2014-15 OUTLOOK

Every new season brings its own unique set of challenges. A year ago Colorado was coming off an NCAA Tournament berth, but injuries and some heart-breaking near misses left the Buffaloes just short of making a return trip to the Big Dance, although a fourth straight winning season (19-15) and a modest run in the Postseason WNIT set a foundation to build upon.

Colorado will be able to rely on a solid senior class that has played a lot of minutes as well as some talented younger players. The bulk of this program has experienced a good level of success, with all returners playing in some sort of postseason play over the last three years.

"We need to have the commitment to continue to work on our individual game on the offensive side, and our overall strength and fitness," head coach **Linda Lappe** said. "I feel like we're a really strong team right now, just looking at us in the weight room, and I really think that will translate onto the court as we begin practice."

"We need to improve our leadership and our defense. Normally, we're a good defensive team, but that wasn't the case at times last year. We need to have that leadership on the floor in those late game situations, to execute plays, and to get stops on the defensive end."

Colorado has already been presented with one significant challenge. Junior forward **Arielle Roberson**, last year's leading scorer and rebounder, will miss the season with a torn ACL in her left knee suffered in a routine drill during individual workouts just a week before the start of fall practice.

While her contributions will certainly be missed the Buffaloes have good depth in the front court and will look to a number of players to fill that void.

"Anytime there is an injury there is an opportunity for another player to step up," Lappe said. "We'll have the time with practice for players to seize that opportunity."

Junior **Jamee Swan** could have a big year for Colorado and her play will be critical even more so with the loss of Roberson. Swan led Colorado in both field-goal percentage (.505) and blocked shots (36) while ranking third in rebounding (5.3 rpg). She had flashes of dominance, including a 25-point outburst against Washington, and a 20-point, 13-rebound effort against No. 4 Stanford.

"Jamee is going to be key for us," Lappe said. "She's already played a major role for us and now as a junior, she needs to continue to evolve into a bigger inside presence. We're going to rely on our rebounding and athleticism at the rim."

Senior forward **Jen Reese** was second in scoring and rebounding for the Buffaloes before missing the final seven games with a shoulder injury. She finished just a fraction behind Roberson for the scoring lead at 12 per game while hitting 48 percent from the field and pulling down nearly six rebounds per contest.

Sophomore forward **Zoe Beard-Fails** has entered fall practice in great shape. She had spurts of success in limited time as a freshman, and has improved her strength and quickness in the offseason.

A pair of newcomers will add depth, especially if the Buffaloes show a big lineup. Sophomore center **Bri Watts**, didn't play in a game last year, but a year of conditioning and practice with the program should help. Freshman center **Zoe Correal** averaged 11.2 points and 8.2 rebounds for her Salesian High School team that made it to the state title game in California's top division.

"(Zoe Correal) has been impressive with her ability to learn and also compete," Lappe said. "She never quits and does everything at 110 percent. We still need to work with her on her skill set, but our fans will enjoy seeing her resolve to get things done."

Colorado's other early season storyline comes in the back court, specifically at the point guard position. The Buffaloes are excited about the prospects of true freshman **Brecca Thomas**, who had a storied career at The Kinkaid School in the Houston area, but also realize the transition at that position from high school to the Pac-12 is a tough one. Fortunately, senior **Lexy Kresl** will be able to help ease that process.

Though, naturally, more of a shooting guard, Kresl has played plenty of minutes at the point for Colorado, with a good deal of success. Kresl had an outstanding nonconference season as a junior; she was named the MVP of the Omni Classic, averaging 15.5 points, 6.0 rebounds and 5.0 assists. She also had fantastic game in one of the nation's toughest venues, scoring 17 points with eight rebounds at No. 7 Louisville.

The growth in her all-around game is what has been the most beneficial to the Buffaloes. She led Colorado in assists and was third in steals as a junior. And, let's not forget, she can shoot. Kresl

enters her senior year 10th in career 3-pointers with 124 and is a career 84 percent shooter from the free throw line.

All this allows the Buffaloes to be patient with Thomas, although the ideal situation may be to have them on the court at the same time. Thomas was a four-year All-South Zone and All-South Preparatory Conference selection, helping her team to a pair of SPC championships. She averaged 18.6 points, 5.0 assists, 3.5 steals and 3.4 rebounds for The Kinkaid School as a senior and was ranked the 25th best point guard in the nation by *ESPN HoopGurlz*.

"Brecca will have to have a lot of reps from the get go and I've really liked what I've seen so far from her and what she's been able to do," Lappe said. "She becomes more prepared every single day. The good thing for her is we have Lexy who played a lot at the point for us last year and can be in that spot as well, but the best thing for Lexy and our team is to be able to utilize her at the 2-guard a lot more."

The backcourt is strong and has the ability to extend the floor with numerous players. Colorado is eagerly anticipating the return of senior **Jasmine Sborov** who really started to come into her own last year during the preseason before a foot injury abruptly ended her season prematurely after 14 games.

Sborov had averaged 7.8 points and 4.6 rebounds prior to her injury and was beginning to showcase the hard work she had put in on her shot in the previous offseason. She had extended her game past the 3-point line, hitting a solid 37 percent from beyond the arc. Sborov also shot 72 percent from the free line and iced road games against Colorado State and Wyoming from the stripe.

"Jas has made tremendous strides in her career, from the time she was a freshman to now," Lappe said. "I know she's looking forward to being out there with her teammates and really playing for them."

When Sborov went down, someone had to take her place. Much like the Buffaloes will have to do with Roberson's absence, someone had to step up and last year it was **Haley Smith**, then a true freshman. Despite some natural bumps, Smith got better

and better as the season went along pitching just under three points and four rebounds per game. Now a year later, her experience makes Colorado that much deeper on the wing.

