## **SHOWDOWN TIME**

Buffs, Rams square off at high noon Saturday in Denver

## This week's notable storylines...

- ► Colorado State and Colorado renew the oldest active series in each program's history. The teams first met on Feb. 11, 1893, in Fort Collins.
- ► The latest installment, the 2010 Cinch Jeans Rocky Mountain Showdown, returns the rivalry to Denver. Last year, the Rams went into Boulder and registered their first Folsom Field win in 23 years.
- ► CSU bids for its first set of consecutive wins over the Buffs since 1999-2000, when the Rams won the first two MWC titles. CSU was 14th in the final 2000 polls.
- ► That also marked the last time the Rams won season openers in consecutive years, something they can do Saturday. CSU in 1994 kicked off seven straight seasons (1994-2000) with a win, until losing to the Buffs in '01.
- ► CSU's Pete Thomas, believed to be the nation's only true freshman QB scheduled to start his team's opener this week, makes his college debut.
- ► Each team finished 3-9 in 2009, but each squad has changed dramatically. Several players on both sidelines will make their first move toward household-name status this weekend, including a pair of FBS transfers, CSU RB Raymond Carter (UCLA) and CU WR Toney Clemons Media Info......2 (Michigan).
- ▶ Possibly seven true freshmen could make their CSU debut.
- ► The Rams have won four of their last five non-conference Coaches in the press box ......10 games. They've also won six of their last eight, since their last Individual notes ......13 trip to Denver, a season-opening loss to CU Aug. 31, 2008. Opponent schedules/results......15

## Rams, Buffs extend football series through 2020: The

next generation of recruits and fans will experience the most exciting football rivalry in the Centennial State. And that rivalry, which has gained national prominence since it first moved to Denver

in 1998, is returning to the Mile High City for the next 10 years.

**Game Notes** 

► Paul Kowalczyk and Mike Bohn, the respective directors of athletics at Colorado State

University and the University of Colorado, announced at this time last year a 10-year extension to their football series, Colorado State's oldest and richest gridiron rivalry. The announcement was made in conjunction with the Metro Denver Sports Commission and Stadium Management Company.

- ► As part of the agreement, the 2010 game will move to Invesco Field at Mile High, and remain in Denver every season through 2019. In 2020, the contest will move to Fort Collins.
- "This is the state's signature college football event and the game belongs in Denver," Kowalczyk said. "Mike, MDSC, SMC and I have worked cooperatively and diligently to craft an agreement that is beneficial for all parties involved. This series benefits our institution, program and fans on many levels. This state is fortunate to have two premier football programs, and we're going to continue to showcase this rivalry for at least another decade."

- ► The extension means the football programs will meet for at least 26 straight years (1995-2020), the longest uninterrupted string of games in the 116-year-old series since they met for 37 consecutive seasons from 1906-42, a streak ended by World War II.
- ► The programs, scheduled to meet for the 82nd time in their Sept. 4 season opener at Invesco Field, first met on Feb. 11, 1893, in Fort Collins.
- ► The current agreement is believed to represent the longest football extension ever negotiated by the state's two largest institutions.

**Winning streaks:** After a win in 2009, the Rams have an opportunity to register their first winning streak against their bitter rivals since 1999-2000.

► CSU owns only five all-time winning streaks against the opponent it has played the most.

**Dan Hawkins** — Representing a level of competitive spirit, Dan Hawkins enters his fifth season at Colorado as the 17th active winningest head coach.

- ► Hawkins came to Colorado from Boise State, where he compiled a 53-11 record in five seasons as head coach. His teams won or shared four WAC titles, including three outright under his direction.
- ► In the modern history of Division I-A football, only Bob Pruett (Marshall, 58-9), Bob Stoops (Oklahoma, 55-11) and Pete Carroll (Southern California, 54-10) won more games in their first five seasons than Hawkins' 53 at Boise State (a number also matched by Miami's Larry Coker).
- ► In 154 career games as a head coach, his teams have been shut out just once, scoring at least one touchdown in all but three games while being held below 13 points just 12 times.

## NOTABLE INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCES VS. CU

- ▶ RB John Mosure in 2008 returned the first kickoff of his career for a 90-yard TD; on the play, he found a crease in the middle of the field, then out ran three CU pursuers down the far sideline over the last 40 yards before diving for the pylon.
- ► FB Zac Pauga had a career-high five receptions in 2008.
- ▶ In his first college game en route to 2008 Freshman All-America honors, LB Mychal Sisson had five tackles and forced a fumble. In 2009, he had nine tackles and a sack.
- Sophomore All-American Ricky Brewer had 11 tackles in the 2008 game.
- ► K Ben DeLine hit all three field goals, tying a career high, last season in Boulder.
- ► G Jake Gdowski made his first career start in that 2009 game, on his 21st birthday.
- ► RB Leonard Mason made his CSU debut last season and compiled 107 yards on 23 carries (4.7 avg.).
- ► NT Guy Miller made his first career start in the 2009 game and totaled four tackles and two stops for loss, including a sack.
- ► RB John Mosure started the 2009 contest and scored both CSU touchdowns, one via the ground and one through the air.
- ► FS Elijah-Blu Smith delivered a critical hit to force a fumble from WR Scotty McKnight in 2009. He also picked off a pass.

The Rams' home away from home: Colorado State considers Denver a home market. Of CSU's current freshman class on the Fort Collins campus, a little more than half originates from the six-county Denver Metro Area. And of all CSU undergraduates registered this fall, approximately 83 percent are from the state of Colorado.

- ► More than 43,000 Denver Metro Area residents hold degrees from CSU, and 73,000-plus Denver-area citizens have taken classes on the campus. When including donors, and other friends of the university, the number of CSU constituents in Denver rises to nearly 100,000.
- ► "This is more than a football game," Kowalczyk said. "It's annually our institution's single greatest outreach to the Denver market."
- ► Kowalczyk also noted that by having the game in Denver, regardless of whether CSU is the designated home team, the Rams will be able to offer the contest as part of their season-ticket package. That was not the case last season, when the game was a traditional road contest, in Boulder.

