In Colorado's 35-34 win over Washington State in Pullman, Webb completed 29-of-42 passes for 345 yards, two touch-

downs and an interception. He had a passer rating of 149.0 and earned 19 first downs (three rushing, 16 passing; the three rushing all came on third downs). He scored two touchdowns rushing, the first on a 1-yard run in the third quarter following a Washington State turnover, and the second with nine seconds left in the game, on a 4th-and-goal from the WSU 4. On that play, he had the option of calling his own number or throwing a pass depending on how the defense set up; he saw a lack of defenders up the middle and was able to race into the end zone untouched on a quarterback draw. His score tied the game at 34 (Will Oliver's PAT then won it).

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (3-1, 1-1 RMAC)

Ron Gaudin (Senior, Wide Receiver, 5-9, 185, Miami, Fla./Abilene Christian/Archbishop Corley Notre Dam HS)

Gaudin made a career-high 10 receptions for 83 yards to lead the Grizzly offense against third-ranked Colorado State-Pueblo. The 10 catches were the most of any Grizzly this season.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies continue to lead the RMAC in scoring defense and are giving up just 15 points per game. They also pace the conference with eight interceptions, a factor in their RMAC-leading 95.9 pass efficiency defense rating. Senior defensive back James Ackel (Riverside, Calif.) is tied for the conference lead with 40 total tackles. ASU went 2-1 in a stretch of three straight road games but will return home for just their second home game of the season next Saturday against Chadron State. The Grizzlies have not claimed victory over the Eagles since 2005.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (1-3, 1-1 RMAC)

Jason Haferman (Junior, Quarterback, 5-11, 195, Fort Collins, Colo./Poudre HS)

In his first career start for Colorado Mesa, Haferman led the Mavericks to their first win of the season in a 31-29 win at Black Hills State. He was 18 of 28 for 157 yards (one interception), was sacked twice and threw a long pass of 22 yards. Haferman also scored three rushing touchdowns; two touchdowns (back-to-back scoring drives) in the second quarter on a 4-yard run to pull to within 14-16 and on a 6-yard run with 27 seconds remaining in the first half to give CMU 21-16 halftime lead. He scored his third touchdown in the third quarter, a six-yard run to extend CMU's lead to 28-16 with 5:09 left in the third quarter. After trailing 29-28 late in the game Haferman drove the Mavericks 65 yards on 11 plays to set up the game winning field goal by Alex Zemzonak with nine-seconds left in the game. On the year Haferman is 19 of 30 for 156 yards. He ranks second on the team in scoring with 18 points.

Team Notes: Colorado Mesa recorded their first win this season on Saturday at Black Hills State. It was also first year head coach Russ Martin's first win at CMU. CMU recorded 406 total yards and was 5-of-6 in the red zone. CMU's defense registered its first three sacks of the season. Jake Cimolino rushed for a game high 196 yards on 33 carries and one touchdown (an individual season high for rushes and yards rushing). Cimolino had 105 first half rushing yards. He scored CMU's first touchdown of the game on a 27-yard run in the first quarter. Cimolino has 80 carries for 471 yards in four games, an average of 5.9 yards per carry. He leads the team in scoring with 24 points. Defensive back Mike Brady has registered back-to-back interceptions in the last two games (Chadron State, Black Hills State). He leads the team with two interceptions for 83 yards and one touchdown. CMU will host New Mexico Highlands on Saturday at 1 p.m. in their annual homecoming game.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (3-1, 1-1 RMAC)

Matt Brown (Sophomore, Quarterback, 6-3, 205, Limon, Colo.)

Brown went into two different record books in No. 18 Mines' 42-37 loss to New Mexico Highlands on Saturday after finishing the game 52-of-80 for 601 yards (65.0 completion percentage) and four touchdowns through the air while adding a one-yard touchdown run. It was Brown's second-straight game with five total touchdowns. His 601 passing yards broke the school record of 506 yards set by David Pesek against New Mexico Highlands in 2009. His 80 pass attempts broke a school record of 65 set by Clay Garcia against New Mexico Highlands last season and his 52 completions broke the school record of 45 set by current quarterback coach Chad Frieauf during his Harlon Hill award-winning campaign against Pittsburg State in the second round of the NCAA Division II Playoffs in 2004. Brown's marks for attempts and completions also set new conference marks, with his attempts total topping the previous record of 74 set by Andrew Webb of Fort Lewis and David Ingram of Western New Mexico. The completions mark broke Frieauf's school record, which was also the highest in RMAC history. Brown's efforts allowed the Orediggers to set RMAC records for team attempts and completions, breaking the attempts record of 74 that Western New Mexico set against Nebraska-Kearney on October 29, 2011. Mines' 52 completions broke the conference record of 45 that was set by Fort Lewis against Nebraska-Kearney on October 12, 2001.

