed the Campbell Trophy) honoring college football's top scholar-athlete. Of the 163 seniors who have played for Tedford, 144 (88%) have earned their degrees and/or gone on NFL careers. The Cal football team was second in the Pac-10 in the most recent Academic Progress Rates (APR) released in June of 2010.

Cal's Colorado Connections

- Three Cal players – Chris Guarnero (Westminster, CO/Mullen HS), Austin Hinder (Steamboat Springs, CO/Steamboat Springs HS) and Alex Logan (Denver, CO/Mullen HS) – list cities in Colorado as their hometown. Guarnero and Logan both hail from the same high school.

- Offensive line coach Steve Marshall was the offensive line coach at Colorado for two seasons from 2000-01, helping lead the Buffaloes to the Fiesta Bowl following a 2001 Big 12 title.

- Strength and conditioning coach John Krasinski was an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Colorado State from 1993-96, helping lead the Rams to the Holiday Bowl in following the 1994 season in which CSU won the Western Athletic Conference and the 1995 campaign in which the Rams tied for the league title.

For Openers

Cal improved to 72-39-4 (.644) in season openers with its UC Davis win and has now won six of its last seven. Cal also upped its perfect home record when opening the season in Berkeley since head coach Jeff Tedford's arrival. The Bears had previous home victories over Baylor (2002), Sacramento State (2005), Tennessee (2007), Michigan State (2008) and Maryland (2009). Cal is 7-2 overall in season openers under Tedford, also with a victory at Air Force (2004), and losses vs. Kansas State (2003, in Kansas City) and at Tennessee (2006).

Final Season in Current Memorial Stadium Configuration

The 2010 season will be Cal's final campaign in the current configuration of Memorial Stadium. Cal will host its 2011 home schedule at San Francisco's AT&T Park, playing its home games away from Memorial Stadium for the first time ever since the facility opened in 1923. Cal will return to a renovated and retrofitted Memorial Stadium in 2012.

Memorial Stadium Retrofit and Renovation

Since it opened in the fall of 1923, California Memorial Stadium has generated scores of unforgettable memories for generations of Golden Bears. From the Wonder Teams of the 1920s to the Pappy Waldorf years mid-century to the current success attained under head coach Jeff Tedford, the venerable facility has treated fans of all ages to many of the greatest games in the history of Cal football.

Now, work is underway to retrofit and renovate the historic building, bringing it up to modern standards and creating a facility that will significantly reduce seismic risk and create a more enjoyable environment for the hundreds of thousands of fans who attend games every year – all while maintaining the architecture and character of the celebrated structure.

Construction on the \$321 million project began in earnest in early June 2010 and is expected to be completed in time for the 2012 season opener. After playing in the current configuration of Memorial Stadium one last time in 2010, the Golden Bears will move to temporary quarters at San Francisco's AT&T Park in 2011 before returning to campus for the following campaign and providing new generations of Cal fans the opportunity to treasure the venue for years to come.

Student-Athlete High Performance Center

The Student-Athlete High Performance Center, under construction since late 2008, is scheduled to open prior to the 2011 football season and will become a modern new home for approximately 450 student-athletes in football and 12 other sports to use on a daily basis. The 142,000-square-foot facility will house locker rooms, offices and meeting rooms, as well as areas for strength and conditioning, sports medicine, nutrition and academics.

The building is the physical manifestation of Cal's High Performance Initiative, a nontraditional approach to excellence that challenges conventional ways of thinking about and delivering high performance in an intercollegiate setting. In an effort to take Cal to the highest level, the HPI applies worldwide best practices in sport and human performance to all aspects of the athletic department. This commitment creates and sustains high performance across Cal Athletics and maximizes the potential of our student-athletes, coaches and support staff.

The High Performance Initiative has three primary objectives – to maximize competitive advantage, to efficiently use available resources and to optimize the student-athlete experience – which will be attained primarily through applying a different mindset to intercollegiate athletics and by delivering world-class advanced support services and facilities.

Jeff Tedford

Head Coach • 9th Season at Cal (68-35, .657)

Jeff Tedford became the winningest coach in the modern era of Cal football when he recorded his 68th victory at the school to pass legendary head coach Pappy Waldorf in Cal's most recent win over UC Davis on Sept. 4, 2010, and will also move past Waldorf to become the school's all-time leader in games coached when he steps on the sidelines against Colorado on Sept. 11, 2010.