Big deal for the Rams: It's no wonder the Rams look forward to the annual clash with their southern neighbors. The two campuses are just 54 miles apart, and the majority of the CSU community knows the rivalry very

- ► According to recent research, 83 percent of Colorado State's enrollment is from Colorado.
- ▶ About one-third of the Rams' football roster also is from the state. No doubt, most of those players grew up following both college teams.
- ► As many as 14 players from Colorado appear in the Rams' two-deep and will play significant roles Saturday.

True freshman under center: Colorado State will start true freshman Pete Thomas in its season opener vs. Colorado, Head Coach Steve Fairchild announced Aug. 17.

- ▶ "Pete's been the most consistent guy this fall," Fairchild said. "We're going to be young this year, but Pete's been the most consistent and hasn't dropped his quard."
- ► Thomas, a poised 6-foot-5, 218-pound passer from Valhalla High School in El Cajon, Calif., could be the only true freshman starting QB in the nation this weekend. Central Florida. Wake Forest and South Carolina are believed to be the only other schools with a chance, but chances are slim, according to SIDs.
- ► Thomas was rated the No. 6 pro-style QB in the nation by Tom Lemming (USA Today Super 25). Rivals.com also ranked him the country's No. 16 pro-style quarterback and No. 48 overall prospect from the state of California.
- ► A three-year starter, three-year captain and two-time team MVP, he guided the Norsemen to a 19-5 record over his final two seasons. Combined over those junior and senior seasons, he threw for 5,553 yards, 52 TDs and only 11 INTs, completing better than 66 percent of his passes to capture consecutive Grossmont South League Offensive Player of the Year honors, in both 2008 and '09. Including the last three contests of his freshman year, he started 36 games in a storied prep career, finishing with back-to-back first-team all-state recognition as a junior and senior.
- ► He graduated from high school one semester early in order to enroll at CSU in January and take part in all 15 CSU practices this past spring.

yards and one interception.

**CSU's past freshmen QB:** According to team historian John Hirn (coloradoaggies.com, Aggies to Rams), Thomas will become the program's youngest starting quarterback since Mark Miller on Sept. 26, 1981. On Sept. 4, Thomas (18 years, 10 months, 24 days) will be only four days older than Miller (18 years, 10 months, 20 days) was 29 years ago as a true freshman at West Virginia, the third game of the '81 campaign. Colorado's top prep quarterback in 1980, incidentally Fairchild's senior year as the CSU signal-caller, Miller hailed from Grand Junction, Colo. He started one other game that season, the following week at Air Force.

A freshman, true or redshirt, has never led the Rams in passing during

- ▶ The youngest starting quarterback in program annals was Bob Hainlen, an 18-year-old true freshman from Trinidad, Colo. At age 18 years, nine months and 11 days, he led the Aggie-Rams to a 33-0 home triumph over Northern Colorado on Sept. 29, 1945, the team's first game in three years due to World War II. Hainlen went on to start at quarterback in the Raisin Bowl, on Jan. 1, 1949, with Fum McGraw and Eddie Hanna, the only two players to have their numbers retired in program history.
- After Sept. 4, Hainlen and Thomas will be the only two freshmen to have ever started a season opener in the rich history of the CSU football program.
- ► The Rams, who started fifth-year seniors Billy Farris in 2008 and Grant Stucker in 2009, are one of only six programs in the nation that will open a third consecutive season with a first-year starter. CSU joins Auburn, North Texas, Mississippi State, Buffalo and Purdue in that category. The last time a CSU passer returned to claim the starting quarterback role was Hanie in 2007, just before he signed with the Chicago Bears, where he now backs up Jay Cutler.
- ► Thomas won't be the first, or the last, true freshman to start a major college football game. The long list includes John Elway (Stanford), Peyton Manning (Tennessee), Kevin Kolb (Houston), Jamelle Holieway (Oklahoma), Chad Henne (Michigan), Jimmy Claussen (Notre Dame), Brady Quinn (Notre Dame), Terrelle Pryor (Ohio State) and Matthew Stafford

## This month in CSU football history

## By John Hirn

Aggies to Rams: The History of Football at Colorado State University

- ▶ 85 years ago Sept. 12, 1925, college president Dr. Charles Lory and other dignitaries laid the cornerstone of the new Men's Gymnasium. The gym, known today as the South College Gym and field house, acted as an indoor practice field for football and continues to serve CSU track in modern times.
- ▶ 75 years ago Sept. 28, 1935, Harry W. Hughes begins his 25th season as head football coach of the Colorado Aggies with a 12-3 win over Wyoming.
- ▶ 70 years ago Sept. 28, 1940, the Colorado Aggies debut new orange uniforms for the 1940 season. The orange jerseys are combined with orange pants, which gives way to the team's nickname "Orange-clad Aggies."
- ▶65 years ago Sept. 29, 1945, the Aggies return to the gridiron after World War II for their first football game since 1942. Aggie coach Hans Wagner starts 18-year-old Bob Hainlen, a freshman from Trinidad, Colo. It is the first time in school history a freshman starts at the quarterback position.
- ▶ 60 years ago Sept. 23, 1950, Aggie halfback and pro football hall of famer Jack Christiansen rushes for 183 yards against the University of Denver. It breaks Eddie Hanna's single-game record set in the 1949 Raisin Bowl for rushing yards. Christiansen's record lasts for 16 years until Oscar Reed breaks it in 1966.
- ▶ 35 years ago Sept. 20, 1975, the Rams' defense beats BYU as CSU, led by middle linebacker Kevin McLain, who forces two fumbles. Keith King recovers a third Cougar fumble while Steve Krum intercepts a pass and returns it 28 yards for a touchdown as 27,491 watch the Rams beat Brigham Young, 21-17.
- ▶ 30 years ago Sept. 6, 1980, in the home opener at Hughes Stadium, CSU coach Sark Arslanian fields the Rams in their visiting white jerseys because they are cooler in the hot sun than the traditional green home jerseys. Rams quarterback Steve Fairchild welcomes the Falcons to the Western Athletic Conference in Air Force's first conference game, a 21-9 CSU victory.
- ▶ 25 years ago Sept. 14, 1985, the Rams rack up over 500 yards of total offense and running back Steve Bartalo rushes for 174 yards and two touchdowns in a 41-24 rout over UTEP.
- ▶ 20 years ago Sept. 1, 1990, the Freedom Bowl-bound Rams open their season in Colorado Springs against Air Force in a thrilling 35-33 triumph. Quarterback Kevin Verdugo earns the starting job and is named WAC Player of the Week after leading the team to victory.
- ▶ 15 years ago Sept. 16, 1995, the defending WAC champion Rams travel to Colorado Springs and beat No. 21 Air Force for the fourth consecutive time at Falcon Stadium. Behind running backs E.J. Watson and freshman Damon Washington, and starting QB Daren Wilkinson, the Rams win, 27-20. All-American safety Greg Myers preserves the victory with an interception on the Falcons' final drive.
- ▶ 10 years ago Sept. 2, 2000, the Rams face No. 23 Colorado in the last college football game ever played at Denver's Mile High Stadium, the third Rocky Mountain Showdown. CSU quarterback Matt Newton leads an aerial attack of 327 passing yards in a


