Seth Lobato
Northern Colorado
Junior, QB, 6-5, 235
Eaton, Colo./CU/Eaton HS
Lobato completed 24-for-38
passes for a season-best 418
yards and four touchdowns
in Northern Colorado's
first-ever win over Weber
State. This is the second time
this season Lobato has been

responsible for five touchdowns in a game,
as he also rushed for one. He threw for five
touchdowns against Idaho State on Oct. 20.
It is also the third time in his career – but the
first this year – he's passed for over 400 yards
in a game. Lobato also did not throw any
interceptions and was sacked just once. His
rushing touchdown is his third of the year.
His 418 yards also bring his career total to
5,155 yards, becoming just the fifth quarter-
back in school history to throw for over 5,000
yards. His 2,584 season yards are sixth on the
list and the most in the school's Division I his-
tory (and only the third non-playoff quarter-
back to top 2,500 yards).

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (8-3, 6-3 RMAC)

James Ackel (Senior, Defensive Back, 6-1, 210, Riverside, Calif./Arlington HS)

Playing his final career game, Ackel tallied a team-leading 10 tackles, including four solos, while coming up with an interception, a forced fumble, a pass break-up and a half tackle for a loss as the Grizzlies pitched their first shutout of the season, 19-0 over Colorado Mesa. The Grizzlies also held Colorado Mesa to just 239 yards of total offense and held their passing game to just seven completions on 31 attempts, four of which were intercepted. Ackel finished the year with a team-leading 100 tackles and had a RMAC-high 54 solo stops.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies finished off their best season in 23 years on Saturday as they shutout Colorado Mesa by a 19-0 margin. The win was ASU's eighth of the season and set a new NCAA Division II era (1992-Present) school-record. The 2004 Grizzlies had held the record of seven wins. The eight wins are the most by an Adams State team since 1989, when the then ASC Indians went 9-2 while advancing to the quarterfinals of the NAIA Playoffs. The Grizzlies racked up 524 yards of total offense in Saturday's victory and averaged 504 in their final four games, all victories. The Grizzlies have now won seven of the last nine games against Colorado Mesa. They are 5-0 at home during that stretch. Saturday's shutout was the first the Grizzlies had pitched this season. It was also the first time that Colorado Mesa had been shutout since Week No. 1 of the 2009 season and marked the first time that Adams State had shutout the Mavericks since 1934, when CMU was known as Grand Junction Junior College. After running a season-high 105 plays in a Nov. 3 win at Colorado Mines, the Grizzlies ran 101 against Colorado Mesa, controlling the ball for nearly 35 minutes. Fullback Justin Kauffman (Anchorage, Alaska) had his second straight 100-yard game as he ran 21 times for a career-high 127 yards. The Grizzlies had a 100-yard rusher (4 different players) in five of their final six games. The Grizzlies came up with six forced turnovers in Saturday's victory, including four interceptions. Throughout the season, ASU forced 40 total turnovers, equal to Missouri S&T for the most in the nation. The Grizzlies recorded four interceptions in Saturday's win and finished the season with 19, equal to the most in the RMAC. They also recorded a RMAC-high 21 fumble recoveries. The Grizzly defense also leads the RMAC in numerous other defensive categories, including scoring, total and pass efficiency defense. They also allowed just 335.82 yards per game and held opposing quarterbacks to a 92.22 efficiency rating. Only West Alabama (86.83) had a better mark nationally. David Van Voris' four field goals on Saturday gave him 18 for the season, equal to the most in the nation. He finished second in the country on a per-game basis. Van Voris had led the country in 2009 as a freshman with his RMAC-record setting 1.89 per game average. Van Voris finished his career with 233 points, second most in ASU history. He also finished this season with 82, the most of any Grizzly kicker in the program's NCAA Division II era. Grizzly senior Mario Moore (Moreno Valley, Calif.) recorded two fourth-quarter interceptions on back-to-back Colorado Mesa offensive plays, returning them for a combined 106 yards. The Grizzlies set new NCAA Division II era (1992-Present) school-records for pass completions and pass completion percentage this season, completing 245 on 399 attempts, good for a 61.4 percent success rate. The 245 completions were 10 more than last year's total while the percentage was four points better than Adams State's 1995 squad that completed 57.4 percent (202-352) of its passes. Senior quarterback Trevor Eggleston (Tucson, Ariz.) also set a new all-time individual single-season school record for pass completion percentage as he completed 62.9 percent (127-202) of his passes. Eggleston went 5-0 as a starter this season. In his career, Eggleston completed a school-record 685 passes for 7,474 yards, the second greatest total in ASU history. The Grizzlies also racked up a new Division II era school-record 4,581 yards of total offense, 293 more than 2005 squad's total of 4,288. Senior James Ackel (Riverside, Calif.) finished his career with 348 total tackles, second most in ASU's NCAA Division II history. Ackel did have a new Division II era school-record 167 solo stops.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (4-7, 4-5 RMAC)

