catch Jackie McFarland for second place on CU's all-time scoring list. McFarland, who was a senior during Spears' freshman season, scored 1,957 from 2004-08.

THE BUFFALOES: Colorado is 12-11 overall and tied with Oklahoma State and Missouri for eighth place in the Big 12 standings at 3-7. Colorado is just one game behind seventh place Texas Tech (4-6) and two behind fifth place Texas and Iowa State (both at 5-5). The Buffaloes, who have already matched their league win total from a year ago (3-13), will now look to match their 2009-10 overall win total of 13 (13-17). The Buffaloes will be looking for their first win away from Boulder this season (0-7) and first true road win in eight tries dating back to the 2009-10 campaign.

Overall the Buffaloes are giving up 59.5 points per game while allowing only 38.4 percent from the field. CU's defensive strength has come from the perimeter, allowing just 28.4 percent from beyond the arc, ranking second in the Big 12 and 39th in the nation. Colorado has also been winning the battle of the boards, outrebounding or equaling its opponent in 18-of-23 games and by an average of 5.5 boards an outing (more on CU rebounding below).

Senior guard/forward **Brittany Spears** leads CU and ranks seventh in the Big 12 in scoring at 17.8 points per game. She is also second in defensive rebounds (5.9 drpg), fourth in overall rebounding (8.1 rpg), sixth in 3-point field goals (2.2 3mpg), 10th in minutes (32.3 mpg) and 11th in blocked shots (1.0 bpg), free-throw percentage (.779) and steals (1.7 spg).

Spears is averaging 18.4 points and 8.6 rebounds in Big 12 play. She had 12 points and 11 rebounds in the loss to Texas Tech for her 30th career double-double and eighth of this season which ranks third in the Big 12. She has logged double digits in scoring in 22-of-23 games this season and in 101-of-116 career outings. Her 101 career games in double-figures is the third most in team history trailing only Lisa Van Goor (108 from 1980-85) and Jackie McFarland (102 from 2004-08). Spears, who tied her own team season-high 26 points in the win over Nebraska, also leads the team in 3-point field goals (50) and blocks (24) and is second in steals (40) and rebounds on a per game basis (8.1 rpg).

Sophomore guard **Chuck Jeffery** is CU's top rebounder on a per-game basis (8.5 rpg) while ranking second on the team in scoring at 14 an outing. Jeffery has seven double-doubles this season, ranking fifth in the Big 12, including the second triple-double in team history by recording 10 points, 13 rebounds and 10 assists against Loyola Chicago.

Jeffery leads the Big 12 in steals (3.0 spg) and defensive rebounds (6.2 drpg) while ranking second in overall rebounding, sixth in assists (4.5 apg), 12th in field-goal percentage (.484) and 14th in scoring, assist-to-turnover ratio (1.1) and offensive rebounds (2.3 orpg).

Sophomore guard/forward **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** is averaging 6.9 points and 4.4 rebounds and is second on the team in blocked shots (14). She tops the Big 12 in 3-point percentage during league play at 50 percent (12-of-24) and is eighth on the league's overall season charts at 39.7 percent (27-of-68).

Junior forward **Julie Seabrook** is averaging 5.7 points and 5.8 rebounds per game while shooting a team best 48.6 percent from the field (54-of-111). She has shot 60 percent or better in 10 games, and 50 percent or better in 13 outings. Seabrook ranks 14th in the Big 12 in rebounding during Big 12 games at 6.1 per game and she is ninth in offensive rebounding at 2.6 per contest. She has four games of double-digit rebounds, including a season-best 11 boards in the win over Missouri.

Freshman guard **Brittany Wilson** is averaging 8.4 points and 3.9 rebounds per game and is one of three Buffs -- joining Spears and Jeffery -- with at least 30 assists and 30 steals. Her 31 total steals rank third among freshmen in the Big 12. Wilson set a career-high by scoring 22 points in the loss at Kansas and dished out a personal-best six assists against Nebraska.

Senior guard **Britney Blythe** has had recent success from downtown making nine of her last 20 (.450), including a 3-for-6 effort in the win over Nebraska. She has hit 37 percent from deep during the Big 12 season, ranking ninth on the league charts.

Freshman center **Rachel Hargis** is becoming a solid player off the bench. Hargis is averaging four points, 4.8 rebounds and 1.2 blocked shots over the last five games, including career highs with six points and eight rebounds in 26 minutes against Nebraska

ABOUT THE WILDCATS: Kansas State is 16-7 overall and in fourth place in the Big 12 standings at 6-4, one game up on Texas and Iowa State. The Wildcats have lost two straight, including their first home setback of the season, a 69-59 decision against Texas on Feb. 9. K-State, still 11-1 in Bramlage this season, averages just under 62 points per game while shooting 40 percent from the field and 30 percent from 3-point range. The Wildcats' defense has held opponents to just 54.1 points per game, ranking second in the Big 12. KSU's field-goal defense (.364) ranks fourth best on the league charts.

Sophomore guard Brittany Chambers paces the Wildcats at 15.5 points and 5.7 rebounds per game. She ranks third in the Big 12 with 60 3-pointers on the season. Junior forward Jalana Childs averages 12.9 points per game while grabbing five rebounds per contest. Sophomore guard Taelor Karr averages 10 points per game with five rebounds. Sophomore guard Mariah White tops the Wildcats and ranks 10th in the Big 12 at four assists per game.

SERIES RECORDS: This will be the 68th meeting between Colorado and Kansas State, briefly tying the Nebraska and Missouri series for the most played in Buffaloes' history (CU will play Missouri on Feb. 26 and Nebraska on Mar. 2). The Wildcats took over the all-time series lead at 34-33 after defeating the Buffaloes 72-59 on Jan. 26 in Boulder, their first lead since the 1992 Big Eight Conference season. KSU has won five of the last six meetings, but the Buffaloes claimed a 63-57 decision in the last meeting in Manhattan on Jan. 20, 2010. In fact, the road team has won the last four in this series (excluding the 2009 Big 12 Championship neutral site meeting). Kansas State holds a 17-13 series lead in Manhattan.

CONNECTIONS: Kansas State head coach Deb Patterson, in her 15th season, is one of five Big 12 coaches that were at their current position when CU head coach **Linda Lappe** played for the Buffaloes from 1998-2003. Colorado assistant coach **Jennie Baranczyk** began her professional career under Patterson as KSU's Director of Basketball Operations in 2004-05 and was a full time assistant coach for one season (2005-06) before moving on to Marquette. Buffs' assistant **Johnna Pointer** grew up about 10 minutes from KSU associate head coach Kamie Ethridge in west Texas, with both eventually starring at the University of Texas. Ethridge led Texas to the 1986 NCAA title as a senior while Pointer was an All-Southwest

MANHATTAN, Kan. - Their arrival was a bit foggy, their departure clearly was better.

When the Colorado women's basketball team's charter flight couldn't land late Tuesday afternoon because of thick fog at the Manhattan airport, the airplane was diverted to Hutchinson, Kan., where the traveling party waited for over an hour to be bused to Manhattan.

Upon their arrival about 8 p.m., the Buffaloes had a short shoot-around at Bramlage Coliseum, returned to their hotel, ate dinner and called it a night.

A night later, there were no ill-effects - particularly not for freshman **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** and junior **Brittany Spears**.

They each hit a pair of late pressurized free throws Wednesday night as CU held off Kansas State 63-57, breaking an eight-game road losing streak and helping the Buffs surpass their 2008-09 win total (11-18, 3-13).

Leading by 14 points early in the second half, the Buffs (12-5, 2-2) appeared to have the game in hand until the Wildcats (10-8, 2-2) cut the margin to 55-54 with just over 3 minutes remaining.

But a three-pointer by Spears, who led CU with 15 points and nine rebounds, quelled that K-State push. The Buffs then hit five of seven free throws in the final 2:18 to preserve the Big 12 Conference victory.

Malcolm-Peck chased down a loose ball, was fouled and connected on both ends of a one-and-one with 14.6 seconds left to score her only two points of the game, giving CU a 61-57 lead.

Eight seconds later, Spears connected on another pair for the final margin.

In addition to Spears, CU had three other players in double figures - **Chucky Jeffery** and **Bianca Smith** with 13 each, and **Alyssa Fressle** with 11.

But the Buffs' defense was just as instrumental as the offense, limiting the Big 12's top three-point shooting team to just four in 18 attempts and keeping the Wildcats out of synch for most of the game.

CU also held its own on the boards, battling to a 33-33 draw with K-State.

The Buffs ramped up their defense to close the first half, holding the Wildcats without a field goal in the final 6 minutes, outscoring them 7-3 in the final 2:50 and going to their locker room with a 30-25 lead.

Entering the game as the Big 12's best three-point shooting team, K-State made just one of 10 first-half attempts. Meanwhile, CU hit four of its 14 tries, with Smith coming off the bench to account for two of them.

CU's halftime advantage at the break marked the Buffs' first in Big 12 road play since Jan. 9, 2008 at Missouri. The Buffs led 28-23, eventually winning in a blowout - 70-58. CU hadn't led at intermission at K-State since Feb. 14, 2007. That advantage was 28-26, and the Buffs also ended that game on top - 60-58.

So, a couple of precedents were set, leaving CU 20 more minutes to follow through - and the Buffs opened the second appearing intent on doing it.