close, 28-27 victory.

Aggies to Rams, the first definitive publication on the rich history of football at Colorado State University, is still available in the CSU and Rams bookstores.

The book, which contains countless pictures, stories and information spanning every era of CSU football history, is the life's passion of author John Hirn. A CSU graduate, Hirn is unselfishly donating 80 percent of net profits to the university's Athletic General Scholarship Fund, so readers can help future Rams continue the tradition of excellence at Colorado State.





**Enemy territory:** QB Ben Schumacher, a Denver Post Class 5A honorable-mention all-state selection who led Fairview (12-1) to the state semifinals, joined the Rams as a walk-on after classes began.

- Schumacher, who played for Tom McCartney at Fairview, joins LB Michael Kawulok (Monarch) and CU transfer Beau Brittenham (Longmont) as one of three players from Boulder County on the Rams' roster.
- ► What's more, Class of 2010 signee Ty Sambrailo, an offensive lineman from Watsonville, Calif., has a dad who was a CU pole vaulter, and a brother who was a CU skier.
- ► Finally, a pair of cousins have played football for the Buffs. Davis Burl's cousin Gerett was a CU cornerback and lettered from 2004-05. Another CU cornerback, true freshman Jered Bell, is expected to play Saturday. His cousin is Darrell Ballard, the Rams' offensive graduate assistant.

Showdown documentary: The Mtn. is currently airing a documentary on the CU-CSU rivalry, having talked to current and former figures from both schools, including Sonny Lubick, Kevin McDougal, Steve Fairchild, Gary Ozzello, Charles Johnson and Alfred Williams. Nic Hallisey, a student-assistant in the CSU sports information office, played a major role in producing the piece. He interned with the network over the summer.



- ▶ Before his win last year in Boulder and his debut as a head coach in the 2008 contest, the last time CSU faced Colorado with Fairchild was Sept. 2, 2000, a 28-24 Rams triumph in the last college game played at Mile High Stadium. The venue was demolished following that year to make room for Invesco Field.
- ▶ Prior to 2008, Fairchild's only lifetime meetings with the Buffs had been as a CSU assistant coach under Sonny Lubick. He did not see them as an assistant at any of his previous stops, or as a CSU quarterback.
- ► The Rams were 2-4 with Fairchild as an assistant coach, including back-to-back wins in 1999 and 2000.

**Revenue comparison:** By playing the game in an NFL venue, on a national stage, Denver offers both programs an opportunity to generate revenue unlike any event they could hold on their own campus.

- ► "The economic benefits of playing the game in Denver cannot be understated," Kowalczyk said. "If we expect to compete on the national stage and continue to grow our programs, it will take the kind of revenue this game generates."
- ► With the game in Denver, each institution has the opportunity to generate more than \$1 million in net revenue.

A nationally known rivalry: Since the series began being played in Denver last decade, college football fans across the country have come to know of the series, and as a result, to know of both programs and institutions.

➤ When the Buffs and Rams meet in Denver, the game annually draws the state's largest single-game crowd for any college football contest.

**What to look for...**Several CSU players are approaching notable milestones in the school record books, and could make a move this week or this season.

- ► Needs nine FG to tie No. 10 Tom Drake (25, 1976-77) on CSU's career list.
- ► Enters the week as the second-most accurate kicker in CSU annals (16-for-21, .762), behind predecessor Jason Smith (45-for-58, .776; 2005-08).

- ► Needs 107 tackles to eclipse No. 10 Dale Carr (302, 1982-86) on CSU's career list. Sisson enters this week with 196.
- ► Has started 23 straight games entering this week.

## **QB Pete Thomas:**

► Needs 1,205 passing yards to break Caleb Hanie's 2004 CSU freshman record.

- Nation's most heated in-state rivalry this decade: Bitter rivals since their first meeting on Feb. 11, 1893, the two schools line up for the 82nd time Saturday.
- ▶ The Buffs have won five of the last eight years, but seven of those eight games have been decided by seven points or less. Five points or less has been the difference in five of those battles.
- ► And, since 2000 when Steve Fairchild squared off as the Rams' offensive coordinator against CU — a 28-24 Rams win at the late Mile High Stadium — a touchdown or less has separated the schools on eight occasions.
- ▶ The bitter rivalry dates back to Feb. 11, 1893, when Grover Cleveland was in his second term in the White House.
- ► The Rams against the Buffs since 1999:

- ▶ One of the nation's most closely contested rivalries this decade, the series is perhaps matched only by LSU-Auburn, which had seen five straight games decided by 19 combined points, until the Tigers' 31-10 triumph in 2009.
- ▶ The networks have taken notice. This will be the 16th consecutive year the CU-CSU game will be televised on a national (12) or regional (four)

Quarterback debuts: CSU quarterback Pete Thomas will become the third Rams quarterback in as many seasons to make his first career start in the opener against the Buffs.

▶ Before Grant Stucker in 2009 and Billy Farris in 2008, the last CSU QB to make his first career start was true freshman Caleb Hanie, now with the Chicago Bears, who led the Rams to a 30-7 triumph over Wyoming in Fort Collins, Oct. 22, 2004.

