NO. 23 USC FOOTBALL GOES TO COLORADO FOR FINAL REGULAR SEASON ROAD TRIP

FACTS

USC (8-3 overall, 5-2 Pac-12 South) vs. Colorado (4-6 overall, 1-6 Pac-12 South), Saturday, Nov. 23, 7:30 p.m. MT/6:30 p.m. PT, Folsom Field, Boulder, Colo.

THEMES

No. 23 USC, back in the national polls after a dramatic last-minute victory over No. 5 Stanford, now takes its final regular season road trip of 2013 when it visits Colorado. The revitalized Trojans, who have won their last 4 overall games and past 5 Pac-12 contests, are now 5-1 under interim head coach Ed Orgeron. USC and CU have played only 7 times in history (Troy has never lost to the Buffaloes). This is the latest date that any team from the Pacific Time Zone has visited Boulder, where it could be quite chilly this Saturday night. It is USC's eighth night game of 2013. The Trojans possess a fairly balanced offense and one of the game's best defenses. QB **Cody Kessler** has hit 75% of his passes over the past 3 games, with key targets being 2012 Biletnikoff Award winner WR Marqise Lee (owner of 24 USC records) and WR **Nelson Agholor** (also a dangerous returner). The run game features TBs Javorius Allen (7 TDs in the last 3 games), Tre Madden and Silas Redd. USC's defense continues to be in the national Top 25 in total defense, rushing defense, scoring defense, pass efficiency defense, sacks, tackles for loss, interceptions, red zone defense and third down conversion defense. That Trojan defense (which played only 2 subs last week) features DEs Leonard Williams, Ss Dion Bailey and Su'a Cravens, OLB Devon Kennard, LB Hayes Pullard and CB Josh Shaw. Colorado, under new head coach Mike MacIntyre, also is coming off a big victory, as its home win over California last week snapped a 14-game Pac-12 losing streak. The Buffaloes feature one of the nation's premier pass catchers in WR Paul Richardson. He owns school records for receptions and receiving yards in a game. True freshman QB Sefo Liufau took over the CU offense mid-season and has been effective. Colorado's defense has struggled, as it ranks in the nation's bottom 25 in total defense, scoring defense and rushing defense. LB Addison Gillam, just a freshman, and S Parker Orms are among the national leaders in tackles, while CB Greg Henderson ranks high in deflections and interceptions. PK Will Oliver is 13th in the country in field goals. The game will be shown live nationally on Pac-12 Networks.

RANKINGS

USC is ranked 23rd in the AP poll and 25th by USA Today. Colorado is not ranked in either poll.

SERIES

USC has won all 7 of its meetings with Colorado, including going 3-0 in Boulder encounters, and has outscored the Buffaloes in those 7 contests, 230-47.

Last year in the Coliseum, QB Matt Barkley and WR Robert Woods had record-setting performances as No. 11 USC manhandled Colorado, 50-6. The win kept the Trojans perfect in 7 meetings against the Buffaloes. Barkley threw a USC single game record-tying 6 touchdown passes, including a school record-tying 5 in the first half, to become the Pac-12's career TD pass recordholder (102, breaking Matt Leinart's mark of 99). He completed 95.0% of his passes (19-of-20, with a drop on the incompletion) to set the Pac-12 game mark for highest completion percentage (minimum 20 attempts), just .8% shy of the NCAA record. His passing efficiency rating of 319.2 also broke the Pac-12 game standard. He threw for 298 yards overall and was 16-of-17 for 269 yards in the first half. Woods, midway through his junior season, set the USC career receptions record (220, breaking Dwayne Jarrett's mark of 216) and the school single game TD catch record (4, tying the Pac-12 record). He had 8 receptions for 132 yards. USC jumped out to a 19-0 lead 6 minutes into the contest. Barkley

FUN FACT I

This Nov. 23 USC-Colorado game marks the latest date that any team from the Pacific Time Zone has visited Boulder. Stanford played Colorado in Denver on Nov. 25, 1904 (a 33-0 win by the Buffaloes).

FUN FACT II

Fifty years ago this Saturday, in 1963, USC's Nov. 23 game against UCLA was postponed a week because of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy the previous day.

FUN FACT II

Both USC and Colorado have a player on the 2013 roster named Alex Wood (USC's sophomore placekicker from Mercer Island, Wash., and CU's senior tight end from Steamboat Springs, Colo.).

FUN FACT IV

In its history, USC has had only 11 lettermen hail from Colorado, including 4 from Boulder's Fairview High in CU's backyard (ILB Joe Barry lettered in 1992-93, OT Tony Boselli in 1991-94, C Chris Foote in 1977-79 and FB-TB Scott Lockwood in 1987-88 and 1990-91). The other Trojan Coloradoans: T Ward Bond in 1928-30, FB Rory Brown in 1990 and 1992-93, OG-C Jeff Byers in 2004 and 2007-09, CB-S Brian Kelly in 1994-97, WR Ryan Lenderman in 1993-94, OG-OT Butch Lewis in 2007-10 and TB LenDale White in 2003-05. Of those, 4 were members of USC national championship squads (Bond in 1928, Foote in 1978, Byers in 2004 and White in 2003-04), Boselli was a 2time All-American first teamer, 6 played in the NFL (Boselli, Byers, Foote, Kelly, Lockwood and White), Lewis was on NFL practice squads and Barry is an NFL assistant coach. Bond became an actor best known for his role in "Wagon Train."

threw a 55-yard scoring pass on the game's second play to WR Marqise Lee, who had 6 catches for 103 yards. After S Drew McAllister picked off a CU pass in the end zone on the ensuing possession, Troy marched 80 yards in 4 plays, capped by a 39-yard Barkley-to-Woods TD toss. McAllister recovered a fumble deep in Colorado territory on the Buffaloes' next play and Barkley found TE Xavier Grimble for an 8yard TD 2 plays later. Colorado got its only points on a pair of PK Will Oliver field goals (27 and 37 yards) in a 3-minute span in the first and second quarters (the second one coming after a Troian fumble). Then Barkley connected with Woods for another 3 TDs, the first one for 29 yards as Barkley passed Leinart's record, then the second one for 17 yards midway through the second quarter as Woods eclipsed Jarrett's record to put USC up 33-6 at halftime and the third for 3 yards early in the second half that sent most of the Trojan starters to the bench. USC added fourth quarter scores on a 24-yard TD pass from QB Max Wittek to TB D.J. Morgan (the first career touchdowns for both players) and a 37-yard field goal by PK Andre Heidari. USC's 7 TD passes in the game was a school standard. Morgan ran for 52 yards on 10 carries. USC had 458 total yards (340 passing), averaging 9.5 yards per play, to CU's 351 total yards even though the Buffaloes had the ball nearly 15 more minutes (37:10) while running 85 plays to USC's 48 and had more first downs (25 to 22). USC's 48 plays were its fewest since getting 48 against Arizona in 1981 and its 22:50 possession time was its least since the 2005 Notre Dame game (21:20). USC had 5 sacks and came up with 6 turnovers (besides McAllisters', LB Tony Burnett and S Gerald Bowman had picks and DE Kevin Greene and LB Will Andrew recovered fumbles), including 3 in the red zone. The Trojans were penalized 9 times. LB Anthony Sarao posted a game-best 9 tackles. For Colorado, QB Jordan Webb was 18-of-35 for 210 yards and TB Christian Powell ran for 56 yards on 14 tries. It was USC's 300th October victory. The Stanley Cup won by the Los Angeles Kings in 2012 was displayed during an on-field presentation.

In 2011 in the teams' last meeting in Boulder, QB Matt Barkley threw a schoolrecord 6 touchdown passes to lead No. 21 USC to an overwhelming 42-17 win over new Pac-12 member Colorado on a cold (high 30s/low 40s) Friday night. The victory kept the Trojans undefeated in 6 tries against the Buffaloes. After Colorado scored on the game's opening series (a 37-yard pass from QB Tyler Hansen to WR Toney Clemons), Barkley threw 4 TDs in the first half (a 33yarder to WR Margise Lee midway through the opening quarter, a 5-yarder to TE Xavier Grimble at the top of the second quarter, a 15-yarder to WR Robert Woods midway through the second quarter and a 25yarder to Lee late in the half). Colorado got a 30-yard field goal by PK Will Oliver to pull within 28-10 right before halftime. Barkley hit Woods on a 45-yard TD late in the third quarter and then, after Hansen connected with Clemons on a 10-yard score early in the fourth quarter, Barkley broke the school record with a 19-yard scoring screen pass to TB Amir Carlisle. Barkley was 25-of-39 for 318 yards but threw an interception, Woods (130 yards) and Lee (124 yards) each caught 9 passes, Carlisle ran for a gamehigh 90 yards on 10 carries off the bench, TB

Curtis McNeal added 87 yards on 10 carries in his first career start and TB D.J. Morgan had 56 yards on 9 tries. CB Isiah Wiley led USC with 5 tackles. TE Rhett Ellison and TE Randall Telfer each blocked a field goal. For Colorado, Hansen hit 17-of-37 passes for 250 yards, TB Rodney Stewart ran for 88 yards on 21 carries and caught 6 passes for 67 yards and Clemons had 5 receptions for 112 yards. USC had decisive margins in first downs (31 to 19), total yards (561 to 384) and plays (72 to 62) while holding the ball for 32:42. CU converted just 5-of-14 third downs. USC started 4 true freshmen (Lee, OG Marcus Martin and LBs Lamar Dawson and Tre Madden), plus PK Andre Heidari. It was the first time ever that USC started 3 freshmen linebackers (redshirt frosh LB Hayes Pullard joined Dawson and Madden). It was USC's first Friday game since 1999 and Colorado's first-ever Friday home game.

VERSUS PAC-12

USC has won 70.1% (434-177-29) of its games against Pac-12 opponents (not including 9 wins later vacated due to NCAA penalty; original record: 443-177-29, 70.5%).

IN NOVEMBER

USC has a 245-127-20 (.651) all-time record while playing in the month of November. (This does not include 3 wins vacated due to NCAA penalty; original record: 248-127-20, .653.)

AT NIGHT

USC owns a 151-45-4 (.765) record at night (after 5 p.m.), including 89-24-4 in the Coliseum, 49-17 on the road and 13-4 at neutral sites. (Does not include 5 wins and 1 loss vacated due to NCAA penalty; original records: 156-46-4, .767 overall; 92-4-4 Coliseum; 15-5 neutral.) This USC-Colorado game will be the Trojans' eighth night game of 2013 (Troy's 10 night contests in 2010 are a school record).

COLD/RAIN/SNOW

USC is 9-8-1 in "cold weather" games (defined as where the cold temperature had such an impact on the game that it was mentioned in the media's game recaps). The last time USC played a "cold weather" game was at Notre Dame in 2013 (a 14-10 USC loss when it was in the mid-40s). USC has a 21-23-2 record in games in which it rained during a major portion of the contest. USC's last rain game was at UCLA in 2012 (USC lost, 38-28). The last time USC played in snow was Nov. 30, 1957 at Notre Dame (the Irish won, 40-12). It was 20 degrees. The 1965 USC-Notre Dame game in South Bend was played in sleet and rain (the Irish won that one, 28-7).

CONNECTIONS

USC has no players from Colorado, while the Buffaloes have 47 players from California...USC C-OG Abe Markowitz's cousin is former Colorado offensive guard Maxwell Tuioti-Mariner...USC graduate assistant/special teams Jaron Fairman was an assistant at Western State College (now Wester State Colorado University) in 2011...Colorado offensive line coach Gary Bernardi was an assistant at USC from 1987 to 1992...USC assistant sports information director Darcy Couch is a 2000 graduate of Colorado.

SCHEDULF.

The Trojans play seven home games in the Coliseum in 2013. Overall, USC's 13-game schedule features seven teams that played in a bowl this year (all won at least 8 games) and four that finished ranked in the final AP Top 25. Four opponents are guided by new coaches. USC plays twice on Thursday nights, including once at home, and one time on Friday night. The Trojans will not play Pac-12 foes Oregon or Washington in the regular season in 2013 or 2014. USC opened its 2013 slate with a Thursday night road game on Aug. 29 against Norm Chow's Hawaii team, the fourth time that the Trojans opened a season facing the Rainbow Warriors in Honolulu's Aloha Stadium. Troy then began Pac-12 play by hosting Washington State on Sept. 7, the first of three consecutive home games for the Trojans. USC then welcomed a pair of squads that last visited the Coliseum in the 1980s: Boston College with new head coach Steve Addazio on Sept. 14 and defending Western Athletic Conference champion Utah State and new coach Matt Wells on Sept. 21. The Trojans returned to Pac-12 action at Arizona State on Sept. 28, then had a bye before hosting Arizona in a Thursday night contest on Oct. 10, the firstever non-Thanksgiving or non-bowl Thursday game USC has played in the Coliseum (the last time USC played a weekday game at home was the 2002 opener against Auburn on Labor Day). USC next traveled to BCS Championship Game participant Notre Dame on Oct. 19 for its annual intersectional clash before returning home to host Utah on Oct. 26 on Trojan Family Weekend. The Trojans then went to Oregon State for a Friday night game on Nov. 1, the first of three road trips in a fourgame span. After visiting California, guided by new coach Sonny Dykes, on Nov. 9, USC returned to the Coliseum to play defending Pac-12 champ Stanford on Nov. 16 on Homecoming/Reunion Weekend before going to Colorado (under new coach Mike MacIntyre) on Nov. 23. Troy concludes its regular season by hosting crosstown rival UCLA in a Thanksgiving weekend battle on Nov. 30.

