The game was tied 59-59 at the end of regulation and 71-71 at the end of the first OT. Scott got the first five points to open the second extra period and CU hit eight of 11 free throws to seal the win

Dinwiddie accounted for 10 first-half points, but eight of them were from the

The Tigers crept to within 57-56 with 3:06 left, but Scott's pair of free throws at 1:51 put CU up 59-56. Aaron Clayborn made one of two free throws 21 seconds later to cut the Buffs' lead to 59-57.

With 59.3 seconds showing, the Tigers worked the ball low to Fred Sturdivant, who tied the score at 59-59 with 42.5 seconds to play

CU's possible winning possession fizzled when the Buffs failed to beat the shot clock, giving the Tigers 7.5 seconds to win it. But Strong's shot with one second left clanked off the back of the iron and OT was on tap.

With 41 seconds left in the first overtime and 4 seconds on the shot clock Booker took an in-bounds pass in the left corner and launched his trey. It swished It was CU 71, TSU 68 with 41 seconds remaining.

Scott, the 6-10 freshman, opened the scoring with an inside bucket, then added a conventional three-point play to give the Buffs a 76-71 advantage.

When Sabatino Chen finished a fast break with a layup, the Buffs had an 80-72 cushion and finally could take a deep breath.

BUFFS FALL HARD IN FIRST TRUE ROAD TEST

LARAMIE, Wyo. – The No. 19 Buffs were overrun by the Cowboys 76-69 in the hoisterous Arena-Auditorium

"It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out why we lost this game," said CU coach Tad Boyle, citing an assist-to-turnover ratio that continues to disappoint, 14 layups allowed (seven in each half) and his team permitting Wyoming to shoot 52 percent in the second half of a game that the Buffs led by two (28-26) at intermission.

Spencer Dinwiddie led the Buffs with 24 points and Andre Roberson added 16 and 12 rebounds - his 28th career double-double. CU's other pair of top scorers - guard Askia Booker and post Josh Scott - accounted for 11 points between them. Booker (16.8 ppg) was held to a season-low six points - a three-pointer in each half, while Scott (14.5 ppg) scored five before fouling out.

The Cowboys weren't interested in getting up and down the court, and they made sure the visitors couldn't. Neither team had a fast-break basket in the opening 20 minutes.

CU did manage a two-point lead in a first half that featured seven ties and eight lead changes, but the Buffs' 28 points was their lowest first-half output of the season. It was an omen, for CU finished shooting 41.4 percent from the field (24-of-58) for their lowest percentage of the season.

The Buffs stayed close, even leading on a couple of occasions, in the first 5 minutes of the second half.

CU pulled to within five (55-50), but a Washington desperation threepointer with the shot clock at one second restored Wyoming's eight-point lead (58-50) at the 5:12 mark.

Said Dinwiddie: "We didn't play defense, plain and simple. They buckled down and made plays and we didn't make plays."

DINWIDDIE SHOWS NO BROTHERLY LOVE IN CU WIN

BOULDER – After Spencer Dinwiddie scored a career-high 29 points in leading CU to a grind-it-out 70-61 victory against archrival Colorado State, Dinwiddie said his "little brother" analogy of CSU was misinterpreted.

"I think they took it as disrespect; I didn't mean it in a disrespectful way," a grinning Dinwiddie said. "I have a lot of respect for their team . . . but being able to back up the comment with a win is great; they were on my Twitter a lot."

The Buffs wanted a solid start - and they might have exceeded their expectations. Before the Rams could blink a couple of times, they trailed 9-0 in the opening minutes of the first half.

In dealing CSU (6-1) its first defeat, CU (7-1) went up by 20 points at halftime, but saw that lead dwindle to three (54-51) in the final 6:45 after a 19-5 Rams run. But a 5-0 Buffs spurt and a recommitment to rigid defense kept the Rams at bay; from the 6:45 mark to the final buzzer, CSU hit only one of its last 11 shots (and that was a trey at the buzzer) and never pulled closer than seven points.

Dinwiddie was 8-of-10 from the field (5-of-7 from beyond the arc) and had an "all-Pac-12" kind of game, said Boyle. Dinwiddie said he was "just hitting my shots . . . it was more about us playing defense."

Junior forward Andre Roberson was the only other CU player in double figures. He picked up his fourth consecutive double-double and the 29th of his career, getting 15 points and 14 rebounds.

CSU got 19 points and 14 rebounds from Colton Iverson and 18 points from Dorian Green.

The Rams never got closer than seven points the rest of the night, and Boyle's record against CSU went to 4-3 - 2-1 at CU.

JAYHAWKS MAKE IT AN UGLY AFTERNOON FOR BUFFS

LAWRENCE, Kan. – No. 9 KU rocked, rolled and romped over CU in historic Allen Fleidhouse, burying the Buffs 90-54 in a beatdown that was reminiscent of darker times in a former conference for the visitors.