**Another season:** Saturday kicks off the 112th season in Colorado State football history.

- ▶ The team all-time owns a 471-519-33 (.477) record. Saturday marks the 1,025th game in CSU annals.
- ► Eight percent (81) of all CSU games played have been against the University of Colorado.

**Season openers:** Head Coach Steve Fairchild loves to the play the

Buffs in his opener every season because the date looms large on CSU's offseason calendar for eight months during offseason conditioning, spring and fall practice. That won't happen next year, when the Buffs open in Hawaii and the Rams have a bye week to open the year, before hosting Northern Colorado in the season opener. The Buffs and Rams won't connect next year until Sept. 17.

- ▶ But this year marks the 19th time the Rams have opened a schedule against the Buffs. The programs first met in an opener on Oct. 15, 1899, when CSU was known as Colorado Agricultural College, in Boulder.
- Saturday is the fourth straight opener involving the schools, and the seventh over an eight-year
- ► All-time in season openers, the Rams are 57-53- All times mountain 1 (.518). They're 5-6 in such games since en- \*-Mountain West Conference opponent; CSU last year in Boulder turned around a stretch

of five losses in its prior six season openers.

- Steve Fairchild, the CSU starting quarterback in 1978 and 1980, and an assistant under Sonny Lubick from 1993-2000, is a combined 9-3 in season openers at Colorado State. With Fairchild on staff, the Rams won seven straight season openers from 1994-2000. He was 1-1 as a field general, and 1-1 now as a head coach (both meetings with Colorado).
- ► The Rams opened their last three bowl seasons (2003, 2005 and 2008) with a loss in their opener. They also lost the opener in 2001 before rallying to go to a bowl.
- Conversely, in eight of the team's 12 overall campaigns that ended in a bowl game, CSU won its opener: 1949, 1990, 1994-95, 1997, 1999-2000 and 2002.

One team still standing: The 2008 season marked only the fourth time the Rams went to a bowl game while CU stayed home.

- ► After dropping its opener to the Buffs in Denver on Aug. 31, 2008, CSU rebounded to win three of its next four, then closed the season with a pair of critical wins to secure bowl eligibility. Then, the Rams capitalized on that momentum to turn away Fresno State in the New Mexico Bowl.
- The only other instances in history when the Rams were the only team still playing after the regular season were 1948, when the Colorado A&M Aggies toppled the Buffs in Boulder to close the regular season before heading to the Raisin Bowl; 1997, when CSU overcame a 31-21 loss to then-No. 8 Colorado, beat Missouri in the Holiday Bowl and finish No. 17 in the final rankings; and 2003, when CSU lost a narrow 42-35 opener to the Buffs, then secured a berth in the San Francisco Bowl opposite Boston College.

**Traveling trophies:** Colorado State has three Front Range rivalries that are celebrated annually with "Trophy Games." All of the traveling trophies are presented to the victorious coach following each year's game.

- ► The Centennial Cup signifies the rivalry between the state's two largest public institutions, Colorado State and the University of Colorado. Last year, CSU graduate Bill Ritter presented the cup to the Rams in their locker room.
- ▶ The Bronze Boot symbolizes Colorado State's series with Wyoming. It was established in 1968 by ROTC detachments at both schools. It is a bronzed combat boot originally worn in Vietnam by Dan Romero, who worked at Colorado State.
- ► The Ram-Falcon Trophy originated in 1980 to highlight the competition and sportsmanship in the series between Colorado State and Air Force. The wood-carved trophy was produced by local artist Bill Wrage. The Air Force ROTC detachment on the CSU campus initiated the creation of the trophy, which is held in possession of the winning program following the game each year until the following contest. The Ram-Falcon Trophy is displayed on the sidelines of the stadium of the team in possession of the award from the previous season.

## Rams topple Buffaloes in Boulder, 23-17 Stucker leads Colorado State on five scoring drives

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) -Grant Stucker's patience finally paid off.

The fifth-year senior quarterback made his first start Sunday night and led Colorado State to a 23-17 upset of Colorado, the Rams' first win in Boulder since 1986.

Stucker barely beat out Jon Eastman last week for the starting job, a year after losing out to Billy Farris.

"One thing you've got to look at it, 50 years down the road, do you think you could've stuck it out, regardless if you get the start or not? It's something I didn't want to have - regret," Stucker said.

"I'm very happy that I was able to have that patience to stick it out."

So are the Rams and their fans, who stormed the field to celebrate the second upset for the Mountain West Conference over a Big 12 team in 24 hours, coming on the heels of BYU's stunning 14-13 victory over thirdranked Oklahoma.

Stucker threw a 13-yard touchdown pass in the first guarter to new running back John Mosure, who also had a 1-yard TD run as the Rams (1-0) took the Folsom Field crowd out early by jumping out to a 17-0 lead.

That helped calm down Stucker, whom Rams coach Steve Fairchild said had a poor week of practice.

"I wasn't sandbagging anybody. First-year quarterback, there's just some growing pains," Fairchild said. "We're not out of the woods yet with him. I think he's a talented young man. Hopefully he'll keep getting better. ... I'll certainly pat him on the back and give him his due. That's not easy, coming into this place and trying to win a game like that."

CU's momentum stalled when wide receiver Scotty McKnight fumbled inside the Rams 20 on a hard hit by free safety Elijah-Blu Smith and linebacker Alex Williams recovered.

**Snake bitten at defensive end:** Three defensive ends the Rams were counting on to play big roles in 2010 are not available to start the season, and none of the issues were due to on-field circumstances. First, after a shoulder injury sidelined him for spring practice, Zach Tiedgen sprained a knee ligament at a pickup basketball game in May and will miss most of the season, if not all of it. Second, returning senior starter Cory Macon was ruled ineligible over the summer after missing all of spring practice battling personal issues. Finally, immensely talented C.J. James, who played as a true freshman in 2009 after foregoing his final semester of high school to enroll early at CSU, tore knee miniscus while conditioning on the eve of fall camp. After arthroscopic surgery, James is out indefinitely.

**Defensive ends and position changes:** Entering the final week of fall practice leading up to the Sept. 4 opener against CU, 13 Rams players have changed positions since the beginning of spring practice. Three of those are now playing defensive end.