Jake Cimolino (Sophomore, Running Back, 6-0, 200, Fort Bragg, Calif./Fort Bragg HS)

Cimolino led the Mavericks with 118 rushing yards on 27 carries at Adams State (L, 19-0). His longest run was for 13-yards; an average of 4.4 yards per carry. Cimolino also had two catches for seven yards. On the year, Cimolino led the team in rushing with 1,365 yards on 242 carries and nine touchdowns. He led the team in all-purpose yards with 1,586. Cimolino rushed for over 100 yards in seven of 11 games including a season high 233 yards against New Mexico Highlands. He rushed for 200+ yards on two occasions (216-FLC). Cimolino also led the team in scoring with 60 points and was second in receiving with 27 receptions for 201 yards and one touchdown.

Team Notes: CMU closes out the season and Head Coach Russ Martin's first year at the helm at 4-7 overall, 4-5 in the RMAC (tied-fifth). CMU was third overall in rushing offense and first in kickoff returns and kickoff coverage. Jake Cimolino leads the RMAC in rushing, second in all-purpose, eighth in total offense and fifth in scoring touchdowns. Trent deBraga led the league in kick return average (25.7). Jake Edmiston led the league in tackles with 122 tackles and an average of 11.1 tackles per game. Trevor and Trent deBraga were eighth and tenth respectively in tackles. Jordan Price was second overall in passes defended with 14 (10 breakups and four interceptions). Cimolino finished third all-time for single season rushing mark with 1365 yards.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (6-5, 4-5 RMAC)

Tyler Denson (Junior, Linebacker, 6-1, 225, New Braunfels, Texas)

Denson led the Oredigger defense with 10 tackles in the squad's 20-14 loss to No. 21 Chadron State on Saturday. He added a sack for a loss of eight yards, and has notched 10 or more tackles in seven games this season, including five-straight to end the year. He finished the regular season fourth in the RMAC with 107 tackles while adding 3.5 sacks, 12.0 tackles for loss, two forced fumbles and two interceptions.

Team Notes: Colorado School of Mines closed out its 2012 campaign on Saturday with a 20-14 loss at No. 21 Chadron State in Chadron, Neb. Mines was led offensively by sophomore running back Tevin Champagne, who notched 118 rushing yards on 21 carries (5.6 yards per carry) and a touchdown in snowy conditions at Don Beebe Stadium. Sophomore quarterback Matt Brown finished 14-of-39 for 132 yards and two interceptions while adding 39 rushing yards on 13 carries, including a 10-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. Champagne also led all receivers with six receptions for a total of 21 yards, while Jerrod Doucet added 71 receiving yards on four catches in his final game in a Mines' uniform. Fellow senior David Pawelek added 40 receiving yards on four catches. He and Doucet ended the regular season as the top two pass catchers in the conference with 85 and 82 receptions, respectively. Cody Renken finished tied for seventh in the RMAC with 65 receptions despite not playing in the squad's final three games after suffering a season-ending injury in the squad's 34-7 win over Colorado Mesa. Billy Sprague led the defense with 11 tackles on the day while junior Tyler Denson added 10, including a sack, to record his seventh game with at least 10 tackles. Senior Henry Kaetzer posted nine stops in his final game in Silver and Blue, while Trevor Stubbs and Jake Utley notched six stops apiece. Senior Taylor Accardi closed out his storied career with a 40.3 average on three punts, including two that were downed inside the CSC (9-2, 8-1 RMAC) 20 yard line.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-7, 2-4 MWC)

