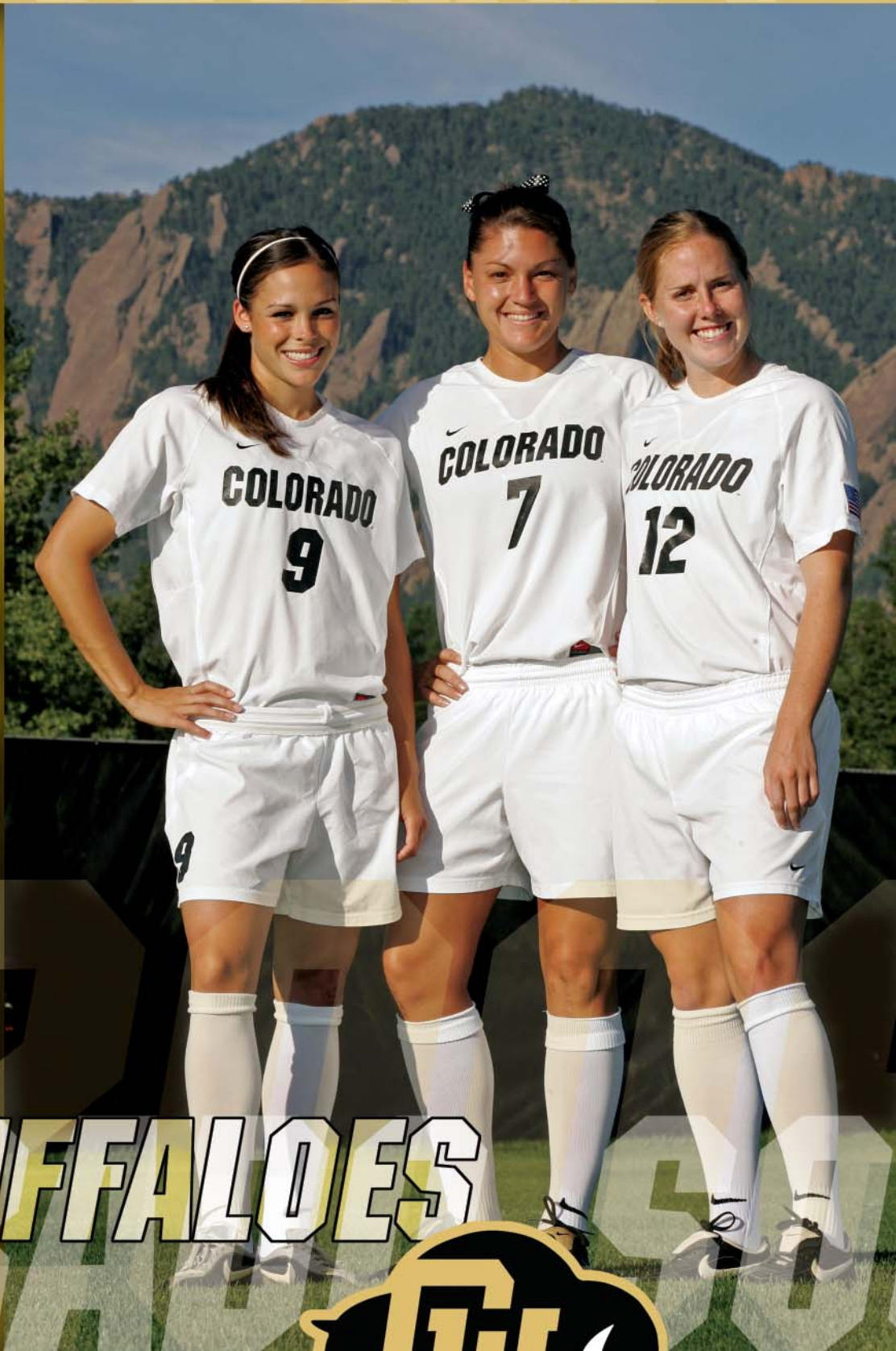

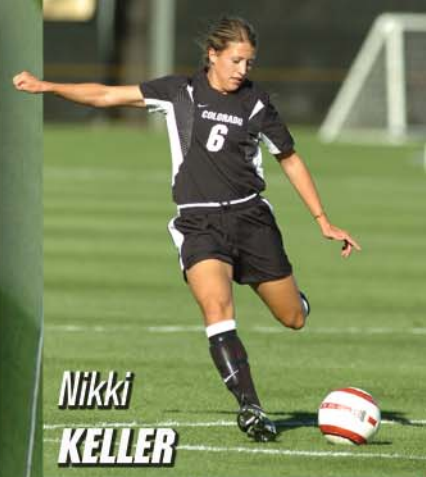

Colorado's Sports Information Department welcomes and encourages your interest in Colorado Soccer. We will make every effort to meet your needs in covering the Buffs. The Sports Information office is located in the Balch Fieldhouse Annex on the west side of Folsom Field and opens at 8 a.m. daily. Associate director Lindsay Lew is located in Gate 2 of Folsom Field.

MEDIA SERVICES

Weekly media releases containing updated team and individual statistics, information on upcoming games, Big 12 Conference standings and the latest NSCAA Division I poll will be available every Tuesday morning throughout the season. Game notes, media guides and roster information can be picked up before every game at the scorer's table at Prentup Field. Copies of the match statistics and postgame release can be emailed to your outlet following each game, home or away.

PRENTUP FIELD

All home games will be played on campus at Prentup Field, located on CU's East Campus at 33rd and Colorado. Admission, and parking in the adjacent lot, are free.

INTERVIEW POLICIES

Interview requests should be made directly through the CU Sports Information Department. Please contact Lindsay Lew to request access to athletes. Both athletes and staff will be on the field and available to the media following a brief cooling off period at the conclusion of all games. Buff practices are held on Prentup Field, from 7:30 to approximately 9 a.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and approximately 3-4:30 on Wednesdays. Players and coaches may speak with the media after practice. The coaching staff is generally available in their offices weekdays from 9 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and after practices. Please feel free to call any member of the coaching staff during the day at 303-492-0632, however to contact a student-athlete, we ask that you go through the media relations office.

DURING THE GAME

Statistics are available at halftime and at the end of the game. There are currently no phone lines available at Prentup, but wireless internet access should be available for the 2006 season. Please see Lindsay Lew or Allie Musso at the game for login information.

With CU's 3-0 victory at Northern Colorado last season, CU head coach **Bill Hempen** earned his 50th win at Colorado. Just the second coach in women's soccer history at Colorado, Hempen is also the winningest. When Hempen took over, the Buffaloes were 36-53-5, with a .404 winning percentage. Since then, CU is 55-37-11, with a .673 winning percentage, and have earned a Big 12 title and have made three consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament. Having graduated six starters, the 2006 season will be a challenge that Hempen and his squad are ready for.

WHAT RETURNS

The Buffs return 11 letterwinners and five starters from the 2005 NCAA Tournament and Big 12 runners-up squad. In all, 64 percent of its goal scorers (24-37) and 64 percent of its shot takers (236-367) will make their way back to Prentup Field this fall.

They return three of their top four scorers in 2005 second team All-Big 12 performers **Katie Griffin** (25 points) and **Allison Kidd** (22) and All-Big 12 Newcomer team selection **Nikki Keller** (12). **Laura Munnelly**, also an All-Big 12 second-team selection returns to hold down the Buffs defense along with lone returning goalkeeper, **Kirstin Radlinski**, from a position that combined for a stellar 1.04 goals against average and 11 shutouts.

"The kids that are seniors, as well as all the returning players, have had a taste of championship caliber soccer and what it takes to play at that level."

The Buffs return nine freshmen from the 2005 season, four of whom found their way into the starting lineup as **Michelle Wenino**, Nikki Keller, **Alex Cousins** and Kirstin Radlinski have started 23, 20, 12 and eight games respectively.

WHAT DOESN'T

The Buffs lose six starters from the winningest class in CU history in Fran Munnelly, Tricia Regan, Ashlie Mihalcin, Darci Smerchek, Jessica Keller and Kathryn Grandinetti. The Class of 2005 went down as the first CU class to string together four winning seasons, as they were 10-8-2 as freshman, 15-4-1 as sophomores, 15-6-2 as juniors and 12-8-4 as seniors. With a 52-26-9 overall mark, the six have been a part of three NCAA Tournament appearances and one Big 12 Championship title in 2003.

One of the most visible midfielders in the league, Munnelly was a four time First Team All-Big 12 selection, finishing with eight goals and six assists for 22 points last season. Munnelly wrapped up her collegiate career with 30 career goals and 81 career points, making her the first player in CU history to score over 80 points.

Grandinetti led the way in the assists column with six in the 2005 season to go along with three goals.

Goalkeeper Keller made a name for herself all over the CU goalkeeping record books, despite not being able to finish out the 2005 season due to a career ending injury on Oct. 16, 2005. She is tops among all CU keepers all time in goals against average with 0.83, wins with 37 and shutouts with 25.

WHAT'S NEW

The Buffs will welcome 14 newcomers to the Colorado program, the most in program history. Junior transfer **Amber Bettenhausen** (Irvine, Calif.) and freshman **Caitlin Choun** (Forest City, N.C.) joined the team for the 2006 spring season and look to continue to contribute in the fall.

