## CU Buffs look to sack critics

Football team predicted to finish last in Pac-12 South

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Five years of losing, a coaching change and what some believe is the nation's toughest schedule have the college football preseason magazines predicting another sluggish season on the gridiron for the Colorado football program.

Predictably, the Buffaloes disagree and hope to prove they are a contender in their first season in the Pac-12 South Division race.

"I think people are thinking the worst and they don't really know what we have," senior quarterback Tyler Hansen said. "We have a big group of seniors, a lot of returning starters coming back, we've been real close to being bowl eligible the last couple years. So I feel like we're going to surprise people.

"We have a lot of playmakers on offense. Our line is great. Defensively, our line is pretty good and we've got to clean some stuff up in the secondary. And once we do that and figure out our special teams situation in camp, I think we're a solid team."

The case against the Buffs is an easy one to make.

First and foremost, they are slow.

Aside from significant injuries, the overall team speed is the biggest concern of the coaching staff heading into the season.

The Buffs will be dealing with all the transition issues of a team under a new management and in a new conference.

They play 13 consecutive games without a bye, with 11 of them against teams from Bowl Championship Series conferences, seven road games and one on a neutral field.

There are only 16 players on the roster who have been in the program long enough to have experienced a road win.

However, none of those players actually participated in the last victory on the road at Texas Tech on Oct. 27, 2007.

Those facts and others led publications such as Athlon, Lindy's, Phil Steele and The Sporting News to pick the Buffs to finish last or next to last in the Pac-12 South. Most have the Buffs battling UCLA and former CU coach Rick Neuheisel to avoid finishing at the bottom of the division.

"It's the same thing it is every year," offensive lineman Ryan Miller said. "That's all it is is a prediction. It's words on a piece of paper. Big deal."

CU does have some reasons to believe it could be one of the feel-good, turnaround stories by the end of the season.

Players have made it no secret they believe their new coaches are superior to their former staff and they expect that to show up on game days.

There are 27 seniors on the team and both the offensive and defensive lines feature solid experience, which often seems to bode well particularly early in the year.

Having an experienced quarterback also is key and three of the Buffs' most difficult games -- Oregon, USC and Arizona -- will be played at Folsom Field.

CU must win seven games this year to qualify for a bowl game because it is playing an extra regular season game at Hawaii.

"You never know what's going to happen," senior tailback Rodney Stewart said. "It's just a prediction. It's somebody's opinion. We're just going to come out and prove everybody wrong."

Meanwhile, fellow Pac-12 newcomer Utah is predicted to compete for the South Division title and a berth in the inaugural Pac-12 championship game.

The Utes recent history of success has garnered them plenty of respect, despite the fact they have played 11 BCS teams over the last four years and must play 10 this season alone.

The Sporting News ranks the Utes No. 22 in the nation to start the season and predicts they will represent the south in the championship game against Stanford.

Four of the Utes first seven games are on the road, including a trip to USC on Sept. 10 and the annual grudge match with Brigham Young on Sept. 17.

Consider this a victory for good taste.


