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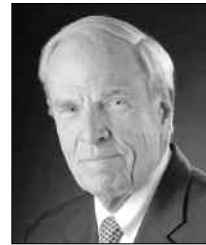

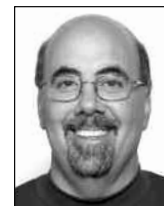

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO

Often called the best of the United States' public universities by the *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, that belief was again strengthened when the University of Colorado received the largest donation ever given to an American public institution of higher learning. The quarter-billion dollar gift to run an institute for cognitive disabilities, it reinforced the fact that CU students not only have the minds to match its mountains, but they climb, and create, those mountains.

Founded in 1876 at the foot of the Flatirons, over 130 years has transformed the University of Colorado from a lone building on a bleak, windswept hill to one of the nation's leading public research institutions. Established in 1861, the University was formally founded in 1876, the year Colorado became a state. The doors of Old Main opened the following year with 44 students, an instructor and the President who taught and lived there with his family, pasturing his horse nearby.

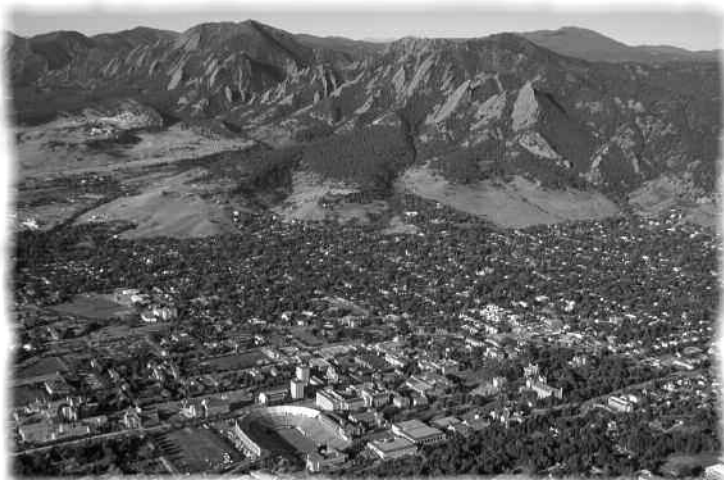
The Boulder campus encompasses just under 800 acres on the main campus, east campus (which includes a research park), Williams Village and the Mountain Research Station north of nearby Nederland (which supports ecology, chemistry and geology). In 1996 the Board of Regents purchased 308 acres of land in unincorporated Boulder County, now informally known as the south campus, in an effort to insure the growth of the University well into this century.

While over 30,000 students are educated on the main campus, another 27,000 study at the University of Colorado at Denver and the Anschutz Medical Center, with 8,000 at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. Nine elected Regents and President Bruce Benson who was named to the position in 2008, lead the three-campus system, while each campus has a Chancellor who serves as the chief academic and administrative officer. Dr. Phil DiStefano is in his second year as chancellor of the Boulder campus.

Students can enter any of 10 schools and colleges offering more than 3,400 courses in 150 fields (of study), representing a full range of disciplines in the humanities, social sciences, physical and biological sciences, the fine and performing arts, and the professions. There are 85 majors on the bachelor's level students may choose from.

The largest University in the Centennial State is a big school, but its northern Italian architecture, named fourth in a ranking of the "most architecturally successful campuses in the country," in *The Campus as a Work of Art*, creates an intimate, visitor-friendly public space thanks to the varicolored sandstone and red-tiled roof facade of more than 200 buildings created by its rural Tuscany influence.

There are 20 residence halls that dot the campus, with more than 1,080 students enrolled in five residential academic programs, providing undergraduates with shared learning and living experiences. Colorado's Greek system, which is comprised of more than



2,000 students, became the first in the nation to ban alcohol from its houses.

Many of the high-tech companies located along the Front Range owe their origins to CU-Boulder's cutting-edge science.

CU has shown that RNA can act as a catalyst in biochemical reactions, developed the first classification system of human chromosomes, created the first national model to assess child development, successfully completed the first instance of human cloning, identified the battered child syndrome, discovered the process of aging is under direct genetic control, developed ways of dealing with natural hazards, created the coldest temperature on earth, and alerted the nation to heightened academic pressures on kindergarten children.

CU-Boulder has played a major role in NASA space programs, designing and building many scientific instruments flown in outer space, and graduated 18 men and women who became astronauts, including the late Jack Swigert, one of the three astronauts in the crippled Apollo 13 mission who made it dock to Earth safely from the moon. When the Hubble Space Telescope was launched in 1990, it was carrying seven major instruments,

including a high-resolution spectrograph to study the evolution of stars and designed and built by an international science team led by astronomer Jack Brandt of CU-Boulder. Since Hubble has been up, CU-Boulder faculty and students have been among the top users of Hubble of any institution in the world. CU-Boulder is the only university in the country where undergraduate students have operated a NASA satellite.

The University has produced 19 Rhodes Scholars, five of which were former football student-athletes at CU, with Jim Hansen the most recent recipient in 1992. Faculty member Thomas Cech, a distinguished professor of chemistry and biochemistry, won the 1989 Nobel Prize in chemistry. Other notable alumni include former

Visitors can experience the University's cosmopolitan atmosphere by visiting Fiske Planetarium, Sommers-Bausch Observatory, and Norlin Library. Lively performances are staged by the Artist Series, Department of Theatre and Dance, and the College of Music, and movie

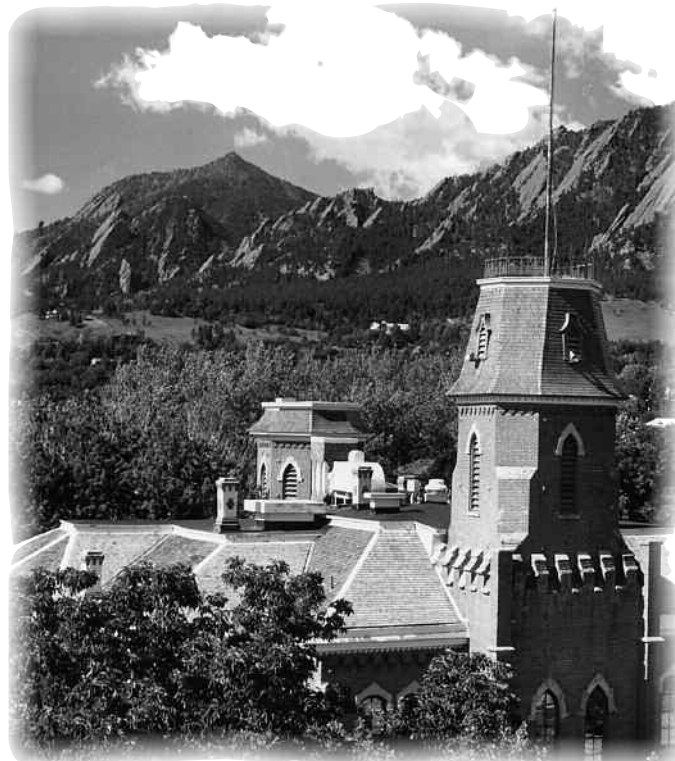
fans can relax with classic, contemporary, and avant garde films. Summer months bring the annual Shakespeare Festival to campus.

Take in the fresh mountain air on any part of 100 miles of trails and 30,000 acres of open space. Climb the Flatirons or in Eldorado Canyon State Park. Swim or board sail at the Boulder Reservoir while elite runners sprint around it.

Rest assured, like the prophesy of an Arapaho Indian Chief, "If you leave Boulder, you will return."

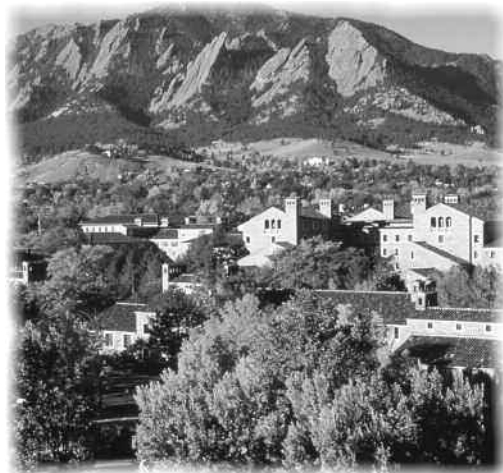
A premier institution in and of itself, the Boulder campus is in good company with some of the finest campuses in the country:

- CU-Boulder was one of only 14 public institutions ranked as a "Best Buy" in the 2009 edition of *The Fiske Guide to Colleges* and annually ranks in its top four most outstanding universities in the United States based on academics, social life and quality of life.
- The *U.S. News & World Report* ranked CU-Boulder 34th among the nation's Top 50 Public National Universities in its 2010 Best Colleges issue. The rankings were based on factors such as academic reputation, retention, faculty resources, student selectivity and financial resources.
- The business entrepreneurship (16th) and aerospace engineering (16th) specialty programs were ranked in the top 20 nationally in the *U.S. World & News Report's* 2010 America's Best Colleges issue. The publication ranked the academic programs overall for engineering (33rd) and business (41st), and also cited 10 UCB graduate school programs in the nation's top 50, led by environmental law (4th) and chemistry (10th).
- And CU has the largest library collection in the Rocky Mountain region, and is 41st among the 125 largest North American research libraries with more than 11 million books, periodicals and government publications.

- For students, the unique campus setting provides an exceptional learning environment. 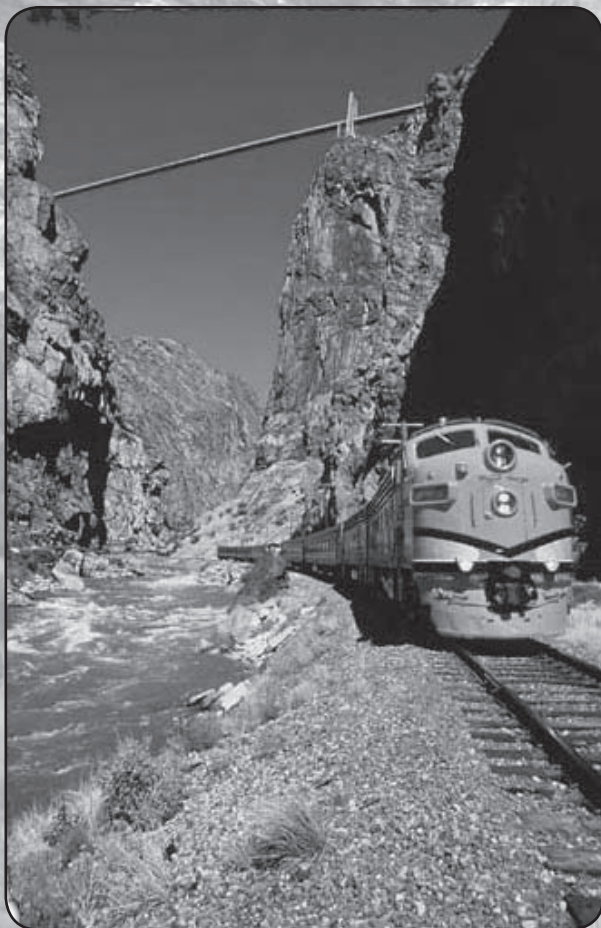

Success Training and Exit Plan for Student-Athletes



STEPS

STEPS is a program designed to assist graduating student-athletes as they transition to life after the university setting.

The "Learn to Earn" workshop with Alice Swanson, a veteran of the Boulder Chamber of Commerce and Leeds School of Business helps with interview skills, job placement and contract negotiation.

Susan Morley from the Leeds School of Business trains about Personal Financial Planning, which is a playbook for life and is a guide to understanding and planning your financial future.

Student-athletes participate in an exit interview to discuss their experience with a senior level administrator.

Student-athletes complete a final medical physical to review medial history with the Office of Sports Medicine and to discuss lingering injuries.

Career services available for student-athletes include help with a resume / folio 21, CSO On-Line, Letters of Recommendation (4-6), Job Fairs and Post-Graduate Test Preparation.

Dr. Jan Johnson, CU's psychologist, offers one-on-one counseling sessions to athletes learning to cope with the impending life changes once their careers have ended.

The Alumni C-Club is available for student-athletes to stay connected to CU through membership.

A graduation checklist is made available as well as help with post-graduate scholarships and a professional sports counseling panel.

HEAD COACH ROY EDWARDS



Roy Edwards, is in his fourth season as head coach of the University of Colorado men's golf team, just the third full-time men's golf coach in Buffalo history. He was named to the position on July 14, 2006, following in the footsteps of the only two coaches the program had ever known over a span of six decades.

Edwards, 33, came to CU with an impressive pedigree, joining the Buffaloes from his alma mater, the University of Kansas, where he had served as the assistant for both the men's and women's programs for the previous four years (2002-06). He held the same position at Vanderbilt University for a year prior to returning to KU.

Edwards replaced the late Mark Simpson, who passed away from complications due to lung cancer in December 2005. Simpson had held the post since 1977, when he followed in the footsteps of his college head coach, Les Fowler. Fowler took over as player-coach in 1948 and remained on board until Simpson, his assistant, replaced him. Thus, Edwards is only the program's third full-time head coach since 1948.

"Coach Fowler and Coach Simpson have built an extremely proud legacy at the University of Colorado," Edwards said. "It's a privilege to follow them at CU, which is truly one of the great institutions in the world and it is an honor to be named its head men's golf coach."

It took less than three years for Edwards to put his stamp on the CU golf program, perhaps in no bigger way than completing the dream of his two predecessors. One of the few major golf programs in the nation without its own true home golf course and facilities, Edwards played an integral part in working with Colorado alum Steve Kerr in the latter's acquisition of Vista Ridge Golf Club in Erie in early 2009. The club officially became Colorado National Golf Club in March of 2009 and now serves as the official home for the university's men's and women's golf teams.

He also initiated the Colorado Partners program, a group that has quickly grown to 80 members who contribute financially to augment

the school's golf budget, and established the Mark Simpson Colorado Golf Day which is an annual celebration and fundraiser for CU golf.