"Amber transferred in and fits right in with the kinds of players that we have here. She is very knowledgeable on the field and we expect her to be a great addition to the program."

CU's 13 true freshmen include **Chelsea Anglin** (Kailua, Hawaii), Choun (Rutherford, N.C.), **Megan Down** (Escondido, Calif.), **Libby Doyne** (Mendham, NJ), **Kelly DuChene** (Chanhassen, Minn.), **Allyson Goodman** (Englewood, Colo.), **Kellis Johnson** (San Anselmo, Calif.), **Shea Kelly** (San Clemente, Calif.), **Kara Linder** (Lincoln, Neb), **Jess Quador** (Littleton, Colo.), **Kelly Ross** (Superior, Colo.), **Nikki Marshall** (Mead, Colo.) and **Mary White** (Highlands Ranch, Colo.).

THE FORWARDS

The Buffs' front line remains relatively intact from the 2005 season. Griffin erupted down the stretch last season, scoring a CU record 12 goals on the year with one assist for a record 25 points. On three occasions this spring and summer, Griffin was called up to train with the United States U-21 National Team, the result of which was a spot on the 2006 Nordic Cup squad, the first such assignment for any Buff in program history.

"Fran (Munnelly) set the standard so high and Katie has followed in her footsteps," said Hempen. "Katie has a chance to take over everything that Fran accomplished."

Allison Kidd was tied for third last season with 12 points from four goals and four assists. Kidd will be looking to start the 2006 season on a new level, coming off a spring ACL injury, and she will prove to be a vital asset up front down the stretch.

"Kidd has had two years of slow starts and good finishes," says Hempen.

Newcomer Nikki Marshall will look to join Griffin and Kidd up top. Marshall was the leading scorer in school history at Skyline and also helped lead her high school 4x400 relay team to the 2006 state championship.

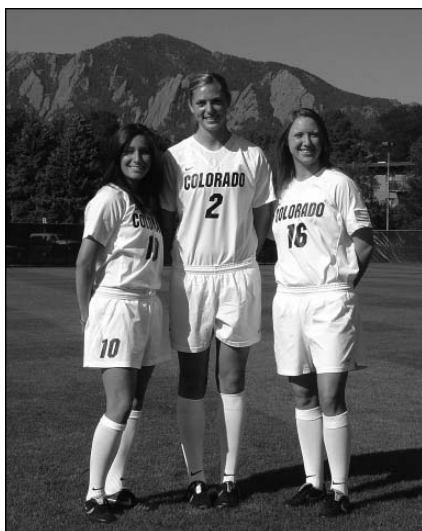
"If Nikki is prepared, we could have three of the fastest forwards in the country," said Hempen.

THE MIDFIELD

"The midfield will be the most difficult thing to reshape with Fran and Ashlie (Mihalcin) gone. Alex Cousins and Nikki Keller will be factors in dealing with how to respond to the responsibility of running the most important part of the game."

Both Keller and Cousins have already experienced the rollercoaster ride of their freshman year and will look to step up in their second year and take charge of the midfield.

Allie True transferred from UCLA and has been sidelined twice due to injury. True saw action in 14 games last year and recorded two assists during the season.

THE DEFENSE

The heart of the defense revolves around senior Laura Munnelly, who will be playing for the first time in seven years without the company of her sister, Fran, at some level. Munnelly is among CU's all time leaders in minutes played with 4,182 and ranks in top 10 for games started and games played. Hempen is expecting the true competitor and leader in Munnelly to set the bar for the Colorado defense.

"I'm hoping that she gets the recognition that she deserves," said Hempen. "After moving her around in the midfield in the spring, we've realized that there is no better center back than Laura."

Sophomore Michelle Wenino started at defender for 23 straight games for the Buffaloes as a freshman and will continue to be one of two regulars in the starting line up.

"Michelle was the shining star of the freshman class and the defense," said Hempen. "With her mental and physical toughness developing, I expect her to be a main star in our defensive scheme."

Kris Kauftheil saw an increase in playing time during the 2006 spring season and by utilizing her strength and size she may see similar action in the Fall.

Megan Manthey, who saw most of her action in 2005 as a midfielder or forward, was a regular in the defensive lineup during the spring season. Manthey played in all but two games last year.

Joining the Buffs in the back will be freshmen Mary White and Kelly Ross, both Colorado high school products.

"White and Ross are two more powerhouse kids as defenders and we expect them to come in and challenge for serious playing time," said Hempen.

THE KEEPERS

Kirstin Radlinski, after stepping into the starting role in the 2005 season when senior Jess Keller was sidelined due to injury, will look to lock down the Buffs last line of defense. Radlinski lead the Big 12 conference in goals against average with 0.47 GAA and a save percentage of .917 as a freshman in 2005.

"Kirstin realizes this responsibility and she showed us last year that she can handle herself and I think that Kara will be able to follow the same path," said Hempen. "I think that we'll be in good hands, no pun intended."

Radlinski will have plenty of competition from freshmen Kara Linder, Megan Down and Kellis Johnson.

"Kara was brought in expecting Jess Keller to be gone and Kirstin to be the only returning keeper. She will provide a challenge for the job."

THE SCHEDULE

Following a preseason exhibition game against Northern Colorado, the Buffs will face three conference champions, nine 2005 NCAA tournament teams, three teams ranked in the final 2005 polls and 15 teams with better than .500 records last season.

Starting with two away games in Nashville, Tenn., against Vanderbilt and Alabama will be a good challenge for the Buffaloes.

"Vanderbilt went on to have a great year after we beat them (last season)," said Hempen. "Starting away is always a challenge."

The home opening weekend will start with the fifth annual Colorado Classic, bringing in Clemson (ACC) and Mississippi (SEC) to face the Buffs in Boulder.

"I really like the way our tournament here looks," said Hempen. "Clemson and Mississippi are two very quality teams from solid soccer conferences."

Colorado will continue the competition on the road as they travel to take on BYU and Utah, both NCAA tournament teams. Before kicking off conference play, the Buffs will have to meet in-state rival Denver.

"Denver is another quality team that is ready to make a surge with their upperclassmen," said Hempen.

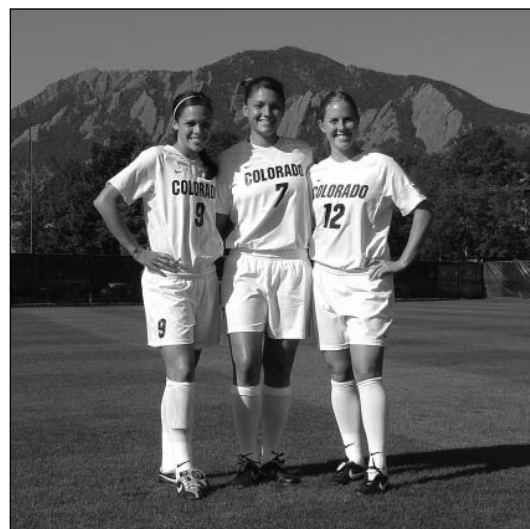
Following the challenging non-conference schedule, Colorado gets into the meat of its schedule when it begins league play against Oklahoma at the Prentup Field.

"Big 12 play is always difficult to navigate," said Hempen. "If we can stay strong at home and steal a few on the road we should be in pretty good shape."

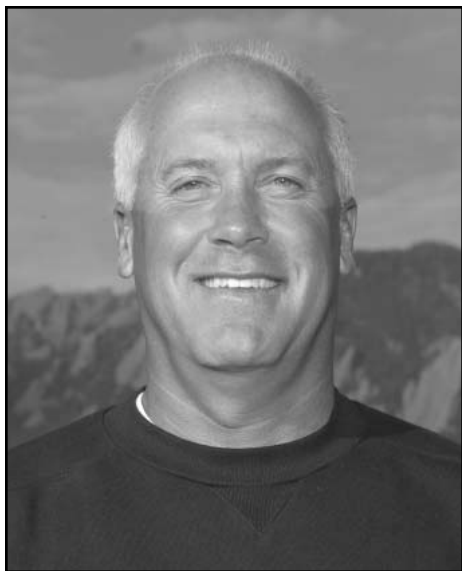
The home league matchups include Oklahoma, Texas A&M, Texas, Texas Tech and the home finale on Oct. 22 against Baylor. There will be one break from league play when Wyoming completes a home-and-home series in Boulder. The Buffs will have to hit the road to take on Oklahoma State, Nebraska, Missouri, Iowa State and Kansas.

After three straight appearances in the NCAA tournament, despite many key losses, the strong 2006 roster is hopeful for another trip to the postseason.

"When you think about losing six starters, you hope that you can get through that," said Hempen. "You can't predict the NCAA Tournament but we'll definitely be setting it as a goal. We've put ourselves in a position to compete for the opportunity."

After five seasons in Boulder, head coach Bill Hempen has produced a team that battles for the Big 12 Conference championship year in and year out.

When he arrived in Boulder in the summer of 2001, he found himself inheriting a team that though close, had yet to put together a winning Big 12 season. He started to put the pieces in place that would make Colorado Soccer a success.

