2010 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (3-5, 2-4 RMAC)

Jeremiah Van Valkenburg (Sophomore, Defensive Back, 6-0, 170, Highlands Ranch, Colo./Highlands Ranch HS)

Van Valkenburg made a career-high 10 tackles, including four solo stops, as the Grizzlies held Fort Lewis to just 10 net rushing yards and 255 yards of total offense. Van Valkenburg, who also played well on special teams, also had a quarterback hurry and a half tackle for a loss.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies saw their 2-game winning streak snapped Saturday with a 14-7 setback to Fort Lewis. The defeat was just the second in the last 13 years in the Musket Game rivalry that the Grizzlies still lead 31-13-1. Six of the last seven games between the teams have been decided by a touchdown or less. The teams have scored just 27 combined points in the last two games of the rivalry played at Rex Stadium. Saturday's game was just the Grizzlies third against Colorado teams this season. The Grizzlies will finish the season playing three more in-state rivals. The Grizzlies are 0-3 thus far against Colorado teams this season but have had a .500 or better record against in-state foes every year since and including 2002. Third-year Grizzly coach Marty Heaton is now 2-1 against Fort Lewis. Heaton is now 13-14 against NCAA Division II opponents in his tenure and has an even 12-12 record against the RMAC. Under Heaton, the Grizzlies are now a combined 11-4 in the final six games of a given season. Heaton's defense, which he coordinates, has now allowed just 24 combined points in the last three games, an average of just eight per contest. The Grizzlies held Fort Lewis to just 10 net rushing yards on Saturday night. That total is ASC's best rush defense effort since Nov. 8, 2008 when the Grizzlies held CSU-Pueblo to a negative 10 yards this season. The Grizzlies have now held three opponents under 30 rushing yards this season and have held their last three opponents to an average of 1.88 yards per carry. The Grizzlies also remain near the top of the RMAC and the nation in pass defense and now rank second in the RMAC with a pass defense efficiency rating of 95.2. They were ranked fourth in the nation in last week's NCAA statistics at 91.6 and were ranked fifth in the nation last week giving up just 130.14 yards per game. The Grizzlies have the top two punt returners in the RMAC. Scott Kellogg leads the RMAC with his 17.2 yard per return average while Trevor Zott (Arvada, Colo.) is averaging 12.2 yards per return. The Grizzlies have just five 1,000 all-purpose yard gainers in the past 13 years and have not had multiple people reach the milestone in at least that time. The Grizzlies go on the road this week to face RMAC co-leading and nationally-ranked Colorado Mines.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (7-1, 6-0 RMAC)

Clay Garcia (Junior, Quarterback, 6-0, 200, Alamosa, Colo./Alamosa HS)

National Football Foundation - Colorado Chapter Player of the Week

Team Notes: Mines registered a season-best 179 yards rushing last Saturday at Western State. CSM amassed 535 yards of total offense while limiting WSC to 197. Junior running back Jordan Smith rushed for a career-best 94 yards against WSC. Redshirt freshman defensive back Ryan Wood, who went into last week's game against Western State tied for second in the country in interceptions, picked off his sixth pass of the season against the Mountaineers. Sophomore punter Taylor Accardi, who currently leads the nation in gross punting average, averaged 44.0 yards per boot on two punts at WSC. Senior tight end Robbin Vinnola caught seven passes for 98 yards and one touchdown at Western State. Senior defensive lineman Kaleb Anderson leads the RMAC in tackles for a loss (11.5). The Orediggers will host Adams State on Oct. 30 at 12pm (MDT) at Campbell Field.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (2-6, 1-3 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State fell 59-6 at Utah. They will host New Mexico this Saturday at 4 p.m.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (6-2, 4-2 RMAC)

Jesse Lewis (Junior, Running Back, 5-6, 173, Loveland, Colo./Loveland HS)

Lewis notched 23 carries for 119 yards in a road win against Mesa State. He averaged 5.2 yards per carry.

Team Notes: After allowing over 500 yards of offense in back-to-back games, CSU-Pueblo allowed just 184 yards at Mesa State.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (2-5, 2-4 RMAC)

Team Notes: Overall, the Skyhawk defense was solid, limiting ASC to just one scoring drive in 14 total drives. The only ASC scoring drive was 31 yards, set up by a long punt return. Two ASC drives ended on downs, nine on punts, one on a fumble, and one on the end of the first half.

