## TIGER NEWS & NOTES

Missouri Tigers (4-3, 0-3) at Colorado Buffaloes (2-5, 1-2)

Oct. 31, 2009 – Folsom Field – Boulder, Colo.

**KICKOFF:** 12:30 p.m. (central time).

**STADIUM:** Folsom Field (53,613 – Natural grass surface). Opened in 1924. MU is 14-20-1 there alltime, but won 55-10 the last time playing there in 2007.

**RADIO:** Tiger Network. Mike Kelly (play-by-play), John Kadlec (color), Chris Gervino (sidelines), Snowball (engineer). Carried on over 50 stations across the Midwest, and on the Internet at mutigers.com. The MU broadcast will also be on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 129) and XM Satellite Radio (channel 103).

**TV:** Fox Sports Net. Bill Land (play-by-play), Gary Reasons (color), Emily Jones (sideline reporter), Jeff Muckleroy (producer).

**RANKINGS (AP/USA):** None.

**SERIES:** MU leads, 40-31-3 overall, while CU holds a 7-6 edge since the Big 12 formed. MU has won 3 straight – its longest in the series since a 6-game string from 1979-84, and the combined score of the last 2 MU wins is 113-10.

### COACHES:

**Mizzou:** Gary Pinkel (Kent, '75), 63-44 at MU (9th year) and 136-81-3 overall (19th year). Pinkel is 4-4 vs. Colorado and is 3-0 vs. Dan Hawkins.

**Colorado:** Dan Hawkins (UC-Davis, '84), 68-40 overall (9th year) and 15-29 at CU (4th year). Hawkins is 0-3 vs. Mizzou and Gary Pinkel.

## TIGERS HEAD TO THE MOUNTAINS IN SEARCH OF BIG 12 GOLD

It's been rough sledding the past three weeks for the Missouri Tigers (4-3 overall, 0-3 in Big 12 Conference play), as they've dropped their first three league games of the season. They'll look to get on track this Saturday in the Flatirons as they head to Boulder, Colo. to take on the Colorado Buffaloes (2-5, 1-2) in a rare day game, with kickoff set for 12:30 p.m. (central time), 11:30 a.m. Boulder time. The game will be televised live on Fox Sports Net, marking MU's first appearance on FSN this season.

The Tigers are coming off a 41-7 home defeat to 3rd-ranked Texas, in a game that saw the Longhorns jump out to a commanding 21-0 first-quarter lead. The Tigers managed an impressive TD drive early in the 2nd quarter to pull to within 21-7, but two more UT touchdowns before halftime essentially salted the game away. Texas held an edge in total offense of 400-to-173 on the night, as they ran 77 plays to Mizzou's 53, and that led to a time of possession advantage in UT's favor of 35:02-to-24:58.

Colorado is coming off a 20-6 road loss at current Big 12 North leading Kansas State last Saturday. The Buffaloes held a 6-3 lead after one quarter, but the Wildcats scored 17 points in the 2nd quarter to take a 20-6 halftime lead, and that's all the scoring that took place on the day. It was a defensive battle, as K-State held a slim margin in total offense (284-to-244), but it was turnovers that really hurt CU. The Buffaloes lost four turnovers (2 fumbles and 2 interceptions) that led to 10 Wildcat points.

The Buffaloes have been tough at Folsom Field (2-1 at home in 2009), with their last game there a 34-30 upset win over 16th-ranked and undefeated Kansas on Oct. 17th. They also shutout Wyoming and former MU coach Dave Christensen by a 24-0 count on Sept. 19th in Boulder. Their only home loss was a season-opening 23-17 defeat to rival Colorado State.

Mizzou will serve as Colorado's Homecoming opponent on Saturday, marking the 14th time the Tigers have been CU's guest for Homecoming. Mizzou is 4-9 in those encounters, with the last one coming in 1995 (21-0 CU win).

## LONGHORNS PROVE TO BE TOO MUCH FOR TIGERS

Last weekend marked Homecoming for the Missouri Tigers, but a sellout crowd of 71,004 (the 10th-largest crowd ever at Memorial Stadium, and the largest since 1983) wasn't enough to overcome the 3rd-ranked Texas Longhorns, who posted a 41-7 victory to spoil the celebration. Any designs of a Tiger upset were quickly dismissed by the Longhorns, who bolted to a 21-0 first quarter lead as they controlled both sides of the ball early on — after one quarter, UT held a 170-to-19 edge in total offense, as they ran 24 plays to Mizzou's 10 in the opening quarter.

The Tigers mustered an impressive 81-yard, 12-play touchdown drive midway in the 2nd quarter to bring life to the sellout crowd and to pull to within 21-7 as QB Blaine Gabbert hit WR Jared Perry on an 11-yard TD pass with 5:53 left in the half. But the Longhorns, led by 2008 Heisman Trophy runner-up QB Colt McCoy, promptly marched 87 yards the other way for a TD with 1:49 to play, and then got a kill shot as they blocked a Tiger punt and fell on the ball in the endzone with 0:45 seconds left for a 35-7 lead.

Mizzou held its own in the second half, keeping the Longhorns out of the endzone and limiting them to just 115 yards of offense after intermission and a pair of field goals, but the Tiger offense couldn't get untracked against the stout Texas defense, save for the one 1st-half scoring drive. Gabbert ended the night just 8-of-16 passing for 84 yards and the 1 TD before having to leave late in the 3rd quarter after reaggravating his injured right ankle that has hobbled his mobility since the Nebraska game.

Senior LB Sean Weatherspoon had 11 tackles (3.0 TFL, 1 QB sack) and an interception of McCoy to lead the defensive charge, while freshman DE Aldon Smith also added a career-high 11 stops, including 4.0 TFLs and 2.0 sacks, while offensive highlights came from senior WR Danario Alexander (6 catches, 74 yds.) and freshman TB Kendial Lawrence (7 rushes, 37 yards, 5.3 avg.).

# MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

## MIZZOU-COLORADO SERIES HISTORY

Mizzou and Colorado will face off for the 75th time when they meet Saturday in Boulder. The Tigers hold a 40-31-3 advantage in the series, and have won three straight, and four of the last five meetings, after the Buffaloes won five straight from 1999-2003.

The Tigers are hoping to rekindle some of the magic that's seen them post dominant wins over Colorado each of the last two seasons. Mizzou has downed CU by a combined margin of 113-to-10 in the last two years, including a 58-0 shutout in Columbia last year that was its largest victory margin ever over Colorado (and it was MU's first shutout of Colorado since a 57-0 win in 1962). In 2007, the Tigers got their first win in Boulder since 1997, with a 55-10 win that was the biggest margin of victory ever for MU in Boulder.

Since the Big 12 Conference formed for the 1996 season, the series between the two old Big Eight Conference foes is as close as can be, with CU holding a slim 7-6 advantage, thanks largely to a five-game winning streak from 1999-2003. Two of CU's wins in that 5-game streak came in overtime, as the Buffaloes took a 46-39 OT win in Boulder in 1999, and followed with a 42-35 OT win in Columbia in 2002.

A win Saturday would give Mizzou four straight wins over Colorado for the first time since it won six straight from 1979-1984. That same stretch also marked the last time MU has won consecutive games in Boulder, as the Tigers claimed wins at Folsom Field in 1979 (13-7), 1981 (30-14) and 1983 (59-20).

## LAST YEAR REWIND: #16 MIZZOU 58, COLORADO 0

COLUMBIA, Mo. - Coming off of consecutive losses and hungry to redeem itself, the 16th-ranked Missouri Tigers took out their frustrations, and then some, against the Colorado Buffaloes in Columbia, to the tune of 58-0. The shutout marked the first time they held a Big 12 opponent scoreless and was the first shutout win against a conference foe for MU since blanking Kansas in 1986 (W, 48-0).

The Tigers scored on 9-of-11 possessions with the #1 offense on the field, and tacked on a late TD by the reserves on a long run in the final 5 minutes to mark the largest win ever for Missouri in Conference play. Heisman hopeful QB Chase Daniel was on fire from the start, as he completed his first 13 passes of the night and ended 31-of-37 passing for 302 yards and a school-record tying 5 TDs.

Daniel's main accomplices were the usual suspects, in WR Jeremy Maclin (11 receptions, 134 yards, 2 TDs) and TE Chase Coffman (7 catches, 50 yards, 1 TD), while TB Derrick Washington got untracked after being held in check in the ground game the previous two weeks, as he contributed 83 rushing yards and 1 TD on 17 tries (4.9 avg.).

Coffman broke an NCAA record for career receptions by a TE in the game, as he entered with an MU-record 213 catches. His 7-catch night moved him past Louisville's Iln Green, who held the record with 217 grabs from 1996-99. One of Coffman's catches was one of his countless highlight-reel catches that capped MU's 2nd possession, when he made a leaping, one-handed grab while falling out of the back of the endzone on a 3rd-and-1 play to give the Tigers a 14-0 lead.

The Tigers took the opening kickoff and promptly marched 56 yards in just 4 plays, taking just 1:09 off the clock as Washington capped the drive with a 3-yard TD run, his 13th of the year. After CU went 3-and-out on its ensuing drive, disaster struck for the Buffs as punter Tom Suazo mishandled the snap and was tackled while trying to scramble on his own 5-yardline, setting up Coffman's heroics as the Tigers grew the lead. After the Tiger defense forced a second successive 3-and-out, Daniel led a 13-play, 55-yard drive that culminated with a 3-yard TD pass to Maclin, and with 3:20 left in the 1st quarter, it was 21-0 Tigers.