"Haley is a prime example of a player that stepped into a role that was void once another player was injured," Lappe said. "Haley was able to step in and be that wing for us that was just steady. When you think of Haley, she's someone that is tough, consistent and we're going to rely on those same things this year with a little additional load on her shoulders to score and defend multiple positions."

Colorado's guard play also benefits from long-range shooter **Lauren Huggins**, who ranked among the Pac-12's most accurate 3-point shooters last year, hitting on 36 percent. Sophomore **Desiree Harris** will also give Colorado minutes; a smart, quick, off-guard that can shoot from outside and also drive into the lane to either score or distribute.

Possibly the 'X-Factor' for the Buffaloes is freshman guard **Alina Hartmann**, from Bamberg, Germany; Colorado's first European player in six years. Hartmann is a veteran of several very successful German junior national teams, including the U20 team that placed first at the 2014 European Championships for Women this past August, where she averaged 8.2 points, 3.8 rebounds and 2.0 assists. She played club basketball for DJK Brose Bamberg in the German 1st Division, averaging 9.8 points and 5.2 rebounds while hitting 43 percent from the field in 22 games in 2013-14.

"Alina played with her German National team this summer, came in here and raised the standard in a lot of ways," Lappe said. "She's in fantastic shape, the best of our freshmen, and competes with our returners for that title. Alina has such a high level of intensity, has a great sense of urgency and is a sponge in what she's told, although sometimes she doesn't really understand it, she watches, and is very perceptive, and imitates whatever she sees in front of her on the floor and will do exactly what we are trying to get done."

Colorado has a challenging nonconference schedule, especially on the road. The Buffaloes will see both the SEC (at Missouri) at Big Ten (at Iowa) with potential games with perennial power Penn State or defending Big 12 Champion West Virginia in the Postseason WNIT. Colorado has its early Pac-12 work cut out for them, starting with a road trip to defending Pac-12 Champion Stanford and California. Five of the Buffaloes' first eight Pac-12 games are on the road, but similar to two years ago, Colorado has six of its final 10 at home, hopefully providing the momentum for another postseason run.

Lexy Kresl has already made a mark on the CU history books with her 3-point shooting efforts, but an improved defensive presence and all-around game is what has pleased the Colorado coaching staff. She's a versatile guard who can no doubt rip the nets, but she knows the offense enough to run the point and is big and quick enough to play out on the wing.

Career: Colorado's top active 3-point shooter as she ranks 10th on the team's all-time list for 3-pointers made (124) and attempted (419). She has made a 3-pointer in 71 of 95 games played and has 33 career outings with two or more 3-pointers. Kresl is one of two Buffaloes (joining Jen Reese) that have a shot at reaching 1,000 career points this season. She enters her final collegiate campaign with 738.

2013-14 (Junior): Topped Colorado in assists (3.1 apg) and free-throw percentage (.841) while ranking third in both steals (1.1 spg) and 3-point field goals made (27). Kresl ranked third in the Pac-12 Conference in free-throw percentage, holding the top stop for a good portion of the season. She was also 11th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.2) and 12th in assists on the league charts. Her 84.1 percent mark from the charity stripe ranks 19th on Colorado's single-season list. She came out of the gate strong, primarily playing the point guard position, starting the first 16 games of the season. Kresl was named MVP of the Omni Hotels Classic averaging 15.5 points, 6.0 rebounds and 5.0 assists in wins over South Alabama (11/29) and Rice (11/30). She scored 12 points, dished out a career-high six assists, and nabbed seven rebounds in the first round win over South Alabama. In the championship game she scored a season-best 19 points on 7-of-14 shooting, with five rebounds, four assists and three steals. She hit double

figures in scoring 10 times, including a 17-point effort in a 69-62 loss at No. 7 ranked Louisville. A leg injury set her back in the middle of the Pac-12 season, forcing her to miss three games (Arizona, Arizona State at Utah), but rallied to finish strong in the postseason. Kresl averaged 9.0 points, 4.2 rebounds and 2.4 assists off the bench in Colorado's five postseason contests. In the first round Pac-12 Tournament win over UCLA, Kresl scored 14 points, including a perfect 6-of-6 from the free-throw line, grabbed six rebounds and dished out three assists.

2012-13 (Sophomore): Led Colorado in 3-point shooting for the second-straight season connecting on 34 from long range. She ranked 14th in the Pac-12 in 3-pointers made per game at 1.2. She hit 32 percent from downtown during the conference season (17-of-54) ranking 15th in the Pac-12 in league-only games. On the season she averaged 6.0 points, 2.7 rebounds and 1.3 steals per game. Her 38 steals ranked third on the team and she led the team on seven different occasions. Kresl tied a personal-best with 20 points in the win over New Mexico (12/29). In that game she tied a school record for 3-pointers made without a miss, hitting on all five attempts from beyond the arc. She actually hit six in a row over two games, making her only attempt in the win over Utah Valley (12/22). She also matched a career-best with seven field-goals made against New Mexico. Kresl scored in double-digits four times, the other three coming during the Pac-12 schedule. Kresl had season-highs of seven rebounds in back-to-back games, at home against Arizona (1/20) and at No. 7/7 ranked California (1/25). She was starting to pick up momentum late in the season, averaging 9.0 points and 2.3 steals over a four game stretch before a shoulder injury forced her to miss three games.

