2009 COLORADO CHAPTER NEWS & NOTES

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (4-5, 4-3 RMAC)

David Van Voris (Kicker, Freshman, 6-2, 165, Elizabeth, Colo./Elizabeth HS)

Van Voris surpassed ASC's NCAA Division II era (1992-Present) record for field goals in a season while matching the 30-year old overall record as he made four field goals while scoring 13 of the Grizzlies' 19 total points in a road-win at Mesa State. Van Voris made field goals from 20, 25, 35 and 40 yards while converting on his lone point after attempt. He also made a 29-yard attempt that was wiped out because of a penalty, while averaging 65.6 yards on seven kickoffs throughout the afternoon. Van Voris is now 14 of 16 on field goal attempts and a perfect 18 of 18 on extra points this season. His 14 field goals made are already two more than teammate Dustin Bolt made last season and are equal to the 14 that Rocky Paulson made in 1979. Van Voris, who has only played in seven games this season, came into the game fourth in the NCAA Division II statistics for field goals per game and is now averaging 2.00 per game.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies have now claimed wins over Mesa State in five of the last six years. The Grizzlies have three of the top seven players in the RMAC for total tackles this season. Senior Oscar Villa (Tucson, Ariz.), tabbed as the RMAC Academic Player of the Year on Thursday, leads the team with 86, second most in the conference. Villa also leads the RMAC in tackles for a loss with 12.5. He had an assisted tackle for loss in Saturday's game and has now been involved in at least one tackle behind the line of scrimmage in 12 consecutive games. Sophomore Rocco DeLorenzo (Arvada, Colo.) is sixth in the RMAC with 69 total tackles while redshirt freshman James Ackel (Riverside, Calif.) is tied for seventh with 68. The Grizzlies' kick-off unit has 20 touchbacks this season, more than twice as many as any other RMAC squad. The Grizzlies have a chance at posting their first winning season since 2006 and are at home for their final two games of the season. They host arch-rival Western State in the annual Colorado Classic game on Halloween. The Grizzlies have won seven straight over the Mountaineers. The winning team gets to keep the Colorado Classic trophy, donated by Town & Country Auto Mall. The trophy lists the scores from all 62 of the games between the teams dating back to 1934. The rivalry is the second oldest in Colorado. The Mountaineers have not come to Alamosa since 2005, when the Grizzlies posted a 42-0 shutout win over the Mountaineers. In 2006 and 2007, the teams played in Pueblo at Dutch Clark Stadium. Each team gave up a home game in order to do so.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (7-2, 7-0 RMAC)

NFFCC Player of the Week

Prior to the start of the 2009 season, Pesek earned pre-season RMAC Offensive Player of the Year honors and was named pre-season First Team All-RMAC by d2football.com. So far this season, Pesek has been named to Allstate AFCA Good Works Team ® (will be recognized at 2010 Allstate Sugar Bowl) and was featured on the monthly NCAA on Campus television show (CBS College Sports network). An Honorable Mention All-RMAC pick as a sophomore in 2007, Pesek was named First Team All-RMAC and First Team NFFCC All-Colorado following his junior campaign in 2008. A two-time RMAC Offensive Player of the Week pick in 2008, Pesek is the President of CSM's Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Pesek earned his bachelor's degree (Electrical Engineering) in May of 2009 and is currently pursuing his master's degree in Mechanical Engineering (pre-med). Pesek has earned multiple Academic Achievement Awards during his collegiate career and has been listed on the Honor Roll at CSM.

Team Notes: Adam Saur leads the RMAC in both touchdowns scored (11) and receiving yards (928). Saur is also ranked second in the RMAC in both receiving yards per game (103.1) and receptions (62), sixth in scoring (7.3 ppg) and ninth in all-purpose yardage (103.1). With 28 career touchdown receptions, Saur is now just three away from tying the CSM individual career record of 31. Saur was named the RMAC Male Athlete of the Month in September of 2009. Jahre Cheeseman is ranked second in the RMAC in scoring (8.6 ppg), sixth in rushing (68.4 ypg), 12th in all-purpose yardage (97.9 ypg) and 19th in total offense (68.4 ypg). Cody Renken leads the RMAC in receiving yards per game (106.0), punt returns (13.1 ypr) and all-purpose yardage (205.8 ypg). Renken is also ranked second in the RMAC in receptions per game (10.2), fourth in receptions (51), sixth in receiving yards (530) and 17th in scoring (3.6 ppg). Hunter Wardlaw is ranked fourth in the RMAC in assisted tackles (45), 11th in total tackles (64), 12th in interceptions (tied – two) and 14th in tackles per game (7.1). James Tucker is ranked second in the RMAC in forced fumbles (tied – two) and 20th in tackles per game (6.3). Marc Schiechl is ranked first in the RMAC in sacks (7.0), second in both tackles for a loss (12.0) and fumble recoveries (two) and 32nd in tackles per game (tied – 5.7). Schiechl is CSM's all-time career leader in sacks (34.0). Alex Vigil leads the RMAC in forced fumbles (tied – three). Vigil is also ranked second in the RMAC in solo tackles (39), fourth in both tackles per game (8.6) and total tackles (77), 10th in assisted tackles (38) and 15th in tackles for a loss (tied – 8.0). Kyle Goracke leads the RMAC in passes defended (13) and is tied for second in interceptions (four). Taylor Accardi is ranked sixth in the conference in gross punting average (39.4). Robbin Vinnola is ranked 12th in the RMAC in receiving yards per game (48.0). Dominic Bravo is ranked 20th in the conference in receiving yards per game (41.4). Ben Tiller is ranked 11th in the RMAC in passes defended (tied – eight).