Ironmen: Fullback Zac Pauga and nose tackle Guy Miller aren't just good friends, they're also the only players in CSU's senior class that haven't missed a single game in their Rams careers. The players share a 37-game playing streak entering the 2010 season, and could close their college careers with 50 consecutive games played.

A third straight first-year starter: For the third consecutive season, the Rams will send out a first-year starting quarterback to begin their campaign. True freshman Pete Thomas follows in the footsteps of fifth-year seniors Grant Stucker (2009) and Billy Farris (2008). The last time CSU had a returning starter was Caleb Hanie in 2007, before he signed with the Chicago Bears, where he now backs up Jay Cutler.

▶ Only six total programs at the FBS level are opening 2010 with a firstyear starter for at least a third straight year. The programs and active streaks including 2010 with a first-year starter:

Former-Quarterback U: In addition to starting QB Pete Thomas, CSU has four players that are contributors and all of them were high school quarterbacks:

- Matt Yemm, WR (holder on all placements, plays as WR, QB at Fort Collins, Colo., High School).
- T.J. Borcky, WR (plays as WR, made switch from QB as a redshirt freshman after volunteering to do a test-drive as a scout-team WR, QB at Lake Highland Prep in Orlando).

- Tyson Liggett, WR (team captain, former walk-on, starting WR; QB at Limon, Colo., High School).
- ► Alex Williams, LB (starting MLB, former walk-on, QB at Sidney, Neb., High School).

Who needs fingers, anyway: CSU defensive graduate assistant Trevor Wikre and starting TE Eric Peitz have a common bond, in that their fingers once left the bond of their hands as a result of football collisions.

- ► A four-year starter (2005-08) at Mesa State, Wikre played his first two seasons as a defensive tackle before moving to offensive guard for his final two years, earning all-conference honors as a junior and All-America honors as a senior. Midway through that 2008 campaign, a compound dislocation of his finger caused ligament damage that doctors told him would prevent his return that season. But to preserve his college career, Wikre chose to have his finger amputated. The surgery forced him to miss the only game of his career, but he returned and played in the final five contests. The story spawned features in Sports IIlustrated, People, the New York Times, USA Today, Sunday NFL Countdown and ESPN The Magazine, as well as guest appearances on ESPN's First Take and Mike and Mike in the Morning.
- ▶ Peitz, a senior NFL Draft prospect, missed the last half of spring practice in April after a pop from teammate Elijah-Blu Smith, whose facemask left the tip of Peitz's finger hanging by only a thread of skin. Peitz, a Mackey Award candidate recognized as among the best at his position, had the finger surgically re-attached and entered fall camp cleared for full contact.

**New threads:** CSU Athletic Director Paul Kowalczyk just before the season finalized a three-year contract with Russell Athletic. The deal is worth more than \$1 million.

- ► CSU will kick off the 2010 season with its first uniform change since 2003.
- ► With four jerseys green, gold and traditional orange to wear at home. and white for road contests — and three colors of pants (white, green and gold). Head Coach Steve Fairchild and the Rams' captains have several options each week. In fact, including black and white Under Armour shoes, the team has 24 total uniform combinations.
- Fairchild and equipment manager Kris Young leaned heavily on the upperclass leaders of the team for direction during the design phase last spring.
- As a tribute to their past, when the school colors were pumpkin and alfalfa, the Rams will don orange tops when they open their Fort Collins slate on Sept. 25 vs. Idaho. Fans also are encouraged to "orange out" the stadium that day.

Honoring McGregor: Keli McGregor first became an All-American at Colorado State, then became an All-American at life.

- ► Long before he unexpectedly passed away April 20, McGregor had left a living legacy with everyone who knew him, from his playing days with the Rams to his time as President of the Colorado Rockies. Above reproach and a champion of genuine leadership, he exuded legacy in a unique way. That's why the CSU athletic department wants to preserve his memory in unique fashion.
- ▶ Beginning this season, Head Coach Steve Fairchild will award the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Football Scholarship to a walk-on player. McGregor first joined the CSU program during his second year on campus, as a walk-on in 1981, then earned a scholarship in 1982 and garnered All-America honors as a senior in 1984. Selected in the fourth round of the 1985 draft by the Denver Broncos, he entered athletic administration following his NFL career.
- ► An endowment, this scholarship fund perennially will inspire CSU football players to follow his example, work ethic, dedication and diligence, both on the gridiron and in the classroom.
- ▶"Lori, the kids, and the rest of Keli's family continue to be close to our hearts and never far from our minds," Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk said. "We want to create a meaningful, immediate and long-lasting connection between Keli McGregor, Ram Athletics and our student-athletes, campus community, alumni and fans. We believe our program shares Keli's core values and, after consulting with his family and the

Rockies organization, cannot think of a more heartfelt gesture than to honor him in perpetuity this way."

- ▶ The recipient of the first McGregor scholarship, Broderick Sargent, was announced at the Green & Gold Gala, in Denver on May 22, 2010. One player will always have the scholarship until he graduates; it will not be awarded annually, similar to CSU's legacy scholarship. It is the expectation of the athletic department that the player will realize the tremendous honor he has received, and demonstrate McGregor-like attributes as a leader, a selfless teammate and a man of authentic character and integrity.
- ► In response to the numerous requests from teammates and friends inquiring about how they can contribute, the university has established a Web site to make gifts to the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Scholarship Endowment: https://advancing.colostate.edu/MCGREGOR
- ► In addition, Colorado State in 2010 has:
- ▶ Created the Keli McGregor Award, given annually beginning in Fall 2010 to a student-athlete in one of CSU's 16 varsity sports that best exemplifies traits demonstrated by the honor's namesake, including integrity, honesty, leadership, class and competing the right way. Presented during CSU's Scholar-Athlete Awards Brunch, during Homecoming/Family Weekend, the award will recognize the characteristics that best defined McGregor's legacy as an All-America tight end and honors student at CSU, an NFL player, and later President of the Rockies. The new award will be among the most prestigious honors given by CSU, on par with the award named after Fum McGraw, the athletic director whom McGregor credited with guaranteeing his scholarship on the heels of a 1982 coaching change. The first student-athlete honored with the award was Tim Walter, a former CSU center now with the Chicago Bears.
- ► Honored McGregor by affixing to every football helmet in 2010 a decal with his CSU uniform number, 88.
- ▶ Will hold Keli McGregor Day at CSU's Sept. 25 home football game against Idaho, at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium. Colorado State's President, Dr. Tony Frank, and Kowalczyk will invite McGregor's wife, Lori, and the couple's four children, as well as McGregor's parents and Rockies staff, to join them in the home athletic director's suite. The family will serve as honorary game captains during the coin toss, and would take part in a brief pregame ceremony honoring McGregor and his family. What's more, CSU would implement a program to generate revenue, either through ticket sales from that game or donations at the game, to be donated on behalf of CSU athletics to the Rockies foundation to support youth sports, in McGregor's name.