Saturday's loss was Boyle's worst at CU and the school's worst since an 84-46 defeat by Air Force in the 2006-07 season under Jeff Bzdelik.

The Buffs wanted to silence the crowd early, but they fell behind on the game's first possession and never caught up. KU, improving to 7-1 and winning its 26th consecutive home game, led by 21 points at the half then came out with just as much juice in the second half with a 7-0 run. The Jayhawks went up by as many as 42 before the final jurgar called them off

The Jayhawks outscored the Buffs 46-26 in the paint, got 20 fast-break points to CU's 12 and scored 16 second-chance points to the Buffs' six. KU's bench won that battle 21-8, and the Buffs' 54 points was their lowest output of the season. CU's season-high 18 tumovers - a dozen of them in the first half - led to 26 KU points.

After averaging 25.2 points in the last three games and scoring a career-high 29 in his last outing, Dinwiddle managed only four on Saturday. He injured an ankle early in the first half, went to the locker room for a re-taping and returned. But he clearly was not as efficient as he had been.

"They came out ready to play and made plays that we didn't make," Dinwiddie said of the Jayhawks' intense second-half start. "We didn't stop them. I know I'm going to sound like a broken record, but it really all comes down to defense... they were dunking on us. There really isn't that much else to say.

BUFFS GRIND OUT 50-43 ROAD WIN AT FRESNO STATE

FRESNO, Calif. – Junior forward Andre Roberson tallied his 30th career double-double with 17 points and a career-high 20 rebounds leading Colorado to a 50-43 road win at Fresno State.

Roberson is the first CU player to grab 20 rebounds in a game since Stephane Pelle grabbed 21 boards on Nov. 21, 2002 against Stetson.

Sophomore Askia Booker and freshman Josh Scott added 14 and 11 points, respectively.

"You have to find a way to win when you don't play your best, and we obviously ran into that in the second half," CU head coach Tad Boyle said. "We didn't play our best, obviously, but we found a way."

After a close first half, in which Colorado led 18-17 with 6:22 remaining, Colorado appeared to finally take control of the game with a 9-0 run led by a Booker 3-pointer, four points by Josh Scott, and a Roberson lavuo to give the Buffaloes a 27-17 halftime lead.

The Bulldogs would take the lead for the second, and last time after a Robert Upshaw layup giving Fresno a 30-29 lead with 12:15 remaining.

Colorado had an answer though, Booker drilled a 3-pointer and then Roberson followed with an impressive alley-oop dunk assisted by Sabatino Chen, who would then score the next four points of the game making the score 41-32, completing a 9-0 run for the visiting team.

Sophomore Spencer Dinwiddie, who sprained his ankle in a road loss at Kansas, did not score a point until a made free throw with 18 seconds remaining in the game to give the Buffaloes a three point lead.

This was the sixth time a Colorado opponent has been held to under 50 points in a game during the Tad Boyle era in Buffaloes basketball.

"It was our best defensive performance all year," said Boyle. "So, that's progress."

BUFFS GET IN THE SPIRIT OF GIVING, WIN BIG

BOULDER - Coach Tad Boyle was more impressed by his team's willingness to share than its point total, despite Colorado registering 98 points to Northern Arizona's 51.

Sharing the ball more effectively has been on Boyle's mind for a couple of months, and Friday night his team responded with 24 assists.

"We played unselfish . . . we made the extra pass and it was contagious on our team," a beaming Boyle said. "It's a great way to go into Christmas break . . . a great team victory."

He used all 12 of his players and 11 of them scored - five reaching double figures. Askia Booker and Xavier Johnson each had 17, with Spencer Dinwiddie adding 15, Josh Scott 11 and Andre Roberson 10. Reserves Ben Mills and Beau Gamble got in the game late and scored their first points of the season.

"We really need to get those (bench) guys going," Boyle said. "Those guys are going to be important to us throughout the season. We know pretty much what we're going to get from our starters."

The Buffs' 98 points were the second most in the Boyle era, as was their 47-point margin of victory. Their 57 first-half points were the third highest for a first half since the 1954-55 season.

CU finished the first half with an eye-popping 71.4 percent from the field (25-for-35) and 60 percent from three-point range (6-for-10). The Buffs shot 66.7 percent (40-for-60) for the game - the best shooting percentage by a CU team in 23 seasons - and were at 55 percent (11-for-20) from beyond the arc.

BUFFS HAMMER HAWKS, EYE PAC-12 OPENER

BOULDER – Colorado hammered Hartford 80-52 at the Coors Events Center, opening 10-2 for the first time since the 2005-06 season.

"Right now, what's on my mind is perspective," he said. "We're 10-2 and for the most part I'm happy. There are still areas for us to get better and taking care of the ball is one of them (CU had a season-worst 21 turnovers). But when you look at our schedule and the strength of our schedule, 10-2 feels good. We're not satisfied, but we've taken care of most of the opportunities in front of us."

