Gaudin matched a 42-year old school record as he returned a kick-off for 100 official yards (was eight yards deep in the end zone) and a touchdown in the Grizzlies' win over Colorado Mines. The 100-yard return was just the third of such length in ASU's history (the first since 1971) and was the Grizzlies' first kick-off return for a touchdown since 1998. Gaudin also caught 11 passes for a career-high 144 yards and two scores and finished the day with three total touchdowns and 252 all-purpose yards. The all-purpose yard total was also a career-high and is the third greatest total in available (1997-Present) single-game school history. His 11 receptions were just one shy of ASU's all-time single-game record of 12.

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (7-3, 5-3 RMAC)

National Football Foundation - Colorado Chapter Player of the Week

Team Notes: The Grizzlies claimed arguably their most important win in years on Saturday as they defeated Colorado Mines on the road by a 36-25 margin. The victory was ASU's first over the Orediggers since 2006 and was just ASU's second in the last 12 battles with the Orediggers. The victory allowed the Grizzlies to match their NCAA Division II era (1992-Present) record for wins in a season (7 in 2004) and gives them a chance to set a new Division II era mark next week when the Grizzlies host Colorado Mesa in their season-finale. The Grizzlies have somewhat controlled Colorado Mesa in recent history winning six of the last eight meetings. However, six of the last seven games between the Grizzlies and Mavericks have been decided by a eight points or less. The Grizzlies are 4-0 at home during that time. CMU's last win in Alamosa was in 2003. ASU racked up 580 yards of total offense on Saturday and held the ball for more than 40 minutes. The Grizzlies have now won three straight games and went 5-1 in road games this season. The Grizzlies have averaged nearly 500 yards (497.3) of total offense in their 3-game winning streak. The Grizzlies ran a season-high 105 plays and had a season-high 57 rushing attempts in Saturday's win. Fullback Justin Kauffman (Anchorage, Alaska) scored his first career touchdown and his first career 100-yard game as he rushed 18 times for 102 yards. The Grizzlies have now had four different players' record 100-yard efforts in the last five games. The Grizzlies scored on all six of their red-zone attempts on Saturday and have scored points on all but one of their last 17 attempts. The one failure came when the Grizzlies intentionally ran out the clock in a win at Western New Mexico on Oct. 20. The Grizzlies continue to lead the RMAC in scoring and total defense allowing just 19.6 points and 345.5 yards per game. They also pace the RMAC in pass efficiency defense (97.5) after ranking 11th in the country with a 100.19 mark last week. Ron Gaudin's 100-yard kick return for a touchdown was the first kick-off return for a touchdown by any player in the RMAC this season and was the longest play in the RMAC this season. It was ASU's first kick return for a touchdown since 1998 and was just the third 100-yard kick return in program history. Senior middle Brent Lush (Tucson, Ariz.) recorded his RMAC-leading fifth fumble recovery of the season in Saturday's win. He has tried to return four of those and has racked up 155 yards of return yardage while scoring two defensive touchdowns. Senior kicker David Van Voris (Elizabeth, Colo.) hit on all three of his field goal attempts and on all three of his point after attempts on Saturday. Van Voris has now made 14 of his 17 field goal attempts this season. The 14 made field goals are equal to second most in ASU's single-season history. Van Voris set the school-record by hitting 17 as a freshman in 2009. Van Voris also has 44 career field goals, second only to the school-record of 47, currently held by Rocky Paulson, who also held the single-season record before Van Voris came along. Van Voris's three attempts on Saturday moved him to 73 in his career as he surpassed Paulson's career record of 72. Van Voris, who also leads the RMAC with his 96.4 percent (27-28) success rate on PAT's now has 220 career points, second most in ASU history.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (4-6, 4-4 RMAC)

Jake Edmiston (Junior, Linebacker, 6-2, 195, Palisade, Colo./Palisade HS)

Edmiston led all players with 15 tackles in CMU's win over Western State in the Mavs' final home regular season game. He had two solo tackles, one tackle for loss yardage and one quarterback hurry. His 15 tackles are the second highest tackle total this season (19 versus NMHU). Edmiston leads the team with 117 tackles, including 28 solo tackles. He has eight tackles for loss yards, 1.5 sack and four quarterback hurries.