As impressive as the Tiger offense was, the story of the night was Mizzou's defense, which was coming off a tough game at #1 Texas, where they allowed 56 points - the most ever allowed by a Gary Pinkel Tiger team. They made up for that in a hurry as they constantly harrassed a pair of CU quarterbacks and never allowed the Buffaloes to get any traction offensively. The Buffs ended the night with just 199 yards of total offense, and didn't have positive yards until midway through the 2nd quarter.

A pair of Jeff Wolfert field goals (23 and 44 yards) followed a Tommy Saunders 10-yard TD catch-and-run in the 2nd quarter, as Mizzou took a 34-0 lead into halftime. The Buffaloes sustained their first drive of the game to open the 3rd quarter, only to have it snuffed out on an incomplete 4th-down pass attempt on the Tiger 17-yardline. Mizzou would answer by getting TD passes of 4-yards and 30-yards in the 3rd quarter from Daniel to Danario Alexander

and Maclin, respectively, as the bulge grew to 48-0.

The defense kept its shutout alive as the Tigers added a 46-yard field goal early in the 4th by Wolfert. Even when the offense was not in scoring mode, it still did so, as reserve TB De'Vion Moore took a handoff and burst untouched 55 yards for his first career TD with 4:45 left to account for the final score.

Mizzou's defense then permitted the Buffaloes to drive in the waning seconds to its 9-yardline before time ran out. The Buffaloes admirably eschewed a cheap field goal attempt just to avoid the shutout, which broke a string of 242 consecutive games in which CU had scored, dating back to their last shutout loss (1988 against Nebraska).

## TIGERS ARE EXTREMELY YOUNG

Obviously, Mizzou has had a rough go of it the past three weeks, but the fact remains that the future is bright in Columbia, as the Tigers are a very young team. Picked to finish third this season in the Big 12 North Division, the Tigers began the season hoping to successfully defend its 2007 and 2008 North Division titles.

We don't have a way to scientifically prove this, but odds are that Missouri is one of the youngest teams in the country in 2009. While youth can sometimes step up and provide nice surprises (i.e. — MU's 4-0 start to 2009), it can also prove to be challenging (i.e. — the last three games).

While Head Coach Gary Pinkel would never offer up youth as an excuse for anything, the fact remains that this team is very young, with only 15 seniors on the roster. Of those, only six are projected to start on offense/defense Saturday against Colorado, with only eight total who are on the two-deep entering the game. That's a stark contrast to 2008, when the Tigers began the season with 12 senior starters (5 on offense and 7 on defense).

Here's a breakdown of MU's projected starters and the offense/defense two-deep for the CU game. You'll notice that of MU's 53 players listed on the 2-deep, more than half (36) are either freshmen or sophomores...

## IMPRESSIVE TD DRIVE HIGHLIGHTS TEXAS GAME FOR TIGER OFFENSE

As one can imagine, the list of highlights on the offensive side of the ball in a 41-7 defeat isn't a staggering one, but the Tigers did manage a very impressive TD drive in the 2nd quarter that gave life to the sellout crowd of 71,004 and momentarily got MU back into the game.

Trailing 21-0, Mizzou had managed just 25 net yards on its first three possessions of the night against Texas' stout defense that came into the game ranked 6th nationally in total defense.

But the Tigers responded with an impressive 12-play, 81-yard scoring drive to close them to within 21-7 with 5:53 left in the 2nd quarter, with the drive capped on an 11-yard TD pass from QB Blaine Gabbert to WR Jared Perry.

The drive consumed 5:46 off the clock, which marked a season-long for a scoring drive time-wise (previous long was a 4:35 FG drive against Illinois). The Tigers showed an effective run-pass balance on the drive, as it ran 7 times for 53 yards against the nation's top-ranked rush defense (UT came in allowing just 35.86 yards per game on the ground to opponents), while Gabbert was 4-of-4 passing for 30 yards and the TD.

## DEFENSE HAS STRONG 2ND-HALF SHOWING FOR SECOND-STRAIGHT GAME

Much like their teammates on offense, the Tiger defense didn't win the battles with Texas' offense, as 41 points allowed would reflect. There were some positives that took place overall on defense, however, so here's a few...

- Mizzou had its second-straight game where it held the opposing offense out of the end zone in the second half. Texas held a 35-7 halftime lead (including one TD that came on a blocked punt), but the Tigers adjusted nicely after halftime and limited UT to just a pair of 2nd-half field goals. Texas had just 115 yards of offense in the 2nd half against the Tiger defense...

- That followed another solid 2nd-half showing at Oklahoma State on Oct. 17th, when the Tigers held OSU's high-powered offense to three second-half field goals, despite the fact that it faced short fields the entire second half of its 33-17 loss...

- The Tigers held Texas to an average of 3.0 yards per rush on the night (43 carries for 131 yards), which was the 2nd-lowest total of the year for the Longhorns (46 yards vs. Colorado). Mizzou did manage to get to QB Colt McCoy 3 times (2 by DE Aldon Smith, 1 by LB Sean Weatherspoon), while Spoon also intercepted McCoy in the 3rd quarter, which was the Tigers' first interception since game #3 against Furman (3rd team INT of the year).

# MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

## GROUND GAME SHOWS SPARK VS. STOUT LONGHORN RUSH DEFENSE

A net total of 74 rushing yards for a game might not be cause for celebration, but when it is twice the average of what the nation's top-ranked run defense is allowing, it's a good starting point...

- Mizzou's rushing total of 74 net yards was more than twice of what Texas was allowing coming into the game. The Longhorns entered the game ranked #1 in rush defense, allowing just 35.83 yards per game...
- Texas had allowed its three previous Big 12 opponents a COMBINED net of 20 yards rushing, including totals of negative 6 yards against Texas Tech, 42 yards by Colorado and negative 16 yards by Oklahoma...
- The Tigers actually gained 99 yards rushing vs. the Longhorns, but a pair of sacks totalling 25 yards in losses counted against the net total. Backing the sack yardage out of the equation, Mizzou gained 99 yards on 27 carries, for a per-rush average of 3.7 yards, which was much better than the 1.3 average opponents were averaging against the Longhorns prior to the game...
- Mizzou's tailbacks were effective against the UT defense, as the trio of Derrick Washington, De'Vion Moore and Kendial Lawrence combined for 24 carries for 101 yards (4.2 average). Lawrence, a true freshman, gave a nice spark as he averaged 5.3 yards on 7 carries (37 yards net), including a nifty 22-yarder that he almost broke the distance. Washington carried 11 times for 35 yards (3.2 avg.) while Moore averaged a healthy 4.8 yards per tote (6 rushes, 29 yards)...
- Through 7 games, Washington leads all Mizzou rushers with 451 yards (4.1 avg.) and 3 TDs, while his per-game average of 64.4 yards currently ranks 8th-best in the Big 12 Conference...
- Lawrence owns the best per-carry average among the three regulars, with a 4.8 average...

## EXTRA-POINT STREAK UP TO 217 FOR TIGERS

What's the surest way to break up a no-hitter in baseball? Talk about a no-hitter in the middle of it, of course. With that in mind, it's with a healthy respect for sports superstitions that we reluctantly bring up this impressive streak for Missouri — the Tigers have converted on 217 consecutive extra point attempts entering Saturday's game at Colorado.

The last time Mizzou missed an extra point (not including 2-point attempts), was back in 2005 — and it just so happens that the miss was in the same location as this week's game, Colorado's Folsom Field. Mizzou missed a PAT on its only kick attempt in a 41-12 loss that year to Colorado, and hasn't missed since. After that, the streak has included:

- 2005: the last 13 PATs of the season (by Adam Crossett)...
- 2006: a perfect 45-of-45 (by Jeff Wolfert)...
- 2007: a perfect 67-of-67 (by Jeff Wolfert)...
- 2008: a perfect 73-of-73 (by Jeff Wolfert)...
- 2009: a perfect 19-of-19 (by Grant Ressel)...

Missouri is quite a ways still from the NCAA record for consecutive PATs made by a school. The record is 262 by Syracuse, from 1978 to 1989 by 7 different kickers.

## SHORT-YARDAGE SUCCESS FOR TIGER OFFENSE

When the Tiger offense has faced 3rd down or 4th down and 2 yards or less, they've had a good deal of success so far in 2009. Coming into Saturday's game with Colorado, Mizzou is a combined 22-of-28 (78.6%) on 3rd and 4th down tries of 2 yards or fewer. Here's a quick breakdown...

- 3rd-&-1: 11-of-14 (78.6%)...
- 3rd-&-2: 6-of-8 (75.0%)...
- 4th-&-1: 3-of-4 (75.0%)...

## SPOON MOVING UP MU TACKLING CHART; NAMED LOMBARDI SEMIFINALIST

The undisputed face, voice and leader of the 2009 Tigers is senior LB Sean Weatherspoon. "Spoon" came to Mizzou as a mostly-unheralded two-star recruit out of Jasper, Texas, and he's looking to leave as an All-American.

He's certainly off to a good start in that regard, and recently, he was one of 10 standouts named as a semifinalist for the 2009 Lombardi Award.

Through 7 games, Spoon ranks 4th in the Big 12 with his 8.71 tackles per game average (61 total). He's coming off a big night against #3 Texas, when he led the Tigers with 11 tackles, including 3.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 QB sack of UT's Colt McCoy. Spoon also grabbed a 3rd-quarter interception of McCoy to mark his first INT of 2009.

His 11 stops gave him 363 for his career (he's only in his 3rd year as a starter on defense), which ranks him 6th in Mizzou history. He needs 12 more tackles to crack the top five, and he's 71 tackles away from the MU career record of 434 tackles, set by James Kinney from 2001-04. With 5 games guaranteed remaining, he'd have to average 14.2 tackles per game to reach that mark. If the Tigers reach a bowl game this season, that goes down to 11.8 per game for him to become MU's alltime leading tackler.

