BOULDER — Brittany Wilson's clutch free throw shooting and Arielle Roberson's overall play pushed Colorado past Idaho 70-65 on Sunday in the Buffaloes' season opener at the Coors Events Center.

Wilson, a junior guard, finished with a game-best 18 points, including four free throws in the final 18 seconds, while Roberson added 16 points. Idaho (0-2) had three players in double figures, led by Alyssa Charleston's 16.

Roberson, a 6-1 forward, redshirted her freshman season due to rehabilitation from hip surgery. CU coaches believed her return would boost the Buffs inside play as well as their overall defense - and they were correct. In addition to her 16 points, Roberson collected three rebounds and added five steals and two blocked shots in her CU debut.

Senior point guard **Chucky Jeffery** missed the opener, serving a suspension because of a violation of team rules. Had she not been in the lineup last season against Idaho, the Buffs would have been in trouble.

With the Vandals up 59-58 with just over 2 minutes remaining in last season's meeting, Jeffery went on a tear, scoring seven of her career-best 30 points to rescue the Buffs, 68-59.

But CU would have to do without Jeffery this time around - and her teammates coped pretty well.

Idaho's Ali Forde scored the game's first points, but the Vandals' 2-0 lead was erased by a Meagan Malcolm-Peck 3-pointer. Roberson took over from there, scoring CU's next six points. Malcolm-Peck and Brittany Wilson combined for 10 of the next 15 points as the Buffs built an 11-point (25-14) cushion.

The Vandals wouldn't go away, an 11-2 run over the first half's final 6 minutes brought them to within two (27-25) on a layup by Charleston. But the Buffs righted themselves and got field goals by Jasmine Sborov and Rachel Hargis to lead 31-26 at intermission.

CU shot 46 percent from the field (12-of-26) in the first half to Idaho's 34 percent (9-of-26). The Buffs held an 18-16 edge on the boards, but also turned the ball over one more time than the Vandals (11-10).

Behind the three-point shooting of **Lexy Kresl** and Roberson's inside work, the Buffs built a pair of eight-point leads in the first 6 minutes of the second half. Kresl drained a pair of treys during that span, marking her 19th career game with two or more three-pointers.

The Vandals weren't lacking for long-distance shooters. They got treys from Connie Ballesteros, Christina Salvatore and Stacey Barr to creep to within four (43-39) with 14 minutes to play. Thanks to Roberson, CU was able to pull away before Idaho could fashion its next run. She scored consecutive baskets to restore a double-digit Buffs lead (54-44), but the Vandals weren't folding.

They closed to 56-50 on a conventional three-point play by Charleston and a trey by Krissy Karr, then to 56-52 on another basket by Charleston with just over 5:30 remaining. Another three-pointer by Karr less than 2 minutes later pulled Idaho to three back (58-55), but CU answered with one of two free throws by Roberson and an Ashley Wilson layup to go ahead 61-55.

The Vandals answered on three of four free throws by Charleston to cut their deficit to 61-60 with 3:04 remaining. Ashley Wilson responded to those with another layup for a 63-60 CU lead. After an Idaho miss and a CU rebound, **Jen Reese** hit a pair of foul shots to put the Buffs up 65-60 with 51.6 seconds to play, and Roberson followed by hitting one of two free throws 11 seconds later for a 66-60 CU advantage.

Idaho called timeout with 37.2 seconds remaining, then another with 22.5 showing after the Vandals couldn't get off a shot. When they did, they missed, but a pair of flagrant fouls was called. Brittany Wilson and Charleston each their free throws (68-62), then Barr hit a long trey to draw the Vandals to within 68-65.

With 13.8 seconds left, Brittany Wilson's pair of foul shots gave the Buffs their final five-point advantage.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - One freshman forward started, one finished. No matter the order of appearance the recipe provided a winning combination for Colorado.

Arielle Roberson and Jamee Swan combined for 37 points on 71 percent shooting as Colorado defeated Missouri-Kansas City, 78-55, Sunday afternoon at the Swinney Recreation Center on the UMKC campus.

Colorado improved to 2-0, claiming its 15th straight win over nonconference regular season opponents dating back to 2010. UMKC drops to 2-2.

Swan, making her first career start, scored 10 of her 14 points in the first half to give the Buffaloes a good start. After picking up her third foul early in the second half, Roberson stepped in scoring 19 of her game-high 23 points in the last 20 minutes.

Roberson was 9-of-12 from the field, hit all five free throw attempts and grabbed six rebounds. Swan was 6-of-9 from the floor had three rebounds and an assist.

The freshman front court duo helped the Buffaloes dominate in the paint, outscoring the Kangaroos 42-14 inside.

"I give all the credit to my teammates," Roberson said. "We knew coming out of the locker room we needed to push the ball and run more, really turn it up in the second half."

Roberson and Swan were the beneficiaries of a Colorado offense that picked apart the UMKC zone; putting on a passing clinic from all five positions. The Buffs had 17 assists on 32 made shots and overall shot 47 percent for the game.

That offense ran through forward **Jen Reese** and center **Rachel Hargis**. Playing in the high post, Reese and Hargis continually made the right pass, either finding Roberson and Swan on the low block or dishes out to continue through the guards.

Officially the two combined for six assists, but their initial reads led to plenty of good looks for the Buffaloes all afternoon.

Reese also had 10 points on 5-of-8 shooting with eight rebounds. Hargis made 3-of-4 field goals finishing with eight points.

"Our four post players, Arielle, Rachel, Jamee and Jen really dominated the game," CU head coach Linda Lappe said. "They really understood what we were trying to do in our zone offense. I thought they did a fantastic job of being a presence on the inside."

After Lauren Dudding put UMKC up with a 3-pointer on its initial possession, Colorado scored nine straight including two buckets from Swan.

UMKC briefly retook the lead with a 7-0 run of its own for a 10-9 advantage six minutes in. Roberson and Swan had back-to-back scores to put CU up for good.

The Kangaroos kept CU close early. Eilise O'Connor scored eight of her 10 points in the first half as UMKC pulled to within two at 18-16, but then the Buffaloes went to work. Colorado scored on five of its next six possessions during an 11-0 run to take a 29-16 lead. Hargis had a three point play and Roberson and Reese each scored on put-backs off CU misses.

Offensive rebounding was key for the Buffaloes, grabbing 19 which led to 22 second chance points. Overall Colorado enjoyed a 44-29 advantage on the boards.

Colorado led by nine at the half (36-27). UMKC's Kim Neziyana quickly converted conventional 3-point play to cut the CU lead to six, and also gave Swan her third foul. From there Roberson shined.

The San Antonio native scored 14 points in the first six minutes of the half as the Buffaloes began to pull away. She scored six in a row as CU rebuilt a double-digit lead at 46-35. After a pair of Hailey Houser free throws, CU put the game away with a 13-0 run. Following a Reese jumper and a transition layup from **Lexy Kresl**, Roberson scored the next seven as the Buffaloes won their fifth straight nonconference regular season game away from Boulder.

Neziyana led UMKC with 17 points and eight rebounds.

BOULDER - What started as a bit of a struggle ended in an impressive stroll Saturday night for the University of Colorado women's basketball team.

The unbeaten Buffaloes (4-0) found their groove midway through the first half and stayed with it the rest of the way, overrunning San Diego State 67-53 to win the Omni Classic at the Coors Events Center.

CU has won 16 of its 26 in-season tournaments, which for 22 years was called the Coors Classic.

Three CU players reached double figures, topped by redshirt freshman **Arielle Roberson's** 17 points. Sophomore **Jen Reese** added 14 and senior Chucky Jeffery 12. Reese also grabbed a game-best nine rebounds, while Roberson added seven.

Roberson was named the tournament's MVP, an award Jeffery had claimed the past two years. Joining both on the all-tournament team were Auburn's Tyrese Tanner, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi's Janae Blount and San Diego State's Courtney Clements, who led her team Saturday night with 19 points.

Defeating the talented Aztecs, an NCAA Tournament last season, was a benchmark November win for the Buffs and third-year coach **Linda Lappe**. She acknowledged that it was her best non-conference win at CU, primarily because her team dealt with and overcame adversity against a physical opponent.

Said Lappe: "It was a great game throughout, two good teams and lot of great players on that court. What we were able to do in the second half...it was not for the faint of heart. I enjoyed seeing our team step up to that level to win."

As Lappe has done after the Buffs' previous three wins, she pointed to her team's balance and depth in the post as keys in overtaking the Aztecs, who led by nine points in the early going. Along with the frontline productivity of Roberson and Reese, CU got eight points and three rebounds from Rachel Hargis and five points and three rebounds from **Meagan Malcolm-Peck**.

Lappe said she and her staff had challenged her frontline players to match San Diego State's physical play: "We challenged them before the game and they took it on...they were the difference makers."

The Buffs led 28-23 at halftime, but getting that five-point lead was difficult. When the Aztecs raced ahead 6-0, it doubled the largest deficit the Buffs had faced in their three previous games. And San Diego State wasn't content with that.

Over the next 5 minutes, the Aztecs built a 14-5 advantage and were limiting the Buffs' looks at the basket. But at the 13:19 mark, CU began to click - mainly because it thumbed up its defensive intensity and matched San Diego State's physicality.

"We were trying to force things," Roberson said. "I don't know if it was nerves or whatever, but we needed to get on the same page." Once that happened and the season's first test of adversity was passed, "It showed us who we really are . . . we're a tough team, they're a tough team."

At about the 6 minute mark, the Aztecs were 5-of-17 from the field - and that made field goal number included San Diego State hitting its first two baskets of the game.

The Buffs began creeping back into it and fashioned a 13-2 run. They finally caught the Aztecs at 16-16 on a Roberson follow of her own miss, then passed the visitors at 18-16 on a short Reese jumper.

