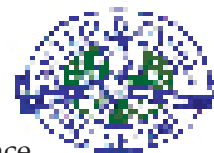

RODNEY STEWART
COLORADO
SOPHOMORE, TAILBACK, 5-6, 175
WESTERVILLE, OHIO

Stewart rushed 24 times for 108 yards, two touchdowns, including the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter, and six first downs to lead Colorado to a 34-30 win over No. 17 and previously unbeaten Kansas. He broke two tackles on a 13-yard run with 8:36 left in the game. It was his third 100-yard game of the season and sixth of his career, and in the process became the 49th player in CU history to rush for 1,000 yards (ending the game with 1,040). It was the second time in his career he scored two touchdowns (also doing so against Wyoming). Stewart is also now 7-of-7 in his career in picking up a first down on third-and-one.

2009 COLORADO CHAPTER NEWS & NOTES

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (3-5, 3-3 RMAC)

Oscar Villa (MLB, Sr., 6-1, 225, Tucson, Ariz./Salpointe Catholic HS)

Villa had another solid game recording 12 tackles, including five solos, while registering another 1 1/2 tackles for a loss. He also forced and recovered a fumble and had a quarterback hurry. Villa now has 81 total tackles this season, second most in the RMAC, and leads the conference with 12.5 for losses. He has had at least one tackle for a loss in 11 straight games dating back to last year.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies committed a season-high seven turnovers in Saturday's loss to RMAC co-leading Colorado Mines. The Grizzlies were guilty of four fumbles and three interceptions. They had committed just four turnovers in their previous three games, all wins, had just seven total turnovers in their previous five contests. The Grizzlies were held to just 18 net rushing yards on the afternoon but did throw for 304 as starting quarterback Trevor Eggleston (Tucson, Ariz.) completed a career-high 30 passes on 42 attempts for 284 yards. He also threw for two touchdowns and now has completed 65.9 percent of his passes for 1,081 yards and 11 touchdowns in his last four games. Junior slot receiver and return man Trevor Zott (Arvada, Colo.) had 152 all-purpose yards in Saturday's game and has surpassed the century mark in each of the Grizzlies' last two and three overall games this year. Zott now has 896 all-purpose yards this season. The Grizzlies have not defeated CSM at home since 2000 and have lost eight of the last nine to the Orediggers. However, the Grizzlies still lead the all-time series that dates back to 1935 by a 36-25-2 margin. The Grizzlies next play Mesa State, a team they have defeated in four of the last five years. The game against the Mavericks will be the last road contest of the year for ASC. The Grizzlies are 2-2 on the road thus far in the campaign.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (6-2, 6-0 RMAC)

Kyle Goracke (Defensive Back, Junior, 6-3, 200, Tecumseh, Neb./Tecumseh Public HS)

Goracke corralled his team-leading third interception, made six total tackles (two solo) and recovered an Adams State fumble in the Grizzlies' endzone for an Oredigger touchdown in Mines' 37-14 RMAC road victory in Alamosa on Oct. 17. Goracke, a 2009 Pre-Season All-RMAC selection who is fifth on the team with 44 total tackles, is currently ranked first in the RMAC in passes defended (tied - 10) and second in interceptions (tied - three).

Team Notes: David Pesek is currently ranked first in the RMAC in passing (298.8 ypg), total offense (286.9 ypg), completions (186), passing yards (2,390) and passing touchdowns (20). Pesek is also ranked second in the conference in both passing efficiency (148.6) and completion percentage (62.4). Senior DB Ben Tiller is ranked 10th in the RMAC in passes defended (tied - eight). Senior WR Adam Saur leads the RMAC in both touchdowns scored (11) and receiving yards (828). Saur is also ranked second in the RMAC in receiving yards per game (103.5), third in both receptions (55) and scoring (8.2 ppg), fourth in receptions per game (6.9) and ninth in all-purpose yardage (103.5). With 28 career touchdown receptions (four in 2007, 13 in 2008, 11 in 2009), Saur is now just three away from tying the CSM individual career record of 31 (Jonny Chan, 2001-04). Senior RB Jahre Cheeseman is ranked second in the conference in both scoring (8.6 ppg) and touchdowns scored (10), fourth in receiving yards per game (68.4), sixth in receiving yards (479), 10th in all-purpose yards (97.9 ypg), 15th in total offense (68.4 ypg) and 18th in receptions per game (3.1). Redshirt freshman WR Cody Renken leads the RMAC in receptions per game (10.2), receiving yards per game (106.0), punt returns (13.1 ypr) and all-purpose yards (205.8 ypg). Renken is also ranked fourth in the RMAC in receptions (51) and sixth in receiving yards (530). Junior DL Marc Schiechl is ranked second in the RMAC in both sacks (6.0) and fumble recoveries (tied - two), and third in tackles for a loss (10). Schiechl is CSM's all-time career leader in sacks (33.0). Sophomore LB Alex Vigil is ranked second in the RMAC in both forced fumbles (tied - two) and solo tackles (35), third in both tackles per game (tied - 8.5) and total tackles (68), and 11th in assisted tackles (33). Junior LB James Tucker is tied for second in the RMAC in forced fumbles (two).