Tedford is now third on the school's all-time win list behind Andy Smith (74-16-7, 1916-25) and James Schaeffer (73-16-8, 1909-15) with the majority of Schaeffer's victories coming when Cal played rugby rather than football. Tedford has already set the school record with 23 road wins and also has another impressive school mark with a 41-27 (.603) record against Pac-10 teams, finishing lower than fifth only once.

Now in his ninth year at the helm and the Pac-10's longest-tenured coach in consecutive years at the same school, Tedford has established Cal as one of the elite football programs in the Pac-10 and lifted the Golden Bears into the national discussion on a consistent basis. The Bears have won more games than any Pac-10 school other than USC since he arrived in 2002 and finished among the nation's top 25 in four of the last six seasons (2004-06, '08). Cal has been ranked in the top 10 at some point during the season in five of the last six years (2004-07, '09) heading into 2010.

Cal also has a current school-record run of seven straight bowl appearances and is 5-2 in the postseason under Tedford, making him the first Cal mentor with more than two bowl victories. He has also led Cal to a school-record-tying eight straight winning seasons and is one of only eight current Football Bowl Subdivision coaches to have a current string of at least that length with only six accomplishing the feat at the same school.

All of this from a team which won just one game in 2001, the year prior to his arrival. The Cal football renaissance rates as one of the most impressive turnarounds in college football history.

Not only have Tedford's teams got it done on the field, they've also got it done in the classroom. His players have been recognized as Pac-10 All-Academic honorees 83 times since his arrival. Of the 165 seniors who played for Tedford in his first seven seasons, 144 (89%) have earned their degrees and/or gone on to NFL careers.

Tedford's success with the Cal program has resulted in local devotion and national attention. Cal drew an average of 59,472 fans in 2009 and began the 2010 campaign with a crowd of 58,040 against UC Davis to extend a string of playing in front of at least 50,000 fans at Memorial Stadium to 38 games in a row. In 2006, the Bears set school records for average fans per home game (64,318) and overall (450,223) spectators. The following year in 2007, Cal set a season-ticket record of 41,366. Cal last played in front of a sellout home crowd of 71,799 vs. USC on Oct. 3, 2009.

Nationally, the Bears have also had multiple Heisman Trophy candidates under Tedford's tutelage with J.J. Arrington (2004), Marshawn Lynch (2006), DeSean Jackson (2007) and Jahvid Best (2009) among top candidates at some point in the season.

Other national recognition has come the Bears way in recent years. Alex Mack was the winner of the 2008 Draddy Award (often referred to as the Academic Heisman and now known as the Campbell Trophy). In 2006, the Bears had a pair of players collect prestigious national awards. Jackson was the recipient of the inaugural Randy Moss Award for the top return man in the country, while Daymeion Hughes earned the Lott Trophy given to a defensive player to equally recognize his athletic performance and personal character.

2010 NFL Draft

Former Cal players Tyson Alualu (DL), Jahvid Best (TB) and Syd'Quan Thompson (DB) were selected in the 2010 NFL Draft.

Alualu (Jacksonville Jaguars, 10th overall) and Best (Detroit Lions, 30th overall) were both chosen in the first round to mark the first time Cal had a pair of players selected in the first round since 2003 and only the fourth time in school history. Alualu and Best are the 24th and 25th players in Cal history to be selected in the first round, while six Bears have been taken in the first round and 32 selected overall since Jeff Tedford became the team's head coach in 2002.

Cal was the only Pac-10 team with a player drafted in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft. The Bears had never had two first-round selections while no other Pac-10 team had a single one.

The last time any Pac-10 team had two players selected in the first round without another conference player being chosen was in 1970, when USC defensive end Al Cowlings (Buffalo, 5th overall) and offensive tackle Sid Smith (Kansas City, 26th overall) were both picked in the first round.

Alualu's selection was the highest a Cal player has gone in the draft since Andre Carter was taken seventh overall by San Francisco in 2001. He was also the Bears' ninth-highest pick ever.

Thompson was also selected in the seventh round of the draft (225th overall) by the Denver Broncos.

He quickly apologized to coach Jeff Tedford for the mistake. Aside from that tiny hiccup, Allen was otherwise brilliant in his collegiate debut.

Allen ran 18 yards for a second-quarter touchdown, then caught a 48-yard TD pass from Kevin Riley to start Cal's second-half scoring in a 52-3 rout of UC Davis on Saturday. Allen made four receptions for 120 yards.

