Colorado Buffaloes (3-1) at #24/#22 Missouri Tigers (4-0)

Oct. 9, 2010 – Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field – Columbia, Mo.

KICKOFF: 6:10 p.m. (central time).

STADIUM: Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field (71,004 – FieldTurf surface). Opened in 1926. MU is 253-167-20 there alltime and has won 26 of its last 31 overall and is 36-10 there since 2003 (3-0 in 2010).

SERIES: MU leads, 41-31-3 overall. The series is tied, 7-7, in Big 12 play. MU has won 4 straight – its longest in the series since a 6-game string from 1979-84, and the combined score of the last 3 MU wins is 149-27.

TIGERS OPEN CONFERENCE PLAY

It's time to separate the wheat from the chaff, so to speak, as Big 12 Conference season is upon us. The Missouri Tigers (4-0), and ranked 23rd in this week's USA Today Coaches' Top-25 Poll, begin conference play this Saturday as they play host to the Colorado Buffaloes (3-1 overall) in the Big 12 opener for both schools. Kickoff for the game is set for 6:10 p.m. (central time) at Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field. The game will be televised on FOX Sports Net.

Mizzou, 3-0 at home this season, will look to get out of the gates fast against the visiting Buffaloes, who they have defeated three straight times, by a combined score of 149-27 from 2007-09. The Tigers are coming off a bye week, which followed an undefeated non-conference run for the fifth straight season. Mizzou has posted 21 consecutive regular-season non-conference wins, with the last defeat coming in 2005 against New Mexico. After winning Big 12 North Division titles in 2007 (7-1 league record) and 2008, (5-3) the Tigers were dethroned by Nebraska in 2009. The quest to get back to the top of the division starts on Saturday against CU.

Colorado comes to town riding a 2-game winning streak, thanks to consecutive home wins over Hawai'i (31-13 on Sept. 18th) and Georgia (29-27 Oct. 2nd). The sole blemish on CU's record was a 52-7 loss at California in week two, after they opened the season with a 24-3 win over rival Colorado State on Sept. 4th in Denver. The Buffaloes had a back-and-forth affair last Saturday in their win over Georgia, and they rallied from a 24-14 3rd-quarter deficit with 15 unanswered points and then withstood a late Bulldog charge to post the win.

The Buffaloes have relied on their ground game in their last two wins, as they ran for 235 yards and 3 TDs against Georgia, one week after gashing Hawai'i for 252 yards and 2 TDs on the ground. Additionally, Colorado has been solid in defending the run, as their defense ranks 18th in the NCAA in the category, allowing only 100.75 yards per game. Opponents have managed only one rushing TD in 4 games against Colorado — making the Buffs one of only seven teams in the nation through games of Oct. 2nd to allow one or fewer rushing scores. They have also used their running game to control the clock, as they enter Saturday's game ranked 7th in the NCAA, with an average time of possession of 33:41.

EIGHTEEN (AND I LIKE IT)

Entering this week's games, Mizzou stood as one of 18 undefeated teams left standing. Eleven teams entered the week at a perfect 5-0, with another seven touting 4-0 marks.

We know that the ranks of the undefeated will drop by at least two after this weekend, as two games feature undefeated teams this week — Nebraska (4-0) at Kansas State (4-0) on Thursday night, followed by Michigan State (5-0) and Michigan (5-0).

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

MU GROUND GAME MOST POTENT IN THE NATION DURING 1ST QUARTER

Us P.R. types are known for our ability to take a random stat and skew it for our purposes to position something in our favor. Maybe this next factoid doesn't mean a hill of beans in the overall scheme of things, but we thought it was pretty interesting to note that no team in the nation is averaging more yards per rush than Mizzou in the 1st quarter of play (thanks to cfbstats.com for the breakdown).

In the 1st quarter of play, Mizzou is averaging a whopping 10.04 yards per rush (27 attempts, 271 yards), and that has led to 5 TDs. Here's a look at the nation's top-10 1st-quarter rushing teams (through games of Oct. 2nd)...

• — Sophomore Kendial Lawrence has had the most success initially in the opening period, as he's averaging 14.60 yards per rush in the 1st quarter (5 rushes, 73 yards, 1 TD). That's 6th-best individually in the NCAA. True freshman Henry Josey is very close behind, averaging 12.11 yards per rush in the 1st quarter (9 carries, 109 yards, 3 TDs). That's 14th-best individually in the NCAA. Sophomore De'Vion Moore is next on the chart, coming in at 26th nationally, with his 1st-quarter average per rush of 10.00 (7 carries, 70 yards, 1 TD).

MORE ABOUT THE TIGER GROUND GAME

Mizzou's rushing attack doesn't garner the attention its aerial game does in the spread offense MU has employed since installing it prior to the 2005 season. However, the Tigers have shown in 2010 that their ground game is something to be aware of, as it's been very efficient and effective when called upon thus far. Here are some basic factoids regarding the Tiger ground game...

• — It's been a tailback by committee approach thus far, with the bulk of the carries being split by junior De'Vion Moore (31 carries, 183 yards, 3 TDs, 5.9 avg.), true freshman Henry Josey (26-212, 4 TDs, 8.2 avg.), sophomore Kendial Lawrence (16-112, 1 TD, 7.0 avg. in 3 games), and true freshman Marcus Murphy (13-81, 1 TD, 6.2 avg. in 3 games). Lawrence missed the McNeese State game due to an injury, and Murphy did not play in the season opener against Illinois...

• — Those four backs have been very potent, as they've combined to average a salty 6.84 yards per attempt (86 combined carries, 588 yards, 9 TDs)...

• — Mizzou has 12 rushing TDs through 4 games in 2010, and that is just 3 shy of MU's 13-game total of 15 rushing TDs in all of 2009...

• — The Tigers have 12 rushing TDs in 124 attempts in 2010, good for a TD per 10.33 attempts. In 2009, MU had 15 rushing TDs in 444 attempts, for a ratio of one rushing TD per every 29.6 attempts...

• — Mizzou's average of 4.97 per rush ranks 38th in the NCAA (through games of Oct. 2nd), which is a big jump from 2009, when MU ranked 83rd nationally with a per-rush average of 3.72 yards...

THIRD QUARTERS HAVE KEYED TIGER WINS

Whenever he's asked about halftime adjustments, MU Coach Gary Pinkel is fond of saying that if you're waiting until halftime to make adjustments, you're waiting too long.

Even with that being the case, Mizzou has been coming out of the lockerroom for the second half in dominating fashion. The tone was set in the season opener, when the Tigers trailed rival Illinois, 13-3 at halftime, only to come out looking like a new team in the 3rd quarter. Thanks to a 7-0 3rd-quarter (which was more lopsided than the score might indicate), the Tigers went on to a 23-13 win. Mizzou outscored McNeese State by a 17-0 margin in the 3rd quarter of game #2 to pull away for a 50-6 win. In game #3, Mizzou won the 3rd quarter by a slim 3-0 margin over a tough San Diego State team, and that certainly played a role in allowing the Tigers to post the eventual 27-24 win. Last time out, Mizzou held a solid 28-3 halftime lead over Miami (Ohio), but they quickly removed any doubt about the eventual outcome of the game, thanks to a sterling 23-3 blitz in the 3rd quarter that led to MU's 51-13 win.

