Bibbs ran for 291 yards and six touchdowns on Saturday at New Mexico. The 291 rushing yards are the third-most in a single-game in program history. After last weekend's

program-best 312-yard rushing performance vs. Nevada, Bibbs holds the No. 1 and 3 spot on the single-game rushing list. Bibbs' six rushing touchdowns are the most in a single-game in CSU history and the most by an FBS rusher this season. Furthermore, the six rushing touchdowns ties for the most in Mountain West history. The six rushing touchdowns set a sophomore conference record for single-game scores. Bibbs' 38 totes ties for seventh-most in a single-game among all FBS rushers this season. Bibbs now holds CSU single-season records for rushing touchdowns (25), total touchdowns (25) and points (144). Bibbs also set the Mountain West record for single-season rushing touchdowns with 25 passing Stephon Jefferson, who tallied 24 rushing touchdowns last season. After his 291-yard rushing performance at New Mexico, Bibbs jumped seven spots to No. 3 all time with 1,439 yards. Saturday marked Bibbs fifth-consecutive game with at least three rushing touchdowns and his sixth of the season.

2013 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (7-4, 5-4 RMAC)

Team Notes: Adams State finished their season with a win, defeating Colorado Mesa on the road, 19-17.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (5-6, 4-5 RMAC)

Team Notes: After winning four straight conference games, the Mavericks ended their season with four losses, including Saturday's home set back to Adams State, 19-17.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (8-3, 7-2 RMAC)

Kole Kadavy (Junior, Linebacker, 5-11, 205, Greeley, Colo./Greeley Central)

Kadavy led the defensive efforts for Mines during the squad's 23-0 victory over Chadron State on Saturday with five tackles, 0.5 tackle for loss and two pass break ups in addition to a 33-yard interception return for a touchdown to give the Orediggers a 10-0 lead in the second quarter. It the third defensive touchdown of Kadavy's career after scoring twice during the 2012 season.

Team Notes: Mines held Chadron State to just 262 yards of offense after the Eagles entered Saturday's contest averaging 506.3 yards per game. The biggest impact came on the Eagle's rushing attack, boasting Harlon Hill candidate Glen Clinton, who spearheaded the CSC 245.4 rushing average with 142.4 yards per game. The Oredigger defensive unit held CSC to 153 yards on the ground, including 94 by Clinton on 21 attempts. Mines picked off CSC quarterback Jonn McClain twice and forced another fumble, including a 33-yard pick-six by junior Kole Kadavy to start the second quarter which gave Mines a 10-0 lead. Senior Ryan Wood thwarted a hail mary attempt at halftime with an interception in the end zone and sophomore Billy Sprague pulled off a sack-fumble in early stages of the fourth quarter that was returned by Dallas Fields. Despite going 0-for-2 on fourth down attempts inside the CSC two yard line, Mines was able to put up 23 points and 369 yards of offense on 78 plays. The Orediggers showed great discipline in the matchup after committing just one penalty for five yards. Conversely, the Eagles were flagged 10 times for a total of 109 yards. Junior Matt Brown led the offense with 313 yards of total offense after finishing 22-of-34 for 233 yards through the air. He also added 80 rushing yards on 22 carries, including a six-yard touchdown run with 9:24 remaining in the second quarter to put Mines up 17-0. Senior Dan Palmer finished with 29 yards on 13 carries and will end his storied career with 2,407 yards – good for second in program history. He also finished his career with 236 career points to also finish second in program history for the category. Senior Tyler Denson went over 100 tackles for the second-straight season with 10 on Saturday for 103 on the season. Junior defensive back Ian McFadden led the squad with 11 tackles (six solo) and 0.5 tackle for loss and a pass break up. Sprague notched 10 stops, 1.0 sack, 1.5 tackle for loss and a forced fumble to close his season second on the team with 81 tackles. Senior Chad McGraw recorded seven stops, 1.5 tackle for loss, two pass break ups and a quarterback hurry, while Kadavy notched five stops, 0.5 tackle for loss, two pass break ups and the 33-yard pick six. Senior defensive linemen Jake Utley and Alex Laudenslager added five stops apiece, with Laudenslager adding a team-high 2.0 tackles for loss. Wood added five stops, a pass break up and an interception as well. Sophomore Jimmy Ellis, the leading receiver in the RMAC entering Saturday, added 12 catches for 103 yards while classmate Cole Spurgeon notched 85 yards on four catches. Senior Jordan Ward added 46 receiving yards on five catches in his final collegiate game. Sophomore Avery Llewellyn made all three of his field goal attempts (24, 27, 33) and punted once for 56 yards. The two-time RMAC Special Teams Player of the Week also notched two touchbacks on six kickoffs.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (6-5, 4-2 MWC)

Kapri Bibbs (Sophomore, Running Back, 5-11, 203, Plainfield, Ill./Snow College)