On the course, the team has steadily improved under his leadership. His third Buffalo team sported one of the nation's dynamic duos in Patrick Grady and Derek Tolan, as each won two tournaments and combined for 14 top 10 finishes. But the team was also balanced as a whole, with 32 top 20 performances posted by seven different golfers, and recorded a 74.06 stroke average, second lowest in school history (topped only by 73.77 in 2003-04). The Buffs posted 11 top 10 finishes in major tournaments, the second-most in school history that included a record-tying seven in the top five, and highlighted by a 34-stroke win in the DU-Ron Moore and three runner-up finishes in the USF Olympic Club, Western Intercollegiate and its own CU-Stevenson Ranch Invitational.

In earning a fourth straight trip to the NCAA's, in the Big 12 Championships, the Buffs posted their best conference finish in 28 years when they took second place; it tied for the largest improvement from one season to another in Big 12 history after finishing 10th in 2008 (CU moved from 11th to 3rd from 1997 to 1998 as did Missouri on one occasion). The Buffs were in the hunt for the title until the back nine of the fourth and final round, when Oklahoma State finally was able to get some distance and eventually won by 14 shots.



Edwards' first CU team had moderate success, and finished 11th in the Big 12 Championships; while that was disappointing, his team did something that neither Fowler's or Simpson's did, qualify for the NCAA Championships (though in fairness, more teams are invited today than when they coached, but it still was an impressive accomplishment). The team placed 20th in the NCAA Central Regional.

His second team, in 2007-08, became just the third in school history to win two major tournaments in the same season, as the Buffs won the Louisiana Classics and the Ohio State Kepler Intercollegiate. The Buffs finished 10th in the Big 12 meet, which moved to a 72-hole format for the first time, and was again invited to the NCAA's, placing 18th in the Central Regional. Junior Derek Tolan was one of two individuals to advance out of the regional into the finals, the first Buff to do so since 1993.

At Kansas, he was heavily involved in recruiting and the day-to-day functions for both the men's and women's teams, managed the Jayhawks' Birdie Club and was the main contact for both golf camps. A KU graduate, he returned to his alma mater in August 2002 as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs and further developed all the skills necessary to one day become a head coach.

He coordinated and managed a \$1 million-plus fundraising campaign for KU's golf practice facility, founded and coordinated the annual booster club program, oversaw program communications, budgeting, alumni-parent relations and condition programs, and cording all aspects of official and unofficial visits for the recruiting process, including prospect evaluation and communication. He also was designated as the head coach on numerous occasions, including for 2003 and 2004 NCAA regional play.

He was one of three finalists for the 2004 Golf Coaches Association of America Assistant Coach of the Year, named for Jan Strickland. The award is given to the NCAA Division I, II, III or NAIA assistant coach who has excelled in working with their student-athletes both on the course and in the classroom.

During his time at Kansas, he helped coach six first-team All-Big 12 players (five men, one woman) and four Academic All-Americans. He started his coaching career as a volunteer/graduate assistant in 1998, working three years in that capacity before moving on to Vanderbilt for his first full-time assistant coaching position. During this time, he was also the Junior Golf Director for the Kansas Golf Association, running all activities for over 600 junior members of the KGA.

He was the assistant for both the men's and women's teams at Vanderbilt from May 2001 until returning to his alma mater the following year. At Vandy, he headed the Commodore Golf Day and the Mason Rudolph Intercollegiate Golf Championships, and was involved in Commodore recruiting as well as the day-to-day practice and traveling schedules. He was a part of history as both teams experienced two of the best seasons in the programs' existence the 2001-02 academic year, and had a hand in coaching a pair of first-team All-Southeastern Conference players, including Brandt Snedeker, a first-team All-American, the 2007 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year and third place finisher in the 2008 Masters.

Between KU and Vanderbilt, he coached five players who attained some level of All-American status, ranging from first-team to honorable mention.

A three-year member of the Jayhawk golf team, he lettered as a senior under legendary and long-time coach Ross Randall and earned his bachelor's of science degree in business administration from Kansas in 2000. Simultaneously while finishing his degree, he worked as a volunteer assistant coach for the men's team. His career playing highlights include being named the PGA Midwest Section Player of the Year in 1995 and the Heart of America Four-Ball champion in 1997. As a student, he was also heavily involved on KU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and held several leadership roles on campus.



Simpson and Randall were good friends, and their teams would cross paths during the regular season four or five on the average before the league championships. Not including his year at Vanderbilt, Edwards was with the Jayhawks for 56 tournaments as a player or assistant coach since 1996 that the two schools were in the same field, aiding his familiarity with the CU program.

Born October 14, 1976 in Kansas City, Mo., but truly a native of Hutchinson, Kan., he was a four-year letterman in golf at Hutchinson (Kan.) High School under legendary Kansas high school coach Rusty Hilst, one of his early mentors in the game. His hobbies include playing golf, cooking and traveling, and he was also an Eagle Scout in high school. His father, R.A., is a distinguished KU alum who was awarded the 2002 Fred Ellsworth Medallion for "unique and significant service to the university" (which two grandparents also earned). An uncle, Ray Evans, is recognized as one of the greatest athletes in KU history, as he was a two-time All-American in basketball (1942-43) and was KU's first football All-American after returning from World War II in 1947.

Edwards is married to the former Shelly Bonfantine of Albuquerque, N.M., as they wed on July 7, 2007 (07-07-07); she is a former golfer at the University of New Mexico. They are the parents of one son, Austin Ross (born last June 3).

ASSISTANT COACH JIM GRADY



Former Colorado golfer Jim Grady is in his second year as the assistant coach for the golf team, as he joined Roy Edward's staff in August 2008.

Grady, 25, is also a playing professional while serving in his CU capacity, as he turned pro in July 2008 upon completion of his CU career and his participation in the U.S. Public Links Championships and a few state amateur championship meets.

He earned four letters playing for the Buffaloes, blossoming his senior season where he became a regular on the travel squad and played on occasion as the No. 1 man. He finished fourth on the team in stroke average (75.58), including a 74.42 figure in the spring. His top career finish came in the Louisiana Classics, where he tied for third individually (215, 1-under), leading the Buffs to their first win in the tournament in 18 tries. He tied for 33rd in the Big 12 championships, with his third round 68 the second best by a Buff in 37 rounds of Big 12 play, bested only by a 66 by Matt Call in the 1999 meet at Prairie Dunes.

He graduated from CU with a B.S. degree in Business (finance) in May 2008. He was a four-time member of the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Grady compiled an impressive list of accomplishments in state amateur play, with a history of playing well in Public Links championships. In 2008, he qualified for the U.S. Public Links Championship at Murphy Creek GC (Aurora), where the event was held; he shot 77-68—145 in match play qualifying, but lost his first round match. He had four top seven finishes in the Colorado Golf Association's Public Links championships, including a runner-up finish in 2004, the same year he finished third in the state's stroke play competition. In 2007, he finished third in the Colorado Golf Association Colorado Cup point standings, with six top five finishes including two wins, also reaching the quarterfinals of the CGA Match Play Championships, where he was eliminated by former Buff Steve Irwin (2 and 1).

Grady lettered four times in golf at Broomfield High School; though Broomfield has produced its share of residents to play for the Buffs and other Division I schools, Grady was the first to play golf on the D-I level from the school. He was joined a year later by his younger brother Pat; they were the fifth set of brothers on the golf team at the same time, the first since Bobby and Tom Kalinowski in the early 1990s. He earned first-team all-state honors as a senior, when he was first-team all-Skyline League and the conference medalist. He also lettered in baseball as a sophomore, playing a variety of positions (pitcher, infield).



He was born October 27, 1984 in Westminster, Colo. His hobbies and interests include working out, hiking, watching sports, drawing and reading. His grandfather on his mother's side played football at the University of Denver and was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers, but had to forego the NFL when he was drafted into the army. A second cousin, Kevin McDougal, played football at Colorado State and for three years with the Indianapolis Colts.

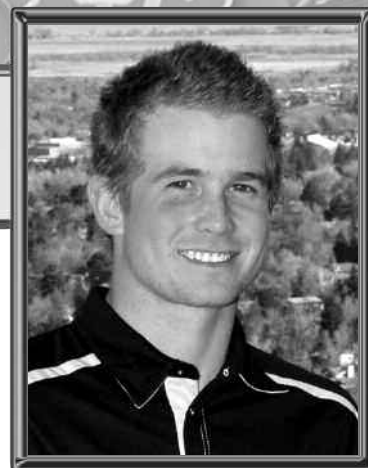

5-11, 170, Sr., 3L, St. Louis, Mo. Chaminade College Prep)



College—This Season (Sr.): In leading the team in stroke average for the fall with a 71.86 figure for 14 rounds, he posted the fifth best average for the fall portion of the season in CU history. He scored seven subpar rounds, four in the 60s, and closed the fall with three top 15 finishes, the first ones of his collegiate career. Tops was a tie for fifth in the Notre Dame Fighting Irish Classic (216, +6), followed by a tie for eighth in weather-shortened Alister Mackenzie Invitational (137, -5). He was in contention for the title in UCLA's Collegiate at CordeValle (9-under after two rounds), but slipped to 15th after a final round 78. In the fall, he was 37th in the nation in greens in regulation (37th, 30th on par-3 holes) and 35th in sand saves; his 46 birdies were second most on the team (113th in the nation).

2008-09 (Jr.): He played in eight tournaments (24 rounds) for the year, finishing sixth on the team in stroke average with a 75.58 figure. He didn't play as well during the spring, owning a 76.22 average, but made the travel team for five of the six fall tournaments, posting three of his top four career efforts through his junior year during the semester, bested by a tie for 26th in DU's Ron Moore Invitational (219, +3). He also tied for 29th in the UNM Tucker Invitational (224, +8) and tied for 36th in the USF Olympic Club Intercollegiate (223, +10). He had three subpar rounds and two even par rounds in averaging 75.20 strokes per round. His final round 70 at the Herb Wimberly, the last event of the fall, was one of the best in the entire field; he owned a final round average of 73.2, fourth on the team, but one bad final round upped that number (sans an 82 at Northwestern's Windon, he averaged 71.0 to close out the other four fall meets). In the spring, eight of his nine rounds were between 74 and 77 (the ninth was a 79), with his best finish a tie for 50th in the Hawai'i-Hilo Invitational.

2007-08 (Soph.-RS.): He averaged 76.56 for 18 rounds on the year, 12 of which came in the spring when he qualified for three tournaments and was a last minute substitute as the fifth man for the NCAA Central Regional. His best finish came at The Maxwell, where he tied for 41st (223, +13). His top scoring effort came at the Hawai'i Hilo Intercollegiate, where he turned in a 219 (+9) scorecard, with his second round 69 his collegiate best round to date. When Michael Baird was not permitted to travel to the regional after being diagnosed with pneumonia, Bardgett was tabbed to fill his spot. His first round 77 was CU's third best score and his second round 80 also counted toward the team total (nine of 12 spring rounds did); he closed with an 81 for a

238 total (+25). He saw action in two fall tournaments, posting his first collegiate top 20 finish when he closed the fall with a 226 (+10) performance in The Wolverine At Mission Inn, tying for 17th.

2006-07 (Soph.): Redshirted; he played in all 21 tournament qualifying rounds as he worked on his game after it was decided he would redshirt.

2005-06 (Fr.): He qualified for two meets in his first semester in college, playing two tough courses in tough conditions. He tied for 89th in The Prestige at PGA West, and followed that up by tying for 68th in the Tunica National Intercollegiate in wet and windy conditions. His lone action in the spring came in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational, where after a disastrous opening round 89, the worst in the 77-player field, he bounced back with a second round 77, the best single improvement in the field as it tied for the 36th best score in round two. In eight rounds for the combined seasons, he averaged 82.0 strokes per round.

High School—As senior at Chaminade College Preparatory, his 67-74—141 scorecard tied for medalist honors in the 2004 Missouri State High School Championships, leading his school to the team title in the process. His opening round five-under-par 67 was the lowest round ever recorded in the state championship meet, topping the previous record of 68 set by current PGA Tour professional John Daly (with the 141 tying the top winning score in tourney history as well). He was the St. Louis Metro Player of the Year as a junior, winning eight of 11 dual meets plus the William Woods tourney in Fulton, while a fourth place finish in the district meet included a clutch par on the 18th hole that qualified his team for the state meet, where it would set a state record for low team score. A two-time, first-team All-St. Louis Metro team member, his stroke average in relation to par as a senior was +0.3 (72.1 stroke average) and as a junior was +1.38 (73.2). As a sophomore, he was a second-team all-metro performer. He earned four letters in golf for coach Jim Prag, and also lettered twice in soccer.

Other—2009: Medalist in U.S. Amateur Qualifying at Boulder Country Club, where he was the only player under par after posting a 68-71—

139 (-1) scorecard. In the event at Tulsa, Okla. (Southern Hills CC), he was in a 27-way tie for the final four spots after a 70-78—148 effort, but birdied the second playoff hole to advance into match play. Seeded 63rd, he lost in the first round (2 up) to Zach Barlow of Percy, Ill. He was the runner-up in the Missouri State Amateur, winning five matches and then succumbing on the first playoff hole to Skip Berkmeier, who he defeated the previous year for the title. The two dueled to a draw after two rounds, forcing the playoff. He tied for 10th in the St. Louis Metropolitan Open (74-70-69—213, +3), but tied for amateur runner-up honors. He tied for the seventh low amateur (and 55th overall) in the Colorado Open at Green Valley Ranch in Denver (75-68-73-72—288, +4). **2008:** Won all six match play matches to win the Missouri State Amateur, sealing the win with an 8 and 6 triumph over Berkmeier; he was the 61st seed, qualifying for the 64-man field on the second playoff hole, and defeated the Nos. 1, 2 and 4 seeds on his way to the title (he won 23 of his 37 holes with birdies, lost just 18 and tied 59 in the nearly seven round competition). He finished third in the St. Louis Metro Amateur (70-68-75—213), and won the Missouri State Four-Ball Championship (69-63—132). He also tied for 48th in the Southwestern Amateur (231, +15), missing the cut to advance to the final round by five shots. **2007:** He finished fifth in the St. Louis Metro Amateur Championship (74-73-72—219). In CU's own match play tourney, he won two matches, including a 5 and 4 win over Patrick Grady. **2006:** Finished second in the Missouri State Stroke Play Championships (70-72-70-72—284), placed third in the St. Louis Metro Amateur

Championship (73-71-76—220) and was eighth in the Metro Open Championship (73-76-68—217). **2004:** He played in 17 ranked tournaments, many on the AJGA circuit, posting a 73.1 average. He had three wins, along with eight top five, 12 top 10 and 14 top 20 finishes. He won the Midwest Championship on the Junior Champions Tour in impressive fashion with a 73-66—139 scorecard and had four rounds in the 60s, with 16 rounds of par or better. He placed fourth in the FCWT meet at the University of Florida.