CU quickly disposed of Hartford (7-6). In fact, the Buffs hardly were challenged, romping to a 45-21 halftime lead and holding at least a 25-point lead for most of the second half. Their largest second-half lead was 37 with just under 12 minutes to play.

Josh Scott led CU with 21 points and 10 rebounds, while Askia Booker added 19 points. Junior Andre Roberson had 14 points and 14 rebounds for his 31st career double-double - the sixth this season. Spencer Dinwiddie added 11 points, his second straight game in double figures after getting five total in the previous two contests.

The first-half board battle wasn't close to even being a skirmish: CU outrebounded the visitors 28-6 and finished with a 52-21 board advantage. The Buffs prevailed in the paint 44-11.

Boyle said his starters "are playing together, playing at a high level, sharing the ball, moving the ball . . . I told our team that there's not one guy who can beat the Pac-12 on his own; we've got to do it together as a collective group. I like where we are."

BLIFES FALL IN OT AFTER CONTROVERSIAL CALL

TUCSON, Ariz. - No. 3 Arizona finally caught Colorado in the final 9 seconds of regulation play, then benefitted from a controversial waivedoff basket in the final second and defeated the Buffaloes 92-83 in over-

The Buffs believed they had won when senior Sabatino Chen banked in a three-pointer at the final buzzer in regulation of their Pac-12 Conference opener. But after conferring with the timekeepers and watching the replay monitor at the McKale Center, officials disallowed Chen's shot

Shown a replay of Chen's trey before his postgame interview with KOA Radio, CU coach Tad Boyle said, "That just makes me sick to my stomach . . . I'm sick to my stomach because I think our team deserved to win that game. But we didn't and we have to move on from it."

In the overtime, it was all Wildcats, who trailed by as many as 17 points in the first half and 16 in the second. Less than a minute into overtime, they took their first lead since 5-4 on a three-point play by Kevin Parrom to make it 83-82.

The Buffs tied it at 83-83 on one of two free throws by Xavier Johnson. who made his first career start in place of Chen. But CU didn't score again.

Five CU players scored in double figures, topped by Askia Booker's 18. Freshman Josh Scott and Chen scored 15 each - a career-high for Chen - while Johnson had 13 and Spencer Dinwiddie 11.

"You have to look at the free throws," Boyle said. "We shot 58 percent for the game; we got away with that earlier in the year at times but tonight we didn't get away with it, it cost us the game. And I'm not talking any one guy, I'm talking about as a team. So, you've got to look at what you can do better, and that is what we can do."

CU STARTS STRONG, CAN'T FINISH AT ASU

TEMPE, Ariz. - Sophomore guard Spencer Dinwiddie scored 19 points and handed out four assists, yet it was not enough as the University of Colorado men's basketball team fell at Arizona State, 65-56, on Sunday evening at the Wells Fargo Arena

Colorado controlled the pace early using an 11-0 run to gain a 13-2 lead early in the first half. The Buffaloes led by as many as 13 points during the half, yet Colorado only held a 33-30 lead at the intermission.

"This is a frustrating loss," CU head coach Tad Boyle said. "We came out of the blocks feeling good about ourselves, but we need to handle adversity better and that is where we are not good enough yet."

Trailing 44-43, CU would be held scoreless for 7:12 (going 0-of-13 from the field) as ASU went on an 11-0 run to gain a 55-43 advantage. The Buffaloes would try to get back in the game with a 10-3 run of their own to pull vithin 58-53 with 1:11 left, but it would not be enough as the Sun Devils inproved to 2-0 in Pac-12 play.

Only three Buffaloes scored in double-digits as Askia Booker and Josh Scott scored 13 and 10 points, respectively, to combine with Dinwiddie's

"I thought our frustrations on offense bled over into the defensive end," Boyle said. "That is what we can't have happen, that is what young teams do and veteran teams don't do."

Finishing the game with 13 rebounds. Roberson moves into fourth place all-time in rebounds at Colorado with 867 passing Jim Davis who had 854 in his three-year career from 1961-64.

BUFFS' RALLY COMES UP SHORT AGAINST BRUINS

BOULDER (Jan. 12) – Deep and talented UCLA led by a point at halftime, revved it up in the second half, then had to desperately hold on to beat CU 78-75 and deal the Buffs their first loss of the season at the Coors Events Center.

CU closed to within a point (76-75) on Spencer Dinwiddie's layup, but UCLA's Jordan Adams sank a pair of free throws with 7.9 seconds to play to give the Bruins their final lead. A three-point attempt from the left corner by Askia Booker bounced off the rim at the buzzer.

CU coach Tad Boyle said his team got the shot it wanted: "We drew that play up and got 'Ski' a wide-open three in the corner... we got the shots we wanted offensively, we really did what we set out to do in the last two or three minutes. But we didn't get a stop when we needed to."

