HEAD COACH LINDA LAPPE

*First
Season*



Linda Lappe, a key contributor as a player for some very prominent University of Colorado women's basketball teams, returns to her alma mater just under a decade removed from her career to take the reins as the seventh head women's basketball coach in the program's history as she was named to the post by athletic director Mike Bohn on April 12, 2010.

"We were searching for a head coach with impeccable character, exemplary work ethic, a competitive drive and commitment to teaching fundamentals," Bohn said. "Our committee found coach Lappe outstanding in all those categories and to top it off, she's a Buff, making her a perfect fit for our program."

"She comes to us as a disciplined and focused coach with high energy and a passion for Colorado basketball. Coach Lappe will be an outstanding representative of this institution and our community."

She becomes the youngest head women's basketball coach at a BCS conference school and at the time of her hire the third-youngest overall, behind only Jamie Craighead (Sacramento State) and Candace Whittaker (Missouri-Kansas City). She's the second-youngest to be named head coach of the CU women's team. Barry was 28 when named on April 12, 1983, exactly 27 years to the date of Lappe's hiring.

Lappe returns full circle to the Buffaloes after a three-year stint as head coach at Metropolitan State College in Denver. She was 50-36 at Metro State, guiding the Roadrunners to top-three finishes and winning records in the Eastern Division of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference in each of her three seasons.

Her 2009-10 squad finished 17-12 overall before ending the season in the RMAC Tournament semifinals against the eventual NCAA Division II national runner up in Fort Lewis (Colo.) College. She had two players earn RMAC All-Eastern Division honors in 2010 in Kristin Valencia and Chelsea Williamson and Valencia was tabbed as the East Division Defensive Player of the Year.

Lappe's 2007-08 Metro State team posted a 19-10 overall record, finished second in the RMAC's East Division and qualified for the conference tournament. Metro State put together a season-high nine-game winning streak during the season and ranked third in the RMAC in scoring defense.

She landed her first head coaching job after four years as an assistant at the NCAA Division I level, three with Drake University (2004-06) and one with Colorado State (2006-07).

Lappe was hired at Colorado State by Jen Warden, a former Colorado assistant who was on the bench with Barry during Lappe's playing career. At CSU, Lappe was the recruiting coordinator and also worked with the Rams' backcourt players

Lappe began her collegiate coaching career at Drake where she spent three years on Amy Stephens' staff, helping the Bulldogs to a 47-42 mark. She assisted Drake to WNIT appearances in 2004 and 2006 and helped sign a Top 50 class that would go on to help the Bulldogs claim the 2007 Missouri Valley Conference Championship.

A two-year captain and All-Big 12 Conference honorable mention selection, Lappe averaged 7.8 points, 3.7 rebounds and 2.0 assists in 115 games from 1998-2003. She helped Colorado to three consecutive NCAA appearances from 2001-03, including an Elite Eight appearance in 2002 and a spot in the Sweet 16 as a senior in 2003.

Lappe averaged 8.4 points and 4.4 rebounds as a senior 2003 while dishing out 96 assists, and shooting 84.3 percent from the free throw line as the Buffaloes finished 24-8 and fourth in the Big 12. She was a finalist for the V Foundation Comeback of the Year award after missing large chunks of her sophomore and redshirt junior years with injuries.

She missed the first 11 games the 2001-02 season, but worked her way back into the lineup for CU's Elite Eight squad averaging 4.6 points and 2.9 rebounds per game against a brutal schedule that included 16 games against ranked teams.

Lappe helped CU to a 22-9 mark in 2000-01 and the team's first NCAA appearance since 1997. She led the Big 12 in free throw percentage at 85.9 percent and tallied seven points and nearly three rebounds per contest.

As a freshman in 1998-99 Lappe was CU's offensive MVP after she led the team in scoring (10.7 ppg), free throws made (91) and percentage (.827), assists (3.8 apg) and steals (1.7 spg) as the Buffs made their first ever postseason WNIT

appearance. She played just two games as a sophomore in 1999-2000 before a broken knee cap ended her season.

A three-time first team Academic All-Big 12 honoree, Lappe graduated from CU with her bachelor's degree in business administration in 2002. She is a native of Burlington, Iowa, where she had a stellar prep career. An honorable mention Street & Smith's All-American, she graduated from Winfield High School with prep records in career points (1,987), steals (402), steals in a season (111), steals in a game (10), career assists (652), season assists (208), single game assists (14) and a 110-3 (.974) career record.

She was a first-team Class A (the smallest classification in Iowa) all-state selection from 1996 to 97 and a second-team all-Iowa pick following her freshman year. Her Winfield-Mount Union teams were the Class A state champions in 1995 and 96 and her 1997 team went 28-0 before being upset in the state semifinals, snapping an 80-game win streak. In 2009 Lappe was inducted into the Iowa Girls Basketball Hall of Fame

The daughter of Tom and Jean Lappe, she has two siblings who both played college basketball. Her older brother Burt is a graduate of Northern Iowa, and her younger brother Jake is a graduate of Luther (Iowa) College.

Jennie Baranczyk begins her first season as an assistant women's basketball coach at the University of Colorado, joining head coach Linda Lappe's staff on May 10, 2010.

