Buffs face tough matchup in Tigers

Likely NCAA-bound Tigers feature speed, balanced scoring

Colorado has played one of the country's most difficult schedules.

From the top of the Associated Press poll -- No. 1 Kansas (twice), No. 6 Kansas State (twice) -- to the middle/tail end of the latest rankings -- No. 18 Gonzaga, No. 21 Texas, No. 22 Texas A&M and No. 24 Baylor -- the Buffs have battled the big boys from Maui to Manhattan.

But the toughest matchup on CU's schedule seems to be Missouri.

The Tigers toyed with the Buffs during an 84-66 victory in Boulder on Feb. 6 for their seventh consecutive win in the series.

"The problem they pose for us is they make you make plays. They force you to go make plays, and our players have to finish those plays," Jeff Bzdelik said. "They seem to be one step quicker than us in all positions thus far."

CU will try to snap a 35-game Big 12 road losing streak in Columbia -- where the Tigers ran them out of town with a 107-62 thrashing last season -- against Missouri tonight at Mizzou Arena (5:30 p.m., no television). It doesn't sound like the Tigers (20-7, 8-4) -- who are quietly in position to earn a bye at the Big 12 Tournament and a likely invitation to the NCAA Tournament -- are going to overlook the Buffs (12-14, 3-9).

"The most important game is the next one coming up with Colorado," Missouri coach Mike Anderson said this week on the Big 12 coaches teleconference. "Jeff is a tremendous coach and a very good person. Their record is not an indication of the kind of season they`ve had. We shot the ball well at their place, but for the most part they`ve been in every game."

Missouri has seven players who average at least 7.5 points per game. That doesn't include Keith Ramsey, who has started every game this season averages 5.5 points and 5.5 rebounds.

Marcus Denmon (22 points), Kim English (21), Justin Safford (10) and Ramsey (10) all scored in double figures in the first meeting at the Coors Events Center. Laurence Bowers added nine points for the Tigers, who shot 49.1 percent from the field, 44.4 percent behind the arc and 81.5 percent at the line.

"That was probably the most efficient game we've had all year long," Anderson said. "Colorado is a team ... they've played teams tough all year long. They have nothing to lose and everything to gain."

The Buffs were suffering from an "emotional hangover" in the first game against Missouri after letting an upset of the top-ranked Jayhawks slip out of their grasp three nights earlier.

Alec Burks was CU's lone bright spot with 27 points. The Grandview, Mo., product is the Big 12's top freshman scorer.

"They pressure you the whole game. They're fast and they run and jump the whole game. It makes you speed your offense up," Burks said. "We need to take care of the ball and share the ball. When we share the ball we're a great team. ... You just have to find open people. When they're trapping someone is open."

Marcus Relphorde was 0-for-5 shooting, Austin Dufault was 0-for-3 and Nate Tomlinson was 2-for-5 against the Tigers the last time CU faced this "40 minutes of hell" style of play. The Buffs turned the ball over 16 times and shot 35.7 percent from the field.

"Our defense has always kept us in games. When we start playing attack basketball and getting our bench involved we start finding a rhythm," Anderson said. "This is the time of year when you want to start playing some of your better basketball."

After tonight's game the Buffs will have an opportunity to put some wins together with games against Iowa State, Nebraska and Texas Tech.

"This team is strong," Burks says of CU, which is coming off a 20-point loss at KU. "Every time we lose we fight back hard."

Buffs holding on to postseason hopes

BOULDER — As we learned Monday from coach Jeff Bzdelik, Colorado men's basketball is not thinking about 2010-11. Not even close.

Bzdelik took exception to a question during the Big 12 coaches teleconference about what the program is playing for, and whether it's trying to set the tone for next year with its final games of this season. He expressed clear intentions that he wants to make something out of 2009-10. The Buffs (12-14, 3-9 Big 12) enter today's game at Missouri still believing they can.

"If we win all the games and make a nice run in the Big 12 Tournament, I don't see why we couldn't make the NCAA Tournament, to tell you the truth," senior guard Dwight Thorne said.

"That would take a lot of coming together, a lot of hard work, a lot of things going our way. But it can happen. If we win our next four games and continue to play well, I think postseason is going to happen."

CU has four games left, including tonight's at Missouri, where the Buffs will try to snap their 35-game Big 12 road losing streak. If they don't snap it tonight, they have one more chance this season — next Tuesday at last-place Nebraska.