Giving up its first home loss of the season, CU fell to 11-5 overall and 1-3 in the Pac-12 Conference.

Dinwiddie led CU with 23 points - 15 in the second half - while Booker and Josh Scott added 18 each. Scott also had nine rebounds. UCLA's Travis Wear matched Dinwiddie's point total and stepped up with clutch baskets when the Buffs were making their comeback. Adams added 18 points, with Shabazz Muhammad contributing 14 and Kyle Anderson 12 for UCLA.

The Buffs, said Boyle, "played hard and competed, but we have to be more consistent from start to finish against good teams." He drew on a quote from his former college coach at Kansas, Larry Brown: "Coming back is easy; coming back and winning is hard."

HUSKIES PUT THE BITE ON FRIGID BUFFS

SEATTLE (Jan. 16) – The Colorado Buffaloes dug themselves a hole with frigid shooting and left Alaska Airlines Arena in a deeper Pac-12 Conference hole, losing 64-54 to Washington.

Boyle said his team's defense "was good enough to win . . . our guys played great (defense). We played with pride and some toughness. We lost to a good basketball team."

The Buffs shot a season-low 29.2 percent in the first half and finished at 36.2 percent (21-for-58) for the game - the team's second-lowest mark this season. CU also tied a season low in assists with six and made only one of 10 three-point attempts.

But the Buffs held the Huskies to 33.9 percent (20-for-59) from the field and outrebounded them by one (38-37).

Boyle said the Huskies' 15 offensive rebounds "really killed us in the second half. We had some stops and couldn't finish the possession with getting the rebound."

Sophomore Spencer Dinwiddie, who led CU with 15 points, said the Buffs played with more overall intensity than in previous conference losses to Arizona, Arizona State and UCLA.

The only other CU player in double figures was junior Andre Roberson with 10 points, marking the first time this season only two Buffs reached double digits. Roberson also had 11 rebounds for his seventh double-double of the season and the 32nd of his career.

Sophomore guard Askia Booker fouled out with 34.4 seconds to play after scoring nine points, while freshman forwards Xavier Johnson and Josh Scott had nine and eight, respectively.

BUFFS GRIND OUT ROAD WIN AGAINST COUGARS

PULLMAN, Wash. (Jan. 19) – As the Colorado Buffaloes' offense came and went, their constant was defense - and it carried them to their second Pac-12 Conference victory and first of the season on the Pac-12 road, grinding out a 58-49 victory over Washington State.

After his team's pregame meal, Buffs coach Tad Boyle told his players that the "hungrier, tougher team" would win Saturday night - and the Buffs proved to be both.

CU survived a cold-shooting final 6:15 of the first half, going that stretch without making a field goal and fell behind by four points early in the second half. But, noted Boyle, "We didn't panic, which I thought was a sign of maturity with this team."

CU held WSU to 34.5 percent, and the Cougars' 29.6 field goal percentage was the lowest by a CU opponent this season at halftime.

CU junior Andre Roberson was largely responsible for limiting Brock Motum - the Pac-12's second-leading scorer (19.4 ppg) - to a season-low 13 points. Motum and Mike Ladd, who also scored 13, were the only WSU players in double figures Saturday night for the Cougars (10-8, 1-4).

CU, meanwhile, got 16 points from Spencer Dinwiddie, 14 off the bench from Xavier Johnson and 11 from Josh Scott. Booker hit only three of his 11 field goal attempts and finished with seven points, but two of his field goals were at critical second-half junctures when the Buffs were keeping the Cougars at bay.

"I think we made plays when we had to make plays," Boyle said. "That's what you have to do, especially on the road. We've got some guys who are much better than the way they've been playing . . . at the end of the day, when you're playing on the road and it's a tight game, you've got to have your best players step up - and I think that happened."

BOULDER – After being manhandled twice by Stanford in their first Pac-12 Conference season, the Colorado Buffaloes finally struck back, leading from opening tip to final buzzer, bashing the Cardinal 75-54 at the Coors Events Center.

The feat did not go unnoticed as the Buffs played before 11,212 fansthe fourth largest crowd in school history.

Said Boyle: "It was a bloodbath out there . . . it was one of those games where you had to put the ball in the basket. We told our guys at timeouts not to look for fouls."

Instead, they relied on balanced scoring - all five starters were in double figures - tenacious rebounding by junior Andre Roberson and steely defense. Roberson tied a career high with 20 of the Buffs' 48 rebounds (the Cardinal collected 30) and added 12 points.

"We fed off Andre tonight . . . (he) was a beast and played like the Andre we know and love. He was after it from the get-go" Boyle said.

