Backup QB jobs high on priority list for scrimmage

BOULDER — With Colorado coach Dan Hawkins previously saying the battle between Cody Hawkins and Tyler Hansen for the starting quarterback job probably won't be decided before the Sept. 6 opener against Colorado State, this evening's closed scrimmage might be more important to two true freshmen vying to be next in line.

Clark Evans, a 6-foot-4, 225-pound scholarship player from Los Alamitos, Calif., and Seth Lobato (6-5, 205), a preferred walk-on from Eaton, are competing for the No. 3 quarterback spot, CU offensive coordinator Eric Kiesau said.

Another preferred, in-state walk-on, Jerry Slota (6-2, 220) of Chaparral, trails Evans and Lobato, Kiesau said.

The team plans to travel with four quarterbacks, but

Kiesau said it would be nice to settle on a third. That makes it easier to distribute repetitions.

"But (between Evans and Lobato), No. 3 could be a week-to-week deal," the coach added, "depending on who understands that particular game plan the best."

Evans started slowly during August camp but has come on of late.

"At first, I thought, 'He's going to take a lot of work,' " Kiesau recalled. "But Clark did a lot of studying on his own. He has improved a lot in communication, how he calls the play, how he

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carries himself."

Evans agreed, saying, "It was a matter of learning the playbook and getting comfortable."

Lobato also has made recent strides.

"Seth came in with a really long windup and was really awkward," Kiesau said. "But he has spent a lot of time on his throwing mechanics and getting his body right."

Kiesau said he is spending about as much time trying to decide on a No. 3 quarterback as he is on the No. 1 job.

"(Evans and Lobato) have good days, and they have days where they look like freshmen," Kiesau said. "There's a lot on them right now. But they'll be all right in the long run."

Invesco open to Showdown

Resolution could be at hand

A resolution in the year-long impasse over the future sites of the Colorado-Colorado State series could be announced as early as Monday at the event's annual luncheon at Invesco Field at Mile High.

Denver Mayor John Hickenlooper, a natural advocate of returning the series to the city, is among speakers lined up for a pre-luncheon news conference. Respective coaches, athletic directors and top university administrators are also on the agenda.

Within a few hours of last year's luncheon, CU issued a release that it was exercising its hometeam option and moving the 2009 game to Boulder. Shortly after, CSU announced it would move the 2010 game to Fort Collins.

CU athletic director Mike Bohn and CSU counterpart Paul Kowalczyk didn't return calls this week. Kowal-czyk said last Saturday an announcement would be forthcoming, but couldn't say when.

The schools are on each other's future schedules through 2014. Denver has hosted the rivalry every year since 1998, except 2004 and 2005, when both games were played in Boulder. The 2005 (54,972) and 2004 (54,954) games at Folsom Field rank as the top two crowds in the stadium's history.

When CU announced the move to Boulder for the upcoming game, Bohn emphasized CU would have only five home games in Boulder without the CSU game. Many Big 12 teams have seven home dates.

CSU officials, including coach Steve Fairchild, prefer the game be played in Denver every year. Both schools have the home or Denver option.

On Friday, Mac Freeman, vice president of stadium operations at Invesco Field, wouldn't confirm or deny negotiations with the respective schools.

Whether the in-state rivalry is the first weekend of the college season or later in September, Freeman said: "We submitted dates to the NFL. We've already looked at dates into the future, and we're absolutely confident we can accommodate those games not in the first weekend of the season."

Freeman pointed to last year's mammoth endeavor when the stadium hosted a Broncos

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preseason game, the closing night of the Democratic National Convention and the Rocky Mountain Showdown within one week.

One of last year's natural cheerleaders for holding the event in Denver, former Denver Metro Chamber CEO Joe Blake, is now the chancellor of the CSU system.

CSU's Hughes Stadium seats 34,400 and Folsom Field lists a capacity of 53,750. There are a limited number of tickets for the opposing team at on-campus games. Invesco Field seats 76,125. Of the nine games at Invesco Field, there have been crowds of at least 73,000 five times, and the fewest was 65,701 in 2006.

"We believe this game should be in Denver," Freeman said. "This is a celebration of two great universities. We would love to see it back."

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Buffs get one more chance to impress

Team will also prepare for CSU in today's final scrimmage of fall

The Colorado coaching staff is expected to determine which player will be the starting quarterback this season after tonight's final scrimmage at Folsom Field.

And then Dan Hawkins will try to keep the decision a secret until the Buffs kick off the 2009 campaign against Colorado State on Sept. 6.

Cody Hawkins, a redshirt junior, is clearly the more experienced of the two. Hansen, a true sophomore, is more mobile and dangerous outside of the pocket.

If the battle for the No. 1 spot is extremely close -- as the coaches have maintained since spring drills and throughout fall camp -- does it really make much of a difference who is under center against the Rams?

"Not really," CU head coach Dan Hawkins said. "I don't think so, really."

First-year offensive coordinator Eric Kiesau plans to lean on his unit's strengths -- a talented stable of tailbacks running behind an enormous offensive line -- until receivers Andre Simmons (just started practicing on Thursday) and Markques Simas (suspended for the first two games) are ready to make an impact.

"They're very similar," Kiesau said of his top two signal callers. "They're both doing a great job, they're both pushing each other. However it plays out, we'll have the right guy out there."

Cody Hawkins, who has a 2-0 record against CSU, has to be considered the front-runner. Hansen missed some practice time during the week due to illness and will probably have to really stand out in tonight's closed scrimmage to move to the top of the depth chart.

"All jobs are open," Kiesau said. "I think once you do (name a starter) guys become complacent and it kind of cuts off the competition. We want competition every day."