MESA STATE COLLEGE (2-5, 2-4 RMAC)

Trent deBraga (Sophomore, Defensive Back/Kick Returner, 6-0, 200, Fallon Nev./Churchill County)

deBraga tallied four kickoff returns for 113 yards and a long of 40 in a home loss to CSU-Pueblo. He also had one punt return for four yards. His 40-yard kick return ties his longest of the year (Colorado Mines). deBraga was second on the team with 12 tackles in the game (three solo). He leads the team in all purpose yards (406) and has a team high 14 kickoff returns for 341 yards and 10 punt returns for 65 yards. deBraga also has one interception on the year. He is second on the team in total tackles (49) and tied with a team high 22 solo tackles. He also has a team high four pass breakups and has one forced fumble.

Team Notes: Mesa State is on a two game losing streak after suffering their first home loss this season. There was a 40-minute lightening delay before the start of the game Saturday night. Mike Brady tied his long punt of the season with a 57-yarder and Trent deBraga long kick return of 40 yards ties a season high. Jake Bruno's team high 13 tackles is also a season high. CSUP's 43-yard field goal and their 49.6 punting average are the longest by an opponent this season.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (5-3, 3-2 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force has scored in a school-record 215 consecutive games dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the nation and 14th longest streak in NCAA history. Air Force fell to 1-2 vs. ranked teams this season. The Falcons defeated No. 24 BYU, 35-14, and lost at No. 7/9 Oklahoma, 24-27. Air Force is now 16-68-4 all-time vs. nationally-ranked teams. Air Force was held without a 100-yard rusher for just the third time this season (Northwestern State, Oklahoma). Air Force was held to a season-low seven points. Previous low was 14 vs. Navy. The Falcons allowed a season high in points with 38. The previous high was 27 vs. San Diego State, Colorado State and Oklahoma. Air Force was held to a season-low 184 yards rushing and 231 yards of total offense.

2010 NFFCC News & Notes

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (3-4, 0-3 Big 12)

Paul Richardson (Wide Receiver, Freshman, 6-1, 175, Gardena, Calif.)

Richardson became the first true freshman in CU history to have two touchdown receptions in the same game, and just the third frosh (true/redshirt) to do it, joining wide receiver Michael Westbrook (1991 vs. Missouri) and Brody Heffner (1996 vs. Iowa State). Richardson's four catches and 79 yards against Texas Tech are career highs. Scotty McKnight was the last player to have two TD catches in a game (vs. Nebraska in Boulder last year and vs. Iowa State at Folsom in 2008).

Team Notes: The series against Texas Tech for the time being concludes at 5-5; the home team won the first eight games, with the road team breaking through for the final two (each is 4-1 at home and 1-4 on the road). The first quarter took all of 32 minutes to play. Travon Patterson's 43-yard punt return in the first quarter was the longest CU punt return since Josh Smith had a 51-yarder vs. Eastern Washington on Sept. 6, 2008. CU has now out-scored the opponent 60-28 in the third quarter. Zach Grossnickle had his first collegiate punt for 50 or more yards (51-yarder in fourth quarter). Tech rushed for 144 yards after CU had held it under 100 the last four games in the series (91, 91, 31, 39). Ten different Buffs had a hand in earning the team's 20 first downs. Tyler Hansen piloted the offense for 26 plays (for 80 yards) prior to leaving the game with a rib injury in the second quarter; quarterback Cody Hawkins directed 59 plays for 284 yards. Tech averaged 6.9 yards on first down, well below the 10-plus both Georgia and Baylor had averaged in CU's last two home games; three plays accounted for 107 of its 233 first down yards. The Buffs are 0-3 in Big 12 Conference play for the first time in the 15 year history of the league, and dropped their first three league games since opening 0-4 in the Big Eight in 1983. TTU scored one touchdown rushing, just the fourth allowed on the ground this season; the Buffs are among the national leaders in fewest rushing TDs allowed (tied for fifth after six games). The Buffs final game against Big 12 South teams is next Saturday at Oklahoma; as of now, CU is an even 22-22 in regular season play against the South, plus another 1-3 in league championship games.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (2-6, 1-5 BSC)

Jace Davis (Sophomore, Wide Receiver, 6-1, 190, Lone Tree, Colo./Denver East HS)

Davis caught a pass in his 12th straight game, with his first reception going 68 yards for a touchdown. Davis ended the day with eight catches for 207 yards and two touchdowns. His 207 yards is the 10th best single-game total in school history and the most since the Bears joined the Big Sky Conference in 2006. Davis' 207 reception yards is the first 200-plus receiving game this season in the Big Sky Conference and he is the first player in the league to have two multiple touchdown receiving games this year. Davis' 207 yards is the third-highest total in Bobcat Stadium history and the most since Joe Douglass of Montana recorded 208 yards in 1995.