Roberson's energy seemed unlimited and spilled over to the entire starting lineup. Sophomore Askia Booker scored a team-high 13, including eight consecutive points midway through the second half when Stanford closed to within eight. Freshman Josh Scott and sophomore Spencer Dinwiddie also scored 12 points each, while freshman Xavier Johnson contributed 11.

BUFFS BEAT BEARS, REACH .500 IN PAC-12

BOULDER – Opening with another stellar defensive performance then staying above ground with a season-best effort from the free throw line, CU beat California 81-71 to even its Pac-12 Conference record at 4-4.

Said Boyle: "The game was one of those deals where our shooting (59.6 percent) overcame a lot of other ills and some deficiencies we know we have to get better at."

Topping his list were the 20 CU turnovers that led to 22 Cal points. There also were the Bears' 53 second-half points - 33 of them attributable to guards Allen Crabbe and Justin Cobbs, who finally got untracked after nearly silent first halves and helped whittle an 18-point Buffs lead to eight in the final minute.

CU led 34-18 at halftime and shot 50 percent from the field (13-for-26). But that percentage at times belied their offensive efficiency. After taking a nine-point lead (14-5) on consecutive treys by Booker, CU went nearly 7 minutes without scoring again.

But in the final 60 seconds, Spencer Dinwiddle hit eight consecutive free throws to keep the Buffs afloat. He hit 9-of-10, leading CU to its best foul-shooting performance of the season - 18-of-22 (81.8 percent).

Finishing with 16 points, Dinwiddie was one of four CU players in double figures. Askia Booker scored 20, Xavier Johnson (18) and Andre Roberson (15). Johnson also collected 12 rebounds for his first career double.

Cal (11-8, 3-4) was led by Cobbs with 22 points - 16 in the second half, and Crabbe added 21 - 17 of those in the second half.

Roberson played only 2 first-half minutes due to foul problems and was limited to five rebounds after his 20-board performance against Stanford on Thursday. He led the nation in rebounding (11.9) entering the game.

BUFFS RALLY FALLS SHORT AT UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah – Colorado fell short of completing the second largest comeback in school history after trailing by as many as 22 points and eventually falling to Utah, 58-55 at the Huntsman Center.

Spencer Dinwiddie led the Buffs (14-7, 4-5 Pac-12) with 18 points, while Andre Roberson recorded his 34th career double-double with 10 points, and 12 rebounds, respectively. Roberson, now having recorded a double-double in each of his four career games against the Utes, moves into sixth place all-time in career double-doubles at CU with a mark of 34.

"These are the games that you have to prepare yourself for, whether it is on the road or it could happen at home, and we didn't handle it very well," said CU head coach Tad Boyle.

Utah (10-11, 2-7) took advantage of sloppy play by CU, who committed 10 turnovers in the first half, which marked a Pac-12 Conference high this season, compared to Utah's two. It was the second straight game that CU committed 10 miscues in the first half.

However, CU did grab seven offensive rebounds in the first half which also marked a Pac-12 Conference high this season.

The Utes ended the half on a 10-2 run to take a 27-23 lead into the locker room. The Utes also benefited from a solid performance from its reserves that outscored the Buffs bench 14-0 in the half.

Yet, the second half started as bad as the first half ended for the Buffs as Utah went on a 9-0 run until CU forward Xavier Johnson made a layup to cut the lead to 40-27 with 14:12 remaining; however, that didn't slow down Utah.

CU had one last chance to send the game into overtime, trailing by three, but Dinwiddie's last second three-point attempt bounced off the backboard.

"It's a disappointing loss in a lot of different ways," Boyle said. "I'm disappointed in myself, and I take this loss as a head coach, if your team is not ready to play for the first 32 minutes of the game then you have to take a look at yourself in the mirror."

ROBERSON, BUFFS STAY WITH IT, EDGE DUCKS

EUGENE, Ore. – Andre Roberson's lay-in with 29.5 seconds to play, coupled with intense defense on Oregon over the final 4 1/2 minutes earned the Colorado a dramatic 48-47 win at Matt Knight Arena over the No. 19 team in the country.

CU's offense was hard to find; the Buffs' winning total was their lowest in the modern shot clock era.

On Thursday night, the Buffs shot only 36.5 percent from the field, but they held the Ducks to 36.2 percent. CU's defense was particularly unforgiving in the final 4:26, holding the Ducks scoreless after they had taken a 47-40 lead.

CU had only one player in double figures - Roberson, who collected his 35th career double-double with 10 points and 13 rebounds

Said Roberson: "I didn't want us to lose, and it starts with me ... I just took it on myself to go out and play defense and continue to fight. We were still right there; we just weren't getting over that hump to get the lead. I tip my hat to each and every one of our guys."

The first tip of his hat might go to Spencer Dinwiddie finishing with eight points, four assists, and whose late defense was as critical as Roberson's, according to Boyle. Dinwiddie pressured E.J. Singler on Oregon's final full possession into a difficult shot, appearing to get a piece of the ball.