They scored the second half's first seven points to take a 37-25 lead, forcing K-State coach Debbie Patterson to call a timeout with 17: 19 remaining.

Talking it over didn't provide an immediate answer. Fressle quickly converted a steal into a layup to give the Buffs a 39-25 lead, capping a 20-4 Buffs run before the Wildcats finally got a three-pointer by Brittany Chambers at the 15:00 mark.

If the Wildcats were looking for a spark, the Buffs unwittingly provided it with 12:33 to play. After collecting a defensive rebound, Smith swung a forearm and cleared out a K-State defender. After being whistled for a foul, Smith protested and was assessed a technical. Kari Kincaid hit both free throws, pulling the Wildcats to within 10 (44-34).

The momentum had shifted to the Wildcats - but the Buffs didn't wilt, winning the game at the free throw line and leaving Manhattan under far better circumstances than their arrival.

Conference performer, helping Texas to four NCAA appearances from 1988-92.

BUFFS REBOUNDING: One of Colorado's biggest improvements as a team this year is rebounding. The Buffaloes are currently averaging 39.9 rebounds per game while allowing just 34.4 per contest. CU's rebounding margin of +5.5 ranks sixth in the Big 12 and 39th in NCAA Division I. In 2009-10 the Buffaloes averaged just 35.1 per contest while allowing opponents 36.9 a game.

Colorado has equaled or outrebounded 18-of-23 opponents this season, and three of those games where CU was outrebounded, it was by two or fewer boards. Colorado has equaled or outrebounded seven Big 12 opponents this year compared to just four of 16 Big 12 games in 2010.

CU pulled down a season high 53 rebounds in the win over Missouri, tying for the most ever by the Buffaloes in a Big 12 game. CU also had 53 in a 69-40 win at Texas A&M on Feb. 8, 1997. Colorado's 20 offensive rebounds were its most in a Big 12 game since grabbing 20 in a 67-53 win over Texas on Feb. 16, 2008. Colorado's plus-18 rebound margin against Nebraska (45-27) was its most in a Big 12 game since out dueling Texas 50-29 (+21) on the boards on Feb. 16, 2008.

CU DOUBLES: Colorado is the only school in the Big 12 with two players sporting seven or more double-doubles this season. Senior **Brittany Spears** is tied with Baylor's Brittney Griner for third in the Big 12 with eight double-doubles, while sophomore **Chucky Jeffery** is in a three-way tie for fifth with seven.

Spears has 30 career double-doubles after her 12-point, 11-rebound performance against Texas Tech. Jeffery's career total is eight in her young career.

JEFFERY, SPEARS BEST REBOUNDING DUO IN BIG 12: Chucky Jeffery ranks second in the Big 12 in rebounding at 8.5 per game, just a fraction behind Texas A&M's Danielle Adams for the league lead. **Brittany Spears** ranks fourth in the same category at 8.1 per contest. The CU duo's 16.6 boards per outing is the best mark for a pair of teammates in the Big 12:

Jeffery and Spears also rank 1-2 overall on the league charts in defensive rebounds. Jeffery tops the Big 12 with 6.2 defensive boards per contest with Spears right behind at 5.9.

BLYTHE PROTECTS THE ROCK: Senior guard **Britney Blythe** not only routinely takes on the task of guarding the opponents best offensive back court player, but she's among the best in the Big 12 this season in protecting the ball on the other end.

Blythe has just 25 turnovers this season, seven of which came in the first two games. She has turned the ball over only 18 times in the last 21 games had a string of four straight games without a turnover snapped against Texas.

Blythe is second in the Big 12 in fewest turnovers over a 40 minute stretch and is eighth for straight up turnovers per game (*minimums are 75 percent of games played and 350 minutes played*):

NOTING THE NEBRASKA GAME: Colorado's 25-point margin of victory over Nebraska (70-45) was its largest in a Big 12 game since defeating Kansas 73-42 in Boulder on Feb. 5, 2003. This was Colorado's largest margin of victory against Nebraska since a 95-60 home win on Feb. 6, 2002, nine years ago to the date. Colorado's 39 first half points were its most in a Big 12 game since scoring 40 against Kansas State on Feb. 23, 2008, a 73-68 CU win. Colorado's 18 assists were its most in a Big 12 games since dishing out 21 in an 82-71 loss to Iowa State on Feb. 7, 2009. The 45 points allowed to Nebraska was CU's lowest in Big 12 play since a 59-41 win over Kansas on Jan. 22, 2008.

BUFFS BREAK RANKING STREAK: Colorado's 66-60 overtime win over Iowa State broke a string of 24-straight losses to ranked teams and 21-game skid against teams ranked in both AP and WBCA Coaches polls (Iowa State was ranked only in the WBCA poll in one meeting last season as was Kansas State in two meetings in 2008-09). Prior to the upset, CU's last win over a ranked opponent was a 73-68 decision over No. 15/15 Kansas State on Feb. 23, 2008.

The last time the Buffaloes beat a ranked ISU team was on Jan. 23, 2002, in an 86-73 win at home. At that time, Colorado was ranked 20/19 as ISU secured a 14/10 position in the polls. The win marked the first time in history that a non-ranked Colorado team has beaten a ranked ISU squad.

SPEARS' STARTING STREAK: Senior **Brittany Spears** has started a school record 116 straight games. She passed the previous mark of Amy Mathern (1989-93) with her 113th straight start in the Texas game on Jan. 30. Spears' mark is also the record for consecutive starts at the beginning of a career as she passed Lisa Van Goor (1980-85) when she started her 101st game against Illinois on Dec. 4. With her scheduled 117th start coming up on Wednesday, she will move into tie for third place with CU Athletic Hall of Fame guard Bridget Turner and current CU Director of Basketball Operations Tracy Tripp who both started 117 games from 1985-89.

JEFFERY 'STEALS' THE SHOW: Sophomore **Chucky Jeffery** had a career and team season-high seven steals in the win over Colgate. It's the 21st time a Buff has registered seven or more steals in a game, but the first since Damietta Velicica had seven vs. Tulane on December 6, 1997. Jeffery, leads the Big 12 at 3.0 steals per game, has had six steals in three other games this season (Regis, Evansville and Kansas) and has at least three steals in 12 of 20 games.

DEFENSIVE FEAT A FIRST: Colorado allowed 34 points to Loyola Chicago and 35 points to Texas State, the first time in team history that the Buffaloes have held an opponent below 40 points in consecutive games. The 69 combined points also marks the lowest

two-game total in team history, eclipsing the 72 allowed in wins over Texas Southern (64-29) and Dartmouth (57-43), Dec. 14 & 21, 2007.

The 34 points allowed to Loyola Chicago tied for the seventh lowest single-game mark in team history (Southwest Missouri State, March 17, 1995), while the 35 points to Texas State ties for the ninth lowest with three other games (most recently against Kansas on Jan. 16, 2002).

JEFFERY'S TRIPLE-DOUBLE: Chucky Jeffery recorded the second triple-double in team history by totaling 10 points, 13 rebounds and 10 assists in the Omni Hotels Classic Championship game against Loyola Chicago. The only other CU triple-double was by Sandy Bean vs. Utah State on Feb. 16, 1979. Bean had 19 points, 11 rebounds and 10 assists.

It marked career highs in both rebounds and assists for Jeffery as well as team season highs in both categories. She's the first CU player with 10 assists in a game since Susie Powers dished out 10 against Pepperdine on Jan. 4, 2008. Jeffery was awarded as the Classic's Most Valuable Player.

Jeffery's triple-double was the 18th in Big 12 Conference history (Baylor's Britteny Griner notched No. 19 the next day, Nov. 28) and she becomes the 11th different Big 12 player to record a triple-double.

SCORING, REBOUND DEFENSE SHINES AGAINST LOYOLA: Chucky Jeffery's triple-double against Loyola Chicago stole the headlines in the Omni Classic Championship game, and deservedly so, but the Buffaloes also notched a couple defensive team milestones of note in that game.

Colorado gave up just 20 rebounds to Loyola, tying for the second fewest in team history. Northern Arizona had just 19 against the Buffaloes on Feb. 7, 1981. On two other occasions the Buffaloes have held an opponent to just 20 rebounds; Dec. 28, 1991 at Washington (a 58-53 loss) and Jan. 21, 1980 vs. Northern Arizona (a 129-47 win). The Buffaloes +22 rebound margin (44-20) was their most since a +23 margin against Arkansas-Pine Bluff (51-28) on Dec. 2, 2008.

On the scoreboard, CU gave up just 34 points to Loyola, tying for the seventh fewest points allowed in team history and the fewest since giving up just 29 to Texas Southern on Dec. 14, 2007.

LAPPE'S DEBUT: The Regis game marked the official CU debut of head coach Linda Lappe, who joined her six predecessors with a successful debut as CU's women's head coach. Lappe is now 12-11 as head coach of the Buffaloes and 62-47 overall in her fourth season as a collegiate head coach.

Spears also ranks second in field-goals made (710) and attempted (1,677), fourth in rebounds (907), double-doubles (30), blocked shots (140) and 3-point field-goals made (206) and attempted (610), fifth in games started (116), seventh in minutes (3,851), eighth in steals (216), and 11th in free-throws made (316) on CU's all-time charts.

She is only the third player in team history, joining Lisa Van Goor (1980-85) and Jackie McFarland (2004-08) to record 1,900 points and 900 rebounds in a career.