LAST GAME

PK Andre Heidari kicked a 47-yard field goal with 19 seconds to play to give USC a 20-17 victory over No. 5 Stanford in front of a national ABC-TV audience and a loud soldout Coliseum Homecoming crowd of 93,607 that stormed the field at the game's conclusion. The win snapped the Cardinal's 4-game winning streak over Troy, Stanford's longest in the series. It was USC's first game against a ranked opponent in 2013 and its first victory over a ranked foe since beating No. 4 Oregon in 2011. After S Su'a Cravens picked off a pass from Stanford QB Kevin Hogan near midfield with 3:02 to play, the Trojans took 10 plays (including converting on fourth-and-2 at the Cardinal 48) to set up Heidari's heroics, USC's first game-winning last minute field goal since David Bell did so at UCLA in 2000. USC scored on each of its first 3 drives, as a 1yard touchdown pass from QB Cody Kessler to FB Soma Vainuku and a 1-yard TD run by TB Javorius Allen sandwiched Stanford RB Tyler Gaffney's 35-yard scoring run in the first quarter and then Heidari added a 23yard field goal early in the second quarter to give the Trojans a 17-7 lead. But Stanford

got a 27-yard field goal from PK Conrad Ukropina right before halftime and then drove 92 yards on 10 plays on its first possession of the second half to tie the game at 17-17 on Gaffney's 18-yard TD run. The Cardinal then twice got into the red zone, but OT Chad Wheeler blocked a 30-yard Ukropina field goal try late in the third quarter after Stanford had recovered a USC fumble at the USC 19 and then S Dion Bailey intercepted a Hogan pass early in the fourth quarter after the Cardinal drove to the USC 10. Only 23 of USC's 311 total yards came on the ground, its fewest rushing yards since getting 1 yard against Utah in the 2001 Las Vegas Bowl and the fewest rushing yards in a victory since getting 23 in 1998 against Arizona State. Stanford managed just 337 yards (210 rushing) against a Trojan defense that used just 2 substitutes (1 played just 1 snap). USC was just 4-of-14 on third downs and Stanford was only 4-of-12. Kessler was 25-of-37 for 288 yards, while WR Nelson Agholor caught a game-best 8 passes for 104 yards and WR Marqise Lee added 6 receptions for 83 yards. LB Anthony Sarao had a game-best 12 tackles, while LB Hayes Pullard added 11 stops. For Stanford, Gaffney ran for 158 yards on 24 carries and Hogan hit 14-of-25 passes for 127 yards. ESPN's College GameDay pre-game show made its 10th visit to USC, but it was the first time it emanated from the USC campus (McCarthy Quad).

125[™] ANNIVERSARY OF USC ATHLETICS

USC is celebrating its 125th anniversary of athletics, with the first football team dating to 1888. Since then, USC football has won 11 national championships and 31 bowls and has produced 160 All-American first teamers, 6 Heisman Trophy winners, 462 NFL players and 22 Academic All-American first teamers. USC athletics, currently fielding 21 men's and women's sports, claims 120 national team championships, unprecedented 419 Olympians and 52 NCAA Postgraduate Scholars. At each home football game during the 2013 season, alumni from USC's various sports will have pre-game reunions and will be saluted during an on-field ceremony (student-athlete alumni can get more information at usctrojans.com/reunions). A commemorative 125th anniversary logo has been produced and will be included on merchandise and graphics. WePlay125, an award-winning all-sports marketing and branding campaign, will be conducted on USC's various distribution platforms, including on billboards, videoboards, print ads and athletic department publications, as well as on TV and radio commercials and Trojan websites and social media. The iconic WePlay logo features cardinalcolored letters W, E, P and Y and goldcolored L and A emblazoned atop stylized photos of USC athletes and moments. The 125th anniversary also will serve as a centerpiece for the USC athletic department's \$300 million fundraising drive called the "Heritage Initiative." Funds raised for the initiative—the most ambitious in the department's history—will support capital projects, annual scholarships for student-athletes, academic support and programming costs, endowments, and recruitment and retention of coaches and staff. Among the capital projects are the renovation of Heritage Hall and the construction of the Uytengsu Aquatics Center, both of which are expected to be completed this January following last year's opening of the state-of-the-art John McKay Center (the JMC houses meeting rooms, coaches offices and a locker room for the football program, as well as the Stevens Academic Center for USC's studentathletes, a weight room, an athletic training room and a digital media production facility for all of USC's sports). The "Heritage Initiative" is part of the university's overall \$6 billion fundraising campaign. John Robinson, one of USC's most popular and successful football coaches, and Barbara Hedges, who developed the USC women's athletics program during her tenure as a Trojan athletics administrator, serve as cochairs of the "Heritage Initiative."

90[™] ANNIVERSARY OF PLAYING IN COLISEUM The 2013 season marks the 90[™] anniversary of USC's first season playing in the Coliseum. USC has played football in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum—one of the world's greatest, largest and most historic athletic facilities—ever since the grand stadium was built in 1923. The Trojans played in the first varsity football game ever held there, beating Pomona College, 23-7, on Oct. 6, 1923. That game was preceded that day by the USC freshman team's 30-0 win over Santa Ana High.

USC SCHOLARSHIP NUMBERS

USC is in the second of a 3-year NCAA sanction that limits its overall roster to 75 scholarship players annually and no more than 15 signees per year, both 10 fewer than the NCAA maximum. The 2013 Trojans have only 74 players on scholarship; of those, 12 are sidelined for the season with injuries (WRs George Farmer and Steven Mitchell, DE Greg Townsend Jr., CB Devian Shelton, OT Zach Banner, OG-OT Jordan Simmons, OT-OG David Garness, LB Lamar Dawson, S Gerald Bowman, TBs Justin Davis and D.J. Morgan and OLB Morgan Breslin), another player must sit out this season after transferring (DE Delvon Simmons) and 4 are former longtime walk-on seniors who were awarded scholarships after 2013 fall camp (TB John Akiba, S John Auran, WR Cody **Skene**, LB **Kyle Yatabe**). That means that the current USC roster has 57 available recruited scholarship players (of those 57, 5 true freshmen are redshirting). For its 2013 opener at Hawaii, the Trojans traveled just 59 recruited scholarship players and, of those, just 52 were available to play (not injured or redshirting); 50 of them played in the game. Forty-four scholarship Trojans played versus Washington State, 51 against Boston College and 43 versus Utah State. USC traveled to Arizona State with only 55 recruited scholarship players (of those, just 50 played). Forty-four scholarship Trojans played against Arizona. Fifty-six recruited scholarship players traveled to Notre Dame (47 played). Only 52 recruited scholarship players were available for the Utah game and 41 played. At Oregon State, USC had just 45 recruited scholarship players available (of the 68 Trojans who traveled, 14 were walk-ons, 3 were non-recruited scholarship players, 4 were redshirting true freshmen on scholarship and 2 were scholarship players who didn't suit up) and 41 played. At California, Troy had 47 recruited scholarship players available (68 Trojans traveled, of whom 15 were walkons, 3 were non-recruited scholarship players, 4 were redshirting scholarship true frosh and 1 was a scholarship player who didn't suit up) and 45 played. Forty-three scholarship Trojans played against Stanford (USC used only 2 substitutes on defense and 1 of those played only 1 snap).

ORGERON NAMED INTERIM HEAD COACH

On Sept. 29 (5 games into the 2013 season), Lane Kiffin was relieved of his duties as USC's head football coach. In his 4 years at USC, Kiffin was 28-15, but his Trojans had lost 7 of their last 11 games, including a 62-41 loss at Arizona State the day before his firing that left Troy with a 3-2 overall mark this season and 0-2 in Pac-12 play. Assistant head coach/recruiting coordinator/defensive line coach Ed Orgeron was named USC's interim head coach. He is 5-1 guiding the Trojans in 2013 (the loss was by just 4 points).

This is Orgeron's 11th overall season at USC (1998-2004, 2010-13), including being on the staff of Troy's 2003 and 2004 national championship teams, and his 29th overall year as a coach. He was Mississippi's head coach for 3 years (2005-07), going 10-25.

COACHING STAFF

The USC coaching staff was reconstructed in the 2013 off-season, as 4 new assistants were hired and roles were re-defined for some of the others. Clancy Pendergast, who coordinated some of the top defenses in the NFL and college (the past 3 seasons at California), is the new defensive coordinator and coaches the secondary. His recent experience in the Pac-12 was viewed as valuable when combatting the many styles of offense seen in the league. Mike Summers, who helped produce some of the most productive offenses in the history of schools such as Arkansas, Louisville, Kentucky, Oregon State and Ohio, is the running game coordinator and offensive line coach. Tommie Robinson, another veteran collegiate and NFL coach (most recently with the Arizona Cardinals), is the passing game coordinator and running backs coach. Mike Ekeler, who helped turn out defenses that ranked among the nation's best while at Oklahoma, LSŪ and Nebraska, coaches the linebackers after serving as Indiana's co-defensive coordinator the past 2 seasons. Of the returning coaches, quarterbacks coach Clay Helton takes on the offensive coordinator duty (he will call plays now that Kiffin has been fired). Associate head coach/special teams coordinator John Baxter has added tight ends to his duties. James Cregg works with Summers coaching the offensive line. Assistant head coach Ed Orgeron remains in his role as recruiting coordinator/defensive line coach and was named interim head coach when Kiffin was let go, while Tee Martin remains as the wide receivers coach. Graduate assistant Ross Cummings now works with the outside linebackers and he is joined by new grad assistants Jon Farmerie (secondary), Kyle Williams (secondary) and Jaron Fairman (special teams). Longtime college and NFL assistant coach Pete Jenkins joined the staff as a defensive line assistant coach in early October of 2013 upon Kiffin's firing.

OFFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Eight starters returned on offense from 2012: wide receiver Margise Lee, tailback Silas Redd, co-starting tight ends Xavier Grimble and Randall Telfer, tackle Kevin Graf, guard John Martinez, center-guard Marcus Martin, guard-tackle Aundrey Walker and guardtackle-center Max Tuerk (they shared 2012 starts) and fullback Soma Vainuku. Others back with starting experience are wide receiver Nelson Agholor, quarterback Max Wittek, tailbacks D.J. Morgan and Tre Madden, fullback Jahleel Pinner and center-guardd Cyrus Hobbi and Abe Markowitz. USC's top rusher (and 7 of its top 9 ground gainers) and leading pass catcher (and 11 of the 13 players who caught a pass) from 2012 are back. USC averaged 32 points and 432 yards of total offense per game in 2012, numbers that were just slightly lower than those from its 10-win season of 2011. Troy was ranked in the national Top 41 in passing efficiency (147.7), passing offense (282.3), total offense (432.9), scoring offense (32.1) and sacks allowed (1.3) in 2012. But the Trojans struggled on third down conversions (34.2%) and in the red zone (74.5%) last season and had 34 turnovers, all areas where improvement is needed.

QUARTERBACKS

USC's most pressing challenge in 2012 was replacing the play and leadership of 4-year starting quarterback Matt Barkley, the Pac-12 career recordholder for total offense (12,214), passing yards (12,327), completions (1,001) and touchdown passes (116). He set 20 USC career, season and game records (10 were Pac-12 standards). Last fall, he completed 63.6% of his passes for 3,273 yards and 36 TDs. USC's first-ever 3time captain, he won the 2012 Wuerffel Trophy (athletics/academics/community service) and was a National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete. He was an NFL fourth round draft selection. Three young signalcallers competed for the starting job going into 2013: sophomores Cody Kessler (178-of-275, 64.7%, 2,265 yds, 13 TD, 6 int in 2013, plus 1 rush TD) and Max Wittek (13-of-24, 54.2%, 190 yds, 1 int in 2013, plus 1 rush TD) and first-year freshman Max **Browne**. Wittek started USC's final 2 games of 2012 when Barkley was sidelined with a shoulder injury, acquitting himself well against Notre Dame but struggling in the cold and wind in the Sun Bowl versus Georgia Tech. Kessler, who was the holder on placekicks in the second half of 2012, appeared briefly in 2 games last season. After sharing the job for USC's first 2 games of 2013, Kessler was named the starter. Kessler has hit 74.7% of his passes (56-of-75) in the past 3 games. Prep All-American Browne, who graduated high school a semester early so he could enroll at USC this spring, was the 2012 Gatorade National Player of the Year and USA Today's Offensive National Player of the Year as he led Skyline to a pair of Washington state championships and set state career records for passing yards (12,953) and completions (882) while competing 70.4% of his passes for 146 TDs. Also available are a trio of walkons in juniors Anthony Neyer, who was a walk-on at USC in 2010 and 2011 before going briefly to Los Angeles Pierce JC and Idaho and then returning to Troy in the fall of 2013, and Chris Willson (1 rec, 5 yds, 5.0 avg in 2013, plus 1 KOR, 7 yds, 7.0 avg), who transferred from Wake Forest and is eligible to compete this season per an NCAA waiver (he also can play tight end, where he most likely would be used) and redshirt freshman Conner Sullivan, who has also played baseball at USC.

—Kessler made his first career start and was 10-of-19 for 95 yards with a TD and an interception at <u>Hawaii</u>, while Wittek took over on the second series of the second half and was 5-of-10 for 77 yards.

—Kessler started against <u>Washington State</u> and was 8-of-13 for 41 yards with an interception and he also had a 4-yard scoring bootleg run, while Wittek played the entire second half and was 3-of-8 for 13 yards with a pick.

—Kessler started against <u>Boston College</u> and completed 15-of-17 passes (88.2%) for 237 yards and 2 TDs (with an 80-yarder), hitting 14 consecutive passes at one point, while Wittek played most of the fourth quarter, connecting on both of his pass attempts and running for a 2-yard TD.

Kessler completed 13-of-26 passes for 164 yards, with a 30-yard TD, against <u>Utah State</u>.

—Kessler was 20-of-29 for 295 yards with 2 TDs and 2 interceptions at <u>Arizona State</u>.

—Kessler was 15-of-30 for a career-high 297 yards with 2 long TDs (62 and 63 yards) against Arizona.

-Kessler was 20-of-34 for 201 yards with an interception at Notre Dame.

-Kessler was 21-of-32 (a season best for completions) for 230 yards with a 30-yard TD pass against <u>Utah</u>.

-Kessler hit 81.0% of his passes (17-of-21) for 247 yards with a TD (71 yards) and an interception at Oregon State.

-Kessler hit 82.3% of his passes (14-of-17) for 170 yards and 2 TDs (12 and 57 yards) at <u>California</u>, while Wittek play the game's final 24 minutes and was 3-of-4 for 73 yards.

-Kessler was 25-of-37 (67.6%), a season best for completions and attempts, for 288 yards with a short TD toss against Stanford.