"Keli will forever represent the finest qualities of a Ram student-athlete and be an example of what we expect from them," Kowalczyk added.

**Permanent team captains:** WR Tyson Liggett, who came to Colorado State as a walk-on in 2006 and earned a scholarship in time for his senior campaign, will represent the Rams as a permanent team captain this season.

- ▶ Liggett, a former QB at Limon (Colo.) High School, is the second straight former walk-on to earn his teammates' vote as captain, following Nick Oppenneer in 2009.
- ► Another captain, LB Ricky Brewer, was honored by his teammates' vote despite missing the 2009 season due to an NCAA suspension.
- ▶ Another unique story is junior G Jake Gdowski, who joins Liggett as one of two offensive team captains. Gdowski, the only non-senior in the five-man group, has started only four career games -- the first four contests of 2009, including the Rams' 3-0 start that earned them votes in the national polls for the first time since 2003. Gdowski is the strongest player on the team, a two-time champion in the bench press event at the annual Rams Superstars Competiton held every spring.
- ► Former offensive lineman Guy Miller, now the anchor of the Rams' defensive line, joins Brewer as one of two defensive captains. Meanwhile, senior John Mosure earned his teammates' respect as the Rams' special teams captain for a second straight season.
- "I take captains very seriously," Fairchild said, "because I was a captain back in 1980 here at CSU."
- ► For the first time in since 1992, the Rams began in 2008 voting for per-

manent team captains. From 1993-2007, captains were selected on a game-by-game basis.

**Deep backfield:** John Mosure and Leonard Mason combined last season for 1,416 yards and nine rushing TDs. All told, CSU returned 92 percent of its rushing yards from 2009, and the top two running backs on the Rams' depth chart entering the fall didn't play in 2009.

- ▶ One of those two players, UCLA transfer Raymond Carter, will start the season opener.
- ► The Rams had so much talent in their backfield that they moved playmaker Lou Greenwood, who played as a true freshman RB in 2009, to wide receiver.

**Four-star backfield:** Raymond Carter, rated the No. 3 running back in the nation out of Crenshaw High School when he signed with UCLA in 2008, joins QB Pete Thomas (Valhalla, El Cajon, Calif.) as former four-star recruits starting together in the CSU backfield. In high school, the two players never played an organized game against each other, but they did meet during summer passing scrimmages.

**Speaking of Crenshaw:** The Los Angeles high school made famous as the setting for the movie Boyz in the Hood (Laurence Fishburne, Cuba Gooding Jr.) is famous in the CSU football program for producing new starting RB Raymond Carter and physical FS Elijah-Blu Smith.

- ► When Carter was searching for a school after deciding to transfer from UCLA in the spring of 2009, his former Crenshaw teammate Smith was right there to answer his questions about Colorado State.
- ► Crenshaw also has produced Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, who broke Reggie White's career Green Bay Packers sacks record, and several others, including Olympic sprinter Johnny Gray, MLB pitcher Darryl Strawberry, rap artist and actor Ice-T, and several other prominent athletes in football, basketball and track.

**In the polls:** Colorado State's football program, fresh off a resounding 23-17 win at intrastate rival Colorado from the Big 12, received votes in both national polls for multiple weeks early in 2009.

- ▶ The last time CSU earned votes was after defeating Weber State on Sept. 13, 2003, the week of an eventual loss to Ben Roethlisberger and Miami (Ohio).
- ► After their win over Weber State Sept. 12, 2009, and over Nevada Sept. 19, 2009, the Rams continued to receive votes in both polls. They didn't get votes after their first loss, at BYU (Sept. 26).

**Close games:** In Steve Fairchild's inaugural season as head coach, 2008, six of the Rams' seven wins, and eight of the team's 13 overall games, were decided in the final 3 minutes.

- ► The Rams in 2008 played six games decided by one score or less, and posted a 4-2 record in those contests. CSU's only two losses were to BYU (45-42) and TCU (13-7), two nationally ranked teams at season's end.
- ► Last season, the team saw five games decided late, but had only a 1-4 record in those games (24-23 win vs. Weber State, then four straight losses 31-29 at Idaho, 24-17 vs. Utah, 29-27 at New Mexico, and 17-16 vs. Wyoming).
- ▶ Finding a way to win close games was one characteristic the Rams lacked during the program's slide in the middle of this decade. Prior to Sept. 6, 2008, when the Rams won on a walk-off field goal vs. Sacramento State, the last time the Rams won a game by a field goal or less was Nov. 22, 2003, at UNLV.
- ► Against arch-rival Colorado alone, the Rams lost three games by three points each over a four-year stretch, from 2004-07.

**97 percent graduation rate:** Since bringing Steve Fairchild back to be head coach in December 2007, only one senior CSU football player did not receive his degree. Since the spring of 2008, 32 of 33 Rams seniors from 2008-09 will have graduated, or 97.0 percent, by the end of the fall semester.

► "If a guy stays here and goes through the program, he's graduating," Fairchild said. "I'm confident of that. We have too much academic help

and our coaches care too much. If a player comes to school here and stays all four or five years, he's going to get a degree. I like what Pat Summitt, the coach of Tennessee's women's basketball team, said. She said they have a 99-percent graduation rate, asterisk, with those who stay. If someone chooses to go through this program at CSU, he's going to get a degree."