Previously, Spoon turned in a 7-tackle outing at Oklahoma State where the Tiger defense performed admirably despite facing a severe disadvantage in field position most of the night. Spoon and company held OSU's high-powered offense out of the endzone in the second half.

At Nevada, Weatherspoon had a 9-tackle game where he registered 1 TFL and a 1/2 QB sack as the Tiger defense held the potent Wolf Pack attack in check for most of the night.

Weatherspoon turned in a game-high 14 tackles in Mizzou's comeback win against Bowling Green. He made four stops in the decisive 4th quarter that saw Mizzou outscore the Falcons, 14-0. Perhaps his biggest play was on a 3rd-and-9 early in the 4th quarter, when he stopped a pass play for a loss of two yards to force a BGSU punt. On the ensuing possession, the Tiger offense drove for a game-tying score...

He got his senior campaign off to a promising start as he registered a team-best 9 tackles in MU's 37-9 dismantling of favored Illinois. Spoon added a QB sack of the Illini's Juice Williams, and threw in 1 QB hurry too.

He's been named a 1st-team pre-season All-American by ESPN.com, and is on the pre-season watch lists for the Walter Camp, Butkus, Nagurski, Lombardi, Bednarik and Lott awards in 2009.

And for good reason, as he led the Big 12 in 2008 with a career-best 155 tackles, which ranked him 5th in all of the NCAA last year. He closed his junior season in fine fashion as he tallied 17 tackles in helping lead MU to a comeback 30-23 overtime win against Northwestern in the 2008 Alamo Bowl, winning Defensive MVP honors in the process.

After earning playing time as a true freshman mostly in a reserve role and on special teams, Weatherspoon emerged on the scene in 2007 as a sophomore. He took over the starting spot at the weakside linebacker position a year ago, and from the get-go was a leader on the defense. He ended the year with a team-best 130 tackles, and was named a 1st-Team All-Big 12 performer by the Associated Press.

## ALEXANDER THE GREAT CONTINUES BREAKOUT SEASON

One of the great stories happening in Big 12 football right now is the outstanding play of senior WR Danario Alexander, who has overcome four surgeries during his time as a Tiger, only to emerge this season as one of the most productive receivers in the nation.

The Marlin, Texas native enters Saturday's game against Colorado with a team-best 50 receptions for 701 yards and 5 TDs. He's already surpassed his previous season highs, which came back in 2007 when he had 417 yards on 37 catches in 10 games. Alexander was a bright spot on the Tiger offense in an otherwise tough night last Saturday vs. #3 Texas, as he caught 6 passes for 74 yards (the rest of the team combined for 6 catches for 25 yards).

Three times this year, he's already established a new career best for receiving yardage. The latest effort was at Oklahoma State, where he caught 9 passes for 180 yards and 1 TD. The TD was a beautiful catch-and-run where he broke a couple of tackles and fought off a facemask penalty to will his way into the endzone from 48 yards out. He also had a 50-yard catch against the Cowboys, to go with another one for 34 yards.

Alexander enters the Colorado game ranked 3rd in the Big 12 and 9th in the NCAA in receiving yards per game (100.14 avg.), and he's also 4th in the Big 12 and 15th nationally in receptions per game (7.14 avg.).

On Sept. 25th at Nevada, Alexander won the Big 12 co-Offensive Player of the Week for his 9-catch, 170-yard, 2-TD game in MU's 31-21 win in Reno. Alexander's scores came from 31 and 74 yards out, and he also had a huge 3rd-down conversion grab on 3rd-and-8 from the MU 5-yardline in the 4th quarter that helped spur what ended up a 97-yard TD drive that essentially iced the game for Mizzou.

Alexander became the first Tiger receiver to win conference offensive POW honors since Victor Bailey won the award in 1992 for his performance against Nebraska — back in the days of the old Big Eight Conference.

Prior to Nevada, he caught 3 passes for 46 yards and he became the first Tiger to throw for a TD and catch a TD pass in the same game since the 2006 Brut Sun Bowl. On the TD pass, Alexander combined with fellow WR Jared Perry as Alexander took a lateral toss from QB Blaine Gabbert, and after selling a bubble screen, he pulled up and lofted a pass



downfield to a wide-open Perry for a 40-yard TD that was MU's first score of the game. Later in the 2nd quarter, Alexander caught a pair of TD passes (13 yards and 17 yards), with the latter coming with just :11 seconds remaining in the half.

He had a 7-catch, 56-yard outing against Bowling Green, and his 22-yard catch-and-run late in the 4th-quarter that went down to the 1-yardline set up the game-winning TD that Derrick Washington scored with 5:38 to play.

Alexander opened his final season at MU in style, as he turned in career highs of 10 receptions for 132 yards against Illinois. Time and again he was QB Blaine Gabbert's go-to guy, as 6 of his 10 catches came on 3rd or 4th down, with 4 of them extending the chains. A fifth, which didn't gain a first down, was just as crucial as any of them, as he had a 16-yard catch on the sideline on a 3rd-and-27 from the Illinois 30-yardline on MU's opening drive of the game. That catch was essentially worth three points, as it put the Tigers within field goal range, and after Grant Ressel made the ensuing 32-yard field goal, the Tigers were off and running with a 3-0 lead.

Alexander's performance vs. Illinois put him over the 1,000-yard mark in receiving yards for his career. He enters Saturday's game against Colorado with 128 career catches for 1,698 yards and 13 TDs. He currently ranks 8th on the MU career receptions and is 9th on the receiving yardage chart, and his 13 career TDs puts him 6th alltime at MU.

His performances have been good to see for such a great kid who has battled through various injuries over the past two seasons. It's easy to forget that Alexander beat out Jeremy Maclin for the starting job at one receiver spot prior to 2007 — a pretty good indicator of his talent. But Alexander broke his wrist in the 2007 season opener, and that kept him out of action for three games. He returned to catch a TD pass in game 5 against Nebraska, and closed the regular season with an 8-catch, 117-yard, 1-TD performance in 4th-ranked MU's historic 36-28 win over arch rival and 2nd-ranked Kansas that led to MU taking over the #1 ranking the next week in the A.P. and BCS polls.

But Alexander saw his season come to an end the next week in the Big 12 Championship Game against Oklahoma as he tore knee ligaments while being tackled on an end around. He had surgery to repair the damage, and was making good progress until his ligament graft came undone during the spring of 2008, which forced him to undergo surgery again. He worked hard to return in 2008, and he did so admirably after missing only the first two games, but he clearly wasn't 100% for the season. His numbers dropped from 37 catches for 417 yards and 2 TDs in 2007 in 10 games to 26 catches for 329 yards in 12 games in 2008. He did up his TD total last year to 5, but he had a third surgery on his knee in the off-season to clean things up another time.

Alexander's perseverance to overcome his challenges was recognized in the off-season by his teammates, as they voted him one of four team captains for the 2009 season.

## GREGORY NAMED FINALIST FOR LOWE'S SENIOR CLASS AWARD

Veteran RG Kurtis Gregory is not only one of the top offensive linemen around, he's also an outstanding example of a student-athlete. Gregory, who was a 2nd-Team All-Big 12 performer a year ago on the gridiron, has also excelled in the classroom, as he earned his undergraduate degree in agriculture in May of 2008 — meaning he's in his 2nd season already of playing as a graduate student. The Blackburn, Mo. native (population of 270 in July, 2008) grew up on his family's farm and intends to make his living off the land when his playing days are done.

He often takes teammates back to the farm during down time to show them what a day of farm life is like — and most of the time his teammates come back appreciating football practice more and more!

Last week, Gregory was named one of 10 finalists for the 2009 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award, which honors the nation's top student-athletes in the categories of classroom, character, community and competition.

Nationwide balloting begins immediately to determine the winner. Lowe's, an official Corporate Partner of the NCAA, will announce the Senior CLASS Award™ winner in early January.

The 2009 finalists are: Zane Beadles, University of Utah; Richie Brockel, Boise State University; Eric Decker, University of Minnesota; Kurtis Gregory, University of Missouri; Jerry Hughes, TCU; Dan LeFevour, Central Michigan University; Colt McCoy, University of Texas; Zoltan Mesko, University of Michigan; Darrell Stuckey, University of Kansas; and Tim Tebow, University of Florida.

These 10 names will be placed on the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award football ballot for a nationwide vote which concludes December 6. Fan balloting is available on the award's official Web site, <http://www.seniorCLASSaward.com>, as well as through text messaging. Fans can text FOOTBALL to 74567 to vote for the finalists. These votes will be combined with votes from coaches and media to determine the recipient of the award.

As of Monday, October 25th, Gregory stood 2nd in the fan voting, which comprises 1/3rd of the voting total, with the remainder coming from Division I coaches and national media voters. Here's a look at the top-five in the voting, as of Monday...

Additionally, Gregory was recently named one of 54 candidates for the William Campbell Trophy, which is nicknamed the "Academic Heisman", and was formerly known as the Draddy Trophy. The award is considered the top scholar-athlete award available to college football student-athletes. Semifinalists must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first team player or significant contributor, and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

The NFF Awards Committee will select and announce up to 15 finalists on Oct. 29. Each finalist will be recognized as part of the 2009 NFF National Scholar-Athlete Class, receiving an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship. The Campbell Trophy winner, who will have his scholarship increased to \$25,000, will be announced live at the NFF's Annual Awards Dinner on December 8 at the prestigious Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. A total distribution of \$277,000 in scholarships will be awarded that evening.