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-4, 0-3 MWC)

Team Notes: The Rams fell 44-6 to Idaho State. They will play host to San Diego State at 2 p.m. on Saturday.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (4-4, 3-3 RMAC)

Jamaal Johnson (Running Back, Sophomore, 5-9, 185, Fountain, Colo.)

Johnson ran for a career high two touchdowns in the Pack's road win over New Mexico Highlands. He rushed 18 times for a net gain of 131 yards. He also caught one pass for minus-seven yards.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (1-7, 0-6 RMAC)

Justin Johnson (Junior, Wide Receiver, 6-1, 180, San Diego, Calif.)

Johnson was tied for second for most receptions against Chadron State. He caught 15 passes for 170 yards and one score in the road loss. He also accumulated more than 90% of Fort Lewis's offensive yards in the game.

MESA STATE COLLEGE (5-3, 5-1 RMAC)

Michael Sweeney (Kicker, Freshman, 5-9, 145, Grand Junction, Colo.)

Kicked game-winning field goal with 1:40 remaining in fourth quarter as Mesa State knocked off Western State 16-14. Sweeney also connected on two other field goals, scoring 10 points during the game. Sweeney leads Mesa State with 54 points, which ranks him seventh in the RMAC this season.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (4-2, 3-1 MWC)

Reggie Rembert (Junior, Defensive Back, 5-8, 185, Flower Mound, Texas/Flower Mound)

Rembert recorded a career and team high 10 tackles, including a career-best eight unassisted in a home win against Wyoming. He also recorded his first sack of the season, good for three yards. Rembert had a key third-down stop in the fourth quarter to help preserve a 10-0 lead and forced a punt.

Team Notes: Air Force posted its first shutout against a conference opponent since winning at Colorado State, 24-0, in 1997. The shutout is the second for Air Force this season, as the team also shutout Nicholls State, 72-0, in the season opener. This season marks the first time since 1997 that Air Force has posted two shutouts in a season. In addition to the Colorado State shutout, the Falcons beat Army, 24-0. Air Force snaps a two-game losing streak and improves to 4-3 overall and 3-1 in the MWC. Air Force has recorded the first four-game winning streak in the series with Wyoming. The Falcons improve to 25-20-3 all-time against the Cowboys, including a 16-13 mark in conference games. Air Force is now 15-9-1 at home against Wyoming. Air Force won its 175th home game and improved to 175-113-3 at home and 324-272-13 all-time in its 54th year of varsity football. Air Force improved to 40-

38 as a member of the Mountain West Conference. The Falcons are 24-16 at home. Air Force is 70-57 overall since joining the MWC in 1999, including a 40-24 mark at home. Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun improved 21-12 overall and 14-6 in Mountain West Conference games. Calhoun is 12-4 at home and 3-0 vs. Wyoming. Air Force improved to 10-3 during the second half of the regular season since 2007. The Falcons were 12-24 over the second half of the season over the previous six seasons since 2001. Air Force improved to 7-2 in conference games in the month of October under head coach Troy Calhoun. Prior to 2007, Air Force was 8-14 in conference games in October since 1999. Air Force forced one turnover vs. Wyoming (INT). The Falcons have forced 21 turnovers this season and have a +17 turnover margin this season. Air Force completed just one pass in the game, good for two yards. The one completion ties as sixth fewest in school history and is the fewest since Air Force went without a completion in a 31-28 win vs. Houston last season. Air Force out-rushed Wyoming and has now out-rushed every opponent this season. Air Force had its first 100-yard rusher this season (FB Jared Tew). Air Force improved to 13-3 under head coach Troy Calhoun when it has a 100-yard rusher. Air Force blocked its third kick this season when sophomore Zach Kauth blocked a field goal attempt in the second quarter. The Falcons also blocked a field goal vs. New Mexico (Ben Garland) and an extra point vs. San Diego State. (Corbin Brown). Air Force's three blocked kicks are its most since blocking seven in 2006. Air Force has blocked at least one kick every year since 1990. Air Force's defense held Wyoming scoreless in the first half to mark its second first half shutout of the season. Air Force also held Nicholls State scoreless in the first half. The Wyoming game marked the fourth time this season the defense has held an opponent without a touchdown in the first half. In addition to the Nicholls State shutout, the Falcons held Minnesota to three points and San Diego State to a safety. Air Force extended its school-record consecutive games scoring streak to 201 games dating back to 1992. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the country. The 201-game streak is the 15th longest in NCAA history.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (2-4, 1-1 Big 12)

Rodney Stewart (Sophomore, Tailback, 5-6, 175, Westerville, Ohio)

It was his third 100-yard game of the season and sixth of his career, and in the process became the 49th player in CU history to rush for 1,000 yards (ending the game with 1,040). It was the second time in his career he scored two touchdowns (also doing so against Wyoming). Stewart is also now 7-of-7 in his career in picking up a first down on 3rd-&-1.