Team Notes: No. 18 Mines suffered its first loss of the season to New Mexico Highlands on Saturday by a 42-37 final in Las Vegas, N.M. Sophomore quarterback Matt Brown finished the game 52-of-80 for 601 yards (65.0 completion percentage) and four touchdowns through the air while adding a one-yard touchdown run (see above). Senior wideout Jerrod Doucet also went into the record books with 15 catches for 172 yards and two touchdowns. His 15 receptions tied teammate Cody Renken's school record of 15 receptions set against Western State in 2010. Renken added 12 catches for 145 yards and one touchdown while tight end David Pawelek added 12 catches for 120 yards. Senior Henry Kaetzer spearheaded defensive efforts after posting seven tackles (four solo) and 2.0 tackles for a loss of eight yards. He added his third interception of the season as well as a pass breakup in the loss. Ian McFadden led the defense with nine tackles (seven solo) while Kelly Zimmerman added eight stops (six solo) and 1.0 tackle for loss. Mines will return home to face Western New Mexico on Saturday for Homecoming at Campbell Field in Golden.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (1-3, 0-0 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State dropped its third game in a row on Saturday night, losing to the Utah State Aggies 31-19 in front of a crowd of 23,374 at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium. After forcing a quick punt from CSU, Utah State marched out its highly-efficient offense. Taking the ball at their own 23-yard line, the Aggies needed just eight plays and 2:26 off the clock to march 77 yards down the field--capping the drive with a 26-yard touchdown run by Kerwyn Williams. It was the sign of a career-best night to come from the senior running back. Williams finished the game with 205 yards rushing and two touchdowns. It was the first time the Rams had allowed a 200-yard rusher since Doug Martin rushed for 200 yards in a Boise State victory at Hughes Stadium last year. After a goal-line stand forced the Aggies to settle for a short field goal late in the first quarter to give them a 10-0 lead, Utah State made sure they would not be stopped so close to the end zone on their next possession. Facing a 4th-and-goal from the 1-yard line, quarterback Chuckie Keeton found wide receiver Matt Austin in the side of the end zone for a touchdown to cap a 19-play 85-yard drive that took 7:46 off the clock. On Utah State's second possession of the half, Rams redshirt-freshman safety Trent Matthews recorded his first career interception near midfield to give the Rams their best field position of the night. CSU would convert on the good field position by connecting on a 28-yard field goal by Jared Roberts to make it a two possession game. The score was set up by an 18-yard reception by sophomore wide receiver Charles Lovett. On the next Aggies possession, the Rams again applied pressure and intercepted Keeton's first pass, this time by Shaq Bell. The interception was Bell's second takeaway of the game, after earlier recovering a fumble in the end zone, and again put CSU in great field position. Again though, the Rams were unable to find the end zone and had to settle for a 31-yard field goal by Roberts to pull within 11 points, at 17-6. That was as close as the Rams would get, as the Aggies responded on their next drive with a 58-yard touchdown run by Williams to go ahead 24-6. In the fourth quarter, CSU was finally able to find the end zone when Grayson found wide receiver Dominique Vinson in the back of the end zone for a 4-yard touchdown on a 4th-and-goal. The Rams, however, were unable to convert on the two-point conversion, and could not make enough stops to get back into the game. Grayson finished the game with 224 yards passing and two touchdowns. Freshman running back Tommey Morris led the Rams with 76 yards rushing on eight attempts, including a career long rush of 33 yards that helped spark a Rams scoring drive.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (4-0, 2-0 RMAC)

Corey Orth (Senior, Defensive End, 6-5, 256, Buena Vista, Colo./Wyoming/Eastern Ariz./Buena Vista HS)

Orth led the ThunderWolves' front seven in its first shutout of 2012 in a 30-0 win over undefeated Adams State Saturday night. He recorded a team-high two tackles for loss (eight yards), which was part of eight tackles for loss by the team, and he recovered a fumble while also forcing a fumble, accounting for one of seven turnovers forced. He finished the game with nine tackles (four solo) and a half sack for a loss of one yard.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-3, 0-2 RMAC)

Tim Jenkins (Senior, Quarterback, 6-3, 220, Highlands Ranch, Colo./ThundeRidge HS)

Jenkins passed for 405 yards on Saturday in a 42-34 loss at Western New Mexico, marking the second time in his career that he has accomplished that feat (the other was 425 at Western New Mexico in 2010). He completed 26 of 52 passes and threw for two scores. He also carried the ball seven times for 14 yards and two rushing touchdowns. Jenkins moved into third place in career passing yards in FLC history (7,563).