The pre-season Outland Trophy candidate is slated to make his 35th consecutive start at right guard this Saturday against Texas.

## ALDON SMITH THE LATEST SMITH TO WREAK HAVOC FOR TIGER D-LINE

Perhaps Tiger coaches should just look for defensive linemen with the last name of Smith when they're out on the recruiting trails. After all, the top two QB sack masters in Mizzou history are Brian Smith (31.5 sacks from 2003-06) and Justin Smith (22.5 sacks from 1998-2000).

Now, it's turn for the next Smith to take his turn, and redshirt freshman Aldon Smith (no relation to Brian or Justin) is turning some heads in his first season of play. Heading into the Colorado contest, Smith ranks 4th in the Big 12 in tackles for loss (1.29 avg.) and is 8th in the Big 12 in QB sacks (0.71 avg.). He's got season totals of 9.0 tackles for loss and 5.0 QB sacks, and he's coming off a big game last time out against Texas, where he amassed a career-best 11 tackles (all of the solo variety).

Included in that 11-tackle night were a pair of QB sacks against Texas' 2008 Heisman Trophy runner-up Colt McCoy. Smith turned in 4.0 tackles for loss in all on the night for 11 yards in total losses.

Smith had a big QB sack at Nevada that went for a loss of 13 yards on 3rd down that forced a Wolf Pack punt. He also was credited with forcing a fumble inside the MU 5-yardline early in the 4th quarter that was recovered by the Tigers, and that preceded a game-clinching 97-yard TD drive by the offense. Smith ended the night with 7 tackles in Reno.

Smith had a 5-tackle performance against Bowling Green that included one huge 4th-quarter sack of 18 yards that came with around 9 minutes left in the game, with MU trailing 20-13 at the time. His sack was on 3rd down, and forced a BGSU punt that MU took and drove for the game-tying TD.

Smith started against Bowling Green, after he was very impressive in his collegiate debut against Illinois, when he registered 6 tackles, including 3 tackles for loss and 1 QB sack of the Illini's Juice Williams.

If that seems like a lot of Smiths to keep track of, well wait, there's more. Aldon's running mate at the other defensive end is sophomore Jacques Smith (again, no relation to any other MU Smiths). Jacques (pronounced jah-QWEE-s) has started 4 games, and has been very productive as well, as he's got 17 tackles and has added 1.5 QB sacks of his own, to go with an interception against Furman that he returned 43 yards for a TD.

## EBNER RETURNS TO FIELD JUST 12 DAYS AFTER KNEE SURGERY

Sophomore LB Will Ebner is fast becoming known as the hardest hitter on the team, as the Friendswood, Texas native has to lead the team in unofficial "oohs" from the stands with the constant stream of hard shots he dishes out.

He might also have earned the award for toughest guy on the team, as he returned to the field against Texas last week just 12 days after he had arthroscopic surgery on his knee to repair damaged meniscus that he suffered in MU's Oct. 8th game against Nebraska. Ebner had surgery on Oct. 12th and sat out the Tigers' Oct. 17th game at Oklahoma State, but was cleared to play this past week.

And play, he did, as he came off the bench to register 7 tackles, including 1.0 tackle for loss.

Despite missing the OSU game, as well as the fact that he's only started one game so far this season, Ebner enters the Colorado game ranked 3rd on the team with 38 tackles.

He made his first career start earlier this year in the place of injured Luke Lambert at Nevada, and turned in a career-high 9 tackles (8 solo), while adding 2.0 tackles for loss in MU's 31-21 road win.

## PINKEL STANDS 3RD ON ALLTIME MU COACHING WINS LIST

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 9th season at MU and touts a career record of 136-81-3 (62.5%). The Illinois game to open the 2008 season was the 200th in Pinkel's head coaching career.

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 41-19 (68.3%) over the past 4+ seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008, has a 9-year record in Columbia of 63-44 (58.9%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has won 35 of his last 49 games overall.

MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 63.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

For the efforts in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was also named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007.

Pinkel has led MU to 5 bowl games, and if his Tigers reach a 6th in 2009, he will join Devine as the only other coach to guide MU to 6 bowl games.

Pinkel has directed Mizzou to 5 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 12-2 in 2007, 10-4 in 2008), with those representing 5 of MU's 7 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

The Big 12 North Division titles won by Mizzou in 2007 and 2008 represent the first football conference title of any kind Mizzou has won since 1969 — the last time it claimed a share of the old Big Eight Conference crown.

In November of 2008, Pinkel agreed to a new seven-year contract, meaning he'll patrol the Tiger sidelines through the 2015 season.

## GABBERT SHOWS HIS METTLE WITH 2ND-HALF COMEBACK VS. BGSU

After winning Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week in his first career start for his stellar performance in Mizzou's season opener against Illinois, sophomore QB Blaine Gabbert had a tough act to follow. Things didn't go so smoothly for the St. Louis native against Bowling Green, but perhaps what he did in the 2nd half of the game was even more impressive than his performance against Illinois, because of the pressure involved.

Gabbert keyed a 2nd-half comeback that saw the Tigers erase a 20-6 deficit late in the 3rd quarter, as they scored touchdowns on 3 consecutive possessions to grab a 27-20 win — and that stands as only the 3rd time in MU history that the Tigers have won after trailing by as many as 14 points at any time in the 2nd half of a game.

He had an outstanding performance in notching a win in his first-ever road start, as the Tigers pulled away for 31-21 win at Nevada on Sept. 25th. Gabbert threw for a career-best 414 yards, on 25-of-40 passing, with 3 TDs to raise his season total to 11 TDs with no interceptions entering the Nebraska game. He had 5 passes of 30 yards or more against the Wolf Pack, including TD strikes of 31 and 74 yards to WR Danario Alexander — for the season, Gabbert already has 16 passes of 30 yards or more, with 7 of them going for scores.

Gabbert had the first tough outing of his collegiate career against Nebraska and their stout defense, as he was held to 134 passing yards on 17-of-43 passing in MU's 27-12 defeat on Oct. 8th. It didn't help that the game was played in a virtual torrential downpour, nor did the fact that he suffered a sprained ankle in the first quarter when he was sacked by Ndamukong Suh. He also had his streak of consecutive passes without an interception broken at 177, when he was picked off by Suh for the first time in his career, in the 4th quarter. Despite being less than 100%, Gabbert hung in there and engineered a potential game-tying drive late in the 4th quarter after Nebraska had taken a 20-12 lead, as the drive reached the Husker 22 before stalling out thanks to a costly holding penalty. He also scored on a 1-yard keeper on the last play of the 1st half to give MU a 9-0 lead at the time.

Playing on the injured ankle, Gabbert had an outstanding 1st half at Oklahoma State on Oct. 17th, as he threw for 259 yards and 1 TD, before the OSU defense clamped down in the 2nd half to pull away for a 33-17 win in Stillwater. Last Saturday brought another tough night, as #3 Texas and its top-notch defense held Gabbert to just 8-of-16 passing for 84 yards before knocking him out in the 3rd quarter with an aggravation of his sprained ankle. Before he left, he did lead the Tigers to an impressive 12-play, 81-yard TD drive in the 2nd quarter that ended with his 11-yard TD pass to WR Jared Perry that cut the deficit to 21-7 at the time.

- His first half against BGSU was tough, as he stood 10-of-21 passing for just 44 yards, as the Tigers trailed 13-6 at halftime. Things got worse in the 2nd half before they got better, as Bowling Green took the opening possession of the 3rd quarter and drove for a TD to make it 20-6. The Tigers followed with a 3-and-out possession, but after the Tiger defense stiffened and forced a punt, Gabbert and company dug in and went to work on the next 3 possessions, scoring 3 straight TDs. The drives covered 87, 72 and 61 yards, respectively, and Gabbert was a combined 9-of-10 passing in those three crucial drives for 121 yards and 2 TDs. The first drive started at MU's 13-yardline with just 4:50 left in the 3rd quarter and MU trailing, 20-6. It ended with his 27-yard TD pass to WR Jared Perry, while the 2nd drive ended with his 33-yard TD pass to WR Wes Kemp...

Gabbert had Tiger nation — and much of the nation overall — abuzz with his first collegiate start, as he completed 25-of-33 passes for 319 yards and 3 TDs (49, 4 and 46 yards), and rushed for a 4th score in MU's 37-9 season-opening win over Illinois. He had 39 rushing yards in all, to give him 358 yards of total offense in his starting debut.

His QB rating of 186.96 was the best of any Big 12 signal caller on the opening week, and it was the 2nd-highest rating ever for a Tiger making his starting debut — trailing only the mark of 207.4 set by Chase Daniel in 2006 against Murray State (23-of-32 for 320 yards and 5 TDs).

Gabbert led the Tigers to a 52-12 win over Furman, thanks to a 17-of-25 passing performance that covered 256 yards and 3 more TDs, plus he added a 40-yard TD run to become the first Tiger since Brad Smith in 2002 (vs. Kansas) to throw and run for a TD of 40 yards or more in a game.

## TIGERS POST COMEBACK FOR THE AGES TO DOWN BOWLING GREEN

One week after breezing through a smooth-looking 37-9 season-opening win over favored Illinois, the Missouri Tigers were expected by most to do the same in their home opener against Bowling Green. Not much went right for the young Tigers, however, and through a combination of mistakes by MU and solid play from the Falcons, Mizzou trailed 20-6 late in the 3rd quarter before scoring the last 21 points of the game to pull out a 27-20 win and improve to 2-0 on the season.

- Mizzou's win tied for the 2nd-largest deficit overcome in school history to post a win. The alltime largest deficit overcome for MU was 21 points (vs. South Carolina in the 2005 Independence Bowl), and it marked the 7th time MU has rallied to post a win after trailing by 14 points in a game (the last was in 2001 at Kansas, when MU trailed 14-0 in the 2nd quarter to rally for a 38-34 win)...