Best Career Round In Competition—67 (-5; August 2009, Loveland Invitational, The Olde Course at Loveland).

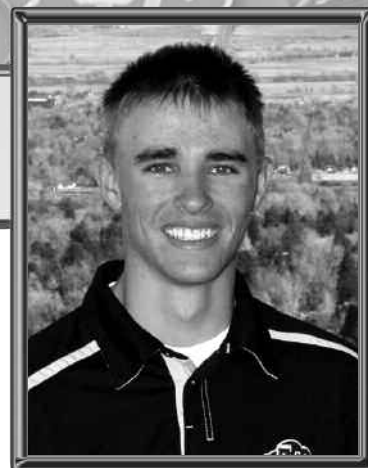

5-11, 150, Fr., HS, Castle Rock, Colo. Douglas County)



College—This Season (Fr.): He participated in four of CU's five major fall tournaments, as well as in the inaugural State of Colorado Cup. He was fifth on the team in stroke average for the fall (75.27), with eight of his 11 rounds counting toward team scoring. He had one top 50 finish (tied for 50th at Air Force), but had at least one par or subpar round in three of the four meets. In the Cup matches against CSU, he was 0-2, dropping a decision in the two-man Four Ball matches and fell 1 up to Riley Arp in single play. He averaged 11.45 pars per round, 191st in the NCAA, but the 38th most by a freshman.

High School—He was selected as the 2008 Colorado Player of the Year by both the *Rocky Mountain News* and *Denver Post*, garnering All-Colorado honors from each following an outstanding senior season. He owned a 71.2 stroke average as a senior, with the crown jewel of 15 high school tournament victories coming his last time out when he won the state's 5A championship. In recording a 73-69—142 in the state meet on the Air Force Academy's Eisenhower Blue Course, he won

the title by six strokes and also led Douglas Country to the state championship. He had several scores in the 60s for the year, including a 64 and a 65. He owned a 72.3 stroke average as a junior, 74.8 as a sophomore and a 75.6 as a freshman, as he earned four letters. He tied for second in the state meet as a sophomore (73-71—144 at Pinehurst CC in Denver), three strokes out of the lead, and tied for 18th as a junior at Collindale GC in Fort Collins. DCHS's most valuable player as a senior, he was a three-time, first-team All-League selection (sophomore through senior seasons; second-team as a freshman), and was also first-team All-State as a sophomore.

Other—2009: He won the Colorado Golf Association's Junior Match Play title, winning all six matches including the championship match over David Oraee, 2 and 1, at Spring Valley Golf Club in Elizabeth; he was seeded 42nd in the field after the stroke play competition and played just three of 35 holes over par in the title pairing. He had reached the quarterfinals in the CGA State Match Play Championship (before bowing out on the 17th hole). He tied for 19th in the CGA Stroke Play Championships at Lakewood CC (73-73-70-73—289, +5). He tied for eighth with his dad (Mark) in the CGA Father-Son at Cougar Canyon in Trinidad (145, +1). **2008:** Reached the round of 16 in the junior state match play, and qualified for the match play portion of the CGA Match Play Championship in being named a CGA Junior All-Star. **2007:** Won the AJGA Medicus Preseason Junior at Albuquerque by two shots (66-74—140) and finished in the top 20 in all four he participated in.

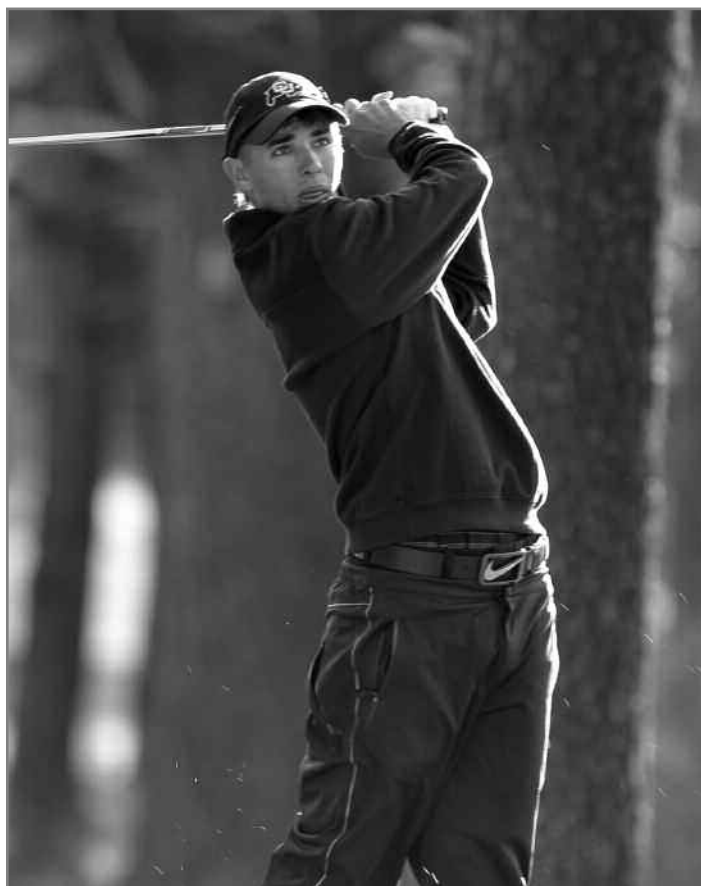

College—This Season (Soph.): For the first time, he became a regular on CU's travel squad, playing in all five fall tournaments and posting the second best stroke average for the fall (73.43). Top finishes included the weather-shortened Alister Mackenzie, where he was tearing it up with a 70-66—136 (-8) scorecard, tying him for sixth in the standings; the second round 66 was his career best in competition to date. He also tied for 24th in the season opener, putting a 220 (+4) into the books in the New Mexico Tucker Invitational. In the fall, he was 44th in the nation in par-3 greens in regulation (69.6) and 64th in overall birdie conversions (28.1 percent); his 48 birdies were the most on the team (90th in the nation).

2008-09 (Fr.-RS): He played in three tournaments on the season, all as an individual where his score did not count toward CU's team score (two occasions; for the third, CU did not enter a full team). His 74.00 stroke average was technically third on the team, but he played just eight total rounds. In the spring, he tied for 57th in CU's Stevenson Ranch Invitational (231, +15), and placed third in CU-Colorado Springs' spring meet (147, +3). He saw action in one fall tournament, tying for 14th in Denver's Ron Moore Invitational with a 67-73-74—214 (-2) scorecard. He recorded his opening 67 despite suffering a triple bogey, but it was still the best first collegiate round in CU history with the 5-under score, besting a 69 (1-under) by Kane Webber in the 1999 Colorado State Invitational. He was also flirting with the best round by a Buff in his first major college tournament, a 65 by Jonathan Kaye in the third round 1990 Wyoming Invitational. Thanks largely to 13 birdies, he became the eighth player in school history to finish in the top 25 in his first collegiate meet.

2007-08 (Fr.): Redshirted; did not see any tournament competition, but participated in all qualifying rounds and practices.

High School—He attended high school in the United States for his junior and senior years at the Bradenton Preparatory Academy, and was coached by Randy Hedgecock along with instructors Scott Bettger and Shane Reiser. He was the No. 90 ranked junior in the *Golfweek*/Titleist rankings for the class of 2007. Bradenton won the Florida State 1A High School championship his senior year (October 2006), as he finished fourth individually with a 75-70—145 effort; BPS also won the district and regional title that same year; he had a hole-in-one in the district competition.

Other—2009: He tied for second in the Dubai Desert Classic Qualifier

(71-79—150); he closed his first round with back-to-back birdies to take over the lead before he missed qualifying by just two strokes. He tied for 33rd in the Colorado Golf Association's Stroke Play Championships at Lakewood CC (73-70-75-78—296, +12).

2008: In the Emirates Golf Club men's championship, he shot a 72-72—144 (-1) to win it for the third time in four tries, successfully defending his title while home from CU on semester break. He finished fourth in the Dubai Desert Classic Qualifier (75-73—148). He tied for second in the Emirates Summer Open (75-70—145); he was actually in a three-way tie for first and was eliminated on the second playoff hole. **2007:** Won the Franz Beckenbauer Invitational for the second time (to go with a 2005 title). He was the runner-up in the amateur division of the Dubai Desert Classic Qualifier (71, -1; missed by one shot). He was the second ranked player in UAE Junior Golf and won the Emirates Golf Club men's championship for the second time. **Other Years:** A regular participant on the Future Collegians World Tour (FCWT), posting three top 10 and seven top 20 finishes, highlighted by a tie for sixth in the 2006 Saddlebrook Junior Classic (70-77—147, seven out of the lead, two out of second) and a tie for seventh in same event in 2007 (72-74—146). He also played in several International Junior Golf Tour (IJCT) events, with his top finish a fourth place effort in the 2005 Orange Lake Fall (73-74—147). He won the 2005 Abu Dhabi Golf & Equestrian Club Junior Open, and in 2004, at the age of 15, he became the youngest ever men's club champion in the UAE (The Emirates Golf Club). He also was the UAE Order of Merit winner for the 2004-05 season.

College—This Season (Jr.): He saw action in four of CU's five fall tournaments, all as a regular on the travel squad, working his game back to where it was after a tough sophomore season. He had a 74.55 stroke average for the fall, fourth best among the regulars. His top finish was a tie for 29th in the Air Force Falcon Invitational (219, +3), and sans one 79, 10 of his 11 rounds were all between 71 and 76. He led the team in fairways hit (75.3 percent).

2008-09 (Soph.): He saw action in four tournaments (two spring, two fall), logging a 76.00 stroke average for 11 total rounds. He played both spring meets as an individual, tying for 63rd in CU's Stevenson-Ranch Invitational (232, +16), and then tying for 17th in CU-Colorado Springs' spring meet (155, +11). In the fall, he owned a 74.83 stroke norm, as he tied for 18th in Denver's Ron Moore Invitational when he played as an individual, recording a 71-72-74—217 scorecard (1-over) at Green Valley Ranch GC. His other fall action came in The Prestige At PGA West, where he tied for 63rd (232, +16).

2007-08 (Fr.): He had a stellar freshman season, with his 40 rounds played the second most by a frosh in school history (trailing the 41 by Terry Kahl in 1976-77) and his 75.93 stroke average tied for the ninth best by a freshman (the seventh by a true frosh). He posted nine top 40 finishes, five in the spring, and had 31 of his 40 rounds count toward team scoring (77.5%). He posted CU's second best 54-hole score in two meets, his first collegiate competition at the St. Mary's Invitational (224, +8) and in the final event of the fall, The Wolverine At Mission Inn (223, +7). He tied for 13th in the latter, his best effort in his first season as a Buff, with his second round 70 his best single round score that he later matched in his second round of the spring in Hawaii. His best finish in the spring came in CU's Stevenson Ranch meet, where he tied for 26th (226, +10). He tied for 46th in the Big 12 Championships and earned a spot on the travel squad to the NCAA Central Regional, joining just a handful of true freshman to do so in school annals. In the fall, he tied for third on the team in scoring average (75.80), the 11th lowest school in school history by a true frosh in the fall. He ranked 32nd nationally for the fall in fairways hit (79.7 percent, which ranked him ninth among all freshmen).

High School—He had steadily improved his prep stroke average at Westlake, as he owned a 74.1 mark as a freshman, a 73.5 as a sopho-

more and a 72.5 as a junior. He led the Marmonte League in scoring average both his sophomore and junior years, earning first-team all-league honors both seasons in leading Westlake Village to conference titles both times. WVHS was the CIF Division champion his junior year. He did not play high school golf as a senior, instead choosing to participate in local amateur tournaments as well as national junior events.

Other—2008: Played a limited amateur schedule due to a shoulder injury, but did tie for 24th in the Southwestern Amateur (300, +12) at Twin Warriors G.C. outside of Albuquerque (low score was a third round 71). **2007:** He tied for 41st in the AJGA ReBath Heather Farr Classic in Mesa, Ariz., with a 219 score; his final round, 1-over par 72 tied for the 16th best score for the last 18 holes. He was ranked as the 160th player in *Golfweek's* Junior Rankings, the 29th player in the state of California. He owned a season tournament scoring average as a senior of 71.44 in national events. **2006:** He was the first alternate for the Western Amateur, and the second alternate for the U.S. Amateur Qualifying. He won the International Junior Golf Tour event at Ojai (Calif.) Valley, one of several IJCT tournaments he competed in. He also had a pair of top 12 finishes in AGJA play, including a 10th place effort in the Mission Hills Desert Junior, where his final round 68 was the low round for the day. **2005:** He won the Junior Tour Desert Classic (Rancho Mirage, Calif.), and was a member of the 2005 United States IJGT Team that also competed at St. Andrews, Scotland. **2004:** He qualified for the United States World Junior Golf Cup team, which competed in St. Andrews as he recorded a 65 in regional qualifying in Long Beach and then a 74-72—146 performance in the national qualifier in Orlando.