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (1-2, 0-1 MWC)

Team Notes: AFA extended its scoring streak to 236 consecutive games. Air Force's streak is the longest in the Mountain West Conference and the fourth longest active streak in the country. The Falcons were last shutout by Mississippi, 13-0, in the 1992 Liberty Bowl. The streak is the 11th longest in NCAA history. Michigan has the longest active streak at 339 games. Air Force lost its first Mountain West Conference opener on the road, falling to 7-1 all time.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-3, 1-0 PAC12)

National Football Foundation - Colorado Chapter Player of the Week

Team Notes: Colorado is now 7-3-1 in games played in the state of Washington (3-0 versus WSU, in three different cities: Spokane, Seattle, Pullman). CU leads the series 5-3. Colorado is 79-38-2 in conference openers (1-1 in the Pac-12; CU snapped a four-game losing streak in league lid-lifters with the win). CU's last one-point win was by the same score, 35-34, over Texas A&M in Boulder on Nov. 7, 2009. Colorado scored on its opening drive for the second time in four games (eight plays, 75 yards), matching the distance it went for seven points against Sacramento State. CU had eight first downs in the first quarter (four rush/four pass); it had 10 (five rush/five pass) against Fresno State last week (not including ne penalty). The team on offense drove into plus territory of the first eight drives of the game (exception was when CU lost the ball on a fumble at its 39). Colorado had scored in eighth straight second quarters until being shutout on Saturday. With tailback Tony Jones (4-105) and wide receiver Nelson Spruce (8-103) both gaining 100 yards rushing and receiving, respectively, CU is now 25-8 in its history with a 100-yard rusher and receiver. Colorado had 255 yards in the fourth quarter, after netting just 276 in the first three. CU's defense was not flagged for a penalty Saturday and has just six in four games. CU has now played all four games in excess of three hours; averaging 3:27:20 coming in, Saturday's game went 3:47.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (1-3, 0-1 BSC)

Team Notes: The No. 2 ranked Montana State football team scored 21 unanswered points in the first quarter and Northern Colorado was never able to recover, losing 41-16 in Bozeman on Saturday. The Bears (1-3, 0-1 Big Sky) get a bye next week to heal and prepare for Montana and Homecoming on Oct. 6. Junior quarterback Seth Lobato completed 13-of-31 passes for 214 yards with one touchdown and one interception. His favorite target on the day was junior wide receiver Jace Davis who caught four passes for 59 yards. Sophomore Dimitri Stimphil, junior Tromaine Dennis and junior Austin Wilbers each caught two passes, while junior Quentin Hildreth led the ground game with 46 rushing yards on nine carries. Defensively, junior linebacker Clarence Bumpas again led the team in tackles, with 11, while sophomore Mykel Morse had a career-best nine stops. Junior kicker Dave Eden tied the Northern Colorado Division I record, making three field goals. He nailed ones from 40, 42 and 38. His PAT in the second quarter also gave him the Division I record for his career with 51, moving him past Michael York (2006-09) who kicked 50. Montana State junior quarterback DeNarius McGhee completed 34-of-44 passes for 387 yards, connecting with Tanner Bleskin 10 times for 116 yards. Running back Cody Kirk led the game with 89 rushing yards and two touchdowns, while McGhee rushed for another.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE UNIVERSITY (0-4, 0-2 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State lost at Chadron State on Saturday, 45-7. Chadron State's defense provided the first two scores of the game. Two interception returns for touchdowns in the first quarter gave the Eagles a 14-0 lead. The Eagles continued to build on that lead until the Mountaineers put points on the board with five minutes to go. A Brian Duboski pass to Lukas Adams made the score 45-7 in favor of Chadron State. Bradey Gasaway led the Mountaineer ground attack. Gasaway compiled 51 yards and averaged 5.4 yards per carry. In the final quarter of play, the Mountaineers gained 109 of their 185 yards in the fourth quarter alone. The Mountaineers will return home for their upcoming game on Sept. 29 against Black Hills State. Kickoff next Saturday is scheduled for 1 p.m. in the Mountaineer Bowl.