- The comeback was also historic in another way, as it marked only the 3rd time in school history that the Tigers have rallied from a 14-point 2nd-half deficit to get a win. The first occasion was in 1976, when Mizzou trailed at #2 Ohio State, 21-7 in the 3rd quarter. The Tigers rallied for a 22-21 win, getting a TD and 2-point conversion in the final minute of play for the win. The last occurrence of overcoming a 14-point (or bigger) 2nd-half deficit to notch a win was the aforementioned 2005 Independence Bowl, when MU trailed 28-14 to start the 2nd half of play...

## WE'LL GRANT YOU THIS: RESSEL HAS BEEN GOOD

Replacing the NCAA record holder for career accuracy could be seen as a daunting task for sophomore PK Grant Ressel, but the successor to former star Jeff Wolfert has shown that he's been more than up to the task, as he's a stellar 12-of-13 on field goals and 19-of-19 on extra points through 7 games. He's 4-of-5 from 40 yards or longer, including a career-best 46-yarder against Bowling Green. His only miss came on a 43-yard attempt on Oct. 8th against Nebraska, in monsoon-like conditions, when the snap appeared to be a little high, which threw off the timing of the kick. The miss broke his string of 10 consecutive FGs.

The Jackson, Mo. native, who didn't win the starting kicking job until late in training camp, ranks 3rd in the Big

12 (10th in the NCAA) in field goals per game (1.71) and is 5th in the Big 12 and 36th in the nation in scoring (7.86 ppg)...

Ressel, who walked on to the Tiger squad in 2007 was an unsung hero of Mizzou's 27-20 win over Bowling Green, as he accounted for the only points MU could muster through nearly 3 quarters of play. His 2nd-quarter field goals of 38 and 46 yards helped keep the Tigers afloat and within striking distance, until the offense could get untracked in the 2nd half. His 46-yarder (a career long) came with 51 seconds before halftime, and cut the score to 13-6 at the time.

On Sept. 25th at Nevada, he again kept things moving forward as he nailed two 1st-quarter FGs (22 & 31 yards) to get points after stalled drives to help Mizzou post a 12-7 halftime lead. He also had 2 more boots in the 2nd half (27 and 26 yards) that helped seal the deal in Mizzou's 31-21 win.

His first 5 field goal tries this year came in the first half, and all were kicked when the outcome of the game was still up in the air — none came in mop-up time when there's no pressure riding on the kick. Against Furman, he did have his only FG try come in mop-up time, but it was a 44-yarder in the 4th quarter, which he nailed to give the Tigers a 52-6 lead. Against Illinois, he was 3-for-3 on FG tries, connecting from 32, 44 and 41 yards in MU's 37-9 season-opening win.

It didn't take long for Ressel to get his first test vs. Illinois, as he was called on for a 32-yard attempt that he nailed to cap MU's season-opening possession to give MU a 3-0 lead at the 7:23 mark of the 1st quarter. After MU took a 10-0 lead and Illinois closed to 10-3, the Tiger defense got an interception in Illini territory. The drive stalled out, however, and Ressel was called on to try a 44-yard attempt, which again was true with 8:36 left in the half for a 13-3 lead. He tacked on a 41-yarder for good measure with just :06 seconds left in the half to give Mizzou a huge boost of momentum, as well as a 16-3 lead, into the lockerroom for halftime.

Ressel won the kicking job in fall training camp in a fierce competition with senior PK Tanner Mills. Ressel had no previous collegiate place kicks on his resume prior to this season, but he did punt once in 2008 in mop-up time, as he booted a 43-yard punt against Southeast Missouri State.

## MISSED OPPORTUNITIES, MISTAKES PROVE COSTLY VS. NEBRASKA

Playing in a driving and relentless rain storm on Oct. 8th, Mizzou managed to scrape together a 12-0 lead over the favored Nebraska Cornhuskers through three quarters of play, only to see a stunning turn of events take place in the 4th quarter that saw the Huskers put 27 points on the board, to post the 27-12 comeback win.

Uncharacteristic mistakes and some big missed opportunities proved to be the difference in this ballgame. As painful as it is to rehash this for Tiger fans, here's a look back at some of the key moments...

- — Twice Mizzou recovered Nebraska fumbles inside the Husker 35-yardline, only to come away with no points on either occasion. On the first instance, the Tigers recovered their own punt that deflected off a Nebraska blocker, on the Husker 32-yardline in the 1st quarter of a scoreless game. But thanks to a holding penalty and an ensuing QB sack, the drive netted negative 19 yards, and the Tigers had to punt. The second instance was perhaps even more crucial, as the Tigers recovered a fumbled snap on the Husker 29-yardline on the first possession of the 3rd quarter. MU led 9-0 at the time, and if they had been able to punch it in for a TD, who knows how the game would have played out, but it didn't happen that way, as three plays netted four yards, and in the sloppy conditions, Grant Ressel's 43-yard field goal attempt went wide left, marking the first kick he's missed all season...

- — Conversely, Nebraska jumped on Mizzou turnovers for 13 points in the key sequence that saw them score 20 points in a span of just 3:22, after they went scoreless for the game's first 46:04. After Nebraska hit its first big play of the game (a 56-yard TD pass early in the 4th to cut the Tiger lead to 12-7), Tiger QB Blaine Gabbert was intercepted on the very next snap — marking the first INT of his collegiate career (breaking a string of 177 consecutive passes thrown without an INT). The Huskers turned that into a TD for six points (the PAT pass failed), and the got seven more just 2:25 later, when Gabbert was again intercepted at midfield, with the return going to the Tiger 10-yardline. Three plays later, the Huskers found the endzone again to increase the lead to 20-12...

- — Mizzou entered the game as the least penalized team in the Big 12 Conference (averaging 5.0 penalties for 45.5 yards per game), but it was flagged 8 times for 100 yards on the night. Included in that total were 4 offensive holding penalties (the Tigers had 10 offensive holding penalties in 14 games during 2008, by comparison). Three of those holds were killers that completely changed the complexion of potential scoring drives. The first was detailed above when MU missed out on a golden scoring opportunity in the 1st quarter after recovering a Husker fumble. Another came late in the 3rd quarter, with MU leading 9-0, and driving inside the Husker 10-yardline. On 2nd-and-4 from the 7-yardline, TB Derrick Washington carried for an apparent 1st down to the 2-yardline. However, a hold was called on the play at the 5-yardline, forcing a 2nd-and-12 from the 15. Two incomplete passes followed, and the Tigers had to settle for a 33-yard Ressel field goal to go up 12-0, instead of a more commanding 16-0 lead that was so close. Lastly, with under six minutes left in the game, and Nebraska up 20-12, the Tigers mounted a solid drive that took the from their own 25-yardline to the Husker 22, where they had a 1st-and-10. During an incomplete 1st-down pass, the Tigers were flagged for holding, which forced a 1st-and-20 situation from the 32-yardline, that the

Tigers couldn't overcome, as they had four straight incompletions derail their last chance...

• — It's hard to imagine a defense playing better than Mizzou's unit did through 3 quarters of play, as it pitched a shutout for the game's first 46:04. The last time Mizzou had shut out Nebraska for the first 3 quarters was way back in 1982 (a 6-0 Nebraska win in Columbia). Through 3 quarters, Nebraska (which entered the game with the nation's 19th-ranked offense) had 50 plays for 109 yards, zero red zone penetrations (it crossed midfield just twice), and was just 4-of-13 on 3rd-downs. Husker QB Zac Lee was just 9-of-27 passing for only 79 yards to that point. But the 4th quarter was all Nebraska, as the Huskers hit that long pass play for a score to break the ice, and then the Tiger defense couldn't keep NU out of the endzone on two short field situations after Nebraska took over on the Tiger 18-yardline and 10-yardline following interceptions. In the 4th quarter, Nebraska managed 27 points and 154 yards of offense on 16 snaps, they were 3-of-3 on redzone chances, and were a perfect 4-of-4 on 3rd-downs...

## SECOND-HALF DRY SPELL, TURNOVERS SEND TIGERS TO DEFEAT AT OSU

Mizzou went to Stillwater, Okla. on Oct. 17th with the intention of ruining 16th-ranked Oklahoma State's Homecoming, but in the end, turnovers and a rough 2nd half by the Tiger offense led to a 33-17 defeat to the Cowboys.

Things looked promising early on, as the Tigers showed a nice mix of run and pass offensively, and drove the length of the field to open the game, before settling for a 21-yard Grant Ressel field goal and a quick 3-0 lead. After the Cowboys responded to take a 7-3 lead, the Tigers drove 97 yards to take a 10-7 lead, thanks to a 1-yard TD plunge by TB Derrick Washington early in the 2nd quarter.

After falling behind 14-10 on a pick-six by Oklahoma State when a ball pass from QB Blaine Gabbert went through the hands of WR Jerrell Jackson, the Tigers surged back to take a 17-14 lead with 6:23 left in the half when WR Danario Alexander willed his way to a 48-yard TD catch-and-run, as he broke several would-be tackles and a facemask infraction against him to get into the endzone.

The Cowboys got a long kickoff return to near midfield and drove for a tying field goal with 3:24 left, and it appeared MU was about to strike again, but a potential 50-yard gain to the Cowboy 25-yardline went incomplete as WR Wes Kemp couldn't haul in a beautifully-thrown pass from Gabbert on 3rd down with about two minutes left. Instead of MU potentially going into the half ahead by a 20-17 or 24-17 count, the Cowboys got the ball back and drove for a demoralizing TD pass with just :02 seconds left on the clock to take a 24-17 lead into halftime.