Baranczyk, 28, will serve as the program's recruiting coordinator and assist with opponent scouting, practice planning and pre and postseason workouts. Baranczyk will also take the lead

in the development of CU's post players.

"I am excited about the opportunity to coach at the University of Colorado and help to bring back the strong tradition of women's basketball here," Baranczyk said. "I really think coach Lappe has a good vision for the future of this program and I look forward to recruiting elite student-athletes who can compete in the Big 12 Conference.

"I've known coach Lappe for a long time (dating back to prep days in Iowa). I'm excited about coaching post players in her system. I hope to bring passion and enthusiasm not only as a coach on the floor but also to the Boulder community."

Baranczyk comes to Colorado after four seasons as an assistant coach at Marquette University (2006-10) as a member of Terri Mitchell's staff, where she helped the Golden Eagles to an overall record of 81-53 and four postseason tournament appearances.

At Marquette, Baranczyk's duties included the development of post players, on and off campus recruiting, game scheduling, opponent scouting and serving as a liaison for media relations.

During Baranczyk's first season at Marquette, she assisted the Golden Eagles to a 26-7 record and a spot in the second round of the 2007 NCAA Tournament. MU qualified for the WNIT postseason event her last three seasons, winning the championship in 2008, a run that included an 86-72 semifinal win over Colorado in Boulder.

"Jennie is one of the best young coaches in the nation and she will be a huge asset in terms of recruiting and overall knowledge of the game," Lappe said. "She is a very good teacher, a proven winner and has high character. We are thrilled to have her on board."

This will be Baranczyk's second venture into the Big 12 Conference as she began her professional coaching career with a two year stint at Kansas State University (2004-06) under Deb Patterson. She joined the Wildcats' staff during the 2004-05 season, serving as assistant director of basketball operations in charge of administrative and organizational aspects of the program.

She was promoted to a full-time assistant coach during the 2005-06 campaign as the Wildcats finished 24-10 and won the WNIT postseason championship. Baranczyk also earned her master's degree in counseling and student development from Kansas State in 2006.

Formerly Jennie Lillis, Baranczyk was a four-year letterwinner at forward for the University of Iowa (2000-04). One of the best all-around players in Hawkeye basketball history, she was a three-time All-Big Ten Conference selection, earning first team honors as a junior (2003) and second team recognition as a sophomore (2002) and senior (2004).

One of only two Iowa players to collect better than 1,700 points and 800 rebounds in a career, Baranczyk is the only player in Hawkeye history to rank in the top 10 all-time in the Iowa record book in scoring (4th/1,762 points), rebounding (5th/827), assists (8th/297), blocks (3rd/114), and steals (6th/196). She helped the Hawkeyes to the 2001 Big Ten Tournament Championship and four postseason appearances, including three NCAA Tournament bids (2001-02, '04).

Baranczyk graduated from Iowa in 2004 with her bachelor's degree in communication studies. She was the recipient of the 2004 Big Ten Conference's Medal of Honor. First awarded in 1914, the Big Ten's oldest award is given annually to a student in the graduating class of each university that demonstrated proficiency in scholarship and athletics. She was also a three-time Academic All-Big Ten pick, a WBCA Scholarship Award recipient, CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree, and a Collegiate Basketball Award for Excellence semifinalist as a senior in 2004.

A native of Urbandale, Iowa, Jennie and her husband Scott Baranczyk were married in May of 2009. (*Last name pronounced Bah-rah-n-check*).

ASSISTANT COACH JONAS CHATTERTONFirst
Season

Jonas Chatterton is entering his first season as an assistant women's basketball coach at the University of Colorado as he joined Linda Lappe's staff on June 9, 2010. He assists with recruiting, opponent scouting, post play development, offensive and defensive schemes and serves as the program's liaison with marketing and promotions.

"I am excited to be part of the staff at Colorado," Chatterton said. "I look forward to being part of the vision coach Lappe has for the program. I truly believe we can be successful here. We are going to put a team on the floor that is going to play hard and work to improve every day."

He spent eight highly successful seasons as an assistant women's basketball coach at BYU under Jeff Judkins (2001-09). During his eight years in Provo, the Cougars compiled a record of 157-89 (.638), won two Mountain West Conference regular season titles (2006-07), one MWC Tournament crown (2002) and participated in five postseason tournaments, including four NCAA Championships (2003-03, 2006-07).

Chatterton returns to collegiate coaching after spending the past year in San Diego as the Director of Sales and Marketing for OrthoRx Inc, a medical supply company. He remained involved in basketball as a coach for the Cal Swish Basketball Club of Orange County.

"It is great to have the final piece to the puzzle in place," Lappe said. "Jonas is a great addition to our staff and will bring a lot of valuable experience. He is a hard working, dependable, high character coach who was a major contributor to the success at BYU and he will no doubt bring a lot to the table at the University of Colorado. We are excited to have him on board."

BYU recorded winning marks in seven of Chatterton's eight seasons, winning 20 or more games three times. The Cougars were 49-16 during their back-to-back MWC title run of 2006-07. The 2005-06 squad spent a majority of the season ranked in the nation's Top 25, recorded the program's best mark in school history at 26-6 and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament which was hosted by CU and held at the Pepsi Center in Denver.