In the half's final 2:15, CU outscored San Diego State 7-1 to take its five-point lead to the locker room. During that span, CU got its only two treys of the first 20 minutes, courtesy of Roberson and Malcolm-Peck.

A 5-0 run to open the second half gave the Buffs their largest lead of the game (33-23) - and they kept the pedal down. After the Aztecs closed to within six, a 7-2 CU spurt opened an 11-point advantage (42-31) with 13:02 to play. Reese was responsible for four of those points, with Jeffery converting a conventional three-point play for the others.

In the final 7 minutes, the Buffs led by as many as 15 - 67-52 in the final half minute - and the Aztecs never got closer than eight points.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL. - Leading scorer or not, it's always smart to listen to your teammates.

Thanks to a little coaxing by her fellow Buffaloes, freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** capped off a career-high 25-point performance with a clutch 3-pointer as Colorado rallied for a 69-62 win over Illinois Saturday afternoon at Assembly Hall.

Clinging to a 3-point lead (63-60) with under 40 seconds left sophomore forward **Jen Reese** had the ball in the paint and kicked it out to the left wing. Roberson held the ball, waiting for the Illinois defense to come to her.

"I was running time off the clock, and I didn't realize how close the shot clock was to running out," Roberson said. "My teammates told me to shoot it."

And so she did. With the Illinois defense leaving her alone on the wing as the shot clock ran down under five ticks, Roberson stepped back and drilled a 3-pointer on the baseline, the lone trey for the Buffaloes in the game, putting the exemption point on a late 9-0 run and Colorado's 19th straight nonconference regular season win.

Colorado's leading scorer through six games (18.5 ppg), Roberson provided the late heroics, but it was a steady all-involved game for the Buffaloes (6-0) who also received career-best scoring performances from Reese (15) and sophomore Jasmine Sborov (11).

"No one gave up in this game," Reese said. "It's big to go and win in the road. With our team...we have the heart of champions."

Senior guard **Chuckey Jeffery** filled the box score nicely with seven points, three steals and game-high figures with eight rebounds and six assists.

"She's letting the game come to her," said head coach **Linda Lappe** on Jeffery's performance. "She understands the flow of the game and what our team needs. She's doing a nice job of leading from the point guard position."

The Buffaloes led for most of the first half, but scored just one Roberson free throw in the final 3:50 of the period which allowed the Illini to finish on a 10-1 run and take a 36-30 lead at the break.

But the Buffaloes quickly erased that deficit, as a **Brittany Wilson** conventional 3-point play sparked a 10-2 run that tied the game at 40:14 left. From there, Colorado played toe-to-toe with the Illini in a contest that saw 14 lead changes in the second half alone.

"We were resilient," Lappe said. "The game could have gone either way at a lot of different times. (Our juniors and seniors) have been in those scenarios. We just stuck with it and didn't let little things affect us. We kept believing we were going to win and I think how we pulled it out."

Illinois reclaimed a 60-57 advantage with 3:00 remaining after All-Big Ten forward **Karisma Penn** hit a jumper in the lane. Roberson responded on the other end to cut the lead to one. On the next possession, Illinois turned the ball over and Reese gave CU a one-point lead. Jeffery then picked the pocket of Ivory Crawford and went coast-to-coast to put the Buffs up 63-60 with 1:26 left. Another defensive stop set up Roberson's 3-pointer.

It was a good afternoon from Colorado's post players on again. Roberson was 7-of-8 from the field, Reese was 7-of-14 and junior Rachel Hargis hit both her field goal attempts. That effort made up for the Buffaloes making just one of 11 3-point attempts.

"We could have let the fact that we couldn't make an outside shot affect the game," Lappe said. "We took what the defense gave us. Our guards hit our posts in great positions and our posts did a fantastic job of finishing and also getting to the free throw line."

Colorado took advantage of Illinois foul trouble. Penn, who entered the game averaging 20 points and 10 rebounds, picked up her fourth foul early in the second half and was limited to 11 points and four boards. Forward Kersten Magrum sat out a large chunk of the second half as well, eventually fouling out with 7:31 still on the clock.

Alexis Smith led Illinois with 17 points.

DENVER - The unbeaten University of Colorado women's basketball team shook off a lethargic start, took control with an 8-0 run and never looked back in dispatching the University of Denver 83-63 here Tuesday night.

Now the Buffaloes can look ahead. Finally, they can focus on their biggest non-conference game - a Friday night date with No. 8 Louisville at the Coors Events Center. The Cardinals are 9-1, with their lone loss by one point (48-47) to archrival Kentucky. "We feel really good with where we're at," CU coach **Linda Lappe** said of her team's 8-0 start. "We've seen a little of everything. Obviously Louisville will present a few different games we haven't seen and a different level of talent. But we're excited for it; it should be a really fun game. Hopefully we can get a crowd there. Our players have really been looking forward to this for a long time."

In winning for only the second time in Denver against the Pioneers, the Buffs got a season-high 19 points from **Brittany Wilson** and 14 points and 11 rebounds from **Chuckey Jeffery**. Leading scorer **Arielle Roberson**, who entered the game with a 17.3-point average, added 11.

Morgan Van Ripper-Rose kept the Pioneers close with 13 first-half points. She finished with a career-high 28.

DU defeated CU 70-69 in their most recent Magness Arena matchup on Nov. 16, 2010. The Buffs led the series 6-2 and won for the third time this season against a Front Range opponent. Before making the trip down I-25 South, CU had beaten Wyoming (68-59) and Colorado State (72-46) in Boulder.

Tuesday's first half produced 11 lead changes, but they all occurred in the first 10 minutes. DU (4-5) took advantage of CU's sluggish start to go ahead by as many as five points (13-8) before the visitors routed themselves.

"It shouldn't have been like that, because it shows that we weren't ready," Jeffery said. "It should be flipped because (Louisville) was on our minds. We have to be prepared."

If it took a little longer for the Buffs to focus, once they got there they took command and made an 18-17 deficit their last of the game. They went on an 8-0 run, getting baskets from **Jamee Swan**, **Roberson** (her first of the game), **Jeffery** and **Brittany Wilson** on a fast-break assist from Jeffery to go up 25-18 at 6:22 before intermission.

From there until the halftime buzzer, CU increased its lead to 10 on two occasions and led 37-27 at the break. CU outscored DU 9-1 to open the second half and surge ahead 46-28. The Buffs didn't allow the Pioneers their first field goal of the last 20 minutes until the 14:07 mark.

A minute later, CU went up by 23 and wouldn't allow DU within 15 points the rest of the night. The Buffs led by as many as 26 points in the final 4 minutes.

Lappe said the surge to open the final 20 minutes was "the key to the game...we got kick started toward the end of the first half and I really enjoyed how we came out of halftime."

She also enjoyed her team getting 50 rebounds for a second consecutive game. The Buffs out-boarded the Pioneers 50-28.

"That's probably the best thing I can say about our team tonight," Lappe noted. "We don't take that lightly. Rebounding takes a lot of heart, character and effort. I really liked how our posts crashed the offensive glass and we were constantly trying to get second- and third-chance points. And we were doing a great job keeping them off the glass. We're extremely happy with our rebounding."

CU outscored DU 32-12 in the paint and got 13 second-chance points to the Pioneers' three. The Buffs committed 13 turnovers and scored 19 points off of the home team's 19 errors. And CU's bench outscored DU's 30-12.

When the Buffs finally got engaged, the night turned easy. But Lappe and her players know a slow start on Friday might doom them. The ante goes up against Louisville.

The CU women's basketball team eventually took down No. 8 Louisville 70-66 on Friday night at the Coors Events Center. But remaining unbeaten (9-0) almost didn't happen for the Buffaloes.

Sophomore forward **Jen Reese** scored on a critical put-back after the second of two missed free throws by **Brittany Wilson** with 11.1 seconds left to secure the Buffs' first win against a Top Ten opponent since the 2002 CU team defeated No. 5 Stanford in the NCAA's Sweet 16.

CU led by as many as 13 (64-51) in the final 3 minutes before Louisville's full-court pressure caused four of the Buffs' 25 turnovers and sparked a 10-0 run in less than half a minute. The Cardinals closed to 68-66 before Wilson went to the line and unwittingly set the stage for Reese.

Head coach **Linda Lappe** said she was "really proud, really happy for our players. We've worked hard since end of last season to be able to come in and do what we did tonight...there were times we struggled to score, but we also hung in there until the end."

The Buffs had four players in double figures, topped by **Chuckey Jeffery** 22. **Arielle Roberson** added 13 and Reese and Wilson had 11 each. CU center **Rachel Hargis** contributed seven points and a career-high seven blocks in what she agreed was her best overall game at CU.

Louisville (9-2) was led by Antonita Slaughter's 19. The Cardinals' leading scorer Shoni Schimmel, an All-Big East selection last season, was held to four points, primarily by the determined Wilson.

Jeffery scored the game's first basket to give CU a 2-0 lead, but the Buffs trailed for almost the next 10 minutes. The good news: They never let the Cardinals get more than a five-point lead before they made their move to go ahead on a 11-0 run that put them up 23-16.

Roberson scored five points during that spurt, with Jeffery and **Lexy Kresl** each adding a three-pointer.

Louisville closed the gap to three (23-20) before CU surged to a win, this time riding Jeffery's five points and an inside basket by Hargis on the way to a 7-2 run that gave the Buffs their biggest early lead - 30-22.

Hargis contributed her best half of the season, hitting three of four field goals, blocking three shots, collecting two rebounds and getting one steal. She was on the receiving end of a Jeffery pass in the half's closing seconds, scoring a layup that put the Buffs up 36-30 at intermission.

But the Buffs started the last half in an offensive stupor, not getting their first points until Roberson hit a pair of free throws (38-34) with 15:36 remaining. She followed those with a basket in the lane to push CU ahead again by six (40-34).