**Band of brothers:** The additions of Bobby Borcky and Crockett Gillmore in 2010 give CSU 16 sets of brothers that have been in the program since Sonny Lubick became head coach in 1993:

- ► A ribbon-cutting ceremony dedicated CSU's new \$13 million Indoor Practice Facility and \$7 million Academic and Training Center.
- Following the ceremony, the public toured both buildings.
- Colorado State first announced plans for the new buildings, a \$20 million leap toward a vivid future, in April 2009. The buildings represent CSU's largest commitment toward athletic facilities in four decades, since the construction of Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena.

- "These buildings show that Colorado State is unmistakably serious about achieving its stretch goals," Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk said. "These buildings, combined with the recent renovations at our football stadium, put us where we need to be in terms of offering quality, state-of-the-art facilities to our coaches and student-athletes, those who are here now and those who are thinking about coming here. There has never been a better time to be a Ram."
- ► The process began in October 2006, when Kowalczyk and associate athletic director Doug Max made the new buildings a priority within the athletic department's long-term plans. But without the help of the CSU administration and the Board of Governors, the university would not have reached this point.
- ▶ Designed by Aller-Lingle Architects P.C., and RATIO Architects, Inc., the facilities were built by Saunders Construction, Inc. Aller-Lingle, a local firm instrumental in several campus projects, including recent Hughes Stadium renovations, served as the lead architect on both new buildings. The firm sought the assistance of Indianapolis-based RATIO because of its recent experience in the design of similar venues at BCS universities such as Illinois, Oregon, West Virginia and Indiana. Saunders has played a significant role in the construction of several prominent Colorado projects, including the Denver Broncos' training center.

**The CSU offense:** In a conference filled with "spread" offenses, Steve Fairchild's system at Colorado State, while one of three offenses currently in use by National Football League teams, is unique in the Mountain West.

- ► The system, sometimes called the Coryell Offense, has its roots where Fairchild grew up, in San Diego.
- ► Former Chargers head coach Don Coryell, using three future Hall of Famers (Dan Fouts, Charlie Joiner and Kellen Winslow), made the system famous while Fairchild was CSU's starting QB in the late 70s.
- ▶ Disciples of the offense include Ernie Zampese, Joe Gibbs, Mike Martz, Norv Turner and Al Saunders. Martz, Fairchild's coach at Mesa Community College in San Diego before Fairchild signed with the Rams as a JC transfer, also was influenced by Sid Gillman.
- ► Gibbs used the Coryell Offense to win three Super Bowls with the Redskins, using a system the Rams follow, with a smash-mouth running game powered by mobile and versatile "hogs" up front.
- ► While with the Cowboys, Turner used Michael Irvin, Emmitt Smith and Troy Aikman to win Super Bowls with a similar version of the offense.
- ▶ Led by Martz, the system led the St. Louis Rams to a Super Bowl title and another NFC championship in the last decade.
- ➤ One aspect of the offense that is unique is the flipping of offensive linemen, assigning two players always to the weak side of the formation and the other guard and tackle always to the strong side. The Rams do that to reduce the amount those linemen have to learn, increasing efficiency.

**True freshmen:** Steve Fairchild said up to seven true freshmen could play this season.

- ► Colorado State used three true freshmen in 2009 (P Pete Kontodiakos, RB Lou Greenwood and DE C.J. James).
- ► The year before, five true freshmen hit the field: Ben DeLine, Marquise Law, Adam Wilson, Momo Thomas and Michael Kawulok. Thomas and Kawulok started, while DeLine had served as the primary kicker after a preseason injury to Jason Smith.
- ▶ Over the previous two years combined (2006-07), the Rams used just two, both in 2007 (tight end Eric Peitz and long-snapper Steve Bryan). In 2006, CSU and Wake Forest were the only Division I programs that did not use a true freshman.
- ▶ Over the previous three years (2005-07), the number is just five, including S Klint Kubiak, DT Shaun McGoveran and DE Wade Landers in 2005. The last time CSU used as many as five true freshmen in an entire season was six in 2004 -- WR Damon Morton, RB Gartrell Johnson, DE Matt Rupp, TE Kory Sperry, QB Caleb Hanie and RB Kyle Bell.

**CoachFair.com:** The Colorado State football program has a new coach, a new level of excitement and, now, a new Web site.

CoachFair.com has been live on the Internet since Sept. 1, 2008. The site houses a multitude of exclusive behind-the-scenes content, includ-

- ing countless video clips assembled by the university's award-winning creative services staff.
- ▶ Each coach is featured in the videos, providing a personal look into his philosophies and assessment of football at CSU under new Head Coach Steve Fairchild. Linebacker Ricky Brewer takes visitors on a tour of the university's facilities, including the Joey Porter Locker Room. And, recent graduate Joey Rucks shares his thoughts on CSU's academic support for student-athletes. Additionally, Fairchild offers a personal blog, providing insight throughout the year.

**The Rams on Twitter:** CSU has two Twitter pages related to its football program. Twitter, a free social networking and micro-blogging service available at www.twitter.com, allows its users to send and read other users' updates (also known as "tweets"). Fans can receive updates on CSU football directly from a Twitter page or on their mobile phone.

- ► Head Coach Steve Fairchild is believed to be one of the only football coaches in the country who updates his page during halftime of each game (with the help of CSU media relations personnel).

**The CSU Yankees:** Although well over a thousand miles separate Fort Collins, Colo., and Yankee Stadium in the Bronx, N.Y., there is still a connection between the two. Sitting in the office of Yankees manager Joe Girardi is a Colorado State Rams helmet. Girardi wanted the helmet because he has family in the Fort Collins area.

## **Individual Notes**

**Brewer back in fold:** At 7:33 a.m. on Aug. 7, Ricky Brewer entered the practice field sounding like a hurricane-force wind battering the Eastern Seaboard.