Spears is now just 15 points behind Jackie McFarland (2004-08) for second place on CU's all-time scoring list, 58 from becoming the second player in team history to score 2,000 and 125 behind all-time leading scorer Lisa Van Goor (1980-85). Based on a minimum seven games remaining (six regular season, one Big 12 Championship), Spears needs to average 8.3 points per game to reach 2,000 and 17.9 per game to catch Van Goor.

NOTABLE FROM THE OPENER: Colorado improved to 32-5 (.865) all-time in overall season openers and 35-2 (.946) in all-time home openers. The Buffs improved to 25-0 when their overall season opener is played at home.

Colorado's win snapped a four-game losing streak dating back to last season. Colorado's 38-point margin of victory was its most in a season opener since a 93-43 win over Albany to open the 2000-01 campaign.

SPEARS ON NAISMITH WATCH LIST: Brittany Spears was named to the 2010-11 Naismith Trophy preseason watch list, announced by the Atlanta Tipoff Club.

The watch list of the nation's top 50 women's players was compiled by the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors, which based its criteria on player performances from the previous year and expectations for the 2010-11 college basketball season. The Naismith Trophy presented by AT&T will be awarded on April 4, 2011 at the NCAA Women's Final Four in Indianapolis.

The second-active leading career scorer in the Big 12 Conference (1,942 points), Spears topped the Buffaloes in scoring (17.7 ppg), rebounding (7.8 rpg) and steals (2.1 spg) as a junior, earning honorable mention to the 2010 All-Big 12 team. On the 2010 league charts she ranked third in steals, fourth in scoring, fifth in rebounding, defensive rebounds (5.5 drpg) and free-throw percentage (.837), eighth in 3-point field-goal percentage (.357), 10th in 3-point field-goals made (1.8 3mpg), 12th in blocked shots (1.0 bpg) and 14th in offensive rebounds (2.3 orgp).

Her preseason recognition by the Naismith Trophy is CU's first since Jackie McFarland was a Naismith Trophy semifinalist in 2008. Former Buffaloes standout Tera Bjorklund was a finalist in 2004.

PAC-KING UP: The 2010-11 season will be Colorado's final one in the Big 12 Conference as the school will officially join the Pacific-10 Conference on July 1, 2011. Utah will also join at that time as league will then become the Pac-12 Conference.

The Pac-12 basketball schedule will comprise of 18 conference games for each institution. Every season's schedule will feature both a home and road game against each institution's traditional rival.

BUFFS PICKED 12TH, SPEARS MENTIONED: Colorado was picked to finish 12th in the annual Big 12 Conference Preseason Coaches Poll while Brittany Spears recieved honorable mention to

the Preseason All-Big 12 team.

2010 NCAA Women's Final Four participant Baylor was chosen as the preseason favorite for the second consecutive year earning 121 points and 11 of 12 first place votes. Texas A&M was second at 109 and received the other first place vote. Oklahoma was third (97) followed by Texas (88), Iowa State (85), Kansas (64), Nebraska (58), Oklahoma State (50), Kansas State (40), Texas Tech (39), Missouri (26) and Colorado (15).

Spears was an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection in 2008 and 2010 and a second team pick in 2009.

BUFFS SIGN THREE: Lexy Kresl, Jen Reese and Jasmine Sborov have signed National Letters of Intent to play basketball and continue their education at the University of Colorado in 2011-12, CU head coach Linda Lappe announced on Nov. 12, during the NCAA early signing period.

Kresl is a 5-11 guard from Paradise Valley, Ariz. She led the state of Arizona in scoring as a junior (27.6 ppg) and guided Shadow Mountain High School to the 2010 Arizona 4A state title. Reese is a 6-2 forward from Clackamas (Ore.) High School and the reigning Gatorade Oregon Girls Basketball Player of the Year. She led the Cavaliers to a 21-3 record in 2010, advancing to the Oregon Class 6A State Tournament Round of 16. Sborov is a 6-1 guard from Round Rock (Texas) High School who led the Dragons to a 15-9 mark in 2010 and the playoffs for a third straight season.

BRENNA MALCOLM-PECK RECOVERING: Sophomore forward Brenna Malcolm-Peck suffered a hyper-extended left knee during preseason workouts and has not yet been cleared to practice.

SHAE KELLEY LEAVES TEAM: Freshman forward Shae Kelley left the women's basketball team citing personal reasons, head coach Linda Lappe announced on Nov. 12. Kelley remained enrolled at CU through the fall semester. A 2010 graduate of Denver East High School, Kelley led the Angels to their first state title last March. She scored 22 points in CU's 93-62 exhibition win over Western State on Nov. 5 in her only appearance.

TOUGH SCHEDULE: Colorado will potentially play 16 games - or 55 percent of the schedule - against teams that advanced to either the 2010 NCAA or WNIT postseason tournaments. Four of CU's 2010-11 opponents are ranked in the latest USA Today/ESPN/WBCA Coaches poll (#1 Baylor, #5 Texas A&M, #15 Oklahoma and #23 Iowa State). Four are ranked in the latest Associated Press poll (#1 Baylor, #5 Texas A&M, #14 Oklahoma and #20 Iowa State).

HOME AT THE CECC: Colorado is traditionally tough at home with a 352-118 all-time record at the Coors Events/Conference Center (.749). The Buffaloes have won 10 or more games in a season at the CECC in 22 of the previous 33 years. The Buffaloes have enjoyed five undefeated seasons (1980-83, 1992-94) at the CECC.

BUFFS ON TV: Colorado's regular season schedule features nine games televised either regionally or nationally, seven of which are at home. CU's season opener against Regis on Nov. 12 was the first FSN Rocky Mountain televised followed by Colorado State (Dec. 8), North Dakota (Jan. 4), Kansas (Jan. 12), Kansas State (Jan. 26) and Nebraska (Feb. 6). FSN Rocky Mountain will also televise home games against Oklahoma (Feb. 23) and road games at Kansas State (Feb. 16) and Nebraska (Mar 2). The home game against Nebraska was televised nationally on FSN as part of the network's Big 12 package.

This Season:

- Needs 15 points to catch Jackie McFarland (2004-08) for second place on CU's all-time scoring list.

- Is the second player in team history to score 400 points in four consecutive seasons, joining Shelley Sheetz (1991-95).

BOULDER - They needed maybe 5 extra minutes to get untracked, but once they did the Colorado Buffaloes produced a tantalizing tip-off to the **Linda Lappe** Era in women's basketball.

CU overran Regis 76-38 Friday night at the Coors Events Center, giving Lappe a victorious debut on the same court where she starred for CU Hall of Fame inductee Ceal Barry before finishing her collegiate eligibility in 2003.

"It's always great to get the first one," Lappe said. "We had some early-game jitters, but that's normal. We picked it up midway through the first half . . . and it started with our defense."

The Buffs' post and transition defense improved as the night went on, and once they settled down, their offense wasn't too shoddy either.

Four Buffs players reached double figures, led by senior **Brittany Spears** with 20 points. Senior guard **Britney Blythe** scored a career-high 15 points, including a career-best five three-pointers. Sophomore **Chucky Jeffery** contributed a double-double - 13 points and 12 rebounds. She also had a game-high six assists and six steals, while sophomore **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** added 10 points.

Jeffery called her diverse role in the opening-night "real fun . . . it's not too much about scoring for me. I'm big on the assist game now . . . it's good to know I can pass to my teammates and they'll knock down the shot."

Spears said the win "felt good. It always feels good with a win . . . we know we're playing for each other."

That thought will have to stay in their minds as the season unfolds.

Lappe's team opened the season with a sparsely populated bench. She knew academics would sideline senior guard/forward **Chelsea Dale** for the fall semester and that sophomore guard/forward **Brenna Malcolm-Peck's** hyper-extended left knee would keep her out of the lineup indefinitely.

But on Friday, top recruit Shae Kelley, an athlete forward from Denver East, informed Lappe she was leaving the program for personal reasons. In the Buffs' 93-62 exhibition tour of Western State a week prior to the opener, Kelley came off the bench to score 22 points on 11-of-14 shooting from the field.

That turned out to be her lone appearance in a CU uniform in the Events Center. As a result, CU suited up eight players to face Regis in Lappe's debut.

"It leaves us in a tough situation," she said. "But our players are great . . . with eight players, everybody has got to contribute. We just have to be in great shape . . . these guys played a lot of minutes. But we work hard all off-season for that. It leads to some great team chemistry; we'll use it as positive."

Lappe said she "wishes Shae the best of luck, but we're focused on our team and getting better every day."

CU opened slowly and frigidly, hitting just one of its first six field goal attempts in the first 4:15 and falling behind 8-2. But after they caught the Rangers at 8-8, the Buffs began to take off.

They went ahead 17-10, then allowed Regis to climb back as close as 17-16 before Blythe & Co. put the hammer down by hitting three consecutive three-pointers. Malcolm-Peck opened the onslaught with a three with 5:55 remaining before halftime, and Blythe followed with back-to-back treys.

For Blythe, a 5-9 senior from Mateo, Calif., her three-pointer with 5:20 left in the half were her first official points since Feb. 14, 2009 at Texas A&M. (She scored nine in CU's exhibition win against Western State.)

Blythe said she "felt good, but I'm not thinking about shooting - unless things are open."