Team Notes: CMU snapped a two game losing streak and closed out their home regular season with a 22-19 win over Western State. CMU averages 186.1 yards rushing per game. Jake Cimolino leads the team with 215 carries for 1,247 yards and nine touchdowns, an average of 5.8 per carry and 124.7 per game. Alex Zemezonak leads the team with 27 receptions for 330 yards. Jake Edmiston leads the team with 117 tackles including eight tackles for loss yards. CMU is 2-3 at home and 2-3 on the road. They will close out the 2012 season on the road at Adams State on Saturday. CMU honored 11 seniors on Saturday's Senior Day.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (6-4, 4-4 RMAC)

Chad McGraw (Junior, Linebacker, 6-0, 200, Castle Rock, Colo.)

McGraw led the Oredigger defensive unit in Mines' 36-25 loss to Adams State on Saturday with 12 tackles, including four solo stops. The junior added 3.0 tackles for loss, a sack, and also recorded his NCAA-leading eighth forced fumble. He is now fifth in the RMAC in tackles for loss (13.5) and continues to lead in forced fumbles.

Team Notes: Colorado School of Mines lost on Saturday to Adams State by a final score of 36-25 at Campbell Field in Golden. Matt Brown finished 22-of-63 for 303 yards and two touchdowns on the day while adding a team-high 21 rushing yards for 324 yards of total offense. Senior Jerrod Doucet hauled in seven receptions for 128 yards and a touchdown while Eric Shannon added 88 yards on seven catches and a score as well. Senior tight end David Pawelek eclipsed the 1,000-yard plateau with 60 receiving yards to give him 1,007 for the season. Billy Sprague led the defense with 14 tackles including a 0.5 tackle for loss, while Trevor Stubbs added 13 stops (six solo) and 2.0 tackles for a loss of 11 yards. Ian McFadden, Chad McGraw, Kelly Zimmerman and Ryan Wood each recorded 12 stops with McGraw adding 3.0 tackles for loss and a forced fumble. McGraw entered the day as the national leader in the latter category and upped his total number of fumbles caused on the year to eight. Taylor Accardi, the nation's leading punter, averaged 49.7 yards on 10 punts, including a long of 63. He also recorded two touchbacks and had two of his punts downed inside the ASU 20 yard line, including one that was downed at the one on a fantastic special teams play by Rylan Hess. The squad will close out the 2012 campaign with a road clash at Chadron State (8-2, 7-1 RMAC) on November 10 in Chadron, Neb.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (2-7, 1-4 MWC)