DINWIDDIE, BUFFS RALLY TO DEFEAT OREGON STATE

CORVALLIS, Ore. – On a night highlighted by Spencer Dinwiddie's perfection and another show of grit by his teammates, CU rallied to beat Oregon State 72-68.

Dinwiddie, the stellar sophomore guard was perfect from the field - six-for-six, including four-of-four from beyond the arc - and hit all eight of his free throw attempts, six of them in the final 1:41. His accuracy brought the Buffs back from a seven-point second-half deficit.

CU's difference against Oregon State, said Boyle: "We had Spencer Dinwiddie and they didn't." He scored 17 of his game-high 24 points in the second half, helping CU to go above .500 (6-5, 16-7 overall) for the first time this season in Pac-12 play.

His second-half shooting, Dinwiddie said, "was a product of the zone. You're going to have to knock down threes to beat a team like that when they play a zone. That's the whole idea of a zone, you know? They pack it in and force you to shoot uncontested jump shots. Fortunately they were going in."

CU also got double-figure production from freshman Josh Scott (17) and senior Sabatino Chen (10). Oregon State (2-9, 12-12) was led by Roberto Nelson with 21 points - 17 of those in the second half. Junior Andre Roberson finished with a career-best five steals to compliment his 10 rebounds and seven points.

CU started with a feverish pace, hitting its first six shots before finally missing and going up by 13 points (19-6) on a pair of free throws by Booker.

"We did what we had to do but it wasn't our best performance," Boyle said. "We beat an Oregon State team that is talented and better than their record indicates. I've got a lot of respect for their players and coach.

BUFFS THROW A BLANKET OF 'D' OVER WILDCATS

BOULDER – The Buffaloes draped themselves over No. 9 Arizona, smothering the Pac-12 Conference's highest-scoring team and leaving a delirious Coors Events Center with a resume-enhancing, think-Big Dancing 71-58 win.

As nasty as CU's defense was in limiting Arizona to its lowest point total of the season, the offense provided by sophomore Spencer Dinwiddie and freshman Xavier Johnson was equally potent. Dinwiddie finished with a game-high 21, Johnson with a career-high 19.

Sophomore guard Askia Booker added 10 points, two assists and three steals, and junior Andre Roberson contributed seven points and a game-best 13 rebounds to move past Cliff Meely into second place (978) on the school's board list.

"It was a great atmosphere for college basketball," CU coach Tad Boyle said. "The whole state of Colorado can be proud . . . this had nothing to do with revenge, but everything to do with respect for Arizona. They'll win a lot of games as the season unfolds, but we will, too."

Arizona came into the game averaging 76.2 points and featured two of the league's top nine scorers in Mark Lyons (17.5) and Solomon Hill (15.4). Lyons got 11 points, Hill 12 as the Wildcats were limited to 42.3 percent from the field.

The Buffs checked out at 50 percent from the field, including 59.1 percent in the second half when the Wildcats cut a 15-point deficit to six with 10:35 to play. Dinwiddie, who also had a career-best seven assists, scored 19 of his total in the final 20 minutes.

The Buffs finished nine of 17 from behind the three-point arc, with Johnson going four-for-five and Dinwiddie two-for-five.

The Buffs had watched a 17-point lead evaporate in Tucson, but no way it would happen in the rematch. All that remained was for the CU student body to rush court - and this time no one questioned whether it was justified

BUFFS FALL IN OT ON BUZZER-BEATING LAYUP

BOULDER (Feb. 16) – Arizona State's Evan Gordon split CU's defense down the right lane, driving for the game-winning basket in overtime as the Sun Devils stunned the Buffs 63-62 at the nearly sold-out Coors Events Center.

"Welcome to college football... I thought the season was over in December," said disgruntled CU coach Tad Boyle. "It was an unbelievably physical game, the most physical game I've ever been a part of - college, high school, YMCA."

CU freshman Josh Scott took the brunt of the night's physicality. Matched against Jordan Bachynski, the 6-10, 215-pound Scott and the 7-2, 250-pound ASU center became entangled and spun to the floor with 16:02 remaining in the second half. The incident sent Scott to the locker room and prevented him from returning.

On ASU's winning possession, which started with 8.3 seconds left after Spencer Dinwiddie's layup gave CU a 62-61 lead, Buffs sophomore Askia Booker and his teammates were aware of Sun Devils point guard Jahi Carson.

Dinwiddie led CU with 24 points, with Booker adding 17 and Xavier Johnson 10. Carson's 18 topped ASU, with Gordon scoring 14 and Bachynski 12.

CU trailed for the final 6:38 of regulation and had only one field goal from the 5:33 mark until a pair in the final 46.6 seconds by Booker and Johnson. It was Johnson's dunk on a dish from Dinwiddie that tied the score at 54-54 and sent the game into overtime.