On the other side of the ball, the coaching staff will be keeping a close eye on the competition along the defensive line.

Defensive end Marquez Herrod is the most experienced member of a group that lost Maurice Lucas, George Hypolite and Brandon Nicolas to graduation. Lagrone Shields and Conrad Obi are battling for a starting spot on the other end. Freshman Forrest West figures to be in the rotation with classmate Nick Kasa out indefinitely with a knee injury.

Taj Kaynor, Curtis Cunninghan, Eugene Goree, Will Pericak and freshman Nate Bonsu are among the names jockeying for position on the interior of the line.

"They're battling and learning. They're going to get better as the year goes on," defensive coordinator Ron Collins said.
"They're all about where we thought we'd be and we still have a lot of guys battling to get in there on game day. That's the great thing about it is there's a lot of guys in the mix and they're practicing hard and playing hard."

The Buffs have more experienced depth at linebacker and in the secondary. The defense would have to like its chances tonight if the coaches were going to keep score vs. the offense.

"We're not going to worry about what our defense is doing. We're going to work on our stuff and try and get better," Kiesau said. "If we spend time trying to beat our own defense ... we don't get wins and losses for beating Ron Collins. We get

wins and losses for beating the teams we play."

And that's why the final scrimmage will be a mix of evaluating CU players and preparing for CSU schemes.

"To me, it's about having a polished Saturday," Collins said. "It's going to be very game-like in terms of the transition from sideline to getting on the field. We'll get our substitution groups down and also our communication between the box and the sideline down. We want those parts to run smooth and hopefully it gets us ready for the next phase going into the CSU game."

Game day a test for CU O-line

Young Buffaloes hope practice makes perfect


BOULDER — Say the Colorado State Rams line up Sept. 6 in some defense coaches haven't seen, didn't expect — whatever — and throw a blitz that the Colorado Buffaloes never anticipated. What's going to happen?

Given the inexperience along CU's offensive line in 2009 — it has no seniors and only two juniors — some might wonder. Offensive line coach Denver Johnson crosses his arms and shakes his head at the notion there'll be a problem.

"Two things can happen there: You can react and go in a negative direction, or you can respond and go in a positive direction," Johnson said. "Hopefully, we'll do a good job from the press box and the sideline if there is something. There's always something in an opening game.

"I tell you, we've seen so much, though, through the spring and even through the fall camp out of our own defense ... I think it'd be hard just to throw something at us that was just completely foreign. It may be not exact, but I think it'd be hard for someone to throw something at us that we haven't been fairly close to in some drill or scrimmage."

Johnson's confidence should comfort CU fans. The Buffs have five offensive linemen who've started at some point, which is way better than in spring 2007, when the Buffs had six offensive linemen on the entire roster.

The Buffs also are counting on improved health up front after injuries were a problem in 2008. Max Tuioti-Mariner earned a starting spot last September but tore an ACL to end his season. Whether he can return this season remains unclear.

There are some other facts that aren't so comforting.

Starting center Mike Iltis and right tackle Bryce Givens will take their first collegiate snaps Sept. 6. Left guard Ethan Adkins has participated in 41 plays over three games.

Right guard Ryan Miller has 11 starts, including the first four of 2008 before a broken fibula ended his season. He received a medical hardship last year and remains a sophomore in eligibility.

The graybeard is left tackle Nate Solder, a fourth-year junior and converted tight end who was in on all 843 offensive snaps in 2008. Miller, Iltis and Adkins are sophomores; Givens is a redshirt freshman.

The last year the Buffs had no seniors starting on the offensive line or in the two-deep was 1998. The last year a senior did not start at least one game on the offensive line for an entire season was 1982, Bill McCartney's first year as coach.

CU has never gone a full season without a least one senior on its offensive line.

Coaches and skill players are quick to laud their linemen for their size and talent. But everyone knows they need some experience.

"It's kind of like credit: You can't ever get any until someone gives you some," Johnson said.

He said you can't compensate for the lack of snaps: "There's just no substitution for time on the job."

Johnson said the line faces simulations of everything coaches can think of in practice, plus it faces the Buffs' regular defense a lot in camp. And, again, he doesn't expect an opponent to throw something at the offense that's a total surprise.

But then there's the crowd, the emotions and adrenaline that accompany a real game.

"They have to learn how to handle that, too," Johnson said.

Givens provided what he believes is the answer.

"Just going out there and being a mauler," he said. "You have to be tougher than the other guy. You have to want it more and get it done."

Givens' mindset represents what the Buffs have wanted to do on the offensive line for years. He physically prepared himself to do so by increasing his weight from the 240s last winter to what he said Thursday was 280. He said he "ate, ate, ate, ate, ate to do now."

Of the five starters, Givens has been in the program for the least amount of time. Does he feel ready?

"I feel as prepared as I can be," he said.

Givens said he knows what the right tackle is supposed to do on every play. He said he knows what the two guys beside him — the tight end and right guard — are supposed to do, too. He said he's still learning to read defenses as a whole, and there are some blitz packages the offensive line continues to master.

Sept. 6, he said, is coming very quickly.

"Spring ball feels like yesterday," Givens said. "Now we're all ready for the first game. ... Can't wait to get out there."

EXTRA POINTS: CU will hold its third, and final, scrimmage of August camp tonight. It's closed to fans and media. It's expected to focus on specific situations. ... No announcement regarding the starting quarterback is expected after coach Dan Hawkins said Thursday that CU probably won't reveal the starter before the Buffs' season opener Sept. 6 against Colorado State.