6-1, 155, Soph., 1L, Springfield, Mo. Central)



College—This Season (Soph.): He was third on the team with a 73.71 stroke average, with 13 of his 14 rounds counting toward team scoring. He had two top 20 finishes in the fall, led by a tie for 13th in the Air Force Falcon Invitational (215, -1); but his first round effort in the meet earned his way into the CU record book. He opened with an 8-under par 64, tying the famed Eisenhower Blue course record and the CU school record for the most strokes under par for a single round (the latter matching Edward McGlasson's 63 on a par-71 track in 2005 and 64 on a par-72 layout a year later; the 64 tied for the second best gross score in school history, topped only by McGlasson). He shot 32 on each side, scoring six birdies, an eagle and 11 pars with just 29 putts for his 64. He tied for 16th in the weather-shortened Alister Mackenzie Invitational (139, -3).

2008-09 (Fr.): He tied for the third most rounds played by a freshman in school history (37), with his 74.95 stroke average the eighth best ever posted by a frosh (sixth best by a true freshman); it also was the fourth best among the regulars on the team. He had struggles just twice in the last round of a tournament, generally closing strong with a 73.42 for 13 final rounds (minus an 84 in CU's Stevinson meet and a 76 in Denver's, and that number was a really solid 72.1). He played in all but one of CU's 13 tournaments as he quickly earned his way as a regular on the travel squad for five of the six fall trips and all seven in the spring. His best spring effort came in the Big 12 Championships, where his 296 (+16) scorecard at the always tough Prairie Dunes CC (Hutchinson, Kan.) was good for a 12th place finish, the third best by a Buff freshman in the Big 12 meet, topped only by 11th place efforts in 2000 by Kane Webber and Stephen Carroll. It was the eighth best all-time conference meet finish by a CU frosh, and his final round 70 matched the second best 18-hole score by a Buffalo frosh in a league championship meet. He also tied for 15th in the Western Intercollegiate (222, +12). In the fall, he had two top 25 finishes in posting a 74.40 stroke average, the fourth best by a true freshman in the fall (minimum 12 rounds) in school history. He debuted in the USF Olympic Club Intercollegiate, where his 76-71-73—220 (+7) effort tied him for 25th, the seventh player in school history to finish in the top 25 in his first collegiate meet. He came back the following week in DU's Ron Moore Invitational and tied for ninth (67-69-76—212; -4) but did share the lead with teammate Pat Grady after 18 as well as 36 holes. His first round 67 (-5) was his best single round of the fall. His top national stat was a No. 55 ranking in sand saves (56.3%).

High School—A four-time all-state performer, he is one of the most decorated players in the history of the Missouri high school golf. He was the Missouri state champion as a senior (2008), turning in a 72-72—144 scorecard and won on the last hole by getting up and down—from behind a tree. He finished second in the state championship as a freshman and junior (he led the tournament with three holes remaining as a frosh before taking runner-up honors). He owned a 72.3 scoring average per round in high school under coach Bob Kinloch (71.8 as a senior, 74.7 as a junior and 70.7 as a sophomore and freshman) and won nine tournaments during his prep career. He set the Missouri state high school record for low score, recording a 63 to win the All City Invitational at the Twin Oaks Country Club as a sophomore. That round was one short of the overall course record of 62 set by Arnold Palmer in 1961 and tied the amateur course record as well. He was featured in *Sports Illustrated's* "Faces in the Crowd" in its May, 15, 2006 edition. He also played basketball (center) as a freshman.

Other—2008: He finished 20th in the Missouri State Stroke Play (71-68-76-77—292) and reached the round of 32 in the Missouri Amateur. **2007:** He had two top finishes in FCWT (Future Collegians World Tour) action, ninth in the Sun Devil and 10th in the Grand Cypress events and was ranked as the No. 74 in the American Junior Golf Association. Also won the Oklahoma Junior Golf Association Whitehawk Shoot-Out in Bixby with a 66-74—140 scorecard. He had eight top 10 AJGA finishes, including four top five efforts topped by a runner-up effort in the Lockton Federal in Kansas City (71-71-70—212). **2006:** He was the Missouri Junior Amateur Champion (71-71—142) and won the FCWT Oklahoma Junior Classic (69-70—139). He tied for 10th in the FCWT Sawgrass event (79-73—152). In AJGA play, he was fourth in the Lockton at Meadowbrook and sixth at Rich Harvest Farms. **Other Years:** Kring was named the PGA Midwest Section Player of the Year (2005) when he was a Midwest Section Junior Golf Team Member; that same 2004-05 season he was selected as the FCWT Central Player of the Year and as a first-team All-American. He had two top 10 finishes in 2005-06 FWCT action, a win in the OU Junior (69-70—139), and a tie for 10th in the TPC Sawgrass (79-73—152). He had an outstanding 2004-05 season in FCWT competition, placing in the top 10 in all eight

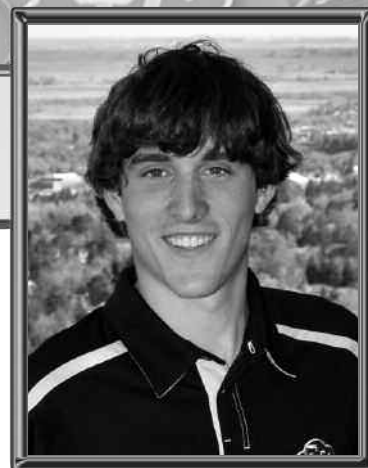

College—This Season (Fr.): He saw action in four tournaments in the fall, three as an individual where his scores did not count toward CU's team total. Though he opened with an 80 in his first collegiate round in New Mexico's Tucker Invitational on the Lobos' tough UNM Championship Course, he bounced right back with an even-par 72 in the second round. His best finish was an 11th place effort in the weather-shortened Colorado State Invitational.

High School—A four-time All-State (6A) and first-team All-District team member. He was a two-time Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS) 6A High School Champion, winning with a 70-74—144 score (even) as a sophomore in 2007 and a 68-76—144 score (even) as a junior in 2008; he placed fourth as a senior (72-76—148; +4) and tied for fifth as a freshman to give him four top 5 performances in as many tries. Playing as his school's No. 1 man from his freshman through senior years, Bishop Lynch won the state title his sophomore and junior seasons under coach David Post. He was a scratch (0 Handicap) golf since the start of his junior year. He completed his

high school/junior career as the No. 107 ranked player in the National Junior Golf Scoreboard Class of 2009 rankings and the No. 177 junior in the *Golfweek*/Titleist rankings.

Other—2009: He finished 17th in the Western Junior Amateur (74-70-72-77—293; +9) at the University of Texas Golf Club in Austin. He won his men's club (Oakridge) championship, the course he grew up on. **2008:** He had a pair of top five finishes on the AJGA circuit, as he was the runner-up in the Dalhousie Open (74-70-71—215; -1) and placed fourth in the New Mexico Open (69-71-74—214; 1-2); he also was 14th in the John Deere Classic, where his first round 67 was his best career round as a junior. **2007:** He placed third in the TJGT Bear Creek Classic, and tied for 16th at the AJGA Dalhousie and the AJGA Fidelity Investments Junior Championship; he played minimally due to a hamstring injury. **2006:** He won the Texas Junior Match Play Championship; after qualifying for the event with a 72-76—148 score and then after winning his first match 1 up, cruised to the title with three 4 and 3 decisions, including in the final, and a 7 and 5 win in the semifinals. In AJGA play, he posted two second place finishes, coming at the Colonial (5-under) and Quad Cities (5-under) competitions, and was eighth in the season championship meet. **Other Years:** He started playing golf when he was four, and played in his first tournament two years later. He posted several top results before he finished grade school.

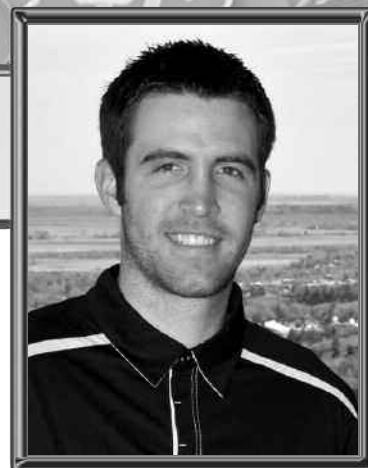

College—This Season (Sr.-RS): He is redshirting this season after undergoing hip surgery in September to mend a chronic problem. He is expected to make a full recovery and was nearly complete with his rehab midway through the spring semester. As a junior, he became the 25th player in school history to play at least 100 rounds.

2008-09 (Jr.): He played in all 13 tournaments (40 rounds), finishing third on the team in stroke average with a 74.28 figure. He had seven subpar rounds (three in the 60s), with 33 of his rounds counting toward team scoring. His stroke average for the spring was almost a stroke higher (74.64) than the fall, as he started to deal with a nagging, chronic hip injury. He still had three top 25 finishes, including the team's best performance in the NCAA West Regional where he tied for 18th with a 70-75-68—213 (-3) scorecard; he had 16 birdies in the meet, tied for the second most in the field, and in the final round, birdied five straight holes at one point (Nos. 17-3), the only player to accomplish that feat in any of the regionals. The final round 68 matched his best score of the year. He had been stuck in a pattern where one bad round cost him a top 20 finish, something that had occurred in the five meets prior to the regional. His other top spring efforts were 25th place ties in the Western Intercollegiate (72-79-73—224, +14) and in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational (75-71-79—225, +9). He tied for 43rd in the Big 12 Championships, rebounding from an opening round of 85 (15-over) to play the next 54 holes at 12-over, helping CU to a second place finish. He qualified for all six fall tournaments and enjoyed a solid semester with three top 20 and five top 32 finishes. He averaged 73.83 strokes per round, third best among the regulars, and had 16 of his 18 rounds count toward the team's total. His top finish was a sixth-place tie in Denver's Ron Moore Invitational, where he posted his best collegiate round to date (4-under par 68) in the second round on his way to a six-under 210 total. He tied for 16th at the UNM Tucker Invitational (220; +4) and tied for 19th at Northwestern's Windon Memorial (217; +4), the latter on one of the toughest courses that plays host in college golf (North Shore Country Club). He closed the fall by opening with an 85 in the first round of New Mexico State's Herb Wimberly invite, but showed his fortitude in rallying for a final round 72. He had three eagles in the fall, tied for 33rd in the nation, and was second on the team in putts per round (30.3).

2007-08 (Soph.): He earned PING All-Central Region honors and finished up as the No. 229 ranked player in the nation by *Golfweek*. His 74.59 stroke average was second on the team, and his 74.08 spring average narrowly missed being the team best, which Michael Baird claimed at 74.05. He was the only Buff with two top five finishes on the year, tied for the team best with four in the top 10, and was second in both top 20 finishes (6) and in rounds counting toward team scoring (83.8, 31 of 37). Four of the top 20 finishes came in the spring, highlighted by a runner-up finish in Ohio State's Kepler Intercollegiate (222, +9) which earned him CU Athlete of the Week honors; he tied for fifth in the Louisiana Classics (216, E) and tied for 10th in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational (220, +4). On all three occasions, he had two solid rounds but one high score in either the first or second round that may have prevented medalist honors in up to all three, but he did rally for a solid closing round all three times. He was second in fall average (75.67), leading the team in total subpar and even rounds with four. He had a pair of top 20 finishes, as he led off his sophomore year with his first collegiate top 10 finish, tying for ninth in the New Mexico Tucker Invitational (216, E). He tied for 15th the next time out in The Prestige At PGA West (217, +1), tying for the top team performance.

2006-07 (Fr.): He had an outstanding freshman season, finishing fifth on the team in stroke average with a 76.26 figure, the 11th best by a frosh in school history (ninth best by a true freshman). In the fall, he played in four of CU's five tournaments, posting a 76.33 stroke average (fifth on the team), with 10 of his 12 rounds counting toward team scoring. He had an impressive start to his college career, finishing 13th in the Rich Harvest Farms Invitational, as his 228 (+12) score on a tough course helped CU to a fourth place finish; it was his best finish of the season. His best score came at the Maxwell Intercollegiate in May, when he tied for 22nd with a 72-70-69—211 (+1) effort playing as an individual, which he did three of his five spring tournaments; the 69 was his season best. He tied for 53rd in the NCAA Central Regional (232, +16), the second best performance by a Buff (it was on the same course the Rich Harvest Farms was played on). His best single 18 in the fall was

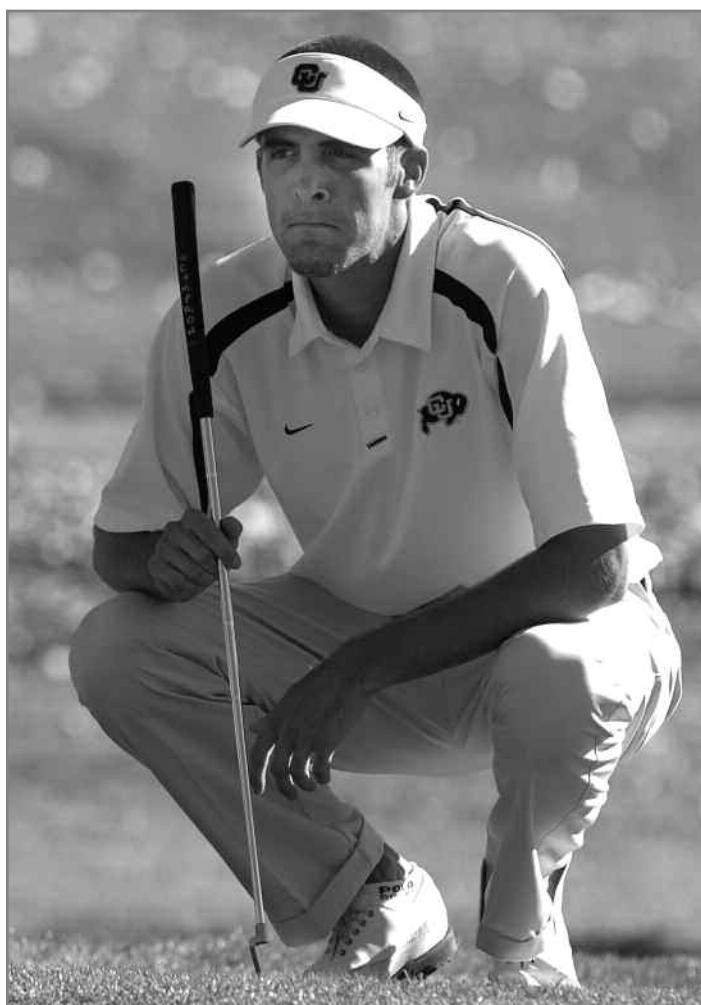
a final round 2-under 70 in The Prestige At PGA West (the 11th best score of the day in the 78-man field), and he closed the fall with a 27th place effort at Pepperdine's Club Glove (234, +18). He finished third in the inaugural Coaches Cup, created to honor long-time CU coaches Les Fowler and Mark Simpson; the award honors the player with the lowest adjusted stroke average in qualifying rounds for team tournaments, as he had a 72.58 average for both.