BUFFS STEP UP, PUT DOWN UTES WITHOUT SCOTT

BOULDER (Feb. 21) – Getting stand-up performances from players in stand-in roles and a typical night's work from Andre Roberson, the Buffs put away the Utes 60-50 at the Coors Events Center.

"It was a must win," CU coach Tad Boyle said. "It wasn't pretty but we found a way to get it done."

In the rematch, CU took control with a 17-5 run to open the second half. The Buffs got 13 points from Spencer Dinwiddie, 12 from Sabatino Chen, 10 from Roberson and season-high nine from Jeremy Adams off the bench. Roberson added 11 rebounds, 4 blocks and two steals.

And among Roberson's 11 boards was his 1,000th career rebound. He is in second place (1,006) at CU, trailing only Stephane Pelle (1,054).

"It means a lot," Roberson said, mainly because of Boyle's emphasis on defense and rebounding. Roberson said he took that emphasis "to heart . . . it's a great accomplishment for me and I'm not done working."

The Buffs limited the Utes to 31.9 percent from the field and outrebounded them 22-14 in the second half.

Dinwiddie, who had averaged 23 points in his last three games, entered Thursday night having made 32 consecutive free throws. He went two-for-four in the first half but was the catalyst in the Buffs closing with a 9-2 run to take a 30-28 lead at intermission. He also hit four-of-four in the final 46 seconds, enabling CU to close out the win.

The Utes pulled to within five points three times in the final 6:25, but got no closer. The Buffs made five of six free throws - four of them by Dinwiddie one of two by Chen - to account for the final margin.

ROBERSON'S CAREER-HIGH PUSHES CU PAST CARDINAL

STANFORD, Calif. (Feb. 27) – Behind Roberson's career-high 24 points and eight rebounds, Colorado edged the Cardinal 65-63, giving the Buffaloes their first Pac-12 Conference sweep of Stanford and their first-ever win at Maples Pavilion.

"Our players deserved that win," said CU coach Tad Boyle, whose team improved to 19-8 overall and 9-6 in the conference.

"For what they've been through, how they battled and the heart they played with, they deserved that."

Roberson, a 6-7 junior, got scoring help from sophomore Spencer Dinwiddie with 19. They were the only two CU players in double figures.

Stanford (16-13, 7-9) had three players in double digits - Andy Brown with 17, Chasson Randle with 16 and Dwight Powell with 12. Powell almost ended with 14 points, taking an in-bounds pass with 2.4 seconds to play, turning on Roberson and going to the basket for a jam that would have sent the game into overtime.

But he had too much court to cover in too little time - and Roberson knew it. "I knew they were going to play the three or attack the rim," Roberson said. "He went past me and I said, 'Oh, shoot' . . . but the ball was still in his hand when the light went off."

After a collective CU sigh, the Buffs had their eighth win in 10 games and their third consecutive conference road win for the first time since the

Boyle called Roberson "a beast" for his offensive effort and lauded his overall defense on the 6-10 Powell. Boyle also said when Dinwiddie "plays aggressively and attacks the rim, and Andre plays like he did, those two

An improving Cal team executed offensively with its star scorer, Allen Crabbe, on the bench in foul trouble. The Golden Bears went on an 8-0 run over the next four minutes to go up 22-15, and while senior guard Sabatino Chen hit a three to end the half on an energetic note, the Buffs were still down four (24-20) at intermission.

Cal had widened its second half gap to nine by the 5:32 mark - and with a final shooting percentage of 23.1 from the field, the Buffs' comeback attempt came nowhere close. By the final buzzer, CU was down 16 and went back to Boulder with its 62-46 loss.

BOULDER (Mar. 9) - Colorado took a step down on Saturday afternoon, losing to the Pac-12 Conference team in last-place entering the final weekend of play, as Oregon State upset CU 64-58 at the Coors Events Center in the final regular-season game for both teams

CU shot only 35 percent from the field Saturday and had only one player - Spencer Dinwiddie with 18 - in double figures. The Beavers shot 43.5 percent and out-rebounded the Buffs 38-32.

"I want to apologize to everyone in this building for our performance," Boyle said to the crowd before recognizing senior Sabatino Chen and graduating junior Shane Harris-Tunks at the post-game Senior Day ceremony. Chen scored nine points while Harris-Tunks added four.

At intermission, Chen led in scoring with seven points, the first time in his career he has been the Buffs' leading scorer at half.

Out of the locker room, though, OSU found its momentum. The Beavers went on a 15-6 run to take a 42-33 lead with 15:08 remaining, and the Buffs spent the rest of the half trying to recover.

While the Beavers built their largest lead of the game - eight at the 10:15 mark - the Buffs did put together a late comeback attempt in the final two minutes that nearly made up the difference. CU was down 56-50 with 2:10 remaining when a Dinwiddle trev closed the gap to three.