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-5, 0-4 MWC)

Team Notes: CSU remained win-less in league play as they lost to San Diego State on Saturday, 48-28. They will play host to Air Force at 2 p.m. on Saturday.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (5-4, 4-3 RMAC)

Team Notes: Jesse Lewis took 28 snaps from center in the "Wildcat" formation in running for a career high 181 yards and three scores on 24 carries. He helped CSUP to 328 team rushing yards in a home win over Western State's 28th ranked defense, the most rushing yards given up to an opponent by a Mountaineer team this season. His rushing yardage and rushing touchdown totals were the most by a ThunderWolf since the program was restarted in 2008.

2009 COLORADO CHAPTER NEWS & NOTES

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (1-8, 0-7 RMAC)

Team Notes: Fort Lewis dropped a 59-14 decision to Nebraska-Kearney at home. They will play their last two games of the season at N.M. Highlands this season and then at home against Western New Mexico.

MESA STATE COLLEGE (5-4, 5-2 RMAC)

Justin Murray (Wide Receiver, Senior, 5-9, 180, Grand Junction, Colo.)

Murray led all receivers with five catches for 90 yards in a home loss to the Grizzlies. He tied a season high for receptions in a game (fourth game this season with five catches). His 90 yards is the second highest yards total this year (107 vs. Fort Lewis). His longest reception on Saturday was for 33 yards. Murray scored his fourth touchdown of the year and ranks third on the team in all purpose yards (593). He is averaging 65.9 yards per game and leads all receivers in receptions (34), and he is second in yards (519) and touchdowns (four) and average per game (57.7).

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (4-3, 3-2 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force uses game captains. The captains for the Utah game were Brandon Geyer, Jared Tew, Myles Morales, Nick Charles and Rick Ricketts. Air Force extended its school-record consecutive games scoring streak to 202 games dating back to 1992. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the country. The 202-game streak is the 15th longest in NCAA history. Utah scored on its opening drive of the game which marks just the second time Air Force has allowed a score on the opponent's opening drive of the game. A touchdown by Navy is the only other score the team has allowed on the opening drive of the game. Air Force forced two turnovers (2 fumbles) in the game and now has 23 takeaways (10 interceptions, 13 fumbles) on the year. The Falcons are a +19 in turnover margin this season. Air Force entered the game leading the nation with a +2.43 turnover margin average. Air Force has forced two or more turnovers in six of eight games this season and in 19 of last 24 overall. Utah's touchdown on its opening drive of the second half marks the first time this season Air Force has allowed a score on the opponent's opening drive of the second half. Air Force forced five punts and two turnovers in the previous seven games. Air Force played the ninth overtime game in school history. The loss drops the Falcons to 5-4 overall and 4-2 in conference games. Air Force is 0-2 in overtime games this season, as the team also lost at Navy. Sophomore SPC Erik Soderberg kicked three field goals and has 17 this season which ties as the fifth most in a single-season in school history. Soderberg ties Joe Wood, who kicked 17 in 1991. Soderberg has kicked at least one field goal in every game this season. His 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to tie the game at 16-16 matched a career long. Sophomore QB Connor Dietz recorded career highs in carries (28) and rushing yards (98). His previous high came earlier this season with 15 carries vs. TCU and 83 yards vs. Nicholls State. Dietz also recorded career highs with seven pass completions and 64 yards passing. His previous marks were six completions vs. TCU and 51 yards vs. San Diego State earlier this season. Senior LB Justin Moore forced fumble and John Falgout made the recovery. The forced fumble is the first of the season for Moore and third of his career while the recovery marks the first of Falgout's career. Sophomore DB Jon Davis recorded the first fumble of his career, which led to a touchdown and a 10-6 Air Force lead. Davis later added the first quarterback sack of his career. Davis also returned the first punt of his career, good for 35 yards which is the longest by a Falcon this season. Junior FB Jared Tew scored a touchdown on a one-yard run to mark the second-straight game he's scored a touchdown. Tew leads the team with five rushing touchdowns on the year. Junior WR Kyle Halderman recorded his first catches of the season. Halderman missed the first six games of the season due to injury. Halderman matched his career high with three catches, good for 54 yards. Senior DL Ben Garland recorded multiple tackles for loss mark the seventh time in eight games he's had at least one tackle for loss this season. Senior LB John Falgout led the team with 11 tackles, marking the third time in four starts this season he's had double figures in tackles. Junior LB Andre Morris, Jr. matched his career high with nine tackles. He also had a sack and a forced fumble.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (2-5, 1-2 BIG 12)

Team Notes: The Buffs lost 20-6 against Kansas State on Saturday. They will play at home on Saturday against Missouri at 11:30 a.m.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (2-6, 1-5 BIG SKY)

Team Notes: Northern Colorado lost to Weber State, 28-20. They will face off against South Dakota at home for a 1:35 p.m. kickoff on Saturday.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (3-6, 3-4 RMAC)

Team Notes: The Mountaineers fell 27-38 at CSU-Pueblo. They will play Adams State this Saturday at 12 p.m.