2011-12 (Freshman): Kresl averaged nine points and led Colorado in 3-pointers made (63) and attempted (198) en route to Pac-12 All-Freshman honors voted on by the media. She earned honorable mention to the coaches' All-Freshman team. Kresl ranked second among Pac-12 freshman in 3-pointers and fifth in scoring. On the overall league charts, she was fifth in 3-pointers made (1.8 3mpg), 12th in 3-point percentage (.318) and 28th in scoring. Her 63 3-pointers were most by a CU freshman breaking the mark of 57 previously held by Brittany Spears (2007-08) and Shelley Sheetz (1991-92). It was the 12th time a CU player has made 60 3-pointers in one season and just the seventh different player to do so. She

made a 3-pointer in 31-of-35 games. Kresl scored a career high 20 points on 6-of-7 from downtown in the win over Oregon State (3/3), the top single-game 3-point percentage in the Pac-12 this season. She was named to the UTSA Classic All-Tournament team, averaging 14.5 points and hitting 50 percent from the field. Kresl topped off the tournament in style by hitting the game-winning 3-point shot at the buzzer against Creighton (12/21). She earned Omni Hotels Classic All-Tournament Team honors, scoring 16 points in the championship game against Wisconsin (11/26) including a team season-best 8-for-8 from the free throw line. She made 36-of-40 free throws on the season, and will carry a string of 17 straight made into the 2012-13 season. Kresl enjoyed a spectacular collegiate debut, tying a school record by hitting five 3-pointers in the first half against Northern Arizona (11/11), finishing with 15 points on 5-of-8 shooting. She registered six straight double-figure scoring games to begin her career, tying Shelley Sheetz for the second most in team history.

HIGH SCHOOL: Lexy Kresl is a 2011 graduate of Shadow Mountain High School in Paradise Valley, Ariz., where she is the program's all-time leading scorer with 2,404 points. She earned consecutive All-Arizona, first-team all-state and regional player of the year accolades and was Arizona's leading scorer her junior and senior years. As a senior, she was a McDonald's All-American nominee after averaging 25 points and 14 rebounds per game. She was named Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year as a senior and earned an Arizona Women's Wendy's Heisman as a junior. During her junior season, Kresl led Shadow Mountain High School to the 2010 Arizona 4AI state title and was named tournament MVP. She was an ESPN Rise All-American after averaging 27 points and 12 rebounds per game. The same year she named Western Sky Player of the Year and earned all-tournament honors at the Nike Tournament of Champions. As a

Jen Reese compliments a solid Colorado front line with her ability to play physical down low and knock down the outside shot. She has a nice soft touch on her stroke and has displayed range out towards the 3-point arc. Reese proved to be a clutch player in many pressure situations for the Buffaloes during her successful career and will be out to finish off her Colorado career in style.

Career: Reese should hit a pair of significant CU milestones in her senior season. She enters the season needing 213 points to join the Buffaloes' 1,000-point club, a figure well below her season outputs the last two years. There are 25 members of Colorado's 1,000 point club and Reese is the closest of current Buffs that have a chance to reach that mark this season. She is just 36 rebounds away from 500, and 57 from cracking CU's career top 20.

2013-14 (Junior): Received honorable mention to the All-Pac-12 Conference team as voted on by league coaches despite missing the final seven games of the season with a broken bone in her shoulder. Reese was second on the team in scoring at an even 12.0 points of game, just being edged out by teammate Arielle Roberson for the season lead by .03. She was also second on the team in rebounding (5.8 rpg), free-throw percentage (.744) and field-goal accuracy (.483). After trading off starting and bench roles during the nonconference schedule, she settled into a starting position during the Pac-12 slate, starting in her final 13 games. Reese scored in double-digits in 17 of 27 contests and logged a pair of double-doubles. Her first double-dip of the season included 14 points and a career-high-matching 14 rebounds in a 69-62 loss at No. 7 ranked Louisville (12/21). The second came in her home state as she scored 18 points and pulled down 13 rebounds in an 81-75 win at Oregon (2/10). Reese had a memorable weekend in the home series with the Arizona schools. She averaged 22 points and 7.5 rebounds on 55



percent from the field and 91 percent from the free throw line in the games against Arizona (1/24) and Arizona State (1/26). She matched her career-best scoring output with 22 points in each game and set career highs for field goals (9), field-goal attempts (18) and minutes played (36) against the Sun Devils. Earlier in the season she was named to the Omni Classic All-Tournament Team after averaging 14.5 points and 7.0 rebounds while hitting 69 percent from the field (11-of-16) in wins over South Alabama (11/29) and Rice (11/30). On the Pac-12 leaderboard, Reese ranked sixth in field-goal percentage, eighth in free-throw percentage and 21st in scoring.

She also extended her shot beyond 3-point range, hitting eight of career 11 3-pointers during her junior campaign. Reese shot 50 percent or better in more than half her games (14) and a blistering 60 percent or higher in 12 of those contests.

2012-13 (Sophomore): Reese made a successful return from a freshman year eye injury, playing in all 32 games. One of the top bench players in the league, she earned honorable mention to the coach's All-Pac-12 team. She was third on the team in scoring (8.4 ppg) and rebounding (4.9 rpg) while hitting 42.5 percent from the field and a team-best 80.6 percent from the foul line. She was especially sharp from the foul line during conference play, sinking 85.3 percent (29-of-34) including a string of 17 straight. Reese scored a career-high 22 points in the comeback win at Arizona State (1/18), where the Buffaloes trailed by as much as 12 in the second half before claiming a 71-63 win. Against the Sun Devils she was 7-of-10 from the floor and recorded a personal and team season-best 8-for-8 from the free-throw stripe. She was especially sharp in the desert that weekend, netting 15 points and six rebounds against Arizona (1/20), tying a career best with seven field-goals made in each contest. She narrowly missed her second career double-double with 14 points and a season-high nine rebounds in the Omni Hotels championship game win over San Diego State (11/24). Her biggest single rebound however came in the final seconds of CU's 70-66 upset over No. 8/8 Louisville (12/14). With Colorado up by two and 11 seconds remaining, Brittany Wilson missed a pair of free throws, but on the second one Reese grabbed the offensive rebound and scored on the put-back to preserve the final margin. On the season she scored in double digits 14 times and led the team in scoring on four occasions. Reese made her only start of the season, for an injured Rachel Hargis, in the NCAA Tournament game against Kansas (3/23).

