CHRIS NWOKE

SOPHOMORE, RUNNING BACK, 6-0, 214
HIGHLANDS RANCH, COLO./THUNDERIDGE HS

Nwoke tallied 102 yards of total offense (85 rushing and 17 receiving) and rushed for two scores to lead Colorado State to a 35-34 double-overtime victory at Utah State on Saturday. Nwoke notched the game-tying score in the waning moments of the fourth quarter, and the eventual game-winner on the Rams' second overtime possession. It marked Nwoke's first-career game with multiple touchdowns and the second time in his career with 100 or more all-purpose yards.

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (2-2, 0-2 RMAC)

Jake Long (Junior, Defensive Back, 6-0, 200, Glendale, Ariz./Glendale CC/Ironwood HS)

Long came up with two big turnovers for the Grizzlies on Saturday, intercepting his second pass of the season, then forcing and recovering a fumble in the fourth quarter that led to an ASC field goal to go up 13-7 with 2:50 to play.

Team Notes: Adams out-gained the Eagles 319-295 on Saturday, and held CSC to just 113 yards passing while gaining 222 of their own through the air. It was the third time this season that the Grizzlies have gained over 300 yards off total offense and Trevor Eggleston's fourth time passing for over 200 this season. The ASC defense forced three turnovers in the game, as Jake Long snagged an interception while also forcing and recovering a fourth quarter fumble. Junior Jeremiah Van Valkenburg also came up with an interception in the game. For Long it was his second interception of the season and the first for Van Valkenburg. Each team put the ball on the ground four times Saturday, but only lost one apiece. Adams State will host No. 7 Nebraska-Kearney in their Homecoming match-up at Rex Stadium on Saturday at 1 p.m.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (1-3, 0-2 RMAC)

Michael Brady (Sophomore, Punter/Defensive Back, 5-11, 185, Highlands Ranch, Colo./Highlands Ranch HS)

Brady had six punts for 279 yards, an average of 46.5 yards per punt. He registered a long punt of 78 yards, his longest of the year. Brady kicked two inside the two-yard line and had one touchback. On the year, Brady has 29 punts for 1257 yards (43.3 avg) and nine punts inside the 20.

Team Notes: Colorado Mesa scored 38 points in a loss at New Mexico Highlands, the Mavs' highest point total this year. The team recorded a season high 374 passing yards. It marked the third time in four games CMU has rushed for over a 100 yards. CMU recovered three Highlands fumbles, a season high. CMU has recovered at least one fumble in each of the four games and have eight fumble recoveries to date. They are averaging 132 yard rushing and 187 passing. Connor Wright leads the team in tackles (46), quarterback hurries (eight) and sacks (8.0-44 yards). CMU is 0-2 at home and will look to notch their first home victory this Saturday in their homecoming game against Western New Mexico at 1 p.m.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (3-1, 1-1 RMAC)

Alex Vigil (Senior, Linebacker, 215, Arvada, Colo./Faith Christian HS)

Vigil recorded a game-high 11 tackles on Saturday against Western New Mexico. He recorded a game-high seven solo tackles finishing with two sacks (nine yards) and three tackles for a loss (11 yards). Vigil combined with Mark Powell on the sack for an 11-yard loss on WNMU's first drive during the overtime period on third down.

Team Notes: Clay Garcia was 19-of-36 passing for 151 yards against WNMU. Garcia completed a four-yard touchdown pass to Tevin Champagne and punched in the game-winning touchdown from a yard out in overtime. Diamond Gillis caught seven passes for 38 yards and also threw a 43-yard touchdown pass to Matt Brown. Brown caught six passes for 87 yards in the game. On the defensive side of the ball, Tyler Denison finished the game with 11 tackles (five solo, six assisted) and 0.5 tackles for loss. Alex Laudenslager finished with a sack and two tackles for a loss. Taylor Jeski, Mark Powell and Sam Frazier all finished with a sack on the day. The Oredigger defense recorded six sacks and 16 tackles for a loss. Henry Kaetzer and Jeski both had interceptions in the game. CSM will also host its annual Homecoming / Hall of Fame Game on Oct. 1 (12pm vs. Fort Lewis).

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-1, 1-0 MWC)

Chris Nwoke (Sophomore, Running Back, 6-0, 214, Highlands Ranch, Colo./ThundeRidge HS)

Nwoke tallied 102 yards of total offense (85 rushing and 17 receiving) and rushed for two scores to lead Colorado State to a 35-34 double-overtime victory at Utah State on Saturday. Nwoke notched the game-tying score in the waning moments of the fourth quarter, and the eventual game-winner on the Rams' second overtime possession. It marked Nwoke's first-career game with multiple touchdowns and the second time in his career with 100 or more all-purpose yards.