After their 8-8 tie, the Buffs outscored the Rangers 34-9, including a 25-1 run in the first half's final 5:55. The score at intermission: CU 42, Regis 17.

And the Buffs weren't done. They scored the first 13 points of the second half, taking a 55-17 lead with 15:30 to play. The Rangers got their first points of the second half on a three-point play Salina Kuiper with 15:10 remaining, but by then it was 55-20 and CU was looking at a name-your-number opening night.

The Buffs eventually led by 43 points before the final buzzer.

BOULDER - Linda Lappe never will complain about a win, but squandering large leads is another matter.

The (Mid) Complaint Dept. is open.

Her first Colorado women's basketball team subdued the University of Tennessee-Martin 78-67 Sunday afternoon in the Coors Events Center, but as her debut season unfolds Lappe is looking for those cushy leads to stop disappearing.

"We haven't showed we can (hold onto a big lead) yet, but that's typical for this time of year," she said. "We haven't played a full 40 minutes yet, but I like our starts, though . . . I don't want to change how we're starting and how we're finishing. We just have to continue to work to put together a full game."

Following almost the exact script they did in Friday night's 71-57 win against Santa Clara, the Buffs forged a comfortable early advantage (15 points), apparently relaxed a bit and let Sunday's opponent close to within eight points at intermission.

Against Big 12 Conference competition, that kind of momentum swing might lead to an uncomfortable second half. Against UTM, of the Ohio Valley Conference, it wasn't devastating.

The Buffs outscored the Skyhawks 11-5 in the opening minutes of the second half, regained control and improved to 2-1 with their Omni Hotels Classic set for this weekend.

"We just need to stay consistent on defense . . . and not let (teams) go on big runs," CU senior Brittany Spears said.

Added sophomore Chuckly Jeffery: "Our offense generates from our defense. We were playing defense hard, but when we get a lead, we seem to slack off a little. When we work on that, we'll be a good defensive team."

A streak of seven consecutive points by Jeffery, who scored a career-best 25 points, helped CU open a 12-point advantage (58-46) midway through the second half.

UTM, which plays at Air Force on Tuesday, pulled within 62-54 with just over 6 minutes remaining, but four consecutive free throws by junior Julie Seabrook restored CU's double-digit lead (66-54).

The Buffs stayed in front by at least 10 points until Heather Butler hit a pair of free throws with 2:29 to play, pulling the Seahawks to 71-63. But a follow by Jeffery, two free throws by Spears, another by freshman Brittany Wilson and a layup by Jeffery helped keep the visitors at bay in the final 1:50.

"We did a good job picking up the win," Lappe said. "We hit our free throws down the stretch; we're getting to the line more . . . offensively, we're clicking at times (but) defensively, we've got a lot of things to work on."

Put on-court communication and focus at the top of Lappe's list. "When we're on it mentally, we can be a really good defensive team," she said.

Spears finished with 20 points and surpassed the 1,600-point plateau (1,611) for her career - a surprise to her: "I didn't even know . . . I guess it's a great accomplishment."

She and Jeffery were the only two Buffs players in double figures. Spears also collected 12 rebounds, giving her 24 double-doubles in her CU career.

CU's 39-31 halftime lead resulted from 46.9 percent shooting from the field (15-of-32) and a string of four consecutive three-pointers by Spears (two), Britney Blythe and Jeffery.

At the time, the Skyhawks were leading 4-2, but the Buffs' treys on four consecutive possessions established a first-half advantage they never lost - although they didn't protect it to Lappe's liking.

After trailing by 15 twice, UTM went on a three-point spurt of its own, getting three straight from Megan White, Alecia Weatherly and Jacissa Haislip to cut CU's lead to 31-25 with 3:15 left in the half. But that was close as the visitors would draw.

The Buffs were outrebounded 19-14 in the first half, but finished the game with a 38-34 advantage on the boards. Lappe said being focused in that area was vital for the Buffs. UTM entered the game with a 46-35 rebounding edge in its three previous games.

"That was one of our keys to the game," she said. "We were more aggressive going to the boards in the second half."

CU outscored UTM 28-24 in the paint and got 18 points off of 19 UTM turnovers. The Buffs committed 17 turnovers but yielded only 10 points off of those.

BOULDER-Colorado needed its defense to step up when nothing else seemed to be going right.

Evansville erased a 19-point first-half CU advantage, had a lead of its own late in the second half, and had the ball in its possession for a potential game-winning shot. But the duo of **Brittany Spears** and **Chuckly Jeffery** wasn't about to let that happen.

Spears had a double-double and Jeffery had 17 points and six steals, including the game-clinching swipe with five seconds remaining to seal a 55-53 Colorado win over Evansville in the first round of the 2010 Omni Hotels Classic.

Colorado (4-1) moves on to play Loyola Chicago (3-1), 74-67 winners over Eastern Washington in the early game, in Saturday's championship set for 7:30 p.m. Evansville (2-2) will face EWU in the consolation game at 5 p.m.

Colorado looked to put this one away early, jetting out to an early 16-2 lead. Spears had 12 of her game-high 19 points in the first half as the Buffaloes shot 52 percent.

Freshman **Rachel Hargis** put in back-to-back buckets as Colorado held its largest lead at 26-7 with 7:10 left in the first period.

The Purple Aces were able to cut the CU lead to 33-19 at halftime and had an even bigger run prepared for the second half.

Colorado missed its first eight shots of the second half as Evansville responded with a 17-4 run to trim CU's lead to 37-36 with 7:48 remaining. The Buffaloes, who shot only 26 percent in the second half, also had trouble holding onto the ball, committing 27 turnovers.

Colorado pushed its lead back up to 44-38 after a Jeffery 3-point play, but the Purple Aces scored the next nine points. Evansville took its first lead on a Samantha Heck jumper and Megan Collins put the Purple Aces up 47-44 with 5:15 left.

Defense dominated the Buffaloes final push. After a Jeffery basket cut the deficit to one, Spears and Jeffery turned Evansville over on three straight possessions, resulting in an 8-0 CU run. Jeffery had a coast-to-coast steal and layup, a Spears steal led to a pair of Jeffery free throws and another Jeffery steal led to a Spears transition layup as the Buffs led 54-49 with 1:56 left.

Buckets by Heck and Collins allowed Evansville to creep back to within 54-53 with 39 seconds left. Spears took a jumper on the baseline with 26 ticks left. She missed but **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** corralled the offensive rebound. The Buffaloes were able to move the ball around before Spears was fouled with 11 seconds left.

Spears made the first foul shot, but missed the second giving the Purple Aces one final opportunity. But it never materialized, Jeffery picked the pocket of Staci Gillum in the backcourt with :05 left and ran out the clock for the Buffaloes third straight win.

Spears finished with 10 rebounds, collecting her 25th career double-double and third in five games this season. She also moved past Erin Scholz (1993-97) into fifth place on CU's all-time scoring list (1,630). Jeffery added eight rebounds and six assists to her numbers.

Heck led Evansville with 16 points and seven rebounds. Collins finished with 13 points off the bench for the Purple Aces.

BOULDER - Five nights after submitting what Coach **Linda Lappe** called "our most complete game of the season," her Colorado women's basketball team found a suitable way to encore.

CU limited Texas State to 16.7 percent shooting from the field in the first half, 24 percent for the game, and cruised past the Southland Conference visitors, 67-35, Wednesday night at the Coors Events Center.

Lappe's calls for the Buffaloes to ratchet up their defense for 40 minutes haven't been ignored; they've allowed 34 and 35 points in their two most recent games. It was the first time in school history CU has kept an opponent under 40 points in consecutive games.

"It all started with our defense; we came out and did some really nice things. Our defense in the last two games has been good in spurts . . . but it was a little better (overall) on Saturday," said Lappe, whose team won its sixth consecutive home game (6-1 overall).

In Saturday night's championship game of the Omni Hotels Classic, CU played hard and smart from buzzer to buzzer and routed Loyola-Chicago, 65-34.

And by Wednesday, there had been no noticeable drop-off in the Buffs' intensity, or in sophomore point guard **Chuckey Jeffery's** overall game. Fresh off the second triple-double in school history (10 points, 13 rebounds, 10 assists), Jeffery paced the Buffs Wednesday night with 23 points and 13 rebounds, her fourth double-double of the season and fifth of her career.

"As long as we get a win, I'm happy for everybody on team . . . everybody is contributing and I'm just going with the flow," Jeffery said.

Senior **Brittany Spears** (12) and freshman **Ashley Wilson** (10) were the only other CU players in double figures, but each of Lappe's players scored. Wilson, whose points were a career-high, also had five rebounds and two assists as she works her way back from a serious kneelleg injury suffered in her senior year of high school in Long Beach, Calif.

Wilson took a hard fall on a layup in the final minutes and drew an intentional foul. She tweaked her ankle, not her knee, in the collision, but said she felt fine afterwards.

"It's taken a long time to come back from the (high school) injury, but I'm making progress," she said. "I like playing with these guys."

The Bobcats (2-3) hadn't won a true road game since Dec. 10, 2006 at UT-Pan American, and the Buffs weren't interested in seeing that streak end in Boulder.

CU's defense was suffocating in the first 10 minutes, allowing Texas State only eight field goal attempts and four points (one field goal, two free throws). The visitors didn't score on consecutive possessions until the 8:30 mark of the first half - and by then the Buffs were up 20-8 and still hungry.