2011-12 (Freshman): Reese ranked second on the team in rebounding (6.0 rpg) and fourth in scoring (7.8 ppg) as a first year Buffalo. She led all Pac-12 freshmen in rebounding by average and earned honorable mention to the Pac-12 All-Freshman team voted on by league coaches. Reese played in 25 games and moved into the starting lineup for nine straight before suffering a broken orbital bone underneath her left eye while attempting to take a charge in the opening minutes of the game at No. 2 Stanford (2/23). She had come into her own, leading Colorado in rebounding (or sharing the lead) in six of the last nine games prior to her injury. Reese grabbed a career-best 14 rebounds against UCLA (1/29), the third highest total by a CU player this season. She made her first career start at Arizona, responding with 12 points and a team-high seven rebounds. Logged her first career double-double with 12 points, on 6-of-7 shooting, and 12 rebounds in the win at Washington State (1/7). She had 11 games with seven or more rebounds, including four in double-digits. Reese was named to the UTSA Holiday Classic All-Tournament Team, averaging 12.5 points over the two games while shooting 66.7 percent (10-of-15). She had a career-high 15 points on 6-of-9 shooting — including her lone 3-pointer made— in the win over Creighton (12/21). She made her collegiate debut against Northern Arizona scoring eight points on 3-of-6 from the field while grabbing three steals. Reese had 11 games of shooting 50 percent or better, finishing her season at 44.9 percent, which would have ranked among the top 12 in the Pac-12, but fell just short of the minimum number of games played to be ranked in the league leaderboard.

HIGH SCHOOL: Reese is a 2011 graduate of Clackamas (Ore.) High School. A 2011 *Parade Magazine* All-American, Reese averaged 25 points, 20 rebounds, six assists and five blocks as a senior guiding the Cavaliers to a 27-2 record and a second place state finish, the

program's best ever state placing. She became the first player to be named Oregon's Gatorade Girls Basketball Player of the Year on two occasions (2010, '11). Reese led the Three Rivers League in scoring as a senior, helping Clackamas to an undefeated (15-0) conference championship season, and a 25-game win streak along the way. She is a three-time Class 6A first team all-state selection and Three Rivers MVP and a four-time first team all-league selection. A 2011 McDonald's All-American nominee, Reese was the MVP of the state of Oregon and the school's Athlete of the Year. She was Oregon's second leading scorer her junior year (21 ppg) and its third leading scorer her sophomore year (20 ppg). As a freshman, Reese earned second-team all-state honors, averaging 12 points and five rebounds. Reese's teams compiled an overall four-year record of 70-17. She earned a spot in the CHS Hall of Fame before graduation. Reese played club ball with Team Concept from seventh through 12th grades, traveling all over the greater west. Her team took first place in tournaments in Las Vegas, San Diego, Seattle and Memphis.

Junior (2013-14): Had an outstanding to the beginning of her junior season, averaging 7.8 points and 4.6 rebounds over the first 14 games. She worked hard on her outside shot during the offseason and it began to pay dividends, hitting on 10-of-27 from 3-point range, a very respectable 37 percent. Sborov also came up clutch for the Buffaloes in a pair of early road games. In the season-opening 63-59 win at Colorado State (11/12) her career-best 13-point effort was highlighted by sinking two free throws with 27 seconds remaining to help the Buffaloes maintain a crucial 3-point lead. In another "regional rivalry" game, Sborov iced the contest against Wyoming (12/4) by hitting another pair of free throws, this time with :05 left on the clock to provide the final 63-59 margin. Sborov made 72.4 percent from the free-throw stripe in her abbreviated season, a stark contrast from being a 53 percent free throw shooter in her first two seasons. She scored in double-digits in seven contests, after having just three such efforts in her first 63 games, including an 11-point outing at UCLA (1/5) where she played a career-high 33 minutes and matched a personal-best with four field goals. She logged her first double-double with 12 points and a career-high 10 rebounds against Southern Utah (12/29). Sborov had upped her rebounding numbers to 7.0 over her final four games.



Following CU's last-minute 57-55 loss to No. 19 California (1/10), she missed the final 20 games of the season with a broken bone in her right foot.

Sophomore (2012-13): Sborov averaged 2.8 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.3 assists, appearing in 30 of 32 contests. She logged a total of 10 starts, six coming during the nonconference schedule and four more at the tail end of the Pac-12 season. Sborov was third on the team in assists with 38. She dished out a career-best four in the

home win over Oregon (2/10). The Ducks proved to bring the best out in Sborov as she scored eight in both games of the series, a personal-best during Pac-12 games. She scored a career-high 11 points, hitting 5-of-9 from the field, and grabbed six rebounds in the road win at Illinois (12/1). In that game she also set career marks for field goals made and attempted. Sborov corralled a personal-best eight rebounds in just 19 minutes at UMKC (11/18). She had two double-digit scoring games on the season, the other coming with 10 points against Texas A&M-Corpus Christi (11/23) in the first round of the Omni Hotels Classic. She had 14 games with four or more rebounds, including five against Kansas (3/23) in the NCAA Tournament.