Monique Reid answered with a pair of quick inside buckets to cut the Buffs' advantage to two (40-38) and then the Cardinals then pulled to within 41-40 on a bucket by Shawnta Dyer. But the Buffs temporarily held them at bay.

At the 10-minute mark, CU was up 48-43, but a three-pointer by Slaughter trimmed the lead to 48-46. The Buffs held that two-point advantage until Wilson hit both ends of a one-and-one to send CU's lead to 50-46 with 7:18 to play.

The Cardinals weren't done - and the Buffs weren't even close. A pair of Slaughter free throws pulled them to 50-48 before Reese banked in a short jumper for a 52-48 CU lead with 5:22 showing. That started a 10-0 Buffs run that produced a 60-49 advantage with 3:33 remaining.

Here's how it happened: Jeffery followed Reese's bank shot with an acrobatic layup to make it 54-48 with just under 5 minutes left, Reese got another basket, and Kresl and Wilson scored on fast-break lay-ins. The Buffs were up by 11 points, the Cardinals were staggering and the CEC was rocking.

But Louisville's 10-0 run and a frantic finish were on the way. And a season-high crowd of 3,408 went quiet until Reese's monster offensive rebound and follow.

BOULDER – Non-conference play is in the rearview mirror, perennial power Stanford is in the headlights. The Colorado women's basketball team contends it is primed and pumped to open work next week in the Pac-12 Conference, and CU sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl** says the Pac-12 had best be primed and pumped for the Buffaloes.

On Saturday, Kresl was that and more - the more being looser, more confident on offense and devilish on defense. She tied a career-high with 20 points, hitting all five of her three-point attempts and tying a school record as No. 23 CU rolled past New Mexico 84-39 at the Coors Events Center.

The victory pushed the Buffs to 11-0 in non-conference play for the second consecutive season and gave third-year coach **Linda Lappe** her 100th career win. Lappe is 100-66 overall and 50-30 at CU.

Never mind the possible implications for the Buffs; Lappe says her team is "as prepared as we can be" to begin conference play. "I can't think of many things we're not prepared for...we haven't faced a ton adversity, but we have veteran players who have. We've been tested at home, on the road. We feel confident in any venue. But it's all about us and what we do, executing what we do...if we play with the intensity and composure we did tonight then I feel confident we're ready for the conference season."

UNM coach Yvonne Sanchez, who saw her team drop to 8-5, said CU "took everything away from us and I credit them immensely. They're well-coached and they had a great game plan. We didn't execute well, but a lot of that has to do with what (CU) did to us."

And that damage was considerable. With Kresl primarily holding Lobos leading scorer Caroline Dublin (12.9 ppg) to five first-half points (seven total), the Buffs raced to a 39-21 halftime lead and never looked back.

CU's pace or intensity didn't slow in the second 20 minutes either. The Buffs opened the last half with a 17-2 run - Kresl scored eight in that spurt - and pushed ahead 56-23. Keeping the pedal firmly down, CU led by as many as 47. Also in double figures were redshirt freshman **Arielle Roberson** (18), senior **Chucky Jeffery** (11) and sophomore **Jen Reese** (10). Jeffery flirted with the third triple-double of her career. In 27 minutes she finished with eight assists and eight rebounds to go with her 11 points.

The Buffs shot 50.8 percent for the game (32-of-63) and held the Lobos to 30.2 percent (16-of-53). CU outrebounded the visitors 42-31, owned a 40-16 advantage in the paint and converted 23 UNM turnovers into 28 points. The Buffs committed 13 turnovers, but the Lobos got only nine points from those errors. And off-setting CU's miscues were a season-high 18 steals.

Kresl, who had totaled 20 points in her previous three games, had 12 at halftime Saturday for a season high. She followed with eight in the Buffs' early second-half run, missing only one of her eight attempts from the field and hitting her only free throw attempt.

"I don't exactly feel like my role this year is to be the leading scorer," she said. "I am more than happy to see my other teammates score and I love passing them the ball. (Saturday) I think I just felt comfortable with my shot. It felt more natural and in rhythm."

Roberson called participating in Lappe's 100th win "definitely positive for us. We get to say we helped her get there. It was a great landmark for all of us... I was just proud to see her get recognized."

Earning her 100th career "W" was "nice," said Lappe. "It's not something you focus on as a coach; you don't ever say, 'I can't wait until I get to 100 wins.'"

Nonetheless, she added, reaching 100 is a tribute to the players, assistant coaches and staff members who have had hands in the milestone. "I obviously hope there are a lot more hundreds after this one, but it is good and I'm happy that our team can experience success...we're going in the right direction, I think."

BOULDER - The Stanford women's basketball team suffered a humbling home loss last weekend and that's where the Cardinal left that unpleasant experience - at home. The Stanford team that showed up Friday night at the Coors Events Center was crisp, focused and physical - and too much for slow-starting Colorado.

The No. 20 Buffaloes played the No. 4 Cardinal even (26-26) in the second half, but, oh, that forgettable first half... In the Pac-12 Conference opener for both teams, Stanford opened strong and stayed in control, downing CU 57-40 and stopping the Buffs' winning streak at 11.

The Buffs' point total was their lowest of the season and tied for the third-fewest at home ever. CU (12-1, 0-1) had averaged 74.3 points in its first 12 games this season, but the Cardinal held the Buffs to 28.8 percent from the field (15-for-52), outrebounced them 41-27 and overpowered them in the paint 32-16.

Stanford (12-1, 0-1) has won or shared the league championship in every season this decade, has posted 79 consecutive conference wins (regular season/conference tournament) and has made Final Four appearances in each of the past five seasons.

And the Cardinal, bolting to a 15-point lead almost before the Buffs could blink, offered hints Friday night that success of that sort might be on the way again.

Forward Chiney Ogumike, a 6-4 junior, led Stanford with a game-high 20 points and 11 rebounds. Forward Joslyn Tinkle, a 6-3 senior, and sophomore guard Amber Orange added 13 points each.

Arielle Roberson, who had been in double figures for all 12 games and entered Friday night as CU's leading scorer (15.7), finally reached double digits (10) on a jump shot with 49.1 seconds to play. Senior guard Chucky Jeffery was CU's leading scorer with 17. None of their teammates reached double figures.

CU was hoping to get a jump on the Cardinal and get the CEC crowd (5,888) involved - but it didn't work out that way. Stanford, coming off its first loss of the season last weekend (61-35 at home to Connecticut), got a grip on CU and didn't let go.

Tinkle opened the scoring with a three-point shot as the shot clock wound down, Orange followed with a layup, and the Cardinal was in high gear. CU, meanwhile, was struggling to find first.

It took the Buffs nearly 4 minutes to get on the scoreboard - Rachel Hargis got their first basket at 16:15 - then another 6:11 was required to score again. At the 11:37 mark, Stanford was up 15-2 and CU was 1-for-15 from the field (6.7 percent) and had suffered six blocked shots.

Hargis finally got someone to accompany her in the scoring column when Jeffery hit a jumper from just left of the free throw line with 10:04 left before intermission. She finished with eight first-half points but got little help; in addition to Hargis, Roberson and Jen Reese were the only other Buffs to score. Each had two first-half points, and Roberson's first basket didn't come until 1:24 remained before intermission.

For most of the first half's final 12 minutes, Stanford held a 15-point lead, then increased it to 17 (31-14) in the last minute. CU's 14 first-half points were the fewest ever at home and tied for the third-fewest ever.

The Cardinal scored the second half's first four points and increased its lead to 21 (35-14) before the Buffs got a conventional three-point play from Roberson to open their second-half scoring. But CU still had a mountain to climb and the time to do it was dwindling.

The Buffs pulled to within 15 (37-22) on a steal and layup by Jasmine Sborov with 14:10 remaining, but the Cardinal answered with two free throws by Ogumike and a layup by Orange for a 19-point (41-22) advantage.

Jeffery converted a traditional three-point play with 3:30 remaining to pull the Buffs within 12 (49-37). But the Buffs got no closer than that.

BOULDER - The No. 20 Colorado women's basketball team rallied but couldn't catch California Sunday afternoon at the Coors Events Center, falling 53-49 to the No. 7 Bears.

Coming off a 57-40 loss on Friday night to No. 4 Stanford, CU dropped to 11-2 overall and 0-2 in the Pac-12 Conference. Cal improved to 12-1 and 2-0.

Chucky Jeffery (13) and Arielle Roberson (11) were the only two Buffs players in double figures. The Bears were led by Brittany Boyd's 15 points.

Sunday's first half immediately took on a defensive flavor and didn't change; the score was tied 24-24 at intermission. But for the Buffs, that was an improvement over their first-half production (14) against Stanford on Friday night.

On Sunday afternoon, neither CU nor California could manage more than a four-point advantage in the first 20 minutes. Both teams survived frigid stretches - the Buffs' covering 7:31 and producing just three points, while the Bears' dry spell went for 8:52 and yielded four points.

Not surprisingly, neither team had a player in double figures for the half, with Lexy Kresl's six points pacing the Buffs and Boyd's nine toppling the Bears. Three of Cal's four leading scorers - seniors Lashyia Clarendon and Talia Caldwell and junior Gennifer Brandon - were held scoreless in the first half. CU shot only 32 percent (8-for-25) while Cal checked in at 42.3 percent (11-for-26).

The Buffs got six consecutive points from Jeffery to start the second half. But as in the first half, creating any separation was a problem for both teams until Cal opened a pair of four-point leads.

The second of those disappeared on a free throw by Rachel Hargis at the 11:26 mark and a conventional three-point play by Roberson just under a minute later that tied the score at 38-38.

Three free throws by Boyd and Clarendon sent the Bears ahead 41-38 with 9:03 to play, and during the previous 9 minutes the Buffs were suffering through another frigid shooting spell (2-for-15).

Cal increased its lead to five (43-38) on a baseline jumper by Eliza Pierre with 7:35 to play. And when Caldwell hit one of two free throws with 6:59 remaining, the Buffs faced a six-point deficit (44-38).