Jeffery said Lappe "never wants us to let up on defense. It sparks everything else, and we put a lot of emphasis on that. In the first half, our defense was good. But in the second half, we laid off a little. Overall, though, I think (the intensity) carried over, definitely."

The Bobcats regularly use a 15-player rotation, but coach Suzanne Fox kept it to 12 in the first half. Lappe, meanwhile, used all available personnel - The Crazy Eight - and saw her team lead by as many as 23 (32-9) before intermission.

Jeffery's short jumper gave her 14 first-half points and CU its 34-12 halftime lead. After snatching nine rebounds in the opening half, Jeffery got No. 10 with just under 17 minutes remaining, then hit a layup and a converted a three-point play on consecutive possessions to give the Buffs a 41-14 lead - their largest of the night to that point - with 16:18 left.

CU led 45-22 at the second half's half-way point and was never threatened in the final 10 minutes. The Buffs outscored the Bobcats 42-18 in the paint, 10-0 on fast breaks, 13-4 on second-chance points and 20-12 in points off turnovers.

BOULDER - **Linda Lappe** wanted to see how her Colorado women's basketball team measured up against an opponent from another power conference in Saturday night's Big Ten/Big 12 Challenge.

In the effort and tenacity categories, Lappe liked what she saw - but on the scoreboard, not so much.

Her Buffaloes gamely rallied from an 11-point second-half deficit to take a two-point lead, but the Illini outscored them 8-2 in the final 3:11 and left the Coors Events Center with a 63-59 victory.

Lappe's returning players contended that coming back from a double-digit deficit last season might not have happened.

Although the Illini brought a losing record (3-5) to Boulder, they dealt the Buffs their first home loss of the season. CU (6-2) had three players in double figures, led by **Chuckey Jeffery's** 17. Senior **Brittany Spears** and junior **Julie Seabrook** added 15.

The Buffs' already depleted roster shrunk to seven when freshman guard **Ashley Wilson** suffered a concussion late in Wednesday night's game against Texas State.

To add depth, Lappe looked to CU's volleyball team and found Nikki Lindow, a 6-foot-2 freshman from Centaurus High School. Lindow averaged 17.5 points a game for Centaurus, and when Lappe coached at Metro State, she thought enough of Lindow's ability to recruit her for hoops.

Lindow practiced once with the Buffs this week but did not leave the bench Saturday night. Lappe hopes Wilson can return for the next game, but she must be "symptom free" on Sunday.

After falling behind 6-1 in the first 3 minutes Saturday night, the Buffs rallied and took their largest lead (15-8) on a 7-0 run with baskets by Seabrook, a three-pointer by **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** and a pair of free throws by Jeffery.

CU held the lead until Lana Rukavina's layup tied the score at 21-21 with 5:50 left in the half. Thereafter, there were three lead changes, with the Buffs going up by as many as four points (28-24) until Lydia McCully's trey from the right corner cut the Illini's deficit to one.

McCully followed that with another three-pointer and Adrienne GodBold's follow at the buzzer pushed Illinois in front, 32-28.

The Illini's size and aggressiveness gave the Buffs problems early, with the visitors outscoring CU 20-8 in the paint in the first half and 32-24 for the game. The Buffs' lack of depth also took a toll; Illinois' bench outscored CU's 18-5. The Buffs were outscored 19-12 in the first half, but came back to hold a 34-33 board advantage at game's end.

McCully opened the second-half scoring with a layup, giving the Illini a six-point lead. They increased went ahead by seven (38-31) on a steal and layup by GodBold before Malcolm-Peck's trey pulled the Buffs to 38-34.

But Rukavina answered with a three-pointer and restored the seven-point Illini advantage. Less than 3 minutes later, it went to 10 (46-36) on a three-point play by Eboni Mitchell, then 11 (55-46).

The Buffs didn't go belly up. An 11-0 run tied the score at 55-55 with 4 minutes remaining, with Spears' basket completing a fast break and knotting the score.

Half a minute later, Seabrook's two free throws gave CU its first lead (57-55) since late in the first half (28-27). Rukavina matched Seabrook's free shots to tie the score, then Penn hit one of two with 1:48 remaining to put the Illini up 58-57, then banked in a running hook for a 60-57 advantage with 50 seconds left.

When Penn hit another pair from the foul line with 16.4 seconds left, Illinois went ahead 62-57. But Seabrook answered with two free throws with 6.8 seconds to play, pulling the Buffs to 62-59. A free throw by McCully on the next possession gave Illinois its four-point win.

Penn, a 6-2 sophomore, finished with 17 points and a game-high eight rebounds.

LOS ANGELES-Colorado shot a season-low 32 percent and a late 20-2 Southern California run allowed the Trojans to pull away with a 68-54 decision in the opening game of the Women of Troy Tournament Saturday afternoon at the Galen Center.

USC provided a formidable front court, with 6-foot, 5-inch Kari LaPlante, 6-2 Cassie Harberts and 6-1 Christina Marinacci, that didn't allow the Buffaloes to establish their inside game early. Most of CU's shots came from the outside, and while they fell in the first half, the tank ran dry for a key nine-minute stretch in the second.

The Trojans also held the Buffaloes' leading scorer **Brittany Spears** to a season-low five points. Spears, who entered the game averaging nearly 18 points a contest, scored CU's first four points, but she also picked up two fouls in the first three minutes which sent her to the bench for most of the first half. She was never able to get in rhythm after that, making just 2-of-12 attempts and was held to single digits for the first time this season.

"USC is big and it was tough for us to get into the paint on them," CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said. "I thought we played great for about 32 minutes of this game," CU head coach Linda Lappe said. "And then we couldn't score...just didn't do the things we needed to do, and that we had been doing up to that point. It's too bad because we did play a solid 32 minutes, but against good teams you have to play 40."

Despite an off night by Spears, Colorado and USC played a tight first 20 minutes.

USC jumped out to a fast start hitting on four of its first six from the field and led 14-6. Long Beach, Calif., native and CU freshman **Brittany Wilson** scored five consecutive points, including her fourth career 3-pointer to cut the USC lead to 14-11.

Colorado shot 43 percent in the first half and received a spark from senior **Chelsea Dale** who was playing in her first game after missing the first nine with academic issues. Dale hit her first two 3-point attempts, and the Buffaloes made 5-of-10 from downtown in the first half.

USC countered, but from the free-throw line. The Trojans made 11-of-13 at-tempts in the first half, compared to just 3-of-3 for CU.

Colorado led 34-33 with 2:00 remaining in the opening period after a Dale 3-pointer and a **Chuckey Jeffery** layup. But the Trojans responded with two consecutive scores to lead 37-34 at the half.

Neither team was shooting the lights out in the opening minutes of the second half. The teams combined to miss 15 of 17 shots, allowing the game to remain tight. **Meagan Malcolm-Peck**'s second 3-pointer of the game closed the gap to 46-44 with 12:34 left in the game.

From there the Trojans started hitting shots, while CU remained cold. USC pulled away with a 20-2 run over the next 9:16. Jacki Gemelos and Ashley Corral hit back-to-back 3-pointers as USC increased its lead to 20 at 66-46 before the Buffaloes cut into the margin in the final minutes.

Colorado made just 7-of-34 in the second 20 minutes (20.6 percent), finishing with a season-low 54 points.

One aspect of CU's game that continued a season-long positive trend was its rebounding. The Buffaloes have outrebounded all 10 opponents this season and held a 44-34 edge over the Trojans. On this night, however the Buffaloes weren't able to use that to their advantage.

"I thought we crashed the offensive glass really well, and we needed too because we were missing a lot of shots," Lappe said. "The problem with our offensive rebounds tonight is we didn't finish very many of them. The rebounding is all heart, all hustle and I thought we did a good job there."

Jeffery led Colorado with 12 points and eight rebounds. Wilson scored 11 points off the bench while Dale finished with 10. Corral and Briana Gilbreath led the Trojans with 14 points each.

LOS ANGELES-Colorado senior **Brittany Spears** had 22 points and 12 re-bounds but cold shooting once again doomed the Buffaloes as the Dayton Flyers captured the Women of Troy Tournament consolation game 70-50 Sunday afternoon at the Galen Center.

The Buffaloes (7-4) shot just 26 percent (18-of-70) and scored a season-low 50 points, falling in consecutive games for the first time this year.

Spears, who notched her fourth double-double of the season, was CU's only player in double digits. She wasn't immune from CU's shooting struggles, hitting only 6-of-23 attempts, and 4-of-14 from 3-point range.

Spears did become the third player in team history to reach 1,700 points and 800 career rebounds, currently standing at 1,716 and 804 respectively.

"We didn't come out ready to go and Dayton took it to us," CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said. "We have to learn from it. We pretty much started and played for 40 minutes how we ended yesterday. We have to be mentally strong enough to bounce back."

Colorado missed its first six shots, including three from 3-point range. Add in three turnovers and Dayton had an 8-0 early lead. **Chuckey Jeffery** got CU on the board with a running jumper at the 15 minute, 28 second mark of the first half.

Dayton extended its lead to 17-2 before the Buffaloes scored again. CU had eight early turnovers and made just 1-of-9 before a **Julie Seabrook** layup at 11:47.

Spears began to find her shot with a 3-pointer with 9:32 left in the half. She added a pair of free throws after getting fouled on an offensive rebound, cutting the Dayton lead to 19-9. Patrice Lalor then scored six straight points for Dayton to push the Flyer lead back up to 25-9.