TIGERS HAVE BEEN TOPS IN THE BIG 12 NORTH THE PAST 3+ SEASONS

TIGERS GUNNING FOR 5-0 START FOR 4TH TIME IN LAST 5 YEARS

Mizzou will look to continue its perfect start to the 2010 season and improve on their 4-0 record Saturday vs. Colorado. A win over the Buffaloes would give Mizzou its fourth season of at least a 5-0 start in the last five years - a feat which had never happened in consecutive seasons at MU prior to the 2006 and 2007 seasons. Mizzou has started 5-0 to a season only 9 times overall in its previous 119 years of fielding a football team.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

MIZZOU-COLORADO SERIES HISTORY

Saturday's game against Colorado will be bittersweet for many associated with the rivalry, in a couple of ways. From an historical perspective, this will mark the 20th anniversary of the infamous 5th Down Game, which was played in Columbia on Oct. 6, 1990 (more on that to follow).

More importantly, Saturday will mark the last meeting between the longtime rivals for the foreseeable future, as Colorado will be moving to the Pac-10 Conference beginning with the 2011 season.

Mizzou and Colorado will face off for the 76th time when they meet Saturday in Columbia. The Tigers hold a 41-31-3 advantage in the series, and have won four straight, and five of the last six meetings, after the Buffaloes won five straight from 1999-2003.

The Tigers are hoping to rekindle some of the magic that's seen them post dominant wins over Colorado each of the last three seasons.

Mizzou has downed CU by a combined margin of 149-to-27 in the last three years, including a 58-0 shutout in Columbia in 2008 that was its largest victory margin ever over Colorado (and it was MU's first shutout of Colorado since a 57-0 win in 1962). In 2007, the Tigers got their first win in Boulder since 1997, with a 55-10 win that was the biggest margin of victory ever for MU in Boulder. Last year in Boulder, MU surged to a 33-0 first-half lead and cruised to a 36-17 win.

Since the Big 12 Conference formed for the 1996 season, the series between the two old Big Eight Conference foes is as close as can be, with it tied up at 7-7. Colorado did most of its damage early on, thanks largely to a five-game winning streak from 1999-2003. Two of CU's wins in that 5-game streak came in overtime, as the Buffaloes took a 46-39 OT win in Boulder in 1999, and followed with a 42-35 OT win in Columbia in 2002.

A win Saturday would give Mizzou five straight wins over Colorado for the first time since it won six straight from 1979-1984.

LAST YEAR REWIND: MIZZOU 36, COLORADO 17

BOULDER, Colo. — In what was considered a must-win game for the Missouri football team to remain in the Big 12 North race, the Tigers exploded for 21 points in the first quarter en route to a 36-17 win over the Colorado Buffaloes. The win put Mizzou at 5-3 on the year and 1-3 in the Big 12.

On the first drive of the game, the Tigers wasted no time storming out of the gate, going on an 11-play, 81-yard drive to draw first blood, as Derrick Washington put Mizzou up 7-0 on a one-yard touchdown run.

The second drive of the game took up considerably less time off the clock, but was exciting still as the combo of Blaine Gabbert-to-Danario Alexander connected on a 73-yard score to put the Tigers up 14-0 midway through the first.

With the quarter coming to a close, the defense put Colorado deep in its own territory, and gave Mizzou great field position for another scoring drive. After a 31-yard gain by De'vion Moore to the CU 33-yard line, Gabbert connected with Alexander again on a two-yard touchdown pass to go up 21-0. That lead would increase to 26-0 early in the 2nd quarter, thanks to a Grant Ressel field goal, followed by a sack of Hansen in the end zone by safety Jarrell Harrison.

Tasting blood, the Tigers received the ball on the free kick with the drive beginning on their 40. The team ate up 34 yards on passes of 10 and 14 yards from Gabbert to Jared Perry and Alexander and a 10-yard rush by Kendal Lawrence. But the signature play came on the field goal attempt after the drive stalled out at the CU 24-yardline. With Ressel setting up for the attempt, the snap was quickly picked up by Forrest Shock and pitched to Jacques Smith, who scrambled around the left side and into the end zone. The extra point by Ressel put the Tigers up 33-0.

Colorado got some momentum going in the 3rd quarter, closing to 33-10. Later in the third, with MU in scoring position, Gabbert tried a pass to the right flat for TE Andrew Jones, but it was read by Benjamin Burney who intercepted the pass and ran 78 yards the other way to the end zone making the score a little tighter at 33-17.

With the Buffs starting to give Missouri problems on both sides of the ball, the defense gave the Tigers momentum the team needed by stopping Colorado on a fourth-and-one deep in Tiger territory, thanks to a huge stop behind the line by LB Sean Weatherspoon. Although the offense would punt on its next possession, the Tiger defense came up big again, with Kevin Rutland intercepting Hansen to kill the drive.

THE 5TH DOWN GAME REMEMBERED

One of college football's most historic games took place on Faurot Field on Oct. 6, 1990, when the eventual national champion Colorado Buffaloes pulled out a 33-31 victory, scoring the winning touchdown on what turned out to be a fifth down on the last play of the game.

With MU leading 31-27, Colorado embarked on a frantic march down the field in the final minute of play. Gaining a first down at the MU three-yard line, with 31 seconds to play, CU quarterback Charles Johnson spiked the ball to stop the clock. After regrouping, Eric Bieniemy charged up the middle to the one-yard line and Colorado called its final time out. Eighteen seconds remained.

It was here that the officials failed to notify the chain crew to flip the down marker from 2nd to 3rd down. When play resumed, Bieniemy tried to go over the top but was thrust backward by Tom Reiner, Mike Ringgenberg and Maurice Benson. The clock reached eight seconds, and officials ordered it stopped momentarily to clear the pileup.

Then, on what was really fourth down (but only third down according to the down marker), Johnson spiked the ball again. With two seconds to play, Johnson squirted over right tackle Mark VanderPoel. Hit by Reiner and Ringgenberg, he rolled over and extended the ball into the endzone and the officials signalled touchdown. Of course, Tiger fans to do this swear that Johnson was down before he stretch the ball over the endzone, another factor which makes it such a lasting memory.

Pandemonium reigned for more than 20 minutes as those in attendance tried to determine just what had happened. But, with time expired, there was no avenue for appeal. What had appeared to be a major upset victory for the Tigers went into the record books as a bitter pill to swallow.

Colorado went on to win the Big Eight Conference championship, and with a victory over Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl, claimed a share of the national championship.

Here's how the play-by-play read of the game's final five plays:

2-G-MU 3 Eric Bieniemy runs middle, gain of 2 (Tom Reiner)

3-G-MU 1 Bieniemy runs middle, no gain (Reiner, Maurice Benson)

4-G-MU 1 Johnson pass incomplete

5-G-MU 1 Johnson runs middle. TOUCHDOWN. Johnson run for PAT, no good.

MOE LEADS NCAA IN RECEPTIONS, EGNEW RANKS #5

It was pretty clear to observers during fall training camp that QB Blaine Gabbert was in the process of developing a good chemistry with sophomore WR T.J. Moe and junior TE Michael Egnew. That comfort level has most definitely transferred to the season, as Gabbert has connected with Moe for 37 completions in 4 games, while Egnew's 33 catches are right behind.

Moe, who caught all of 2 passes as a true freshman in 2009, currently finds himself as the nation's #1 most prolific pass catcher through 4 games, as his 37 receptions (for 394 yards and 2 TDs) are ranked 1st nationally entering Saturday's game against Colorado. Moe, who was initially pegged to play safety when he first came to Mizzou, made his 1st career start in the 2010 opener vs. Illinois, and made 13 catches for 101 yards and 1 TD, and he followed with a 10-catch, 79-yard outing against McNeese State. Of course, his legend at Mizzou will be forever cemented in the history books after his 7-catch, 119-yard outing in week #3 against San Diego State, most notably for his 68-yard catch-and-run score with just :51 seconds left that gave Mizzou a dramatic 27-24 win. Moe followed by catching 7 passes for 95 yards last time out against Miami (Ohio), despite not seeing the field much after halftime due to the lopsided score.