High School—He was the state leader in stroke average as a senior (71.9), when he was the 2005 Continental League West champion. He finished third as a junior (2004) in the state championships at The Pinery southwest of Denver (147), and was sixth as a senior at Green Valley Ranch (81-71—152). He earned first-team All-Continental League honors his sophomore through senior seasons, and was first-team All-State as a junior and senior. He earned four letters in all under coach Jim McCord, as he also owned stroke averages of 74 as a freshman, 73.5 as a sophomore and 72 as a junior.

Other—2009: Reached the round of 16 in his defense of the state match play championship before succumbing on the 17th hole. He tied for 67th in the Pacific Coast Amateur (299, +11) at The Gallery Golf Course in Marana, Ariz. He finished 29th in the Colorado Golf Association's Stroke Play Championships at Lakewood CC (74-73-73-74—294, +10). **2008:** Won low amateur honors at the San Juan Open (San Juan CC, Farmington, N.M.), recording a 66-72-64—202 (-8),

which also allowed him to continue on to the fourth day overall; he was tied for the lead with mainly just pros remaining in the field and shot a 73 to finish with a 275 total, tying him for sixth overall. He shot a 67 in the qualifying for the CGA Match Play championship, earning the No. 3 seed; he rode that position to the title, dispatching two senior teammates in the process, Patrick Grady in the semifinals and Derek Tolan in the finals, winning the latter two round marathon 2 and 1. He placed sixth in the CGA's State Stroke Play Championship, recording an even par 68-71-71—210 effort at Pinehurst Country Club in Denver. He tied for 13th in the Colorado Open, the fourth low amateur, with a consistent 70-70-71-71—282 (-2) effort at Green Valley Ranch in Denver. He tied for 35th in the Southwestern Amateur (228, +12), but missed the cut by two strokes to advance to the final round. Finished sixth with teammate Tom Gempel in the CGA Two-Man Championship at Eagle Ranch Golf Course (72-74—146). He tied for 60th in the Pacific Coast Amateur with a 75-71-71-75—292 (+12) scorecard at Royal Colwood Golf Club in Victoria, B.C. **2007:** Won the Colorado Golf Association's Western Chapter Championship with an 8-under par 71-65—136 score at The Links at Cobble Creek in Montrose, which was good for a four stroke win; that final round 65 set a course record. He made the 36-hole cut at the Southwestern Amateur but was eliminated after 54 holes at Desert Mountain Golf Club in Scottsdale (73-78-80—223). He tied for 18th in the Colorado Golf Association's Stroke Play Championship, turning in a 74-76-73-72—295 (+7) effort at Murphy Greek Golf Course in Aurora. Missed the cut in the Colorado Open by one stroke, as he recorded a 70-75—145 scorecard, tying him for 67th; the top 60 advanced. **2006:** He won the fourth and final qualifier for the Colorado Open by carding a 6-under par 65 at Riverdale Dunes GC in Brighton the Monday prior to the event, and then finished tied for fifth (and 31st overall) with a 69-69-73-71—282 effort. In the 89th Annual Western Junior Championship in Wheaton, Ill., he finished seventh with a 74-74-69-71—288 scorecard on the challenging Cantigny GC layout, finishing seven shots out of the lead. He finished second in the qualifying for the CGA Junior Match Play Championships (with a 2-under 70 at Bear Creek GC in Lakewood), and went on to reach the quarterfinals in the event. He tied for 14th in the CGA Stroke Play Championships at Boulder CC, as he posted a 72-72-75-67—286 effort, matching the second best score in the field for the final round, and reached the third round of the CGA Match Play Championships (Plum Creek G&CC). He tied for 37th overall in the Southwestern Amateur, as he just missed advancing to the final day of competition with a 76-75-74—225 performance; he made the 36-hole cut and missed out on playing in the final round by a single stroke. Finished as the second alternate (fifth in the rankings though he tied for second overall) in the U.S. Amateur Sectional Qualifying at Green Gables (68-75—143). In four AJGA events (12 rounds), he owned a 72.75 stroke average, with his 43 birdies tied for the fifth most on the circuit for the summer; he had four subpar rounds including a low of 66. He ranked as the No. 81 junior nationally (Sagarin/Golfweek) and was ranked No. 17 for his 2006 class. **Other Years:** He finished fourth in the 2005 CGA junior stroke play, and posted a pair of impressive sixth place finishes on the AJGA circuit in 2004, at the Southwestern Junior and the Lubbock Junior. He tied for first in the '05 Colorado Open qualifying with a 65 and finished 57th in the tournament, where he was 3-under par through 54 holes.

College—This Season (Soph.): Redshirting; he is practicing with the team on a regular basis but is sitting out the year for assorted reasons.

2008-09 (Fr.): He saw action in seven tournaments, six in the spring when he earned his way as a regular on the travel squad. He owned a stroke average of 76.23 for the year (76.00 in the spring), with one subpar and one even-par round in his 22 on the season, though had just three rounds in the 80s (with no 79s, but four 77s and five 78s). His top finish was a tie for 20th in the Oregon Duck Invitational (222, +6). He played some of his best golf for the final two rounds of the Big 12 Championship: he closed with rounds of 73 and 72 on the tough Prairie Dunes Golf Club layout, or just five over par; he tied for 34th and helped CU to a second place finish as a team. That was the fifth best finish by a CU freshman in the Big 12's since the league's inception in 1997. He saw action in one fall tournament, making his debut on one of the hardest courses on the college circuit in the Northwestern Windon Memorial. He tied for 73rd with a 74-81-78—233 (+20) scorecard on the tough North Shore Country Club course.

High School—He played internationally for the Cayman Islands Men's Team while attending the Pendleton School in Bradenton, where he was coached by Shane Reiser of the IMG Academies.



Other—2008: He finished 12th in the Junior Orange Bowl, posting a 72-71-70-70—283 (+3) scorecard. **2007:** He finished eighth in the 2007 *Golfweek* Invitational in Orlando (at the New Course at Grand Cypress), recording a 7-under 68-69—137 scorecard. The top 100 junior golfers in the magazine's rankings were the only ones invited to participate in the tournament, which took place four days after his 18th birthday. **Other Years:** He has an impressive list of amateur accomplishments, which include Caribbean Junior Championships medalist honors in both 2002 and 2006. CU IN THE BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIPS

Colorado has had both individual and team successes in the Big 12 Championships since the old Big 8 Conference absorbed four members of the now defunct Southwest Conference in 1996. Though the Buffs have yet to win an individual or team title, Colorado has seven first division finishes (top six), topped by second place in 2009 and third place efforts in 1998 and 2000. CU flirted with the title in 2001 (undone by one collective bad hole, No. 16 at Prairie Dunes in Hutchinson, Kan.) and again in 2009 (Oklahoma State and the Buffs dueled and traded the lead for the first 63 holes until the Cowboys finally pulled away for a 14-stroke win). In 2003, CU finished a surprising sixth playing with three freshmen in the lineup. CU's last conference championship came in 1968 (Big 8) while **Bob Kalinowski** was the last Buff to claim league medalist honors, doing so in both the 1993 and 1994 Big Eight title meets.

CU THE FIRST In the 2001 Big 12 Championships, **Colorado** became the first school to have all five of its participating golfers finish in the top 20. In CU's case, all five were in the top 16: **Kane Webber** (t-7th), **Ben Portie** and **Matt Zions** (t-13th) and **Matt Call** and **Joe Liley** (t-16th). Oklahoma placed all five in the top 18 in the 2003 meet, and Oklahoma State did the same in 2008, joining CU as the only three schools to place all five in the top 20; the Buffs still have the mark for the fewest places (16). Four players from the same school have finished in the top 20 on 10 occasions, in 1998 (Oklahoma State), 2000 (Kansas), 2001 (Oklahoma), 2003 (Texas), 2004 (CU, OU and OSU), 2005 (OSU), 2008 (OSU) and 2009 (OSU).

In 1989, the University of Colorado inaugurated a "Golf Hall of Fame," inducting four former players at a ceremony prior to start of The International at Castle Pines Golf Club. Periodically, those who have made a significant contribution to the University of Colorado golf program will be inducted into this select group.

THE INAUGURAL INDUCTEES



DALE DOUGLASS, Fort Morgan, Colo.

Dale lettered three seasons at CU (1956 through 1959), graduating in 1959. Following a successful collegiate career in the days of dual matches rather than tournaments, he went on to blossom as a professional golfer on the PGA Tour, winning three tournaments. Since he turned 50, he has taken the PGA Senior Tour by storm, with 12 victories as well as several runnerup finishes. Dale is known by his peers as one of the finest gentlemen of the game and by his friends as an all around nice guy.



LES FOWLER, Boulder, Colo.

Les is truly one of the state of Colorado's golf legends. He was first a player at CU as an undergraduate starting in 1946, then a player-coach and then the head coach, all the while building solid political and real estate careers. He was CU's golf coach for 30 years—the second longest coaching stint in CU history—and on a volunteer basis without compensation. Les was personally rewarded in that he coached many golfers on to great careers in the sport, most notably Dale Douglass and Hale Irwin. He remained one of the state's top senior golfers for over two decades, and won dozens of state tournaments in his career.



HALE IRWIN, Boulder, Colo.

Hale enjoyed two great careers at the University of Colorado. He was a three-year letterman at defensive back in football (an all-Big Eight selection in 1966 and 1967), and spent three seasons as the number one golfer for Coach Les Fowler (1965 through 1967). In his junior year, he set the school's season stroke average record (72.04), which stood for 38 years. He won three tournaments as a senior, ending with a bang: he ended his collegiate career by claiming medalist honors in both the Big Eight and NCAA Championships. He went on to become one of the most respected players and fiercest competitors on the PGA Tour, in addition to having a fabulous career which has seen Hale win 20 Tour events, including the U.S. Open on three occasions (1974, 1979, 1990). He has won 41 events on the Champions Tour, was the Rookie-of-the Year in 1995, is the only player on any PGA Tour to have won the same event five straight years (Turtle Bay) and has surpassed \$30 million in overall career earnings (\$24 million-plus on the Champions Tour).



STEVE JONES, Yuma, Colo.

Steve lettered four years at CU (1978 through 1981), and during that time he rewrote the Buff record book. As Coach Mark Simpson's first recruit, he won two college tournaments and posted nine top-five finishes to go with a school record 21 top-10 placings. He broke Hale Irwin's career stroke average mark with a 73.7 norm for 141 rounds, with his 73.3 average his senior year remaining a school best. Since graduating from CU, he has become one of the bright young stars of the PGA Tour, winning eight tournaments, including the 1996 U.S. Open, and became golf's 99th millionaire. He also won the 1988 Colorado Open. He is now eligible to join the Champions Tour and desires to do so, but is still nursing an elbow injury that has kept him from playing competitively for two years.

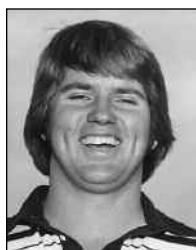

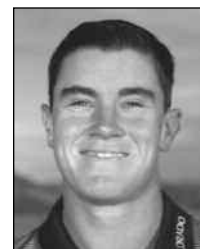

The University of Colorado men's golf team currently has three endowed scholarships, as the interest from those endowments go directly to funding scholarships of current CU golf team members.

The **Nick Petry Scholarship** is in the name of the late CU golf letterman (1939-40), and was begun in 1991.

The **Dale Douglass Scholarship** is in the name of CU's first real star on the PGA Tour (and current Senior Tour member) as he lettered as a Buff between 1956 and 1959.

The **Les Fowler Scholarship** is in the name of the late CU golfer and longtime coach (1948-77) and state legislator. It was created in 2003.

These scholarship endowments aid immensely Coach Mark Simpson's program, as it is his goal to one day have every annual scholarship he awards endowed in this manner.

CU GOLF HISTORY & TRADITION

The game of golf migrated to the United States from Europe, and was introduced at the college level around 1850. As the sport became popular, proponents sought out the warmer climates where it could thrive year-round. And as golf popularity grew, it spread to the larger cities where there was a desire for outdoor recreation, but the financial burden of building and maintaining a golf course was rather great.

Several eastern universities were among the earliest institutions to entertain the game of golf as a "club." As this relatively new sport enticed athletes of all ages to allot their recreation time to it, cities began to select acreage specifically as sites for future golf courses. Around this time, the late 1800s, several universities were endowed with funds that permitted their own private courses. Golf fell in line with most other sports at the time, which originated as clubs at American colleges.

In 1901, a group of professors and students formed a club for golf at the University of Colorado, but were without any real local place to play until 1917, when the city of Boulder built a nine-hole course on the north side of town. This course featured "buffalo" grass, sand greens and a "pasture-pool," complete with gophers. College enthusiasts were invited to join the local "divot diggers," and so golf took off in Boulder Valley. Denver already had the Denver Country Club and Cherry Hills, so Boulder was growing up in this area.