The Buffaloes shot just 16 percent in the first half as Dayton led 29-16 at the break.

"I thought we had some great shots on the outside and they didn't fall early and we let that affect us for the rest of the game," Lappe said. "As good as our focus was last Wednesday (against Colorado State) I thought it was equally as bad, this whole weekend and particularly tonight."

Colorado was able to close the gap to single digits by scoring the first five points of the second half. Jeffery scored on a layup in transition and Britney Blythe hit a 3-pointer as the Dayton lead was down to 29-21 with 18:40 left.

Dayton then went on a 9-0 run and kept its lead above double-digits the rest of the way. The Flyers were the first team to outrebound CU this year and did it in dominating fashion, 59-45.

"Dayton was ready," Lappe said. "They ousted us in every facet of the game, rebounds, turnovers, ripping balls out of our hands. Over the break we've got to get a lot better."

BOULDER - Ready or not, Big 12 Conference play begins this weekend for the Colorado women's basketball team. And in a 67-56 win Tuesday night against North Dakota, CU flirted with both ends of a scary spectrum - ready at times, appearing not even close at others.

No matter; the preview is over.

The Buffaloes play Saturday at Texas A&M, taking a 9-4 non-conference record into their final Big 12 season.

"Bottom line, a win's a win," she said. "We're happy to start off 2011 in the right way . . . but we obviously didn't play very well; we didn't play nearly as well as we're going to have to from here on out to compete in the Big 12."

Replacing sophomore Meagan Malcolm-Peck in the lineup, freshman Brittany Wilson contributed 15 points, including a career-best four three-pointers. One was a 30-footer to close the first half. She also made a career-high four steals.

Wilson's practice effort over the past "three or four weeks" earned her the start, Lappe said. But Lappe also was pleased with Malcolm-Peck coming off the bench to record her second career double-double (11 points, 10 rebounds). She scored all of her points and collected seven of her boards in the second half.

CU finally put away North Dakota with a 15-0 run midway through the second half. Senior Brittany Spears and Malcolm-Peck accounted for 13 of those 15 points, with Spears hitting a pair of three-pointers and Malcolm-Peck knocking down one trey and adding another pair of baskets.

Spears (21) and Malcolm-Peck (11) were two of four Buffs in double-figures. The others were Brittany Wilson (15) and sophomore Chucky Jeffery (11). Spears reached 20 points for the seventh time this season and 36th time in her career.

The Buffs led 41-26 at the half, but it took a 30-foot buzzer-beater by Brittany Wilson to account for that 15-point margin. Otherwise, CU's first-half finish wasn't of the variety that would leave Lappe particularly happy.

Her team had its first-half highlights:

It never trailed and went ahead by as many 18 on another Brittany Wilson trey at the 8:10 mark.

It held the Fighting Sioux to six points for almost 7 minutes and allowed baskets on back-to-back possessions only once for almost 9 minutes.

It limited the visitors to 35.7 percent shooting from the field in the first 20 minutes and forced a dozen turnovers. But there was also a bundle of Buffs blunders - not what Lappe wanted in the way of a final Big 12 tune-up:

They committed one more first-half turnover (13) than the Fighting Sioux and finished with 27 - one more than North Dakota.

They allowed their 18-point lead to dwindle to a dozen on the next-to-last possession of the half and were threatening to cut it to 10, maybe 9, before a turnover and Brittany Wilson's long trey.

They had six steals - but the Fighting Sioux had eight. CU finished with 11, North Dakota 18.

Can you say better ball security for the Buffs? Lappe could, and she also could say pass the ball with more authority: "Our passes are very, very soft. We don't have any zip . . . we telegraph, we get tunnel vision . . . Sometimes we get tentative; we just have to be confident in our passing."

The second half opened with a CU turnover and a three-pointer by Mallory Youngblut, cutting the Buffs' advantage to 12 (41-29). Youngblut, a senior co-captain who finished with 19, then scored her team's next five points as North Dakota closed to within 44-34.

Shortly thereafter, CU launched its 15-0 run and North Dakota temporarily was on the ropes. But fight remained in the Fighting Sioux; they pulled to 67-56 on another trey by Youngblut in the final 1:10 - cutting what had been a 25-point deficit to 11.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas-Texas A&M sports one of the best defenses in the Big 12 Conference, and it was on full display Saturday.

The No. 7 (AP)/5 (WBCA) ranked Aggies forced 27 Colorado turnovers on their way to an 85-57 victory over Colorado at Reed Arena in the league opener for both teams.

"I don't like the score; I hate to lose, but this is a very good basketball team," head coach Linda Lappe said. "This is a team that's going to go a really long way in the NCAA basketball tournament. They are going to do a lot of good things in the Big 12."

Brittany Spears led Colorado with 21 points, as she moved past former CU All-American Shelley Sheetz (1,775 from 1991-95) into fourth on the Buffaloes' all-time scoring list (1,779). She tied a team season-high with five 3-point field goals and also grabbed six rebounds.

Texas A&M (13-1, 1-0), leading the Big 12 in steals and turnover margin, turned CU's 17 first half miscues into 21 points. Colorado (9-5, 0-1) shot just 29 percent in the first 20 minutes and trailed 45-17 at the break.

In contrast the Aggies had just seven turnovers for the game. Texas A&M outscored CU 36-7 in points off turnovers.

Colorado picked up its intensity early in the second half and played the Aggies even. Brittany Wilson, making her second straight start, scored 11 of her 12 points during a 14-6 CU run to open the half and bring the Buffaloes back to within 20 (51-31).

"There aren't a lot of moral victories, but if there is one, then playing them 40-40 in the second half is definitely one," Lappe said. "It just helps us believe that we can play with anybody. Now we have to go back and do that from the start and play that way for 40 minutes."

"We knew that we had to come out and compete because they weren't going to lay down," Wilson said. "A lot of people don't think we are as good as we are, so we have to come out and play with a chip on our shoulder. We have to show everybody that we are ready to play in this conference and we won't finish last."

Danielle Adams, the Big 12's leading scorer countered, scoring the Aggies first nine points of the second half on her way to a team high 18 points.

Sophomore Meagan Malcolm-Peck scored all 10 of her points in the second half as the Buffaloes bounced back to shoot 56 percent in the second half. Sophomore guard Chucky Jeffery just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds.

Colorado will return to Boulder to host the University of Kansas on Wednesday, Jan. 12, at 7 p.m. The game will be televised live on FSN Rocky Mountain

BOULDER - Sometimes the most satisfying wins are the most improbable. So how's this for an improbable scenario: Colorado's women's basketball team, coming off a lackluster loss and suddenly minus its second-leading scorer and leading rebounder, takes No. 17/16 Iowa State to overtime and, . . . wins? Improbable never means impossible, and the Buffaloes boldly underscored that Saturday afternoon at the Coors Events Center, surprising the Cyclones, 66-60. CU improved to 10-6, 1-2 in the Big 12 Conference; ISU is 13-4, 1-2. It was first-year CU Coach Linda Lappe's first league win and her first victory over a ranked opponent and her home state. But as pleased as she was personally, Lappe was ecstatic for her players, who pulled together in the absence of sophomore Chucky Jeffery who suffered a concussion in the loss to Kansas. "More than great for me, it's great for our players. . .I'm so glad our players were able to experience something like they did today," Lappe said. "That was fun. I'm so proud of our players and how they responded."

In Jeffery's absence, several Buffs stepped forward - freshman point guard Brittany Wilson foremost among them. Wilson, who plays Jeffery's position, responded with a career-best 19 points, while senior Brittany Spears collected her 28th career double-double (18 points, 12 rebounds). Her defense on ISU's 6-foot-7 Anna Prins was also critical. Prins, who has averaged 16.5 points and 8.5 rebounds in a pair of Big 12 games, finished with four points and three boards. Then there was late arriving senior Chelsea Dale, who became eligible for the second semester. Dale added 11 points, including a pair of free throws in overtime that gave the Buffs a 64-60 lead with 42 seconds left.

And CU sophomore Meagan Malcolm-Peck, battling through an ankle ailment that cut her minutes almost in half (27.8 average, 14 on Saturday) added the last of her 10 points on a pair of free throws with 29.2 seconds to play in OT, giving the Buffs a six-point lead and sealing the win.

Dale's pair of late free throws came after Spears was fouled but couldn't shoot because of bloody nose. As Spears went to the bench, Dale said Spears told her, "This is what you do, you make free throws. . .so I just went up there and knocked them down."

Brittany Wilson said she and Jeffery spoke before the game. "I knew I had to step up," said Wilson, who also recorded career highs in rebounds and field goals made (eight each). "Especially with Chucky out, people thought we couldn't do it." Lappe said even with her team losing a 12-point advantage in the second half and the game heading into overtime, she looked into her players' eyes in the huddle and liked what she saw.

Despite Jeffery's absence, CU got off to a fast start and led 5-2 on a Brittany Wilson jumper and a three-pointer by Dale. The first half saw four lead changes and three ties before the Buffs pulled away for a 29-22 halftime lead.

Aiding CU in the first 20 minutes were a pair of early fouls called on Prins, who missed her only first-half field goal attempt and collected just one rebound in 9 minutes. The Buffs opened the second half as inspired as they closed the first. With Brittany Wilson scoring 11 of their first 13 points, the Buffs rolled to a 12-point advantage (41-29) before the Cyclones finally began stirring.