During his first year as an assistant coach (2001-02), BYU won the MWC Tournament and advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time in the program's history. In 2002-03 the Cougars also advanced to the NCAA Tournament, losing a first round game in Boulder to Lappe, then a senior, and her Buffaloes who were bound for the Sweet 16.

Before joining BYU, Chatterton spent two years as an assistant men's basketball coach at Westminster College, an NAIA school in Salt Lake City (1998-2000) where he helped revive a program that had been discontinued in 1979.

Chatterton received his bachelor's of science degree from the University of Utah in 2000 where he majored in exercise and sports science. He played one year of basketball for Rocky Mountain College (Mont.) before transferring to Utah.

A native of Salt Lake City, Chatterton has a daughter, Josie (8), and he and his wife Cami have a daughter, Celia (1).

Pointer will organize pre and post season workouts and take the lead in developing CU's guards as well as assisting with recruiting, opponent scouting, practice planning and serving as the program's liaison with academics.

"I am so pleased to have been offered this position by coach Lappe," Pointer said. "Knowing her vision of where she wants this program to go, with the players and the coaching staff she is bringing together, and the passion she has for CU, it's exciting to be a part of this. It's going to be an incredible journey and I'm looking forward to being part of it."

"I think of myself as a player's coach, here for the players; to get to know them on and off the court and have an impact on their lives is something that is important to me. I want to be part of rebuilding a winning program here."

Before coming to Colorado, Pointer was the Administrative President for the Hoop 10 Basketball - Serious Basketball Instruction program in Amarillo, Texas. In her position she had a hand in every facet of the program. Pointer would recruit players and organize competitive teams, plan and conduct individual and team practices and schedule and direct camps and clinics throughout Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

She joined the Hoop 10 Basketball program after nearly a decade of coaching in the Lone Star state. Pointer spent seven years as the head women's basketball coach at Wayland Baptist University. She guided the Flying Queens to a 155-48 record from 1996-2003, landing in seven NAIA National Tournaments including three trips to the quarterfinal round.

Pointer led WBU to the 1998 Sooner Athletic Conference Tournament title and was the league's Coach of the Year in 1999. Her teams finished in the NAIA Top 25 final rankings all seven years including the 1999 No. 2 final national ranking.

"Johnna has a lot of valuable experience at every different level," Lappe said. "She brings a great deal of knowledge about what it takes to lead a successful program and she will be counted on to bring a great deal of energy and enthusiasm. She is very organized, can relate well to the players, has integrity, and has a passion to teach young women."

Prior to her stint at Wayland Baptist, Pointer served as head women's coach at Frank Phillips College (1994-96). She led the Lady Plainsmen to a 43-17 record in two years, claiming the 1996 Western Junior College Athletic Conference title and a pair of regional tournament appearances.

Pointer was a student assistant coach at the University of Texas for the 1993-94 season and began her coaching career as the head girls basketball coach at Bensberg High School in Bensberg, Germany in 1992-93. That year she also played professionally for the Bensberg TVB Women's Basketball League team.

Pointer was a two-time All-Southwest Conference performer for Texas from 1988-92 where she helped the Longhorns to a pair of SWC Tournament Championships and four NCAA Tournaments including Elite Eights in 1988 and 1989. She also played for Athletes In Action for two years (1991-93) and participated in Olympic Sports Festivals in 1989 and 1990.

She earned her bachelor's degree in education from Texas and her master's of education from Wayland Baptist. She was a two-time Academic All-SWC and Scholar-Athlete Award recipient.

TRACY TRIPP, DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONSThird
Season

Former CU women's basketball standout **Tracy Tripp** begins her third year as Director of Basketball Operations as she joined the program on Aug. 1, 2008. Her duties include film exchange, team travel, monitoring the budget, community service and facility coordination.

A native of Fort Collins, Colo., Tripp was a four-year letterwinner for the Buffaloes from 1985-89 and remains prominent on CU's career charts. She is the eighth leading scorer in team history with 1,574 career points and ranks third in minutes played (3,960), fourth in field-goals made (654) and assists (443) and 10th in steals (174) on the school's all-time lists. Tripp's 38-point scoring effort against Oklahoma State on Feb. 4, 1987, is tied for the school single-game record and she also holds single-game marks for field-goals made and attempted (17-for-32 against OSU) and field-goal percentage (11-of-11 against Wyoming on Dec. 2, 1986). She was a key figure on CU's initial NCAA Tournament team in 1988, averaging 12.5 points and nearly four assists per game as a junior.

A 1987 second team All-Big Eight Conference selection, and three-time Academic All-Big Eight pick, Tripp is also a two-time Colorado Sportswoman of the Year. Her first honor came as a prep following her senior year at Fort Collins High School in 1985, and the second after her senior season at CU.

Tripp graduated with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and earned her teaching certificate from Colorado in 1990.

Tripp spent 13 seasons (1995-08) as an assistant women's basketball coach at the University of Denver, and was promoted to associate head coach for the 2007-08 season. She assisted the Pioneer's transition from NCAA Division II to NCAA I in 1998 and just four seasons later, helped guide DU into the 2001 NCAA Tournament.