Team Notes: The Colorado State Rams came up short in their quest to bring the Bronze Boot back to Fort Collins on Saturday night, losing to the Wyoming Cowboys 45-31. The Rams (2-7, 1-4 MW) trailed early to their rival to the north, as Wyoming (2-7, 1-4 MW) marched down the field in 10 plays to score a touchdown on their opening drive. The Cowboys managed to stay on the field after converting three separate third-down conversions on the opening drive, and capped it off with a 26-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Brett Smith to Chris McNeill. Colorado State took little time to answer back, needing just one play to tie the game at seven. Freshman quarterback Conner Smith looked for tight end Kivon Cartwright down the seam, and after the ball was tipped a couple of times, Thomas Coffman found himself in the right place at the right time; hauling in the ball and running it in for a 75-yard touchdown. Again though, Wyoming was able to respond on the following drive. This time the Cowboys moved the ball 75 yards in 14 plays, finishing the drive off with a 16-yard touchdown pass from B. Smith to Brandon Miller. Early on, it looked like the game would continue in that see-saw fashion. With the Rams inside the ten yard line, it looked like CSU was poised to tie up the game. On a third down play though, defensive back Blair Burns picked off a C. Smith pass in the end zone and returned it 99 yards for a touchdown to give Wyoming a 21-7 lead in the first quarter and control of the game. The Cowboys added another touchdown early in the second quarter to extend their lead to 21 points. After an 11-yard touchdown run from freshman running back Donnell Alexandr and a 30-yard field goal from Jared Robertsmidway through the third quarter, the Rams pulled within 11 points of their rival, but didn't manage to get closer than that. Wyoming responded with a pair of touchdowns from B. Smith, who finished the game with 235 yards passing and five total touchdowns, to again seize control of the game. Colorado State showed some mental toughness late in the game though, as C. Smith led the team down the field for a couple of touchdowns to make it 45-31 with just under seven minutes left in the game, but that was as close as it would get at the end. C. Smith led the Rams with a career-high 326 yards passing and two touchdowns, while Alexander added balance to the offensive attack with a career-high 114 yards and a touchdown. Alexander's 114 rushing yards is the most by a freshman running back since Jaime Blake in 1995 when he ran for 170 on Hawai'i. Defensively, Aaron Davis and Lanston Tanyi led the way for Colorado State combining for 23 tackles.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (10-0, 8-0 RMAC)

J.B. Mathews (Sophomore, Tailback, 6-0, 191, Aurora, Colo./Rangeview HS)

Mathews broke the CSU-Pueblo school record for most touchdowns in a season with three touchdowns against New Mexico Highlands (now at 16 touchdowns in 2012). He scored three touchdowns for a second straight game. Mathews eclipsed 1,000 rushing yards in a season for the first time in his career in the win. He has now accumulated 1,388 all-purpose yards, which is currently the third most in a single season in school history.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-9, 0-8 RMAC)

Phil Odell (Senior, Linebacker, 6-1, 215, Show Low, Ariz./Show Low HS)

Odell had 16 tackles (four solo, 1.5 for losses) as the Skyhawks limited Chadron State to 178 rushing yards Saturday at home (L, 45-20). He needs just four tackles in FLC's last game to tie Fort Lewis Athletic Hall of Famer Shane Voss (356, 1990-93) for most career tackles in school history.

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (5-4, 4-1 MWC)

Team Notes: Army's opening touchdown drive marks just the third time this season the Falcons has allowed a score on the opponent's opening drive of the game. Michigan and New Mexico are the only other teams to score on the opening drive, both scoring touchdowns. Air Force has also forced a missed field goal, four punts and a fumble. Air Force scored a touchdown on its opening drive of the game for the fourth time this season and first time since the Navy game. The score marks Air Force's second straight game opening with a score, as it opened with a field goal last week vs. Nevada. The Falcons have also missed two field goals and punted twice on the opening drive of the game this season. Air Force extended its school record consecutive games scoring streak to 242 which is the fourth longest active streak in the nation. The streak is tied as the 10th longest in NCAA history. Air Force was last shutout in the 1992 Liberty Bowl vs. Mississippi, 13-0. Air Force extended its streak of consecutive games with at least one rushing touchdown to 43 straight games dating back to Navy Oct. 3, 2009. The streak is the longest current active streak in the nation. This season marks the first time since 2005 that Air Force has lost to both Army and Navy in the same season. The Falcons lost at Navy, 27-24, and at home to Army, 27-24, in 2005.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-8, 1-5 PAC12)