A short jumper in the lane by Clarendon put Cal up 46-38, and with 6 minutes left Lappe called a timeout as her team's offensive malaise (2-for-17 over an 11:46 span) continued.

Jen Reese finally snapped the dry spell with a turnaround jumper from the right baseline (46-40) and Roberson followed with her second trey of the game to cut Cal's lead to 46-43 at the 4:41 mark.

But one of two foul shots by Boyd and a put-back by Reshanda Gray on Boyd's second miss sent the Bears back ahead by six (49-43), and one of two free throws by Clarendon made the Buffs' deficit seven (50-43).

Cal's eight-point lead (51-43) returned when Caldwell hit the first of two foul shots at the 2:53 mark - and time was slipping away for CU. A Jeffery basket with 1:59 left brought the Buffs to 51-45. Layups by Jeffery and Brittany Wilson pulled them to 51-49 with 16.7 remaining.

Clarendon was fouled by "B-Wil" on the inbounds pass, and with 15.6 seconds showing Clarendon missed both shots. Jeffery and Caldwell battled for the second miss rebound and a tie ball was called. With 13.2 seconds left, the possession arrow favored Cal.

When inbounds pass was made, Clarendon was fouled again - this time by Hargis - and this time she made one of two to give the Bears a 52-49 edge with 10.3 seconds to play.

Lappe called time out, drew up a play - but a shot was never taken. Jeffery turned it over to a drive to the basket and Cal got possession. Fouled with 4.5 seconds showing, Boyd missed both free throws but Afure Jemerige controlled the rebound.

She hit one of two free throws, giving the Bears a four-point lead and the win.

BOULDER - Linda Lappe's third Colorado women's basketball team is more balanced than her first two, but after a pair of Pac-12 Conference losses she wisely recognized that a stronger dose of Chucky Jeffery might be just as beneficial as balance.

After dropping consecutive home games to No. 4 Stanford and No. 7 California, Lappe and Jeffery talked - and on Tuesday night Jeffery responded. The senior point guard scored a season-high 28 points and collected 12 rebounds to lead No. 23 CU to its first Pac-12 win of the season, 67-57 over Utah at the Coors Events Center.

"Chucky came out a lot more aggressive," Lappe said. "She was tentative against Cal and Stanford...we needed more from her."

More is what Jeffery delivered, helping key a 20-3 second-half run as the Buffaloes (12-2, 1-2) finally pulled away from the uncooperative Utes (9-5, 0-3).

CU also was lights out from the free throw line, hitting 22 of 26 in the second half and 23 of 28 for the game. The Buffs' final nine points came from the free line, and they sealed the win by sinking five of six free throws in the final 33 seconds.

Registering her 23rd career double-double (third this season), it was the type of trademark performance expected of Jeffery in her first three CU seasons. "And we still need that from her," Lappe said. "She knew when we needed to score...there are times when we need her to step up; she understands big possessions."

It wasn't as if Jeffery was completely unproductive against Stanford (17 points) and Cal (13). But she agreed with her coach about playing tentative to open Pac-12 play: "After the past two games, I watched film with coach...and I was tentative and wasn't looking to score. She just wanted me to be more aggressive. She told me when I'm more aggressive I make smarter and better decisions to create and help my teammates score as well."

The Buffs only led once in Tuesday's first half, and it took them 19 minutes to finally catch the Utes. They did it by closing the half on a 10-1 run, with eight of the points scored by Jeffery as CU took a 32-31 lead at intermission.

Behind Plouffe's 11 first-half points, Utah led by eight points on two occasions before CU shook itself awake. The Utes' last eight-point advantage (30-22) came on a pair of Wicijowski free throws with 4:42 remaining before the break.

That's when Jeffery went to work, getting eight of her 14 first-half points in the final 41/2 minutes. The Buffs' other basket was scored by freshman Jamee Swan, who finished with a career-high 11 boards and eight points in 22 minutes and was a catalyst in CU catching up in the first half, said Lappe: "She kept us in the game for a lot of the first half."

The Buffs' 32 first-half points gave them a nice start toward finally reaching 50 in their third conference home game. They managed only 40 and 49 in the two previous losses. But that wasn't a second-half focal point for the Buffs; scoring 49 and getting a one-point win would have been fine. They opened the second half with a basket by Swan, taking their largest lead (34-31) of the night to that point.

Plouffe answered for Utah (34-33), then got a trey by Rachel Messer to go up 36-34. Meagan Malcolm-Peck's layup tied the score at 36-36 before a 9-2 Utes run opened a 45-38 advantage for the visitors with just under 13 minutes to play.

It was the Buffs' turn to respond, and they did with an 11-1 run, with seven of the points made at the free throw line. The final pair by Brittany Wilson put CU up 49-46 with 8:49 left.

Jeffery took it from there. After hitting a short jumper, she got a steal at the other end, was fouled and hit two free throws for a 55-48 Buffs lead. And when the Utes misfired on their next possession, Jeffery made them pay with a three-pointer from the top of the key that completed CU's 20-3 surge and opened a 10-point lead (58-48) with 5:58 remaining.

The Utes pulled to within five points (62-57) when Plouffe made one of three free throws with 36.1 seconds to play. But the Buffs pulled away at the free throw line, hitting five of six free throws to pocket their first Pac-12 win.

SALT LAKE CITY - The No. 23 Colorado women's basketball team showed itself as a balanced group of road warriors here Sunday in a 56-43 Pac-12 Conference win over Utah.

CU's victory was the second over the Utes in five days and kept the Buffaloes unbeaten (4-0) on the road this season. CU improved to 13-2 overall and 2-2 in the Pac-12, while Utah slipped to 9-6 overall and remains winless in conference (0-4).

The Buffs and Utes competed in unusual back-to-back games, with CU winning 67-57 on Tuesday at the Coors Events Center. In that game, Buffs guard **Chucky Jeffery** was the dominant force offensively with a season-high 28 points.

On Sunday, though, Jeffery took the opposite approach, taking a step back while her teammates - nearly all of them - stepped up.

Initially, Jeffery's withdrawal was forced as she went to the bench with two fouls and 8:58 remaining in the half - but not without hitting her 1,400th career point on an "and-one" play early in the game.

Without the senior standout, the Buffs were forced to spread out their scoring and dip into a balanced bench to keep up the momentum. Jeffery's teammates handled the pressure well, shooting just 44 percent from the field but holding Utah to 31 percent.

"We're better when we're balanced. I really feel that," CU coach **Linda Lappe** said. "I thought everybody that came in...really just kept the flow going. You could never see at any point when we subbed that it affected anything, and I think that's what you want when you sub. I felt like any of the combinations that we put in contributed a lot, and we're just really solid."

Although Jeffery came back in for a couple minutes midway through the first half to restore order after a 7-2 Utah run, she never had to carry the load on offense. The Buffs leading scorer wound up with only six points, but she recorded six assists, three steals and five rebounds - three areas in which she has led the team throughout the season.

By the end of the first half, seven CU players had scored, including freshmen **Jamee Swan** and **Kyleesha Weston** and sophomore **Jen Reese** off the bench.

Meanwhile, forwards Taryn Wicijowski and Michelle Plouffe carried much of the load for the Utes, earning 16 of Utah's 23 first-half points between them.

Neither team had more than a five-point lead at any point in the half, but CU managed a two-point advantage (25-23) at intermission.

Jeffery started the second half, but the Buffs' depth continued to show. A 10-4 Buffs run capped by a **Jasmine Sborov** three gave them an eight-point lead with 14:47 on the clock. Plouffe then hit a three to close the gap to five, but Reese responded with a 7-0 run of her own, putting CU up 42-30 with 11:46 remaining.

The Buffs never relinquished the lead from there. Redshirt freshman Arielle Roberson, sophomore **Lexy Kresl** and junior **Rachel Hargis** picked up the effort on defense to hold Plouffe and Wicijowski to a combined eight points in the time remaining. Guard Iwalani Rodrigues, another key offensive threat for the Utes, scored just three on the night.

"What we told our team is, it's not going to be three players that guard their best three players (Plouffe, Wicijowski and Rodrigues)," Lappe said. "It's going to be a total team effort in terms of defense...everybody who was on kind of a non-scorer did a fantastic job of really making them work for everything that they got."

By game's end, the Buffs were up by 13 (56-43), and Reese had racked up 11 points off the bench to lead the Buffs in scoring. Roberson also hit double figures for the 14th time this season with 10, while Weston added eight.

In total, nine CU players contributed points, with Kresl and Sborov contributing three each in the second half.

Colorado outrebounded Utah 41-32, led by Hargis' seven, and shot 44 percent from the field compared to Utah's 26.3.

Wicijowski led the Utes in scoring with 16. Plouffe added 15; no other Utah player scored more than three.

BOULDER - Thanks to a strong second-half surge, the Colorado women's basketball team secured a 57-43 Pac-12 Conference win over Arizona State Friday night at the Coors Events Center.

Senior guard **Chuck Jeffery** earned her 24th career double-double and her fourth of the season with 19 points and 16 rebounds. Her rebound total was also a team season-high.

Redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** earned a career-high 11 rebounds and contributed seven points of her own. Overall, Colorado out-rebounded Arizona State 47-31.

"Like any Pac-12 game, it was very physical down there," Roberson said. "It's always a war, it's always a battle ... But we knew we had to box out and then go get the rebounds, not just let them try to come to us."

Forward **Jen Reese** and guard **Lexy Kresl**, both sophomores, added eight points each.

Strong defense from both teams kept the score and shooting percentages low, as Colorado shot just 37.8 percent from the field but held the Sun Devils to 23.6 percent. One of the goals for Colorado was to keep ASU players from scoring around the rim.

The Buffs executed that game plan well, forcing the Sun Devils to shoot 8-for-26 from beyond the arc.