A 10-0 run keyed by a pair of three-pointers (Kelsey Harris, Kelsey Bolte) brought ISU to within 43-41 with 12:14 to play. But CU quashed that comeback with a pair of baskets by Malcolm-Peck, the first a layup on a feed from Dale as the shot clock wound down and the second a three-pointer from the left corner.

The Buffs shot back in front 48-41 with 9:11 remaining, but they could assured the Cyclones weren't done. A basket by Bolte, the Cyclones' leading scorer (16.3 average) and a formidable three-point shooter, pulled ISU to 52-48. But Dale scored off an in-bounds play to push CU back in front by 54-48 with 4:22 left.

From there, it was up to the Buffs to make a final stand. A three-point play by Chelsea Poppens pulled the Cyclones to 54-51. But Spears answered with a trey from the right wing to give CU a 57-51 lead at the 2:23 mark.

After Harris buried a three-pointer to make it 57-54, Dale was off on a three attempt at the other end. ISU called a timeout with 7.9 seconds to play. When the ball was in-bounded, it ended up in Bolte's hands. Her trey attempt bounced on both sides of the rim, then the front, then led through.

It was 57-57 with 10 seconds to play. With 5.3 seconds left, the ball went to Brittany Wilson, but she was called for a charge. Less than 2 seconds remained for the Cyclones to attempt a court-length pass and shot. It missed and the game was headed for overtime.

Fortunately for the Buffs, it was a good place to be - but not the Cyclones. They got out one early field goal in overtime (it was by Prins, who immediately thereafter fouled out) and missed five of six free throws.

It began as an improbable afternoon for the Buffs, but they finished it by celebrating.

STILLWATER, Okla. - Brittany Spears scored a game-high 18 points and grabbed nine rebounds, but cold shooting down the stretch doomed the Buffaloes as Oklahoma State claimed a 58-49 Big 12 Conference win Tuesday evening at Gallagher-Iba Arena.

Facing the second-best scoring defense and field-goal percentage defense team in the Big 12, Oklahoma State (13-4, 1-3 Big 12) held the Buffaloes to a season-low 49 points and just 32 percent from the field.

"We're leaving here disappointed in the loss tonight," said head coach Linda Lappe. "It's back to work for us."

Colorado (10-7, 1-3 Big 12) never led, but despite the cold shooting night the Buffaloes kept it close throughout. CU trailed by 10 with 12:09 left in the game, but fought back to get within 47-46 on a Brittany Wilson 3-pointer with 7:22 remaining.

Three free throws, two by Spears and one by Wilson were all the Buffaloes could manage the rest of the way as the Cowgirls closed on an 11-3 run. Colorado missed its final 13 shots from the field.

CU played its second straight game without starting point guard Chucky Jeffery, who suffered a concussion in the loss to Kansas. She remains listed as day-to-day.

"With the inexperience we have, I don't think we were on the same page," Meagan Malcolm-Peck said. "We were rushed offensively and not sure what to do with that. Although, I think we did a pretty good job without Chucky leading the offense."

Wilson finished with 11 points. Malcolm-Peck, still nursing a sore ankle of her own, came off the bench to pitch in nine points and five rebounds.

Oklahoma State opened the game with seven straight points, before a 3-pointer by Chelsea Dale and a Julie Seabrook layup cut the lead to 7-5.

Shortly after, Seabrook picked up her second foul and the Cowgirls took advantage with 6-foot-6 freshman center Vicky McIntyre scoring six straight points as OSU led 13-5. OSU took its biggest lead of the half when Jenni Bryan connected on a 3-pointer to put the Cowgirls up 19-10 with 7:38 remaining.

Colorado struggled to get into its offense early. The Buffaloes had few shots inside and had 11 first half turnovers, eight of which came in the first 12 minutes. Malcolm-Peck ignited the Buffaloes off the bench. She scored seven points during a 10-2 run which cut the deficit to 21-20.

After the under 4-minute timeout, Lakyn Garrison answered with her second 3-pointer of the half, sparking an 8-0 Cowgirls run. Wilson gave the Buffaloes a little momentum heading into the half with a steal and coast-to-coast layup as CU trailed 29-22 at the break.

Spears shrugged off her third foul picked up in the opening seconds of the second half by scoring CU's next 10 points. She hit two straight 3-pointers and had a steal, was fouled and hit the ensuing free throws as OSU led 34-32 with 15:43 left.

The Buffaloes then tied the game at 34-34 on a Seabrook layup off a nice dish from Dale.

Oklahoma State responded with a 12-2 run to take its largest lead of the game at 46-36. Back then came the Buffaloes, who answered with a 10-1 run, culminated with Wilson's 3-pointer, but CU wouldn't draw any closer.

"Spears and I got the rebounds and shot it up there, but there's no point in getting the offensive rebounds if you're not going to make the shots," said Meagan Malcolm-Peck. "We're disappointed that we let up the last four minutes."

McIntyre finished with 14 points, eight rebounds and four blocked shots. Toni Young had 10 points and six boards.

BOULDER - There's a direct correlation here: As the number of games she believes slipped away begins to increase, so does **Linda Lappe's** frustration. Colorado's first-year women's basketball coach added another to that category Wednesday night at the Coors Events Center.

After an unfocused first half, her Buffaloes rallied from a nine-point deficit early in the second half and even went ahead by four. Alas, they couldn't sustain their momentum over the final 12 minutes and lost 72-59 to Kansas State.

"We're disappointed," Lappe said afterwards. "We felt like this was a game we needed to have and could have had . . . but we let one slip."

Put it down as No. 3 in that dubious category, alongside losses to Kansas and Oklahoma State that drop the Buffs to a frustrating 2-4 in the league (11-8 overall).

"Our focus was not what it should have been in the first half," Lappe continued. "We didn't do what we talked about needing to do."

Hoping to capitalize on momentum gained from a weekend win against Missouri, the Buffs knew what was at stake Wednesday: A win would have moved CU into a fifth-place tie with K-State (14-5, 4-2) in the conference standings.

But the Buffs opened as if they were clueless about that or much of anything else. In the first 20 minutes, they committed 13 of their 17 turnovers, resulting in 16 KSU points; had the ball swiped from them seven times; gave up nine second-chance points while scoring none themselves; were outscored 20-6 in the paint; and got three shots, three points, three turnovers and one rebound from their leading scorer, **Brittany Spears**.

Spears led Amy Mathern's school record for consecutive starts (112) Wednesday night, but the mark was darkened by the outcome. She committed only one more turnover and finished with 13 points, finally coming to life in the second half when the Buffs made their run to catch and temporarily pass the Wildcats.

In her second game back after missing a pair with a concussion, **Chucky Jeffery** was the only other CU player in double figures (19). Jeffery, who didn't start, called the loss "just frustrating. We scout these teams to a T. We practice it and to get into a game and not have any focus, it kills everything we practice . . . it's frustrating because we know the teams we're losing to we should be beating. We're playing one half and not the other."

The Buffs trailed 30-23 at the half, and that seven-point deficit could have been much worse - all ugly things considered. Spears hit a straightaway trey for CU's first points of the game, but that was her output for the half.

The Buffs' only other lead of the half (8-5) came on a three-pointer by **Meagan Malcolm-Peck**. Thereafter, the Wildcats launched a 12-0 run and shot ahead 17-8 before the Buffs partially regained their focus and cut their deficit to 26-23 on back-to-back baskets by **Brittany Wilson**.

But K-State got inside baskets from 6-foot-2 Jalana Childs (17 points, four rebounds) and 6-2 Branshea Brown (four points, 11 rebounds) to close the half and account for the Wildcats' seven-point lead at the break.

It took CU about 6 minutes into the second half to find the gear it needed to compete, but once that happened the Buffs began looking like the team that had disposed of Missouri by 10 points in its last game.

Spears snapped to with consecutive baskets - one a trey - and **Britney Blythe** followed with a pair of three-pointers to forge a 39-39 tie with 13:30 to play. Less than minute later, Jeffery hit a layup to send the Buffs ahead.

Jeffery's pull-up jumper from the free throw line gave CU a four-point (43-39) lead, but the Buffs couldn't hold it. The Wildcats responded with a 13-2 run, going up 52-45 on a conventional three-point play by Taelor Karr with 7:33 remaining.

They closed to within four points (54-50) with 4:18 to play, but the Wildcats closed them out with an 8-0 run capped by a Brittany Chambers three-pointer - she finished with a game-high 20 - that gave K-State a 12-point advantage, its largest of the night to that point. CU got no closer than seven points before the final buzzer.

AUSTIN, Texas - Whatever Coach **Linda Lappe's** halftime message was to her Colorado women's basketball team here Sunday, this wasn't the intended result: Texas, leading by only a point at intermission, opened the second half with a 20-6 run and buried the Buffaloes 67-50 at the Frank Erwin Center.

Dropping back-to-back games in the Big 12 Conference for only the second time this season, CU fell to 2-5 in league play and 11-9 overall. Texas, after opening its Big 12 schedule 0-4, won its third consecutive game and improved to 3-4, 14-7.

"I thought we had a great first half," Lappe said. "I thought our defensive intensity was good. We were getting through screens and putting some pressure on them. I thought in the second half (Texas) came out with a different mindset, a different mentality. They were a lot more aggressive . . .