It then took just two seasons to orchestrate the biggest single-season turnaround in CU and Big 12 history, and one of the best in the nation when his 2002 squad went 10-8-2 and finished fifth in the league just a year after his first team struggled at 3-11-1 to finish 10th.

It would take just one more year to turn naysayers into believers as the Buffs went from 10th to first with the program's first conference title, a 15-4-1 record, nine shutouts, a 14-match unbeaten streak, the school's first national ranking in the sport, a Big 12 Coach of the Year title for Hempen and the program's first NCAA Tournament bid in 2003.

While Hempen took a leap of faith to leave a Duke program that he started in 1988, he credits others that leapt along with him for bringing Colorado its first conference crown in 2003.

Along with the efforts of his assistant coaches, he credits 2003 Big 12 Player of the Year Fran Munnelly's commitment to come to CU during that 3-11-1 season, "She must have seen my passion and commitment to make it work here. My track record, the locale and University was good enough for her to come here."

Since his arrival in Boulder during the summer of 2001, Colorado soccer has reinvented itself.

He won his 50th game at CU when the Buffs topped UNC 3-0 on Oct. 10, 2005, and coached his milestone 350th game on Oct. 17, 2004 and the record breaking 7-0 shutout against Texas Tech gave the 17-year veteran his milestone 200th career victory.

He is among the all-time winningest coaches in NCAA Division I women's soccer history, with 217 career wins, good for 20th on the active list.

"What this means is that I've been doing this a long time," said Hempen after the match. "It's really an honor and a tribute to all the kids that have put up with me over the years and to my first team at Duke (1988) who also contributed to this."

As the program enters its 11th season, one need only look at Hempen's leadership when charting its future. Since his arrival, the Buffs have gone 55-37-11 (.598) overall and 25-18-7 (.581) in Big 12 Conference play. Included in four straight top-five league finishes is the 2003 Big 12 Championship and that season's player, rookie and coach of the year in addition to 20 player appearances on All-Big 12 teams. Colorado has claimed six spots on all-region teams, and boasts a three time All-American in Fran Munnelly, who was also named to the Big 12 10th Anniversary team in 2005.

In the classroom, 32 players have been named to Academic All-Big 12 teams while the 2003 squad won the athletic department's most improved honor for a team as its aggregate grade point average rose .44 from the previous academic year. In 2005, senior goalkeeper Jessie Keller was named a CoSIDA District VII Academic All-Region Soccer Team member, the first in CU history.

When hired on June 5, 2001, Bill Hempen came to Boulder with eight NCAA Tournament Appearances, three ACC Coach of the Year honors, 1992 National Soccer Coaches Association of America National Coach of the Year recognition, and one of the winningest programs during the last decade under his belt.

He came to Colorado from Duke, where he had been the Blue Devils' head coach since the program's inception in 1988.

He led the Blue Devils to eight appearances in the NCAA Tournament and had a career record of 162-100-16 (.676) in Durham. He was the NSCAA National Coach of the Year in 1992, and was also named Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year three times (1992, 1994 and 1997) while directing Duke to the 16th most wins in the country (124) in the 1990s.

Hempen's Duke teams finished the season ranked in the national polls nine times with their highest finish coming in 1994, a No. 4 ranking following Duke's first ACC regular season title and a win over 13-time national champion North Carolina to snap the Tar Heels' 101-game unbeaten streak.

The 1992 season was among Hempen's finest, as he

specifically in Region III and as the head coach of Colorado's state ODP Program.

Born June 6, 1958 in St. Louis, Hempen graduated from Bishop DeBourg High School before attending Meramec Community College in St. Louis where he split time in goal for Meramec's 1976 Junior College National Championship and 1977 Runner-Up teams.

He continued his collegiate career as a two-year letterwinner in goal at the University of Evansville for the 1978 and '79 seasons compiling a 22-11-6 mark in that span. He graduated from Evansville in 1981 with a degree in Health/Physical Education. The New Jersey Americans of the American Soccer League drafted Hempen in 1980.

Hempen got his start in the coaching profession as a graduate assistant at Northeast Louisiana before assuming full-time assistant duties at Centenary College in Shreveport, La., where he served three years prior to his start at Duke.

He was an assistant coach on the Blue Devil men's team from 1986-1991, compiling a 78-36-7 overall record and 16-16-4 ACC slate. In those six seasons Duke advanced to three NCAA Tournaments, winning the NCAA Championship in '86 with a 1-0 victory over Akron in Seattle.

He married then-Duke assistant coach and 1990 Colorado graduate Stephanie Poncher in 1999. The couple has a 6-year-old daughter, Emma, and a 4-year-old son, Lucas.

led his team to a school-record 17 wins and a berth in the national championship game in its first trip to the NCAA tournament. Since then, Duke teams have advanced to the NCAA tournament every season sans 1998.

In his 13 seasons at Duke, he coached nine All-Americans, 34 All-ACC players, seven Academic All-ACC selections and three players currently playing professionally in WUSA.

He also has significant experience with the United States Soccer Federation's Olympic Development Program,

The constant of Bill Hempen's tenure at Colorado has been the presence of assistant coach Paul Hogan. Hogan has been Hempen's right hand man since his arrival prior to the 2001 season.

Paul Hogan is in his sixth season at Colorado, his first as associate head coach as he was promoted August 22, 2006.

During his time in Boulder, Colorado has won the 2003 Big 12 Championship, appeared in three NCAA tournaments and have earned four straight top-five league finishes.

"Paul is good for keeping Bill level," said senior captain Laura Munnely. "He brings another coaching perspective to the table along with Alli (Hunt) and is great to have around. He means so much to this program and we wouldn't be where we are at Colorado without his contributions."

In addition to his duties as assistant coach on the Boulder campus, Hogan is also in his fifth season coaching the Colorado ODP teams.

Prior to his arrival in Boulder, Hogan spent three seasons at Allegheny where he guided the Gators to a 35-16-7 (.686) overall record and 17-6-2 (.739) North Coast Athletic Conference mark while producing 16 All-NCAC players.

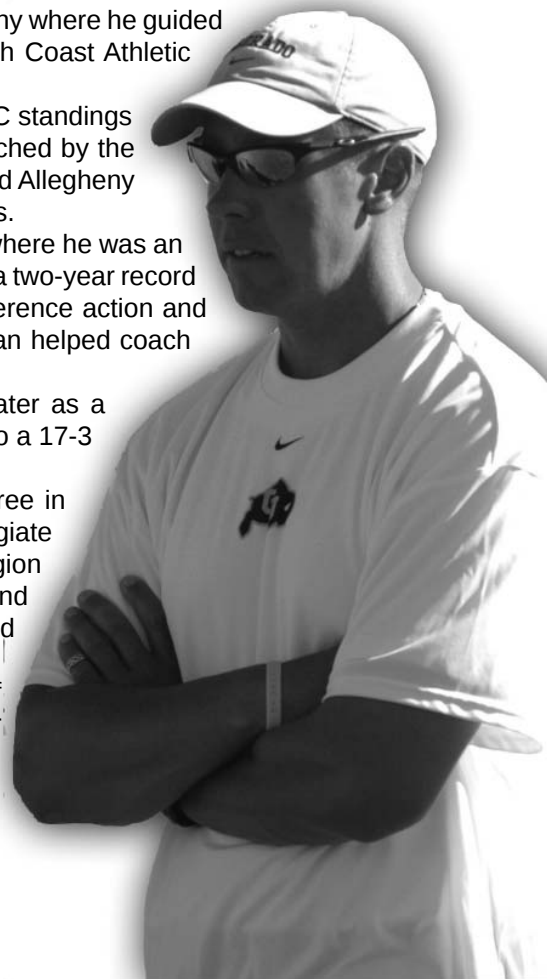
His three Gator teams finished no lower than third in the final NCAC standings and his 1999 squad won a school record six conference games, matched by the 2000 team, earning Hogan conference coach of the year accolades and Allegheny NCAC Newcomer and Offensive Player of the Year postseason honors.

Hogan made the leap to head coach in April 1998 from Duke where he was an assistant for the 1996 and '97 seasons. He assisted the Blue Devils to a two-year record of 28-11. In 1997, Duke finished 15-5-0, 4-2-0 in Atlantic Coast Conference action and won the ACC tournament championship. Over his two seasons, Hogan helped coach three All-Americans and 11 All-ACC selections.

Previously, Hogan spent one season contributing at his alma mater as a volunteer, the University of Charleston (W.V.). He helped Charleston to a 17-3 record and an NCAA Division II playoff berth in 1995.

Hogan graduated from Charleston in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in sports science. There, he was a three-time All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference selection at goalkeeper. He earned All-South Region honors from the National Soccer Coaches Association in both 1993 and 1994, and led the Golden Eagles to WVIAC championships in 1992 and 1994.

Born August 22, 1972, the Monroe, N.Y. native is a 1990 graduate of Washingtonville High School. He is the oldest of two and his younger sister Nancy also played soccer at Elon College in North Carolina. In what little free time he has, Hogan likes to golf.





ASSISTANT COACH ALLI HUNT



Alli Hunt is entering her second season as assistant coach after filling the void of a second assistant coach that had been vacant since the end of the 2003 season.

