

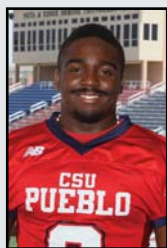

McDondle broke CSU-Pueblo records for most rushing yards in a game by a freshman with his 240-yard performance at

Colorado Mines (W, 35-21). He carried the ball 37 times for a 6.5 yards per carry average. McDondle is a third-string tailback and was pushed into duty because of multiple injuries. He helped lead CSU-Pueblo to its first win at Colorado School of Mines since 1982. He scored a third-quarter touchdown as part of a 25 point period (the second-highest scoring third quarter in school history) as CSU-Pueblo turned a 21-10 deficit into a 35-21 lead.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (4-3, 2-3 RMAC)

Connor Stevens (Sophomore, Linebacker, 5-10, 220, Colorado Springs, Colo./Pine Creek HS)

Stevens tallied a team-high 12 total tackles, including 2.0 for losses, and returned a fumble 54 yards for a touchdown against New Mexico Highlands. He also had a half-sack and a pass breakup. Two of his tackles were of the solo variety. Stevens now has two defensive touchdowns this season as he had returned an interception for 45 yards and a score against Western State.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies scored two defensive touchdowns in Saturday's game against New Mexico Highlands. Connor Stevens (above) had a 54-yard fumble recovery for a score that tied the game at 20 early in the fourth quarter while Vince Coach (Indianapolis, Ind.) blocked a punt and recovered it giving the Grizzlies an early 7-0 lead in the first quarter. Coach has now blocked kicks in each of the last two games. He had blocked a field goal attempt against Black Hills State. Coach's blocked punt and touchdown marked the first time a Grizzly has scored a touchdown on a blocked punt since Nov. 4, 2006. Sophomore running back Michael Carl (Rush, Colo.) tallied 100 all-purpose yards for the second straight game as he caught three passes for 59 yards while running for another 41. The Grizzlies gave up a season-high 34 points to New Mexico Highlands but still lead the RMAC in scoring defense at 19.1. The Grizzlies also lead the RMAC in total defense (340.3). The Grizzlies now head out on the road to face Western New Mexico. The Grizzlies have won the last four games between the teams. Each of the last two games have been decided by four points. The Grizzlies are 4-2 against the Mustangs since WNMU re-joined the conference in 2006. All but two of those games have been decided by a touchdown or less. Grizzly coach Marty Heaton recorded the first of his 25 career wins against the Mustangs on Oct. 4, 2008 in Silver City, N.M.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (3-4, 3-2 RMAC)

Defense: Trevor deBraga (Senior, Defensive Back, 5-11, 190, Fallon, Nev./Churchill County HS)

deBraga tied for a team high 13 tackles (tied with teammate Valencio Gray) including four solo tackles Saturday night in a 36-12 home win over Fort Lewis. He recorded a sack for a loss of 16 yards, had one pass breakup, one forced fumble and had 1.5 tackles for loss of 18 yards. deBraga took a pitch from his brother Trent on a punt return and ran 82 yards for a touchdown to give CMU a 13-0 lead early in the second quarter. deBraga is second on the team with 60 total tackles, leads the team with 24 solo tackles. He have 3.5 tackles for loss yardage (20 yards), 1.0 sack (16 yards), two forced fumbles, one breakup, and one quarterback hurry.

Team Notes: Saturday night marked Colorado Mesa's first home win of the season after they defeated Fort Lewis, 36-12. It was also the first home victory for first year head coach Russ Martin. CMU is on a two game win streak and has won three of their last four games. Jake Edmiston leads the defense with 78 total tackles, 6.0 tackles for loss yardage (19 yards). Michael Brady leads the team with three interceptions. Brady's eight punts and three punts inside the 20 against FLC is a season high. Trevor deBraga's 82 yard punt return for a touchdown is CMU's long punt return of the season. Cees Doxsey's 2.0 sacks against FLC in a season high. CMU held FLC to an opponent season low of 12 points and 73 rushing yards. CMU will travel to Colorado School of Mines on Saturday in the Nyikos Cup game. Kickoff is scheduled for noon.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (4-3, 2-3 RMAC)

Tyler Denson (Junior, Linebacker, 6-1, 225, New Braunfels, Texas)

Denson posted a career-high 19 tackles for the Orediggers in the squad's 35-21 loss to No. 2 CSU-Pueblo on Saturday. He posted a half sack, 1.5 tackles for loss and also forced a fumble during the contest. His 19 tackles fell two short of tying the school record and stands as the most by an Oredigger since Jared Heath set the school record against South Dakota in 2005. Denson is currently tied for fifth in the RMAC in tackles (66) and fourth in solo stops (30).