"I felt offensively we came out flat for the whole game, especially right off of halftime. I thought we had some good shots that we just didn't knock down, and let that affect us for the rest of the half. Texas is a nice team and they got after it in the second half, we just didn't quite have enough."

The Buffs lost for the sixth straight time this season away from the Coors Events Center and dropped their 23rd straight road game against Big 12 South opponents.

CU senior **Brittany Spears** set a school record with her 113th consecutive start. She finished with a team-best 16 points, but had to score the Buffs' final nine to reach her total. Spears also hit a pair of three-pointers, becoming the fifth CU player to reach 200 (201) for her career.

Junior **Julie Seabrook** and sophomore **Chucky Jeffery** added 10 each for the Buffs, but Seabrook's total included only a free throw in the second half.

Texas was led by freshman Chassidy Fussell's game-high 21. Kathleen Nash added 12 and Yvonne Anderson 10 for the Longhorns, who closed out the Big 12 series with the Buffs holding a 16-4 advantage. Texas defeated CU, which heads for the Pac-12 Conference next season, for the ninth time in Austin.

Despite committing 12 of their 20 turnovers in the first half, the Buffs trailed only 25-24 at intermission and were behind by no more than four points in the first 20 minutes. The single point difference at the break was something of a breakthrough for CU: In their four previous trips here, the Buffs had trailed at the half by an average of 17 points per game.

CU's last lead of the half - and the game, as it turned out - was 24-22, courtesy of a Meagan Malcolm-Peck put-back with 1:09 before intermission.

But the smooth Fussell, the Big 12's leading freshman scorer, canned the second of her three three-pointers to put the Horns back up by a point. The half ended that way - and it was as close as the Buffs would be for the rest of the afternoon.

Lappe said Fussell "did a great job of coming out and getting her shot off and knocking them down. She's got a nice shot, and she's got a great pull up jumper. Stop and pop on a dime, and you don't see that a lot with her accuracy. They did a nice job setting on-ball screens for her, and she came off the on-ball screen ready to score - getting her feet set. She's got a high release. You put a bigger guard on her and she's quick and she's fast. You put a smaller guard on her and she rises above and can shoot over. She can do a lot of different things that cause problems.

When the second half opened, there was Fussell again. She scored nine of Texas' 20 points in the decisive run that quickly increased the Longhorns' lead to double digits and kept them ahead by at least 13 points over the game's final 10 minutes. Their biggest lead was by 23 (64-41) on a basket by Kristen Nash with about 4 minutes remaining.

The Longhorns shot 57 percent from the field in the second half - the best 20-minute percentage by a Buffs opponent this season. CU, meanwhile, shot only 42.3 percent in the second half and 44.7 for the game.

BOULDER - After losing by almost 30 points in its previous game, Colorado needed a bounce-back performance in the worst way. The Buffaloes got it in perhaps the best way possible - a 25-point victory against a Big 12 Conference opponent that has been dominant recently in the series.

CU stunned Nebraska with a decisive early run, quashed the Cornhuskers' attempt at a second-half rally and cruised to a 70-45 win. Snapping a three-game skid this season and a three-game losing streak to the Huskers, the Buffs rebounded impressively from an 81-53 loss at Kansas on Wednesday.

"I thought we played an outstanding game," CU Coach **Linda Lappe** said. "I really saw an outstanding performance by our team. We came out and kind of had a slow start but changed out mindset after the first three minutes, for the rest of the game. It was an all around team win."

The Buffs improved to 12-10 overall and 3-6 in the Big 12, with their three wins matching last season's league total. CU heads for the Pac-12 Conference next season, NU for the Big Ten. The Buffs visit Lincoln, Neb., for the final time on March 2.

Senior **Brittany Spears** led CU with 26 points. Lappe said Spears, who reached double figures for the 100th time in her career, "played a very complete game. Offensively she hit her three's and had some nice drives and she hit a couple of pull-up jumpers. She scored in a lot of different ways and she helped move the ball...She played an all around complete game."

CU sophomore **Chucky Jeffery** - returning to the lineup after sitting out the KU loss for academic reasons - barely missed her second triple-double of the season. Jeffery finished with nine points, nine assists and 10 rebounds before leaving the game in the final 2 minutes.

CU finished with an impressive 49.1 shooting percentage (27-for-55) while holding Nebraska to 28.8 percent (17-for-59). The Buffs hit almost half (10) of their 21 three-point attempts, including seven in the first half. The Cornhuskers, meanwhile, never got into their offensive flow and hit only nine of 30 first-half field goal attempts.

The Huskers jumped to a 4-0 lead, but the Buffs responded quickly - and impressively. CU took control with a 24-2 run that produced an 18-point lead (24-6). Shooting 53 percent from the field, the Buffs led by 20 points on three occasions in the first 20 minutes and rolled to a 39-24 lead by intermission, with their first-half total the program's largest in three seasons.

The Buffs had 18 assists on their 27 baskets and outrebounded the Cornhuskers 45-27. Eight of the Buffs' boards were courtesy of freshman Rachel Hargis, who also contributed six points. Both totals were career highs.

Of her team's 18 assists, Lappe said, "Any time you can have that many assists, it means the ball is moving, and everyone is touching it."

Senior **Britney Blythe** canned three three-pointers in the opening half, including back-to-back treys that helped CU open its first 20-point lead (30-10). Blythe said her treys weren't taken specifically to nudge Nebraska out of its zone defense: "It wasn't an objective but I think we just hit open shots. We weren't hesitant at all so once we started hitting it was just going in."

Nebraska, which had beaten CU in 10 of their past 11 meetings, opened the second half with a 9-4 run and pulled to within 10 points twice in the first 9 minutes. Each time, the Buffs responded. After Nebraska had closed to 51-41 on a pair of free throws by Jordan Hooper with 11:25 to play, CU answered with 11 consecutive points - five of them by Spears - and surged ahead 62-41 with 6:14 remaining.

Trailing by 21, the Huskers were done. Just over 4 minutes later, the Buffs took their largest lead of the game - 70-45 - on a three-point play by Spears and closed out the afternoon with a 19-4 run.

BOULDER - Six days after playing what first-year coach **Linda Lappe** had called their most complete game, the Colorado Buffaloes traveled in a completely different direction on Saturday.

Desperate to break a six-game losing streak, Texas Tech apparently visited the Coors Events Center at the perfect time, rolling over error-prone CU, 72-44.

The Buffs submitted a season low in points and a season high in turnovers, with their 28 the most since 34 at Texas on Jan. 13, 2007. CU's turnover total was four times its number of assists (seven) and almost doubled its made field goals (15).

"We definitely got outplayed for most of the game," Lappe said. "They were physical, they were quick. Our turnovers were obviously a huge part of the game; we just didn't handle the ball like we needed to."

The Buffs dropped to 12-11 overall and 3-7 in the Big 12 Conference, while the Lady Raiders - after opening the season 16-1 - improved to 17-7, 4-6.

Scoring 12 points, senior Brittany Spears was the only CU player to reach double figures. She became only the second Buff player to score 400 points in four consecutive seasons, joining Shelley Sheetz (1991-95). Spears also had 11 rebounds, giving her 30 double-doubles in her career.

Tech, meanwhile, was topped by sophomore Casey Morris with 19. She was one of three Lady Raiders in double figures.

Most of this story was told in the first 20 minutes: At halftime the Buffs' point total exceeded their turnover total by two - 21 to 19 - and the Lady Raiders were up 37-21. Tech was opportunistic, scoring 21 points off those 19 CU miscues, which were the most in a half since the Buffs had the same number against Nevada on Nov. 24, 2006.

"We were throwing bad passes . . . just not clicking," CU guard Chucky Jeffery said. "We just weren't on the same page . . . it's hard trying to break a press when everybody isn't on the same page."

CU's already thin roster was reduced to eight by the absence of senior guard Chelsea Dale, who had not received clearance to play after exhibiting concussion symptoms following the 70-45 win over Nebraska on Sunday, Feb. 6.

Not having played since then, the Buffs opened either rusty or out of sorts due to the Lady Raiders' withering pressure.

After falling behind 3-0, the Buffs finally got their first field goal - a three-pointer by Spears - at the 16:29 mark, then got another pair of treys on consecutive possessions to go ahead 9-3.

Then the turnover plague, induced by Tech's pressure, hit. Lappe said her team alternated between being "too tentative" and "too passive" against the Lady Raiders' full- and three-quarters court press.

Seven minutes into the first half, CU had committed seven turnovers, with many more to follow. By intermission, the total had reached 19 and - no big surprise - the Buffs trailed by their largest margin of the half, 37-21.

Of CU's eight first-half field goals, five were three-pointers, which among other things was indicative of Tech's defense stifling CU's inside game. The Lady Raiders outscored the Buffs 16-6 in the paint in the first 20 minutes and got 11 points from their bench to the Buffs' three. Tech finished the game with a 28-18 advantage inside and scored 32 points off its opponents 28 miscues.

Tech shot 63.6 percent from the field in the first half, including 75 percent from beyond the three-point arc. CU managed 40 percent (50 percent on its treys), but that was hardly enough to compensate for its turnover total.

Things didn't improve in the second half.

At the 10:00 mark, Tech led 58-29 - and time was just one of many factors working against CU. The Lady Raiders' largest lead was 30 in the final 5:21.