- "Woooooooooo," he screamed in an emotional, high-pitched voice as he bounced around and sprinted to a pre-practice drill. Whether his new Under Armours actually made contact with the wet grass is questionable.
- ▶ Brewer should be excited. He'd waited 17 months for that moment, walking onto the Rams' field as the starter for the first time since learning the NCAA was suspending him for the 2009 season. A sophomore All-American in 2008, Brewer said after practice that day he tested positive for a banned substance before that season's New Mexico Bowl and talked about paying an excruciating price, his entire junior campaign, for that choice.
- ▶ During the ensuing two springs and last fall, he never missed a practice or a meeting, working on the scout-team defense as he wrestled with the emotions of the ripple effect caused by his choice. In the end, knowing he was a role model to others, he decided he needed to let them know that if they make the same choice, the consequences are steeper than they probably would imagine.
- ▶ Brewer, elected a captain by his teammates before fall camp, also gave credit to Head Coach Steve Fairchild and defensive coordinator Larry Kerr for sticking by him, giving him a second chance. Not allowed to travel to road games, including the unforgettable win over CU in Boulder, Brewer instead spent his weekends making community appearances, talking to youth football teams and other kids groups.
- Now, as Brewer said, he can enter his senior season without this issue hanging over him.

**Peitz a Mackey Award candidate:** Colorado State tight end Eric Peitz received national recognition in August, when the Nassau County Sports Commission named him one of 32 preseason watch-list candidates for the John Mackey Award, presented annually to the country's top tight end.

- ▶ Peitz, a 6-foot-5, 258-pound senior from Crofton, Neb., is one of only six tight ends on the watch list from conferences that don't automatically qualify their champion for the BCS. The last time a Colorado State player earned a spot on the Mackey watch list was Kory Sperry, now with the Broncos, in 2008.
- ► "Eric is very deserving of this honor," said Head Coach Steve Fairchild. "He's one of the few tight ends out there that can do both. He can catch and he can block. And on top of all that, he's an even better kid."
- ▶ Majoring in biological sciences, Peitz owns a 3.68 grade-point average entering fall of 2010. A member of the College of Natural Sciences dean's list, he was an academic all-conference selection following the 2009 season. Peitz expects to graduate in May and once his football career is over, has his sights set on giving back to the community by becoming a teacher and a coach.
- "I like working with kids and coming from a small town, I understand the impact someone in that position can have on kids," said Peitz, whose Crofton, Neb., home does not have a stoplight.
- ▶ Peitz is back to full health this fall after missing the last half of spring practice. On a routine pass play this past April, his finger was nearly severed by a collision, but he's now able to bend the finger and enters the year at 100 percent.
- ▶ In 2009, Peitz had started all nine games at tight end until sustaining a season-ending shoulder injury in Week 9 against Air Force. He finished with 14 receptions for 114 yards (8.1 avg.) and three TDs, ending the year on an eight-game reception streak. A true senior, Peitz played right out of high school in 2007, replacing an injured Sperry.
- ▶ NFL Hall of Fame member John Mackey is considered to be the best to have played the tight end position. A tight end by whom all others are measured, Mackey was a role model on and off the field as demonstrated by his Super Bowl championship, his commitment to community and his place in history as the first President of the NFL Players Association.
- ▶ The John Mackey Award, presented since 2000, lists nine NFL players as alumni: Dallas Clark ('01) of the 2006 Super Bowl champion Indianapo-

**Unique number:** CSU's 6-foot-3, 245-pound defensive end C.J. James, one of the most promising young Rams, is dropping the 1 from his uniform number, going from 91 to 9.

- ► The last CSU lineman to wear a single-digit number was Joey Porter, who donned No. 8 as a senior DE in 1998 before launching his All-Pro NFL career.
- In April, James flew to North Carolina two days before the Rams' spring game for the birth of his daughter, then returned in time to dedicate a sack in that game to his little girl. After graduating one semester early from high school so he could enroll at CSU and go through 2009 spring practice, James played in 11 games as a true freshman. He had a pair of sacks in the Rams' season finale against Wyoming.

**Thomas family plans to give back:** True freshman quarterback Pete Thomas will return to his hometown Nov. 6 when the Rams meet San Diego State, and his family hopes to literally give him his own cheering section.



- ► IThomas' mom, Avis, said that she hopes to purchase approximately 500 tickets for the event, explaining that about half will go to family and friends. One of 10 children, she is married to Pete's dad, whose parents had five kids, and the extended family is quite large. But more than relatives, she wants to honor so many people that helped her sons become successful, including coaches, educators and even bus drivers.
- It just made sense that we should all sit in the same section," she said.
- Pete's brother Chris is a senior and former wrestler at the Air Force Academy.

**Smith gets extra year:** Four of CSU's starting five offensive linemen in 2009 are now on NFL rosters, so the Rams need all the depth they can get at that position heading into 2010. They got a little help in July.

- ► The NCAA has granted a sixth year of eligibility to Connor Smith, a 6-foot-4, 287-pound guard from Spring Branch, Texas. Smith, whose shoulder injury last year prevented him from playing, officially was a senior until Friday. He now enters the 2010 season as a junior with two years remaining.
- A standout in the San Antonio area, he signed with Northwestern out of high school but couldn't play because of a previous shoulder injury. After transferring to CSU and sitting out the 2007 season, he started three 2008 games in place of an injured Shelley Smith and Adrian Martinez.

**Matrimony:** Ryan Griffith became the team's only married player on June 25, when he married fiancé Julie in their hometown, Rancho Cucamonga, Calif. Griffith, a senior, entered 2010 camp battling for a starting role at offensive guard.

**Lubick becoming more involved:** Legendary coach Sonny Lubick, who guided the Rams from 1993-2007, for the second time in as many months this past summer partnered with Steve Fairchild, former players and alumni at an event. In July, he joined his son Marc (now an assistant with the Houston Texans) at the Rams' annual football alumni golf tournament. The tournament also drew several prominent alumni, including Calvin Branch, Anthony Cesario, Cole Pemberton and Kevin McDougal. In June, Lubick met in Denver with Fairchild and several former players at a private event.

**Stucker gets unique award:** Grant Stucker, who became only the second QB in CSU history to win his first three starts when he led the Rams to a 3-0 record last year, received some unique help in July. Stucker received a degree-completion financial award for the fall semester. His major, construction management, generally takes longer to complete than most degrees, and the CSU athletic department according to NCAA rules is no longer allowed to fund his education into the fall. However, the NCAA agreed to grant him the financial help needed to graduate.