DINWIDDIE, CU WIN UGLY, CATCH ARIZONA NEXT

LAS VEGAS (Mar. 13) - Beaten and embarrassed the previous weekend on their home court by last-place Oregon State, the Buffs regrouped and eliminated the Beavers 74-68 on Wednesday in the first round of the Pac-12 Conference Tournament.

CU sophomore guard Spencer Dinwiddie, who led the Buffs with 20 points on Wednesday, including eight straight after the Beavers had pulled to within a point in the second half.

"Sometimes in tournament games you've got to win ugly," Boyle said, adding he couldn't remember when his team shot better from beyond the three-point arc (43.8 percent) than in front of it (39.3).

Junior forward Andre Roberson, who returned after missing two games with a viral illness, scored 12 points, added seven rebounds and, according to OSU coach Craig Robinson, was Wednesday's

Roberson was enough of an inside presence on the defensive end to help limit the Beavers to 39.7 percent from the field. He also contributed to CU having an 18-12 advantage in second-chance

In addition to Dinwiddie's 20 and Roberson's 12, CU got 16 points from Johnson and eight first-half points off the bench from Jeremy Adams, who continues to be a late-season force

Roberson, the Pac-12's Defensive Player of The Year, knocked down a three-pointer followed by a pair of free throws that gave the Buffs a 12-point lead (61-49) with 2:43 remaining. It was CU's largest advantage of the afternoon, one that the Beavers could not overcome. Added Roberson: "They're a great program. They play just like us - same philosophies. It's like the cat going to get the mice; we've got to come hungry . . . and be ready to play."

BUFFS' LATE RALLY FAILS TO OVERTAKE WILDCATS

LAS VEGAS - The Buffs believe their NCAA case has been stated even in Thursday's 79-69 quarterfinal loss to No. 18 Arizona in the Pac-12 Conference Tournament

No. 5 seed CU rallied dramatically, cutting a 14-point lead by No. 4 seed Arizona to two in the final 63 seconds. But the Wildcats held on and left the Buffs holding their collective breath for one of 37 NCAA at-large bids.

"We're one of the top 37 teams in my mind," said CU coach Tad Boyle. "But it's not for me to say."

The Buffs trailed 39-28 after a first half that saw them commit 10 of their 13 turnovers (leading to 15 first-half Arizona points) and hit only five of 12 free throw attempts.

With 12:24 left in the game, CU fell behind by 14 before tightening up its defense, rebounding more tenaciously and eventually closing to within 71-69 on a pair of Andre Roberson free throws with 1:03 remaining. But Arizona's Nick Johnson scored a layup between two CU defenders at the other end to push the Wildcats up four. The Wildcats added four more free throws in the final 14.2 seconds to win

CU outrebounded Arizona 33-31 with the help of another Andre Roberson double-double (15 points, 11 rebounds), CU also received help from Spencer Dinwiddie (18 points), Askia Booker (12) and

Arizona coach Sean Miller said the Wildcats "beat an excellent basketball team . . . we needed to play extremely hard to beat a team like Colorado. You think about Colorado being seeded fifth, it really shows the depth and quality of our conference from top to bottom."

BUFFS RALLY BUT CAN'T HOLD ON AGAINST ILLINI

AUSTIN, Texas (Mar. 22) - Colorado caught Illinois with a furious second-half comeback, but the Buffaloes couldn't make their inspired run - or their stay in the NCAA Tournament last.

The seventh-seeded Illini withstood the Buffs' rally then staged one of their own, eliminating No. 10 seed CU 57-49.

"I told our team I'm proud of what they've done this year, with a young group," said CU coach Tad Boyle. "We've put Colorado basketball on the map, but we've got a lot of work we need to do . . . I'm proud of what Colorado basketball is in the process of becoming.".

CU trailed by 16 points (37-21) at halftime, but opened the second half with a 23-2 run and went up 44-39 with just under 10 minutes to play. The Buffs held the Illini without a second-half field goal until 8:33 remained in the game and limited them to only three field goals in the

The Buffs' defensive effort in final 20 minutes wasn't enough. Boyle said his players showed "extreme heart" in coming back, but "we just didn't have enough of what it took in key possessions of the game, some offensive and some defensive, to finish this thing off. Illinois made more plays down the stretch than we did.'

Askia Booker topped CU with 14 points and was the only CU player in double figures. Josh Scott contributed a game-high 14 rebounds. Andre Roberson, the nation's No. 2 rebounder entering the tournament, was limited to nine points and eight boards. He finished his junior season 10 rebounds shy of becoming the school's career rebounding leader.

Reflecting on the elimination, Boyle stated: "We'll take some time, get our batteries recharged. But just because we're going to be a year older next year doesn't mean we're going to be a year better. Our players need to understand that . . . we have still got plenty of room for mprovement and this isn't our last time here, I promise you that