Team Notes: Senior linebacker John Eddy became the ninth different Bear to recover a fumble this season, picking up the third fumble of his career, helping set up the team's first touchdown of the year. Junior defensive tackle Marcus Felker recovered the second fumble of the afternoon for the Bears, one forced by senior linebacker James Schrenk. It was Schrenk's second force of the season and Felker's first recovery. Felker's recovery broke the Northern Colorado single-season Division I record for fumble recoveries in a year, giving the Bears 14, surpassing the 2007 team's record of 13. Eddy recorded two sacks in the game, giving him 19.5 for his career. That moves him into a tie for sixth on the Northern Colorado all-time charts with Paul Hubbard (2002-03). Eddy's 19.5 sacks is already a school Division I record. Junior Brandon Owens, in his first start for the Bears, notched a career-best in tackles. He had six in the first half, passing his previous best of five at Sacramento State. He ended the contest with a game-high 11 and also added a pass break-up. Senior free safety Max Hewitt had his second interception of the season and 11th of his career, stopping a Montana State drive in the final minute of the first half. Sophomore wide receiver Jace Davis ended the day with eight catches for 207 yards and two touchdowns. His 207 yards is the 10th best single-game total in school history and the most since the Bears joined the Big Sky Conference in 2006. Davis' 207 reception yards is the first 200-plus receiving game this season in the Big Sky Conference and he is the first player in the league to have two multiple touchdown receiving games this year. Davis' 207 yards is the third-highest total in Bobcat Stadium history and the most since Joe Douglass of Montana recorded 208 yards in 1995. Junior receiver Patrick Walker surpassed the 1,000 career reception yards mark, catching a pass over the middle for 33 yards in the third quarter. He ended the game with three catches for 72 yards for 1,063 career receiving yards. Orms threw for a career-best 344 yards on the afternoon, surpassing his previous career best of 233 yards at Weber State. His 344 yards is the 12th best single game total in school history. Orms four touchdown passes is the most by a Northern Colorado quarterback since Nick Hager had five against Colorado School of Mines in 2005. For the second-straight week, Gunn recorded more than 100 kickoff return yards, notching 115 yards on five returns. Those 115 yards give him 372 for the season and bring him within 50 yards of ranking in the top 10 in single season school history. They also give him 566 career kickoff return yards to move him into ninth on the school's career charts, passing Rick Pierson (1967-70) with 555 yards and Cedric Tillman (1986-89) with 554 yards. Senior Derek Palmer recovered a fumbled snap on a Montana State punt, his first career fumble recovery and the Bears' third of the day, giving the team 15 on the season.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (1-7, 1-5 RMAC)

DJ Hughes (Senior, Defensive Back, 6-1, 185, Westminster, Colo./Ranum HS)

Hughes returned an interception for 79 yards for a touchdown against No. 20 Colorado Mines at home. It was his first interception of the season. The 79 return yards is fifth in the conference this season. It was the first interception return for a touchdown for the Mountaineers since Adrian Trujillo returned an interception 31 yards against Mesa State (Oct. 13, 2007).

Team Notes: Western State is leading the RMAC with 15 yards per punt return, only 51.6 penalty yards per game and eight blocked kicks this season. Germaine Daniels is third in the conference with 126 rushing attempts this season and is on pace to finish the season with 174 rushing attempts, just two short of 10th in program records. Markus Harvey blocked a point-after attempt last weekend against Colorado School of Mines, his first of the season. The Mountaineers have blocked a kick in five straight games and in six of the last seven. Shaun Suttorp is tied for fourth in career touchdown receptions with 17 and needs four to tie Joe Wuebben (1995-98) for third in program records. Suttorp also needs 11 receptions to tie for 10th in season reception records. He's already mentioned twice in the top-10 records for season receptions (third-68, 2009 / tied fifth - 64, 2008) and continues to improve his program record for career receptions with 187. Western State is scoring on 85 percent of its trips into the red zone, the best percentage since at least 2003. Dustin Driscoll moved into ninth in program records with 428 kickoff return yards this season. The Mountaineers have posted 100-yard rushing games in each of the last two weeks with 111 yards against the Oregiggers. It was only the third time this season Colorado Mines has given up more than 100 rushing yards. Western State travels for the final time this season to Mesa state Saturday and holds a 20-16 overall record against the Mavericks. The last three games between the two teams have been decided by an average of five points.