Riley threw for 258 yards and three touchdowns in just more than a half of work, helping Tedford become California's winningest coach in the modern era as the Golden Bears won for a sixth time in their last seven season openers.

Shane Vereen ran for two scores and caught a touchdown pass, all in the first half. Marvin Jones made a 13-yard TD reception for Cal, which jumped out to a big lead early to avoid becoming an upset victim by the Aggies, the way Stanford did five years ago during Davis' last visit to a Pac-10 school.

Riley completed his first nine passes and 14 of 20 overall—including Jones' career-best 51-yard reception on which he made the play despite pass interference that was declined.

UC Davis avoided being shut out when it got a 43-yard field goal from Sean Kelley at the 10:24 mark of the third quarter. Not much went right for the Aggies, who shocked Stanford 20-17 on The Farm in 2005. Redshirt freshman quarterback Randy Wright completed 8 of 22 passes for 57 yards in his first career start. He became the first freshman to start an opener for the Aggies since Ryan Flanigan in 2000.

2009 Season in Review

Cal equaled a school record with its eighth straight winning season and extended another school mark by making its seventh consecutive bowl appearances in 2009 during a season that included many highlights and a few disappointments.

Before the season even started, Cal was widely viewed by experts to be the Pac-10 team with the best chance at ending USC's seven-year run on top of the league standings. The Golden Bears were picked to finish second in most preseason Pac-10 polls and were ranked as high as No. 12 nationally.

Cal started the season strong with three consecutive victories to move up to No. 6 in the country.

An inspired Bears squad avenged a surprising 2008 loss at Maryland by blasting the Terps, 52-13, in the season-opener at home. Heisman Trophy candidate Jahvid Best set the tone early when he ran for a 73-yard touchdown on the only play of Cal's second drive of the game then scored again on a two-yard run only two plays later after Cal had recovered a Maryland fumble on the ensuing kickoff. Kevin Riley threw for four touchdowns, completing 17-of-26 passes for 298 yards. Best finished with 137 yards rushing on only 10 carries. Cal had 6.0 sacks led by a career-high two from Ernest Owusu.

Eastern Washington was no match for the Bears when Cal hosted the Eagles in their next contest. Grant Washington scored on a four-yard pass from Matt Nichols with 6:30 to go in the first quarter to tie the score and briefly give the visitors hope for a stunning upset. But Cal was relentless after that, scoring the final 52 points as Best led the way with 144 yards rushing and a TD on 17 carries, while Shane Vereen scored three times on the ground. Mike Mohamed's jarring hit on Nichols at midfield was one of the most memorable defensive plays of the year, causing a fumble that Mychal Kendricks returned 45 yards to the Eagles' five-yard line to set up Best's rushing touchdown. Kendricks finished with a career-high 15 stops.

The Bears then traveled to Minnesota for their first road game of the season, hoping to change their luck after a 1-4 record in true road games the previous season. Best had one of his most amazing games ever, tying a school record with five rushing touchdowns (career-high 26 carries, 131 yards) on a nationally-televised ESPN broadcast and playing in front a sold-out crowd of 50,805 at the recently-opened TCF Bank Stadium. His effort would catapult him into the top spot on many Heisman lists and a photo of him leaping into the end zone landed him in Sports Illustrated. The game was tied 21-21 in the fourth quarter until a pair of two-yard TD runs by Best, the first set up by two long passes from Kevin Riley to Jeremy Ross, provided the winning 35-21 margin.

The 3-0 start moved the Bears up to the No. 6 ranking in the country and arguably made them the favorite to claim the Pac-10 crown at that point in the season, but the next two games on the schedule were daunting.

Cal's season-opener was at Oregon's Autzen

Stadium, where the Bears had won their most recent visit in 2007 but had previously dropped seven in a row to the Ducks dating back to 1989. The game started well for Cal when C.J. Moncrease forced a fumble on the opening kickoff that was recovered by D.J. Campbell at the Oregon 22-yardline. But the writing was on the wall immediately as Cal lost eight yards on its first three plays and had to settle for a career-long 47-yard field goal from Vince D'Amato. The day was all Oregon's after that as the Ducks won 42-3, with Jeremiah Masoli (21-25-0-253-3) connecting on three touchdown passes to Ed Dickson (11-148, 3 TD) and LaMichael James rushing 21 times for 118 yards and a touchdown.