TAILBACKS

Although Curtis McNeal, who accumulated 1,739 career rushing yards (including 701 last year) while starting 12 times (8 in 2012), is gone, USC is well-stocked at the tailback position. Returning is veteran senior Silas Redd (76 tcb, 351 yds, 4.6 avg, 1 TD in 2013, plus 10 rec, 45 yds, 4.5 avg, 1 TD), who started 6 games last fall after transferring from Penn State. He has run for 2,934 yards in his career at both schools, including 12 career 100-yard rushing games (5 at USC, with 2 in 2013). He was slowed early in the 2013 campaign with a knee injury, not seeing his first action until the sixth game. Emerging as the starter going into 2013 was highpotential soph Tre Madden (134 tcb, 682 yds, 5.1 avg, 3 TD in 2013, plus 15 rec, 201 yds, 13.4 avg, 4 TD and 0-of-1 passing, 00.0%, 1 int), who was switched from linebacker to tailback in 2012 spring practice and was very impressive before suffering a knee injury that sidelined him last fall. Madden has 4 100-yard rushing outings in 2013. He was the first Trojan to open a season with 3 consecutive 100-yard rushing games since Marcus Allen had 11 straight to open his 1981 Heisman Trophy season. Besides Madden and Allen (he also did so in the first 9 games in 1980), the only other Trojans to open a season with 3 consecutive 100-yard rushing games were Charles White (first 3 in 1978), Ricky Bell (first 5 in 1976), O.J. Simpson (first 5 in 1968), Mike Garrett (first 5 in 1965) and Don Williams (first 3 in 1928). The last Trojan with 3 consecutive 100-yard rushing games was Reggie Bush in 2005 (5 in a row, games 2 to 6), but those stats were later vacated due to NCAA penalty: revised: LenDale White (3 in a row in 2005, games 3 to 5). Madden's 4 receiving touchdowns are the most by a Trojan running back since fullback Stanley Havili had 5 in 2007 and the most by a USC tailback since Reggie Bush had 7 in 2004. A hamstring injury slowed him a bit during the middle of 2013. Sophomore Javorius Allen (67 tcb, 431 yds, 6.4 avg, 8 TD in 2013, plus 12 rec, 165 yds, 13.8 avg, 1 TD and 2 tac) and junior D.J. Morgan, also a hurdler on the Trojan track team who started twice at tailback in 2011 (he is out for the season with a knee injury), add quality depth. Allen has scored 7 touchdowns in the past 3 games (6 on the ground) and 4 of them have been at least 43 yards. Joining the tailback fray as freshmen were a pair of prep All-Americans in Justin Davis (53 tcb, 361 yds, 6.8 avg, 6 TD in 2013, plus 1 rec, 7 yds, 7.0 avg), who enrolled at USC this past spring after graduating a semester early from high school and participated in spring drills (he was impressive), and Ty Isaac (22 tcb, 146 yds, 6.6 avg in 2013, plus 1 rec, 1 yd, 1.0 avg), who came aboard in the fall. Davis, however, is out for the season with an ankle injury. Senior John Akiba (4 tcb, 21 yds, 5.3

avg in 2013), who missed 2013 spring ball after having shoulder surgery, is a one-time walk-on who earned a scholarship in the fall of 2013. There also is a trio of walk-on tailbacks: junior Alec Jaffe, sophomore Taylor Ross, who sat out of 2013 spring practice while recuperating from surgery on a fractured foot (he is now out for the season with a knee injury), and first-year freshman James Toland.

-Madden made his first career start at tailback and responded with 109 yards on 18 carries (he also caught a 10-yard pass) at <u>Hawaii</u>, while Davis added 74 yards on 14 rushes with a 3-yard TD, Allen had 18 yards on 4 tries and Issac had a 4-yard run.

-Madden rushed for 151 yards on 32 carries against <u>Washington State</u> to become the first Trojan to open a season with back-to-back 100-yard rushing outings since Marcus Allen did so in his 1981 Heisman Trophy campaign (his 32 carries were the most by a Trojan since Sultan McCullough had 39 against California in 2001), while Davis added 2 yards

-Madden ran for 102 yards on 16 carries against <u>Boston College</u> (the first Trojan to open a season with 3 consecutive 100-yard games since Marcus Allen in 1981) and scored touchdowns on a 30-yard run and 5-yard reception, while Davis added 96 yards on 10 carries with a 17-yard TD, Allen had 45 yards on 8 carries and Isaac had 18 yards on 3 tries.

–Madden had his 100-yard rushing streak snapped against <u>Utah State</u>, as he ran for 93 yards on 24 carries (with a short TD) and he also got 3 passes for 15 yards, while Davis added 17 yards on 6 , carries and Allen had a tackle.

-Madden had a game-high 8 rushing yards on 20 carries (with a 24-yard TD) and caught 3 passes for 64 yards with 2 TDs (10 and 48 yards) at <u>Arizona</u> State (he also threw an interception out of the Wildcat formation), while Davis added 122 yards on 10 carries with 3 TDs (26, 15 and 58 yards)

-Redd had a team-best 80 yards on 19 carries against <u>Arizona</u> in his first action of the year after having a pre-season knee injury (he had 7 consecutive carries, getting 3 first downs, to run out the clock when the Wildcats pulled within a touchdown), while Davis added 38 yards on 9 carries (with an 11-yard TD), Allen had 37 yards on 6 tries with a pair of TDs (1 and 4 yards) along with 2 catches for 6 yards and a tackle, Isaac had 36 yards on 3 rushes and Madden had 28 yards on 5 carries and caught a 63-yard TD before being sidelined with a hamstring injury in the second half.

-Redd had a game-best 112 yards on 19 carries, with a short TD, plus a 6-yard catch at <u>Notre</u> <u>Dame</u>, while Allen haḋ 20 yarðs on 7 carries, Davis had 12 yards on 2 carries and caught a 7-yard pass and Isaac had a 1-yard carry.

-Madden had a game-high 60 yards on 12 carries and a 3-yard catch against <u>Utah</u>, while Allen added 2 yards on 2 carries with a 3-yard catch and Redd had 0 yards on 10 carries along with 5 receptions for 15 yards.

-Redd had 140 yards on 22 carries and 3 catches for 12 yards at <u>Oregon State</u>, while Allen had a career-high 133 yards on 16 carries with a career-best 3 TDs (9, 18 and 52 yards) plus he caught 4 passes for 41 yards, Madden had a carry for no yards and Isaac had 2 carries for minus 2 yards and caught a 1-yard pass.

—Ällen averaged 22.5 yards per carry and 27.4 per touch as he ran for 135 yards on just 6 carries (the most yards ever on the road by a Trojan with 6 or fewer carries and the most anywhere since 1954) with a pair of long TDs (43 and 79 yards) and had a 57yard TD reception at <u>California</u>, while Isaac had 87 yards on 11 carries with 2 TDs (4 and 37 yards), Akiba had 21 yards on 4 carries and Redd had 19 yards on 6 carries and a 12-yard TD catch before being sidelined with a knee injury.

-Allen ran for 26 yards on 16 carries and caught 4 passes for 58 yards against <u>Stanford</u>, while Madden had 11 yards on 6 carries and he caught a pass for 0 yards and Isaac had a 2-yard run.

FULLBACKS

USC's fullback corps is thin and young, but it is experienced. Sophomores Soma Vainuku (7 rec, 63 yds, 9.0 avg, 1 TD in 2013, plus 1 PR, 3 yds, 3.0 avg and 11 tac and 2 BLK P) and Jahleel Pinner (6 rec, 29 yds, 4.8 avg in 2013, plus 1 KOR, 1 yd, 1.0 avg), used primarily as blockers so far, both notched starts last year. Then there is first-year freshman walk-on Pat Hart. Senior Simione Vehikite, who mainly has played linebacker in his USC career, can also be used at fullback.

—Pinner had a catch for 5 yards at <u>Hawaii</u> and Vainuku made 2 tackles on special teams.

-Vainuku had a tackle against Washington

-Vainuku had a 14-yard reception and a tackle against Boston College, while Pinner had an 11-yard catch.

—Pinner had 2 receptions for 6 yards at Arizona State and Vainuku had a 2-yard catch.

–Vainuku had a tackle and blocked a punt against Arizona.

-Vainuku had 2 catches for 16 yards at Notre Dame and Pinner had a 3-yard catch.

—Vainuku had 2 tackles against <u>Utah</u>.

–Pinner caught a 4-yard pass at <u>Oregon State</u> and Vainuku had 2 tackles.

–Vainuku caught a 15-yard pass, made a tackle and blocked a punt that was returned for a TD (he was credited with a 3-yard punt return) at California, while Pinner had a 1-yard kickoff return.

-Vainuku caught 2 passes for 16 yards, including a 1-yard TD, and he made a tackle against Stanford.

MARQISE LEE USC returned the nation's best wide receiver—and perhaps the nation's premier player—in junior Margise Lee (44 rec, 604 yds, 13.7 avg, 2 TD in 2013, plus 5 tcb, 1 yds, 0.2 avg and 8 KOR, 151 yds, 18.9 avg and 8 PR, 46 yds, 5.8 avg). The unanimous 2012 All-American first teamer and Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year won USC's firstever Biletnikoff Award last season and he is now a top candidate for the Heisman Trophy (he finished fourth in 2012). Also a dangerous kick returner, he owns or shares 24 USC records (5 are Pac-12 marks), including most receptions (118) in a season and most receiving yards in a season (1,721) and game (345), all league standards he set last year. With 3,468 career receiving yards, he is USC's career recordholder. He has 14 100-yard receiving games in his career, 3 shy of the USC record, with a school-record tying twice with 200 yards. He has a school-record 8 career games with double digit receptions and 6 career contests with multiple TDs. He has had at least 8 receptions in a school record-tying 15 games in his career. His 27 career TD catches is fourth most at USC. He is on target to break USC's career records for receptions (he is second with 235 catches, 18 away from breaking Robert Woods' record) and kickoff return yards (seventh with 1,292 yards). He has 4,946 career all-purpose yards on 314 plays (15.8 avg.) with 29 TDs. A knee injury sidelined him for 2 midseason games in 2013. He was second nationally in receptions (9.1) and receiving yards (132.4), third in all-purpose yards (206.4) and eighth in kickoff returns (28.5) in 2012. Last year, he averaged 16.7 yards every time he touched the ball, the average length of his 15 TDs was 40.8 yards, he had 16 plays of 40-plus yards and more than half of his 118 receptions went for first downs. He also is a long jumper on the Trojan track team.

- —At <u>Hawaii</u>, he caught a game-best 8 passes for 104 yards (it was his USC record-tying 15th career outing with at least 8 receptions) and added 2 punt returns for 8 yards, a 22-yard kickoff return and a rush for minus 4 yards.
- —Against <u>Washington State</u>, he caught 7 passes for 27 yards, had 2 punt returns for 15 yards, a 12-yard kickoff return and 3 carries for minus 3 yards.
- —He had 2 catches for 90 yards against <u>Boston</u> <u>College</u>, including an 80-yard TD.
- —He had 6 catches for 72 yards against <u>Utah</u> <u>State</u>, plus he had a 34-yard kickoff return, an 8-yard run and a punt return for no yards.
- —He caught 7 passes for 92 yards, had 2 kickoff returns for 31 yards and 2 punt returns for 23 yards at <u>Arizona State</u> before being sidelined early in the fourth quarter with a knee injury that kept him out of the following game against <u>Arizona</u>.
- —He had 2 catches for 18 yards at <u>Notre</u> <u>Dame</u>, but missed the second half with a knee injury and that sidelined him for the next game against <u>Utah</u>.
- —He had 5 catches for 105 yards at <u>Oregon State</u>, including a 71-yard TD on USC's first play from scrimmage.
 - —He had a 13-yard catch at California.
- —He had 6 catches for 83 yards (and he caught a 2-point conversion pass) along with 3 kickoff returns for 52 yards against <u>Stanford</u>.

OTHER WIDE RECEIVERS

USC, however, will miss Marqise Lee's receiving mate of the past 2 years, Robert Woods. The 2011 All-American first teamer and 3-year starter, who is USC's career pass catching leader (252 receptions), declared for the NFL after his 2012 junior season (he was a second round pick). He owns or shares 12 USC records; in addition to the career receptions mark, he also set game standards for receptions (17) and TD catches (4). His 32 career scoring receptions are second most in USC history. He had a catch in his last 33 games. He had 76 catches and 11 TD grabs in 2012, plus he returned 17 punts. Filling Woods' spot is often-used sophomore Nelson Agholor (44 rec, 751 yds, 17.1 avg, 3 TD in 2013, plus 13 PR, 300 yds, 23.1 avg, 2 TD and 5 KOR, 77 yds, 15.4 avg and 2 tcb, 8 yds, 4.0 avg and 1 tac), who also returned kicks in 2012. He has 3 100-yard receiving games in his career (2 in 2013). Then there are senior De'Von Flournoy (9 rec, 135 yds, 15.0 avg in 2013) and soph Victor Blackwell (4 rec, 49 yds, 12.2 avg in 2013). Speedy junior George Farmer is sidelined in 2013 while recuperating from torn knee ligaments suffered in this past spring's practice. Two freshmen who were prep All-Americans joined the wide receiver competition: impressive Darreus Rogers (16 rec, 162 yds, 10.1 avg in 2013, plus 1 PR, 5 yds, 5.0 avg and 1 tac), who originally signed with USC in February of 2012 but did not enroll until this past spring semester and participated in spring drills, and Steven Mitchell, who enrolled this fall but will miss the 2013 season after tearing ligaments in his knee this summer. There also is senior Cody Skene, a one-time walk-on who earned a scholarship in fall of 2013, plus 8 walk-on wideouts: sophomores George Katrib (8 tac in 2013), Christian Tober and David Mellstrom (he transferred from Virginia Tech and must sit out the 2013 season because of the NCAA transfer rule), redshirt freshmen Robby Kolanz (1 rec, 3 yds, 3.0 avg in 2013), who he did not play football at USC in 2012, when he was an intern in the USC sports information office, Christian Guzman, a junior college transfer, and Robert Flewelling, who can also play tight end, and first-year freshmen **Aaron Minor** and **Brennan Cassone**.