Mizzou gained 313 yards of total offense in the first half, as Gabbert threw for 259 yards. Alexander had 161 of those yards in receptions, and the Tiger run game was showing signs of life after struggling the past couple of games. But the second half couldn't bring more of the same output, as OSU controlled the clock and held a massive advantage in field position in the 3rd quarter to shorten the game severely.

Mizzou's defense played valiantly, but faced a short field for most of the 2nd half. In the 3rd quarter alone, OSU's average starting point on 4 possessions was its own 46-yardline, while MU had each of its 3 possessions in the period start precisely on its 14-yardline. The Cowboys held the ball for a massive 10:18 of the quarter, but thanks to a strong effort by the MU defense, OSU could only muster a field goal in the 3rd quarter to take a 27-17 lead into the final period.

The Tigers were flagged for only 3 penalties all night, but one was very costly, as it negated a kickoff return by Jasper Simmons that followed OSU's 3rd-quarter field goal that would have set Mizzou up inside the OSU 20-yardline. Instead, a hold was called on the return and the Tigers started at their own 14 again.

In the 4th quarter, the Tiger defense held OSU to a pair of field goals, while the Tigers had the ball inside the Cowboy 25-yardline twice, only to be turned away on downs both times.

## OKLAHOMA STATE FOLLOW-UP NOTES

• — The Tigers outgained OSU by a 393-to-351 margin in total offense, but Mizzou faced a 4-0 deficit in the turnover category at Oklahoma State, and those miscues led directly to 10 Cowboy points — a killer indeed in a 16-point game...

• — Mizzou's defense played much better than the final 33 points on the scoreboard would indicate. As mentioned above, 10 of the points came off of Tiger turnovers, and despite facing a short field most of the second half, Mizzou's defense held the potent Cowboy offense out of the endzone in the 2nd half. Oklahoma State had just 351 yards of total offense and 124 yards rushing, well below their averages of 425.40 and 196.00 coming in...

• — This was a game where field position played a crucial role in the outcome. Oklahoma State had to put together only one drive of 55 yards or more for a score, while the shortest of MU's 3 scoring drives had to cover 72 yards. Mizzou's 3 scoring drives were 78 (FG), 97 (TD) and 72 (TD) yards, while OSU had scoring drives of 24 (FG), 54 (TD), 40 (FG), 24 (FG) and 2 (FG) yards in addition to its interception return for a score, after the Cowboys opened the game with a 79-yard TD drive...

SEPT. 5, 2009 • EDWARD JONES DOME • ST. LOUIS, MO. • (64,215)

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Blaine Gabbert threw for 319 yards and three touchdowns and ran for a fourth in a stellar starting debut to lead rebuilding Missouri to a 37-9 victory over Illinois, its fifth win in a row in the neutral-site series.

Juice Williams was held in check and failed to convert a crucial fourth-down play for Illinois, which just missed cracking the preseason Top 25 but flopped despite an offense with eight returning starters. The Fighting Illini were 5-7 last year but had been a touchdown favorite against a program replacing 23 seniors, including quarterback Chase Daniel and a Big 12-best six NFL draft picks, including a pair of first-round selections.

Missouri won its eighth straight opener without most of the key skill players from an offense that helped produce 22 victories the past two seasons. Gabbert, a sophomore shining in his hometown after appearing in three games last season as Daniel's understudy, was 24-for-33 and added 54 yards on nine carries for an offense that had no turnovers.

Gabbert had three first-down runs before bulling into the end zone on an 8-yard carry in the fourth quarter

The Tigers led 16-3 at the half and pulled away with touchdowns on two of their first three possessions after the break. Danario Alexander had a career-high 10 receptions for 132 yards, including two catches for 59 yards, on the opening drive of the third quarter, and Jared Perry caught a 46-yard touchdown pass in the third for a 30-3 lead.

Williams was 18 for 28 for 178 yards with a touchdown and an

interception. Last year, Williams passed for 451 yards and five touchdowns and set an Edward Jones Dome record with 461 yards of total offense.

Illinois wide receiver Arrelious Benn and running back Jason Ford missed the second half with ankle injuries. Daniel Dufrene, the starter at running back, dressed but did not play due to an ankle injury.

Gabbert was 7 for 8 for 106 yards in the first quarter, leading Missouri to a 10-0 lead after two possessions while Illinois opened with two punts. The big play of the half was a 49-yard scoring pass to Wes Kemp, a sophomore St. Louisian also making his first career start, and the Tigers added field goals of 32, 44 and 41 yards from new kicker Grant Ressel.

Trailing 13-3 late in the second quarter, Illinois failed to capitalize on a roughing the punter call when Williams stumbled just after taking the snap on 4th-and-1 at the Missouri 20. Williams appeared to get his legs tangled with guard Randall Hunt and fell backward for a 4-yard loss.

Missouri has won 11 straight non-conference games, the longest streak in school history, since a home loss to New Mexico in 2005.

# 2009 GAME RECAPS

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - Blaine Gabbert looked like a star in his first college start. In Missouri's home opener, he looked like a sophomore learning on the job.

Gabbert threw two second-half touchdown passes and Derrick Washington scored the go-ahead TD late in the fourth quarter, helping the 25th-ranked Tigers rally from a slow start to beat Bowling Green 27-20.

"It was a gutsy win," Gabbert said. "It really checked what we're made of, and in the end it's going to make our team better."

Washington had 120 yards on 23 carries for the Tigers, who jumped into the rankings after an impressive opening victory over Illinois and needed a strong finish Saturday for any hope of staying there. Missouri (2-0) trailed 13-0 in the second quarter and 20-6 midway in the third before its offense stirred.

Missouri's point total was its fewest in a victory since beating Iowa State 27-24 on Oct. 15, 2005. The Tigers, who have beaten 10 straight non-conference opponents, averaged 42 points last year.

"I wouldn't want to make a living doing that every Saturday," coach Gary Pinkel said. "You can grow tremendously from it. I feel fortunate we're 2-0."

Bowling Green (1-1) was such a handful seldom-used Missouri punter Jake Harry was called upon seven times. Harry punted only 26 times all last season.

Tyler Sheehan was 29 for 46 for 206 yards and a touchdown and Willie Geter had 99 yards on 20 carries with a 1-yard scoring run for Bowling Green, which capitalized on a pair of fumbles for two first-half field goals before fading. Bowling Green, a Missouri nemesis from the Mid-American Conference, is 3-2 against the Tigers.

"I think Missouri stepped it up a little bit, and they made some adjustments," Sheehan said. "I think we played good enough to win. It just didn't happen."

Gabbert, who threw for 319 yards and three touchdowns in his first career start against Illinois, finished 20 for 33 for 172 yards after totaling 44 passing yards in the first half. His lost fumble on a sack led to a 37-yard field goal by Jerry Phillips that put Bowling Green ahead 10-0 late in the first quarter.

Pinkel said his quarterback never lost composure.

"He was under control," the coach said. "One of the greatest things a quarterback can do is learn to forget."

Missouri began its comeback with an 18-yard run by Washington on third-and-10, and Gabbert's 27-yard touchdown pass to Perry on consecutive plays cut the gap to 20-13 near the end of the third quarter. Perry said the ball went right through a defender's arms.

Washington gained 6 yards on 4th-and-2 from the Bowling Green 39 one play before Gabbert and Kemp connected for a 33-yard score for Missouri's first lead.

Washington topped 20 carries for the first time in his career, and his yardage was the third-best. The running game had a major role in the Tigers' rally.

"They really ran the ball well," Bowling Green coach Dave Clawson said. "And we didn't tackle as well as we did in the first half."

Bowling Green outgained Missouri 162-116 in the first half but could have put the Tigers in a deeper hole with touchdowns off the two turnovers at the Missouri 18 and 21.

"With a loss it's always a collective effort, as much as a win is a collective effort," Sheehan said.

GAME #3 • MIZZOU 52, FURMAN 12

SEPT. 19, 2009 • MEMORIAL STADIUM/FAUROT FIELD • COLUMBIA, MO. • (61,617)

COLUMBIA, Mo. - After a bit of a sluggish start, Mizzou exploded with 42 points in less than 20 minutes of the first half, and cruised to a 52-12 win over FCS opponent Furman, to improve to 3-0 on the season. Mizzou is now 9-0 alltime against FCS competition (formerly Division I-AA).

Mizzou's first two offensive possessions ended in punts, and a combined net of zero yards. But a gadget play got things going, when QB Blaine Gabbert lateraled to WR Danario Alexander, and after selling a screen pass, he threw downfield to a wide open Jared Perry for a 40-yard TD pass with 4:47 left in the 1st quarter, and a 7-0 lead.

The Tiger defense forced three straight punts, and the offense responded with three more scoring drives. It started with a Gabbert-to-Perry 48-yard TD pass (giving Perry his first multiple TD receiving game of his career), and continued with a 40-yard TD run by Gabbert on an option keeper. Gabbert became the first Tiger since 2002 to run and throw for a TD of 40 yards or more in a game (Brad Smith vs. Kansas — 62-yd. TD pass, 75-yd. TD run).

Gabbert would throw two more TD passes in the 2nd quarter, as he hooked up with Alexander both times, the first on a 13-yarder with 7:10 to play, and the last from 17 yards out with just :11 seconds left to close out a sharp 3-play, 75-yard drive.

Gabbert would play just three quarters in all, ending with solid passing numbers of 17-of-25 for 256 yards and 3 TDs, plus 44 yards rushing and the 1 TD.

