His 15 tackles are the most by an Air Force player this season, and he doubled his previous career high for tackles. Waiwaiole also notched his first career interception which sealed the win for Air Force with 25 seconds left in the game. On Navy's second to last drive, he had a sack that put Navy in a 3rd-and-18 situation and led to a Navy punt. That was his second sack of the season.

2010 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (1-4, 0-3 RMAC)

Terjean Saffold (Junior, Running Back, 5-8, 200, Stockton, Calif./Laney JC/Weston Ranch HS)

Saffold had a career-high 176 combined rushing and receiving yards and scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns in Saturday's game against nationally-ranked and RMAC favorite Nebraska-Kearney. Saffold had 23 carries for a career-high 142 yards, good for an average of 6.2 per tote, and also caught two passes for 34 yards, including a 25-yard touchdown. On the ground, Saffold had 105 yards in the fourth quarter alone rushing for 29 yards on a 3rd-and-27 before darting 46 for the Grizzlies' first touchdown on the same drive. He now has two 100-yard days this season and ranks fourth in the RMAC in total rushing with 343 yards.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies out-gained Nebraska-Kearney 400-375 in Saturday's game, likely to be the Grizzlies last in Kearney for some time as UNK has announced plans to join the MIAA after the 2011-12 academic year. The Grizzlies only win in Kearney came in 1991. UNK has now defeated the Grizzlies six straight times. Before scoring 14 points on two Terjean Saffold (Stockton, Calif.) touchdowns in the fourth quarter, the Grizzlies had just one offensive touchdown in the previous 15 quarters. The Grizzlies have now dropped four straight games and are 0-3 in RMAC play for the third time in four years. The Grizzlies' three RMAC opponents thus far are a combined 8-1 in conference play and with the only loss by that group coming in Saturday's head-to-head meeting between Colorado State-Pueblo and Chadron State. Those three RMAC opponents are a combined 12-3 overall. Conversely, the Grizzlies next three RMAC opponents are just a combined 3-6 in conference play and 4-10 overall. After giving up just four sacks in the first four games, the Grizzlies allowed seven to Nebraska-Kearney. However, the Grizzlies successfully had 10 third-down conversions more than doubling their previous total of nine in the first four games. The Grizzlies were 10-for-23 on third down and 2-for-3 on fourth-down against the Lopers while racking up 21 first downs. The Grizzlies now return home to face New Mexico Highlands in their annual Homecoming game. Third-year Grizzly head coach Marty Heaton is 2-0 in previous homecoming games. He is 11-13 against NCAA Division II opponents in his tenure and 10-11 against the RMAC. He is 1-1 against New Mexico Highlands, who the Grizzlies play this Saturday. The Grizzlies defeated the Cowboys in Las Vegas, N.M. last season and have defeated them in six of the last eight years.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (4-1, 3-0 RMAC)

Blaine Sumner (Senior, Defensive Line, 6-2, 330, Conifer, Colo./Confer HS)

Sumner blocked two Fort Lewis College field goal attempts in the Orediggers' 38-28 RMAC victory in Durango on Oct. 2. A nose tackle by trade, he also had three short-yardage carries for five yards and one touchdown as CSM remained undefeated in conference play at 3-0. Sumner also contributed a pair of assisted tackles – including one tackle for a loss – against the Skyhawks. For the season, he has 10 total tackles (three solo), 3.5 tackles for a loss, half a sack, one pass defended and two fumble recoveries.