Freshman (2011-12): Pitched in just under three points and three rebounds per games, but the season averages don't tell the story for Sborov's freshman year. She steadily climbed the ladder throughout the season, moving from the end of the bench, to a starter and key contributor in Colorado's postseason run. Sborov started the final nine games of the season, essentially taking the position of classmate Jen Reese who was lost for the season with an eye injury. She scored 84 of her season's 94 points in the final 20 games of the season and 24 of her season's 32 field goals came in the last 15. Sborov began to see extended action in the home game against No. 4 Stanford (1/14) and played double-digit minutes in all but two of the final 20 contests. She shot 47 percent (8-of-17) during CU's WNIT run averaging 5.8 points and 4.3 rebounds. She tied a career-best playing 29 minutes in the third round win over Villanova (3/22). Sborov had a career night in the home win over Arizona (2/9), setting personal bests with 10 points, on 4-of-6 shooting, with seven rebounds and three assists. She scored her first collegiate points

HIGH SCHOOL: Sborov is a 2011 graduate of Round Rock (Texas) High School. She was a was a four-time team MVP, three-time Offensive Player of the Year and two-time first-team all-district 16-5A selection. A McDonald's All-American nominee in 2011, Sborov helped the Dragons to the playoffs for the fourth straight season, averaging 15 points and eight rebounds per game. She led the Dragons to a 15-9 mark in 2010 averaging 12 points and eight rebounds, en route to all-district honors. Sborov led her team in blocks and rebounding while averaging 11 points as a sophomore, earning honorable mention to the all-district team. She averaged 11 points and seven rebounds as a freshman, leading Round Rock in blocked shots. She also lettered in track at Round Rock and set the school's high jump record at Regionals in 2010 with a 5 feet, 6 inches mark. She played club basketball with TeamXpress, helping them win a Nike Nationals tournament.

Arielle Roberson had entered the fall as strong as ever, having a full offseason of work outs after the previous two were slowed by injury rehabilitation. Unfortunately the injury bug bit again, however, as she fell victim to a torn ACL in her left knee during individual drills just one week before the beginning of fall practice. She will miss the 2014-15 season. Roberson was the last signee in Colorado's Class of 2011, waiting until the NCAA's normal signing period (April 2011) to pick the Buffaloes.

Career: Ranks 19th in career blocked shots with 57. She is 14th in career double-doubles with 10 and also 14th in double-figure rebounding games at 14. Her 464 career rebounds are the fourth best for a freshman/sophomore combined in team history.

2013-14 (Sophomore): Roberson led Colorado in scoring (12.0 ppg) and rebounding (8.3 rpg) while ranking second in blocked shots (1.0 bpg) and third in field-goal percentage (.458). She earned honorable mention to both the coaches All-Pac-12 Conference and All-Defensive teams. On the Pac-12 leaderboard, Roberson ranked fifth in offensive rebounds (3.4 orpg), ninth in blocks, overall rebounds and field-goal percentage, 14th in defensive rebounds (4.9 drpg) and 20th in scoring. Roberson had a team-high seven double-doubles, including a stretch of three straight (at Wyoming, Illinois, Denver) and four out of five during preseason action. During the first part of that stretch, she earned Pac-12 Player of the Week honors (12/9) averaging 15 points and 11 rebounds while hitting 48 percent from the field during wins at Wyoming (12/4) and Illinois (12/7). She then put in a third-straight outstanding effort with a season-high 22 points along with 10 rebounds against Denver (12/12). In that contest Roberson recorded career-highs by hitting 13-of-17 from the free-throw line; the 17 attempts tying for the second-most in team history. In five postseason games, Roberson shot



56 percent while averaging 10.2 points, 9.4 rebounds and 2.0 blocks. She had a monster game in the Pac-12 Tournament quarterfinal loss to No. 4/3 ranked Stanford (3/7). Roberson pulled down a career-high 17 rebounds; the most ever by a Buffalo in a postseason conference tournament game, tying the third-best overall postseason mark and tying for the 11th best overall single-game performance. Her rebounding efforts were strong the entire season, especially on the offensive end. Roberson's 109 offensive rebounds are the fourth-most by a Buff since the 1987-88 season (when the stat was first charted on a regular basis). Her 266 overall rebounds tied for 18th on CU's single-season list while her 8.3 per game average ranks 14th best in the team annals. Roberson scored in double digits in 19 of 32 games, hitting the 20-point mark

on three occasions. She started 31 of 32 contests, coming off the bench in the Omni Hotels Classic championship game against Rice (11/30) after missing the previous two contests with a concussion she sustained in the win over Iowa (11/20). She flirted with a triple-double in that game against the Hawkeyes, scoring 17 points with nine rebounds and a career-best six assists. While her scoring numbers stayed virtually even from her freshman-to-sophomore seasons, Roberson increased her rebounds by more than two per game and her assists by one per contest.

2012-13 (Freshman): The 2013 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year as voted on by league coaches, Roberson averaged 12.1 points and 6.2 rebounds per game. Her Freshman of the Year honor was the first of its kind for the Buffaloes in any conference. She led Colorado in free-throws made and attempted (97-of-142), ranked second in scoring and rebounding, third in blocked shots (24) and fourth in steals (32). Both the Pac-12 coaches and media members named her to their respective all-freshman teams. Roberson earned honorable mention to the overall Pac-12 All-Conference team as well as its all-defensive squad. She was touted as a third team Freshman All-American by FullCourtPress.com. Roberson ranked seventh in offensive rebounds, 16th in overall rebounds and 17th in scoring on the Pac-12 leaderboard. She dominated the Pac-12's Freshman of the Week honor. In its inaugural season, Roberson won five, including the very first, after recording 16 points, six rebounds and five steals in her collegiate debut against Idaho (11/11). Her five steals were the most by a CU player in her collegiate debut since Brittany Spears had five in 2007. Her five weekly conference awards in one season are the most by any Buffalo in the Big 12, Pac-12 era (since 1996-97). Roberson was the MVP of the Omni Hotels Classic, the first CU freshman to win that honor, averaging 16.5 points and 7.5 rebounds over the two-game series. She scored a career-high 25 points to lead Colorado in the win at Illinois (12/1), nailing a clutch 3-pointer in