Egnew is in a similar situation, in that he's relatively new to being a focal point of the passing attack. After catching a total of 7 passes for 47 yards (0 TDs) in 2008 and 2009 combined, Egnew has emerged as a weapon, with 33 receptions for 298 yards and 1 TD through 4 games. Egnew ranks 5th in the NCAA among all players with his 8.25 receptions per game average, and his 33 receptions are most in the nation among tight ends, 7 more than the next on the list (North Carolina's Zack Piantalo, with 26). He is also tops in the nation among tight ends in receiving yardage per game, at 74.50 yards entering Saturday's game against Colorado.

He began the season by snagging 10 catches for 60 yards and 1 TD against Illinois, and followed with 6 grabs for 52 yards against McNeese.

Egnew had an outstanding game against SDSU in game #3, as he finished the night with career highs in receptions (13) and yards (145). Both totals represented school single-game records for tight ends at Mizzou, with the old standards being 12 catches for 140 yards by former All-American Chase Coffman at Texas in 2008. He had a more pedestrian 4-catch, 41-yard outing in limited time last time out in MU's 51-13 blowout win over Miami (Ohio).

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

PINKEL STANDS 3RD ON ALLTIME MU COACHING WINS LIST

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 10th season at MU (20th overall as a head coach) and touts a career record of 144-83-3 (63.4%).

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 49-21 (70.0%) over the past 5+ seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009, has a 10-year record in Columbia of 71-46 (60.7%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has won 43 of his last 59 games overall (72.8%).

MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 71.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

For his efforts in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was also named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007.

Mizzou's bowl appearance in 2009 means that Pinkel has led MU to 6 bowl games overall, and he now joins Devine as the only other coach to guide MU to 6 bowl games.

Pinkel has directed Mizzou to 6 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 12-2 in 2007, 10-4 in 2008 and 8-5 in 2009), with those representing 6 of MU's 8 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

The Big 12 North Division titles won by Mizzou in 2007 and 2008 represent the first football conference title of any kind Mizzou has won since 1969 — the last time it claimed a share of the old Big Eight Conference crown.

In November of 2008, Pinkel agreed to a new seven-year contract, meaning he'll patrol the Tiger sidelines through the 2015 season.

TIGERS ARE 36-10 AT 'THE ZOU' SINCE 2003 SEASON

Since nicknaming Faurot Field/Memorial Stadium "The Zou" prior to the 2003 season, Gary Pinkel's Tigers have done a nice job of defending their home turf (FieldTurf surface, which was also installed prior to the '03 season, by coincidence).

Since 2003, the Tigers are an impressive 36-10 at home, good for a winning percentage of 78.3%, including 18-9 during that time in Big 12 competition (66.7%). That breaks down to records of 6-0 in 2003, 3-3 in 2004, 4-2 in 2005, 6-1 in 2006, 6-0 in 2007, 5-1 in 2008, 3-3 in 2009 and 3-0 in 2010.

In fact, the record book shows that Mizzou has dominated at home against fellow Big 12 North foes. The Tigers have lost at home to a Big 12 North opponent only once since 2005, when it dropped a 27-12 contest to rival Nebraska last season. In all, MU has won 10 of its last 11 home games over Big 12 North foes. Here's a rundown:

GABBERT IMPROVES TO 12-5 AS A STARTER

The old adage is that quarterbacks will be judged in the history books by how many games they help their teams win, not by the records and stats they accumulate.

Junior QB Blaine Gabbert is off to a great start in the winning category, as he's helped guide Mizzou to a 12-5 record in his 17 career starts (70.6%). Win number 12 came last time out against Miami (Ohio) when Gabbert had an efficient day which included 15-of-21 passing for 187 yards and 1 TD (with 1 INT) in MU's 51-13 win. Gabbert retired for the day early in the 3rd quarter but managed a QB rating of 152.42 before grabbing the headset for good — his second-highest rating of the season (154.13 vs. McNeese State is tops thus far).

His passing yards average of 259.75 ypg ranks him 23rd in the NCAA currently, and he's also 34th in the nation in total offense (257.25 avg.). Gabbert has completed 103-of-151 passes so far for 1,039 yards and 5 TDs, in helping lead MU to wins over Illinois, McNeese State and a dramatic late rally to beat San Diego State, in addition to the Miami (Ohio) win.

Gabbert threw for a season-high 351 yards in the win over San Diego State, as he completed 28-of-51 passes, including the game-winning TD to T.J. Moe covering 68 yards with just :51 seconds left. He became the first Tiger QB to throw a game-winning TD in the final minute of play since Pete Woods beat 2nd-ranked Ohio State in Columbus in 1976 (a 22-21 win with :12 seconds left).

Gabbert did throw his first two interceptions of the season in the 4th quarter against SDSU, but he also helped stake the Tigers to a 17-7 lead late in the first half when he scrambled 11 yards for his first rushing TD of the season, on a play where all his receivers were covered.

In limited action against McNeese State, Gabbert completed his first 15 passes, and eventually finished the game 26-of-31 (220 yards, 1 TD) to break the MU single-game completion percentage record with a mark of 83.9%, breaking the old standard of 83.8% set in 2008 by Chase Daniel vs. Buffalo.

In the opener against Illinois, Gabbert helped lead the Tigers to a 20-point 2nd half as MU rallied for its 23-13 win over Illinois in St. Louis. Gabbert finished the game 34-of-48 for 281 yards and two TDs. While he was solid in the first half (14-of-20 passing, 114 yards, QB rating of 117.88), he enjoyed a more effective 2nd half, as he completed 20-of-28 passes for 167 yards and 2 TDs (QB rating of 145.10).

Gabbert ended 2009 ranked 2nd in the Big 12 Conference (29th nationally) in passing efficiency, with a rating of 140.45. He was also 4th in the Big 12 and 11th in the NCAA in total offense, averaging 292.08 yards per game.

The fourth QB to start for 10th-year Head Coach Gary Pinkel in his Mizzou tenure, Gabbert hopes he can continue a trend his predecessors Brad Smith and Chase Daniel achieved — increasing the win totals dramatically from the first year to the second year as a starter.

Smith started as a redshirt freshman in 2002 and helped the Tigers to a 5-7 record. In his second year as a starter, the Tigers went 8-5 in 2003 — an improvement of 3 wins. Daniel started for the first time in 2006 as a true sophomore, and he helped take the Tigers to an 8-5 record. In his 2nd year running the show, the Tigers exploded for a school-record 12-2 record — an improvement of 4 wins.

PASSING GAME ODDS & ENDS

A few random notes regarding Mizzou's passing attack...

- — All 5 of Mizzou's passing TDs (all by Blaine Gabbert) have come in the 2nd half so far...
- — Mizzou's 2nd-half team pass efficiency rating is 149.29, compared to a 1st-half rating of 119.50...
- — In the 3rd quarter of play so far, MU's team pass efficiency rating is 162.43, which is the best of any quarter (35-of-46 for 355 yards, 3 TDs, zero INTs)...

TIGER RUSH DEFENSE STOUT IN 3RD QUARTER

Mizzou's defense has had the most success against opposing rushing attacks in the 3rd quarter, as foes are averaging just 1.59 yards per attempt (27 rushes, 43 yards, 0 TDs).