—Agholor had 2 catches for 35 yards, with a 19-yard TD, at <u>Hawaii</u>.

—Rogers had a 7-yard catch and a tackle against <u>Washington State</u>, while Agholor had a run for minus 5 yards.

—Agholor had 4 catches for 55 yards and 2 punt returns for 16 yards against <u>Boston College</u>, while Flournoy had 2 catches for 22 yards and Rogers had a 5-yard punt return.

—Agholor had 2 catches for 38 yards, a 15-yard kickoff return and a 13-yard rush on a reverse against Utah State.

—Agholor had 3 catches for 64 yards and a 5yard kickoff return at <u>Arizona State</u>, while Blackwell added 2 grabs for 26 yards.

—Agholor had a career-best and gameleading 7 receptions for 161 yards, with a 62-yard TD, and he returned a kickoff 25 yards against <u>Arizona</u>, while Blackwell had 2 catches for 23 yards while making his first career start and Katrib made 3 tackles.

—Agholor had 209 all-purpose yards <u>at Notre Dame</u> (6 receptions for 89 yards, 4 punt returns for 100 yards and a 20-yard kickoff return) along with a tackle (his 48-yard punt return in the second quarter that set up a Trojan field goal was USC's longest since Ronald Johnson returned one for 89 yards for a score against Hawaii in 2010 and it also was the longest against ND this year), while Rogers had 6 catches for 60 yards and Flournoy had a 2-yard catch.

—Agholor had a game-high 6 catches for 97 yards with a 30-yard TD against <u>Utah</u>, Rogers added 5 receptions for 62 yards, Flournoy had 2 grabs for 45 yards and Katrib had a tackle.

—At <u>Oregon State</u>, Agholor had 2 catches for 73 yards (including a 62-yarder on the first play of the second half) and he returned 2 punts for 4 yards, while

Rogers had an 11-yard reception.

-At <u>California</u>, Agholor tied a Pac-12 game record with 2 touchdowns on punt returns (75 yards the first time USC touched the ball and then 93 yards to tie the second longest punt return in USC history), sharing the record with 3 others (including USC's Mike Garrett, who did so at Cal in 1965), and his 168 punt return yards on the 2 runbacks broke Garrett's USC game mark by 6 yards (he had 215 all-purpose yards—averaging 30.7 yards per touch—as he also caught 4 passes for 35 yards and had a 12-yard kickoff return) to earn Pac-12 Special Teams Player of the Week, CBSSports.com Specialist of the Week, Hornung Award Honor Roll and College Football Performance Awards National Punter Returner and All-Purpose Performer of the Week, while Flournoy added 3 catches for 63 yards, Rogers had 2 catches for 8 yards, Kolanz had a 3-yard grab and Katrib had

—Agholor had 8 catches for 104 yards and 3 punt returns for 12 yards against <u>Stanford</u>, while Rogers had a 14-yard catch, Flournoy had a 3-yard catch and Katrib made 3 tackles.

TIGHT ENDS

Tight end might be USC's most solid position. as equally-proficient juniors Xavier Grimble (15 rec, 174 yds, 11.6 avg, 1 TD in 2013) and **Randall Telfer** (4 rec, 57 yds, 14.2 avg in 2013, plus 2 tac) returned as co-starters once again. The duo, which combined for 41 grabs and 9 touchdowns in 2012, has 101 catches with 19 TDs between them in their careers. Sophomore Jalen Cope-Fitzpatrick (1 rec, 4 yds, 4.0 avg in 2013) adds young talent to the tight end corps. Grimble, Telfer and Cope-Fitzpatrick were each sidelined for some 2013 mid-season games with injuries. Senior Kevin Greene (2 tac, 0.5 for loss in 2013), who played defensive end and linebacker earlier in his career, moved from outside linebacker in 2013 fall camp to join the tight end corps, although he is being primarily used at outside linebacker. Also available are junior walk-ons Chris Willson (1 rec, 5 yds, 5.0 avg in 2013, plus 1 KOR, 7 yds, 7.0 avg), who transferred from Wake pitched and Forest played (he quarterback) and is eligible to compete this season per an NCAA waiver (he might also be used at quarterback) and Shane Sullivan, who transferred from a junior college after previously playing at Wyoming (he is out for the season with a knee injury). Junior offensive tackle Nathan Guertler has also been used as a blocking tight end as 2013 mid-season injuries decimated the tight end corps.

- —Telfer had 2 catches for 40 yards and a tackle against <u>Arizona</u> and Cope-Fitzpatrick caught a 4yard pass.
- —With all the scholarship tight ends (Grimble, Telfer, Cope-Fitzpatrick) sidelined with injuries against <u>Utah</u>, Willson started and had a 5-yard catch and a 7-yard kickoff return.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Although starters returned at 4 offensive line spots, the loss of 2012 Rimington Award finalist center Khaled Holmes cannot be discounted. To wit: when an injured Holmes had to miss the Stanford game last fall, the Cardinal took advantage with its defensive game plan and upset the Trojans. The 3-year starter starred on the field and classroom as he made the All-Pac-12 first team, Academic All-American second team and Pac-12 All-Academic first team last year. He was a fourth round NFL draft pick. Tackle Kevin Graf and guard John Martinez, both seniors, and junior center-guard Marcus Martin (1 tac in 2013) all returned after starting the past 2 years (Martin slid into Holmes' center spot after previously playing guard). Also back are junior Aundrey Walker and versatile sophomore Max Tuerk, co-starters last fall at tackle who both are being used at guard in 2013. Tuerk, a 2012 Freshman All-American first teamer who started the Sun Bowl at guard, can play all the line positions. Redshirt freshman tackle Chad Wheeler (1 BLK FG in 2013) was impressive in the spring before getting hurt and then emerged during this fall's camp at the starting left tackle spot. Other returners, all relatively inexperienced, angling to get into the offensive line playing rotation are senior tackle-guard David Garness, junior guardcenter Giovanni Di Poalo, sophomore center-guard Cyrus Hobbi and redshirt freshman tackle Zach Banner (he also was on the USC basketball team) and redshirt frosh guard-tackle Jordan Simmons, as well as a pair of walk-ons, junior tackle Nathan Guertler (he has played some at tight end in 2013) and soph guard-center Erick Jepsen. Garness, Banner and Simmons, however, are out for the season with injuries. Walk-on center-guard Abe Markowitz, who saw significant action in 2012 at left guard (he even started twice), is back for his sixth season after receiving an NCAA injury waiver (he also has competed for USC's track team). Linemen enrolling in the fall as freshmen were prep All-Americans Nico Falah, a tackle, and guard-center Khaliel Rodgers. New walk-ons include first-year freshmen Marco Scavuzzo, a tackle, and guard-center Dane Stevens (both are

slowed by injuries this season).

—Wheeler, Tuerk, Martin, Martinez and Graf started at <u>Hawaii</u>, <u>Arizona State</u> and <u>Utah</u>.

—Wheeler, Tuerk, Martin, Walker and Graf started against <u>Washington State</u>, <u>Boston College</u>, <u>Utah State</u>, <u>Arizona</u>, <u>Notre Dame</u>, <u>California</u> and <u>Stanford</u> (Wheeler had a blocked field goal versus Stanford)</u>.

—Wheeler, Martinez, Martin, Walker and Tuerk started at <u>Oregon State</u>.

DEFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Seven defensive starters returned from 2012: outside linebacker Morgan Breslin, defensive end Leonard Williams. linebackers Hayes Pullard and Lamar Dawson, safety-linebacker Dion Bailey, defensive end George Uko and safetycornerback Josh Shaw. Other defensive players with career starts are outside linebacker Devon Kennard, cornerbacks Torin Harris, Anthony Brown and Kevon Seymour, defensive linemen Antwaun Woods and J.R. Tavai and linebacker Anthony Sarao. Five of USC's 6 top tacklers of 2012 are back, as are its leaders in tackles for loss, sacks, interceptions, deflections, forced fumbles and fumble recoveries. Last season, the Trojans ranked fourth nationally in sacks (3.5) and 11th in tackles for loss (11.5) and were in the national Top 41 in pass efficiency defense (124.0) and scoring defense (24.3). Troy forced 32 turnovers last year, nearly double its 2011 total, including picking off 19 passes (more than twice its 2011 total). However, USC looks in 2013 to shore up a defense that allowed among the most yards and points in school history: the 394.0 total defense average in 2012 was the second highest ever, the 24.3 scoring defense average was fourth highest and the 227.0 pass defense average was the eighth highest. New defensive coordinator Clancy Pendergast has changed USC's defensive scheme from a 4-3 to a 5-2 base (2 outside linebackers on the line bookending 3 down linemen). But he has said this new defense is adaptable depending on the situation, especially with the various offenses employed in the Pac-12. At times, USC could run a 3-4 or it could even revert back to last year's 4-3 alignment.

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN/OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS USC lost only 1 defensive lineman of note from 2012—end Wes Horton, who had 117 tackles with 13.5 sacks while starting 32 times in his career—so the depth is good at this position, which is important as more frontline players are required this year in the new 5-2 defensive system. The line now consists of tackles, ends and outside linebackers. USC's defensive linemen have proven particularly adept at pressuring the quarterback, considering 35 of Troy's 45 sacks last fall were by the defensive front. Three line starters returned from 2012: high-motor senior outside linebacker Morgan Breslin (15 tac, 8 for loss, 4.5 sack in 2013), dominating sophomore end Leonard Williams (63 tac, team-high 11 for loss, 5 sack, 1 FR, 1 FF in 2013) and junior end George Uko (29 tac, 5 for loss, 4 sack, 1 FF, 1 BLK FG in 2013). In his first year at USC in 2012 after transferring from a junior college, Breslin was a Hendricks Award finalist last year while playing end. He was fifth nationally in sacks (1.0) and 15th in tackles for loss (1.5) in 2012. His sacks and tackles for loss totals were the most at USC since 2003. However, Breslin is sidelined now for the season with a hip injury. Williams is among 16 semifinalists for the Bednarik Award and he made the 2013 CBSSports.com Midseason All-American first team. He is attempting to be the first Trojan defensive lineman to lead the team in tackles since Mike McGirr in 1971 (he currently is within 8 tackles of the lead). He was a 2012 Freshman All-American first teamer and the Pac-12 Defensive Freshman of the Year while playing mainly at tackle (as did Uko). Also back after sitting out last season with a chest injury is senior outside linebacker Devon Kennard (48 tac, 10 for loss, team-high 8 sack, 4 dfl, 1 FR in 2013), who has notched 183 tackles while making 29 starts in his career while also playing as an end and linebacker. Kennard among 9 semifinalists for the 2013 Lott Impact Trophy. There are other experienced linemen who can be called on: senior Kevin Greene (2 tac, 0.5 for loss in 2013), who was moved from outside linebacker in 2013 fall camp to join the tight end corps but primarily is available on the defensive line, muchimproved junior end-tackle J.R. Tavai (41 tac, 6.5 for loss, 2.5 sack in 2013), sophomore tackle Antwaun Woods (16 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack, 1 dfl in 2013), who started the first 4 games of 2012 and has re-emerged as a

starter in 2013, and soph end Greg Townsend Jr., who is out for the season with a knee injury. Other less-tested linemen in the mix are senior outside linebacker Marquis Simmons (6 tac, 1 for loss, 1 sack in 2013), sophomores Charles Burks (3 tac, 1 for loss, 1 sack in 2013), an outside linebacker, and tackle Cody Temple, as well as redshirt freshman outside linebackers Jabari Ruffin (19 tac, 1 for loss, 1 sack, 1 FF in 2013) and Scott Starr (5 tac, 1 dfl in 2013), who had 2012 neck surgery that allowed him to redshirt last fall despite seeing action at linebacker in 3 early-season games (he moved to outside linebacker in 2013 fall camp). Then there are 5 walk-ons: ends Michael Arakelian, a senior, sophomore Jeff Miller (he missed 2013 spring practice recovering from 2012 surgery on an ankle fracture and he is out for this season with a back injury), who both saw limited action last year, plus junior college transfers Michael Maguire (1 tac, 0.5 for loss in 2013), a junior end, and sophomore tackle Joey Augello (3 tac in 2013) and first-year freshman outside linebacker Cameron Baggett. Looking to make an impact on the line is freshman tackle Kenny Bigelow, a prep All-American who graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at USC this spring (he participated in spring drills). Junior end Delvon Simmons, who started in 2012 at Texas Tech, must sit out the 2013 season because of the NCAA transfer rule.

—At <u>Hawaii</u>, Williams had 2 sacks among his 4 tackles, Kennard had 4 tackles (with 2.5 for losses, including 1.5 sacks) and 2 deflections to earn <u>Lott IMPACT Player of the Week</u> honors, Ruffin had 3 tackles, Uko had 2 sacks, Simmons had 2 tackles (with a sack) and Tavai had a tackle.

—Kennard had 5 tackles, with 0.5 sack, and a fumble recovery to set up a TD and a deflection against <u>Washington State</u>, while Williams added 5 tackles, Breslin had 2 sacks among his 3 tackles and like had 3 tackles (including a sack).

Uko had 3 tackles (including a sack).

—Against <u>Boston College</u>, Kennard had 3 tackles (1 for a loss), Woods had 3 tackles, Williams had 2 tackles (1 for a loss), Breslin, Uko and Green each had 2 tackles (0.5 for loss), Ruffin had 2 tackles and Maguire had a tackle.

—Williams had a team-best 8 tackles (3 for a loss) against <u>Utah State</u>. Uko added 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Breslin had 4 tackles, including 3 for losses (with 2 sacks), Kennard had 3 tackles (with a sack), Woods had 2 tackles and Tavai had a tackle.

—Kennard had 6 tackles at <u>Arizona State</u>, Williams had 5 tackles (with a sack), Breslin had 2 tackles for a loss and Uko and Ruffin each had a tackle.

—Williams had a team-best 12 tackles (with 0.5 sack) against <u>Arizona</u>, while Tavai started and had 10 tackles, including 3.5 for losses (with 0.5 sack), Kennard had 7 tackles (with a sack), Simmons had 2 tackles and Uko and Ruffin both had a tackle.