In between those strikes to Alexander, sophomore DE Jacques Smith tipped a Paladin pass to himself, and rambled untouched 43 yards for a touchdown that made it 35-0 with 3:55 left in the 2nd quarter, to give MU its first defensive TD of the 2009 season.

Mizzou called off the dogs in the second half, as it ran 26 times on its 39 offensive snaps after taking a 42-0 halftime lead. Derrick Washington scored on a 1-yard run to make it 49-6, and PK Grant Ressel added a 44-yard 4th-quarter field goal to round out the Tiger scoring.

Mizzou's defense forced two turnovers in all on the day, with the other coming on a fumble forced by LB Sean Weatherspoon at the Tiger 1-yardline. After a reception by a Furman receiver, Weatherspoon caught him from behind, and popped the ball out, causing the ball to roll forward into the endzone, where SS Jasper Simmons picked it up and ran out the other way to prevent the Paladin score.

Furman avoided the shutout when it drove 75 yards midway through the 3rd quarter to score on a 21-yard TD pass from QB Jordan Sorrells to WR Tyler Maples. The Paladins would add a short TD run midway through the 4th quarter against the reserve defense to account for the final score.

Perry finished with 7 receptions for 161 yards and 2 TDs, all totals which represented career highs for the senior wideout. All of his stats came in the first half.

Sophomore LB Will Ebner led the defensive effort, with a game-high 9 tackles, while All-America candidate Weatherspoon added 6 tackles, which moved him into 9th place on Mizzou's career tackles list (331).

The win extended Mizzou's school-record non-conference win streak to 13 games, dating back to MU's last non-Big 12 loss - to Oregon State in the 2006 Sun Bowl.

That game was also the last time that a Tiger player had thrown for and caught a TD pass, when former TE Chase Coffman did the deed. Alexander joined Coffman in that category with his TD daily double.

RENO, Nev. (AP) Blaine Gabbert passed for 414 yards and three touchdowns, including scoring tosses of 74 and 31 yards to Danario Alexander, to help Missouri beat Nevada 31-21.

Alexander finished with nine catches for a career-high 170 yards, and Grant Resel made all four of his field-goal attempts to run his streak to 10 for 10 this season for the Tigers (4-0), who have won a school-record 14 consecutive non-conference games.

Luke Lippincott ran for 114 yards for the Wolf Pack (0-3), who took a 13-12 lead on the first series of the second half on Colin Kaepernick's 11-yard touchdown run and had a chance to regain the lead early in the fourth quarter before Lippincott fumbled on Missouri's 4.

Wes Kemp caught three passes for 99 yards, and Jared Perry added eight receptions for 72 yards and a touchdown for the Tigers, whose last nonconference loss was in the 2006 Sun Bowl against Oregon State.

Missouri went ahead 18-13 in the third quarter on Gabbert's 74-yard hook-up with Alexander. The Tigers put the game away early in the fourth quarter on a 97-yard scoring drive, capped by Gabbert's 4-yard TD pass to Perry.

Turnovers and penalties cost both teams in the first half.

Trailing 12-7, Nevada had a chance to cut into the lead just before the half when Burnett Kaelin forced Derrick Washington to fumble and Jonathan Amaya recovered it at the Tigers' 27 with 23 seconds left. But the Wolf Pack's Nate Agaiava was whistled for a personal foul after the recovery and they had burned all their time outs in the first quarter. Time ran out before the Wolf Pack was able to get close enough for a field-goal attempt.

Nevada squandered another chance to score on Lippincott's fumble on the 4

when Aldon Smith stripped the ball loose and Brian Coulter recovered with 14:29 left in the game.

Nevada's Mike Ball returned the opening kick of the second half 52 yards and Lippincott carried six consecutive times for 34 yards to move deep into Missouri territory. On third-and-7 from the 11, Kaepernick started to roll right then with three Tigers in pursuit, rolled back around the left side to score for a 13-7 lead. Running back Courtney Randall failed to convert a 2-point play.

Missouri answered two plays later from their own 26 when Gabbert lobbed a pass to an open Alexander at midfield and he raced to the end zone. Another failed 2-point try left the score at 18-13 with 10:29 left in the third.

Missouri led 3-0 on Ressel's 22-yard field goal after Vai Tava fumbled a punt at midfield and Andrew Gachkar recovered it.

Nevada's first first-half score of the season came when Kaepernick pitched to Lippincott, who pitched to flanker Chris Wellington on a reverse for a 19-yard gain to set up Randall's 2-yard touchdown run for a 7-3 lead. Ressel added a 31-yard field goal to cut it to 7-6 a minute before the end of the first quarter. He also hit from 27 and 26.

Gabbert, a sophomore, completed 25 of 40 attempts with no interceptions. He was scrambling under pressure on third-and-8 from Nevada's 31, but managed to escape and threw over the middle to Alexander who caught it at the 20 and sprinted to the end zone to put Missouri up 12-7 with 2:09 left in the half.

Playing in a virtual downpour all night long, the #24 Missouri Tigers managed a shutout the 21st-ranked Nebraska Cornhuskers through three full quarters. Unfortunately for Mizzou, they could only build a 12-0 lead, and that wasn't enough to withstand a furious 4th-quarter rally by the visiting Huskers, as Nebraska exploded for 27 points in the final 13 minutes of play to escape Faurot Field with a 27-12 win.

Mizzou's defense was outstanding most of the night, as it held the Huskers to a paltry 109 yards of total offense through three quarters of play. But on the third play of the 4th quarter, Nebraska QB Zac Lee found WR Niles Paul open on a post-route and hit him in stride for a 56-yard touchdown with 13:56 to play to pull the Huskers to within 12-7.

That one strike seemed to turn the momentum immediately, as the Huskers intercepted Mizzou QB Blaine Gabbert on the very next snap — marking the first collegiate interception Gabbert had ever thrown (breaking a string of 177 consecutive passes without an interception), as Husker star DT Ndamukong Suh leapt high to bat a pass down over the middle, only to have the ball stick in his mitts for the INT at the Tiger 18-yardline.

Two plays later, Nebraska took the lead as Lee hit Paul again, this time from 13 yards out with 12:59 left, and just like that, the Huskers held a 13-12 lead.

Before those two TD passes, Nebraska's Lee was just 9-of-27 passing for 79 yards.

After Mizzou drove on its ensuing possession to midfield, Gabbert was again intercepted, as Nebraska's Dejon Gomes jumped a sideline route at the 50-yardline, and returned it all the way to the Tiger 10-yardline. The Huskers would capitalize, as Lee hit TE Mike McNeill for an 8-yard TD pass on 3rd-and-goal with 10:34 to play for a 20-12 lead.

In a span of just 3:22 off the clock, Missouri went from a seemingly solid 12-0 lead to a 20-12 deficit. The swing of momentum was too much to overcome, although the Tigers tried valiantly to stage a comeback of their own.

Gabbert led a promising drive that reached as far as the Husker 22-yardline with under six minutes to play, but a holding call — Mizzou's 5th costly holding penalty of the night — derailed the possession and eventually led to a failed 4th-and-20 try from the Nebraska 32-yardline.

The Huskers were able to ice the game as they drove 68 yards in 8 plays for a 5-yard TD run by Roy Helu to account for the final score.

The Tigers had built their lead thanks to a safety on a bad punt snap by Nebraska in the 2nd quarter, followed by a gutsy QB keeper by Blaine Gabbert from one yard out on 4th-and-goal with no time left on the clock to put the Tigers up, 9-0, at half.

The Tigers also got a 33-yard field goal by Grant Ressel with 1:26 left in the 3rd quarter to extend the lead to 12-0, but missed opportunities loomed large in the end, as the 12-point lead could have much more.

Twice Mizzou recovered Nebraska fumbles inside the Husker 35-yardline, only to come away empty both times. Late in the 1st quarter, Mizzou recovered a fumbled punt by Nebraska at the Husker 32-yardline, but the drive netted minus 19 yards, thanks to another holding penalty and 3rd-down sack of Gabbert.

Another key exchange happened early in the 3rd-quarter, as the Tigers recovered a fumbled snap by the Husker offense, at the Nebraska 29-yardline. The golden opportunity to take a big lead went for naught, however, as the Tigers could muster only four yards on a pair of runs, and an incomplete pass, and Grant Ressel couldn't connect on a 43-yard field goal try (his first miss of the year).

GAME #6 • #16 OKLAHOMA STATE 33, MIZZOU 17

OCT. 17, 2009 • BOONE PICKENS STADIUM • STILLWATER, OKLA. • (55,752)

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) – A back-and-forth first half that saw five lead changes abruptly turned south for Missouri, as the Tigers saw a 17-14 2nd quarter lead turn into a 33-17 defeat at 16th-ranked Oklahoma State.

Mizzou buoyed by the right arm of QB Blaine Gabbert, and an improved running game, bolted to a 17-14 lead at the 6:23 mark of the 2nd quarter, as WR Danario Alexander caught a 48-yard TD pass, breaking several would-be tackles on the way to the endzone.

But the Cowboys, playing on their Homecoming, scored 10 points in the final 3:24 of the half to post a 24-17 halftime lead.

The second half was nothing like the first, as the defenses took over and prevented any touchdowns. Three OSU field goals were the only scores after intermission, as the Cowboys took advantage of superior field position and some key 4th quarter stops, to hold on for the win.

Mizzou's defense forced a pair of Cowboy punts on their first two second-half possessions, but the Tiger offense, which rolled to 313 yards in the first half, went 3-and-out on its first possession, and had its second drive ended on the second of three OSU interceptions on the night.