the final minute to put the game away. Roberson hit 41.2 percent from 3-point range, the ninth-best single season mark in team history with a minimum of 50 attempts (21-of-51). She caught fire at the tail end of the season, making 13 of her last 25 (.520). She scored in double-digits 23 times, including the first 13 games which set a school record to start a CU career. Roberson led the Buffaloes in scoring on 10 occasions. She started in 31 of 32 games, coming off the bench against UMKC (11/18) and in that game she scored 23 points on 9-of-12 from the field. Her 23 points off the bench were the second most, and her nine field goals the most, for any Buffalo in the last 10 seasons. Roberson had three double-doubles, all of which came in the final seven games of the season, including an 11-point, 12-rebound performance against Kansas (3/23) in the NCAA Tournament. Her first double-double was a 17-point and personal-best 13-rebound effort against Washington State (2/22). The WSU game was her first of two on the season where she grabbed eight offensive rebounds; the other was her second double-double, a 10-point, 11-rebound performance in the overtime win at Oregon State in the regular season finale (3/3). She averaged 12.8 points and 8.5 rebounds over the final eight games.

2011-12 (Redshirt): Sat out the 2011-12 season after developing a torn labrum in her left hip during preseason workouts. She underwent successful surgery to repair the tear in December 2011.

HIGH SCHOOL: Roberson is a 2011 graduate of Wagner High School in San Antonio where she was a Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC) and Texas Girls Coaches Association (TGCA) All-State pick as a senior. She averaged 18.2 points, 9.7 rebounds, 2.7 assists, three steals and two blocks per game in 2011 while guiding Wagner to a 32-7 record, advancing to the semifinals of the Texas 5A State Tournament. A multiple all-region and all-district performer, Roberson also shot 57 percent from the field and 73 percent from the free-throw line as a senior. A two-time

member of the *San Antonio Express-News* All-City Super Team, Roberson finished her career at Wagner with 1,640 points. She was unanimously chosen as the District 25-5A MVP as a senior and was also a McDonald's All-American nominee and the MVP of the Lone Star Invitational Tournament. Roberson, who played in the TABC Girls All-Star Game in May 2011, was a part of three state tournament teams at Wagner sporting a four-year record of 133-15. Roberson also was a three-year letterwinner in volleyball. She played club basketball with TeamXpress.

ACADEMICS: Roberson is majoring in Communication at Colorado.

PERSONAL: Arielle Roberson, was born Jan. 20, 1993, in Grand Rapids, Mich. She is the daughter of John and Lisa Roberson. Her parents, John (basketball) and Lisa (volleyball), were both student-athletes at New Mexico State University. She is the fourth of seven Roberson siblings. Older brother Andre, who starred for three seasons with the Buffaloes (2010-13), is in his second year with the NBA's Oklahoma City Thunder after being selected by the Minnesota Timberwolves with the 26th pick of the first round in the 2013 NBA Draft (he was dealt to the Thunder on a draft day trade). Two older sisters competed in NCAA Division I intercollegiate athletics and are currently playing overseas in their respective sports. Ashlee was a three-year letterwinner in basketball at Texas Tech University (2007-10) and Amber played volleyball at the University of Texas (2008-11). A younger brother, Anthony, is a sophomore basketball player at Weatherford (Texas) Junior College. Her two youngest siblings are in grade school, Aaliyah (10) and Arianna (8). She would like a chance to play in the WNBA.

2013-14 (Sophomore): Led Colorado in both field-goal percentage (.505) and blocked shots (36) while ranking third in rebounding (5.3 rpg). On the Pac-12 Conference leaderboard, Swan was fifth in field-goal percentage, eighth in blocks (1.1 bpg) and 15th in offensive rebounds (2.4 orgp). She had 12 double-figure scoring games, and shot particularly well in those outings (76-of-128, 59.4 when in double figures). She shot 50 percent or better in 10 of those instances, including a 7-of-9 effort resulting in 16 points in the WNIT win over TCU (3/19). Swan netted a career-high 25 points in just 18 minutes in the home loss to Washington (2/14), hitting 9-of-12 from the field and 7-of-10 from the free-throw line. That career-best night was the middle game of a three-

game stretch where she scored 53 points in just 54 minutes (at Oregon, Washington, Washington State). Swan recorded her second career double-double with 20 points and a career-best 13 rebounds against No. 4 ranked Stanford (1/12). She had one other double-digit rebounding game, pulling down 10 in the Pac-12 Tournament first round win over UCLA (3/6). She had a memorable homecoming in Colorado's come-from-behind overtime win at Arizona (2/23). Swan scored 18 points, grabbed seven rebounds and recorded a career- and team season-high six steals against the Wildcats. She also hit a short jumper with 0.9 seconds remaining which

sent the game into overtime. Swan was only one of two Buffs (with Rachel Hargis) to appear in all 34 games. She logged eight starts, mostly coming in the early portion of the Pac-12 season.