Golf was one of the last minor sports to become a varsity program, attaining that status in 1912. CU initiated a golf team that year, and original opponents included Denver University, Colorado College and Greeley State Teachers College

(now Northern Colorado). World War I had delayed many of the college level sport programs, and the program resumed play in 1920 under Joe Mills, who had coached football the previous two seasons.

Golf at CU underwent a reorganization in 1924, with the first varsity match a challenge between two DU football players (who were caddies at Denver C.C.) and two CU football seniors, who kidded their opponents about the "sissy-game." They learned during the summer at a cost of 50 cents per round. Walt Franklin and Burke bought three clubs and six golf balls from a shop on Denver's Larimer Street to play the match, but there is no record of who actually won. But competitive golf had finally arrived on the CU campus.

Prior to World War II, team captains often served as player-coaches. But since 1948, the University of Colorado has had only two coaches, Les Fowler (1948-76) and Mark Simpson (1976-current). Fowler, an accomplished player himself, led CU into the Big Seven Conference in 1948, finishing second in the league meet as a senior player-coach. It marked the beginning of the modern era of Colorado golf.

It took the youthful Fowler just six years to bring the first championship to Boulder. In 1954, Keith Alexander shot a 216 for 54 holes, powering the Buffs to the league title. The following year, Fowler's team did it again, although the Buffs had to share the spotlight as 1955 Big Seven champions with Oklahoma.

When Oklahoma State became the eighth school to enter the conference, a dynasty of unequalled magnitude resulted. The Cowboys have proceeded to win every Big Eight tournament since 1958-with only three exceptions. In 1968 the Bison surprised the Grier Jones-led Okie Staters by shaving 35 strokes off the previous year's winning total to upset the defending

champs and interrupt the Cowboys' dominant hold. (Missouri won in 1984 and Oklahoma in 1992.)

That 1968 win surprised many a CU golf follower because the Buffs had just lost their all-time best golfer to graduation-Hale Irwin. Irwin, a two-sport star who captained the football team as a senior defensive back, won the individual league title in 1966 by three strokes to pace the Buffs to a second-place finish. He was also co-champion in the rain-shortened, 36-hole tourney the following year with OSU's Jones.

But it was that final year of Irwin's which brought prominence to Colorado golf. The current pro standout won the 70th annual NCAA Championships over such future touring luminaries as Johnny Miller, Hubert Green, Jerry Heard and Rick Massengale.

Irwin continues to be an authoritative force with the PGA. He is just one of a handful of players who have won over \$8 million on the Tour. He was won over 30 major tournaments, including the U.S. Open three times (1974, 1979, 1990), between the PGA and Senior PGA tours.

DID YOU KNOW?... that former CU golfer **Jonathan Kaye** owns the PGA Tour record for the most improvement from one round to the next? At the 1999 Bob Hope Classic he shot a second round 83 but came back with a 62 in the third round. The 21 stroke improvement is a PGA record.

Irwin, though, wasn't the first CU golfer to make it big on the pro tour. Dale Douglass, a 1959 graduate, also made his professional mark after college.

Douglass rarely lost an individual match throughout his collegiate career and was one of the Big Eight's top stars his senior year, finishing fifth in the league championships. As a professional, Douglass' best year was 1969 when he won both the Azalea and Kemper Opens. The two-time president of the Tournament Players Association also won the 1970 Phoenix Open. Most recently, Douglass has made it big on the PGA Seniors Tour, becoming one of its top money winners.

For several years in the Big Eight, the Colorado golf team played second fiddle to Oklahoma State as a powerful foe. After suffering poor finishes in 1973 and 1974, Mark Simpson joined with the legendary Les Fowler to lead the Buffs to a third place in '75 and second in '76. Simpson then took over the reins of the program in January, 1977, and would lead the Buffs to 11 NCAA tournament appearances and 13 first-division finishes in conference action, including a trio of runnerup efforts.

Simpson's first star recruit, Steve Jones, also has made it big on the PGA Tour, winning three tournaments in 1989 alone and the 1996 U.S. Open.

In 1994 another Simpson recruit, Bobby Kalinowski, joined Irwin as a two-time Big Eight champion.

In 1996, one of the most powerful collegiate golf conferences was born out of the formation of the Big 12 Conference, which consisted of all members of the old Big Eight and four members of the disbanded Southwest Conference. The conference has averaged five teams in the Top 25 since its inception, with Colorado often included in that mix.

CU returned to the NCAA Championship finals in 1999 after a five-year absence in stunning fashion. In the NCAA Central Regional on the Ohio State campus, the Buffs pulled off the second largest rally in the 11-year history of the regional format. CU climbed from 18th to 10th place on the final day, and then won a playoff on the first hole against Kent State to advance to the national finals.

The Buffaloes returned as a regular member of the nation's Top 50 during the 1999-2000 season, and have climbed as high as No. 10 in the polls over the last decade. In 2001-02, the Buffs had one of their best years in tying for 14th in the NCAA Championship Finals. The 2003-04 team won the Western Intercollegiate, the first team win in four years, and set a school record for stroke average both overall (73.77) and the spring (73.71).

Colorado has appeared in the NCAA Finals 15 times and in the Championships 27 times overall; on 14 other occasions, CU has been represented by at least one individual.

Backlund NCAA Golf Medalist

Buff Ace Fires 137 For Record

Merle Backlund, the University of Colorado's golf ace, shot with four aces (birdies) to lead the Buffs to a record-breaking 137 in the NCAA golf tournament at Colorado Springs. 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The first individual national title in Colorado golf history, as the late Merle Backlund was the medalist in the 1953 NCAA meet.

Tragedy hit the program in 2005, as on December 5, Simpson passed away after a valiant yearlong battle against cancer. Ironically, he would coach the Buffaloes for the exact same amount of time as Fowler, his predecessor and coach. The duo combined to coach 58 seasons for the school. The legacy the two created was one the administration looked to continue when Roy Edwards was named just the third full-time head coach in CU history.

In Edward's third season, he coached the Buffaloes to a second place finish in the Big 12—CU's first runner-up conference finish since Simpson's teams did so in 1979, 1980 and 1981.



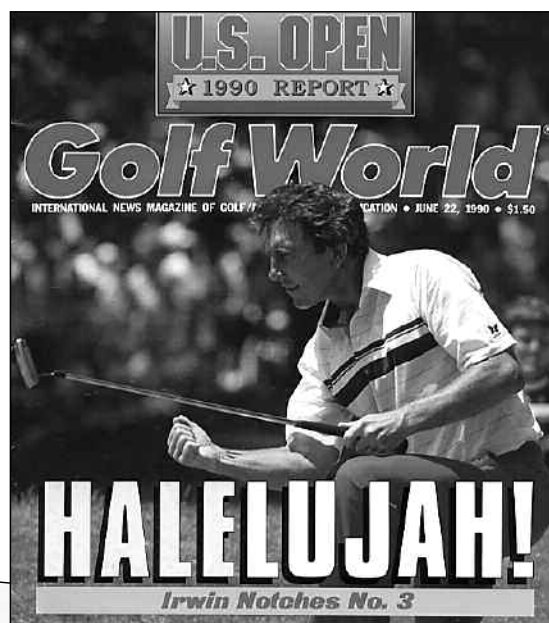

The Buffaloes, Buckeyes and Demon Deacons have had their respective alums win four titles—for Colorado, **Hale Irwin** has won three (1974, 1979, 1990) and **Steve Jones** one (1996). The trophy in 1974 is pictured at right.

CU was the only school in the 1990s to boast two winners (Irwin in '90, Jones in '96), and was also the only school to produce two in the 1970s (Irwin in '74 and '79). No school has ever had three in the same decade.

In 1999, junior-to-be **Matt Call** became the first Buffalo to play in the U.S. Open while still attending CU when he advanced through the two stages of local and sectional qualifying. In 2002, senior and current CU assistant coach **Ben Portie** earned a spot in the same fashion in the Open just three weeks after playing his final collegiate round. That same year, current CU junior **Derek Tolan** qualified and played as a 16-year-old.



BUFFALO GREATS

A look at *some* of the greats in Colorado golf history, including conference champions, multiple record holders and major tournament winners, and/or those who have made their mark professionally.

At Colorado (1953-56): The first Buffalo to win Big 7 Conference medalist honors when he won with a 216 score in the 1954 meet, he helped Colorado to the team title, its first Big 7 crown in golf. Emerging as CU's No. 1 golfer as a sophomore in the spring of 1954, he was the first and remains the only soph in school history to win a conference medalist honors. By tying for 10th in 1955 and eighth in 1956 in the league meet, he became the first (and to date, still one of just five) CU players to have recorded three top 10 finishes in the conference championships. He is believed to have compiled a 25-10-2 record in dual match play, a pretty impressive figure for a No. 1 man, and led CU to the NCAA Championships in both 1954 and 1955.

KEITH ALEXANDER



At Colorado (1950-53): Colorado's first national champion in golf, as he won NCAA medalist honors in 1953 at the Broadmoor in Colorado Springs, when he recorded a 69-68—137 scorecard for a then-NCAA record 7-under par; it was in the day when the field was pared to the low 64 after medal play, and despite losing in the first round of match play, he became only CU's fourth national champion in its athletic history at the time (joining three track performers: Gil Cruter, Dave Bolen and Warren Bateman). The 137 was a record at the time as well, besting the old mark of 138 set by a most familiar name in 1950: Wake Forest's Arnold Palmer. In the Big 7 Championships, he finished ninth as a sophomore and third as a senior.

MERLE BACKLUND



At Colorado (1978-82): The first and to date only golfer in Colorado history to play in four NCAA Championships, as he went individually as a freshman in 1979 (also a first and only) and as a senior in 1982 and with the full Buff contingent in 1980 and 1981. He finished second in the 1979 Big 8 Championships, to date the highest finish ever by a Colorado freshman in a conference championship meet. He tied for 5th in the 1981 event and for seventh in the '82 affair, making him one of just five Buffs to have recorded three top 10 finishes in league championship play. His third place finish at the 1978 Falcon Invitational would stand as the best by a CU freshman in his first meet for 21 years. The summer after he completed his CU eligibility, he pulled off the rare sweep in winning both the Colorado State Stroke and Match Play championships. He was a third-team All-American in both 1981 and 1982.

RICK CRAMER



Professionally: He played briefly on the PGA Tour but did play several seasons on some of the other pro tours, and is currently involved in the Gateway Tour Series in the Phoenix area.

At Colorado (1956-59): Owned a career stroke average of 74.11 as a Buff, playing in an era where dual matches were the norm and tournaments were the exception. He posted three top 10 finishes in the Big Seven/Eight Championships, tying for eighth as a freshman in the '56 Big 7 meet, and taking seventh and fifth in the '58 and '59 Big 8 tests, respectively; he was the second Buff (and still one of just five) to record three top 10 finishes in conference championship play.

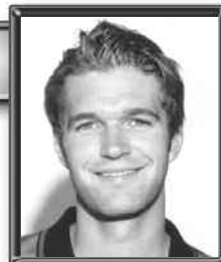
DALE DOUGLASS



Professionally: A member of the Champions Tour since he turned 50 in 1986, he has 11 victories on what was formerly known as the Senior Tour; he became just the fifth player in history to play in 500 tournaments when he reached the mark in 2003. He starred on the PGA Tour after turning pro in 1960, winning three events. He has won just under \$7.5 million on the Champions Tour and over \$9 million as a professional.

At Colorado (1994-99): He led the team in stroke average all four of his playing seasons, one of just two Buffs to do so (with Steve Jones), but they weren't in consecutive years as he redshirted after his true junior season. He led the Buffs at the 1995 NCAA Central Regional in 1995, tying for 14th, and played in one other NCAA meet (in 1999 as a senior). He played 133 rounds, and with 127 counting toward team scoring, he set the school record for percentage counted (95.5). He had a career stroke average of 74.34, and he had 11 top 10 and 22 top 20 finishes in his career. Over the course of his career, he was the top Buffalo scorer in 27 tournaments, the most in school history.

KNUT EKJORD



At Colorado (1945-76): He tied for fourth in the first Big 7 Conference championship meet Colorado ever played in, as he recorded a 147 score for 36 holes in the 1948 meet. Following his graduation, he would coach the Buffaloes on a volunteer basis for a total of 29 seasons, actually starting as a player-coach his senior year. His top players out of over 125 that played for him included Hale Irwin, Dale Douglass, John Hamer, Gary Polumbus, Larry McAtee, Bill Musselman, Tom Woodard, Mark Crabtree and the man who succeeded him as head coach, Mark Simpson. His teams won three conference titles and reached the NCAA Championships seven times, with the 1968 team posting the school's best ever national finish when it tied for eighth. He was a district manager in the insurance business, and active in Boulder politics as a city councilman and state representative and state senator. Though he never played professionally, he was one of the states top amateur golfers for four decades, including senior golf, and is a member of the state of Colorado Golf Hall of Fame. He passed away on February 8, 2003 at the age of 78 in Boulder.

LES FOWLER



At Colorado (2004-09): He finished 14th in the most rounds played (113) at Colorado, finishing 16th in career stroke average (74.45), ninth in top 5 finishes (7), sixth in top 10 finishes (12) and ninth in top 20 efforts (18). As a senior, he was the Co-Male Athlete of the Year at Colorado for all sports (with teammate Derek Tolan), he played in all 13 tournaments, with two wins, five top 5, eight top 10 and 10 top 20 finishes. He earned PING All-Region honors and was an honorable mention All-American, finishing as the No. 46 ranked player in the nation (Golfweek). He recorded a 71.98 stroke average for the season, the third best in school history (and his 71.32 average during the spring the second best, just .02 off the record). His outstanding spring was topped by his victory in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational, where he cruised to the win with an 8-under par 208 score. His top fall highlight was his first career collegiate win, when a 67-69-68—204 scorecard earned him medalist honors at Denver's Ron Moore Invitational at Green Valley Ranch GC in Denver. The 12-under par effort matched John Lindberg's school record for the most strokes under par that he set in the 1989 BYU Classic. He was named the *Golfweek* National Player-of-the-Week for the week ending Sept. 22 after he won the DU-Ron Moore invite, and in the process was believed to be the first player in CU history to be afforded such an honor. He turned pro following his senior year, and won the Adams Tour's Coca-Cola Wal-Mart Open (in Louisiana) in March 2010.