Team Notes: The Orediggers fell to AFCA-No. 2 CSU-Pueblo by a 35-21 final on Saturday afternoon at Campbell Field in Golden. Mines was held to a season-low in plays with 71 after averaging 92.5 per game through six contests, as well as passing yards (253) and total yards (280) after entering the contest as the top-ranked passing offense in the nation and the second-ranked overall offense in terms of yardage. Sophomore quarterback Matt Brown finished 25-of-49 for 239 yards and three touchdowns in the loss, while Cody Renken led the receiving corps with seven catches for 128 yards and two scores, including an 81-yard catch-and-run for a score in the second quarter. Jerrod Doucet added seven catches for 56 yards and a two-yard touchdown in the first quarter. Zach Newnam led the rushing attack with 29 yards on nine carries. Tyler Denson posted a career-high 19 tackles on defense with a half sack, 1.5 tackles for loss and a forced a fumble. His 19 tackles fell two short of tying the school record and stands as the most by an Oredigger since Jared Heath set the school record against South Dakota in 2005. Kelly Zimmerman and Ryan Wood each added nine stops and 0.5 tackle for loss while Wood added a fumble recovery. Senior punter Taylor Accardi had another strong game despite the wet conditions with seven punts at an average of 52.6 yards per kick, including a 74 yarder that bounced into the end zone for a touchback and a 71 yarder that was downed at the CSUP six yard line. He put two of his kicks inside the CSUP 20-yard line and leads the nation and the conference with an average of 52.6 yards per kick at a full 5.5 yards ahead of Justin Rosenbaum of Fort Valley State for the national lead in the category. The Orediggers will stay at home next weekend for a matchup with Colorado Mesa at noon.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (1-6, 0-3 MWC)

Team Notes: Looking for their first win in conference play, Colorado State fell to the San Diego State Aztecs (4-3, 2-1 MW) 38-14. Capped off by a 51-yard touchdown run by Adam Muema, San Diego State marched down the field in just 1:47 to give them an early 7-0 lead over the Rams. Utilizing an effective ground game and some key third down conversions, the Rams moved the ball 72 yards in 15 plays for a touchdown. M.J. McPeek helped keep the drive alive with third down runs of 15 yards and 13 yards. On 4th-and-goal from the two yard line, McPeek was able to find Kivon Cartwright wide open in the endzone for the touchdown. Turnovers proved to be the difference in the game, with the Rams turning the ball over three times leading to 21 points for the Aztecs. With 5:21 left in the second quarter, redshirt freshman quarterback, Conner Smith, replaced an injured McPeek in the game. While the Rams were able to move the ball down the field, finishing the game with 335 yards, they were not able to capitalize, twice turning the ball over on downs. In just two plays, SDSU moved the ball 33 yards finishing the drive with a 15-yard touchdown pass from Katz to Brice Butler. It was Katz's third touchdown of the game -- two through the air and one on the ground -- and extended the lead to 31-7 with 4:25 left in the third quarter. The Aztecs would add on to that lead with a 1-yard touchdown by Muema at the beginning of the fourth quarter. On the ensuing kickoff, Thomas Coffman returned the ball 73 yards down the left sideline to the SDSU 27-yard line, giving the Rams their best field position of the day. Four plays later, Colorado State would capitalize with a one-yard touchdown run by freshman running back Tommey Morris, the first of his career. Smith finished the game 18-22 for 165 yards and one interception, completing numerous quick passes in rhythm. Law finished the game with 63 yards on a career-high six receptions, making him Smith's favorite target on the night. Freshman linebacker Cory James made history on the night with 1.5 sacks, putting his season total at 6.5. The 6.5 sacks are the most ever by a Colorado State freshman, passing DeVaughn Hawkins's mark of five sacks in 1994. McPeek returned from his left shoulder injury for one play at the end of the first half, and was on the sideline in full uniform for the second half.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-6, 0-5 RMAC)