Team Notes: Colorado is now 2-4, 1-1 in the Big 12; Kansas State leads the Big 12 North with a 2-1 mark, with CU, KU and Nebraska all 1-1. With Kansas entering the game ranked No. 17 (Associated Press), since the start of the 1989 season, Colorado has now played the second most ranked teams in the nation (103), trailing only Florida (112) and equaled by Florida State. CU is 43-58-2 in those games. WR Will Jefferson made his first career start tonight, the first true freshman to start for CU in 2009. The teams went "three-and-out" on the first four possessions; the game's initial first down came at the 8:19 mark of the first quarter. Kansas netted only a first quarter field goal, extending the opponent streak to eight quarters at Folsom Field without a touchdown (CSU scored two first quarter TDs in the opener and KU got the next one late in the first half tonight). PK Aric Goodman's 45-yard field goal to open the second quarter was his first career make as a Buffalo between 40-49 yards (he was 0-for-8, and 2-of-14 including his time at Wyoming); he did make a 54-yard kick against CSU and had a 52-yard boot when he was a Cowboy. Colorado's 24-3 lead in the second quarter was its second largest of the year, behind only the 24-0 final score in the win over Wyoming; it also marks the largest margin KU has trailed in 2009 (trailed 7-0 early against Duke and by six twice versus Iowa State). WR Scotty McKnight extended his regular season streak to 30 games with at least one reception. CU was in danger of tying its record for losing its largest lead (21 points on two previous occasions, once to Kansas: in 1950, CU led 21-0 but lost 27-21; the other was in 2007 at Iowa State, losing 31-28 after leading 21-0). The 24 points scored by Colorado was its most in a single quarter since Aug. 30, 2003, when the Buffs scored 28 points in the second quarter of a 42-35 win over Colorado State in Denver. It was the eighth 20-point quarter in the Dan Hawkins Era; CU had scored 26 points in the second quarter of five games this season before tonight. West Virginia rushed for 257 yards on Colorado to open October (220 by Noel Devine), but in the six quarters since then, Texas and Kansas have combined for 38 rushing yards on 47 tries (when taking out sacks, it's 40 true rushes for 90 yards, or 2.25 per). KU had 22 attempts for minus-8 yards, the sixth best defensive effort against the run in CU history and the best since 1999 when the Buffs held Oklahoma to minus -11. Eleven ranked, undefeated teams have now lost their "0" in the loss column at Folsom Field since 1989, as No. 17 Kansas (5-0) joins this list tonight. The last was Oklahoma in 2007, as the Sooners rolled in ranked No. 3 and left with a 27-24 setback to the Buffs. That was the first time since 2002, when Kansas State came to Boulder ranked No. 13 at 4-0 and lost, 35-31. Colorado has now defeated at least one ranked team in 18 of the last 22 seasons with its 34-30 win tonight over No. 17 Kansas. The three opponents that have visited Folsom Field are just 12-of-49 on third down after Kansas was 5-of-17 tonight; the Jayhawks came into the game 13th in the nation converting at 50.7 percent; KU also earned first downs on just 4-of-22 second down plays (1-of-2 on fourth down). Kansas flirted with converting a 3rd-&-20 in the third quarter (gaining 19 on the play); but in the fourth quarter, the Jayhawks converted on a 3rd-&-29 (41-yard pass from Reesing to Briscoe), ending an 0-of-30 on 3rd-&-20 or longer by the opponent (dating back to 2004).

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (2-5, 1-4 Big Sky)

Bryan Waggener (Senior, Quarterback, 6-3, 230, Chino Hills, Calif./Florida-Ayala HS)

Waggener was responsible for two of the three NC touchdowns, rushing seven yards and going airborne over the pile for the team's first touchdown. He then threw for the third touchdown, a 14-yard strike to Alex Thompson - capping a 99-yard drive. With his 212 passing yards, Waggener moved into ninth on the all-time career passing yards list with 3,872. He passes Nick Henkowski (1980-83), who threw for 3,858. Waggener also surpassed 4,000 yards of total offense and now stands at 4,026.

Team Notes: Northern Colorado snapped a 19-game road losing streak and won its first-ever Big Sky Conference road game, defeating Idaho State 30-7. It is the Bears' first conference win of the season. Senior wide receiver Alex Thompson has caught at least three passes in each of the seven games this year.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (3-5, 3-3 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State fell 16-14 at home to Mesa State. They will travel to CSU-Pueblo on Saturday for a 2 p.m. kickoff.