Team Notes: Battling snowy conditions at Hughes Stadium on Saturday night, Colorado State walked away with a 33-11 victory over the UNLV Rebels (2-9, 2-4 MW). It was the second consecutive win at Hughes Stadium for the Rams, a feat that hadn't been accomplished by Colorado State since October of 2010 when the Rams knocked off UNLV and New Mexico. While the offense struggled early on in the tough weather, the Rams' defense had no trouble. Junior linebacker Shaquil Barrett got the scoring started for CSU with a 49-yard interception return for a touchdown with 4:30 left in the first quarter. It was the third defensive touchdown of Barrett's career at Colorado State. Five minutes later, the Rams' defense would score again. On the first play of the second quarter, Calvin Tonga forced a fumble which was recovered by junior defensive back Shaq Bell and returned 30 yards for a touchdown to give CSU a 14-0 lead. The score marked the fourth defensive touchdown for the Rams on the year, all coming in the last two home games. Colorado State would extend its lead midway through the second quarter, after Donnell Alexander rushed for his first of two touchdowns. The 10-yard touchdown run capped a two-play, 19-yard drive that was set up by another UNLV fumble. The Rams defense was relentless all night, forcing four UNLV turnovers which they turned into 21 first-half points. Just before halftime, sophomore kicker Jared Roberts connected on a career-long 49-yard field goal to give Colorado State a 24-0 lead heading into the break. It was the first time CSU had held its opponent scoreless in the first half since Sept. 10, 2011 when the Rams defeated Northern Colorado, 33-14. Coming out of intermission, the Rams did not lose a step on defense, forcing three-and-outs on each of the Rebels' first two possessions of the half. Utilizing the good field position that their defense gave them, the offense featured a strong running game to move down the field. Capping off an eight-play drive, Roberts connected on a 32-yard field goal to give CSU a 27-0 lead with 4:47 left in the third quarter. UNLV finally got on the board with 13 minutes left in the game, scoring on a 1-yard touchdown pass from Nick Sherry to Max Johnson on fourth-and-goal. The Rebels converted on their two-point conversion to close the gap to 27-8. The Rams would respond right away though, moving the ball 55 yards in 10 plays for a touchdown. The drive was capped by a 14-yard touchdown run from Alexander, his second of the night. UNLV would add a field goal late in the game, but CSU was able to run out the clock after recovering the onside kick. Alexander led all Rams with a career-best 139 yards on 21 carries, while Chris Nwoke added 66 yards on 14 carries. CSU's defense proved to be the story of the night, however. On top of the four turnovers and two defensive scores, the Rams also tallied two sacks on the night. Even more impressively, CSU held UNLV to just 3-of-13 on third-down conversions and just 219 yards of total offense.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (11-0, 9-0 RMAC)

Cameron McDondle (Freshman, RB, 5-6, 202, Littleton, Colo./Columbine)

McDondle logged 231 all-purpose yards in CSU-Pueblo's win at Western State. He carried the ball 33 times for 197 yards and a score. McDondle averaged 6.0 yards per carry, and his longest run of the game was for 40 yards. During the game, he ran his 2012 rushing total to 748 yards for the season, setting a new CSU-Pueblo freshman rushing record.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-10, 0-9 RMAC)

Phil Odell (Senior, Linebacker, 6-1, 215, Show Low, Ariz./Show Low HS)

Odell recorded 15 tackles (seven solo) in FLC's 23-0 loss at Black Hills State. He finished his career as FLC's all-time tackling leader (367), surpassing the 19-year-old school record set by FLC Athletic Hall of Famer Shane Voss in 1993. Odell recorded a career-high 107 tackles in 2012 (his previous high was 102 in 2011). He ranked third in the RMAC in tackles in 2012. Odell is ranked among RMAC tackling leaders all four of his seasons (third in 2012, sixth in 2011, third in 2010, 16th in 2009).