- — The average of 1.59 yards per attempt ranks as 2nd-best in the NCAA for the 3rd quarter...
- — Only 1 run of 10 yards or more has been managed by opponents in the 3rd quarter so far, and the longest run was a 16-yarder by McNeese State on the last play of the 3rd quarter in MU's 50-6 win...
- — That 16-yard run is the only one in the 3rd quarter that Mizzou has allowed so far which has resulted in a first down for opponents...
- — For all quarters, from the MU 40-yardline to the goalline, opponents are averaging just 1.29 yards per rush (38 rushes, 49 yards), and have just 1 TD, with just 2 runs of 10 yards or more to this point...

DEFENSE RANKED 10TH IN NATION WITH 13 TURNOVERS FORCED

Mizzou's rallying cry on defense each day is, "It's all about the ball," a saying meant to put the focus on getting the ball for the Tiger offense. Through 4 games in 2010, that mantra has served Mizzou well, as the Tigers enter Saturday's game against Colorado tied for 10th in the NCAA for most turnovers gained in the nation, with 13. Among teams who have played just 4 games, the 13 takeaways are 3rd-most nationally, behind only Oklahoma State and Troy (14 each).

MU's 4-game average of 3.25 takeaways puts the Tigers on pace for 39 turnovers, which would be a nice step up from the 23 total gained in 13 games in 2009 (1.78 avg.).

The Tigers showed just how impactful takeaways can be against Miami (Ohio) last time out, when the defense set the tone for the day on the first play of the game, when LB Andrew Gachkar forced a fumble after a short pass

completion on the RedHawk 21-yardline. Tiger CB Carl Gettis picked the ball up on the 19-yardline and raced down the left sideline untouched for the first score of his collegiate career which put MU up, 7-0, just :08 seconds into the game. The Tigers went on to get 3 takeaways against Miami, including 2 fumble recoveries and an interception by DE Michael Sam that he returned 62 yards.

After getting 9 takeaways in their first 2 games combined, Mizzou couldn't get the ball out against San Diego State in game #3, but the one they did manage was huge, as it was a goal line interception in the 4th quarter by senior CB Kevin Rutland that helped play a key role in MU's eventual 27-24 win.

The big plays began against Illinois in the 2010 opener, when Mizzou nabbed 3 interceptions and 1 fumble in a 4-turnover day, and they continued last Saturday against McNeese as MU collected 3 more INTs and 2 fumbles. Combined with the Tiger offenses' ability to hang onto the ball (4 turnovers so far), MU's turnover margin of +1.50 per game is currently 7th-best in the nation (Oregon is #1, at +2.20 p/g).

Mizzou ranked 50th in 2009 with 23 turnovers gained (15 fumbles, 8 INTs) in 13 games. The 8 INTs so far in 2010 have already equaled the total of 8 INTs the Tigers got in 13 games in 2009. The 2010 ratio of 8 INTs in 132 opponent passing attempts so far is 1-in-16.5, compared to 1-in-59.4 attempts in 2009 (8 INTs in 475 attempts).

TIGER PASS DEFENSE RANKS 5TH IN NATION IN EFFICIENCY

Mizzou's propensity for snagging interceptions (MU's 8 INTs gained so far is tied for 9th-most in the nation, and is 2nd-most in the nation among teams who have played just 4 games) has helped the Tigers' pass defense keep opponents' passing attacks in check.

Mizzou enters Saturday's game against Colorado ranked 7th in the nation in pass efficiency defense, with a rating of just 96.55. Opponents have averaged only 174.3 yards per game in the air against Mizzou (the Tigers rank 29th-best in the nation in that category), and have thrown 8 interceptions, compared to only 3 touchdowns (with two of them being 4th-quarter TDs in garbage time by both McNeese State and Miami).

The ranking signifies a big improvement from the 2009 season, when the Tiger defense ranked 74th nationally in pass efficiency, with a rating of 132.54 for opposing QBs. The highest Mizzou has ever ranked in the category (which wasn't tracked until 1990 by the NCAA) was in 2004, when the Tigers ranked 12th (104.28 rating).

GETTIS STARRING IN SEVERAL ROLES OF THE GAME FOR MIZZOU

Senior CB Carl Gettis (a native of O'Fallon, Mo., a suburb of St. Louis), had an outstanding fall camp, and seemed primed to put together a big final season as a fourth-year starter in 2010. Through 4 games, Gettis has starred for the Tiger defense, as a punt returner and also as part of the punt coverage unit.

His overall numbers were limited last time out against Miami (Ohio), but he supplied perhaps the biggest play of the game, when he scooped up a fumble and scored on a 21-yard return on the first play of the game, to set the tone for the day. His big play — his first career collegiate TD — jump-started Mizzou on the way to its 51-13 win.

Gettis also had a big day in Mizzou's win against San Diego State. In that game:

- — Gettis recorded 5 tackles, 1.0 tackle for loss (1 yard) and broke up a pass as the Tiger defense held a potent SDSU passing attack in check. Gettis had arguably the play of the game for the Tiger defense when he came off the corner to burst into the flat and blow up a crucial 3rd-down play by the Aztecs late in the game that set up T.J. Moe's game-winning reception just three plays later.

- — With SDSU leading, 24-20, the Aztecs had a 3rd-and-7 at the Mizzou 34-yardline with 1:36 left to play, meaning a first down would have likely ended any chance of a Tiger win. The Aztecs tried a swing pass in the right flat on the play, but Gettis, who was lined up near the far sideline in tight coverage on another receiver, broke free from the attempted block and charged into the ball carrier to upend TE Gavin Escobar for a 1-yard loss. The loss on the play forced an Aztec punt with 1:29 left, which Gettis fair caught at the Tiger 12-yardline. Two plays later on offense, the Tigers had the win as Moe (Gettis' high school teammate at Fort Zumwalt West HS in St. Louis) went 68 yards with :51 seconds left.

- — In the 4th quarter, Gettis broke up a pass on 3rd-and-6 by SDSU from the Aztec 19-yardline with about 8:30 left to play.

- — Gettis was also heavily involved in the return game on Saturday, as he had 5 punt returns for 47 yards, including a career-long 31-yarder in the 1st quarter which set up an MU field goal for a 10-7 lead.

Opening the season in his hometown of St. Louis against Illinois, he got things started with a bang as he was undoubtedly one of the keys to Mizzou's comeback 23-13 win on Sept. 4th.

Gettis might very well have been the MVP of the win against Illinois, as he made a trio of huge plays in the 4th quarter which helped seal MU's win. First, he made an acrobatic one-handed interception along the right sideline on a deep pass which was named SportCenter's #5 play of the day. That pick came with 12:24 to play in the game and was the 3rd of his career.

After MU's offense went 3-and-out on the ensuing possession, Gettis got downfield on the punt team to down Matt Grabner's punt inside the Illini 1-yardline. The Tiger defense forced a quick 3-and-out and Gettis returned the Illinois punt 15 yards to the Illini 45-yardline, which set up a drive by the Tiger offense that resulted in a field goal with 7:21 left that extended the lead to 20-13.

On the day, Gettis ended with 4 tackles and the interception. Gettis is far and away the most experienced defender on the Tiger squad, as he has now started 40 games in his career — more than double of the next-highest career start total of any other Tiger defender (Luke Lambert has the next most, with 18 career starts).

Gettis followed with a solid outing against McNeese State, when he was credited with 4 tackles in limited action that saw him exit early in the 3rd quarter with the game well in hand. Gettis also returned a punt 41 yards for an apparent 2nd-quarter touchdown, but the return was called back due to a penalty.