2012-13 (Freshman): Swan led Colorado in field-goal accuracy at 45.5 percent (66-of-145) and ranked second in blocks (28) and fourth in rebounding (4.5 rpg). Her success from the field actually improved to 48.1 percent (39-of-81) during Pac-12 play and she was the team's third-best rebounder during the league schedule (4.6 rpg). Swan appeared in all 32 games and logged one start which came in the second contest of her career. In that game at UMKC (11/18), she scored 14 points on 6-of-9 from the field with three rebounds. Swan wasn't intimidated by the nation's best. At No. 6/6 Stanford (1/27) she scored 14 points while recording a personal-best 7-of-9 performance from the field. She had an outstanding Pac-12 Tournament, averaging 10.5 points, 8.0 rebounds and 2.0 blocks in games against Washington (3/8) and No. 4/4 ranked Stanford (3/9). Swan recorded her first career double-double with a personal-best 15 points to go along with 10 rebounds in the Pac-12 quarterfinal win over Washington. In all she scored in double-digits five times and grabbed double-digit rebounds on two occasions. Swan grabbed a career-best 11 rebounds in the home win over Utah (1/8), narrowly missing a double-double with eight points. She had a career-best four blocked shots in the NCAA Tournament game against Kansas (3/23).

High School: A 2012 graduate of Marana High School near Tucson, where she was highly regarded as the top prospect in the state of Arizona. She was ranked as the eighth best forward in the nation and the 38th best overall player by *ESPN HoopGurlz*.

Swan averaged 20.8 points, 12.8 rebounds, 3.4 blocks and 3.0 steals as a senior, earning All-Southern Arizona, first team All-Division I, and Division I Player of the Year honors from the *Tucson Citizen*. A 2012 *Sporting News* honorable mention All-American, she had a double-double in all but one contest with game highs of 42 points and 19 rebounds. Despite missing 10 games of her senior season with an injury, Swan received honorable mention to the WBCA All-America team and was a McDonald's All-America nominee. Swan averaged 19.6 points, 13.4 rebounds, 4.1 blocked shots and 4.1 steals for the Tigers as a junior, earning first team All-Southern Arizona and Southern Arizona 4A1 Player of the Year honors from the *Tucson Citizen*. She was also the *Arizona Daily Star* Player of the Year and a member of the Class 4A All-State first team. Swan was a 2009-10 Class 4A All-State performer as a sophomore, averaging 21.5 points, 15.2 rebounds and 6.3 blocks per game. Swan earned a total of 12 varsity letters at Marana, also participating in volleyball and track & field. She was the Arizona 2011 Division II state champion in the shot put. Swan played club basketball with the Arizona Elite out of Phoenix.

2013-14 (Freshman Medical Hardship):

Appeared in 26 games, all-off the bench, and ranked second on the team with 36 3-point field goals. Huggins was Colorado's most accurate long-range shooter, hitting on 36.4 percent beyond the arc, a mark good enough to rank 11th in the Pac-12 Conference. She scored a career-high 16 points in the win over Alcorn State (11/15), hitting a team season-best five 3-pointers. Huggins matched that output later in the season, during the home win over Arizona (1/24), she made 5-of-8 from downtown, finishing with 15 points. She had a good all-around game against Iowa (11/20), scoring nine points, on 3-of-6 from 3-point range, with a personal-best five rebounds to go with two assists and two steals. During that stretch of

Alcorn State, Iowa and at New Mexico (11/23), Huggins made 12-of-24 (.500) from downtown. She had nine games with at least two 3-pointers and hit one in each of Colorado's five postseason contests, making 7-of-13 during that run (.538).

2012-13 (Freshman): Huggins played in five games, averaging 2.4 points and 1.2 rebound in 6.0 minutes per game. She scored all

12 of her season's points on 3-pointers, connecting on 4-of-11 from downtown (.364). Her most extended time came against Colorado State (12/5) where she played 17 minutes and recorded six points, three rebounds, one steal and one blocked shot. Shortly after that game was when she was diagnosed with a stress fracture in her right leg that ultimately ended her season. She was granted a medical hardship by the NCAA in the Summer of 2013.

High School: A 2012 graduate of Heritage High School in Littleton, Huggins is the first Colorado signee for Linda Lappe's coaching staff. A two-time All-Continental League first team selection, Huggins helped the Eagles to an 18-7 record as a senior and a spot in the Sweet 16 of the Class 5A Colorado State Tournament. She was rated as the 64th best player in the nation and the 11th best wing by *ESPN HoopGurlz*. She starred at 2012 edition of "The Show" Colorado's annual high school basketball all-star game played at the Pepsi Center. Huggins was named MVP of the contest, scoring a game-high 15 points, hitting on 5-of-6 from 3-point range, in her "Blue" team's 69-48 win. As a junior she averaged 12 points and nearly eight rebounds per game, guiding the Eagles to the 2011 Class 5A Sweet 16. A two-time honorable mention to the Class 5A All-State team, she played her club basketball with the Boulder Rockies.

Academics: Huggins is majoring in integrative physiology at CU. She earned honorable mention to the 2014 Pac-12 Women's Basketball All-Academic team.

Personal: Born on March 28, 1994, she is the daughter of Jerry and Tracy Huggins of Littleton. She has two older sisters, Erin, a graduate of the Colorado School of Mines, and Megan a senior at CU.

Zoe Beard-Fails is a strong and competitive forward who has the ability to score on the inside with a variety of post moves, but can also step outside and hit from 3-point range. She earned valuable time as a true freshman, especially down the stretch of Colorado's postseason run. Colorado's third Virginia native, Beard-Fails showed she can play well in a crowded post area, winning plenty of 50-50 balls and converting in traffic.