Considered an excellent teacher of the game, Tripp was responsible for the development of both guard and post play, scouting of opponents, in-game strategy, and served as the camp director for all summer camps. Tripp's other duties included recruiting, alumni relations and academic support. She was responsible for the development of DU's most notable center, Misa Pavlickova, the 2001 Sun Belt Conference Player

of the Year, the 24th overall pick of the 2001 WNBA Draft and a member of the 2004 Czech Republic Olympic team, as well as other numerous all-conference players.

Prior to Denver, Tripp spent one season as an assistant coach at San Diego State (1994-95), helping the Aztecs to the Western Athletic Conference title and earn a berth in the NCAA Tournament. She also spent one season (1993-94) as an assistant basketball and volleyball coach at Western State College.

Before embarking on her collegiate coaching career, Tripp served as head girls basketball coach at Boulder's Fairview High from 1990-93, leading Knights to three-straight Class 5A state tournaments and an overall record of 54-18. Tripp also taught physical education, health and science during her tenure.

Troy Andre is in his eighth year as CU's assistant sports information director/internet managing editor, and seventh as women's basketball contact.

Andre maintains CU's official athletic website, CUBuffs.com and was the contact for volleyball for two seasons (2003-04). He was the media coordinator for the 2006 NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament First and Second rounds played at the Pepsi Center in Denver.

Prior to CU, he worked for five years at Minnesota-Duluth both as the assistant SID and ticket manager, helping to publicize and promote 14 NCAA Division II sports and two NCAA Division I programs. He was UMD's primary contact for volleyball, women's soccer, men's and women's basketball and baseball; maintained UMD's official website; supervised the office work-study students; and in 2003, coordinated the marketing, promotion and ticket sales for the 2003 Women's Frozen Four.

Andre, 36, graduated in 1996 from the University of Northern Colorado with a bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communication with an emphasis in public relations and advertising. He attended graduate school at North Dakota State University, majoring in mass communication, and worked for two years as a graduate assistant in NDSU's sports information office between 1996 and 1998.

At UNC, he worked two years in the Bears' sports information office as a student assistant, and also was a sports reporter for the *Greeley Tribune*, a job he actually started in high school and held for over five years. He covered the Denver Broncos training camp as a beat reporter for the Tribune, and later would work as a summer intern for the Broncos in 1996 following his senior year in college.

Born December 12, 1973 in Fort Collins, Colo., he graduated from University High School in Greeley, where he lettered in cross country and was also active in statistical work with football, basketball and baseball. He is married to the former Danielle Driscoll.

DAN DOERFLEIN

Dan Doerflein is in his first year as video coordinator for the University of Colorado women's basketball team.

Doerflein, 28, joins the Buffaloes after spending seven seasons working with the women's basketball program at Brigham Young University. He began as a student assistant at BYU for the 2001-02 season and after a two-year mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in Washington D.C., he returned to his role from 2004-07 where he primarily worked on conversion defense and player development.

Doerflein was the Cougars' film coordinator from 2007-09, where he was responsible for recording and analyzing game film. After graduating from BYU with his bachelor of science degree in American Studies in 2009, he served as director of operations for the 2009-10 campaign where he was in charge of scheduling, travel, academics and film exchange.



He enjoyed a successful stint on the staff of Jeff Judkins' BYU program. While Doerflein was at BYU the Cougars won two Mountain West Conference regular season titles (2006-07), one MWC Tournament Crown (2002) and participated in three NCAA Tournaments (2002, 2006-07). Doerflein also has a familiar face to work with at his new position at CU as current Buffaloes assistant Jonas Chatterton was an assistant on Judkins' staff from 2001-09.

Doerflein is also a veteran of the youth camps circuit working with sessions at both BYU and the University of Maryland.

Prior to his arrival at CU, Kataoka was a high school teacher and coach for 10 years in the Orange County, Calif. He taught 9th through 12th grade English and Language Arts in his first eight years. He spent his last two years as a program specialist, coordinating high school college and career centers. He coached basketball and volleyball each year while in high school education.

A native of San Diego, Kataoka attended Grossmont High School where he played basketball, volleyball and football. He graduated from the University of California, Irvine in 1996 with a bachelor of arts in English. He earned a Single Subject Teaching Credential in Language Arts and a Cross-Cultural Language and academic development certification in 1997.

Kataoka is also completing a Master's Degree in Coaching and Athletic Administration. He and his wife Suzanne have two daughters, Leah and Marisa.

**BRENDON SMITH****Assistant Director of Equipment**

Brendon Smith is in his second year as an assistant equipment manager at the University of Colorado. Smith handles the equipment duties for the men's and women's basketball teams and assists with football.

Prior to his arrival at Colorado, Smith served as the equipment manager at Sacred Heart University. He started out as an assistant manager in 2005 and was promoted to the director in 2006. Smith was responsible for the equipment needs of all 31 sports at SHU.

Smith earned his bachelor's in public relations and sports communications from Marist College in 2004. He graduated from Catskill High School in 2000 and lettered in baseball and bowling.

Born on March 24, 1982 in Catskill, N.Y., Smith enjoys hanging out with friends. He currently resides in Westminster, Colo.