He also continued his stellar play on MU's punt coverage special teams unit, as he downed a Matt Grabner punt at the 1-yardline for the second straight week.

GACHKAR EMERGING AS A LEADER OF THE DEFENSE

Senior LB Andrew Gachkar is one of those quiet types of kids who flips the switch to a hard-hitting machine on the football field — he might be soft-spoken for the most part, but on the field he packs a wallop.

He's definitely emerging as a leader of the Tiger defense, as through 4 games, he's a big reason for MU's improved play on that side of the ball. He enters the Colorado game tied for the team lead in tackles, with 24, and his 3.0 tackles for loss are 3rd-most on the team, just one behind co-leaders Aldon Smith and Brad Madison. Gachkar leads the team with 3 pass break ups, and he's had a hand in 4 turnovers (most on the team), as he's forced 2 fumbles, recovered another, and grabbed his 1st career interception in game #2 against McNeese State.

He's coming off a 6-tackle outing against Miami (Ohio), and had the most impactful stop of the day on the first play of the day, when he stopped a pass in the flat, and forced a fumble by the Redhawk receiver that teammate Carl Gettis scooped up and scored from 21 yards out, just :08 seconds into the game.

Gachkar had an impactful day to start the year, as he tallied 7 tackles against Illinois in MU's 23-13 season-opening win. He made his presence felt big-time in the first quarter when he came in to sandwich Illini QB Nathan Scheelhaase on a keeper that popped the ball free near midfield, a fumble that the Tigers jumped on to end the drive. Later in the game, Gachkar broke up a pair of passes, including one on 3rd down when Illinois was backed up inside its own 10-yardline.

After notching 3 tackles in limited time during a blowout of McNeese State, Gachkar came back with an 8-tackle outing last Saturday against San Diego State, which included 2.0 tackles for loss (6 yards in all).

Pretty good stuff for a guy who almost had his football career ended before his sophomore season. After playing as a true freshman in 2007, Gachkar had blood clots develop in his arms and upper body during the off-season, and he eventually had to have one of his ribs removed to remedy the problem. It wasn't known initially if he'd be able to play football again, but Gachkar worked hard to get back on the field and he played in all 14 games. He became a starter for the first time in 2009, and he registered a career-best 80 tackles in 13 starts, which was 2nd-most on the team.

"MID-MOE MIRACLE" MOVES TIGERS TO 3-0

Mid-Missouri has seen its share of some memorable finishes over the years at Mizzou's Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field, but Tiger fans would argue that the most memorable ones have gone against MU.

In the 3rd game of the season, perhaps any lingering pain from events such as The Fifth Down (vs. Colorado in 1990) and the "Flea Kicker" (vs. Nebraska in 1997) will be erased, thanks to what might be called the "Mid-Moe Miracle."

With Mizzou at its own 12-yardline and trailing, 24-20, with just 1:21 to play, the Tigers needed a miracle comeback to avoid the upset loss. The Tiger offense hadn't seen the endzone since late in the 2nd quarter, and things just didn't look promising. But QB Blaine Gabbert, who had been intercepted on the last two possessions, got the Tigers out of a hole when he hit WR Jerrell Jackson for a 20-yard gain to the MU 32-yardline.

What happened next will likely go down in history books as one of the more incredible plays in Tiger Football history. Gabbert hit sophomore WR T.J. Moe on a quick 7-yard out, and Moe did a stutter-step to juke a would-be tackler to the ground. Moe looked to get out of bounds, but all of a sudden he got a block from WR Jerrell Jackson that took two Aztecs out at once, and it was off to the races. Moe raced down the left sideline untouched for an improbable touchdown with just :51 seconds left to put MU up, 27-24.

After the Tiger defense prevented San Diego State from moving into field goal position, Mizzou had its miracle finish that was very historic in nature. It marked the first time since 1976 that Missouri had scored a touchdown in the final minute of play when trailing to win a ballgame. The last time came in 1976 in Columbus, Ohio, when Missouri's Pete Woods threw a TD pass to Leo Lewis with :12 seconds left to give MU a 22-21 win over the 2nd-ranked Buckeyes.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

RESSEL RETURNS AFTER ALL-AMERICAN & RECORD-SETTING 2009 SEASON

In 2009, Mizzou took to the field with the daunting task of having to replace departed PK Jeff Wolfert, who, in his three seasons (2006-08), set the NCAA combined kicking accuracy record, as he made a combined 244-of-257 kicks (59-of-72 FGs, plus 185-of-185 PATs), for a career percentage of 94.9%.

In stepped sophomore Grant Ressel, who won the kicking job in the final week of training camp, and who took the field in the 2009 season opener with exactly zero career kicks under his belt. All Ressel did during his sophomore season was establish himself as the most accurate kicker in the nation, as he made a combined 65-of-66 total kicks (98.5%) — a mark which broke the NCAA single-season record for best combined kick accuracy.

Ressel also led the NCAA in FG percentage among those with 13 or more attempts (96.3%). For the season, Ressel, who joined Mizzou in 2007 as a walk-on (he's now on scholarship), made 26-of-27 FGs, and was perfect on 39-of-39 PATs.

Through 4 games in 2010, Ressel has picked up where he left off, although he did start the year with an uncharacteristic miss against Illinois, when a high snap threw the timing off of his first attempt of the season, and his 37-yarder went just wide. After that, he's been perfect on field goals, as he connected 33, 27 and 34 against Illinois (the last two which came with the game still in the balance in the 4th quarter), then from 27 and 32 yards against McNeese State, followed by makes from 34 and 38 yards against San Diego State.

In Ressel's last time out against Miami (Ohio), he had a mixed bag of a day, as he nailed a 50-yard field goal in the 3rd quarter, which represented his first career make of 50 yards or more. That followed a shocking miss on an extra point attempt in the 3rd quarter where he simply pushed the kick right and banged it off the right upright. That miss broke a string of 252 consecutive made extra points by Mizzou (dating back to 2005), which left them just 10 shy of the alltime NCAA record of 262 consecutive PATs made by a school (Syracuse).

For the 2010 season, Ressel is 8-of-9 on FGs and 17-of-18 on PATs, making him 34-of-36 on FGs (94.4%) and 56-of-57 on PATs (98.3%) for his career.

He forever etched his name fondly into the hearts of Tiger fans in the 2009 regular-season finale against arch-rival Kansas, when he made four FGs (43, 28, 37, 27 yards), including the game-winning 27-yarder as time expired to give Mizzou a comeback 41-39 win. Ressel's only miss on the year was a 43-yard attempt against Nebraska in terrible downpour conditions, on a play where the snap that was off a bit, which threw off the timing of the kick.

For his efforts, Ressel was named a 1st-Team All-American by Sports Illustrated, becoming MU's first-ever kicker to achieve 1st-Team All-American status.

2010 SENIOR CLASS HAS EYES ON SCHOOL WINS RECORD

Mizzou's senior class isn't very big (just 16 in all) but they've no doubt played a big role in helping the Tigers elevate the overall standing of the program in their time at MU. The 2010 senior class entered the season having collected 30 wins over the previous three years, and with 4 wins so far in 2010, that puts them within reach of the school record of 38 wins over a four-year period, which was established by the 2009 class.

The 2009 class one-upped the record of 37, which had been established just the previous year by the 2008 class. The 2010 class has been a very key group of players and leaders who have helped push Mizzou to new heights. They have been part of two Big 12 North Division championship teams (2007, 2008), they've helped lead Mizzou to bowl games in each of the past four seasons overall (2006 Sun, 2008 Cotton, 2008 Alamo, 2009 Texas), and they were also part of the 2007 team which ascended to #1 in the BCS polls on Nov. 25th, 2007.