PATRICK GRADY



At Colorado (1961-64): He helped CU to a tie for 18th in the 1964 NCAA Championships, tying for 36th individually (73-78—151), the same year he tied for fifth in the Big Eight Championships (73-71-71—215), as he led the Buffs to a third place finish. Dual meets were more the norm for his day, and as a senior, he posted one of the best dual marks in school history, going 14-2 on the year, with a low round of 68.

JOHN HAMER



After CU: He opted not to pursue a professional career, but took the state of Colorado by storm in the amateur ranks. He owns 10 CGA state titles, including four individual championships (1969 and 1970 Stroke Play; 1992 and 1996 Senior Stroke Play). He was the state amateur of the year in 1969, is one of only three players to ever win back-to-back stroke play titles, and was inducted into the Colorado Golf Hall of Fame in 2002.

At Colorado (1964-67): The 1967 NCAA individual champion, winning by two strokes with a 2-under par 286 score, an effort that saw him post a 65 in the third round, which included a hole-in-one. The all-time CU leader in tournaments won (4), he also racked up two medalist honors in Big 8 Conference play, winning the 1966 title outright and sharing the '67 crown when he was a first-team All-American. His 72.04 stroke average as a junior still reigns as a CU single-season best, as are his eight rounds in the 60s that year, and he is one of just five players to have led the Buffs in average three or more seasons. He earned a combined six letters in football and golf; after playing quarterback as a sophomore, he became a two-time first-team all-Big Eight selection at weak side safety 1965 and 1966, making nine interceptions (in 1989, he was selected to the 25-member All-Century Football Team for CU's first 100 years of football).

HALE IRWIN



Professionally: The all-time money winner on the Champions (Senior) Tour with \$25 million, and he has over a \$6 million advantage over No. 2 Gil Morgan. He won 20 times on the PGA Tour, including three U.S. Opens (1974, 1979, 1990); had 45 Champion Tour wins through 2008, including two U.S. Senior Open crowns (1998, 2000); and 18 other professional wins including international play. His son, Steve, also played for the Buffs between 1994-97, and the two won the 2003 Father-Son Challenge. He is also very active in his own golf course design company.

At Colorado (1977-81): He set numerous school records during his CU career, in which he became the first and only player in school history to record four top 10 finishes in the conference championship meet (two thirds and two sevenths in four Big 8 title meets). A second-team All-American as a senior in 1980-81, when he had nine top 10 finishes and ten top 20 efforts, which are both still school bests. Over the course of his career, he had 19 top 10 and 26 top 20 finishes, both CU records, and was the top Buffalo scorer in 23 tournaments, tied for the second most in school history. He is the only player in Buff annals to lead the team in stroke average for four consecutive seasons, and one of just two to do it four times overall.

Professionally: He has \$6.5 million in career earnings through 2008 (he became the sports' 99th millionaire when he topped that figure). He has won eight times on the PGA Tour, none bigger than his 1996 U.S. Open title. His win in the 1997 Phoenix Open was landmark, as his 11-shot victory was accomplished by scoring the third lowest 72-hole score in PGA history at the time (a 26-under 258). He was the medalist in the 1986 Tour Qualifying School, finally making it to the big time in 1987.

STEVE JONES



At Colorado (1976-81): During his CU career, he played the second most rounds in school history when he teed it up for 18 holes 152 times. But in 1981, in his last Big 8 Conference championship meet, the three rounds he recorded there were most memorable as he ended a 14-year run by Oklahoma State golfers in claiming medalist honors with a 211 score. His 41 rounds during the 1976-77 season still stand as the most ever in a single year by a Colorado freshman. He earned honorable mention All-America honors as a senior in 1981.

TERRY KAHL



At Colorado (1991-94): He became the ninth (and to date, last) player to win back-to-back Big 7, Big 8 and/or 12 Conference medalist honors when he captured both the 1993 and 1994 Big 8 Championships. He joined Hale Irwin as the lone Buffaloes to accomplish the back-to-back feat. His 72.62 stroke average as a senior in 1993-94 was the best in CU history by a senior at the time; his 144 career rounds are tied for the third most by a Buff, with a career stroke average of 73.97. He is tied for the most top five finishes in CU history (11), ranks second in top 20 finishes with 25 and fourth in top 10 efforts with 14. A third-team All-American his junior season in 1993 and a second-team performer as a senior in '94, when he recorded a school record six top five finishes.

BOBBY KALINOWSKI



At Colorado (1990-93): He joined the Buff team after spending his freshman year at Phoenix Community College, and formed quite a CU trio with Scott Petersen and Bobby Kalinowski. As a junior in 1992, he won the PING-Arizona Intercollegiate in style, as he defeated Phil Mickelson on the first playoff hole; he was also the co-medalist at the '93 Air Force Falcon Invitational as a senior, making him one of eight players in school history to win multiple major tournaments. One of six players in school annals to record a 65 (or better) round in competition when he shot 31-34 in the 1990 Wyoming Invitational; the 31 on the front tied the second best single 9-hole score in Buff history as well. He owned a career stroke average of 74.98 with eight top 10 and 13 top 20 finishes in his Colorado career.

JONATHAN KAYE



Professionally: Now a regular on the PGA Tour, with over \$10.3 million in earnings through 2008. He finally broke through for his first Tour win in 2003 when he won the Buick Classic in Harrison, N.Y. and won the FBR Open in 2004. He played on and off on the Tour, mainly due to a rotator cuff injury, but tied for second in the 1998 Qualifying School and has been a regular since 1999; that year at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, his 21-stroke improvement from round one to two (83-62) set the PGA Tour improvement mark.

At Colorado (1972-73): He played just one season of golf, joining the team his senior year. He led the team in stroke average with a 74.00 norm for 16 rounds, posting three top 10 finishes which included a victory in the Galveston Island Intercollegiate, where he won with a 1-over par 289 score.

After CU: He is the owner/general manager of Stevinson Ranch Golf Club (Stevinson, Calif.), and has played a key role in the tournament the Buffaloes have hosted annually since 1999 on one of California's top public courses. After graduating from CU in 1973, he played three years as a touring pro on the European, Asian and Australian tours. After his playing days, he became a real estate broker with an eye on golf, brokering several large scale golf course deals, and in the early 1990s, he set forth to build the highly acclaimed Stevinson Ranch on family owned land in central California. He is often a guest lecturer and is active in the National Golf Course Owners Association.

GEORGE KELLEY



At Colorado (1986-89): His 73.65 career stroke average is the third best in CU history (it set the record at the time), the second best for a player with 100-plus rounds; his 71.15 stroke average the fall of his junior season still ranks as the best for the fall portion of a season at Colorado, while he is tied for the most wins (4) and top five finishes (11) in a CU career (he is second in top 10 efforts with 18 and fourth in top 20 finishes with 23). He set, and still owns, the Colorado records for low score for 36, 54 and 72 holes, all set during his junior season: a pair of 66s for a 132 at the Robertson Homes Invitational set the two round mark; a final round 72 in that meet for a 204 set the 54-hole standard; and his 284 score earlier that same fall in the New Mexico Tucker Invitational established the four round best. And for his career, he was the top Buffalo scorer in 23 tournaments, tied for the second most in school history. He was a second-team All-American as a senior in 1989 after being an honorable mention choice as a sophomore.

JOHN LINDBERG



At Colorado (2002-06): He tied for the third most rounds played in Colorado history, 144, including three GCAA Match Play Championship rounds. His career stroke average of 73.54 ranked third all-time for the Buffaloes, behind only one-time teammate Kane Webber (72.90) and Scott Petersen (74.37); it was the second best figure for 100-plus rounds other than Webber. He set the school record for low single round (63), as well as the most under par (-8) for 18 holes. By holding both the low gross score and most-under-par records for a single round, he became the first player to solely own both marks since Hale Irwin did so between 1967 and 1981. For his career, he had 13 top 10 tournament finishes, including a school record six straight during the course of his senior season, and 20 top 20 finishes. He was named CU's Male Athlete of the Year for all sports at the school's annual CUSPY (CU Sports Performers of the Year) Awards for 2005-06, when he also earned honorable mention All-America honors. He was two-time PING/GCAA All-Central Region selection and was just the second CU player to earn All-Big 12 and All-Big 12 Tournament Team honors in the same season when he did so as a senior.

EDWARD McGLASSON



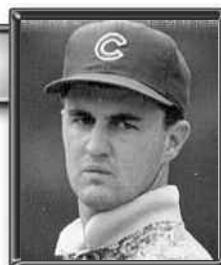
At Colorado (1967-69): As a senior in 1968, he earned first-team All-America honors, the last CU player to do so. He was the No. 1 man on the Buffalo team that posted the school's best-ever finish at the NCAA Championships, as he led the Buff to an eighth-place tie in the meet at Las Cruces, N.M. He tied for eighth individually (70-72-75-74—291), to date the third best individual finish in the NCAA's by a University of Colorado golfer. He led the team in stroke average as a senior (73.80), when he finished second in the Big 8 Championships with a 212 score, falling to Oklahoma State's Grier Jones by two shots; however, he was one of three Buffs to finish in the top four in leading Colorado to the Big 8 title, its last conference crown to date.

BILL MUSSELMAN



At Colorado (1991-93): As a senior, he earned honorable mention All-America honors, when he was a second-team All-Big 8 performer. He led the team in stroke average both as a senior (73.5) and as a junior (73.4), one of only eight players in school history to do so for multiple seasons. He set a mark for the lowest CU career stroke average for 50 or more rounds with a 73.47 for 77 rounds, a mark that stood through 2003. His senior year, he won the John Burns Intercollegiate (Honolulu) and the Fresno State Lexus Classic, and he posted eight top 5, nine top 10 and 15 top 20 finishes in his career. An honorable mention All-American his senior year (1993). Prior to transferring back to the state where he starred as a prep (at Englewood's Cherry Creek High School), he lettered twice at the University of Tulsa in 1989 and 1990.

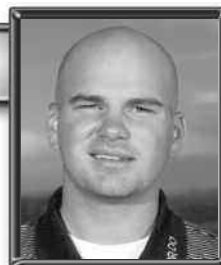
SCOTT PETERSEN



Professionally: A member of the Nationwide Tour since 2000, as well as in 1996; he played on the Canadian Tour from 1997-99. He has came up just short several times in his bid for his PGA Tour card, but has won over \$540,000 as a pro, including wins at the 1997 Infiniti Championship, the 1999 Samsung CPGA Championship and the 2000 Colorado Open.

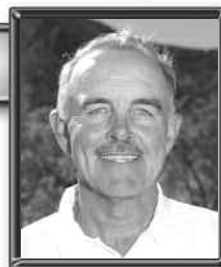
At Colorado (1997-2002): Playing as CU's No. 1 man over the course of his entire senior season, he completed his career with a 73.89 stroke average, fifth-best all-time at Colorado (at the time), with his 106 career rounds tying for the 13th most. As a senior, he led CU with a 72.46 average, the second best number in Colorado history at the time. His spring stroke average of 72.44 set a school record, and was the first Buff under 73 in the spring since Steve Jones did so in 1980. He became the fifth CU player to post a season stroke average under 73, putting him impressive company with Dale Douglass, Irwin, John Lindberg and Bobby Kalinowski. He also led the team in top 10 finishes (4), top 20 finishes (8), rounds in the 60s (5), subpar rounds (12), first round average (71.15), middle round average (72.79), final round average (73.50), and in rounds counting toward team scoring (38 of 39, or 97.4 percent). He tied for 33rd in the NCAA Championships (66-72-75-73—286), becoming the first Buff since Irwin to lead at any point of the finals after his 5-under par 66 in the first round. He won the 2002 sectional qualifier for the U.S. Open, shooting rounds of 68-67—135 and earned the right to play in the U.S. Open on the famous Bethpage Black course in Farmingdale, N.Y. (though he missed the cut). He turned professional immediately following the qualifier, and went out and won his first professional tournament (Green Mountain Open, Killington, Vt.) the following weekend, winning \$10,000 as a tune-up for the Open. After a two-year stint as CU's assistant coach, he is now the head pro at Sterling Country Club.

BEN PORTIE



At Colorado (1968-2005): Student, Athlete, Facilities Manager, Administrator, Assistant Coach, Head Coach. Simpson held all those roles over nearly four decades as a Buffalo, until cancer claimed him early at the age of 55 on December 5, 2005. He had a modest playing career at CU, earning three letters, but would make his mark as one of the top coaches in the collegiate game. On January 12, 2005, he was inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame. Simpson had replaced his own coach, the legendary Les Fowler, in January 1977, and would coach the Buffs for 29 years, the exact length Fowler had done so. He presided over 421 events as head coach, the fifth most for any sport in school history. He was most proud of the fact that 119 of the 129 players he brought into the program (92.2 percent) graduated with a degree from CU. He was the 1981 Big Eight Conference and NCAA District Five coach of the year, when CU finished second in the league and 11th in the nation. He was named the co-Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year in 2000, as his Buffaloes finished third in the league meet and were ranked in the nation's Top 25 for most of the year. He was also a finalist for induction into the Colorado Golf Hall of Fame in 2002, and in 2004, the organization recognized him for his contributions to the sport and honored him with its Lifetime Achievement Award. Simpson's teams went to the NCAA's 15 times in his tenure. Under his tutelage, Colorado produced seven different All-Americans who combined for 13 accolades (Jones, Tom Woodard, Terry Kahl, Rick Cramer, John Lindberg, Bobby Kalinowski and Kane Webber), in addition to 10 all-Big Eight and four all-Big 12 golfers and 15 All-America Scholars. He was also heavily involved in collegiate golf administration, and served two-and-a-half years as GCAA president (2000-2002) and spent a decade in different positions with the organization.