The next game on the schedule was USC's visit to Memorial Stadium, but a game that had billed as a Pac-10 showdown well before the season started was now more of a game of survival. Both

yards and also had a career-high seven receptions for 61 yards and a score.

Cal put its three-game win streak on the line against Oregon State the following week at Memorial Stadium. The Beavers jumped out to a 14-0 lead before the Bears mustered a 15-play, 81-yard drive that ended with Best leaping high into the air and into the end zone to cut the score to 14-7. But the play also ended Best's collegiate career and provided for the one of the most frightening moments in Cal football history as Best laid motionless on the ground as emergency personnel attended to him. He was later transported to Highland Hospital in Oakland, where he stayed the night before being released the next day. Best would recover from the injuries he sustained in the fall and be drafted in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions but would never play again at Cal. Oregon State would go on to win the game, 31-14.

Cal would still manage to put back-to-back wins together over nationally-ranked teams Arizona and Stanford in the next two games, something the Bears had not done in consecutive weeks since 1950.

Vereen was the star on both nights.

He ran for 159 yards on 30 carries at Arizona (both career highs that smash the following week at Stanford) and also scored the game-clinching touchdown on a 61-yard run with 1:21 remaining,

after Giorgio Tavecchio had put the Bears ahead, 18-16, on a 22-yard field goal with 4:46 to go.

His signature game came against the Cardinal when he again established career highs with 193 yards rushing on 42 carries, tied for the second-most by an FBS player in 2009. He also equaled a career-high three rushing touchdowns but the most dramatic moment of the game came when Mohamed intercepted a pass by Stanford quarterback Andrew Luck on the Bears' own three-yard line with 1:36 remaining to save a 34-28 Cal win.

The Bears were riding high but their last two games would be disappointments with a 42-10 defeat at Washington in the regular-season finale and a 37-27 loss to Utah at the Poinsettia Bowl.

The performance by opposing quarterbacks Jake Locker of Washington (19-23-0-248-3) and Jordan Wynn of Utah (26-36-1-338-3) were the most damaging factors in both defeats. Vereen did manage two more strong games, rushing for 92 yards on 16 carries at Washington and a bowl-high 122 yards and two scores on 20 carries vs. Utah. Syd'Quan Thompson became the school's all-time leader in pass breakups (36) during the game and also completed his career by starting all 52 games possible to set a school record.

The team's 2009 accolades were numerous both on and off the field, including first-team All-Pac-10 selections for Tyson Alualu, Bryan Anger, Mohamed, Mike Tepper and Thompson.

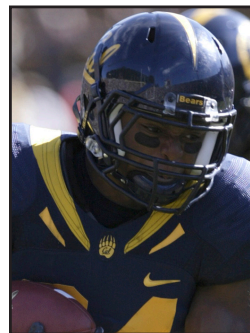
Cal's team statistical highlights included an offense that committed only 17 turnovers, the least ever by a Cal team, and a rushing defense that ranked second in the Pac-10.

teams came into the contest with a Pac-10 loss (USC had been upset by Washington in its conference opener two weeks earlier) and the Trojans would hand the Bears a second with a convincing 30-3 victory.

Cal would rebound to win five of its next six games to get back to 8-3 overall and 5-3 in the conference standings.

The run started with a 45-26 win at UCLA to give head coach Jeff Tedford his first win in Los Angeles after seven previous tries. Vereen (17-154, TD) and Best (18-102, TD) both had 100-yard games with Vereen's a career-high that he would break later in the season and Best picking up 93 of his yards on the third-longest run in Cal history. Best also had a 51-yard TD catch, while Marvin Jones had the first two-TD reception game of his career and Riley threw for three scores.

A 49-17 home victory over Washington State was next as Riley became the first Cal quarterback to ever throw touchdowns on each of his first three passes in a game, while Jeremy Ross totaled a career-high 228 all-purpose yards and Best rushed for 159 yards and two scores on 13 carries. Ross had 191 of his all-purpose yards on three players, returning a punt 76 yards for a touchdown, catching a 61-yard pass and bringing the opening kickoff back 54 yards.

Cal's third straight victory was a nailbiting 23-21 win at Arizona State. Giorgio Tavecchio's 24-yard field goal with 21 seconds remaining provided the winning margin to cap an 11-play, 74-yard drive. Riley finished 27-of-44 for a season-high 357 yards and two scores, and was 5-of-6 for 85 yards on the game-winning drive. Best rushed 18 times for 63