—Williams had a game-best 10 tackles (1 for a loss) and a forced fumble <u>at Notre Dame</u>, Kennard had 5 tackles with 0.5 sack, Breslin had 4 tackles with 0.5 sack, Uko and Tavai each had 4 tackles and Woods had 3 tackles.

—Tavai had a game-high 11 tackles with 2 sacks against <u>Utah</u>, while <u>Williams</u> added 8 tackles, including 2.5 for losses (with 1.5 sacks), Kennard had 6 tackles (0.5 sack), Uko had 3 tackles (0.5 sack), Ruffin had 2 tackles with a sack, Simmons had 2 tackles and Woods had a sack and a deflection.

—Kennard had 2 sacks among his 4 tackles and he added a deflection at <u>Oregon State</u>, while Tavai had 4 tackle, <u>Williams</u> had 2 tackles, Uko had a tackle and blocked a field goal and Woods, Ruffin, Burks and Starr each had a tackle.

—At <u>California</u>, Ruffin had a game-high 8 tackles, Tavai added 7 stops, Woods had 5 tackles, Kennard had 4 tackles (with a sack), Starr had 4 tackles with a deflection, Uko had 4 tackles, Augello had 3 tackles and Burks had 2 tackles (with a sack), while Greene saw brief action on both sides of the ball (at outside linebacker and tight end).

—Williams had 7 tackles and recovered a fumble on the last play of the game against <u>Stanford</u>, Tavai had 3 tackles (1 for a loss), Uko had 3 tackles and Woods and Ruffin each had a tackle.

LINEBACKERS

Linebacker figures to be a position of strength for USC in 2013, as all 3 starters from the past 2 seasons return. The trio of returning starters, all juniors, is **Hayes Pullard** (team-high 71 tac, 5 for loss, 1 int, 6 dfl in 2013), Dion Bailey (52 tac, 4.5 for loss, 0.5 sack, 4 int, 5 dfl, 1 FF in 2013) and Lamar Dawson (35 tac, 3.5 for loss, 1.5 sack, 2 dfl in 2013). Last fall, Pullard (along with safety T.J. McDonald) became the first Trojan since 2004 with at least 100 stops in a season. Bailey, whose 4 interceptions in 2012 were second most in the nation by a linebacker, has moved to safety in 2013. Dawson is out for the season with a mid-year knee injury. Another experienced linebacker aiming to make a contribution is sophomore Anthony Sarao (29 tac, 1.5 for loss, 1 FR, 1 FF in 2013), who had a strong showing in the spring. Senior Simione Vehikite, who is also available at fullback, mainly has appeared as a backup linebacker in his USC career. Then there is senior Kyle Yatabe, a one-time walkon who earned a scholarship in the fall of 2013, and walk-on redshirt freshman Nick **Schlossberg**. Joining the linebacker corps in the fall as freshmen were prep All-Americans Michael Hutchings (13 tac in 2013), who was the 2012 Cal-Hi Sports' California Mr. Football, and Quinton Powell (16 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack in 2013)

—Dawson had 5 tackles at <u>Hawaii</u>, Pullard had 3 stops and an interception, Powell had 2 tackles and Sarao had a tackle.

—Dawson had 6 tackles, including 1.5 for losses (with 0.5 sack), against <u>Washington State</u>, while Pullard added 5 tackles (0.5 for loss).

—Against <u>Boston College</u>, Pullard had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Powell had 3 tackles, including 2 for a loss (with a sack), Sarao and Hutchings each had 2 tackles and Dawson had a tackle and deflection.

—Dawson had 7 tackles (1 for a loss) against <u>Utah State</u>, while Pullard had 5 tackles and 2 deflections.

—Pullard had a team-best 8 tackles and 2 deflections at <u>Arizona State</u>, while Dawson added 6 tackles and a deflection, Hutchings had 4 tackles and Powell had a tackle.

—Pullard had 10 tackles against <u>Arizona</u>, Dawson had 4 stops, Simmons and Sarao had 2 tackles and Hutchings had a tackle.

—Dawson had 6 tackles with a sack <u>at Notre</u> <u>Dame</u>, Pullard had 4 tackles (0.5 for loss) and Hutchings and Powell each had a tackle.

—Pullard had 9 tackles, with 1 for a loss, against <u>Utah</u>, Sarao had 9 tackles (0.5 for a loss) and recovered a fumble while starting and Powell had a tackle

—Pullard had 7 tackles (2 for losses) at <u>Oregon</u>
 <u>State</u>, while Sarao and Powell each added 1 tackles.
 —Powell had 7 tackles at <u>California</u>, Hutchings

had 5 stops, Pullard had 4 and Sarao had 2.

—Sarao had a game-best 12 tackles (1 for a loss) and forced a fumble against <u>Stanford</u>, while Pullard had 11 tackles, forced a fumble and had a deflection.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

USC's secondary has a completely new look to it, as a trio of 3-year starters have departed and another starter might switch positions. Gone are hard-hitting 2011 All-American safety T.J. McDonald, who had 275 career tackles and 8 interceptions (his team-best 112 tackles last year were the most by a Trojan since 2001) before being an NFL third round draft pick, lockdown cornerback Nickell Robey, who left early for the NFL after making 163 tackles, 7

interceptions and 17 deflections in his career (his 3 scoring interception returns tied the USC career record) and reliable safety Jawanza Starling. Junior Josh Shaw (57 tac, 4.5 for loss, 3 int with 1 for TD, 4 dfl in 2013, plus 0 PR, 14 yds, 14.0 avg, 1 TD), who transferred to USC last fall from Florida as a safety but was moved midseason to cornerback and started the final 7 games there, was shifted back to safety for 2013, although he has appeared at both safety and cornerback this year. Battling to start at safety are seniors Demetrius Wright (45 tac, 2 for loss, 2 dfl in 2013) and Gerald Bowman (he is now out for the season with a shoulder injury), as well as junior Dion Bailey (52 tac, 4.5 for loss, 0.5 sack, 4 int, 5 dfl, 1 FF in 2013), who started the past 2 seasons at linebacker (his 4 interceptions in 2012 were second most in the nation by a linebacker). Bailey has 10 career interceptions, tied for 17th on the USC list. He mainly appears as the often-used nickel back. Also in the safety mix are senior John Auran, a onetime walk-on who earned a scholarship in the fall of 2013, and walk-ons Rob Dooley (2 tac in 2013) and Adrian Johnson, both redshirt freshmen, and first-year freshman Matt Lopes. And quickly emerging into a starting spot has been freshman safety Su'a Cravens (43 tac, 1.5 for loss, 4 int, 1 dfl, 1 FF, 1 FR in 2013, plus 1 PR, 1 yds, 1.0 avg), a prep All-American who was the 2012 USA Today Defensive National Player of the Year and the Gatorade California Player of the Year. He graduated a semester early from high school in order to enroll at USC for this spring semester and participate in spring practice. He currently is 22nd nationally in interceptions (0.4, seventh in Pac-12). Contesting for starting roles at cornerback are some experienced veterans along with some youngsters. Senior Torin Harris (27 tac, 5 dfl, 1 int in 2013) has 12 career starts at corner, including 5 mid-season starts last year. He entered the 2012 lineup after junior Anthony Brown (9 tac in 2013) started the first 2 games. Then there are sophomores Kevon Seymour (37 tac, 1 for loss, 1 int, 5 dfl in 2013, plus 7 KOR, 92 yds, 13.1 avg) and Ryan Henderson (1 tac in 2013) and redshirt freshman Devian Shelton (3 tac, 2 dfl in 2013), as well as walk-ons Ryan Dillard (5 tac, 1 for loss in 2013), a sophomore, and first-year freshman Kevin Carrasco. Shelton, however, is out for the season with a hip injury. Two prep All-Americans who enrolled at USC this spring after graduating from high school a semester early also are fighting for time: Leon McQuay III (16 tac, 1 int, 4 dfl, 1 FF in 2013) at safety and Chris Hawkins at cornerback.

—At <u>Hawaii</u>, Bailey had a team-best 7 tackles, with 0.5 sack and an interception, while Harris added 5 tackles and 2 deflections, Cravens had 4 tackles with an interception, Shelton had 3 tackles and 2 deflections, Shaw had 2 tackles and returned an interception 35 yards for a TD, Brown had 2 tackles and Wright and Dillard had 1 tackle.

—Balley had a team-high 10 tackles (including 1 for a loss) and an interception against <u>Washington State</u>, while Wright started and had 6 tackles (1 for a loss), Harris also had 6 tackles along with 2 deflections and an interception in the end zone, Cravens had 3 tackles (0.5 for loss), McQuay had a tackle and forced fumble and Seymour had a deflection.

—Wright had a team-high 7 tackles against Boston College, Cravens added 6 tackles and a forced fumble, Shaw had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Bailey had 4 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection and Seymour had 2 tackles.

—Shaw had 7 tackles <u>Utah State</u> while playing both corner and safety, Cravens and Wright each had 5 tackles, Seymour had 4 tackles (1 for a loss) and Bailey had 3 tackles.

—Seymour had a team-best 8 tackles at <u>Arizona State</u> and added a 19-yard kickoff return, while Cravens had 6 tackles, an interception and a deflection, Bailey, Shaw and Wright each had 4 tackles and Harris had 2 tackles.

—Shaw had 8 tackles and a deflection while starting at free safety against <u>Arizona</u>, Cravens had 7 tackles and a 1-yard punt return, Harris had 7 tackles and a deflection, Seymour had 5 tackles and a deflection and also returned 4 kickoffs for 25 yards and Bailey had 2 tackles and a deflection.

—Shaw had 7 tackles (0.5 for loss) <u>at Notre Dame</u>. Brown started and had 7 tackles, Cravens had 5 tackles (1 for a loss) and recovered a fumble, Bailey had 4 tackles, Wright had 2 tackles, Seymour had a tackle and a 33-yard kickoff return and McQuay had a tackle.

—Śhaw had 6 tackles and an interception against <u>Utah</u>, Wright had 4 tackles and a deflection, McQuay had 3 tackles, an interception and a deflection while playing often as the nickel back, Harris had 2 tackles, Seymour had a tackle, a deflection and a 15-yard kickoff return, Cravens had a tackle and returned an interception 54 yards and Bailey had a tackle and a deflection (he did not suit up for the first half because of a lingering injury, but played in the second half because of injuries in the secondary).

—Shaw had a team-best 8 tackles with an end zone interception and a deflection at <u>Oregon</u> State to earn <u>Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Week</u> honors, while Seymour had 6 tackles, an interception and a deflection, McQuay had 6 tackles and 2 deflections while starting, Bailey had 5 tackles, 1 interception near the goal line and a deflection, Wright had 3 tackles, Harris had 2 tackles and Dooley had a pair of tackles on special teams.

—At <u>California</u>, Bailey had 6 tackles (1 for a loss), Wright had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), McQuay had 5 tackles and a deflection, Seymour had 5 tackles, Dillard had 4 tackles (1 for a loss), Shaw had 3 tackles (1 for a loss), 2 deflections and returned a blocked punt 14 yards for a TD, Cravens and Harris each had 3 tackles and Henderson had a tackle.

—Wright had 8 tackles and a deflection against <u>Stanford</u>, Bailey had 6 tackles (1 for a loss), an interception and forced a fumble, Shaw had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Seymour had 5 tackles and a deflection and Cravens had 3 tackles and an interception.

SPECIAL TEAMS OVERVIEW

USC's placekicker (Andre Heidari), snapper (Peter McBride), holder (Cody Kessler) and kickoff returners (Marqise Lee, Nelson Agholor) are back from 2012. But the Trojans are fielding a new punter and punt returner. USC continued in 2012 its recent penchant for making big plays on special teams (Troy had 4 blocks, including 1 returned for a TD, and a scoring kickoff return last fall). The Trojans ranked fourth nationally in kickoff returns (26.4) and 29th in net punting (38.6) last year. Only 14 of USC's 45 punts were returned in 2012 and none of the punts were touchbacks.

SPECIALISTS

Sophomore Kris Albarado (38.1 avg in 2013, plus 2 tac) has taken over for Kyle Negrete, who handled the punting duties the past 2 seasons. Some 24 of Albarado's 63 punts in 2013 have pinned opponents within the 20-yard line and he has booted 3 in excess of 50 yards. Negrete, known as an accurate directional punter, averaged 41.5 yards per boot in his career and never had a touchback among his 83 punts. He pinned opponents within the 20-yard line 39 times. A pair of walk-ons—sophomore Joey Krassenstein, who prepped in China where he played semi-pro rugby, and first-year freshman Jack Basalari—also are available to punt. Junior Andre Heidari (35-of-38 PAT,

13-of-20 FG in 2013) is in his third year as USC's placekicker, hitting 38 field goals. Of his 59 kickoffs in 2013, 17 have pinned opponents within the 20-yard line and 15 have been touchbacks. After a Freshman All-American and All-Pac-12 first team showing in 2011 when he nailed 15-of-17 field goals, he struggled with his accuracy somewhat in 2012, especially after missing 2 early-season games following arthroscopic knee surgery. Heidari is also USC's emergency punter. When Heidari was sidelined last fall, sophomore walk-on Alex Wood filled in admirably, hitting all 8 of his PATs. Walk-on junior Craig McMahon handled the kickoff duty in 2012 and is backing up Heidari in that role in 2013. Sophomore Peter McBride (1 tac in 2013) returned after handling the long snapping duties all of last year and the short snapping role up until late last season. He will do the long snaps in 2013, while the short snaps will be the responsibility of first-year freshman walk-on Zach Smith, whose high school trick shot video has garnered more than half a million views on YouTube. Sophomore quarterback Cody Kessler returned after taking over the holding duties from quarterback Matt Barkley in the second half of 2012. Soph quarterback Max Wittek backs him up. Junior Marqise Lee (8 KOR, 151 yds, 18.9 avg in 2013, plus 8 PR, 46 yds, 5.8 avg) is back as one of the most feared returners in the country. He was eighth nationally in kickoff returns (28.5) last fall. He is seventh on USC's career kickoff return list (1,292 yards) and has 2 scoring runbacks so far. Sophomore wide receiver Nelson Agholor (5 KOR, 77 yds, 15.4 avg in 2013, plus 13 PR, 300 yds, 23.1 avg, 2 TD) joined Lee returning kicks last year and is doing so again in 2013, along with soph cornerback Kevon Seymour (7 KOR, 92 yds, 13.1 avg in 2013). A new punt returner had to be found with the departure of wide receiver Robert Woods and cornerback Nickell Robey, who more-than-capably shared that duty the last 2 years. Lee is handling that role, with Agholor, freshman wide receiver Darreus Rogers (1 PR, 5 yds, 5.0 avg in 2013) and freshman safety Su'a Cravens (1 PR, 1 yds, 1.0 avg in 2013) also possibilities here.