Team Notes: Colorado State opened the 2011 season with a 14-10 victory at New Mexico on Sept. 3, and improved its road mark to 2-0 against the Utah State Aggies on Saturday. The 2011 squad is the first team to win its first two true road games since the 2003 squad. CSU has 16 sacks as a team, more than the 10 it had during the entire 2008 season, the last time the Rams went to a bowl. The Rams, who matched a single-game team record with nine in the season-opening win at New Mexico, are on pace for 48 sacks this season. Since the NCAA consistently began tracking the category in 1982, the school record is 44 in 1982. Saturday's win over Utah State marked the third overtime game in the history of the CSU program. CSU lost previously to CU in 2007 and Fresno State in 2001. It was also the first ever double-overtime game in CSU football history.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY-PUEBLO (4-0, 2-0 RMAC)

Josh Sandoval (Sophomore, Wide Receiver, 6-1, 180, Pueblo, Colo./Pueblo East HS)

Sandoval caught six passes for 105 yards in a 47-0 home win over Fort Lewis Saturday night. He became the first ThunderWolf with 100 yards receiving since last season, when current wide receivers coach Bernard Jackson accomplished the feat. He is also the first ThunderWolf with 100 yards receiving and 100 yards on punt returns in the same game since Markus Turner in 2008. Sandoval returned four punts for 134 yards (33.5 average) and a touchdown Saturday night against Fort Lewis (W, 47-0). His longest return was 77 yards. Sandoval claimed both the CSU-Pueblo career punt return yardage record (held by Alan Webster), the single season punt return yardage record (held by Markus Turner), and the single game punt return record (his own mark set three weeks ago). Sandoval added six receptions for 105 yards. He racked up 239 all-purpose yards against the Skyhawks.

Team Notes: The ThunderWolves have now won eight straight games (including last season), which is tied for the longest winning streak in all of Division II. The ThunderWolves' shutout win marked the first time since 1962 that it had claimed two shutouts in a season and the first time since the school became a four-year institution in 1963 that it had accomplished the feat.

2011-2012 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (1-3, 0-2 RMAC)

Terry Begaye (Junior, Corner Back, 5-8, 180, Santa Fe, N.M./St. Michael's HS)

Begaye led all players Saturday night with 13 total tackles at CSU-Pueblo. Five of his tackles were solo stops, and he added a half tackle for a loss yardage.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (2-1, 0-1 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force has now scored in 223 consecutive games, dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl (13-0 loss to Mississippi). AFA's streak is the fourth longest active streak in the country and the 13th longest in the history of the NCAA. Air Force has scored a rushing touchdown in 24 straight games, dating back to Navy in 2009. Air Force is 15-7 against non-conference opponents under coach Troy Calhoun, including a 9-1 mark at home. AFA is 17-0 all-time vs. FCS teams. Under head coach Troy Calhoun, AFA is 21-6 in Falcon Stadium. With Asher Clark's 148 rushing yards on Saturday, Air Force is 22-4 under Calhoun when the Falcons have a 100-yard rusher. Air Force's 792 yards of total offense broke the school record of 700 vs. UTEP in 1994. Air Force's 595 rushing yards today are the third most in school history. The school record of 646 rushing yards was set vs. New Mexico in 1987. AFA rushed for 640 vs. Utah in 1988. Air Force's 63 points today are the most since scoring 72 vs. Nicholls State in 2009.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-3, 0-0 PAC 12)