Team Notes: Stanford now leads the series 5-3, winning for the first time in Boulder since 1904 (when Teddy Roosevelt was president). The Buffs are 61-32-5 in Homecoming games in their history but have dropped the last five. CU has lost 11 straight against ranked teams (last win: 34-30 over Kansas in 2009). The Buffaloes are now 56-33-1 in their last 90 November games (50-21 not including the Nebraska rivalry games, 2-3 under Embree). Saturday was the second game of the year where both CU and its opponent went 3-and-out on the opening drive (other: CSU). Stanford ran 21 plays in plus territory in the first half (for 159 yards); CU never crossed the 50 in the half (best field position was its own 42, but that's where the catch/fumble occurred). For the game, the Buffs had just two plays in Stanford territory, a 2-yard TB Donta Abron rush and then the loss of 24 on the sack/fumble of QB Nick Hirschman (by comparison, Stanford gained 241 yards on 37 plays in plus territory). The minus-21 rushing yards on 21 attempts is the second lowest in CU history; in 2007 CU had minus-27 against Florida State in Boulder (25 attempts). The last time CU was held under 100 yards both rushing and passing was on Oct. 10, 2009 in a 38-14 loss at Texas (42 rushing, 85 passing). The six first downs by the Buffs were their fewest since Oct. 21, 2006, when they had 5 at Oklahoma in a 24-3 setback. Colorado had a season-low 23:43 in time of possession on Saturday; in fact, the Buffs possessed the ball more than the opponent six straight games coming in. Opponents are now 12-of-14 in field goals this season, 104-of-133 since 2006 which includes 72-of-83 inside 40 yards (Stanford's pair were both in the 30s). Colorado had scored in 150 straight games at home until today; the last shutout had been a 28-0 loss to Oklahoma on Nov. 15, 1986 (when CU ran the wishbone offense). This was just the third time CU was shutout at Folsom Field over the course of the last 288 games (all the way back to 1963; the other was in 1979 to LSU, 44-0).

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (3-6, 2-4 BSC)

Dominic Gunn (Senior, Return Specialist/Wide Receiver, 5-11, 170, Aurora, Colo./Rangeview HS)

Trailing 28-11, Dominic Gunn returned a punt 83 yards for a touchdown, sparking a Northern Colorado comeback that saw the Bears win 32-28 on the road – the first road victory in almost two years. He recorded 107 punt return yards on five returns, the ninth-highest single game total in school history. It is the second time this year Gunn has topped the century mark after recording 133 against Colorado Mesa. Gunn's 83 yard return for a touchdown also ties for the fifth-longest in school history, knotting him with current Head Coach Earnest Collins Jr (vs North Dakota State, 1994) and Randy McCall (vs Abilene Christian, 1982). Gunn also recorded 11 kickoff return yards in the game, giving him 2,005 for his career. He is just the fifth player in Big Sky Conference history to top the 2,000 yard milestone. He also caught the winning touchdown on offense – a 29-yard strike from Seth Lobato with 7:26 left in the game for the 32-28 score and had three tackles on special teams, pinning Portland State deep in their own territory twice.

WESTERN STATE COLORADO UNIVERSITY (1-9, 1-7 RMAC)

Team Notes: With less than two minutes to play, the Western State Colorado University football team had the ball deep in Colorado Mesa territory. The Mavericks forced a fourth down and the Mountaineers lined up for the kick. Unfortunately for WSCU, the kick sailed wide left and Mavericks ran out the clock for the 22-19 win. The Mountaineers seemed to have an answer for the Mavericks after every score early in the game. The score was tied at 7-7 and 14-14, before a Mountaineer safety by Calvin Winter and Jaden Terry gave WSCU a 16-14 lead. WSCU padded their lead in the third quarter with a Steven Ballard 21 yard field goal. The field goal was setup by a Justin Brooks interception and 27 yard return. The Mavs took the lead and scored the game winning touchdown after a 16 play 93 yard drive at the 7:31 mark. L.A. McGee took over the work load in the running game for the Mountaineers, rushing for 137 yards. Kyle Motal threw for 121 yards for WSCU. The Mountaineers final game of the season will be played at home next weekend against CSU-Pueblo. Senior day kickoff is scheduled for 1 p.m. in Mountaineer Bowl.