—At <u>Hawaii</u>, Heidari hit all 3 of his field goals (20 yards, a career-long 52 yards at the halftime gun to tie the fourth longest by a Trojan ever and the longest since Quin Rodriguez's 54-yarder in 1990 against Michigan State and 22 yards) and all 3 PAIS and 4 of his 6 kickoffs pinned the Rainbow Warriors within the 20, while Albarado made his career debut by averaging 43.3 yards on his 6 punts, with a 64-yarder, and 4 of his punts pinned UH within the 20.

—Against <u>Washington State</u>, Albarado averaged 40.3 yards on his 6 punts (with one pinning the Cougars within the 20), while Heidari hit his PAT but had a field goal blocked and missed another (and 1 of his 2 kickoffs was a touchback).

—Albarado averaged 44.0 yards on his 4 punts against <u>Boston College</u>, with a 55-yarder and 2 pinning the Eagles within the 20, while Heidari hit all 5 of his PATs and 2 of his 5 kickoffs pinned BC within the 20 (2 others were touchbacks) and McMahon had a kickoff.

—Five of Albarado's 7 punts (he averaged 35.4 per punt) against <u>Utah State</u> pinned the Aggies within the 20-yard line, including 2 inside the 5, to help him earn <u>Pac-12 Special Teams Player of the Week</u>, while Heidari hit both of his PATs and 1 of his 2 field goal tries (a 25-yarder that proved to be the decisive points) and he also had 2 touchbacks on his 4 kickoffs and another pinned USU within the 20.

—Albarado averaged 42.8 yards on his 5 punts at <u>Arizona State</u> (with a 54-yarder), while Heidari hit 5 of his 6 PATs and 1 of his 6 kickoffs was a touchback (another was an onside kick recovered by USC).

—Four of Albarado's 6 punts against <u>Arizona</u> pinned the Wildcats within the 20, including 3 inside the 10-yard line (2 of those were downed at the 4-yard line), as he averaged 35.7 yards per punt, while Heidari hit a 45-yard field goal all 5 of his PATS, plus 3 of his 7 kickoffs pinned Arizona within the 20 (he also had a touchback).

—Albarado averaged 37.3 yards on his 6 punts at Notre Dame, with 3 pinning the Irish within the 20, while Heidari hit a 22-yard field goal (he missed 2 others) and a PAT and 1 of his 3 kickoffs was a touchback.

—Heidari bounced back from a pair of misses the previous week and the possibility of losing his job by hitting a career-best 4 field goals (35, 38, 28 and 40 yards) in 5 tries against <u>Utah</u>, adding a PAT and kicking off 5 times (1 pinned the Utes within the 20 and another was a touchback), while Albarado averaged 38.4 on 7 punts, with 2 touchbacks, and he made a tackle.

—At <u>Oregon State</u>, Heidari hit a 34-yard field goal and all 4 of his PATs, plus 1 of his 6 kickoffs pinned the Beavers within the 20, while Albarado averaged 36.2 yards on his 6 punts, with 2 pinning the Beavers within the 20.

—At <u>California</u>, Heidari hit 8-of-9 PATs (he missed a field goal) and 4 of his 10 kickoffs pinned the Bears within the 20 (and he had 5 touchbacks), while Albarado averaged 31.5 yards on his 4 punts.

—Heidari hīt a game-winning 47-yard field goal with 19 seconds to play—USC's first game-winning last second field goal since David Bell did so at UCLA in 2000—against <u>Stanford</u> (he also hit a 23-yarder, but missed his PAT try) and 1 of his 5 kickoffs pinned the Cardinal within the 20 (he also had a touchback), while Albarado averaged 35.3 yards on his 6 punts, with 3 pinning Stanford within the 20.

ACADEMICS

Fourteen Trojans have cumulative grade point averages of 3.00 or higher (through spring 2013 semester). Among the top scholars on the 2013 Trojan squad are: DE Michael Arakelian (3.57, communication), LB Kyle Yatabe (3.43, economics), OLB Charles Burks (3.37, political science), QB Max Browne (3.32, communication), PK Alex Wood (3.31, communication), WR Robby Kolanz (3.26, broadcast and digital journalism), LB Nick Schlossberg (3.25, business administration), OLB Devon Kennard (3.23,communication management master's), P Joey Krassenstein (3.22, East Asian languages and cultures/ print and digital journalism), WR Cody Skene (3.18, business administration), CB Ryan Dillard (3.14, communication), S John Auran (3.05, business administration), QB Conner Sullivan (3.04, business administration) and WR Christian Tober (3.04). Kennard (bachelor's degree in the spring of 2012) and TE Kevin Green (bachelor's in spring of 2013) are working on their master's degrees. Burks made 2012 Pac-12 All-Academic honorable mention, while Kennard was a Pac-12 All-Academic second teamer in 2011 and 2010. In its history, USC football has produced 22 Academic All-American first teamers (tops in the Pac-10 and among the Top 10 in the nation), 20 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 13 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes, 6 NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winners, 4 NCAA Today's Top Eight winners, 1 Rhodes Scholar (current athletic director Pat Haden) and 1 Academic All-American Hall of Famer (Haden).

***USC's <u>defense</u> currently is second nationally in red zone defense (.576, first in Pac-12), 12th in interceptions (15, third in Pac-12), 16th in scoring defense (19.4, second in Pac-12) and third down conversion defense (.327, first in Pac-12), 17th in total defense (339.3, second in Pac-12), 18th in rushing defense (121.8, third in Pac-12) and pass efficiency defense (112.9, third in Pac-12), 19th in sacks (2.8, third in Pac-12) and 24th in tackles for loss (6.9, third in Pac-12).

**USC has not allowed any second-half points in 3 mid-season games (Notre Dame, Utah, Oregon

State).

***USC has held 6 of its 11 opponents of 2013 to 300 total yards or less. **USC limited its first 4 opponents of 2013 to under

300 total yards each for the first time since 2009 (the first 3 foes were held under 250 yards for the

first time since 2008).

***The 44 points allowed by USC in its first 4 games of 2013 were its fewest allowed in its first 4 games

since 2009.

***USC has <u>allowed just 24 points in the first quarter</u> in 2013.

***It took until the fourth game of 2013 (Utah State) before USC's first team defense allowed a touchdown.
***USC has limited 2 opponents to no offensive TDs

and 3 foes to just 1 offensive TD in 2013.

***USC has held opponents to 14 points or less 7 times in 2013.

***USC has intercepted a pass in 106 of the last 149 games.

*USC has held 85 of its last 149 opposing teams to 100 rushing yards or less (4 times in 2013, 4 times in 2012, 5 times in 2011, 4 times in 2010, 9 times in 2009, 10 times in both 2007 and 2008, 6 times in 2006, 5 times in 2005, 8 times in 2004, 10 games in both 2002 and 2003).

***Only 31 opposing runners have <u>rushed for 100 yards</u> against USC in the past 138 games (most recently, Stanford's Tyler Gaffney with 158 yards in 2013).

*Since the start of the 2001 season, USC is 66-6 when holding opponents to 300 yards of total offense or less (the losses were against UCLA in 2006, Stanford in 2007, Washington in 2009, Notre Dame in 2010 and Washington State and Notre Dame in 2013).

OFFENSE

*USC's offense currently is 13th nationally in red zone offense (.903, second in Pac-12) and fumbles lost (4, second in Pac-12) and 19th in time of possession (32:31, second in Pac-12).
***Four Trojans have rushed for at least 100 yards in

a game in 2013: TBs **Tre Madden** (4 times), **Silas** Redd (2 times), Javorius Allen (2 times) and Justin Davis (1 time).

**USC's 130 rushing attempts in its first 3 games of 2013 were its <u>most in 3 consecutive games</u> since 2008 (136 versus Washington State, Arizona, Washington).

***USC's 130 rushing attempts in its first 3 games of 2013 were its most in the first 3 games of a season since 2000 (134).

The <u>5 Trojans who ran for at least 30 yards</u> against Arizona in 2013 (TB Silas Redd had 80 yards, TB Justin Davis had 38, TB Javorius Allen had 37, TB Ty Isaac had 36 and QB Cody Kessler scrambled for a 34yard run) marked the first time that USC had 5 players rush for at least 30 yards since the 1990 Arizona State game.

MISCELLANEOUS

'USC's special teams currently are 10th nationally in punt returns (14.8, first in Pac-12), as well as second in blocked punts (2, first in Pac-12) and fifth in blocked kicks (4, first in Pac-12)

*USC won the time of possession battle in its first 9 games in 2013.

In 2 of its <u>losses</u> in 2013, USC held the opponent to 2 touchdowns or less (Washington State's 10 and Notre Dame's 14); in its other loss, USC scored 41 points (Arizona State).

*In USC's 3 losses of 2013, the <u>opponent scored</u> in the final minute of the first half, including twice

at the halftime gun.

*USC won a game in 2013 by scoring 62 points (California) and lost a game by allowing 62 points (Arizona State)

*USC has used <u>3 or fewer substitutes on defense</u> in 5 games in 2013 (Washington State, Arizona, Notre Dame, Utah, Stanford)

*Opponents have returned 3 interceptions for TDs in 2013, the most since it happened 4 times in

1999. ***USC has <u>blocked 22 kicks</u> since 2010 (2 punts, 2 1 punt in 2011, 2 field goals, a punt and a PAT in 2012 and 2 punts and 2 field goals in 2013).

***USC has appeared on <u>live national, regional or</u> local telecasts 448 times, including 314 of the past 316 games (Troy's last 155 games have been televised live, a school record).

RANDOM NOTES

***The USC football program is on probation until June 9, 2014 for NCAA reported violations involving agent and amateurism issues, lack of institutional control, impermissible inducements, extra benefits, exceeding coach staff limits and unethical conduct. The penalties include: public reprimand and censure; four years of probation through June 9, 2014; postseason ban for the 2010 and 2011 seasons; one-year show cause penalty (through June 9, 2011) for an assistant football coach; vacation of wins, a loss and the individual records of a former football player from December 2004 through the 2005 season and the reconfiguration of the records of the University and the head coach to reflect those actions; limit of 15 initial scholarships and 75 total scholarships for each of the 2012-13, 2013-14 and 2014-15 years; \$5,000 fine; disassociation of a former football player; prohibit non-university personnel from traveling on team charters, attending practices and camps, and having access to sidelines and locker rooms.

***USC's 2013 captains, as elected by their teammates prior to the season, are: WR Margise Lee, C-OG Marcus Martin, LB Hayes Pullard and OLB Devon Kennard.

***USC's Thursday home contest on Oct. 10 night against Arizona was the first-ever non-Thanksgiving or non-bowl Thursday game the Trojans played in the Coliseum. Before this year, USC last played a home game on a Thursday was in 1938 on Thanksgiving, a 42-7 victory over UCLA, and USC last played a weekday game at home was the 2002 opener against Auburn on Labor Day Monday, a 24-17 win (USC last played a non-holiday weekday home game was in 1999, a 45-19 win against Louisiana Tech on the Friday following Thanksgiving).

***USC's home game against Arizona was the 17th time in history the Trojans have played on Oct. 10, tying for the most popular date that USC has played a football game in the regular season (joining Oct. 16, Oct. 24, Oct. 30, Nov. 7 and Nov. 10). The Trojans have played 33 times on January 1 (all but 2 were bowl games).

***USC is the only FBS school never to have had surnames on the back of its jerseys.

***USC's 2 conference "misses" in 2013 (as well as in 2014) are Oregon and Washington. The last time USC did not face Oregon was 2004 and the last time it missed Washington was 2000, while the last time USC played neither the Ducks nor the Huskies in a season was 1928.

***Nine Trojans previously <u>played at other</u> <u>4-year schools</u>: TB **Silas Redd** (Penn State), S-CB Josh Shaw (Florida), LB Kyle Yatabe (Willamette), DE **Michael Arakelian** (Chapman), DE **Delvon Simmons** (Texas Tech), TE Shane Sullivan (Wyoming), QB Anthony Neyer (Idaho), TE-QB Chris Willson (Wake Forest) and WR David Mellstrom (Virginia Tech).

***OLB Devon Kennard and TE-OLB Kevin Greene received their bachelor's degree in communication from USC in the spring of 2012 and 2013, respectively, and they are now working on master's degrees in communication management.

***USC currently has 13 players who graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at USC in the spring. PK Andre Heidari, QB Cody Kessler, QB Max Wittek, SNP Peter McBride and FB Soma Vainuku all enrolled in the spring of 2011, OLB Scott Starr and OT Chad Wheeler both enrolled in the spring of 2012, and DT Kenny Bigelow, QB Max Browne, S Su'a Cravens, TB Justin Davis, CB Chris Hawkins and S Leon McQuay III all enrolled in the spring of 2013. Since 1999, 28 Trojans have graduated at least a semester early from high school and come to USC (including 1 who graduated a full year early). Also, TB Silas Redd, who transferred to USC from Penn State in the fall of 2012, graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at Penn State in the spring of 2010.

***Who's the <u>fastest</u> among the 2011 Trojans? It might be TB **D.J. Morgan** (bests of 10.6 in the 100, 21.8 in the 200 and 13.28 in the 110-meter high hurdles), who won the 2009 California state high hurdles and was second in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles (he also won the highs at the 2009 IAAF World Youth Championships). Or maybe WR **George Farmer**, with bests of 10.40 in the 100 meters and 21.22 in the 200 meters (he was second in the 100 meters and seventh in the 200 at the 2010 California state meet).

