CU Buffs freshman Hornbuckle prefers Bzdelik's offense

6-foot-7 Hornbuckle looks to contribute right away for Buffs

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A year ago this week legendary Arizona coach Lute Olsen stepped down after leading the Wildcats to 24 NCAA appearances during his 25 years on the bench in Tucson.

Despite Colorado's lack of basketball tradition and March Madness, Keegan Hornbuckle -- who was offered a scholarship by Olsen after an official visit to Arizona -- decided the more stable coaching situation in Boulder was a better fit for his development.

And so the 6-foot-7 forward from Westlake Village, Calif., committed to Jeff Bzdelik.

"When (Olson) left, that's kind of when I lost interest in it," Hornbuckle said.

Hornbuckle was also recruited by Arizona State, Michigan and Oregon State.

So why did he choose the Buffs again?

"Keegan is a smart kid. He definitely did his homework before he committed to Colorado," Terry Kelly, Hornbuckle`s high school coach, told the Los Angeles Times last fall. "In reality, the system is perfect for him. He had plenty of options, but I think he made the right choice. ...

"We are talking about a kid who will have the opportunity to play right away, in a very tough conference, no less. He's not going to shy away from competition at the next level. He can step in and make an impact, there's no question about it."

Bzdelik hopes to produce a winning record at CU this season after suffering back-to-back 20-loss seasons. Hornbuckle and four other newcomers bring a much-needed infusion of athleticism and depth to a program that has taken its lumps in the Big 12 in recent years.

"Keegan has a high basketball IQ, a very good skill set and he`s very long and athletic," Bzdelik said after a recent workout with his young team. "He has a great upside."

Hornbuckle won two state championships at Campbell Hall High School and averaged 12.2 points, 4.8 rebounds, 1.5 assists and 1.3 steals as a senior. He said the Princeton-style offense Bzdelik brought to Boulder fits his game perfectly.

"I'm starting to get used to everything and the offense. I feel like I'm running everything a lot smoother than when we first started," Hornbuckle said. "My strengths right now are my endurance and my running and cuts and basketball IQ. I need to improve on my strength when I'm driving and on defense."

Hornbuckle will likely be able to provide Bzdelik a spark off the bench as a big guard or small forward. He will have a chance to be an understudy to junior Cory Higgins, a third-team All-Big 12 selection last season who led the team in scoring and rebounding.

Bzdelik has said that all four true freshmen will have an active role on this year's team. Hornbuckle's class also includes point guard Shannon Sharpe, shooting guard Alec Burks and center Shane Harris-Tunks.

"I like to run and cut and all that. I thought this was the best offense I could do that in," Hornbuckle said. "I'm hoping to get in for a lot of minutes. We're pretty deep, but hopefully I'll be able to get some minutes and play hard and do pretty well."

Bzdelik also adds junior college transfer Marcus Relphorde to the rotation this season. The 6-7 forward's name has come up frequently as a player who has opened eyes during preseason workouts.

"Marcus has impressed me," Hornbuckle said. "He's a big kid and he's strong. Cory has also impressed with me with how easily he runs the offense."

CU's first practice for the 2009-10 season will be tonight after the team holds its annual media day at the Coors Events Center.

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