"Alli has been a great addition to our team," said senior captain Katie Griffin. "We definitely needed a female role figure for our girls. She makes everyone feel very comfortable and we're pleased to have her as a part of the coaching staff."

A four-year letterwinner and starter for Wake Forest and head coach Tony da Luz, the Demon Deacons went 41-30-8 overall and 10-16-3 in Atlantic Coast Conference play from 2001-04. Hunt played in four NCAA Tournaments as an undergraduate, as the Demon Deacons dropped first round matches during the 2001, '03 and '04 championships and advanced to the second round in 2002. She started 71 of 79 career matches and her career line includes 49 shots, a single score, 13 assists and 15 points.

As a freshman, she was an ACC All-Freshman Team selection and picked by Soccer Buzz to the Southeast Region All-Freshman Team. She saw action in 18 games with 11 starts and assisted on the gamewinning goal in a 1-0 shutout win over North Carolina State.

The most productive season of her career, her sophomore campaign, she started all 22 matches and led the team with a season high seven assists which tied the single season school record.

Hunt was named to the 2003 Wake Forest adidas Women's Soccer Classic All-Tournament team as a junior. She started all 20 matches for the Deacons and had nine shots and a single assist on the 10-7-3 season.

As a senior she started all 19 contests and had four points on the season, including one score and a pair of assists. Her lone goal proved to be the gamewinner on a penalty kick against Maryland. And one of her two assists on the season was against CU in a 1-2 loss during the WF adidas Women's Soccer Classic. The win was CU's first in six attempts against ACC teams. She capped her collegiate career as an All-ACC and All- Southeast Region pick.

A Charlotte, N.C. native, Allison Meredith Hunt was born July 31, 1983 in Charlotte. Prior to playing at Wake Forest, she captained and was named the 2000 season MVP of her club team, the '81 Ladies Blue, which she led to the 1998 and 2000 North Carolina state championship and the Region III semifinals. She captained the state and region team in the Olympic Development Program, and has also been invited to five national camps. Hunt led her state team to the 2001 Region III championship. She attended the select Adidas ESP Camp two years. In prep play she was a two-time conference player of the year and the 2000 Region II Player of the Year at Charlotte Country Day School. A three-time all-state selection, three-time all-region selection and three-time all-conference selection, she led Charlotte Country Day to the state semifinals three straight years and also played basketball.

She is a second generation ACC student-athlete as her mother, the then Ginny Bauer, swam and dove at North Carolina where she was the ACC diving champion in the mid 1970s.

Her hobbies include reading, watching the Food Network and beating Paul daily at the "meg" game.

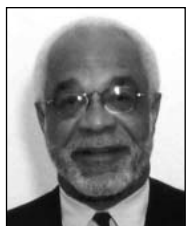

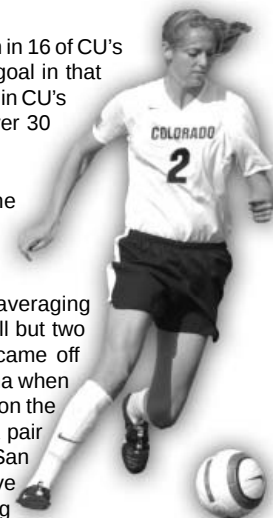

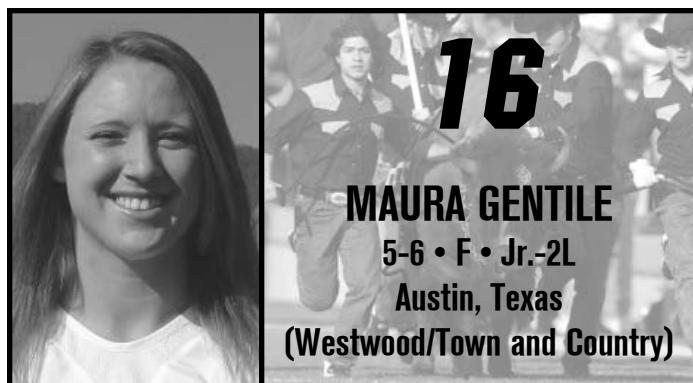

THIS SEASON: Fully healed from a torn ACL, Gentile is ready to take her hard work, determination and experience into the fall season and pick up where she left off as a freshman.

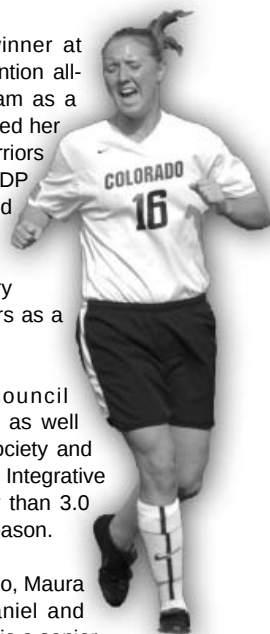
SOPHOMORE (2005): After suffering a torn ACL during the summer while playing club ball, Gentile was forced to miss what would have been her sophomore season.

THIS SEASON: With an extremely accomplished summer behind her, representing Colorado soccer at the international level, the coaches are confident that Griffin will continue to set the standards of the program high and lead this championship caliber team to another exemplary season.

US SOCCER (2006): On three occasions this spring and summer, Griffin was called up to train with the United States U-21 National Team, the result of which was a spot on the 2006 Nordic Cup squad, the first such assignment for any Buff in program history. She netted her first international goal in the U.S. opener of the Nordic Cup vs. Denmark on July 16, a 3-0 U.S. victory.

JUNIOR (2005): Griffin had the most prolific season of any Buffalo in history in 2005, scoring a school record 12 goals and adding an assist for another record 25 points. She also set a single season record with 84 shots, getting 44 of those on goal for a .524 percentage. She tied for game winners with Allison Kidd (3) and had three two-goal games. She scored the quickest goal in school history vs. Wyoming, her first of the season, coming in 1:39. Griffin netted her second goal of the year against Detroit, then got her game rolling two weeks later with two against Iowa State. She scored the gamewinning goal against then-undefeated Oklahoma State on Fox Sports Net, then a week later netted goals in back-to-back games vs. Missouri and Northern Colorado. Griffin caught fire towards the end of the season, with two goals at Texas Tech, a goal and an assist vs. Oklahoma at the Big 12 Tournament, followed by another pair of goals vs. Texas in the semifinals, a 3-2 CU win. She earned a spot on the All-Tournament Team for her work. She then put in 107 minutes in CU's shootout victory over UC Riverside with three shots on goal. She averaged 1.04 points per game on the season on 3.50 shots per game.

SOPHOMORE (2004): After leading the team in goals and points as a freshman, she was the most productive of the sophomore class with five scores on 48 shots and five assists. She was second on the team in game winning scores (3), with back-to-back winning goals against Utah to claim the Wake Forest/adidas Classic title and LSU a week later. Her third was against Northern Colorado where she became CU's all-time leader in career multiple goal game leader with two scores, the third such match of her career.

At the Big 12 Tournament she took a team-leading five shots and had two a week later against Utah and Portland in the first and second rounds of the NCAA Championships.

FRESHMAN (2003): A midfielder by trade, she made the transition to forward look effortless as CU's second straight Big 12 Rookie of the Year set a CU single season goals scored record with 10 on the season, and a program best 23 points. She bettered teammate Fran Munnelly's freshman class goals and points mark. She had a pair of two goal-four point games on the season, against Georgia and Iowa State, both in Boulder. Her five gamewinners at the expense of Georgia, Wyoming, Iowa State, Texas and Texas Tech also set a new single season record.

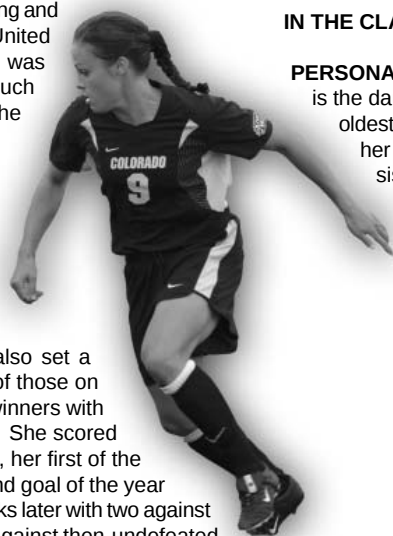
HIGH SCHOOL: Griffin earned a pair of varsity letters her freshman and junior seasons while playing for Desert Mountain, but sat out her sophomore and senior campaigns. In two seasons she was named all-city, all-region and all-state and the Wolves' most valuable player. On the club side she played for the Sereno 85 Golden Eagles, the six-time state champions and in August of '02 defeated then-defending national champion Pleasanton Rage. In October of '02 the Golden Eagles were the No. 4 ranked club in the nation and were the Region 4 ODP Las Vegas runner-up.