Team Notes: Senior defensive lineman Marc Schiechl is CSM's all-time leader in sacks with 37.5, which ranks him third in the NCAA Division II career record book. Schiechl needs just 2.5 sacks to climb into a tie for second, and 4.5 to tie the record of 42.0. Heading into last week's contest, the Orediggers were ranked sixth in the nation in turnover margin per game and seventh in net punting average. The CSM defense was ranked second in the country in turnovers gained, fourth in sacks per game and eighth in interceptions. The CSM offense was ranked fourth in the country in passing offense, sixth in fourth-down conversion percentage, seventh in scoring offense, ninth in total offense, 11th in third-down conversion percentage and 15th in passing efficiency through four games. Sophomore punter Taylor Accardi led the country in gross punting average through four games. Accardi averaged 49.0 yards per boot on three punts against the Skyhawks. Junior QB Clay Garcia threw for 242 yards and three scores in CSM's 38-28 victory at Fort Lewis on Oct. 2. Going into the game against the Skyhawks, Garcia was ranked first in the country in points responsible for per game, second in touchdown passes, fourth in yards passing per game, tenth in passer efficiency rating and 17th in completion percentage. Garcia was also ranked fifth in the nation in completions per game, yards passing and total offense through CSM's first four games. Redshirt freshman defensive back Ryan Wood snared his fourth and fifth interceptions of the year at Fort Lewis on Oct. 2. Wood was tied for ninth in the nation in interceptions. The Orediggers will return home to host their 2010 Homecoming/Hall of Fame game against CSU – Pueblo on Oct. 9 at 12 p.m. at Campbell Field. Mines will induct two former student-athletes, as well as one team, into the 15th annual class of its Athletics Hall of Fame on Oct. 8. CSM will dedicate the 12th Man Memorial (in honor of the late Scott Hahn).

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (1-4 0-1 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State lost their first league game of the season, 27-0 to TCU at home. They will play at Air Force this weekend.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (5-0, 3-0 RMAC)

Lee Meisner (Junior, Inside Linebacker, 6-0, 230, Sterling, Colo./Sterling HS)

Meisner turned in a career-high and school record 17 tackles in a triple overtime win over Chadron State. Five of his tackles were solo stops, and he added 1.5 tackles for a loss of three yards. Meisner leads the league with 12.4 tackles per game, and entered the game ranked in the top 10 nationally in tackles.

Team Notes: CSU-Pueblo took part in just its second overtime game in school history and first multiple overtime game, besting Chadron State 33-30 in three over times. CSU-Pueblo extended its winning streak to nine games (dating back to last season), the second-longest winning streak in school history. CSU-Pueblo is off to its second-best start in school history at 5-0, its best since 1980, when the Pack started 8-0 and won its only RMAC Championship. Their current national ranking of 25 marks the first time since the program was restarted in 2008 that the team has been a nationally ranked. It hadn't been ranked since 1982, when the school was a member of the NAIA and reached the national playoffs for the only time in school history.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (1-3, 1-2 RMAC)

Tim Jenkins (Sophomore, Quarterback, 6-2, 200, Highlands Ranch, Colo./ThundeRidge HS)

Jenkins completed 40 of 55 passes for 390 yards and four touchdowns (two interceptions) in a 38-28 home loss to Colorado Mines. He also rushed five times for 19 yards to amass 409 yards of total offense.

Team Notes: Two different Skyhawk receivers had over 100 yards and two touchdowns each in a home loss to Colorado Mines. Senior Justin Johnson posted 15 catches for 128 yards and two scores, and junior Justin Garman posted 11 catches for 155 yards and two touchdowns.

2010 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

MESA STATE COLLEGE (1-3, 1-2 RMAC)

Mike Brady (Freshman, Punter, 5-11, 185, Highlands Ranch, Colo./Highlands Ranch HS)

Brady posted a career high nine punts for 396 yards, an average of 44.0 yards per punt at Western New Mexico. His longest punt of the day was 57 yards. Brady landed one punt inside the 20. On the year, Brady has punted 27 times this season for 1125 yards and a 41.7 average. He has a long of 57, one touchback, four fair catches, seven punts inside the 20-yard line and one blocked punt.