**DERIC SWANSON****Director of BuffVision**

Deric Swanson is in his 12th year as the Director of BuffVision, coordinating all aspects of production involving the \$4.7 million video board operation for athletics in Folsom Field and now in Coors Events Center.

Swanson, 36, came to CU from the Colorado Avalanche Hockey Club in 1999, where he had worked for a brief time as the manager of game entertainment and video production. He had previously worked three-plus seasons with the Colorado Rockies Baseball Club, first as a stadium camera operator, and then as video production coordinator, including the 1998 Major League Baseball All-Star Game at Coors Field.

In 2003, BuffVision won the Golden Matrix Award for "Best Overall Video Display" in the University Division at the Information Display and Entertainment Association (IDEA) conference in Atlanta. The following year, BuffVision was awarded two distinctions, one for the 2004 Aurora Awards, a Platinum Best of Show statue for In-Game Entertainment Graphics/Design, and a Telly Award for The Buffalo Stampede, CU's coaches' show. In 2006 and 2007, BuffVision won four more Telly Awards for Swanson's production, including two for the "Ralphie on Campus" institutional spot and another for The Buffalo Stampede.

He is a 1996 graduate of Colorado State University, earning his bachelor's degree in technical journalism and broadcasting. He graduated Magna Cum Laude and was recognized as CSU's outstanding graduate in journalism.

He was born May 24, 1974 in Oakland, Calif., and attended two high schools. His father was stationed in the Azores, Portugal, and he spent two years at Lajes High School, where he lettered in football, soccer, volleyball and basketball. After moving to Colorado, he graduated from Liberty High School in Colorado Springs, where he lettered in football. He played volleyball on CSU's club team for three years. In 2009, Swanson completed his second IronMan triathlon in Phoenix, Arizona. He is married the former Heather Cohea and the couple has a son, Gavin Pierce (2).

**NICOLE MAKRIS****Assistant Athletic Trainer**

Nicole Makris is in her seventh season as an assistant athletic trainer at Colorado. She primarily works with the women's basketball and men's golf teams.

Makris joined CU from the University of Denver where she was as an assistant athletic trainer for four years. At DU she served as the athletic trainer for the Pioneer women's basketball, women's lacrosse, and men's and women's tennis programs. She was also an assistant athletic trainer at Washington State University for one year, serving as the head athletic trainer for the Cougars' women's volleyball and rowing teams.

Prior to Washington State, Makris was a graduate assistant athletic trainer at San Jose State for two years (1997-00) where she was the head athletic trainer for softball and assisted with football.

A 1997 graduate of Northern Colorado with a degree in Kinesiology (emphasis in athletic training), Makris worked with all of the Northern Colorado athletic teams as a student trainer from 1995-97. She holds a Master's degree in Human Performance and Athletic Training from San Jose State. Makris is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association. She is single and resides in Superior.

ERIC PELLONI

Assistant Director of BuffVision

Eric Pelloni is in his fifth season as the Assistant Director of BuffVision, although he has been involved in CU Athletics for the better part of 11 years.

Pelloni is the associate producer of "The Buffalo Stampede" coaches show which airs weekly on FSN Rocky Mountain. He assists with the video packages for CU's video display boards and has been on the BuffVision game day crew for 12 seasons.

When CU Athletics overhauled its official athletic website, CUBuffs.com, in 2003, Pelloni was hired on a part-time basis to create video content and stream live events for The Stampede Online subscription service. He has created the majority of the graphic work and assisted in the designing of CUBuffs.com, and has designed the last two women's basketball media guide covers.

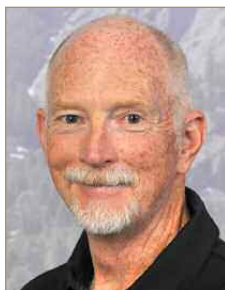


B.G. BROOKS

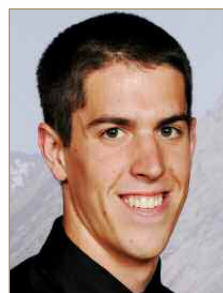

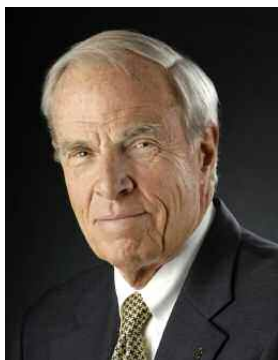

PRESIDENT BRUCE BENSON



Before he became president of the University of Colorado in March 2008, Bruce D. Benson had already made his mark in business, politics, philanthropy, education and civic endeavors.

He founded Benson Mineral Group in 1965, a year after earning a degree in geology from CU. Over his career, he has been involved in a variety of business ventures, including real estate, restaurants and banking.

Three different Colorado governors have named Benson to various education initiatives and governing boards, including the Colorado Commission on Higher Education and the Metro State College Board of Trustees, both of which he chaired. In addition, he co-chaired the P-20 Education Coordinating Council from 2007 until early 2008 and chaired the Governor's Blue Ribbon Panel for Higher Education for the 21st Century from 2001 to 2003.