Oklahoma State held the ball for a whopping 10:18 of the 3rd quarter, yet managed only a field goal as it took a 27-17 lead into the final period. A potential game-changing play was wiped out by a Tiger penalty late in the 3rd, when MU's Jasper Simmons busted a kickoff return all the way to the Cowboy 10-yardline, only to have it called back due to a holding penalty on the Tiger 24-yardline.

Mizzou lost the turnover battle, 4-0 on the night, as the Cowboys turned those four miscues into 10 key points to help their cause.

The Tigers outgained OSU on the night by a 393-351 margin, but only 80 yards came after halftime as MU committed three turnovers in the 2nd half and

twice turned the ball over on downs, once on the OSU 21-yardline and the last time on the Cowboy 10-yardline.

Alexander was a star on the night for Mizzou as he hauled in 9 catches for a career-high 180 yards and the 1 TD. His 180 yards receiving was the 7th-highest single-game total in MU history, and the most since 2002 when Justin Gage tied his own MU single-game mark of 236 yards against Bowling Green.

Simmons also gave MU a spark midway through the 4th quarter when he took a reverse on a punt return and went 60 yards down to the OSU 17-yardline. But facing a 4th-and-3 from the Cowboy 10, and trailing, 33-17, MU was denied a chance at a comeback when TB Derrick Washington was held for no gain to give the ball back to Oklahoma State.

Washington had 35 yards on 10 carries on the night, including a 1-yard TD plunge with 14:02 to play in the 2nd quarter that put MU on top, 10-7. That capped a brilliant 9-play, 97-yard drive by the Tiger offense.

Field position was a huge advantage for OSU in the 3rd quarter. The Cowboys' average starting position on 4 possessions was its 46-yardline, while MU started all 3 of its 3rd-quarter drives on its 14-yardline. The Tigers couldn't flip the field as it went 0-of-7 on 3rd-downs and 1-of-3 on 4th-downs in the 2nd half, allowing OSU to control the clock for nearly 19 minutes of the 30-minutes after halftime.

Faced with a short field for most of the 2nd half, the Tiger defense held tight, allowing only three field goals by OSU. The Cowboy offense accounted for only 23 points (10 came directly off MU turnovers) and 351 yards, well below their per-game averages of 38.40 points and 424.40 yards coming in.

# 2009 GAME RECAPS

GAME #7 • #3 TEXAS 41, MIZZOU 7

OCT. 24, 2009 • FAUROT FIELD/MEMORIAL STADIUM • COLUMBIA, MO. • (71,004)

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) – Colt McCoy completed his first 11 passes and produced touchdowns on No. 3 Texas' first three drives, helping to put Missouri away early in a 41-7 victory in front of a sellout Homecoming crowd at Faurot Field/Memorial Stadium which was MU's 10th-largest crowd in history, and the largest overall since 1983.

McCoy matched his season best with three touchdown passes, two of them to Jordan Shipley, while Texas' defense blocked a punt for a score in a nearly flawless first half that produced a 35-7 halftime lead.

The Longhorns (7-0, 4-0 Big 12) beat Missouri for the sixth straight time and Tiger QB Blaine Gabbert was held to 84 yards passing and a touchdown before having to leave the game in the third quarter due to an injured ankle.

The Tigers (4-3, 0-3) fell behind 21-0 in the first quarter before responding with an impressive touchdown drive against the Longhorns salty defense. Gabbert led a 12-play, 81-yard drive that culminated with his 11-yard touchdown strike to WR Jared Perry on 3rd-down that cut the deficit to 21-7 with 5:53 to play in the 2nd quarter.

Mizzou gained 53 yards on the ground during the possession, which was more than Texas' top-ranked rush defense was allowing per game coming in (35.83 average per game, #1 in the nation).

But the Longhorns had no designs of letting Mizzou hang around the game, as they marched right back 87 yards the other way for McCoy's 3rd TD pass that made it 28-7 with 1:49 before half.

The backbreaker came barely a minute later, when a Tiger possession ended deep in its own territory, and a punt was blocked near the MU goalline by Texas' Curtis Brown, with UT's Malcolm Williams falling on the ball in the endzone for a 35-7 lead with just :45 seconds left in the half.

The Tiger defense held its own in the second half, limiting Texas to just 115 yards of offense and a pair of field goals after intermission, but it wasn't enough to offset a tough night for the MU offense, which held Mizzou to a season-low 173 yards and 7 points.

McCoy was 26 for 31 for 269 yards with an interception. Shipley had seven catches for 108 yards, his fourth 100-yard game of the season, with scoring catches of 8 and 13 yards.

Texas is 31-4 against the Big 12 North since 1998 and coach Mack Brown is 6-0 against Missouri, the two-time defending North division champions.

Gabbert was 8 for 16, including a touchdown. He had been hobbled by a sprained right ankle the previous two weeks, but his problems appeared to have more to do with Texas' stifling defense.

Danario Alexander was a bright spot for the Tiger offense, as he had 6 receptions for 74 yards, while the rest of the team combined for 6 catches for 25 yards.

Tiger running backs combined for 101 yards rushing on 24 carries, good for an average of 4.2 yards per carry, much better than what Texas' top-ranked run defense was allowing per game (1.3 avg. against coming in).

Sean Weatherspoon had 11 tackles and an interception of McCoy in the 3rd quarter to lead the defensive charge. Freshman DE Aldon Smith also had a productive night, as he had a career-best 11 tackles (all solo) and notched 4.0 tackles for loss, with 2.0 of those coming on sacks of McCoy, the 2008 Heisman runner-up.

McCoy totaled one touchdown pass the previous two games and had been a bit of a question mark this week due to a bruised right thumb. Instead, Texas led 21-0 late in the first quarter.

McCoy opened 9 for 9 for 106 yards and the Longhorns had a 170-1 advantage in total yards before Missouri got anything going.

# 2008 GAME RECAPS

GAME #8 • #16 MIZZOU 58, COLORADO 0

OCT. 25, 2008 • MEMORIAL STADIUM/FAUROT FIELD • COLUMBIA, MO. • (68,349)

COLUMBIA, Mo. - Coming off of consecutive losses and hungry to redeem itself, the 16th-ranked Missouri Tigers took out their frustrations, and then some, against the compliant Colorado Buffaloes Saturday night in Columbia, to the tune of 58-0. The shutout marked the first time they held a Big 12 opponent scoreless and was the first shutout win against a conference foe for MU since blanking Kansas in 1986 (W, 48-0).

The Tigers scored on 9-of-11 possessions with the #1 offense on the field, and tacked on a late TD by the reserves on a long run in the final 5 minutes to mark the largest win ever for Missouri in Conference play. Heisman hopeful QB Chase Daniel was on fire from the start, as he completed his first 13 passes of the night and ended 31-of-37 passing for 302 yards and a school-record tying 5 TDs.

Daniel's main accomplices were the usual suspects, in WR Jeremy Maclin (11 receptions, 134 yards, 2 TDs) and TE Chase Coffman (7 catches, 50 yards, 1 TD), while TB Derrick Washington got untracked after being held in check in the ground game the previous two weeks, as he contributed 83 rushing yards and 1 TD on 17 tries (4.9 avg.).

Coffman broke an NCAA record for career receptions by a TE in the game, as he entered with an MU-record 213 catches. His 7-catch night moved him past Louisville's Iln Green, who held the record with 217 grabs from 1996-99. One of Coffman's catches was one of his countless highlight-reel catches that capped MU's 2nd possession, when he made a leaping, one-handed grab while falling out of the back of the endzone on a 3rd-and-1 play to give the Tigers a 14-0 lead.

The Tigers took the opening kickoff and promptly marched 56 yards in just 4 plays, taking just 1:09 off the clock as Washington capped the drive with a 3-yard TD run, his 13th of the year. After CU went 3-and-out on its ensuing drive, disaster struck for the Buffs as punter Tom Suazo mishandled the snap and was tackled while trying to scramble on his own 5-yardline, setting up Coffman's heroics as the Tigers grew the

lead. After the Tiger defense forced a second successive 3-and-out, Daniel led a 13-play, 55-yard drive that culminated with a 3-yard TD pass to Maclin, and with 3:20 left in the 1st quarter, it was 21-0 Tigers.

As impressive as the Tiger offense was, the story of the night was Mizzou's defense, which was coming off a tough game at #1 Texas, where they allowed 56 points - the most ever allowed by a Gary Pinkel Tiger team. They made up for that in a hurry as they constantly harrassed a pair of CU quarterbacks and never allowed the Buffaloes to get any traction offensively. The Buffs ended the night with just 199 yards of total offense, and didn't have positive yards until midway through the 2nd quarter.

A pair of Jeff Wolfert field goals (23 and 44 yards) followed a Tommy Saunders 10-yard TD catch-and-run in the 2nd quarter, as Mizzou took a 34-0 lead into halftime. The Buffaloes sustained their first drive of the game to open the 3rd quarter, only to have it snuffed out on an incomplete 4th-down pass attempt on the Tiger 17-yardline. Mizzou would answer by getting TD passes of 4-yards and 30-yards in the 3rd quarter from Daniel to Danario Alexander and Maclin, respectively, as the bulge grew to 48-0.

The defense kept its shutout alive as the Tigers added a 46-yard field goal early in the 4th by Wolfert. Even when the offense was not in scoring mode, it still did so, as reserve TB De'Vion Moore took a handoff and burst untouched 55 yards for his first career TD with 4:45 left to account for the final score.

Mizzou's defense then permitted the Buffaloes to drive in the waning seconds to its 9-yardline before time ran out. The Buffaloes admirably eschewed a cheap field goal attempt just to avoid the shutout, which broke a string of 242 consecutive games in which CU had scored, dating back to their last shutout loss (1988 against Nebraska).