Team Notes: MSC recorded three turnovers at Western New Mexico, resulting in 10 points. They gave up the ball four times (three fumbles, one interception) resulting in 10 Mustang points. MSC rushed for just 57 yards, their second lowest rush total this year. Saturday was the third game the Mavs have passed for 100 yards or more. MSC has had at least one field goal attempt in each game this season. Field goal kicker Caleb Pavy kicked his longest field goal to date; a 45-yard field goal to give the Mavs a 3-0 lead in the first quarter. Pavy is 6-of-8 in field goals. MSC had two interceptions for 36 yards (Tanner Whaley and Chad Benkelman interceptions). Their defense has had at least one interception in three of the four games. MSC was 0-for-12 in third down conversions and 0-for-1 in fourth down. MSC was 1-of-2 in the red zone at WNMU. They have recorded at least one sack in each game. Mesa State will play host to Fort Lewis on Saturday at 7 p.m. in the Mavericks homecoming game.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (4-1, 2-0 MWC)

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (3-1, 0-0 Big 12)

Rodney Stewart (Junior, Tailback, 5-6, 175, Westerville, Ohio/Brookhaven HS)

In CU's 29-27 win over Georgia, the CU junior had his 10th career 100-yard game (second in a row, second this year), and is now tied for the seventh most in school history with three other players (Hugh Charles, Merwin Hodel and Cortlen Johnson). The 149 yards are the second most in his career (2008: 166 vs. West Virginia). With 1,828 yards, he has crept close to CU's top 20; he is 22nd all-time, on the heels of Byron White (21st, 1,864) and Bob Stransky (1,868). His 65-yard run in the third quarter was the longest rush by a CU player since Charles had a 74-yard TD run at Oklahoma State on Oct. 1, 2005. He also converted on one 3rd-&-1 and one 4th-&-1, and is now 7-for-7 in such situations this season (and 18-of-20 in his career).

Team Notes: The Buffs are 3-1 for the first time since 2008, also the last time they won back-to-back games (opening the year 3-0). Matt Bahr, a converted offensive tackle (last spring), scored his first career touchdown on CU's opening drive. It was also the first points CU has scored this year on its opening drive in four games. Georgia's field goal on its first possession also marked the first opponent points this year on their opening drive. Tailback Brian Lockridge made his third career start; the other two were on the road, boat at Kansas State (2007, 2009). Cornerback Jalil Brown made his second interception of the season in the second quarter, the fifth of his career (the other was against CSU). Wide receiver Will Jefferson (1-46 receiving), came in with three catches for 16 yards, and had six for 45 his freshman year. CU extended its streak to 24 consecutive games with at least one sack. The fourth quarter drive where CU missed a 52-yard field goal attempt was 15 plays for 45 yards (10-for-13) in plus territory, but consumed 8:53 off the clock. Georgia averaged an astonishing 10.6 yards on first down plays (317 yards on 30 plays), but managed just 92 yards on 29 second/third down plays (3.2 per). The Buffs scored on a 2-point play for the second time this year; the last time CU had more than one in a single season was 2002 (4-for 4). The Buffs have now outscored the opponent 46-10 in the third quarter this year (and own a 487-249 edge in total offense). CU was flagged for a season-low three penalties (two special teams, one on the defense); it was a team low since being called for two at Nebraska on Nov. 28, 2008. Dan Hawkins' staffs are now 9-3 after bye weeks (3-3 at Colorado).

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (2-3, 1-2 BSC)

Team Notes: Northern Colorado lost to Montana on Saturday, 30-7. Their next action will be at Sacramento State for a 3:05 p.m. kickoff this Saturday.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (0-5, 0-3 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State leads the RMAC with 15.2 yards per punt return, fewest penalty yardage per game with 45 yards, and they remain perfect in the red zone after the New Mexico Highlands game last Saturday. Taylor Keith continues to lead the RMAC with 1.6 tackles for loss this season after recording 1.5 tackles for loss last weekend. Markus Harvey posted 1.5 sacks against the Cowboys, the best performance by a Mountaineer this season. The Mountaineers have out-scored Western New Mexico - next week's opponent - 84-43 in the last two meetings. Shaun Suttorp added to his program-record career reception mark with a 16-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter last Saturday. The Mountaineers have blocked a kick for the second straight game this season with a blocked punt in the first quarter against New Mexico Highlands that led to the opening touchdown for Western State. The Mountaineers have now blocked three kicks this season.