He has been active in support of his alma mater. He was national chairman of CU's four-campus, \$1 Billion Comprehensive Fund-Raising Campaign from 1997-2003. He served as a director on the Coleman Colorado Foundation – Institute for Cognitive Disabilities from 2001-08. He was a board member for CU- Boulder's Center for the American

West from 2006-08. Benson also served on the board of directors of the CU Foundation from 1990-96, and was a member of the CU Foundation Development Cabinet from 1992-95. CU awarded him the University Medal in 1999 and the university's Ira C. Rothgerber Award in 2003 (one of two ever awarded). The CU Alumni Association honored him with its Recognition Award in 2001. He also has provided significant philanthropic support to CU.

Benson was also one of the leaders of the 2005 statewide campaign that successfully passed Referendum C, which provided additional funding for education and the state budget. He was elected chairman of the Colorado Republican Party four times, and was the Republican nominee for governor in 1994.

As CU president, Benson leads a system of four campuses: Boulder, Colorado Springs, Denver and the Anschutz Medical Campus. CU serves some 56,000 students and has a

\$2.7 billion annual budget.

Benson has received many honors recognizing his leadership in a variety of activities, but two are particularly notable: CU in 2004 granted him an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters, and in February 2009, he was named to the Colorado Business Hall of Fame.

A native of Chicago, Benson has called Colorado home for nearly five decades. He is married to Marcy Head Benson. He has three adult children and 10 grandchildren.

CHANCELLOR PHIL DISTEFANO



Dr. Philip P. DiStefano is the Chancellor at the University of Colorado Boulder. Prior to his appointment on May 5, 2009, Dr. DiStefano was the top academic officer at CU-Boulder for eight years as the Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. He served as interim chancellor twice during pivotal times in the university's history.

Dr. DiStefano co-chaired the steering committee for CU-Boulder's visionary strategic plan, *Flagship 2030*, conceived with campus, community and statewide input, to guide the university for decades to come. Today, Dr. DiStefano is shepherding its implementation as *Flagship 2030* moves from vision to reality.

Dr. DiStefano has served CU-Boulder for 36 years. He joined the University of Colorado in 1974 as an Assistant Professor of Curriculum and Instruction at the School of Education. His academic career

flourished as he assumed a series of academic and administrative positions, including Professor, Associate Dean, Dean and Vice Chancellor. He was appointed Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs in 2001.

As Chancellor he works closely with students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, governing officials, and business and community leaders in extending CU's legacy as a preeminent national comprehensive research university.

A first-generation college graduate, Dr. DiStefano earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Ohio State University and a Master of Arts degree in English Education from West Virginia University. He holds a Doctorate in Humanities Education from Ohio State University, where he served as a teaching and research associate.

He began his educational career as a high school English teacher in Ohio. He has authored and co-authored numerous books and articles on literacy education.

Dr. DiStefano and his wife, Yvonne, have been married for 41 years and are the parents of three grown daughters and a granddaughter.

PROVOST RUSSELL MOORE

Dr. Russell L. Moore has had a long and distinguished career at the University of Colorado Boulder. As the interim provost since July 1, he is the chief academic officer on the Boulder campus.

Dr. Moore also served as interim vice chancellor for research from May 2009 to July 2010. Prior to that appointment, he was associate vice chancellor for research since 2006.

Dr. Moore served as chair of kinesiology and applied physiology (now integrative physiology) from 1994 to 2001, and was assistant professor (1984-86), associate professor (1993-96) and full professor (1996-present) in that department.

He holds an adjunct professorship in medicine (cardiology) at the University of Colorado's Anschutz Medical Campus at the University of Colorado Denver.

He was an assistant and associate professor (1986-91) in the departments of medicine, cellular and molecular physiology at the Pennsylvania State University College of Medicine in Hershey, Pa. He did postdoctoral work at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas (1981-84).

Dr. Moore earned a Bachelor of Science degree in biochemistry from the University of California at Davis in 1976, and a master's degree (1978) and doctorate (1982) in physiology from Washington State University in Pullman, Wash.

FACULTY REP DAVID CLOUGH

David Clough, professor of chemical and biological engineering, is in his sixth year as the University of Colorado's Faculty Athletic Representative (FAR), as he was named to the position in March 2005.

Dr. Clough, 64, replaced current Chancellor Phil DiStefano, who had served as FAR from June 1, 2000 until just shortly after his appointment as interim chancellor for the Boulder campus in 2005. Clough is only the sixth FAR in CU history, joining a very prestigious list: Walter Franklin (1947-

1948), Warren Thompson (1949-1966), William Baughn (1967-1989), James Corbridge (1989-2000) and DiStefano (2000-2005).

Dr. Clough has had a significant impact on engineering education at CU-Boulder and beyond through career-long efforts to enhance the learning of engineering students. He has pioneered active- and cooperative-learning techniques in the College of Engineering and Applied Science, and in 1989 he originated the concept of the Integrated Teaching and Learning Laboratory (ITLL). Clough's research has focused on the automated control of chemical and related processes.

He also has been involved with student-athletes for a long time, as he's had a relationship with the CU athletic department for over 30 years. For his entire faculty career, Clough has taken a special interest in engineering student-athletes, as early on he gained an appreciation for the combined challenges they face. He played an integral role in Rhodes Scholarship candidacy of former football player Jim Hansen, an Academic All-American who was awarded the Rhodes in 1993; he is now teaching at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, and the two remain best of friends.