The postseason NIT and CBI are watching the Buffs to see how they finish and whether they merit invitation. A strong finish would probably garner one. CU hasn't played in a postseason tournament since the 2006 NIT, the end of coach Ricardo Patton's next-to-last year in Boulder.

CU entered Tuesday one game behind Texas Tech, which hosted Kansas State on Tuesday night, for eighth place in the Big 12. The Buffs have home games remaining with Texas Tech and 11th-place Iowa State.

After being picked to finish last by league coaches in the preseason, eighth place wouldn't be too bad.

"There's still a lot of basketball left," sophomore forward Austin Dufault said. "There are four games plus the Big 12 Tournament. There's a lot of talk of us being in a postseason tournament. That's something we'd like to have. That hasn't happened around here for a while. It'd be great to get to 15, 16 wins."

Missouri (20-7, 8-4) has beaten CU seven straight times, including an 84-66 decision in Boulder on Feb. 6 and a 107-62 win last January in Columbia. The Buffs say having faced Missouri once this year provides familiarity with how it coaxes opponents play faster than they want. But the Buffs sound more concerned with themselves.

They admitted to being complacent on Feb. 6, a result of coming close to beating Kansas three days earlier and having enjoyed so much success at home.

Tonight, they say, complacency won't be a problem.

"We have to come out with more energy," Thorne said. "We didn't have any energy in that game. We all know it. We didn't play with any tenacity.

"We'll have a different mindset at Missouri. Last year we got slaughtered there, and I think that's in the back of everybody's minds."

Missouri focusing on Colorado game and nothing else

COLUMBIA | Most college basketball coaches break the season into segments. The non-conference games. The conference race. The postseason.

Missouri coach Mike Anderson breaks down the Tigers' season even further, into 24-hour segments.

Yes, Missouri is shooting for a top-four Big 12 Conference finish that will give it a first-round bye in the league tournament at the Sprint Center.

And of course the Tigers are building a resume worthy of gaining admission into the NCAA Tournament again.

But Anderson spends little time discussing tournament time with his Tigers.

"I don't talk about it at all," Anderson said. "They may amongst themselves. I'm a day-to-day guy, and all I want this team to do is to stay focused on the things they can control."

At 20-7 overall and tied for third in the Big 12 at 8-4, focusing on the next game at 6:30 tonight against Colorado at Mizzou Arena coincides with a view of the big picture for Missouri.

Win and the Tigers assure themselves of a winning record in Big 12 play. Given the national posture of the conference this season, that should be enough to assure them NCAA Tournament inclusion.

That thought has occurred to more than a few Missouri players.

"We know we're fighting for an NCAA Tournament bid," sophomore forward Laurence Bowers said. "We know what we're playing for."

But, following Anderson's lead, the players contend they have no problem compartmentalizing.

"We think about practice when we practice," Bowers said. "We think about that game when we play that game."

Alec Burks is front and center in the minds of the Tigers, who recall too well the freshman from Grandview pouring in 27 points in Mizzou's 84-66 victory Feb. 6 at Colorado.

"He ate us alive at Colorado," Bowers said. "I'd never even heard of him. But he scores in a lot of ways. Him being 6-6, 6-5, that's to his advantage.

"He's the one that really hurt us at Colorado."

Cory Higgins and Marcus Relphorde are concerns as well.

Higgins leads the Big 12 in steals per game in league games at 2.3, and scored 15 against MU in the first meeting this season. Relphorde has averaged 14.5 points and seven rebounds his last two games, but scored only two against Mizzou.

Colorado is 12-14 overall and just 3-9 in the Big 12 for any number of reasons — including ranking as the worst rebounding team in the league at minus 11.1 boards a game in Big 12 play.

Marcus Denmon and Kim English led Missouri in its earlier victory at Colorado, with Denmon scoring what was then a career-high 22 points and English adding 21. Keith Ramsey and Justin Safford each scored 10 points, and Bowers had nine.

The Colorado victory picked up Missouri's spirits after having dropped a home game for the first time since the 2007-08 season when the Tigers lost to Texas A&M.

Since then, the Tigers' only loss was by two points at Baylor.

The temptation is to look past Colorado toward a bigger test Saturday at Kansas State, where a second victory over the Wildcats could lead to a second-place finish in the Big 12 and all sorts of postseason possibilities.

But of course, that is something Anderson won't discuss with his players, other than to issue a stern warning not to.