***Speaking of <u>track and field</u>, three other Trojan footballers shined in high school at their state meets. OT **Kevin Graf** was third in the shot put at the 2009 California state meet. WR **Marqise Lee**, who had the nation's second best prep long jump mark in 2011 (24-8), was second in the long jump at the 2011 California state meet. C-OG **Abe Markowitz** was second at the 2008 Hawaii State meet in the shot put and discus.

***Several USC football players have participated on other Trojan athletic teams. WR Marqise Lee was a long jumper and sprinter on the 2012 and 2013 track teams (in 2013, he was third in the long jump at the UCLA dual meet, then was 12th at the Pac-12 Meet and 25th at the NCAA West Preliminary Rounds; in 2012, he was fourth in the long jump at the Pac-12 Meet and 17th at the NCAAs). TB **D.J. Morgan** was a hurdler on the 2012 track team (he was fifth in the 110-meter high hurdles at the Pac-12 Meet). C-OG Abe Markowitz was a thrower on the track squad in 2009, 2010 and 2012. OT Zach Banner was on the 2013 men's basketball team, but did not see any action. QB Conner Sullivan was an infielder/ outfielder on the 2013 baseball team (he hit .267). Before coming to USC, TE-QB Chris Willson pitched on the baseball team at Wake Forest.

***WR Cody Skene was a member of his high school's state championship lacrosse team in 2007 (TB Silas Redd, TB Taylor Ross, S Rob Dooley, LB Nick Schlossberg and WR Brennan Cassone also played lacrosse as prepsters). OLB Morgan Breslin played rugby while in high school, as did P Joey Krassenstein (he was All-Asia and went on to play semi-pro rugby with the Shanghai Hairy Crabs and then with the USC men's club team) and TB John Akiba. Ross, Krassenstein, WR Christian Guzman and P Jack Basalari also played soccer in high school, as did PK Alex Wood. S Demetrius

Wright and S John Auran wrestled in high school, while TE-QB Chris Willson, S Matt Lopes, TE Shane Sullivan and QB Conner **Sullivan** played <u>baseball</u> and OLB **Cameron** Baggett played volleyball. Among the Trojans who played prep basketball: Redd, Schlossberg, OT Zach Banner (he led his team to the state 3A title in 2011), TE-OLB Kevin Greene (he led his team to the state Division III championship), QB Cody Kessler, WR Marqise Lee, LB Hayes Pullard, WR Nelson Agholor, OT Kevin Graf, TE Xavier Grimble, DE Greg Townsend Jr., QB Max Browne, TE Jalen Cope-Fitzpatrick, WR George Farmer, OT Nico Falah and OT Marco Scavuzzo. High school tracksters included Lee, Farmer, Graf, Pullard, Wright, Scavuzzo, TB D.J. Morgan, C-OG Abe Markowitz, LB Lamar Dawson, OG-OT Aundrey Walker, WR De'Von Flournoy, TB Javorius Allen, DE-DT J.R. Tavai, DT Cody Temple, FB Jahleel Pinner, WR Victor Blackwell, TB Justin Davis, DE Michael Maguire and WR David Mellstrom.

***WR George Farmer, DE Leonard Williams and DT Antwaun Woods had their artwork displayed at the 2013 "Artletics" oncampus exhibits that featured the works of USC student-athletes, while OLB Charles Burks' work was on display there in 2012.

***OT-OG **David Garness**, who prepped at Bartlett High in Anchorage (Ak.), could become the first Trojan letterman to claim Alaska as his home. LB **Lamar Dawson**, from Boyle County High in Danville (Ky.), is just the second Trojan letterman from Kentucky (joining LB Kurt Barber, who lettered 1988-91 after prepping at Paducah Tilghman High). TB **Silas Redd**, from King Low Heywood Thomas School in Stamford (Ct.), is just the fifth Trojan letterman from Connecticut (joining LB-G Pat Cannamela and LB-DE Willie Hall, both All-American first teamers, and OLB Garry Cobb and DT Vinny Van Dyke).

***TB **Tre Madden** and FB **Jahleel Pinner**, who both started USC's first 6 games of 2013, have been <u>backfield teammates</u> since peewee football and while at Mission Viejo (Calif.) High.

***USC OG-OT **Aundrey Walker** has <u>17 siblings</u>. He is the youngest of 14 brothers.

***WR **Nelson Agholor** was born in <u>Nigeria</u>, while P **Joey Krassenstein** was born in <u>Singapore</u> and has lived in 6 countries (he came to USC from the Shanghai American School Puxi Campus).

***TB **John Akiba** speaks fluent <u>Japanese</u> and P **Joey Krassenstein** speaks <u>Chinese</u>. WR **Marqise Lee**, whose parents are deaf, is proficient in <u>sign language</u>.

 $^{\star\star\star}\text{CB}$ Ryan Dillard played the $\underline{\text{saxophone}}$ in his high school's orchestra.

***C-OG **Cyrus Hobbi**, a theater major at USC, wrote and performed a solo play based on his the anxiety of starting his first Trojan game (at Stanford in 2012).

***S Leon McQuay III, a music industry major at USC, has produced his own music tracks.

***A YouTube video of SNP **Zach Smith's** long snapping trick shots has more than 610,000 views.

***OT-OG **David Garness** and LB-FB **Simione Vehikite** are <u>married</u>. The aunt of Garness' wife is Sarah Palin, the former Alaska governor and 2008 Republican vice presidential nominee who is now a television commentator and host.

***C-OG **Abe Markowitz** is a member of one of Samoa's <u>royal families</u>, the Aiga Sa Malietoa, and he was selected as a "Talking Chief" of the family. He also is a cousin of the King of Tonga.

***TE **Shane Sullivan** and QB **Conner Sullivan** are USC's only set of <u>brothers</u>.

***TB D.J. Morgan's initials stand for Dale Jr. and DE-DT J.R. Tavai's for John Robert. TB Tre Madden's real first name is Curtis and assistant coach Tee Martin's is Tamaurice. TB Javorius Allen goes by the nickname of "Buck."

***Three Trojans have the first name of <u>Cody</u>: QB **Cody Kessler**, WR **Cody Skene** and DT **Cody Temple**. There are 3 Trojans with the last name of <u>Simmons</u>—DE **Delvon Simmons**, OG-OT **Jordan Simmons** and OLB **Marquis Simmons**—but none are related.

***USC associate head coach/special teams coordinator/tight ends coach John Baxter, who developed the innovative study skills program "Academic Gameplan," has written a book about the highlysuccessful and nationally-regarded program. <u>"I Hate School: How a College</u> Football Coach Has Inspired Students to Value Education and Become Lifelong Learners" details the challenges today's students face in setting and achieving academic goals. Baxter's "Academic Gameplan" program has provided college student-athletes with tools of be successful in the classroom and beyond by teaching valuable life skills. His wisdom and unique life experiences help students overcome obstacles. and become "communicators, competitors, and thinkers." Under his guidance, hundreds of college football players, including those at USC, have enjoyed unprecedented scholastic success.

***USC's current coaching staff has a combined <u>25 years of experience coaching in the NFL</u>. Clancy Pendergast spent 15 years coaching in the NFL, followed by Tommie Robinson (6), James Cregg (2), Ed Orgeron (1) and Mike Summers (1). Between them, they have coached with 5 NFL playoff teams, including 1 Super Bowl participant. In all, the Trojan staff has 212 years of coaching experience at all levels. Collegiately, they have coached in 73 bowls or playoffs, including on 5 national championship teams. The staff also has 35 years of college playing experience and 5 years of pro playing experience.

***Interim head coach/recruiting coordinator/defensive line coach Ed Orgeron has been recognized as one of the country's top recruiters. In 2012, Sporting News selected him as the nation's No. 2 recruiter and Rivals.com named him one of the nation's Top 25 recruiters. In 2011, he was named the Scout.com/FOXSports.com National Recruiter of the Year, ESPNU/ESPN The Magazine named him the top recruiter in college football (and third best in all of collegiate athletics) and Rivals.com ranked him as the second-best recruiter of the previous 10 years (2002-11).

***Interim head coach/recruiting coordinator/defensive line coach **Ed Orgeron** played himself in the 2009 Oscarnominated movie, "The Blind Side."

***Wide receivers coach **Tee Martin's** wife, Toya, is a <u>recording artist</u> with hit singles "I Do!" (2001) and "No Matta What (Party All Night)" (2002).

***PROJECT TROJAN, an updated free mobile application for iOS, iPad and Android devices that gives fans, media and recruits a unique inside look at the 2013 USC football program, is available this season for download from the iTunes Store and Google Play. Users get unprecedented access to this year's Trojan players and coaches through exclusive videos, social media platforms, biographical, statistical and media links and interactive options. The Trojan Way section delves into the USC football program's history and philosophy, the interplay among athletics and academics and the student-athlete experience of attending USC. There is a virtual tour of USC's athletic facilities, including the new McKay Center and the Coliseum, and special looks at various facets of the athletic department available to student-athletes, such as athletic training, academic services, strength and conditioning and sports nutrition. A historical section profiles USC award winners, Trojans in the NFL and successful alumni in the professional community. The app includes the popular Photo Booth, as well as links to Twitter feeds of USC coaches and players. merchandise and tickets also are available for purchase within the dynamic app, which will have new video and elements added throughout the year.

***After a lengthy public negotiating process, USC received unanimous approval this summer from the Board of Directors of the California Science Center to allow the transaction between the university and the state of California for USC to begin operating and renovating the Coliseum. Over the next decade, USC will invest \$70 million into the stadium to improve the fan experience (\$100 million will be invested by 2054). USC has been a tenant in the Coliseum since the historic stadium opened in 1923.

***Two Trojans have relatives who played on national championship USC football squads: OT Kevin Graf (father, Allan, was on the 1972 team) and OLB Marquis Simmons (brother, Melvin "Champ," was on the 2003 team). Also, interim head coach Ed Orgeron was a USC assistant coach on the 2003 and 2004 teams. Assistant coach **Tee Martin** quarterbacked Tennessee to the 1998 national championship. Assistant coach Mike Ekeler was a football intern on LSU's 2007 BCS Championship team. Assistant coach Pete Jenkins was the defensive coordinator on Troy State's 1968 NAIA national champ squad. DE Michael Maguire redshirted as a first-year freshman at Minnesota Duluth in 2010 as the Bulldogs won the NCAA Division II national championship.

***Several Trojans have other <u>relatives with</u> USC football connections. S Su'a Craven's cousin, Jordan Cameron, played tight end at USC (2008-10). OT Kevin Graf's brother, Derek, lettered at center at USC in 2002. TB Tre Madden's uncle is former USC (1995-98) cornerback Daylon McCutcheon. C-OG Abe Markowitz's grandfather, Larry, played football at USC in the early 1950s, while his cousin is former USC offensive lineman Faaesea Mailo (1996, 1999-2002) and his distant cousins are former (2005-08) Trojan linebackers Rey Maualuga and Kaluka Maiava. TE Shane Sullivan and QB Conner Sullivan are brothers (Conner, was a walkon quarterback at USC in 2012 and he also played infield/outfield on the 2013 Trojan baseball team). WR Christian Tober's brother, William, was a walk-on cornerback at USC in 2012. FB **Soma Vainuku's** cousin is former USC All-American (2005-08) linebacker Rey Maualuga. S Matt Lopes' mother, Helaine, was an assistant athletic trainer at USC in the 1980s and 1990s, including working with the Trojan football

***Speaking of genes: WR Nelson Agholor's father, Felix, played soccer in Nigeria. S Gerald Bowman's cousin, Maalik Wayns, was a guard on Villanova's basketball team (2010-11), then played in the NBA with the Philadelphia 76ers and Los Angeles Clippers. CB **Anthony Brown's** cousin, Bryan Harper, was a cornerback at Arizona in 2012 before transferring. QB Max Browne's brother, Mitch, played quarterback at Claremont McKenna College (2001-04). S Su'a Cravens has a long line of athletic relatives: his brother, Siaki, was a defensive lineman at Hawaii (2010-12) who previously played at Utah (2008); his sister, Malia, was on the women's basketball at Hawaii in 2012 before transferring to USC, where she was briefly on the 2013 Women of Troy basketball team before joining the track team as a high jumper; his cousins, Jordan and Brynn Cameron, played men's basketball (2008) and women's basketball (2005-09), respectively, at USC (Jordan also played men's basketball at BYU in 2007); another cousin, Colby Cameron, was a quarterback at Louisiana Tech (2009-12) before signing with the NFL's Carolina Panthers; his grandfather, Jack Cravens, played basketball and baseball at BYU (1957-59); he is related by marriage to Utah head coach Kyle Whittingham; the second cousin of his mother. Yolanda, is former Arizona State and NFL safety David Fulcher; and a distant cousin is former Notre Dame All-American linebacker Manti Te'o, now with the NFL's San Diego Chargers. CB Ryan Dillard's cousin is Detroit Lions wide receiver Calvin Johnson, who played at Georgia Tech. S Rob Dooley's father, Robert, played football at Yale, while his sister, Grace, is a senior on Notre Dame's lacrosse team. WR George Farmer's father, George, was a wide receiver at Southern and then in the NFL with the Los Angeles Rams (1982-84) and Miami Dolphins (1987). TE Xavier Grimble's cousin, Jalen Grimble, is a junior defensive tackle at Oregon State who formerly played at Miami (Fla.). OLB Devon Kennard's father, Derek, was an All-American offensive lineman at Nevada (lettering from 1981 to 1983) who then played 2 years in the USFL (Los Angeles Express) and 11 seasons in the NFL (St. Louis/ Phoenix Cardinals, New Orleans Saints and Dallas Cowboys), including on the