Dr. Clough received his bachelor's degree from the Case Institute of Technology (now Case Western Reserve University) in 1968 and his master's from CU-Boulder in 1969, both in chemical engineering. He worked as an engineer for E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Co., Inc., from 1969 to 1972 before returning to CU-Boulder to earn his doctorate in 1975. He joined the faculty of the Department of Chemical Engineering at that time.

From 1986 to 1992 he served as the college's associate dean for academic affairs, playing a role in a number of important initiatives, including the Gemmill Engineering Library, the Herbst Humanities Program, and the ITLL. From 1993 through 1999, he was associate chair

of the Department of Chemical Engineering and was responsible for significant improvements to the department's undergraduate advising program.

Known for his willingness to experiment with new educational concepts and technology, Dr. Clough has worked to reform traditional lecture classes into an interactive workshop format that greatly enhances the learning of students. Through these efforts, he has helped to reshape the way engineering is taught. The student-run Engineering Excellence Fund chose Dr. Clough as the first recipient of the Sullivan-Carlson Inspiration in Teaching Award in 1998. He has received numerous teaching and advising awards from nominations by his students over the years. He also has been given the college's Hutchinson Teaching Award and Peters Service Award. He received the first Boulder Faculty Assembly Teaching Award in 1980 and the Boulder Campus Outstanding Advisor Award in 1996. His merit as an educator has also been recognized outside CU, as in 1995, the American Society for Engineering Education (Rocky Mountain Section) presented him with its first Outstanding Educator Award.

In April 2000, he received the college's Distinguished Engineering Alumnus Award in the Education category. It recognized his significant impact on engineering education through pioneering the active learning concept for the ITLL, and in leading the college in changing traditional lecture courses to an active learning format.

In his role as Faculty Athletics Representative, Clough represents CU to the Big 12 Conference (and soon to the Pacific 10) and the NCAA. He provides a liaison between Athletics and the faculty and works to enhance the educational experience of our ~350 student-athletes. He is also active on the national scene as a member of the Executive Committee of the 1300-member Faculty Athletics Representatives Association (FARA), and this year is a candidate for President-Elect of FARA. In his time as FAR, Dr. Clough has established a reputation for his expertise in the NCAA's Academic Performance Program and that program's statistics that track the progress of student-athletes, the Academic Progress Rate (APR) and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR). He has developed tracking and predictive tools that have been shared with over 100 NCAA institutions.

He and his wife, Sydney, have four grown children, Astrid, William, Rodney and Damon, and four grandchildren. Dr. Clough's father, John W. Clough, was a chemical engineer, and his two brothers are retired engineers. The Clough family established a scholarship endowment in engineering at CU in honor of John Clough, who died in 1994. The family holds a strong belief in giving back to the educational institutions that have benefited its members.



ATHLETIC DIRECTOR MIKE BOHN



Mike Bohn was introduced as just the fifth full-time athletic director in University of Colorado history on April 13, 2005, returning to the surroundings where he starred as a prep athlete before embarking on a journey that would take him all over the western half of the United States and finally back home.

Bohn, 49, came to Colorado from San Diego State University, where he left an indelible imprint in just 18 months as the Aztecs' director of athletics. He agreed to a 5-year contract with the Buffaloes and was rewarded quickly for his initial efforts, as in November 2007 he received an extension

through the 2011-12 academic year.

He replaced Jack Lengyel, who served as interim athletic director for five months after Dick Tharp stepped down in November 2004 after holding the position since 1996. Tharp had followed three legendary men in CU athletic history, Harry Carlson (1927-65), Eddie Crowder (1965-84) and Bill Marolt (1984-96).

Bohn is the first of the five to be named CU athletic director without having previously worked within the CU system. Carlson and Crowder were coaches upon being named, Marolt returned to CU where he coached for 10 years before leaving for the U.S. Olympic ski team, and Tharp was a university attorney with strong CU-Boulder campus ties. But his ties to Boulder were extensive, growing up here with family and friends always in the area.

He accomplished a lot in his first 100 days on the job, from branching out into the community with Chancellor Phil DiStefano at town meetings, to implementing the *YOUR TEAM* campaign to raise significant funds for immediate scholarship and capital project needs. Several other creative ideas, especially in marketing including Ralphies' Kids Roundup and the Pearl Street Stampede the night before home football games, were established to create better ties with CU and area communities.

Those first 100 days were just the beginning, and just five years into his service to CU, he has made major improvements in fundraising, including the establishment of the Buff Club Cabinet, huge in-roads in community and campus relations, and has worked to balance a budget by making tough but necessary cuts, guaranteeing the future success of Colorado's 16 intercollegiate sports.

Perhaps his top "one shining moment" to date took place in the spring of 2010, when he led the charge for the Buffaloes to join the Pacific-10 Conference. A very tense period in college athletics, rumors swirling about concerning several schools, he had CU's ship steadied throughout and landed CU in a conference that conforms to a perfect fit with its students, alumni and fans on many levels, including academics as well as athletics. Colorado is set to join the league in either the summer of 2011 or 2012.