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (5-5, 4-2 MWC)

Team Notes: Adam Muema ran for two touchdowns and Everett Beed returned a fumble 52 yards for a score, leading San Diego State to a 28-9 win over Air Force on Saturday. San Diego State (8-3, 6-1 Mountain West) ran its winning streak to six as it reached eight victories for the third consecutive season. Muema, who scored on runs of 20 and 15 yards, rushed for 81 yards on 15 carries as the Aztecs gained 178 yards on the ground. Walter Kazee added 106 yards on 23 rushes. Air Force (5-5, 4-2) could not overcome three turnovers by quarterback Connor Dietz that led to three San Diego State touchdowns. Beed's 52-yard TD came after he picked up a loose ball when Dietz had the ball slip out of his hand as he brought it back to pass. The score put the Aztecs up 21-3 early in the third quarter. Dietz fumbled twice and threw an interception. Air Force had four turnovers. The Aztecs have converted 17 of their opponents' last 19 turnovers into points. The Falcons were able to move the ball, gaining 393 yards in total offense, including 320 on the ground. But Air Force could not sustain drives despite converting on 6 of 9 fourth-down plays. Parker Herrington kicked a 22-yard field goal on the Falcons' first possession but also missed a 42-yard attempt at the end of the first half. San Diego State gained only 268 yards in offense as it employed a conservative, ground-oriented approach. Quarterback Adam Dingwell was 11 of 18 passing for 90 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown to Chad Young. Wes Cobb scored on a 5-yard run late in the third quarter for Air Force to cut the lead to 28-9. The last time San Diego State won at least eight games in three consecutive seasons was from 1972-77. San Diego State remains in the hunt for its first Mountain West title in its last season in the conference. The Aztecs are scheduled to move into the Big East in football next season.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-9, 1-6 PAC12)

Christian Powell (Freshman, Tailback, 6-0, 235, Upland, Calif./Upland)

Powell had 32 carries for 137 yards, two touchdowns and six first downs in Colorado's 56-31 loss at Arizona. It was his third 100-yard game of the season, tying CU's freshman record, previously set by Lamont Warren (1991) and Rodney Stewart (2008). His 625 yards are now the fourth-most by a CU freshman (third by a true frosh), and he has seven touchdowns, tied for the second-most and just one behind Herchell Troutman's record of eight in 1994.

Team Notes: Colorado now leads with the series with Arizona by a 13-2 count (8-1 in Tucson, 5-2 when coming off a loss); CU is 9-0 overall in Tucson counting the '99 Insight.com Bowl, the last time before Saturday the Buffaloes visited the city (a 62-28 CU win over Boston College). The Arizona game was number 200 as a Buffalo for Jon Embree: he has 23 as head coach (4-19), 121 as a full-time assistant coach (81-39-1), 12 as a volunteer coach (8-3-1) and 44 as a player (17-27; he missed the ninth and 10th games of his freshman season in 1983 with mono). He is 110-88-2 overall. The Buffaloes are 56-34-1 in their last 90 November games (50-22 not including the Nebraska rivalry games), and are 51-12 against unranked teams in the month. Colorado is now 3-7 in the coin toss this season and opened on offense for the fifth time. When the Buffs took a 7-0 lead, it marked their first lead since holding a 7-6 edge over Arizona State in the second quarter on Oct. 11 (or a span of 219:30). The first quarter field goal drive matched the longest drive in terms of plays (15) and was the longest drive of the year (8:18; old: 6:52 vs. USC, a 16-play drive for a field goal). Colorado's time of possession for the game (41:48) was its second most in history; record is 42:17 against Indiana in 1980 (a 49-7 loss in Boulder). This was the 57th time in school history the Buffaloes rushed and passed for 200 or more yards in a game; CU is now 51-6 in such situations (and 43-3 in the last 46). The 31 points by the Buffs were their second most this season. CU had a season-high 224 rushing yards.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (4-6, 3-4 BSC)

Seth Lobato (Junior, Quarterback, 6-5, 235, Eaton, Colo./Colorado/Eaton HS)

National Football Foundation - Colorado Chapter Player of the Week

Team Notes: This is the first time Northern Colorado has won back-to-back games since 2003. The four wins are the most for the Bears since the 2005 team went 4-7 and the three conference wins are the most since the 2002 team went 8-0 in its final year of Division II.

WESTERN STATE COLORADO UNIVERSITY (1-10, 1-8 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State lost their last game of the season, 21-3 at home against the league champions, CSU-Pueblo. The Mountaineers finished ninth in the conference with a 1-10 overall mark, 1-8 in the conference.