"It was a very solid night defensively for us," said Colorado head coach **Linda Lappe**. "Knowing how Arizona State likes to score, they score a lot of baskets and layups at the rim, so one of our goals was to give up less than 10 layups. I think we gave them only a couple of wide-open layups."

The Buffs and the Sun Devils looked evenly matched in the first half as the lead changed seven lead times, but two three-pointers by Arizona State's Jada Blackwell and Haley Videckis put the Sun Devils up 26-22 at the half. Neither team shot particularly well in the first half, as CU was 32.1 percent from the field and ASU was 36.0.

After intermission, though, the Buffs found the energy they had been lacking. With 14:30 remaining, Colorado went on a 13-0 run capped by a Kresl three-pointer to go up 12 (44-32).

"We have to start fast and finish strong, that's our motto. We say that before every game," Jeffery said. "We just kept going. Once you attack them, you keep them on their heels a little bit."

The Buffs held onto the momentum from that point on, gaining their largest lead of the game, 17, on a Jeffery free throw with less than a minute remaining.

"Even when they started hitting some outside shots, we stayed steady," Lappe said. "We didn't panic, and I thought that allowed us to pull away in the second half."

Jeffery said part of what allowed the Buffs to pull away in the second half was recognizing ASU's key scorers and guarding them with more intensity. Videckis, who was the Sun Devils' leading scorer in the first half with 11 points, was shut out in the second half.

"I thought we did a much better job on (Videckis) in the second half, she hurt us a lot in the first half," Lappe said. "We barred down and knew where she was. Arielle (Roberson) got the assignment on her for a large part, Jen (Reese) guarded her for a little while, and our guards understood where she was in the second half as well."

The Buffs also showed their strength off the bench once again, as three non-starters — Reese, sophomore **Jasmine Sborov** and junior **Ashley Wilson** — scored a combined 14 points on the night.

With the win, Colorado improves to 14-2 overall and 3-2 in the Pac-12. The Sun Devils fall to 10-7 overall and 2-3 in conference play.

BOULDER - The Colorado women's basketball team executed its game plan in every category Sunday afternoon to earn a decisive 79-36 win over Arizona at the Coors Events Center.

It was the Buffs' fourth straight Pac-12 Conference win, with the 43-point margin of victory the eighth-largest in CU history in conference play.

"Obviously I'm really happy with how that game turned out," said CU head coach **Linda Lappe**. "We had very few mental or physical errors, which was fun to see. It's very rare that you see both of those things happen on the same night."

Senior guard **Chuck Jeffery**'s performance (11 points, five rebounds and six assists) made her the first player in school history to earn 1,400 points, 800 rebounds and 400 assists in her career.

The Buffs started strong over the Wildcats, going on a 7-0 run to start the game and building that lead for the rest of the half. CU shot 56.7 percent from the field and 66.7 percent from beyond the arc in the first half and held Arizona to 23.3 from the field and 14.3 from three-point range.

By intermission, Colorado was up 43-15, its largest halftime lead in conference play since leading Kansas 42-14 in February 2003. Hitting a jumper with nine seconds remaining in the half, freshman guard **Kyleesha Weston** became the ninth player to score for CU in the first 20 minutes.

CU held onto that momentum for the rest of the game, going up by 46, the largest lead of the game, on a Weston basket with four minutes to go.

But even with such a decisive lead, the Buffs never lost energy or focus. "When you're on a roll, you just continue staying on a roll," said redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson**, who scored a game-high 12 points on her 20th birthday. "You've got to continue to stay focused. In the timeouts, coach would say, 'Stay focused, stay solid, and I think that helped.'"

By the final buzzer, CU had a 43-point lead over the Wildcats and had played nearly its entire bench, including walk-on guard **Alexus Atchley** in the final minutes. Weston, who was recruited to the team as a true point guard, gained a valuable 17 minutes of playing time at that position.

Four CU players - Roberson, Jeffery, sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl** and freshman forward **Jamee Swan** - scored in double figures, while five other CU players added at least six points.

"We have a lot of players that can score, and you could see that (Sunday)," Lappe said. "I thought our bench played great. From the very first second when the first one came in, we didn't slow down at all. In fact, we pushed the tempo . . . I think everybody that came off the bench was ready, brought a lot of energy, and there was no disruption of flow, so you have to credit our players for that."

All-conference guard **Daveylyn Whyte** led the Wildcats in scoring with 11, nine of which were in the first half. Lappe said junior guard **Brittany Wilson** stepped up her defense on Whyte to shut her down in the second half.

"I thought Brittany did a really good job on her, staying down on her face," Lappe said. "Daveylyn Whyte is a very talented player, has some great offensive skills, and I thought Brittany stepped up to the challenge."

Overall, CU shot 50 percent from the field and held Arizona to just 25 percent. The Buffs also out-rebounded the visitors 51-26, with Swan and junior guard **Ashley Wilson** recording eight boards each.

And while the Buffs' combined 51 rebounds, 21 assists and 79 points are something to be proud of, Kresl said Sunday afternoon wasn't about the stats.

"We all played together," Kresl said. "It was definitely a team effort and not one person was trying to get their points or steals or anything. It wasn't about statistics, it was all about the win and trying to play together."

Colorado improves to 15-2 overall and 4-2 in Pac-12 play, its best start since the 2003-04 NCAA Tournament team began its season 18-2. With the loss, Arizona falls to 11-6, 3-3.

STANFORD, Calif. - The Colorado women's basketball team encountered another in-game lapse on Sunday against Stanford, rallied from it, but couldn't finish its comeback and fell 69-56 to the No. 6 Cardinal at Maples Pavilion.

The No. 20 Buffaloes held their own for most of the first half, staying within single digits of the Cardinal by halftime (35-26). That gap couldn't be smaller, however, had the Buffs not given up 10 first-half turnovers and allowed the Cardinal to go on a 9-3 run to cap the first half.

Colorado didn't regain its momentum until midway through the second half, and with 14:25 remaining, Stanford had already built a 21-point lead from which CU could not recover. That slow second-half start, CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said, was reminiscent of another scoring drought the Buffs had the last time they played Stanford - a 57-40 loss on Jan. 4.

"In both games that we've played these guys, we've had a stretch where we have not played very well, and we've just given them way too many opportunities," Lappe said. "We weren't making them work to get that 21-point lead, and that's probably the most disappointing thing, in both games. Last time it was at the beginning of the game, this time it was right before half into the second half."

With the loss, the Buffaloes drop to 15-4 overall and 4-4 in Pac-12 Conference play, while Stanford improves to 18-2 and 7-1 in the Pac-12.

The two teams were ranked No. 1 and 2 in the conference in scoring defense entering the game, with the Buffs holding opponents to 52.7 points per game and the Cardinal 52.9. On Sunday, though, Stanford's defense prevailed, forcing 18 Colorado turnovers.

Despite its ineffective opening to the second half, CU had nearly 15 minutes to play and wasn't able to give up. The Buffs thought themselves back into contention with a 12-0 run, trimming the score to 51-42 with 10:45 remaining. The Cardinal's lead eventually shrunk to just seven (53-46) as **Brittany Wilson** hit a three with eight minutes on the clock.

But every time Colorado brought the energy, Stanford responded. With 6:10 remaining, Stanford made what turned out to be a five-point play: forward Joslyn Tinkle hit a three-pointer, and missed her "and-1" shot, which forward Chiney Ogumike rebounded for a layup.

It was the spark the Cardinal needed to bring the game home.
 "We didn't close out with our high hands, we run into the shooter and then we don't box out on the free throw, and that was a huge deal at that point in the game," Lappe said. "It gave them a lot of momentum."

Though the Buffs kept fighting, they would never get closer than 10 points.
 Lappe said that while Stanford brought a high level of play to the game, many of the Buffs' mistakes were of their own creation.

"We didn't do nearly enough that it was going to take to win tonight," Lappe said, "and I felt like we controlled a lot of that."

But junior guard **Ashley Wilson**, who scored five of her seven points during CU's second-half comeback attempt, said her team had to feel that a win was still possible until the final buzzer.

"It's just never giving up. No matter what position we're in, we have to fight, fight 'till when the horn goes off," Wilson said. "We've just got to be ready to bounce back. That's all we can do every single time it bounce back and not let it defeat us."

Freshman forward **Jamee Swan** led Colorado in scoring with 14 points off the bench, while senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** added 13. Jeffery and redshirt freshman forward Arielle Roberson grabbed a team-high seven boards each, helping CU to out-rebound the Cardinal 39-33.

Stanford's Ogumike led all scorers with 20, adding 12 rebounds to earn her 15th double-double of the season. Three other Stanford players - Tinkle, guard Toni Kokenis and guard Amber Orange - also scored in double figures, as the Cardinal hit 49.1 percent from the field compared to CU's 36.1 percent.

LOS ANGELES - The No. 22 Colorado women's basketball team had an opportunity on Friday night to gain a win over a ranked Pac-12 Conference opponent for the first time this season — but the Buffs couldn't capitalize.

Shooting just 20 percent in the first half and 28.6 percent overall, CU fell to No. 18 UCLA 62-46 at Pauley Pavilion.

It was the Buffs' third straight road game against a ranked opponent, having fallen to then-No. 7 California and then-No. 4 Stanford last weekend. Now 4-5 in the Pac-12 and 15-5 overall, CU has just one day to regroup before taking on Southern California Sunday at 10 a.m. MST.

Colorado was No. 1 in the conference in scoring defense going into Friday's matchup, holding opponents to an average of 52.1 points per game — but UCLA's forceful offense was too much for the Buffs to handle.

The Bruins (16-4, 7-2) shot 55.5 percent from the field, improving from 44 percent in the first half to 70 in the second. Senior guard/forward Markel Walker led the Bruins with 17 points, and senior forward Alyssia Brewer added 10.