Team Notes: Colorado Mesa's Jake Cimolino rushed for 216 yards and Trevor deBraga had an 82-yard touchdown on a punt return to lead Colorado Mesa to a 36-12 win over Fort Lewis Saturday at Stocker Stadium. The Skyhawks lost three fumbles and threw an interception. Cimolino staked the Mavs to a 6-0 lead with a 21-yard run midway through the first quarter. Fort Lewis kept things close for the majority of three quarters. After trailing 16-0 at intermission, Tim Jenkins (32-of-54 passing, 248 yards) engineered a six-play, 54-yard drive on FLC's first possession of the second half to cut the lead to 16-6. Jenkins found Jordan Benton (seven catches, 66 yards) open for a 25-yard score just 2:58 into the third quarter. Mike Campbell stopped the ensuing Mavs drive by intercepting holder Mike Brady's pass on a fake field goal and returning it 19 yards to the FLC 39, giving the Skyhawks good field position and momentum in a 16-6 game. Fort Lewis went three-and-out, though, giving the ball back to CMU. An 11-play, 73-yard scoring drive culminated by Cimolino's second rushing touchdown of the game -- a three-yard run -- dampened hopes of an FLC comeback, though. Jenkins led the Skyhawks on one final scoring drive -- one that covered 87 yards on 12 plays -- late in the fourth. The big plays were a 22-yard scramble by Jenkins, a 22-yard completion to Amery Duncan (six catches, 68 yards), and a 22-yard strike to Doyle Bode (seven catches, 53 yards). Bode's catch went to the CMU one-yard line and set up a one-yard TD run by Jenkins with 3:28 remaining to end the scoring. Phil Odell led the Skyhawk defense with 10 tackles (two solo), including a half-sack. Brett Barnes added nine assisted tackles, while Campbell had eight tackles (five solo) and his 19-yard interception return. The Skyhawks return home to face Western State (0-7, 0-5) at 1 p.m. next Saturday at Ray Dennison Memorial Field.

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (3-3, 2-1 MWC)

Connor Dietz (Senior, Quarterback, 6-0, 195, Columbus, Ohio)

Dietz rushed for a season-high 92 yards, averaging 6.6 yards per rush, and he had a season-long run of 48 yards in a one point win Saturday at Wyoming. He hit seven of nine passes for 141 yards and matched his career high with two touchdown passes. Dietz threw for touchdowns of 41 and 46 yards and became the 39th player in AFA history to surpass the 1,000-yard mark for his career in the game. He ranks 37th in AFA history with 1,079 career yards. Dietz' 141 passing yards are the second-most of his career. He converted two first downs on AFA's winning touchdown drive in the fourth quarter. One was a four-yard run on third and three and the other was a 14-yard pass for a first down on a first down play. On the team's final drive of the game to seal the game, he picked up a first down with a seven-yard run on third and four and sealed the game with a 17-yard pass on third and 10.

Team Notes: Air Force extended its school record consecutive games scoring streak to 239 which is the fourth longest active streak in the nation. The streak is the 11th longest in NCAA history. Air Force was last shutout in the 1992 Liberty Bowl vs. Mississippi, 13-0. Air Force was forced to punt on its opening drive of the game, snapping a three-game streak of scoring a touchdown to open the game. Air Force improves to 3-3 overall and 2-1 in Mountain West play. The Falcons improve to 27-21-3 overall in the series vs. Wyoming, including an 18-14 mark in conference games. AFA is 11-11-2 in Laramie and has won four straight and six of the last eight at War Memorial Stadium. Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun improves to 44-27 overall and 26-16 in Mountain West games. Calhoun is 16-15 in road games, including a 12-9 mark in MW road games. He is 5-1 all-time vs. Wyoming. It was Air Force's first win this season when trailing in a game and first since trailing to Colorado State on Nov. 26, 2011 (45-21 win). After allowing 322 yards and 24 points in the first-half to Wyoming, the Falcon defense allowed just 125 yards and a field goal in the second.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-5, 1-2 PAC12)

Nick Kasa (Senior, Tight End, 6-6, 260, Thornton, Colo./Legacy)

In CU's 51-17 loss to Arizona State, Kasa caught four passes for 71 yards and a touchdown. He continues to evolve as a tight end (this was just his seventh game with action at the position); he now has 11 receptions for 239 yards (20.9 per) and a team-best three receiving touchdowns. Kasa now has six receptions of 20 yards or longer, the most on the team (and he has three plays over 70 yards - 70, 40, 31). It's just the 21st time that a CU tight end has caught as many as three touchdowns in a single season, but just the second time in the last half century a tight end has done caught on in three straight games (Tyson DeVree did it in 2007).

Team Notes: The Arizona State game marked the 88th anniversary of Folsom Field; the Buffs are 3-3 in home games on the date the stadium was christened back in 1924. CU is now 2-1 in Thursday night home games on ESPN. The Buffaloes donned their complete all-black uniform look, with black jerseys and pants for the 43rd time and is now 21-21-1 in the look; it was the fourth time the Buffs have worn black helmets (1-3 in that head gear); the Buffs have done all black from head-to-toe just one previous time (against USC last Nov. 4, also an ESPN broadcast). Colorado held the opponent scoreless on its first drive for the fourth time in six games. ASU ran eight first down plays in the first quarter, all rushes (81 yards, 10.1 per, including runs of 23, 23 and 19 yards); it passed on its first try in the second quarter (incomplete). CU has now scored in 150 straight games at home (last shutout: 28-0 to Oklahoma in 1986). The 17 second quarter points marked the second most in a quarter this year for the Buffs (21 in the fourth at Washington State); it was the most in a half against Arizona State and tied the second most in a game (Missouri: 24). The last kickoff return for a touchdown against Colorado was by Texas A&M's Cyrus Gray, who returned one 99 yards in Boulder on Nov. 7, 2009.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (1-5, 0-3 BSC)