Bibbs ran for 291 yards and six touchdowns on Saturday at New Mexico. The 291 rushing yards are the third-most in a single-game in program history and tied for sixth-best rushing performance among FBS players this season. Furthermore, the six rushing touchdowns ties for the most in Mountain West history. Nevada's Stephon Jefferson scored six rushing touchdowns on Sept., 22, 2012 at Hawai'i. The six rushing touchdowns set a sophomore conference record for single-game scores. Bibbs' 38 totes ties for seventh-most in a single-game among all FBS rushers this season. Bibbs now holds CSU single-season records for rushing touchdowns (25), total touchdowns (25) and points (144). Calvin Branch set all three records in 1996. Bibbs also set the Mountain West record for single-season rushing touchdowns with 25 passing Stephon Jefferson, who tallied 24 rushing touchdowns last season. Bibbs is tied for first among all Mountain West rushers with three 200-yard rushing games this season. After 11 games Bibbs already ranks No. 5 all-time at CSU with 25 career rushing touchdowns. Bibbs now holds the Rams' single-season sophomore rushing record with 1,439 yards. The record was previously held by Kyle Bell who rushed for 1,288 yards in 2005. Entering Saturday Bibbs had the 10th-most single-season rushing yards in program history. After his 291-yard rushing performance at New Mexico, Bibbs jumped seven spots to No. 3 all time with 1,439 yards. Saturday marked Bibbs fifth-consecutive game with at least three rushing touchdowns and his sixth of the season. Bibbs is now one of four FBS running backs to rush for at least three rushing touchdowns in six games in a single season since 2000. The last FBS running back to accomplish this feat was current Denver Bronco Monte Ball, who did it for Wisconsin in 2011.

Team Notes: The Rams have recorded the most wins in a single-season since 2008 when Colorado State finished the season 7-6, including a victory over Fresno State in the New Mexico Bowl. 2013 marks the first time the Rams have won four of their first six conference games since 2005.

2013 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (11-0, 9-0 RMAC)

Chris Bonner (Junior, Quarterback, 6-7, 225, San Diego, Calif./Grossmont JC)

Bonner turned in his third career 300-yard game in the ThunderWolves' 38-13 RMAC-clinching win over Western State. In the game, he vaulted over previous record-holder Ross Dausin to become the ThunderWolves' top single-season passing yardage leader (now at 3,116). This season, Bonner has thrown 30 touchdowns, also a single season school record.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (4-7, 3-6 RMAC)

Broderick Sargent (Senior, Defensive End, 6-3, 245, Chesterfield, Mo./Colorado State/Parkway Central)

All eight tackles Sargent made in a 17-14 home loss to Black Hills State were solo stops. Five of the tackles went for a loss of 12 yards, including three sacks for a loss of eight yards.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (2-8, 0-6 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force did not play last week. They return to action Nov. 21 against Nevada-Las Vegas for a 7:30 p.m.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (4-6, 1-6 PAC-12)

Nelson Spruce (Sophomore, Wide Receiver, 6-1, 205, Westlake Village, Calif./Westake)

In Colorado's 41-24 win over California, Spruce caught eight passes for a career-best 140 yards, which also included the long reception of his career, a 62-yard catch and run from Sefo Liufau. On special teams, he returned an on-side kickoff 46 yards for a touchdown, the first on-side return for a score in CU history; he also had one punt return for 2 yards, but he fielded that in a 35 mile per hour gust and saved at least 20 yards of field position.

Team Notes: By improving to 3-2 at home this season, Colorado is now 300-159-10 in its 90th season playing its home games at Folsom Field. The first game at Folsom was Oct. 11, 1924 (then known as Colorado Stadium, built at a cost of \$75,000); previous, CU was 73-17-6 at Gamble Field and 19-5 on other grass areas of campus; the Buffs are 391-181-16 all-time at home. Colorado cut the Cal lead in the series to 4-3; the Buffs lead in Boulder, 3-2. The 41 points were the most by the Buffs in the series. CU is now 2-8 on the coin toss in 2013. Colorado is now 52-15 against unranked teams in November dating back to 1989. TE Sean Irwin made his first career start. The 21 second quarter points matched CU's high for a quarter this year (also in the fourth vs. Central Arkansas), and the 24 points were a first half high, as was its 324 total yards. The Buffs scored their first touchdown of the year in the last two minutes of the first half (came into the game outscored 56-3 in the final 2:00 of the first half).

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (1-10, 0-7 BSC)

Team Notes: Northern Colorado lost 24-7 at Northern Arizona. UNC will play their final game of the season against Cal Poly.

WESTERN STATE COLORADO UNIVERSITY (2-8, 2-6 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State fell at CSU-Pueblo Saturday afternoon, 38-13. The Mountaineers will play this Saturday in a make up game at Black Hills State.