Junior guard **Brittany Wilson** and senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** led CU in scoring with 12 and 11, respectively. The Buffs, however, didn't show their usual scoring depth, with all non-starters combined scoring just nine points.

Rebounding, though, was perhaps Colorado's biggest struggle. The Buffs were outrebounded 25-16 at the half and 44-29 on the night. Four Bruins recorded at least six rebounds, while only one CU player had more than four.

The Buffs did force 29 turnovers while only committing 17. CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said that while that may have been the only positive on the stat sheet for her team, the inability to capitalize off of those turnovers was costly for the Buffs.

"They gave us plenty of opportunities," Lappe said. "Obviously they weren't really ever threatened by us, and so perhaps they gave away some passes that they wouldn't have if the game had been closer."

Lappe said her team was capable of much more than it showed Friday night, especially on the defensive end.

"We didn't have any mental toughness tonight," Lappe said. "I mean, we were really a shell of ourselves. We didn't rebound, we didn't really play defense, we didn't play together."

CU started with a bang in the first half, going up six on a **Lexy Kresl** bucket with 16:32 remaining. When UCLA's Walker responded with a 6-0 run of her own, though, the Buffs were unable to recover. In the 10 minutes following Walker's run, Colorado scored just three points, allowing the Bruin's lead to grow to 14 with five minutes left in the half.

By intermission, CU had recorded only 15 points to UCLA's 29.
 The Buffs found some energy with a 6-2 run at the start of the second half, even closing the Bruins' lead to 11 with 14:43 remaining.

Ultimately, though, an inconsistent CU offense paired with UCLA's dominance on the boards prevented the Buffs from a successful comeback.

With 6:41 on the clock, UCLA's lead had grown to 19 — and while Colorado would not stop fighting, the shots simply didn't fall.

"We were off the entire night," Lappe said. "We couldn't make layups. We weren't necessarily turning the ball over a ton, but we just couldn't get stops. We were on our heels the entire night. When we did get a stop, they'd get an offensive rebound put-back, or they'd get to the free throw line because we'd bail them out. There are so many things to point to that I can't even name just one."

"We've just got to get back to the drawing board, we've got to figure out how to get ready for the next game," Lappe said. "Play like we can play, play with a sense of confidence, understand what we're trying to do. We've got to play together. We just have to get back to doing the things that we were doing to win so many games that we seemed to not want to do tonight."

BOULDER - Colorado senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** recorded her 1,500th career point and 26th career double-double on Friday night to lead the CU women to a 61-47 win over Oregon State.

Jeffery, moving into 10th place on the school's career scoring list, led the Buffs with 22 points, added 11 rebounds and a season-high three blocks. CU sophomore forward **Jen Reese** also scored in double figures with 10 points, while redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** added nine.

With the win, CU improves to 17-5 overall, 6-5 in the Pac-12 Conference, while OSU falls to 9-14 and 3-8 in conference play.

It was a long-awaited return to the Coors Events Center for the Buffs, who dropped three of four games in California over the past two weeks. CU lost to Top 25 opponents Stanford, Cal and UCLA but defeated Southern California.

The Buffs wore pink-accented uniforms on Friday night in honor of the annual "Play 4 Kay" game to support breast cancer awareness. Breast cancer survivors were recognized at halftime, and fans were invited to donate to the Boulder Community Hospital Auxiliary's Breast Cancer Fund to aid local cancer patients.

"It was breast cancer week, and coach talked about attacking because that's what the women with breast cancer have to do," said junior guard **Brittany Wilson**, who had a game-high five steals. "They have to attack, they have to fight. So we came down, we attacked, we came after loose balls, and I think that's what forced them into those (24) turnovers."

CU put the heat on the visitors early on, going on a 9-0 run before OSU scored its first basket of the game with 14:09 left in the half.

Wilson said that solid start was crucial for the Buffs, as they were battling a strong defensive team ranked sixth in the nation in blocks at 6.1 per game.

"We knew we had to come out and set a statement or they would keep coming at us," Wilson said, "and you can't give a team like that confidence."

The Beavers answered with four three-pointers in five minutes to make it 21-16 with six minutes remaining in the first half. But CU was opportunistic at the free throw line (78.6 percent) and maintained its five-point lead (28-23) at the break.

"Oregon State is a good team, they hustle and they scrap the entire game," Jeffery said. "They weren't going away, so we knew we had to go on a run and we had to get it up a little bit . . . that was huge for us to get this win."

The second half began in a similar fashion to the first as the Buffs went on a 7-0 run with five straight points by Jeffery and two made free throws by Roberson.

This time, though, the momentum stuck. Colorado built its largest lead of the game - 15 points - with eight minutes to play. From there, the Beavers would not pull closer than eight.

Shooting 7-of-10 free throws to end the game, the Buffs widened the gap back to 14 and closed out the visitors, who were led by freshman guard Jamie Weisner with 22 points and seven rebounds. She was the only OSU player with more than seven points.

"Weisner's tough," said CU head coach **Linda Lappe**. "She plays so hard, she's physical, she never quits. She's a tough matchup for anybody in the league, so you've got to get her a lot of credit. She kept them in the game."

Colorado returns to the Coors Events Center Sunday at 1:30 p.m. to take on Oregon. After falling to Utah 67-47 Friday night, the Ducks are ranked last in the Pac-12 at 1-10.

In fact, the Buffs have just one opponent remaining (Washington) in the regular season that is currently ranked higher in the conference standings.

Wilson, however, said her team won't get comfortable just yet.

"Being in the Pac-12, you never know what team is going to come out," Wilson said. "You have to play every team and respect them. This is a bottom-to-top hard conference to play, and if you give a team confidence, they'll keep shooting and keep coming back at you. You don't want to relax too much."

BOULDER - Four players scored in double figures Sunday afternoon to lead the No. 21/25 Colorado women's basketball team to an 84-59 Pac-12 Conference romp past Oregon at the Coors Events Center.

With the win, Colorado improves to 18-5 overall and 7-5 in the Pac-12. CU's seven conference wins to date are more than the team recorded in total last season (6-12). The Buffs had not won seven or more conference matchups in a season since finishing the 2004 Big 12 schedule at 11-5.

Junior guard **Brittany Wilson** led CU with 16 points, while senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** added 15 points and 15 rebounds. Jeffery's totals marked her 27th career double-double and just the fourth time she has recorded 15 or more.

"To be able to score just as much as you rebound, that's pretty amazing," sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl** said of Jeffery's performance. Kresl and junior center **Rachel Hargis** added 12 points and 10, respectively, while four other players scored at least six.

Hargis said her team prepared specifically to face Oregon's zone defense, something the Buffs haven't seen much of from opponents this season.

"Coach talked to us about moving the ball well, just keeping it moving and not holding the ball as much," Hargis said. "Playing a zone you don't really expect to score that much inside, but coach kept talking to us about attacking and cutting to open areas, and that's what I focused on."

Colorado started the first half slow, allowing Oregon to go on a 10-3 run in the first 3:15 and record three blocks in the first five minutes.

"I didn't think we were being very aggressive, we were letting them score however they wanted to score with not very many passes," said CU head coach Linda Lappe. "We didn't look like we were ready for what they were bringing, so we just needed to take a deep breath and get back out there."

Once the Buffs had regrouped and gotten a chance to assess Oregon's top scorers, they made the necessary adjustments on defense to stop the Ducks' streak.

"We recognized who was going to be scoring and who was going to be shooting," Kresl said. "We definitely tried to pick up the pressure on them more and play them a little bit closer."

And with a more efficient defense came a ramped-up offense, as Jeffery and Wilson hit three consecutive three-pointers to regain a four-point lead with 13:40 left in the half.

Oregon didn't give in easily and even briefly took the lead again with 7:45 on the clock. CU's offense responded with force, though, outscoring Oregon 20-6 in the final 7:20 to enter intermission with a 43-31 advantage.

That momentum more than carried through halftime, as the Buffs went on an immediate 10-0 run to go up 20 (53-33). The Ducks were unable to recover, and with three minutes remaining a Hargis basket put the Buffs up 27 (80-53).

Colorado would maintain that energy until the final buzzer.

"It was a good game, we shared the ball a lot as a team, had 17 assists," Wilson said. "We hit open shots, played great defense, so I think it was a team effort... I don't think you could ask for anything more."

Eleven Colorado players saw time on the court at some point Sunday, including freshman guard **Kyleesha Weston** and walk-on freshman guard **Alexus Atchley**. Atchley scored her first two career points in the last minute of the game.

"Anyone who can get players experience is important, especially young players," Lappe said. "Especially when you play that tempo, you have to play ten players to stay fresh. We knew it was going to be a fast-paced game today, and everybody who came in just kept that pace going."

CU shot 44.9 percent from the field, recording 17 assists and just 12 turnovers. Meanwhile, the Ducks were held to 38.6 percent from the field and recorded 21 turnovers.

TUCSON, Ariz. - So far this season, the No. 21 Colorado women's basketball team hasn't been fazed by road competition. On Friday night at the McKale Center, the Buffaloes showed they can create their own energy wherever they go.

Led by sophomore forward **Jen Reese**'s 15 points, CU rolled to its fourth consecutive win, 55-42, over the Arizona Wildcats. It was the second meeting this season for the Pac-12 Conference opponents, as the Buffs also defeated the Wildcats 79-36 in Boulder in January.

CU improves to 19-5 overall and 8-5 in the conference. Arizona's loss, meanwhile, was its eighth straight, dropping the Wildcats to 11-13, 3-10.

The Buffs outbursts countered their opponents 40-35, grabbing 16 offensive rebounds compared to the Wildcats' 9. Redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** picked up a game-high seven rebounds, while Reese and freshman forward **Jamee Swan** added six each.