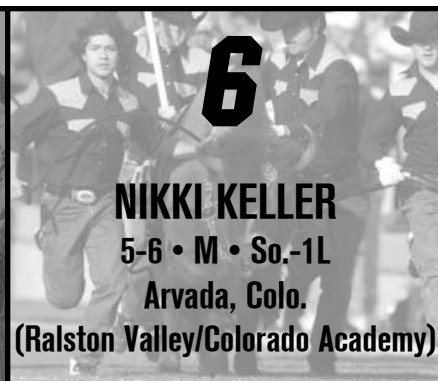

THIS SEASON: Kauftheil saw an increase in playing time during the spring season and by utilizing her strength and size she may see similar action in the fall.

FRESHMAN (2005): An ankle injury sidelined Kauftheil for much of the 2005 season, but she did see action in three games. That included a career high 25 minutes at Texas Tech. After CU's starting keeper Jessie Keller went down with a broken ankle midway through the season, Kauftheil trained part time as a backup to Kirstin Radlinski in addition to field training. Kauftheil stepped up in the final game of the spring season when Radlinski was sidelined due to illness. She started in goal for the Buffaloes against conference rival, Nebraska and recorded a 5-0 shutout to help Colorado close out the spring season on a positive note.

HIGH SCHOOL: Kauftheil played her freshman and sophomore seasons at Carondelet before playing prep ball at Las Lomas where the Knights played for the 2004 North Coast Section (NCS) title Kauftheil's junior season. Las Lomas lost the match 2-1, and Kauftheil lost what was left of the season when she tore all the ligaments in her right ankle on a tackle just prior to halftime. That junior season she was on the Diablo Foothills League Honorable Mention list and received the Coaches' Award. As a senior she was first-team all-DFL and MVP of her team. A two-sport athlete, she played shortstop on Carondelet's softball team as a freshman.

IN THE CLASSROOM: A four-year scholar athlete with a 3.5 grade point average or higher, Kauftheil is a journalism major at CU.

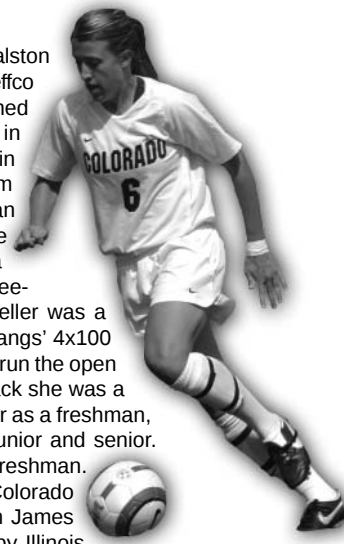

THIS SEASON: With a year of experience under her belt, Keller will be an integral part of Colorado's midfield. After an accomplished freshman campaign, the coaching staff is expecting more contributions from Keller as a sophomore.

FRESHMAN (2005): Keller started 20 of CU's 24 games in her first year, scoring four goals and notching four assists, good for 12 points and tying with Allison Kidd as CU's third leading scorer. She notched two game winning goals, against Pittsburgh and Iowa State. Her goal vs. Pitt was the first of her career, and came at the 83:11 mark. She managed a career high four shots on four different occasions and posted 42 on the year, 22 of which were on goal.

HIGH SCHOOL: Keller and the Ralston Valley Mustangs won four straight Jeffco League Championships and reached the 4A state quarterfinal rounds in 2002 and '04 and semifinal play in 2003. Keller was a second-team all-Jeffco performer as a freshman and first-team all-conference and second-team all-state as a sophomore, junior and senior. A three-sport athlete at Ralston Valley, Keller was a four-year letterwinner of the Mustangs' 4x100 and 4x200-m relay teams and has run the open 100 and 200 distances. On the track she was a second-team all-conference runner as a freshman, and first team as a sophomore, junior and senior. She also ran cross country as a freshman. Keller played her club ball for the Colorado Girls Soccer Academy, and coach James Harris. Keller was also recruited by Illinois and Denver.

THIS SEASON: Kidd will start the season coming off a spring ACL injury, and once she is healthy she will prove to be a vital asset up front.

SOPHOMORE (2005): After recovering a torn ACL suffered the previous year, Kidd started 20 of CU's 24 games as a sophomore. She was CU's third-leading scorer with four goals and four assists, with three gamewinners to her credit. She had 46 shots on the season, including 21 on goal. Kidd scored the gamewinner in overtime against Texas in the Big 12 Tournament, just 1:06 into the period. She also had gamewinners at Texas earlier in the season, and against Missouri in CU's second-to-last home game of the year.

FRESHMAN (2004): Kidd may have been on pace to become Bill Hempen's fourth straight freshman to lead the team in scoring as she was fourth with four points (trailing then-leader Ashlie Mihalcin by two) when she tore her ACL at Iowa State in the conference opener. It was her second such injury as she tore her right in high school. Prior to the season-ending injury she started the first two games of the season at Georgia and at Air Force and came off the bench the last seven leading up to the ISU game. Her two scores on the season came at the hands of Eastern Michigan and Denver. Sans the injury she took on National Anthem duties prior to Buff home games and also sang at a Buff basketball game.

HIGH SCHOOL: Kidd was the soccer team captain as a freshman, junior and senior at midfield on the pitch as well as all-district as a junior. As a senior her John Horn team were regional semifinalists. A member of the ODP state team since 1997 and Region III Pool team for three years, her D'feeters' club team was a WAGS finalist in 2000, '01 Surf Cup Finalist, '02 Surf Cup Champions and Orange Bowl Classic finalists a year later. A three-sport athlete at John Horn, she was a point guard on the basketball team and ran long sprints and relays as well as jumped (long and triple) on the track team and has the school mark as a member of the 800-m relay team.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Kidd graduated as a member of the first, four-year class at John Horn. A Spanish major at CU, Kidd will also pursue a business minor.

PERSONAL: Born in Dallas on Oct. 28, 1985, Allison Marie Kidd is the daughter of David and Sylvia Kidd. Her older sister, Jena, played soccer at Stephen F. Austin and her younger sister, Lauren, is a high school senior.

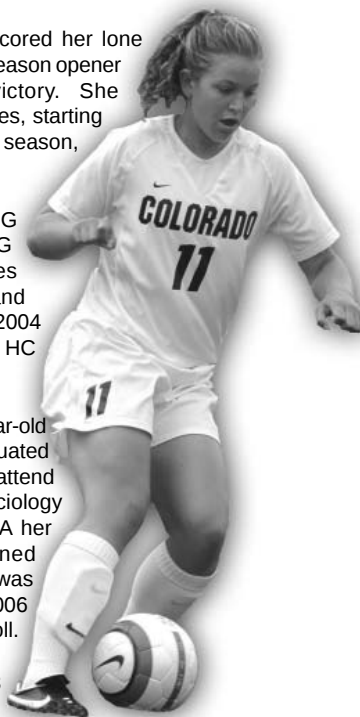

THIS SEASON: Munnelly continues to prove that she is the heart of the defense. The coaching staff is expecting the true competitor and leader in Munnelly to set the bar for the Colorado defensive line in the fall. Munnelly is among CU's all time leaders in minutes played with 4,182 and ranks in the top 10 for games started and games played.

JUNIOR (2005): Munnelly was again CU's stalwart in the back of the defense, starting all 24 games for the Buffaloes as a junior. She played a team high 2,237 minutes, and again was only substituted for when she was subjected to a hard foul in CU's first round NCAA game against UC Riverside. She notched one assist on the year, providing service to Alex Cousin's game-tying goal vs. Texas A&M in the Big 12 Championship game. She earned both second team All-Big 12 and All-Region following the season.

SOPHOMORE (2004): The preseason All-Big 12 pick was one of 17 players nationally who, entering the Oklahoma State game, hadn't been substituted for in 2004, and her 1,658 minutes when she came off the field in that match after getting tackled from behind was fifth among those players. Her 2,121 minutes led all field players. Through her sophomore year, she started and played all but seven minutes of 43 career matches.

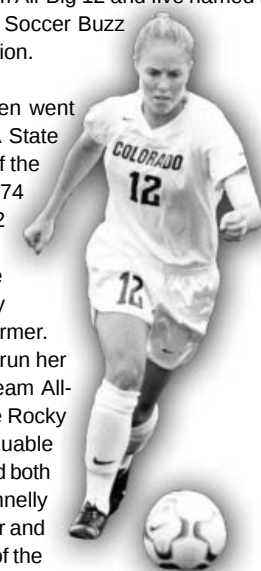
FRESHMAN (2003): The only player on the team (and just one of two players in the league) to not to come off the pitch, she logged a team-high 1,824 minutes. Controlling CU's backfield, she was an integral reason opponents only got off 90 shots on goal and scored a program opponent low 14 times. Her two assists on the season game in back-to-back games, against Seton Hall and San Jose State (both on Ashlie Mihalcin scores). Half of her shots have been on goal. Dominant in CU's backfield, she

was one of two Buffs named second-team All-Big 12 and five named to the league's All-Newcomer team and was a Soccer Buzz Freshman All-American Honorable Mention.

HIGH SCHOOL: In four seasons, Mullen went 61-14-3, the 2001 and '02 Colorado 4A State Champions and '03 runner-up. As part of the defensive corps, the Mustangs owned a .74 goals against average during the 2000-02 seasons and Munnelly added eight goals, 13 assists and 29 points on the offensive side of the ball. As a freshman Munnelly was an honorable mention all-state performer. During Mullen's first state championship run her sophomore season, she was a First -Team All-Centennial League, all-state and was the Rocky Mountain News' 4A title game's most valuable player. As a junior and senior she repeated both her all-league and all-state honors. Munnelly was a six-time Colorado State Cup winner and two-time Region IV finalist as a member of the Colorado Girls Soccer Academy.