Seth Lobato (Junior, Quarterback, 6-5, 235, Eaton, Colo./Colorado/Eaton HS)

Lobato completed 27-of-37 passes for 278 yards and two scores (zero interceptions) in a 56-28 setback at No. 15 Cal Poly. The 24 rushing yards for Lobato are the third-highest total in his career. A pure pocket passer, Lobato has thrown for over 200 yards in seven straight against Big Sky Conference opponents and in 10 of 11. It is also the 10th time in his career he's passed for over 250 yards. With the 278 yards, Lobato moved into the top 10 in Northern Colorado history with 3,980 yards (19 games/17 starts). At Cal Poly, Lobato also connected with nine different receivers, and has passed to 14 different players in 2012.

Team Notes: Marcell Peoples, Sawyere Monson and Robert Holland each caught passes in the game and Seth Lobato has now hit 14 different players in 2012. Monson's catch was the first of his career. Sophomore TE Sawyere Monson, junior RB Tomaine Dennis, sophomore DT Chris Urbaniak and junior DE Ryan Holmes all started the first games of their career. Junior WR Jace Davis extended his streak of multiple receptions to 20 straight games, while senior WR Dominic Gunn stretched his streak of at least one catch in a game to 11 straight. Tomaine Dennis scored his fifth rushing touchdown of the season in the first quarter, tying the 2011 team for total rushing touchdowns. Darin McDonald scored the first touchdown of his career in the first quarter. For the third-straight week, senior Mason Puckett has a career-long punt, this one going for 67-yards. Jace Davis scored his first touchdown of the season in the fourth quarter, the ninth of his career to tie for 19th all-time at Northern Colorado. Seth Lobato also had his first rushing touchdown of the season and the second of his career. Lobato ended the game with 24 net rushing yards, just the second time this year he's had positive yardage on the ground. Lobato extended his streak of throwing for at least 200 yards to seven-straight against Big Sky opponents. Lobato has also thrown for over 250 yards in seven of 11 games in league play. On Saturday, the junior threw for 278 – the tenth time in his career he's topped 250. Lobato also brought his career passing total to 3,980 yards, climbing one spot to tenth all-time, passing Nick Henkowski (1980-83) and he's just three yards shy of tying Tony Christensen (2002-04) for ninth at 3,983. Senior Dominic Gunn topped the 100-yard mark in all-purpose yards for the fourth time this season with 179 yards (63 receiving, 104 kickoff return, 12 punt return). The 12 punt return yards give him 613 in his career, moving him up one spot into fourth on the career charts at Northern Colorado. He passes Jeff Knabenshue (1986-87), who had 607. The 28 points scored by the Bears are tied for the most against a Big Sky team in Coach Collins career at Northern Colorado. On Oct. 1, 2011 the Bears also scored 28 at Montana. Gunn's 63 receiving yards push him over the 1,000 career mark, and he now has 1,017 yards on 84 catches. He is the second active player on the roster with 1,000 yards, joining Jace Davis, who now has 99 catches for 1,514 yards.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE UNIVERSITY (0-7, 0-5 RMAC)

Team Notes: The score was even for the first 25 minutes of the game between Western State and Western New Mexico. With 4:13 left in the first half Western New Mexico put seven points on the board. It was all they needed as the Mustangs defeated Western State by a score of 28-0 on Saturday in Gunnison. The first WNMU touchdown came off a Mitch Glasman 20 yard touchdown pass to Marquis Sumpter. The Glasman-Sumpter connection caused havoc for the Mountaineer secondary all day long. Of Glasman's 238 passing yards and three touchdown passes, Sumpter was responsible for 176 of those yards and all three of the touchdowns; including a 59 yard touchdown pass in the third quarter to make the score 21-0 in favor of the Mustangs. WSCU did have big games from their middle linebacker Jaden Terry and punter Dakota Swinehart. Terry came away with a game leading eight total tackles, seven of which were solo. Swinehart, a true freshman, had nine punts in the game and averaged over 40 yards per punt (41.2), with a long of 51. Mountaineer running back, Germaine Daniels (Sr., Miami, Fla.) carried the ball for 98 yards on 28 carries. Daniels is averaging a little over 90 yards per game in the first seven for WSCU. Quarterback Kyle Motal played the entire second half after Brian Duboski (Jr., Porterville, Calif) started the game. Motal finished the game with 98 passing yards on 22 attempts and nine completions. The Mountaineers will head south to Durango, Colo. for the next game at Fort Lewis.