If the 2010 team can reach a bowl game, this senior class will become only the fourth in MU history to play in four bowl games in a four-year span. The only previous classes to achieve that feat were the 1981 senior class, followed by the last two classes to come through (2008 & 2009).

- Mizzou chooses the ball and drives 76 yds. on 8 plays for a TD and 7-0 lead;
- McNeese goes 3-and-out and punts;
- 2nd Half — McNeese trails 33-0 and goes 3-and-out and has punt blocked to start half;
- Mizzou gets field goal for 36-0 lead.

vs. San Diego State

- 1st Half — SDSU calls and wins, defers choice;
- Mizzou chooses the ball and drives 80 yds. on 9 plays for a TD and 7-0 lead;
- SDSU responds with 10-play, 80-yd. TD drive;
- 2nd Half — SDSU trails 17-14 and is forced to punt after gaining 2 first downs;
- Mizzou gets field goal for 20-14 lead.

vs. Miami (Ohio)

- 1st Half — Miami calls and wins, takes ball and fumbles on 1st play, with Mizzou returning it 21 yards for a TD just :08 seconds into the game;
- After a Miami punt, MU drives 94 yds. for a TD and 14-0 lead on its first offensive series;
- 2nd Half — MU takes opening kick and drives 71 yds. for a TD to take a 34-3 lead;
- Miami goes 3-and-out.

GRABNER QUIETLY STANDING OUT IN PUNT GAME

Senior P Matt Grabner is making quite an impression in his first year on the field for Mizzou. After initially attending Ole Miss, the Alton, Ill. native transferred to Mizzou and focused on school and playing club soccer. After being convinced by friends that he should take his strong kicking leg and try out for the Tiger football team, Grabner did so prior to the 2009 season, and he was invited to join the team as a preferred walk-on.

After watching the Tigers rank 4th in the NCAA in 2009 as a team in net punting (40.5 avg.) thanks to the outstanding year put together by P Jake Harry IV, Grabner had big shoes to fill in 2010. He's doing just that, and then some. For the season, Grabner has an average of 43.06 yards per kick, which ranks him 7th in the Big 12 Conference, and 32nd in the NCAA. The net of his punting has been even more effective, as the Tigers rank 3rd in the league, and 15th nationally, in team net punting, with an average of 40.12 yards per punt.

Grabner was called into action extensively in game #3 against San Diego State, and he delivered in fine fashion, as he averaged 45.4 yards on 8 punts. Three of his punts finished inside the Aztec 20-yardline, including one which was downed at the 1-yardline — marking the third straight game he'd gotten a punt down on the opponent 1-yardline.

Grabner's 3 punts in the 4th quarter when the game was on the line were stellar, as he had kicks of 46 yards, 58 yards (a career-long) and 47 yards. The Aztecs tried to return 4 punts in the game, but could manage only 16 yards in returns.

TIGERS HAVE BEEN COOL UNDER PRESSURE

Mizzou's comeback win in week #3 against San Diego State (albeit in a game in which the Tigers led for most of the game, and never trailed until the 4th quarter) continued a recent trend that saw Mizzou pull out games in the 4th quarter whose balance have been in the air.

The SDSU win continued a string that saw Mizzou win four straight games against Div. I-A foes in the 4th quarter. Prior to beating the Aztecs, MU opened the season by defeating Illinois 23-13, but the Tigers trailed 13-3 at halftime and 13-10 to open the 4th quarter, before blitzing the Illini to the tune of 13-0 in the final period.

Prior to that, MU's last two wins of the 2009 regular season including 4th quarter "wins" against Kansas and Iowa State. Against the rival Jayhawks, MU held a 36-28 early 4th quarter lead, only to see the Jayhawks score 11 straight points to take a 39-36 lead with just 5:10 to play. But Mizzou got a safety by Aldon Smith and Brian Coulter with 2:45 to play to pull to within one point, and drove for a game-winning 27-yard field goal by Grant Ressel at the final gun for a dramatic 41-39 win. The week before, Mizzou trailed Iowa State at halftime, 17-10, and entered the 4th quarter tied at 24-apiece. But the Tigers dug in during the final period and outscored ISU 10-0 in the 4th quarter to post a 34-24 win.

In fact, going back to last season, a key to MU's wins has been to win the 4th quarter. In MU's last 8 wins against Div. I-A foes (dating back to Bowling Green in game #2 of 2009 season), Mizzou has outscored opponents by a combined 76-29 count in the 4th quarter. It was a 69-19 margin in MU's favor prior to the SDSU game, when the Aztecs outpointed the Tigers by a 10-7 margin in the final period of play.

To further illustrate the importance of winning the 4th quarter, in taking a look back at MU's last 6 losses (dating back to the 2008 Big 12 Championship Game against Oklahoma), the Tigers have been outscored in the 4th quarter combined in those 6 games by an 85-13 margin.

JOSEY MAKES BIG SPLASH IN FAUROT FIELD DEBUT

True freshman TB Henry Josey made quite the first impression on Tiger fans seeing him play in his first game ever at Faurot Field/Memorial Stadium on Sept. 11th, when he rushed for 112 yards and 3 TDs on just 7 carries against McNeese State. After logging just one carry in the opener against Illinois (for 10 yards), Josey got the call early on against McNeese, as starter Kendial Lawrence was out with a shoulder bruise.

Josey came off the bench to work in tandem with starter De'Vion Moore, and he paid immediate dividends, as he went for 34 yards on the third play of the game to get the Tigers down to the McNeese 32-yardline. If that wasn't enough, Josey then became Mr. Touchdown, as he scored TDs on each of his next three carries to virtually single-handedly get Mizzou out to a 21-0 lead.

His first collegiate score came five plays after his 34-yard run, and it came from 6 yards out to make it 7-0. On MU's 2nd series, Josey got the call again from the 6-yardline, and again, he produced a TD for 14-0 lead. The next time he touched the ball, he raced untouched around left end for 62 yards and a score to begin the 2nd quarter, which gave Mizzou a 21-0 lead. It was the longest run by a Tiger since the 2006 Sun Bowl, when Tony Temple had a 65-yard TD run against Oregon State. He carried just two times early in the 3rd quarter as his day ended early.

Josey became the first true freshman at Mizzou to score 3 TDs in a game since former QB great Corby Jones had 3 rushing scores to close the 1995 season against Iowa State. After rushing for a team-best 36 yards on 10 carries against San Diego State, followed by an 8-carry, 54-yard, 1-TD game against Miami (Ohio), Josey currently leads MU with 212 rushing yards and 4 TDs on 26 carries (8.2 avg.).

If Josey were to lead Mizzou in rushing this season, he would become the first true freshman to do so at Mizzou since Brock Olivo led the Tigers in 1994 with 614 yards and 5 TDs on 142 carries (4.3 avg.).

ALDON SMITH LISTED AS OUT FOR COLORADO GAME

Sophomore DE extraordinaire Aldon Smith broke his fibula in right leg in the waning moments of Mizzou's dramatic comeback win over San Diego State on Sept. 18th. Due to the fortuitous location of the cracked bone, team doctors felt he might have a shot at returning in time for Mizzou's Big 12 opener this week against Colorado, but on Monday, Coach Gary Pinkel announced that Smith isn't quite ready to go this week. His status for next week will be evaluated later.

Prior to the injury, Smith, the 2009 Big 12 Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year and 1st-Team Freshman All-American, made it known in the 2010 season opener that he is intent on improving his game from a year ago, as he put together a dominating performance that was key to MU's strong defensive outing.