IN THE CLASSROOM: An English major, Munnelly had an in-season 3.0 grade point average in 2003. She was a member of the National Honor Society, the Spanish Honor Society and was a member of Mullen's Honor Roll from 2000-02.

PERSONAL: Born April 18, 1985 in Wheat Ridge, Colo., Laura Munnelly is the youngest daughter of James and Elizabeth Munnelly of Arvada, Colo. Her father was a gymnast (parallel bars) at Northern Colorado during the early 1970s and her older sister, Fran, was a two-time All-American midfielder on CU's soccer team from 2002-05. THIS SEASON: After stepping into the starting role in the 2005 season, Radlinski will look to lock down the Buffs last line of defense in the fall.

FRESHMAN (2005): Radlinski entered the season as backup to incumbent goalkeeper Jessie Keller, but was soon thrust into the fray when Keller broke her ankle against Kansas on Senior Day, Colorado's final home game of the season. The freshman responded with four shutouts and a goals against average of 0.92, the best in the Big 12. She had a .816 save percentage, grabbing 40 saves in her 11 appearances. She also shared three shutouts with Keller in her 880:21 minutes of play.

HIGH SCHOOL: As a freshman Radlinski set nine El Dorado school records, including shutouts (15) in guiding the Golden Hawks to the Empire League title that year and Century League crown as a sophomore and junior. With Radlinski in goal, El Dorado had a 52-22-6 record, advancing to the second round of CIF play in 2002, the quarterfinals in '03 and semifinals in '04. She also holds prep marks for single season (177) and career (345) saves and had a 1.06 goals against average as a junior as well as El Dorado's Female Athlete of the Year as a senior. She was a first-team all-league player for four years and all-CIF three. Radlinski played her club ball for Irvine's ISC Strikers premier team, the 2003 Pleasanton and 2004 Score-By-The-Shore tournament winners. She was the club's only keeper for six years. A two-sport athlete, she played on El Dorado's girls varsity tennis team as a member of the No. 1 doubles tandem since her sophomore year, and was named all-Century League as a sophomore, junior and senior and made the CIF tournament her sophomore and senior years. As a sophomore and senior she and her doubles partner reached the league finals, settling for runner-up finishes.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Radlinski was a league scholar-athlete and a member of the honor roll in high school and has continued to excel at CU. An English and Pre-Education major, Radlinski maintained a 3.00-3.49 as a freshman in-season during the Fall of 2005 and was recognized for her hard work as she was honored in the Fall 2005 Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

PERSONAL: Kirstin Lynda Radlinski was born Aug. 28, 1987 in Fullerton, Calif. She is the daughter of Marc and Birgit Radlinski and the younger sister of Peter (26) and Alexander (22). Her hobbies include playing tennis.

THIS SEASON: True returns from extensive time spent rehabbing her ACL and is back to top form for the first time in over a year. She should provide a calming veteran influence to the midfield.

JUNIOR (2005): The coaching staff got True back from a spring ACL tear a week earlier than expected, as she made her season debut against Detroit in the Colorado Soccer Classic. She immediately responded with an assist just minutes into the game, one of two she would post on the season. She played in 11 games, starting one (Nebraska), and notched five shots on the season, two of which were on goal. She re-injured her knee against Texas in the Big 12 Tournament but played vs. UCLA in the NCAA Tournament.

SOPHOMORE (2004): True started all but one game in her first season in Boulder, giving up her spot in the lineup for a change to support the start of all three seniors in their last home game vs. Oklahoma. Her second score was in the regular season finale at Nebraska, where she took a game high five shots, putting the Buffs up 2-0 off a Grandinetti/Katie Griffin combination. She took a career-high five shots in both those matches. She got the nod on direct free kicks just outside the 18 and hers with 14 seconds remaining vs. Missouri nailed the crossbar and was sent back into play where Tricia Regan would score on the putback to force OT and CU's eventual first round Big 12 Tournament win.

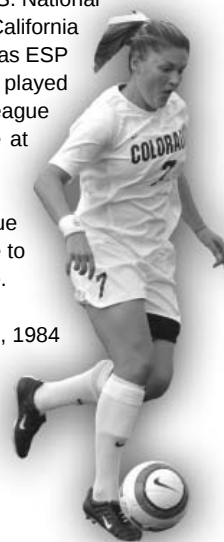
AT UCLA: As a freshman at UCLA during the 2002 season, she played in all 22 games on an 18-4-0 Bruins team that advanced to the NCAA Championships before dropping a 1-0 decision to then-No. 4 Texas A&M in a shootout. 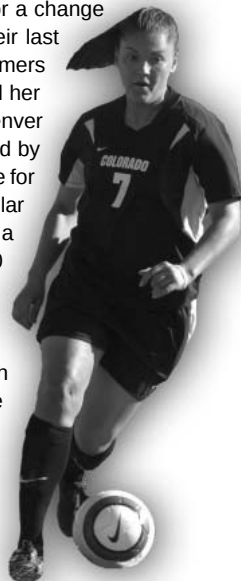

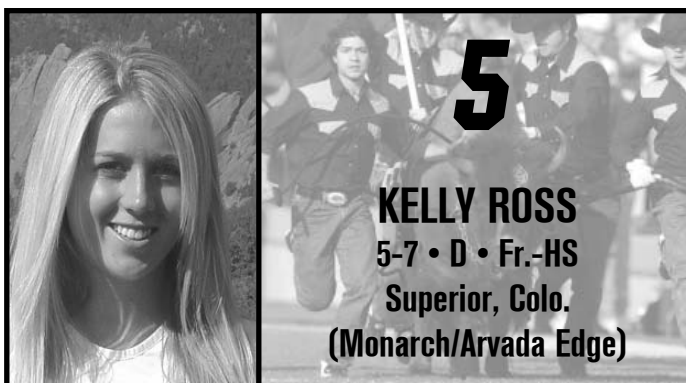

OPPONENTS



For the first time in program history the Buffs had a field to call their own as Prentup Field went from a baseball-only field as recent as three years ago to the Buffs' exclusive home field in 2005. Along with a new home field, the Buffaloes celebrated their fifth season under head coach **Bill Hempen**. He entered the 2005 season having led the team to two NCAA tournament appearances and a Big 12 Championship in addition to 44 wins in that span.

Colorado opened the 2005 season with a thrilling 2-1 victory over Vanderbilt in front of 1,166 fans at Prentup Field. Freshman **Megan Manthey** stepped up for the Buffaloes to break the 1-1 tie with 1:32 to play in the second half. Senior **Fran Munnelly** was the force behind the first goal to tie the game with her 23rd career goal, as she began her journey to pass Melissa Cartmell who held the career mark with 26.

Colorado hit the road to take on the number one team in the nation, the North Carolina Tar Heels. The 22nd-ranked Buffaloes fought hard and hoped that the third time would be a charm, but with only three shots on goal, the Buffs fell to UNC by a score of 3-0.

The Buffaloes returned home to travel down the road to the state capitol for the Denver Soccer Classic. **Katie Griffin** and **Ashlie Mihalcin** put away two early goals, but Denver battled back to tie the game and force a shootout. The Buffs won the first of three shootouts on the season to advance to the finals of the tournament and took on Wyoming. Colorado again took an early 1-0 lead, this time on a **Tricia Regan** goal, but the Buffs couldn't hang on and took a 1-1 tie in two overtimes.

Colorado headed west for the UCLA Women's Cup to take on two more ranked teams. It proved a fruitless but educational trip for the Buffaloes, as they posted two 2-0 defeats at the hands of No. 22 USC and No. 3 UCLA. Despite the 0-2 record, CU had three players earn a spot on the All-Tournament Team in senior midfielder Fran Munnelly and freshmen **Nikki Keller** and **Michelle Wenino**.

The Buffs returned home after two weeks on the road and snapped a four game winless streak by defeating Detroit 3-0 to open the fourth annual Colorado Soccer Classic. Munnelly had a pair of goals in the win, putting her at 25 career goals. CU advanced to take on Pittsburgh in the final game of the Classic. Nikki Keller tallied her first career goal and the Buffs' keeper **Jessica Keller** recorded her second consecutive shutout in the 1-0 win over Pitt.

Colorado opened the Big 12 Conference with a three game homestand against Nebraska, Iowa State and Oklahoma State. The Buffs broke open first against Nebraska with Fran Munnelly's team-high fourth goal of the season, but the Cornhuskers would rally in the second half for two goals and the 2-1 win. Despite the loss, the Buffaloes responded with a 4-0 win over Iowa State. Keller recorded two goals for the first multi-goal game in her career. Colorado continued to pressure the Cyclone defense and Griffin matched Keller's pair of goals as she put the game away with a final score of 4-0. Rallying off the decisive victory, the Buffs set out to take on unbeaten Oklahoma State the following week in a match that was televised on Fox Sports Net. An evenly matched defensive contest, Griffin broke the tie with her second gamewinner of the season with just over seven minutes to play in the second half. The win gave Colorado a winning 2-1 record in Big 12 play as they hit the road to take on Oklahoma.

