## CU women set to face freshman phenom

MacFarlane has inside scoop on Baylor's Griner

At least one Colorado women's basketball player won't be shocked and awed the first time Brittney Griner steps on the court tonight when the Buffaloes travel to face No. 15 Baylor.

The 6-foot-8 Griner made a name for herself in recent years with her dunking prowess and as the top recruit in the country -- so much so that Baylor garnered a top-10 preseason ranking largely because of her talents. And the freshman phenom hasn't disappointed at the college level.

But CU freshman center Melissa MacFarlane squared off against Griner two summers ago in a club tournament. And while Griner's team won, it should be at least a little comforting for the Buffs to know that one of their own has gone head-to-head with Baylor's Wonder Woman and believes she can be contained.

"She goes to her right shoulder, shoots it off the backboard," MacFarlane said this week in assessing Griner's many talents. "She likes to shoot the 12-foot jumpshot. She's just got such a long wingspan that it's kind of hard.

"Brittney Griner's a huge force in the middle. But I thinkwe can get it done."

The key, MacFarlane and CU coach Kathy McConnell-Miller both said, is getting physical with the slender center.

Griner's numbers this season have certainly read at times like a basketball superhero's.

The Houston product with the 88-inch wingspan is fourth in the Big 12 Conference in scoring at 19.1 points per game. She's fifth in rebounding at 8.5 per game. She's already broken the league's single-season blocks mark with 122 -- an average of 5.8 per game. She leads Baylor in 14 statistical categories. She has numerous double-doubles as well as a 34-point, 13-rebound, 11-block triple-double against Oral Roberts. And, oh yeah, she's dunked four times so far this season, the most recent coming on Wednesday night at Kansas State.

And yet, the Bears are 3-4 in conference play, an indication that the freshman isn't dominating everyone she faces just yet.

"Teams have been successful being a little physical with her," McConnell-Miller said.

McConnell-Miller said the teams that have done well against Griner have done so by pushing her off the block and making her shoot over the top of them instead of trying to deny her and letting her catch lobs close to the basket.

"I think we have to do what other teams have had to do," the coach said. "You`ve got to make it tough for her to make shots."

A big key to that tonight, McConnell-Miller said, will be throwing as much size at Griner as possible. And that's a good thing for the Buffs' own imposing freshman.

The 6-foot-7 MacFarlane has played sparingly this season, appearing in just 11 games and averaging 3.4 minutes in those contests.

Unlike Griner, whose game was college-ready when she stepped on campus in Waco, MacFarlane said she knew entering this season that she wouldn't be playing a lot.

"I'm looking at this year to get better and learn the system and then my next three years hopefully play a lot more," said the Omaha, Neb., native, whose father David played at Nebraska from 1979-81.

Junior Courtney Dunn has gotten most of the minutes at center this season and will get the start tonight as usual for the Buffs. But McConnell-Miller said she expects more reinforcements for Dunn than usual, coming in the form of MacFarlane and sophomore Julie Seabrook.

Seabrook has already seen her minutes increase lately. But McConnell-Miller said MacFarlane has been making strides in her conditioning and offensive abilities inside.

"I do have confidence in her and I've just got to put her out there and let her go," McConnell-Miller said. "I think she's improved considerably over the past month, not only her work ethic but her desire to be on the floor. She's showing that she really wants to be out there."