In the game's first five minutes, Arizona forced five turnovers but failed to capitalize offensively, allowing CU to stay even through the 12:42 mark (11-11). CU sophomore guard **Jasmine Sborov** then put together an "and-1" play which sparked a 14-0 Colorado run to put the Buffs up 25-13.

"We knew we had to take a run, and we just had to keep going," Reese said. "Our defense goes into our offense, and after a while we got great shots, everyone was finding gaps in either zone or man - so we just kept knocking those down and playing defense."

Sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl**'s trey with 4:33 remaining gave CU its largest lead of the first half at 30-15, but the Wildcats responded with an 8-0 run of their own to end the half down only seven (30-23).

Buts as the Buffs turned up the heat out of the locker room, the Wildcats went cold. CU went on a 10-0 run to start the second half, holding Arizona scoreless for more than six minutes.

Arizona senior guard Davellynn Whyte, the team's leading scorer, put up her first three points of the game and Arizona's first of the half at the 13:36 mark. While Whyte would score another three to bring the Wildcats to within nine, the gap would never get closer than that.

Colorado ended the game shooting just 37.3 percent from the field, but held Arizona to 32.6 percent. CU also scored 14 points off of turnovers compared to AU's nine and got 30 points in the paint compared to AU's 14.

Lappe said her team was prepared specifically to guard Whyte, a player who averages 16.4 points per game to rank fifth in the Pac-12.

"I thought it was a team defensive effort," Lappe said. "We rotated a lot of different players on her, and I thought it was great to have somebody fresh on her. We know what she can do offensively."

Junior guard **Brittany Wilson** opened the standout, but senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** and junior center **Rachel Hargis** took turns on her as well.

"Whyte's a great player," Reese said. "Stopping her was big - I mean, they had other players kind of stepped up, but our defense won the game for us."

CU committed 20 turnovers but also had 11 steals, marking the team's fifth straight game with 10 or more steals.

Still, Lappe said that despite the strong defense, that 20-turnover total was inexcusable for a Top 25 team.

"I told our team we should never have 20 turnovers in February, and that has to become a part of our program's culture," Lappe said. "It hasn't been in the past, we've been OK with it in the past, but this year needs to be different."

BOULDER - Early style points were scarce for a Top 25 team, but in late February for the No. 20 Colorado Buffaloes aesthetics don't matter as much as points on the scoreboard and final results.

That's what the Friday night unfolded and at times unraveled at the Coors Events Center. After an unsightly start, the Buffs stayed patient, regained their poise late and finally disposed of Washington State 59-45 for their sixth consecutive win.

Coach **Linda Lappe** said she and the Buffs "were happy to get that win. It was a hard-fought game and you have to give Washington State a lot of credit."

But after watching her team commit 19 of the game's 44 turnovers and shoot only 33.8 percent from the field while trying to solve WSU's match-up zone, Lappe added, "There was no rhythm in that game at all. When you watch basketball, when you coach basketball, when you play basketball, usually there is some rhythm within a game. . . . It was hard to get into a rhythm. Both teams never did, and I told our team after the game that's not a game where you're going to be able to play your best."

Offensively, who could argue? But defensively, the Buffs turned in another near airtight performance, limiting the Cougars to below 20 percent from the field and forcing 25 turnovers that led to 25 CU points.

WSU was the 11th opponent CU (21-5) has held under 50 points this season, and the Cougars' 11 field goals and 19.6 field goal percentage were among the lowest seen for Buffs opponents. WSU coach June Daugherty recognized CU's "D" for what it was and has been: "Credit to their defense," she said. "They have been pushing teams in that aspect all season."

Three CU players - **Arielle Roberson** with 17 and **Chucky Jeffery** and **Jen Reese** with 10 each - finished in double figures Friday night. WSU (10-16, 6-9) was led by Lia Galdeira with 12 and Mariah Cooks with 10. Roberson also collected a career-high 13 rebounds, accounting for her first career double-double.

Roberson and the Buffs opened aggressively but couldn't maintain it. Going ahead 21-8 on a conventional three-point play by Roberson, they appeared to have a comfortable first-half lead. Then they went frigid and forgetful, lapsing on the offensive end and allowing the Cougars back into the game.

WSU went on a 10-1 run and cut CU's 13-point lead to four (22-18). The Buffs had opened by hitting six of their first 12 shots, but they closed the half hitting just three of their last 20 attempts - and their final field goal of the half was by Roberson just seven seconds before the buzzer.

Still, despite shooting 28.1 percent from the field, committing 11 turnovers and getting just two points from Jeffery, CU led 26-19 at intermission. Mainly because WSU committed 14 of its turnovers and was limited to 21.9 percent shooting.

Lappe can be forgiven if she was leaning toward destroying the first-half tape. "We refocused at halftime," she said. "To beat that defense, you all have to be on the same page. . . . We did a much better job in the second half."

With 13:30 remaining, the Buffs matched their largest lead of the game - 13 points at 40-27 - on a Jeffery basket. But the Cougars crept back to within six (48-42) with just under six minutes to play.

A Jeffery jumper with 4:48 to play pushed CU ahead 50-42, and a Roberson tray from the top of the key restored the Buffs' double-digit lead (53-42) with 3:30 left. When Roberson followed with a basket in the paint, CU's lead went to 15, and WSU was finished.

Although Roberson said the Buffs' performance "definitely wasn't our best," she added that she never felt they had lost control of the game. "I can speak for myself; I'm not sure how everyone else felt. But I think the majority of us felt like we could control the game," she said.

"When the game was going downhill, it was our fault. And when we were doing good things, it was us as well. I think, knowing that, we weren't threatened at all. At least I wasn't."

BOULDER - The No. 20 Colorado Buffaloes outlasted Washington 68-61 on Senior Sunday at the Coors Events Center and closed in on the No. 4 seed for next month's Pac-12 Conference Women's Tournament.

Winning their seventh consecutive game, the Buffs improved to 11-5 in the Pac-12 and moved into a fourth-place tie with the Huskies. But Sunday's win gives CU the head-to-head tiebreaker, and the Buffs' remaining schedule appears more favorable than the Huskies' for securing the No. 4 seed.

CU (22-5 overall) closes the regular season with games at Oregon (March 1) and Oregon State (March 3), while UW (19-8) finishes with home games against Pac-12 co-leaders Stanford and California.

The Buffs led by 11 points at halftime and by as many as 12 before the Huskies closed to within one on two occasions in the final 9:58. And with 2:39 to play, UW pulled to 59-57 on the first field goal of the game by guard Jazmine Davis - the Pac-12's No. 2 scorer with a 19.7-point average. She finished with nine points, hitting only two of her 13 field goal attempts.

At that point, **Jen Reese** hit back-to-back mid-range jumpers to give the Buffs a six-point lead (63-57). The Huskies cut the deficit to three (64-61) on Davis' second field goal but CU went four-of-four from the free throw line in the last 37.6 seconds to seal its win.

Chucky Jeffery had 11 points and 13 rebounds for her ninth double-double of the season and 29th of her career. She was one of four players in double figures, topped by **Arielle Roberson's** 16. **Brittany Wilson** added 13 - 11 in the first half - and Reese chipped in 11. Five of Reese's points came in the final 2:55, including her pair of critical jumpers after misfiring on another couple of open shots earlier.

"I thought Jen did a tremendous job of knocking down those two huge jumpers," head coach **Linda Lappe** said. "I think that shows a lot of mental toughness to be able to bounce back and knock down those two shots."

Kristi Kingma led the Huskies with 19 points. Aminah Williams added 12, Talia Walton 11 and Mercedes Wetmore 10.

CU never trailed by more than three points in the first half, and after Kingma hit a three-pointer to send the Huskies up 16-14, the Buffs launched a 16-3 run that produced a 30-19 advantage.

An acrobatic put-back by freshman **Jamee Swan** enabled CU to maintain that 11-point lead (36-25) at intermission. UW opened the game hitting six of its first 11 shots, but made only three of its final 18 attempts to close the first half. CU held the visitors to 38.3 percent from the field and just 5-for-20 from behind the arc. The Huskies were averaging a league-leading 8.5 treys a game.

The Huskies scored the first six points of the second half, pulling to 36-31. The Buffs, meanwhile, had Jeffery leave the game with an ankle injury at the 19:12 mark. But she was back about four minutes later, and her return might have given CU an emotional lift.

Lappe said she knew Jeffery "would probably be tough enough to go back in. I felt like that injury kind of took out the air of the balloon for us, it happened so quickly for us in the second half and from there I felt like our demeanor kind of changed. But at the same time it was good to see her come back; she is a tough player and a big part of our team."

After UW crept to within five points, CU went on an 8-1 run and shot ahead 44-32 with 12:41 to play. Roberson scored six of the Buffs' points during that surge.

But that 12-point CU lead disappeared quickly. UW put together an 11-0 run that featured treys by Wetmore and Kingma and another three free throws by Kingma. That pulled the Huskies to within one twice in the final 9:58, but an 8-0 CU that included four points by Jeffery opened a nine-point Buffs lead (56-47).

UW wouldn't rest. The Huskies outscored the Buffs 8-2 over the next three minutes, closing to 58-55 with 3:38 to play and finally pulling to 59-57. Then Reese hit her pair of monstrous mid-range jumpers to give CU breathing room and the Buffs tucked away their big win at the free throw line.

CORVALLIS, Ore. - The No. 19 Colorado women's basketball team turned a slow start into a 66-63 overtime victory Sunday against Oregon State to finish the Pac-12 Conference season 13-5.

The Buffs' 13 league wins this season trail only the 1989 and '95 squads, both of which finished their seasons 14-0 and made it to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament.

CU shot just 33.8 percent from the field but outrebounded the Beavers 49-36. Senior guard **Chuck Jeffery** scored a game-high 25 points, while redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** earned her second career double-double Sunday with 10 points and a team-high 11 rebounds. Eight of those were on the offensive end, a number just two off from the program record.