Colorado was faced with another close game against Oklahoma. After the Sooners got on the board in the second half, Fran Munnelly tied the game at 1-1 after burying a penalty kick in the 63rd minute, and the goal was a historic one as it was the 27th of her career, making her the all-time leading goal scorer in Colorado history. Despite the excitement of that milestone, the Buffs were unable to convert in overtime and the Sooners did, and OU came away with a 2-1 win.

After the disappointing loss to OU, the Buffs bounced back with a thrilling 2-0 victory at Texas and another decisive win over Northern Colorado in Greeley, 3-0. It was a busy weekend for CU's Hermann Trophy candidate Munnelly, who scored once against Texas and twice against UNC. CU also got goals from **Allison Kidd** (the gamewinner at Texas) and Griffin (goal No. 2 in the UNC game, her sixth of the year). The victory over the Bears was head coach Hempen's 50th at Colorado.

The Buffs, now 7-5-2 overall and 3-2 Big 12, returned home for the final time of the season to host Missouri and Kansas. Colorado jumped out to an early 3-0 lead over Missouri with goals coming from the front line of Keller, Griffin and Kidd. The Tigers made the game interesting as they clawed their way back into the match on a pair of corner kicks in a ten-minute span late in the game. The Buffs defense held on, keeping the final score 3-2.

Colorado would continue the final home weekend with an action-packed game against Kansas. It was a day of several firsts for the Buffs as they celebrated Senior Day. In a 90-minute defensive battle, the Buffs jumped into first place in the Big 12 with a 1-0 win over KU. Just six minutes into the game, CU's senior goalkeeper Keller came off her line to challenge a Jayhawk forward. The collision proved to be career-ending for Keller as she suffered a broken ankle. Freshman **Kirstin Radlinski** stepped up to the challenge and recorded five saves in her first meaningful game action. **Lindsay Ralph** netted the gamewinner, her first career goal at CU, off a deflection from a Munnelly blast at the KU keeper. Colorado would take their 1-0 victory and first place standing into the next three road games to wrap up the regular season.

The Buffs traveled to College Station, Texas, to take on No. 14 Texas A&M. CU jumped out to an early 1-0 lead with **Kathryn Grandinetti's** first goal of the season. Colorado lost their lead in the second half as the Aggies battled back with two goals for the win and sole possession of first place in the Big 12. From there the Buffs traveled to Waco to take on the Baylor Bears. The teams battled for 110 minutes in gale force winds, but neither team could find the back of the net and the Buffs tied the Bears 0-0.

Colorado wrapped up their regular season in style, beating Texas Tech in Lubbock by a score of 5-0. Griffin led the Buffs with two goals, giving her a team-high nine for the season. **Michelle Wenino** recorded her first career goal and Kidd and Grandinetti also found the net in the final game of the regular season, wrapping up Big 12 play tied for second with a record of 6-3-1.

By virtue of conference tiebreakers, the Buffs secured the No. 2 seed in the 10th Annual Big 12 Soccer Tournament in San Antonio, and opened the first round against No. 7 seed Oklahoma. Grandinetti and Griffin both scored in the match giving CU the 2-0 win, advancing them to the semifinals against No. 6 seed Texas. That proved a thrilling match, as Colorado jumped out to a 2-0 lead from two Griffin goals only to have it disappear with just two minutes left in regulation play. The Longhorns sent the

game into overtime, but Lone Star State native Kidd blasted a shot from 15 yards out into the Texas goal just minutes into overtime sending the Buffs to the Championship game for the first time in school history to face top seed Texas A&M.

Texas A&M got on the board in the first half and the Buffs trailed 1-0, despite dead-even halftime stats. Colorado answered the Aggies with a header by **Alexis Cousins** for her first career goal off a free kick from **Laura Munnelly**. Despite battling in front of the partisan crowd for a full overtime, the Aggies scored in the first minute of the second overtime

period to steal a 2-1 win and the NCAA automatic bid.

The Buffs earned a bid to the NCAA Championship tournament and were sent to Los Angeles to take on the UC Riverside Highlanders in the first round at UCLA. In a game filled with highly physical play from UCR, the Buffs outplayed the Highlanders, outshooting them 20 to two, but were unable to convert through two overtimes. The game was forced to go into a shootout. Fran Munnelly, Griffin and Kidd all buried their shots for a 3-2 lead. CU keeper Radlinski made a fantastic save to keep the lead at 3-2, but Darci Smerchek would miss wide off the post and UCR tied it 3-3. Senior captain Mihalcin stepped up for CU's final kick and put it in the upper right corner to give the Buffs a 4-3 lead, a score that held on for the win, as UCR would miss their final kick. Colorado would advance to the second round and face No. 1 seed and host team UCLA.

The Buffs were looking to avenge the earlier loss to UCLA, this game proving to be a chance to move on in the NCAA Tournament. After a tough fight, the Buffs' bid for a second round upset fell short as CU dropped a 3-0 decision to the fourth-ranked Bruins, who went on to the championship game and lost to Portland.

At the conclusion of a stellar season, the Buffs found plenty of honors for their outstanding play. Fran Munnelly was named an NSCAA Second Team All-American, the highest honor a Buffalo has ever earned. Munnelly was also named to the first-team All-Big 12 team for the fourth time in her career, and Laura Munnelly, Allison Kidd and Katie Griffin all took second-team honors, while freshman Nikki Keller was named to the Big 12 All-Newcomer team. The Buffs earned a program-best and season-best four spots on the NSCAA All-Central Region team, with Fran Munnelly and Griffin both named to the first team, while Jessica Keller and Laura Munnelly earned second team honors.

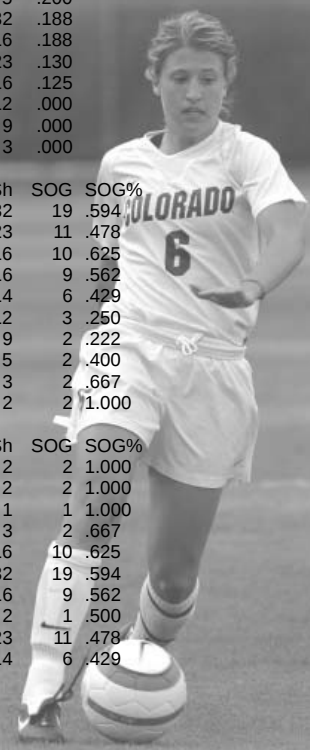

Prentup Field, located on the East Campus of the University of Colorado at Boulder, has been the home of Colorado Soccer since 2003. The field had been the home of the now-defunct Colorado baseball team before the women's soccer team took over in 2001.

Prentup combines the best of what Boulder has to offer, with beautiful Colorado mountain views and a lush pitch courtesy of CU's turf management team.

The Buffaloes have always enjoyed great home advantages in Boulder. CU formerly played its matches at Pleasant View Soccer Complex in North Boulder. This facility had an award-winning match field for CU to play on and nine surrounding fields for practice.

During that time, the Buffaloes compiled a home record of 50-28-4, a winning percentage of .646. The Buffs also played host to over 3,000 fans on Sept. 2, 1998 when they hosted defending national champion North Carolina.

Upon the arrival of coach Bill Hempen, the Buffs started training at Prentup in the spring of 2002 while it was still a baseball field.

In the spring of 2003, the soccer team was granted exclusive use of Prentup, and work began to re-landscape the field. All remnants of the baseball field except for the outfield fence were razed, and the turf began a major makeover.

Prentup Field is now a 160,000 square foot facility that contains a 120x75 yard game field along with a practice area. It is a native soil field and is equipped with an automated irrigation system. When the irrigation was installed and the field was graded in July of 2003, the turf management team produced a playable soccer facility from seed in just 33 days.

Each week, the field is painted and mowed 3-4 times in preparation for matches and practices under the supervision of Ryan Newman, along with a collection of other maintenance practices.

The Buffs continued to train at Prentup and finally, in the fall of 2004, they played their first-ever match there, defeating Northern Colorado by a score of 3-0 on October 1, 2004. In 2005, Prentup became CU's full time home, with the Buffaloes posting a record of 7-1-1 last season and an all-time mark of 9-1-1.

An athletic department fundraising campaign in the summer of 2005 helped raise funds to put in bleachers for 800 people, a new scoreboard, nets behind the goals and entrance gates into the venue.

Prentup Field has been home to University of Colorado athletics for almost 40 years, as the venue is named after former CU baseball coach Frank "Chief" Prentup. The field, formerly known as Varsity Field, was renamed after the former coach in 1978. The complex remained a popular venue until the varsity baseball team was removed in 1980.

The field was used by several different entities within Colorado athletics after 1980. The club baseball team played there, and CU's mascot Ralphie was even known to have taken practice runs

- Donna Holyman led the Buffs with six goals, four assists and a total of 16 points on the season.
- Keeper Sloane Cox recorded 133 saves, one shutout and six wins during her first season for Colorado in the net.