Picking right up where he left off from his freshman All-American season of 2009, Smith led the charge for Mizzou's stifling 2nd-half shutout, as he tallied a career-high 10 tackles and added 3.0 tackles for loss (12 yards), and 2.0 QB sacks (9 yards), to go with one other QB hurry.

His effort was noticed nationally, as Smith was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week for his performance against Illinois, as well as taking home Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week honors.

Smith got his 3rd QB sack of the young season in the last outing versus San Diego State, and that marked the 1st sack that the Aztecs had allowed this season.

Against Illinois, with Mizzou trailing 13-3 to start the 3rd quarter, on the opening possession of the quarter, Smith broke loose to sack Illini QB Nathan Scheelhaase on 3rd-and-6 for a 7-yard loss to set the tone for what would be a dominating half of defense. Mizzou allowed only 85 yards of total offense in the second half as the Tigers outscored Illinois, 20-0 to post the comeback win.

Illinois had just 4 first downs in the second half and converted on just 1-of-6 3rd-down tries after halftime, thanks to the constant pressure that Smith and company provided. He followed with a 4-tackle outing in limited field time last week against McNeese State as the Tigers cruised to a 50-6 win.

Smith ended his 2009 freshman season with 64 tackles in all, including team-high totals in tackles for loss (19.0 for 126 yards) and QB sacks (11.5 for 99 yards). The sack total broke the MU single-season sacks record of 11.0 set in 2000 by All-American DE Justin Smith (no relation), who is now in his 10th year in the NFL.

Smith's sack total led all of the NCAA's freshmen in 2010, and ranked 9th among all players (3rd in the Big 12 overall). He begins 2010 on the watch lists for the Nagurski Trophy, the Hendricks Award and the Bednarik Award, and is a consensus pre-season 1st-Team All-Big 12 pick.

TIGER DEFENSE KEYED DRAMATIC WIN, AS WELL

If it sounds a little strange to state that a defense which gave up touchdown runs of 75 and 93 yards played well, then label us weird, because the Tiger defense played very well overall and was a key to Mizzou's 27-24 win over San Diego State. Credit Aztec RB Ronnie Hillman for breaking those long runs certainly, but if those runs are backed out, the Aztecs had 82 yards rushing on their other 31 carries, for an average of just 2.7 yards per attempt. Hillman ended with 228 net yards on 23 carries, meaning that he had 60 yards on 21 carries outside of his two long totes (2.9 avg.).

The Tiger defense was stellar with its backs against the wall in the 4th quarter, as MU's offense turned the ball over three times in the final 15 minutes in its own territory. Undaunted, the Tiger defense allowed only 3 points total in those three instances, and that was a key to MU's win. The first short field came with 13:40 to play, with MU leading 20-14, when the Aztecs forced a fumble by TB De'Vion Moore and recovered on the Tiger 7-yardline. But senior CB Kevin Rutland intercepted a 2nd-down pass on the goal line and returned it 21 yards to avert the threat. Later, with MU now trailing 21-20, SDSU intercepted Blaine Gabbert and took over on the Tiger 45-yardline. The Aztecs managed one first down, but the defense held, and forced a field goal that kept it to a one score game with 2:03 to play. It got even worse, as MU was intercepted again on its next possession at the Tiger 37-yardline, but the defense kept the Aztecs to two yards on three plays, and forced a punt with 1:29 left that set up MU's game-winning pass from Gabbert to T.J. Moe.

Mizzou's defense held San Diego State to just 6-of-18 on 3rd-down conversions, including 0-of-4 in the 4th quarter, and just 1-of-8 overall in the 2nd half. SDSU had only one sustained drive on the night, as they took their opening possession of the game and drove 80 yards on 10 plays (4:10 TOP) for a touchdown which tied the game at 7-apiece.

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Blaine Gabbert rallied Missouri from a 10-point halftime deficit with two touchdown passes and Carl Gettis made a leaping one-handed interception and downed a punt at the 1 in the fourth quarter of a season-opening 23-13 victory over Illinois.

T.J. Moe had 13 receptions for 101 yards and a touchdown, and the Tigers' defense shut out Illinois in the second half. Kenji Jackson also intercepted Nathan Scheelhaase in the fourth quarter to help seal it for Missouri, which finished the neutral-site Arch Rivalry series with six straight victories.

Mikel Leshoure had 112 yards on 20 carries for Illinois, coming off a 3-9 season. Scheelhaase, a redshirt freshman, was 9 for 23 for 81 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions. He also rushed for 76 yards on 16 carries and lost a fumble in his first career start.

Missouri was a sizeable favorite after totaling 129 points the previous three meetings, but the Tigers couldn't get untracked offensively in the first half. Illinois controlled the clock for nearly 18 minutes and scored twice in the final 2:10 to take a 13-3 lead on A.J. Jenkins' 10-yard catch and Derek Dimke's career-best 52-yard field goal to end the half.

Illinois was held to 85 yards and four first downs in the second half.

Gabbert was 34 for 48 for 281 yards, 167 of them coming in the second half.

Gettis leaped high to steal the ball away from Jenkins at the Illinois 45 early in the fourth quarter, halting Illinois' first possession after Michael Egnew's 6-yard catch put the Tigers ahead 17-13.

After Missouri's ensuing drive stalled, Gettis downed Matt Grabner's punt at the 1. That led to a three-and-out for Illinois.

Illinois took advantage of a tough two-play sequence by Mizzou in the first half. A wide open Wes Kemp couldn't haul in a pass at the Illinois 25, a gain that would have been at least 25 yards, and Gabbert was subsequently sacked on the next play for a 14-yard loss to force a punt.

Illinois' last drive ended after Leshoure was ruled out of bounds on a potential first-down catch at the Missouri 46 after officials reviewed the play. Grant Ressel added a 35-yard field goal in the final minute.

Missouri had 98 yards rushing and were led by junior De'Vion Moore, who had 78 yards on 16 carries.

Sophomore DE Aldon Smith led the way defensively for Missouri, with 10 tackles. The 2009 Big 12 Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year also had three tackles for loss and two quarterback sacks, including one which came on third down in Illinois' opening series of the 3rd quarter that appeared to give the Tigers momentum they lacked in the first half.

Gabbert then drove the Tigers 77 yards on 10 plays, and found Moe in the back of the endzone on 3rd-and-goal from the 7-yardline with 9:38 left in the 3rd quarter to cut the deficit to 13-10.

Moe's 13 receptions were just three shy of the MU single-game record of 16, set in 2002 by Justin Gage against Bowling Green.

Mizzou outgained Illinois in the 3rd quarter by a whopping margin of 147-to-10 in total yards.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) -Freshman Henry Josey scored on three of his first four carries and Blaine Gabbert completed his first 15 passes in Missouri's 50-6 rout of McNeese State at Memorial Stadium.

Josey had 112 yards on seven carries, 105 coming in the first half. He was untouched on a 62-yard scoring run, had a 34-yarder for his first carry of the game, and scored twice - both times untouched - from 6 yards for Missouri (2-0).

Josey began the game as the third-string tailback, a position already minus starter Kendial Lawrence, who was unable to play versus McNeese due to a shoulder bruise suffered the previous week against Illinois. Josey, who had one carry for 10 yards in the opener, became Missouri's first freshman to score three touchdowns since quarterback Corby Jones in 1995 against Iowa State.

His 62-yard burst also marked the longest run from scrimmage by a Tiger since the 2006 Sun Bowl, when former standout Tony Temple ran 65 yards for a touchdown against Oregon State.