MARK SIMPSON



At Colorado (2005-09): He finished third in the most rounds played (151) at Colorado, and was 13th in career stroke average (74.19). He tied for second in both the most top 10 finishes (18) and top 20 efforts (26) in school history (he was 11th with five top five performances). He has had 89.8 percent of his career rounds count toward team scoring (132 of 147; does not include four solo rounds), a figure which ranked fifth in school history. He became just the fifth CU player to have qualified to play in four NCAA Championships, joining Rick Cramer (1979-82), Bob Kalinowski (1991-94), Matt Zions (1999-2002) and Kane Webber (2000-04). As a senior, he was selected as the Male Career Athletic Achievement Award winner for all sports, and the co-Male Athlete of the Year (with teammate Patrick Grady) at the school's annual CUSPY celebration (CU Sports Performers of the Year). An honorable mention All-American by Golfweek (one of 20) and the GCAA (one of 33), he also earned PING All-Central Region honors, All-Big 12 honors and All-Big 12 Tournament Team accolades. He finished as the No. 43 ranked player in the nation by both GolfStat and Golfweek. He became the 10th player in school history to win two career tournaments, claiming both in the fall semester, and in doing so set a school record for the lowest stroke average (71.00) for the fall in CU annals. He opened up his senior year by earning co-medalist honors in San Francisco's Olympic Club Intercollegiate, and three weeks later again snared co-medalist at New Mexico's Tucker Invitational. In-between, he placed second in DU's Ron Moore Invitational, posting his career best for the most under par in a tournament (205, -11). In the spring, he had four top 20 finishes, highlighted by a tie for second in the Western Intercollegiate (213, +3). He turned pro following his senior year and promptly went out and won the San Juan Open in his third tournament as a professional, and then captured the Colorado Open.

DEREK TOLAN



At Colorado (2000-04): A third third-team All-American as a senior, when he had three wins, six top 10 finishes (11 top 20) and a conference-runner-up 71.46 average that established a new CU single-season school record (just three strokes over par for the year). His first collegiate win came in the Western Intercollegiate (206, -4); three weeks later, he won again, claiming the Purdue Invitational (206, -10); and a month after that, he won The Maxwell in a playoff to become one of just 19 golfers for the year to win three or more times. His 71.35 stroke average in the spring decimated the previous record, and for the year, he led the team in 23 (of 24) statistical categories. He played the fifth most rounds in school history (144) on his way to a 72.90 career stroke average, which bested the old mark by over half a stroke. He also ranked fourth in top five finishes (10), fourth in top 10 efforts (15), first in top 20 finishes (27) and first in 54-hole tournament scores of 220 or better (29). At the 2004 CUSPY's (CU Sports Performers of the Year Awards banquet), he was selected as the Male Career Athletic Achievement Award recipient.

KANE WEBBER



Professionally: He is competing on the European and Asian tours and in several regional professional tournaments.

At Colorado (1974-77): Nicknamed the "Human 2-Iron" for his svelte 6-foot-3 frame, believed to be the first African-American to play varsity golf at Colorado. He led the Buffs in stroke average as a junior ('75-76) with a 76.27 figure for 30 rounds. He often played his best in the Big Eight Championships, tying for fifth as junior in 1976 and was sixth as a senior a year later, when he earned an individual berth in the NCAA Championships and was awarded honorable mention All-America honors. He became the sixth player in program history to twice be named first-team all-conference, garnering the nod in 1976 and 1977 and joining Keith Alexander, Dale Douglass, Hale Irwin, Larry McAtee and Jim English as two-time recipients. He played briefly on the PGA Tour in the late 1970s. He is currently the general manager and director of golf at Foothills Golf Course in Denver, a position he held for years for the City of Denver (overseeing six courses), and has served on the board of directors for the Colorado Golf Association. Owns the low round at Denver's popular City Park Golf Course (an 11-under 61 he shot in 1988).

TOM WOODARD



GCAA HALL OF FAME

LATE CU COACH SIMPSON INDUCTED INTO COACHES HALL

NEW ORLEANS (January 12, 2005) — University of Colorado men's golf coach Mark Simpson was inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame, the first CU coach to earn the exclusive honor.

"I'm completely honored and humbled that the committee would consider my coaching career worthy of this honor," Simpson said in opening his induction speech. "I'd like to thank the person who nominated me, but I don't know who that is.

"About three months ago, I was having breakfast with a friend, and about three-fourths of the way through it he said, 'You know, Simpson, you have a great job.' I said, 'Yeah, I like it.' Then about two weeks later at lunch with another friend, he says to me, 'You really do have a dream job.'

"I got to thinking and I truly realized that I do have a dream job," Simpson said. "One, I get the special privilege to work with young 17- and 18-year olds and help mold them as people and golfers; two, I love the University of Colorado and no matter what you've heard about CU these last months, ninety-eight percent of what some perceive about us just isn't true. It is truly a special place, and I'm fortunate enough to coach at my alma mater. And three, I get to coach and teach the game of golf.

"My dream job has lasted 29 years," he continued. "There is so much to be thankful for and people to thank. God.

The University of Colorado, as (the athletic director) Eddie Crowder took a chance and named me as head coach when I was just 26 years old. All of the players who I've been blessed to coach and watch mature during my time at CU. My peers. The GCAA; I've been to Japan, Scotland, England, Ireland and all over the United States thanks to the GCAA.

Simpson closed by acknowledging that when he was a young coach, he would listen to advise of those who had been in the profession for a long time. He gave a bit of advice for younger coaches in the audience.

"If you want to be a great coach, one of the qualities you have to have is that you must relate to your players," he said. "Use relate as an acronym: the R is for respect; the E for edify, or to build up your players; the L for listen, as in truly listen to them; the A for authentic, be the real person you are; the T for time, and wisely spend the same amount of time with each of your players and in several areas; and the second E for expectations, for as a coach, it is extremely important to pass on your expectations of them.

"One of the quests we have is to prepare them for life, and the greatest thing I can hear is when they return years later and tell of the appreciation for what they learned from me, but more importantly, from their experiences at the University of Colorado."

In attendance at the event were members of Simpson's immediate family, his mother Martha, Anne Kelly, CU women's golf coach; Mark Crabtree, the head coach at Louisville who was one of Simpson's first players; and Eric Hoos, a former CU assistant and current head coach at Denver.

CU's Assistant Athletic Director for Media Relations, David Plati, a long-time friend and colleague of Simpson, presented him for induction. Some highlights of his presentation:

"I've been CU's SID since 1984; five years earlier, as a freshman in the office, I was handed the men's golf beat. After being named SID, I wasn't about to give it up, in part due to my love for the game as well as for the sheer enjoyment I have had working with Coach Simpson and

the golf team for what has now been almost 26 years. I'm probably the only SID he even remembers handling his sport...

"Mark's induction is two-fold, one for his longevity as a respected coach, as well as for all the work he has done on behalf of college golf. He has truly thrived on being involved on the administrative side of things, and the game is better for his contributions.

"Mark is truly one of the good guys. Ask most everyone who has ever met him. I can say for fact that 'Stretch,' one of his nicknames, is truly one of the all-time most popular figures both at the University of Colorado as well as in Colorado golf circles, which honored him last September with the Colorado Golf Hall of Fame's Lifetime Achievement Award.

"Mark has all the qualities one seeks in a college coach, some of which include:

"Humility. Mark has never been above learning and evolving as a coach. He will tell you that when he started out, he wanted all his players to like him. After a few years, he learned they didn't want a friend; they wanted to be coached and to be mentored.

"Disciplinarian. After all, we are talking about a man who left Jonathan Kaye home from the 1993 Central Regional. To this day, he will tell you it was one of, if not the, toughest decisions he has ever had to make.

"Compassion: A freshman, Charlie Luther, hit his first collegiate drive off the then-called women's tee markers with the ball landing several feet behind the tee box. The poor kid was even holding his pose, having no idea where the ball went until he heard the thud behind him. 'Simps' comforted him with the line, 'Don't worry Charlie, even Bo Jackson lost yardage on his first college carry.'

"But he also traveled the 14 hours both to and from Australia to help comfort one of his players after his father passed away. He was on hand when that player, Kane Webber, shot a 59 a day after the funeral in a family

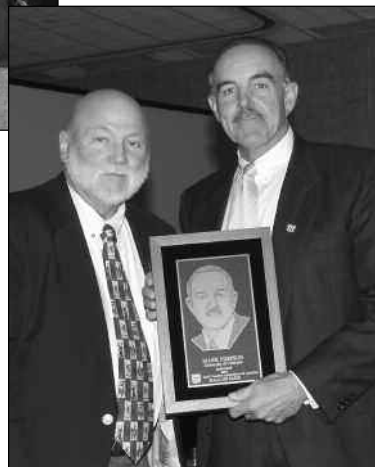
tournament played to honor his dad.

"Part-Time Nutritionist. Mark has purchased over 10,000 bananas for players to snack on during their rounds... something about the potassium I believe. Mark also thrives on finding the best Mexican food restaurant in a town so he can showcase his knowledge of the Spanish language, and loves the Louisiana Classics as he has turned many a young meat-and-potatoes golfer on to crawfish.

"Respect. How many U.S. Open winners openly thank their college golf coach publicly within minutes after victory? That's what Steve Jones did in 1996, as well as several more times in the days afterward.

"And Good Fortune. Mark offered the same Steve Jones, his first top recruit, a full ride back in the summer of 1977 after Jones shot a 72 after a morning 86 at one of Colorado's tougher courses, Hiwan in Evergreen. He would soon learn that a full scholarship back then was seldom ever offered and it ate up almost all of his allotted aid for the year. But it would be worth it.

"In a recent interview, Mark summed up what he thought was the best thing about the game of golf. He said, 'The greatest thing is that it teaches maturity in the sense that you can't blame anybody or anything for your failures, you can only point the finger at yourself.'"

The camp is geared toward the golfer who regularly participates in tournaments and is looking to improve their competitive game and understands what it takes to be a successful college golfer. Our double-occupancy accommodations will be at the four-star Westin Westminster Hotel, just outside of Boulder. All our golf will be at Colorado National Golf Club, the home of the University of Colorado golf teams. Colorado National (CNGC) is one of the best golf facilities in the Denver-Boulder metropolitan area. The overnight option is strongly encouraged due to the concentrated schedule of the camp. A \$150 discount will be given to anyone wishing to enroll in both sessions. Deadline for registration is 10 days prior to start of camp.

COLORADO NATIONAL GOLF CLUB

The Official Home of the Buffaloes

Les Fowler had a dream. **Mark Simpson** had the same one.

The two head golf coaches at Colorado, each for 29 years between 1948 and 2006, longed for the University of Colorado to have its own golf course.

Enter **Steve Kerr** and current CU head coaches, **Roy Edwards** (men) and **Anne Kelly** (women). Kerr graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School in Denver and was one of Fowler's last recruits, playing under both coaches as Simpson took over in the middle of his Buffalo career.

A long-time supporter of CU's golf teams, Kerr remained close with Simpson through the years and saw his daughter **Erin** become one of CU's first real stars of its fledgling women's program. She graduated from CU in 2003 as the school's all-time leader in stroke average and is now playing professionally.

To say that Kerr wanted to give something back to the program he loves and cherishes would be an understatement. In addition to the financial contributions through the years he has made to both programs, on March 2, 2009, it became official: the Buffaloes finally would have a golf course and facility to call its very own thanks to him.

Located in Erie and formerly known as Vista Ridge Golf Club, Kerr's purchase of the entire operation and subsequent licensing agreement with his alma mater has created **Colorado National Golf Club**, which will now provide Colorado's men's and women's programs with one of the finest arrangements in all of college golf.

Kerr floated the idea of purchasing and/or developing land in or around Boulder to build the school a course, but that became unrealistic due to several factors. Edwards and Kelly then suggested models in place at Texas A & M and the University of Washington, where local courses were purchased and then for all intents and purposes were basically donated back to the schools for their privileged

use without any of the financial responsibility or liability for owning or operating the course.

Kerr liked the idea and as it became more of a reality, athletic director **Mike Bohn** and former CU chancellor **Bud Peterson** became integral players to make CNGC happen. Knowing Vista Ridge was attainable, Kerr worked to acquire the property to set everything in motion by the end of last summer.

CNGC and the school have signed a long-term licensing agreement for it to be the exclusive home golf course of the CU men's and women's golf programs and will utilize the primary athletic mark and a newly created secondary logo (*see next page*) in all branding efforts. The club will feature CU memorabilia from all sports, highlighted by CU Golf All-America Awards and already has plaques on display, as well as Simpson's last golf bag he maintained as head coach.

The club is in the process of transforming its look and incorporating the CU brand. New golf carts have been ordered, 71 of which will be black and gold with the CU logo, with 11 others to represent each rival school in the Big 12 Conference. Each cart will eventually be equipped with a past or present Buffalo celebrity welcoming the participants to CNGC.

All six Big 12 Conference South Division schools have home courses, along with Iowa State and Kansas State in the North. Locally, the Air Force Academy and Colorado State have official home courses.

The course will remain open for public play as well as tournament play, both amateur and for charity.

Matt Schalk is the club's director of golf and general manager, with **Jason Dumler** the head professional; both are native Boulderites and Schalk at one time served as a volunteer assistant coach for the Buffs. The championship configuration of CNGC is 7,676 yards with a par-72 layout, though there are six tee boxes, the shortest all the way down to 4,790 yards with four in-between providing every golfer to play in his or her own comfort zone. CNGC is located at 2700 Vista Parkway (Colorado Highway 7), about two miles west of Interstate 25.