1998 Milestones

- Colorado opened the season with a 2-0 loss to 1997 national champion North Carolina in front of a school record 3,000 fans.
- With 36 saves in one weekend, including a school record 19 against BYU on Sept. 11, Sloane Cox became Colorado's career saves leader with 189 (passing Nina Bjornstad who had 158).
- Shawn Kenyon became the first Buff to record 100 shots with No. 100 coming against Utah on Sept. 13.
- CU earned their first ever win in a Big 12 Conference opener with a 3-0 win over Oklahoma on Oct. 2.
- Cox notched the first ever point for a CU goalkeeper with her assist of Jessica Wollow's second goal on Oct. 2 vs. Oklahoma.
- CU ran into its program-worst losing streak with the fifth consecutive loss to Denver 1-0 on Oct. 18.
- With a 6-0 loss to Missouri, the final game of the season, Cox finished her career as the holder of every Colorado goalkeeping record. In addition to her 200th save of the season, Cox also recorded the 333rd save of her career, and had six shutouts.
- Sloane Cox was named to the All-Big 12 second team, the first player in CU soccer history to be named All-Conference.
- Cox was also named Big 12 Athlete of the Week for September 2 (first player in program history to earn the honor) and CU Athlete of the Week for November 1.
- Teri Fildey was named TCI Student Athlete of the Week for September 5.
- Five players were named to the Academic All-Big 12 first team: Fildey, Cartmell, Matassa, Kenyon, Pascoe.
- Melissa Cartmell led the Buffs offense with 50 shots, six goals, two assists and 14 points.
- Assistant coach Kim LeMere was inducted into the University of Hartford's Alumni Hall of Fame on April 17.

- Bill Hempen was named head coach of the Colorado Soccer team in June, replacing Austin Daniels.
- Hempen earned his first win at Colorado with the 2-1 decision over Wyoming on Sept. 2.
- Hempen coached his milestone 300th career game vs. Missouri, however the Buffs fell 2-0 in the match.
- Colorado bounced back from a 10 game winless streak with a win over Colorado College 1-0 on Oct. 21. The win also ended a four-game scoreless streak that dated back to Oct. 7 at Oklahoma.
- When Hempen cleared his bench and substituted the entire field late in the first half vs. Kansas, he set a program mark for most players in a game as the Buffs played 24 by the final buzzer.
- Tiffany Booth netted her first career goal to secure CU's first Big 12 Conference victory of the season, a 2-1 win over Texas Tech.
- CU's eight freshmen made more than an immediate impression on the coaching staff as five freshmen scored seven of Colorado's 17 goals on the season and have dished off six of the team's 17 assists.
- Colorado's 2-2 tie against No. 9 Texas A&M was the programs best result vs. a ranked team since a 3-2 win over then-No. 22 Baylor in 1997.
- The Buffs scored 17 goals by 12 different players, the most players to get in the goal column

- CU extended the school record unbeaten streak to six games with the win over Oklahoma State on Oct. 27.

- Five Buffs earned All-Big 12 Honors. Fran Munnely was named to the First Team for the fourth consecutive year. Katie Griffin, Laura Munnely and Allison Kidd were all named to the second team. Nikki Keller was a Big 12 All-Newcomer selection.
- Going into the Big 12 Tournament, Colorado was tops in the conference in defense, leading the league in league play in goals allowed (eight), goals against average (0.78), and shutouts (six).
- CU advanced to the NCAA Division I Soccer Tournament and moved past the first round with a shootout win over UC Riverside on Nov. 12. The Buffs dropped their second round game 3-0 to UCLA, who went on to the finals.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

In 2003, when Jen Thais said in a preseason press conference that her season goal was, "to make the NCAA Tournament and to be nationally recognized. What I'm hoping... what I'm expecting, is to surprise people," little did she know what kind of impact that prediction would have on the eighth team in Colorado soccer history... and the nation for that matter.

A record breaking season was approached in four phases. Phase I were the preseason exhibition games where the Buffs shutout Northern Colorado 4-0 and Air Force 3-0.

Phase II consisted of CU's non-conference schedule where the Buffs came out virtually unscathed at 7-1. In the season opener, they held defending national champion and then-No. 2 Portland scoreless for 87 minutes before suffering a 1-0 defeat. The Buffs would regroup and close out the remainder of the non-conference season 7-0, beating teams by a 17-2 scoring margin. It was during Phase II that CU picked up its first-ever win against a top-10 ranked opponent when it handed then-No. 9 Denver a 3-0 blanking, just days after the Pioneers had upended Portland.

Enter Phase III... the Big 12 Conference season. The Buffs came away from the '03 season 8-1-1, the crescendo of the season being a 3-1 win over nemesis Nebraska in the season finale for both teams in below freezing temperatures on a pitch covered in ice. Colorado's 25 season points was the fourth highest in league standings history. At the conclusion of the regular season, the Buffs came away with the coach, player and rookie of the year, a first-team All-Big 12 pick, three second-teamers and five of their nine newcomers named to the All-Newcomer team.

With 25 school single-season, class and career records shattered, Colorado entered the final phase of the season, Phase IV... the postseason. They went into the eighth Big 12 Conference Tournament as the No. 1 seed for the first time in program history, and a week later the Buffs entered their first NCAA Tournament as just one of 16 seeded teams.

ACADEMICS AND ATHLETICS



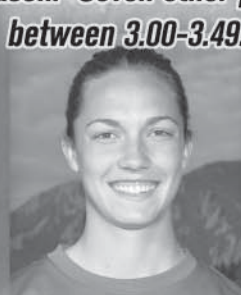
The University of Colorado at Boulder offers student-athletes a world-class education and an elite Division I athletic experience in arguably the most beautiful college setting in America and has been referred to as "the Harvard of the Rockies."

The Herbst Academic Center in the Dal Ward Athletic Center was created to help student-athletes meet and exceed the academic requirements of the University of Colorado. Since its inception, the goal of the Herbst Center has evolved to facilitating the academic and personal excellence of student-athletes.

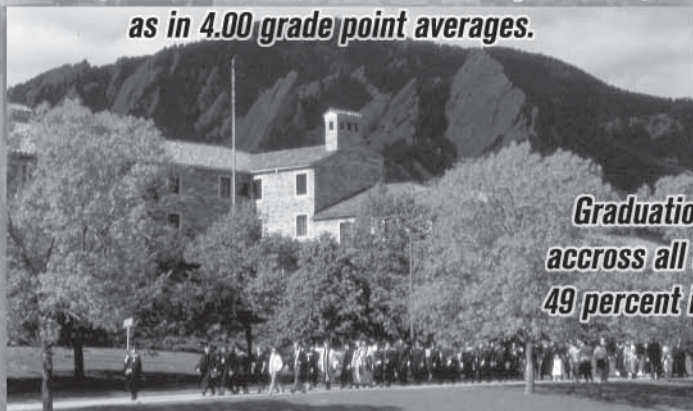
The 2005 soccer team placed 15 players on the 2006 Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll in the spring and 10 on the list in the fall when they were in season.

Four 2005 soccer players received Academic All-Big 12 honors in the Fall

Three 2005 seniors, Kathryn Grandinetti, Jessica Keller and Ashlie Mihalcin all maintained a GPA between 3.50-3.99 during the 2005 soccer season. Seven other players earned GPAs between 3.00-3.49.



In 2005, 13 student-athletes studied to perfection, as in 4.00 grade point averages.



Graduation rates for combined men and women student-athletes across all sports fields was 81 percent for the 2006 cohort, up from 49 percent in 1998. In comparison, the 2006 six-year graduation rate for all CU students was 66 percent.

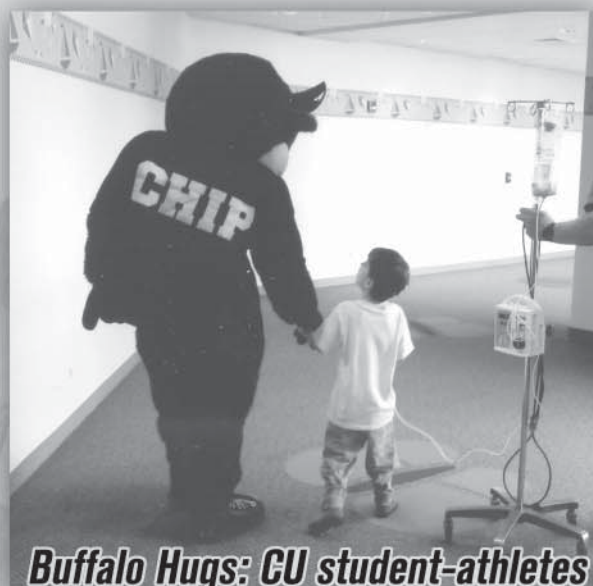

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

They focus on areas such as academics, community service, university relations, student-athlete life and career development. SAAC also strives to facilitate communication and foster camaraderie between student-athletes and the administration. In May 2001, SAAC created a unique ceremony especially for recognizing the student-athletes. The CU Sports People of the Year (CUSPY) Awards marked an inaugural event that has become an annual tradition. Loosely fashioned after the "ESPys," it's a fun-loving celebration designed to recognize athletic achievements, as voted on by student-athletes.