Gabbert was 15 for 15 for 129 yards before his first incompletion early in the second quarter. He finished 26 for 31 for 220 yards and a touchdown. Gabbert threw a 24-yard scoring pass to Jerrell Jackson on his lone series of the third quarter for a 43-0 lead before being relieved by true freshman James Franklin.

Missouri scored touchdowns on its first four drives and added a safety for a 30-0 cushion with 10:03 left in the half en route to its fifth straight home opening victory. Michael Sam tackled quarterback Jacob Bower for the safety and later blocked a punt in the third quarter to set up one of Grant Ressel's two chip shot field goals.

Even the Tigers' first punt was a success, downed at the 1 in the second quarter. Missouri led 43-0 with 11:54 to go in the third quarter against a school ranked 13th in the FCS, and is 10-0 against teams from the lower division.

Jacob Bower was 11 for 19 for 99 yards and three interceptions for McNeese State (1-1), co-champions of the Southland Conference last year. Wes Briscoe caught a touchdown pass early in the fourth quarter for the Cowboys, who trailed 33-0 at halftime.

The Tigers' T.J. Moe reached double figures in receptions for the second straight game, catching 10 passes for 79 yards. Franklin scored on an 8-yard run late in the third quarter in what was his first collegiate game.

Leading 50-0 at the end of the third quarter, Tiger Coach Gary Pinkel called off the dogs, and instructed his team to be conservative, in hopes of not running up the score against the overmatched foe.

Mizzou's resurgent defense stifled the Cowboy offense most of the night, as 85 of McNeese's 245 total yards of offense came in the fourth quarter against reserves. McNeese was held to just 65 rushing yards on 33 attempts — just 2.0 yards per carry, and when they went to the air, the Tiger defense was up to the challenge, picking off three passes on the evening to raise the two-game season total for interceptions to six. That's only two fewer pass interceptions than Mizzou gained during the entire 2009 season in 13 games.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — T.J. Moe came to Missouri a year ago as a decorated high school quarterback. A last-minute, 68-yard touchdown catch to lift the Tigers to a 24-20 win over San Diego State entrenched him as a star receiver.

Moe executed a backward stutter step more commonly seen on the Mizzou Arena basketball court that left Aztecs defensive back Brandon Davis on the ground clutching for air. Then Moe turned the short sideline pass from quarterback Blaine Gabbert into a score with just 51 seconds left, thanks to the help of fellow receiver Jerrell Jackson, whose block caused two San Diego State defenders to collide.

Missouri (3-0) had fallen behind by four points after a 32-yard field goal by San Diego State (2-1) with just over two minutes remaining.

Moe was modest about the play that sent Memorial Stadium into a frenzy.

"I just wanted to catch the ball and get out of bounds," Moe said. "The first thing I did was go over and thank Jerrell. Blaine and I gave him a big hug."

The St. Louis-area prep star entered the night with 23 catches in Missouri's first two games, tied for first in the country. But he was overshadowed for most of the game by his teammate, tight end Michael Egniew, who caught 13 passes for 145 yards. Moe finished with seven catches for 119 yards.

Missouri coach Gary Pinkel was more forthright with his praise for Moe, who during his first season in Columbia struggled with the position change and a lingering foot injury from high school.

"He knows he's good now," said a relieved Pinkel.

Moe's electrifying score also helped Missouri overcome an up-and-down night from Gabbert, who was 28-of-51 for 351 yards but threw two interceptions in the final five minutes. Other than his scoring toss to Moe, Gabbert's best play of the night may have been an 11-yard, first-half touchdown scamper in which

he outran three defenders while scrambling to his left to cross into the end zone untouched.

The dramatic win offset a career day by San Diego State freshman Ronnie Hillman, who ran for 228 yards and touchdowns covering 75 and 93 yards. He overshadowed his first-year counterpart Henry Josey, who had 44 yards on 10 carries for a Missouri team that totaled just 89 rushing yards.

Missouri appeared to be in control after Kevin Rutland's goal line interception following a Tiger fumble deep in their own territory preserved a 20-14 lead early in the fourth quarter.

But Memorial Stadium grew quiet after Hillman's full-field burst gave the Aztecs a one-point lead just two minutes later. Hillman's first long TD run with 35 seconds remaining in the first half similarly silenced the home crowd, trimming what had been a 10-point Missouri lead to 17-14.

Mizzou got the win despite turning the ball over three times in the fourth quarter in its own territory. But the Tiger defense — which played very well overall, aside from the two long scoring runs allowed — clamped down in crunch time and allowed only three points total by the Aztecs in their three possessions. One drive, which began at the Tiger 7-yardline after a fumble recovery by SDSU, ended when CB Kevin Rutland intercepted a pass at the goal line. The second resulted in a 25-yard field goal that made it 24-20 SDSU with 2:03 to play. The last one was a 3-and-out on a series that began at the MU 37-yardline and which forced a punt.

That last punt set up Moe for his heroics. His winning touchdown with under a minute to play marked the first time Mizzou had won a game with a touchdown in the final minute of play when trailing since 1976 at Ohio State.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP)- Carl Gettis returned a fumble 19 yards for a score on the first play of the game and was among seven Missouri players getting a touchdown apiece in a 51-13 rout of visiting Miami (Ohio).

Missouri (4-0) scored on runs of 39 yards by Kendial Lawrence and 28 yards by Henry Josey while going ahead 21-0 in the first quarter. Blaine Gabbert threw a touchdown pass and scored on a 1-yard sneak for the Tigers, who ended suspense immediately a week after getting a last-minute touchdown to beat San Diego State.

Missouri finished its pre-Big 12 schedule unbeaten for the fifth straight year after polishing off Miami of Ohio (2-2) and will get a week off before opening conference play Oct. 9 at home against Colorado. The Tigers have won 21 straight non-conference games in the regular season since 2005 and won easily without top pass rusher Aldon Smith, out with a broken bone in his right leg.

The Tigers were without four starters in all for the game, as Smith was joined on the sideline by starting LB Luke Lambert (hamstring), FS Jasper Simmons (knee) and WR Jerrell Jackson (thigh).

The lone blemish was a missed extra point kick by Grant Ressel early in the third quarter, ending the school's string of 252 in a row since 2005 by three kickers. Ressel hit the right goalpost after Wes Kemp's 33-yard scoring reception for a 34-3 lead, but recovered quickly and hit a career-long 50-yard field later in the quarter.

Armand Robinson had 10 receptions for 99 yards for Miami of Ohio, which had three turnovers in the first half and had five fumbles, losing two of them. All three turnovers led to Missouri touchdowns, starting with Gettis' tightrope walk down the left sideline after Andrew Gachkar forced a fumble on a reception by

Thomas Merriweather on the first play of the game.

Records have not been kept related to the quickest score in school history, but Mizzou officials believe the touchdown is possibly the quickest touchdown ever scored at MU.

Trevor Cook had two field goals for the RedHawks, including a career-long 40-yarder in the third quarter. The lone touchdown came on a 12-yard reception by Jamal Rodgers with 1:40 to go.

Missouri had five carries of 10 yards or better in the first quarter, two each by Josey and Lawrence. Michael Sam's interception gave the school eight overall, matching last season's total. T.J. Moe had seven catches for 95 yards

Missouri had 236 yards rushing with an average gain of 6.2 yards per carry, including 63 on six carries by Lawrence, 54 yards on eight carries by Josey, 48 yards on four carries by backup Marcus Murphy and 39 yards on three attempts by De'Vion Moore.