He has overseen the hiring of seven head coaches, Dan Hawkins (football), Jeff Bzdelik and Tad Boyle (men's basketball), Kathy McConnell-Miller and Linda Lappe (women's basketball), Roy Edwards (men's golf) and Liz Kritza (volleyball).

Mile High Sports Magazine selected Bohn as its Sports Person of the Year for 2006, as the publication recognized his efforts in his first year on the job.

Bohn's brief tenure at San Diego State featured many remarkable accomplishments, including the instilling of energy, enthusiasm, accountability and determination into the Aztec staff. Officially named SDSU athletic director on October 6, 2003, his immediate task was to unify the athletic department, the campus and the community of San Diego.

Bohn strategically and steadily restructured the SDSU athletic department with emphasis on fund raising, fiscal responsibility, compliance and academics.

Under his watch, San Diego State set a new single-game attendance record in football when more than 57,000 fans watched the Aztecs' win over Idaho State in the 2004 season opener. The average football attendance of 35,995 in 2004 was the best at the school since 1993, with the increase of 14,369 fans per game marking the third largest attendance jump in the country. The SDSU baseball team also set attendance records under his watch.

He landed the San Diego State position after serving five years as athletic director at the University of Idaho (1999-2003), where he first made his mark as a lead administrator in the area of transformation.

At Idaho, he developed projects for new facilities, increased community and corporate support, and produced balanced budgets for the department after

inheriting an operation that had accumulated a deficit of over \$1 million.

During his five years in Moscow, he oversaw the transition of the Vandals to the Division I-A ranks from the Big Sky Conference. Under Bohn, Idaho began construction on the Vandal Athletics Center, the first facilities improvement for UI athletics in two decades. He was also the driving force behind a 20-percent increase in the Vandal Scholarship Fund and a \$350,000 surge in annual corporate support.

Between Idaho and San Diego State, Bohn hired 12 head coaches in all as well as several administrators.

Bohn prepared for his career goal of becoming a Division I athletic director entirely in the state of Colorado, his adopted "native" state despite being born in Illinois; he moved to Colorado with his family when he was one year old.

His first job in athletic administration came at the Air Force Academy, where he worked for the better part of nine years (1984-92). During his tenure in Colorado Springs, Bohn advanced from an intern to assistant athletic director. He served as executive director of the Blue and Silver Club, as well as other external operations throughout his stay at the academy. He played a major role in the increase of football season ticket sales from 6,000 to 20,000 and implemented a fundraising campaign that generated \$16 million for stadium improvements.

From 1992 to 1995, Bohn served as Director of Marketing for the College Football Association, where he worked for one of the most respected people in the history of college athletics, Chuck Neinas (the one-time Big Eight Conference commissioner). The CFA, the precursor to the current Bowl Championship Series, consisted of six major football conferences encompassing 67 universities. He created and developed the CFA "Good Works Team" which recognizes significant off-the-field accomplishments in the area of community relations of 11 football student-athletes nationally (a team that is still selected today by the American Football Coaches Association).

Bohn was involved in many facets of the organization's operations, including the administration of a \$67 million television package involving ABC, ESPN and ESPN2. He also formulated a blueprint for the promotion and development of the image of college football as a whole.

He then moved on to Colorado State University, where he spent the next three years (1996-98) as an associate athletic director for the Rams. At CSU, he was responsible for all external revenue-producing operations, including ticket sales, fundraising through the Greater Ram Club, licensing, corporate sales, signage, capital campaigns and broadcasting rights fees and special events. He also helped escalate student interest in CSU athletics.

He earned his bachelor's of arts degree from the University of Kansas in 1983, where he was recruited as a quarterback and also played baseball (pitcher-first basemen-outfielder). He then graduated with a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University in 1984. While earning his master's, he worked as a graduate assistant football coach for the Bobcats.

Bohn is a former member of the NCAA Championships Cabinet and the Division I-A Athletics Directors Association Executive Council. During his stay at Idaho, he was a member of the Big West Conference executive committee and served on the University of Idaho executive council.

Born November 16, 1960 in Hinsdale, ILL., he graduated from Boulder High School where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. He is married to the former Kim Zeren, and the couple has two grown children, Michaelyn and Brandon.

DID YOU KNOW?... Mike Bohn is the first athletic administrator to work at three of the state's Division I-A colleges (CU, Air Force, Colorado State and Denver). Several high profile people have logged time in at two of the schools; those who spent time at CU and one other include assistant football coaches **Kay Dalton** (CU/CSU), **Chuck Heater** (CU/CSU), **Tom McMahon** (CU/CSU) and **Dan Stavelly** (CU/DU); track coaches **Don Meyers** (CU/CSU) and **Jerry Quiller** (CU/CSU); basketball coaches **Jen Warden** (CU/CSU) and **Linda Lappe** (CU/CSU); sports information directors **Steve Hatchell** (CU/CSU) and **Tim Simmons** (CU/CSU); gymnastics coach **Dan Garcia** (CU/DU), golf coaches **Eric Hoos** and **Sammie Chergo** (both assistants at CU and then head coaches at DU); assistant women's basketball coach **Tanya Haave** (CU/DU); trainers **Eric Fry** (DU/CU), **Ed Lochrie** (CU/DU) and **Nicole Makris** (DU/CU); and fundraiser **Chris Kiser** (CU/CSU).