"We knew how we wanted to end the regular season, but now it's one-and-done here from here on," said Jeffery, who also contributed seven rebounds. "We had a heck of a regular season, but now it's Pac-12 tournament time, and anybody can win."

With a win over Oregon on Friday, the Buffs secured a No. 4 seed and first-round bye at the Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament, set for March 7-10 at the KeyArena in Seattle.

But even with a first-round bye already locked down, the Buffs had no easy go of Sunday's matchup against the Beavers.

"Coach said this was probably how the game was probably going to go," Jeffery said of OSU's aggressiveness. "They weren't going to come out and give it to us, we were going to have to earn it, and that's what they did. I think it was a good game for us to end our regular season on, it was very competitive."

It was senior day for the Beavers at Gill Coliseum, and the strength of the OSU upperclassmen showed early. Four OSU seniors hit the court at some point in the first nine minutes of the game, helping the Beavers to a 22-9 lead with 11:05 left in the half.

OSU seniors Mollie Schwelger, Quortni Fambro and Patricia Bright put up a combined 15 points in the half, including two Schwelger three-pointers in the first four minutes. The Beavers built their largest lead, 18, at the 6:50 mark, but CU responded with a 14-2 run to head into the locker room trailing by just five (28-33). "We don't give up," Jeffery said. "They were hitting shot after shot, and it was kind of draining us, but we just had to keep plugging ... we started cutting the lead, and we started getting settled, getting stops on defense and making baskets."

Jeffery opened the second half with a layup and made two free throws to bring the Buffs back within one (33-32), but a strong OSU defense held CU to just four points over the next six minutes.

But then it was OSU's turn for a scoring drought, as CU turned up the energy on both ends of the court with a 15-4 run. Junior center **Rachel Hargis** gave the Buffs their first lead of the game with a jumper at the 7:09 mark, and while CU would build a five-point lead with 2:12 on the clock, the Beavers weren't done yet. With nine seconds remaining, OSU freshman guard Jamie Weisner hit a three-pointer to tie the score at 56-56 send the game into overtime.

The Buffs went on a 7-1 run to gain a six-point overtime lead, but OSU would fight to the finish as Weisner hit another three with 30 seconds on the clock. Jeffery then hit one of two free throws, but OSU guard Ali Gibson responded with a deep, nearly half-court trey to close CU's lead to one (64-63) with 6.3 seconds remaining.

Roberson was fouled on the next possession and made two crucial free throws, and OSU missed its buzzer-beater shot to give the Buffs the 66-63 win.

"You can't ever think that it's not your day," CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said of the Buffs' comeback. "You've just got to find different ways to get things done ... you've got to make sure that little things don't affect you. We could have even let that half-court shot affect us, but we didn't, and I really liked our resolve."

SEATTLE - Once they settled in, the Colorado Buffaloes could think about moving on. But that process took a while and required nearly every player on the roster Friday night in the second round of the Pac-12 Conference Women's Tournament.

Overcoming a first half of near and sometimes bad misses, fourth-seeded CU finally took control in the final 20 minutes and ousted fifth-seeded Washington 70-59 at KeyArena. It was the Buffs' 10th consecutive victory.

Head coach **Linda Lappe** used 11 players against UW (20-11) and not only did all of them score, all but one of them collected at least two rebounds and all but two contributed at least one assist. In addition to her 19 points, **Chuck Jeffery** also had a game-best four assists, while freshman forward **Jamee Swan** scored a career-high 15 points and hauled in 10 of CU's 58 rebounds - UW had 36 - in her 19 minutes of court time.

CU's bench outscored UW's 33-18. The Buffs had 25 offensive rebounds to the Huskies' 13, outscored them 40-18 in the paint and won the second-chance point duel 20-9.

"I like how we crashed the offensive glass," Lappe said. "We needed to get a lot of extra shots in this game and we did. We showed a lot of resolve in chasing down loose balls to get us extra shots."

But the season's script has featured defense and it did against UW. The Buffs had their opponents to 34.9 percent shooting - on pace to be a school-record - and they held the Huskies to 27.9 percent. UW made just 17 of its 61 shot attempts.

Dub was leading the conference in three-pointers made (8.2 a game). The Huskies hit seven treys Friday night, but their final two came in the last two minutes when they were trying to cut into a 10-point Buffs lead. CU's goal was to limit UW to five, the same number the Buffs allowed in their 68-61 win last month in Boulder.

Sophomore guard Jazmine Davis, the Pac-12 No. 2 scorer (19.5 ppg), hit two if UW's treys and finished with a team-best 17 points. In the first CU-UW meeting, Davis was held to nine points.

UW got as close as four (63-59) before Jeffery scored five consecutive points - a jumper and three of four free throws - and Swan sank two free throws with 13 seconds left to account for a 7-0 run to close out the game.

The Buffs were up 29-26 at the half, but it took them almost 18 minutes to get their first lead. Blame that on shooting that was somewhere south of frigid. UW led by as many as six (14-8) before the Buffs finally began finding their range - kind of.

Lappe said her team was "really excited to play. I think anytime that's the case you miss some easy shots...but I like how we stayed with it."

After a Jeffery three-pointer - her team's only trey of the first half - tied the score at 23-23, she hit a pull-up jumper from the free throw line following a UW turnover to give CU its first lead, 25-23, with 2:41 before intermission.

The final 20 minutes would belong to whoever wanted them, and based on the first 21:2 it appeared that was CU. After scoring the first eight points the Buffs surged to a 37-26 lead and were threatening to rip this one open.

It didn't happen. Talia Walton's trey started an 8-0 UW run and Davis' traditional three-point finished it, pulling the Huskies back to within three (37-34) with 16:09 remaining.

CU went back ahead by as many as seven points on an **Ashley Wilson** layup and maintained at least a four-point lead until a pair of free throws by Kristi Kingma pulled UW to 45-43 with 10:29 to play.

The Huskies could get no closer. Pulling ahead twice by 10 on a pair of layups by Swan in the final two minutes, the Buffs looked like they could begin making semifinal plans for Saturday.

But three-pointers by Heather Corral and Walton, who finished with 13, closed UW's deficit to 63-59 with less than a minute left. Jeffery answered with a layup and three of four free throws, and when Swan sank a pair with 13 seconds remaining.

BOULDER - Scoring the fifth fewest points of the season while allowing the second most was not a formula for success for the Colorado women's basketball team, as five Kansas players scored in double figures to lead the Jayhawks to a 67-52 upset over the host Buffaloes in an NCAA Women's Tournament first round game here Saturday. Seniors Carolyn Davis and Angel Goodrich led the scored 14 points apiece for Kansas (19-13, the 12th seed in the Norfolk Region), which basically limped into the tournament after losing six of its last eight games (and 11 of 18). But the Jayhawks, after falling behind by 10 early, played the like the team that opened the year with seven straight wins on their way to an 11-2 start.

Colorado (25-7, seeded No. 5), was playing in the NCAA Tournament for the first time in a decade, but had to make a go of it without starting center Rachel Hargis, who suffered a knee injury in practice a week ago Friday.

Colorado started out 6-of-7 from the field in building an early 14-4 edge, but then went cold the rest of the way in the first half (5-of-27) and missed its first seven shots of the second half before a **Brittany Wilson** layup at 14:02 ended the drought. Meanwhile, KU shot 50 percent in the first half (15-of-30), closing with 11 makes in 18 tries; the Jayhawks made 5-of-6 to open the second for a 16-of-24 performance while turning a 15-9 deficit into a 49-29 lead, the first of two 20-point advantages it had in the game (the other coming at 56-36).

It all added up to a whopping 45-15 comeback after Colorado recorded that early lead.

If the Buffaloes were going to get back in it, they needed a quick start in the second half. But the Jayhawks were not to be denied, scoring the first six points to extend their 10-point intermission lead to 43-27. The margin hovered between 14 points, the closest the Buffs would get on three different occasions, and 18 the remainder of the game.

Kansas opened the scoring on a Davis layup but then Colorado went on a 14-2 run in just over a two minute span, fueled by eight points, including a pair of 3-point baskets, by junior **Brittany Wilson**. The Jayhawks slowly worked their way back into the game, pulling to within 15-13 on consecutive scores by Monica Engelman at the 11:19 mark. A three-pointer by **Lexy Kresl** and a layup from **Chuck Jeffery** put the Buffs back up by seven, 20-13 with 9:12 left in the half.

KU then matched and actually exceeded CU's early run with one of its own, using a 17-3 spree over the next five-plus minutes to take a 30-23 lead, with Davis and Chelsea Gardner each contributing six points. Davis had 10 points in the half, which ended with a Charlicia Harper three-point shot to give the Jayhawks a 37-27 lead.

"We came out and it was rainin' in here, and then after a while we couldn't hit anything," Wilson said. "I mean, we had open shots, I just think ... I don't really know what happened. Then there were open shots, and we kept saying, 'just step into it and take another shot.' I don't know if it was nervousness, I don't know what it was, but after a while we just couldn't hit anything."

Colorado finished just 16-of-63 from the field, the 25.4 shooting percentage easily its worst of the season. The Buffs came into the game hitting at 39.9 percent, while Kansas was allowing its opponents to click at just 41.1 percent. The Jayhawks converted 46 percent of its tries; otherwise, the only other decided statistical advantages belong to Kansas in assists (16-8) and to Colorado in steals (13-5) and free throw attempts (25-6).

Arielle Roberson recorded a double-double for Colorado, scoring 11 points and grabbing 12 rebounds; Wilson tied her for the team scoring lead, also netting 11. Jeffery struggled in her final appearance in a CU uniform, scoring just eight points on 2-of-16 field goal shooting, but did have five rebounds, five assists and two steals. Jeffery finished her career ranked high on several of CU's all-time charts, including scoring (1,644 points, sixth), rebounds (921, fifth), assists (481, fourth) and steals (283, fourth).