Cowboys' 1995 team that won the Super Bowl, while his brother, Derek Jr., was a 4year (2000-03) football letterman at Nevada. WR Robby Kolanz's grandfather is Stan Chambers, a television reporter who spent 63 years at KTLA in Los Angeles before retiring in 2010. S Matt Lopes' father, Steve, is a senior associate athletic director and chief operating officer at USC who was a 1983 College Division All-American offensive lineman at Linfield College, which won the NAIA national championship in his 1982 junior season (he also wrestled and played golf at Linfield), while his uncle, Lance Lopes, also played football at Linfield and now is a senior vice president and general counsel of the Seattle Seahawks (he previously held a similar position with the Green Bay Packers). TB Tre Madden's father, Curtis, was a fullback and defensive end at Kansas State (1988-91), while his grandfather is Lawrence McCutcheon, a Colorado State and NFL All-Pro running back with the Los Angeles Rams (1972-79), Denver Broncos (1980) and Buffalo Bills (1981) who set the since-broken Rams career rushing record (6,186 yards), led the Rams in rushing 5 times and played in Super Bowl XIV (he then was a scout and now is Director of Player Personnel with the Rams). C-OG Abe Markowitz's father, Barry, lettered as a linebacker at UCLA in 1974, his great grandfather, Richard Love, played basketball and tennis at UCLA in the 1920s and his other cousins include former UCLA and Kansas City Chiefs linebacker Frank Manumaleuga, ex-Arizona and NFL (St. Louis Rams, San Diego Chargers, Chicago Bears) tight end Brandon Manumaleuna, former Hawaii and San Francisco 49er offensive lineman Jesse Sapolu, former Colorado offensive guard Maxwell Tuioti-Mariner, Kansas State junior offensive lineman Tomasi Tuioti-Mariner and BYU sophomore defensive tackle Travis Tuiloma (currently serving on his Mormon mission). C-OG Marcus Martin's cousin is Oregon junior defensive end Tony Washington. OG John Martinez's cousins, Henry (1994-95), Jeff (1994-96), Doug (1998-2001) and Jason (2000-03) Kaufusi, all played football at Utah, with Doug later playing in the NFL and CFL, and cousins Steve (1985-87) and Rich (1989-90) played football at BYU, with Steve now an assistant coach at BYU, while his brother Keni Kaufusi was a defensive lineman at California (2010-12). S Leon McQuay III's grandfather, the late Leon McQuay, was a running back at Tampa (1968-70) and then in the CFL (Toronto, Calgary) and NFL (Giants, Patriots, Saints). LB Hayes Pullard's uncle, Robert Pullard, was a pole vaulter at USC (1971-74) who finished third at the 1973 NCAA meet and fourth in 1974. OLB Marquis Simmons' brother, Marvin, lettered in 2004 at linebacker for Kansas State. The father of TE ShaneSullivan and QB Conner Sullivan, Joe, played soccer and baseball at Air Force. DE-DT J.R. Tavai's brother, Jordan, is a senior defensive lineman at Kansas. DE Greg Townsend Jr.'s father, Greg, played at TCU (1981-82) and then was a 4-time All-Pro defensive end with the NFL's Los Angeles/Oakland Raiders (1983-93, 1997) and Philadelphia Eagles (1994). TE-QB Chris Willson's father, Jim, was a 4year letterman in football at Denison, while his mother, Sue, played softball, tennis and basketball at Eckerd College. S Demetrius Wright's brother, Daiveun Curry-Chapman, was a wide receiver at Northern Arizona

(2007-10) who played briefly with the NFL's Arizona Cardinals and Arena League's Kansas City Command. Associate head coach/special teams coordinator/tight ends coach John Baxter's father-in-law is former Utah and Weber State head coach Ron McBride. Offensive coordinator/ quarterbacks coach Clay Helton's father, Kim, was Houston's head coach from 1993 to 1999, as well as an assistant in college (Florida, Miami and Alabama Birmingham), the NFL (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Houston Oilers, Los Angeles Raiders, Washington Redskins) and the CFL (Toronto Argonauts) following his playing career at Florida; his brother, Tyson, is the running backs coach at Alabama Birmingham after assistant coaching stops at Memphis and Hawaii and playing at Houston. Running game coordinator/offensive line coach Mike Summers's wife, Kathy, is the daughter of legendary Kentucky men's basketball head coach Joe B. Hall. Secondary graduate assistant coach Kyle Williams' brother, Kevin, played defensive back for the New York Jets (1998-2000), Miami Dolphins (2000) and Houston Texans (2002) after his career at Oklahoma State.

SCOUTING COLORADO

Under new head coach Mike MacIntyre, Colorado captured all 3 of its 2013 nonconference games but didn't win a Pac-12 encounter until defeating California at home last week, 41-24, to snap a 14-game league losing sked. CU's top offensive threat is junior WR Paul Richardson (71 rec, 1,201 yds, 16.9 avg, 9 TD in 2013), who is fourth nationally in receiving yards (120.1, second in Pac-12) and 16th in receptions (7.1, second in Pac-12). He opened his 2013 slate with consecutive 200-yard receiving outings versus Colorado State and Central Arkansas. He had a school record-tying 11 catches against California (the fourth time he has done that in his career) and he also owns the school mark for game receiving yards (284 in 2011 versus Cal). He is fourth on CU's career receptions chart (144) and fifth in receiving yards (2,270). True freshman QB **Sefo Liufau** (109-of-172, 63.4%, 1,350 yds, 8 TD, 6 int in 2013, plus 30 tcb, 50 yds, 1.7 avg) now guides the Buffalo offense, taking over mid-season for junior QB Connor Wood (84-of-157, 53.5%, 1,103 yds, 8 TD, 7 int in 2013). Sophomore TB Christian Powell (134 tcb, 509 yds, 3.8 avg, 3 TD in 2013, plus 4 rec, 38 yds, 9.5 avg) leads the team in rushing. Colorado's defense is in the bottom 25 of the national statistics in total defense (477.9, 11th in Pac-12), scoring defense (38.8, 11th in Pac-12) and rushing defense (210.4, 12th in Pac-12). Top tacklers are true frosh LB Addison Gillam (88 tac, 9.5 for loss, 3 sack, 4 dfl in 2013), owner of the CU freshman season tackles record and 10th nationally in tackles (6.3, second in Pac-12), senior LB Derrick Webb (64 tac, 6.5 for loss, 2 dfl, 1 FR in 2013), senior S Parker Orms (58 tac, 2 for loss in 2013), who is 21st nationally in tackles (5.7, third in Pac-12) and junior CB Greg Henderson (48 tac, 2 for loss, 4 int, 10 dfl, 1 FR in 2013), who is 11th nationally in deflections (1.4, first in Pac-12) and 22nd in interceptions (0.4, seventh in Pac-12). Junior PK Will Oliver (16-of-23 FG, 25-of-25 PAT in 2013) is 13th nationally in field goals (1.6, second in Pac-12).

ANNIVERSARIES

Besides USC celebrating its 125th anniversary of athletics in 2013 (the first Trojan football team began play in 1888), the 2013 season marks the anniversaries of several other significant USC football seasons:

—<u>The 100th anniversary of Exposition Park.</u> Originally created in 1872 as Agricultural Park, the 160-acre park that surrounds the Coliseum was transformed and renamed Exposition Park upon its re-opening on Nov. 6, 1913. That year, however, USC did not field a football team, but rather was in the third and final season of playing rugby.

—The 90th anniversary of USC's first season playing in the Coliseum. USC has played football in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum—one of the world's greatest, largest and most historic athletic facilities—ever since the grand stadium was built in 1923. The Trojans played in the first varsity football game ever held there, beating Pomona College, 23-7, on Oct. 6, 1923. That game was preceded that day by the USC freshman team's 30-0 win over Santa Ana High.

—The 75th anniversary of the famous 1939 Rose Bowl victory over Duke (following the 1938 season). USC's fourth-string quarterback, Doyle Nave, who had played only 28½ minutes all year, came off the bench to fire four straight passes to second team end Al Krueger, the last a 19-yard touchdown aerial, in the last two minutes to edge the Blue Devils, 7-3. Those were the only points scored on previously undefeated Duke all season.

-The 10th anniversary of USC's 2003 national championship team. After a 25-year hiatus, USC returned to the top of the college football world when it won the 2003 AP national championship. Head coach Pete Carroll, in just his third year at Troy, guided his Trojans to a 12-1 record and their second consecutive Pac-10 title. USC closed the season by winning its last 9 games, including a dominating victory over No. 4 Michigan in the Rose Bowl. USC scored at least 30 points in 11 consecutive games, including 40 points in 7 in a row (both Pac-10 records), en route to tallying 534 total points (another Pac-10 mark). For just the second time in history, USC swept traditional rivals UCLA and Notre Dame in consecutive years. Not many predicted the 2003 team's success. After all, these Trojans had to replace a Heisman Trophy winner (Carson Palmer) and an All-American safety (Troy Polamalu), among others. But Trojan fans got an inkling of the team's potential when USC opened its season at No. 6 Auburn with a 23-0 whitewash. The only loss came in triple overtime at California. Five players won All-American first team honors: QB Matt Leinart, WR Mike Williams, DE Kenechi Udeze, OT Jacob Rogers and P Tom Malone. Leinart and Williams finished sixth and eighth, respectively, in the Heisman Trophy voting. And Carroll was recognized as the National Coach of the Year. Leinart, who had never thrown a pass in his USC career before the 2004 campaign, was the Pac-10's Offensive Player of the Year (Stanford's John Elway was the only other sophomore so honored) and set a Pac-10 record with 38 TD passes. Williams, another sophomore, caught 95 passes with a schoolrecord 16 TDs. Udeze tied for the national lead in sacks with 16.5, while soph Malone shattered the USC season punting average record (49.0). Other key contributors were WR Keary Colbert, who became USC's career receptions leader, the rotating tailback threesome of Hershel Dennis, LenDale White (the first true freshman to top Troy in rushing) and Reggie Bush, CB Will Poole, C Norm Katnik, DTs Shaun Cody and Mike Patterson, PK Ryan Killeen and LB Lofa Tatupu. The Trojan defense topped the nation in rushing defense and was second in turnover margin, forcing 42 turnovers and scoring 8 TDs.

IN THE NFL

USC is always well-represented in the NFL. Eleven former Trojan players are in the Pro Football Hall of Fame (more than any other school). A Trojan has appeared in all but 5 of the 47 Super Bowls and Trojans have been selected to play in the Pro Bowl 218 times. Troy has produced more NFL draft picks (480) than any school and there have been 462 USC players who have played in the NFL or its sister leagues. USC has had more first round NFL draft picks (77) than any school and is tied with Notre Dame and Auburn for most players (5) selected as the top pick in the NFL draft. At the start of training camp this summer, there were 53 ex-Trojans on NFL rosters. There were 42 <u>Trojans on 2013 opening day NFL rosters, the</u> most of any school (since records were available, USC has been first 19 of the last 38 years) and USC had the most quarterbacks, linebackers, offensive tackles and centers of any school. Among USC's NFLers are QBs Carson Palmer, Mark Sanchez and Matt Barkley, RB Reggie Bush, LBs Clay Matthews, Keith Rivers, Brian Cushing and Rey Maualuga, DBs Troy Polamalu and T.J. McDonald, DL Jurrell Casey, WRs Robert Woods, Patrick Turner and Damian Williams, OLs Ryan Kalil, Sam Baker and Tyron Smith and TE Fred Davis. Three NFL head coaches have USC ties (either as former players or coaches): Seattle's Pete Carroll, St. Louis' Jeff Fisher and Indianapolis' Chuck Pagano. Twelve current USC players have relatives with NFL playing backgrounds: OT Zach Banner (father, Lincoln Kennedy), S Su'a Cravens (cousins, Jordan Cameron, Colby Cameron, David Fulcher and Manti Te'o), CB Ryan Dillard (cousin, Calvin Johnson), WR George Farmer (father, George), DE Devon Kennard (father, Derek), TB Tre (grandfather, Madden Lawrence McCutcheon, and uncle, Davlon McCutcheon), C-OG Abe Markowitz Sapolu, (cousins. Jesse Brandon Manumaleuga and Manumaleuna), OG John Martinez (cousin, Doug Kaufusi), S Leon McQuay III (grandfather, Leon McQuay), DE Greg Townsend Jr. (father, Greg), FB Soma Vainuku (cousin, Rey Maualuga) and S Demetrius Wright (brother, Daiveun Curry-Chapman). Secondary graduate assistant coach Kyle Williams' brother, Kevin, played in the NFL. Additionally, interim head coach Ed Orgeron and assistants Clancy Pendergast, Tommie Robinson, Mike Summers and James Cregg were NFL assistants. Assistant coach Tee Martin played in the NFL, NFL Europe and CFL.

BIO OF PETE JENKINS

Jenkins joined the USC staff as a defensive line assistant coach in early October of 2013. The 72year-old Jenkins has 41 years of coaching experience, including being on the staffs of 5 Southeastern Conference championship teams and an NAIA national championship squad. He has coached 17 All-SEC selections and more than 30 of his players made it to the NFL. His most recent coaching duty was handling the defensive line for the Philadelphia Eagles for 3 seasons (2007-09), helping the team advance to the 2008 NFC Championship Game and the 2009 NFC Wildcard Game. He was retired from 2002 to 2006 and again from 2010 until joining USC in 2013. He began coaching on the high school level, as an assistant at Warner Robins (Ga.) High in 1964 and Columbus (Ga.) Baker High in 1965 and 1966 and then as the head coach at Phenix City (Ala.) High in 1967. He then was the defensive coordinator at Troy State for 3 seasons (1968-70), including on the 1968 NAIA national champ squad. He was North Alabama's defensive coordinator in 1971 and 1972, then handled the defensive ends at South Carolina in 1973 and 1974 before becoming the defensive coordinator at Southern Miss for 3 seasons (1975-77). He then was the defensive line coach at Oklahoma State in 1978, Florida in 1979, LSU for 11 seasons (1980-90), Mississippi State for 5 years (1991-95), Auburn for 4 seasons (1996-99) and back at LSU for 2000 and 2001 before retiring for the first time. While at LSU, he also served as the defensive coordinator in 1982 and from 1987 to 1989 and as the assistant head coach from 1980 to 1984 and in 1990. He was part of LSU's SEC champions in 1984, 1986, 1988 and 2001 and Auburn's in 1997. He prepped at Hawkins High in Macon (Ga.), then played at Western Carolina, where he was a 1964 graduate. He was born on Aug. 27, 1941. He and his wife, Donna, have 2 children, Jennifer and Jeff.