Team Notes: Colorado falls to 1-3 on the season and will open its first year in the Pac-12 Conference on Saturday in Boulder against Washington State; kickoff has been set for 1:40 p.m. and the game will be televised nationally by FCS-Pacific. Ohio State now leads the all-time series by a 4-1 count, including four straight wins. CU is now 1-3 in the state of Ohio and 7-22 all-time in games played in the Eastern Time Zone, dropping their last nine; the last win was at Michigan in 1994. This was the third largest crowd (105,096) that a CU team has ever played before (the other two were 106,000+ at Michigan in 1997 and 1994). CU had three sacks against Ohio State, giving the Buffs at least one in 35 of their last 36 games. Colorado has now lost 19 straight road games (20 straight out-of-state including one neutral site—the '07 Independence Bowl). The 16 rushing attempts by Colorado tied the second-fewest in school history; the Buffs had 14 against Iowa State in Boulder in 1992 and previously had 16 twice (the last in the 2004 Big 12 Championship game versus Oklahoma). Tyler McCulloch had his first career touchdown reception (14 yards from Tyler Hansen in the fourth quarter). It came on his fifth career catch. Alexander Lewis has been practicing some at tight end and saw his first game action at the position; when he did so, he was in #98. Ryan Deehan had a career-high 71 receiving yards, besting his old high of 70 against Baylor last year (on seven receptions). Freshman Will Oliver remained perfect on the season (he is 6-of-6 on FG and 11-of-11 on PAT, 29 points). Only Jeremy Flores has made more field goals without missing to start a career at CU than Oliver; Flores made his first seven over the 2001 and 2002 seasons. Josh Hartigan recorded a pair of sacks today, giving him four on the season and 11 in his career. Colorado came into the game one of just eight schools to have committed a single turnover in the first three weeks of the season, but that run ended on the fumbled exchange in the first quarter between Hansen and Stewart. CU went 133:09 between turnovers. Stewart moved into third place on CU's all-time rushing yards list, closing the game with 3,022 yards; he passed Bobby Purify (2000-04; 3,016) and is right behind Rashaan Salaam (1992-94; 3,057) for second. He is still second in career rushes with 692 (Eric Bieniemy leads with 699). His five receptions gives him 71 career receptions, now second most by a running back at Colorado as he passed Lawrence Vickers (2002-05; 68) today. His 702 receiving yards are also second by a running back, as he skipped by Cortlen Johnson (1998-2001, 691) and Lee Rouson (1980-84, 699) with Herchell Troutman (1994-97, 725) now within his sights. Hansen moved into seventh place all-time in passing yards at Colorado with 3,972, as he overtook Darian Hagan (3,801) and Steve Vogel (3,912). He now has 357 career completions, moving into fifth all-time at Colorado; he passed John Hessler (347) and Koy Detmer (350) on Saturday.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-4, 0-2 BSC)

Clarence Bumpus (Sophomore, Linebacker, 6-2, 244, Colorado Springs, Colo./Kansas State/Sierra HS)

Bumpas had 19 total tackles in the game, a career-high and tied for the second most in Northern Colorado Division I history. His total also ties for the 12th most in school history. Bumpas also forced a fumble in the fourth quarter.

Team Notes: Senior wide receiver Patrick Walker had his second career 100-yard receiving game with seven catches for 102 yards. Both 100-yard games in his career have come against Weber State, as in 2009 he notched 137 yards. In the last three years against Weber State, Walker has amassed 401 all-purpose yards. The Bears had four players in double figures in tackles. Bumpas (19), Cameron Friend (13) and Chuks Nweke (12) all had career-bests totals, while Marcel Gibbons (10) had double figures for the second time this year.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (0-4, 0-2 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State finished with its best offensive performance of the season in a loss at No. 7 Nebraska-Kearney. Kurtis Dunbar turned in a career performance with five receptions for 84 yards and his first career touchdown reception. Curtis Prock made his third touchdown reception of the season and is fourth in the RMAC in that category. He improved his career touchdown total to seven, and needs three more to tie for ninth in program records. He is also on pace to finish fifth in season touchdown records, and ranks No. 10 in the conference in scoring. Prock added 92 receiving yards in the best performance by a Mountaineer this season, and five yards short of his career best. Jaden Terry ranks fifth in the conference for tackles per game after he turned in Division II's best performance against Chadron State Sept. 17. He recorded 20 tackles, which also ranks as the fourth-best mark in program history. All of Adam Turner's 3.5 tackles for loss have come in the conference season, and ranks in the top 10 in the RMAC for conference-only statistics. Germaine Daniels moved into a tie for seventh in career rushing attempts with 30 rushes last Saturday. He was leading Division II freshmen in tackles going into last weekend. He stands with 394 attempts and needs 68 attempts to move into a tie for fifth. Daniels has rushed for 75 or more yards in four of his last five games. Miles Gorham has increased his punting average in each of the last three games, and averaged 36.2 yards per punt against Nebraska-Kearney on Saturday. Western State is scoring on 83 percent of its trips in the red zone this season. The Mountaineers celebrate Homecoming this weekend with New Mexico Highlands Saturday at 1 p.m. Western State has won eight of its last 10 home meetings with the Cowboys since 1990.