2013-14 (Freshman): Played in 27 games as a first-year Buffalo, averaging just under three points per outing. She shot well on limited opportunities, hitting 52.8 percent from the field (28-of-53) as most of her offense came directly off the blocks. Her time on the court increased considerably down the stretch playing in 18 of the last 19 games including the final 10. She scored a career-best 10 points on 5-of-6 shooting in just nine minutes in the regular season finale against USC (3/2). Beard-Fails scored just over half (17) of her points during the Pac-12 season (33) in the final five regular season games. She took that momentum into the postseason, with several solid performances. Beard-Fails established personal bests hitting 5-of-6 from the free-throw line in the Pac-12 Tournament first round win over UCLA (3/6). Against TCU in the first round of the WNIT (3/19) she tied for the team lead in rebounds with six, a personal-best. In the second round against win over Southern Utah (3/22) Beard-Fails recorded three blocked shots, accounting for her season total.

the District of Columbia Interscholastic Athletic Association (DCIAA) state championship. She owns school single-game records for points (42), rebounds (27), free-throws made (22) and free-throws attempted (24). Beard-Fails was a 2013 *Washington Post* "All-Met" Third Team selection and named to the Independent School League All-Conference team. Additionally, she claimed the Alain-Ciaco Sportsmanship Award and was a McDonald's All-America nominee. Desiree Harris is a smart, athletic combo guard who can get to the rim off the dribble as well as hit the 3-pointer. She is a high-character student-athlete with a tremendous work ethic. The Colorado staff likes her ability to defend both guard positions. She had a chance to learn from an experienced group as a freshman and looks to increase her playing time.

2013-14 (Freshman): Harris appeared in 15 contests, averaging just a little under five minutes played per game as she was able to learn and grow behind a deep and experienced Colorado back court. She scored one field goal on the season, but it was a memorable one. She converted on a layup driving through the Arizona defense during Colorado's rally from a 16-point deficit halftime to win in overtime. Haley Smith's introduction into college basketball came a little quicker than her peers. Injuries played a role in Smith learning the ropes of the Pac-12 by fire. She persevered through the growing pains and is ready to take the next step in her development. She is a strong, athletic wing who can elevate over smaller players with a nice true jump shot. Just the second Washington native in program history, Smith is an outstanding student as well and has all the right tools to have a successful career in a Colorado uniform.

2013-14 (Freshman): Averaged 3.5 points, 2.3 rebounds and just over one assist as a first year Buffalo. She was thrust into a starting role during the early part of the Pac-12 Conference season, once junior Jasmine Sborov was lost for the season with a foot injury. Smith started the final 20 games of the season and saw her numbers increase to 4.9 points, 3.1 rebounds and 1.3 assists in that role. Her all-around game picked up piece-by-piece as the season went along. Her first career start came against defending Pac-12 champion and No. 4 ranked Stanford (1/12), and while her numbers were minimal, two points in 17 minutes, Smith began a foundation to build on. One week later, in front of her home town team, she grabbed seven rebounds and made her first career 3-pointer at Washington (1/19). She just missed a double-double by scoring eight points and grabbing a personal-best eight rebounds in the home win over Utah (2/2). Smith registered career numbers in the home win over UCLA (2/28), scoring 11 points on 5-of-10 shooting and matched her personal best with eight rebounds. Smith averaged 6.6 points over five postseason games. She put on a gutsy performance in the Pac-12 Tournament quarterfinal loss to No. 4/3 Stanford (3/7). Battling flu-like symptoms, she recorded her

Alina Hartmann is the latest addition to the Colorado Buffaloes, signing on in April 2014. She plays with an up tempo style which fits the team very well. Hartmann also brings a wealth of international experience from her national teams. She'll be the 15th international player to suit up for the Buffaloes; the 11th from Europe and first from Germany.

Club Basketball: Hartmann is a 2014 graduate of Kaiser-Heinrich-Gymnasium in Bamberg. Her basketball upbringing has come on the club circuit and international play as the high school level is not played in Germany. She played for DJK Brose Bamberg, a club team which competes in the 1st German Division. In 22 games for Bamberg in 2013-14 she averaged 9.8 points and 5.2 rebounds while hitting 42.5 percent from the field. Hartmann led Bamberg with 29 3-point field-goals, hitting a solid 42.6 percent beyond the arc, and ranked second on the team in rebounds and third in scoring. She averaged 7.7 points for Bamberg in both the 2011-12 and 2012-13 seasons.

German National Team: A veteran of Germany's junior national basketball program, Hartmann averaged 8.2 points, 3.8 rebounds and 2.0 assists to help her team to a first place showing at the 2014 U20 European Championship for Women Division B in Sofia, Bulgaria, with an 8-1 record. She scored 14 points on 6-of-10 shooting against Bosnia and Herzegovina, in a 68-50 win that ensured Germany a promotion into the A Division for the U20 tournament. Hartmann played in six games for her country which placed 10th at the 2013 U18 European Championships, Division B, in Miskolc, Hungary. She starred for Germany's gold medal winning team at the 2011 U16 European Championships, Division B, in Arad, Romania. Hartmann averaged 10.4 points, 7.2 rebounds and 2.0 steals as team Germany swept the competition with a 9-0 mark. Hartmann scored 18 points on 46.7 percent from the field (7-of-15) and grabbed seven rebounds in a 71-64 semifinal win over Bulgaria; a win which earned Germany, along with fellow finalist England, a promotion into the A Division. In the gold medal game, Hartmann had nine points and seven rebounds in a 66-63 win over England. She was also on Germany's U16 European Championships team in 2010, appearing in five games. Hartmann was invited to practice with Germany's senior national team this past summer.



Academics: Hartmann is an International Affairs major at Colorado and is also interested in Communication.

Thomas averaged 17.3 points, 4.2 steals and 3.8 assists as a sophomore as the Falcons finished 31-3, setting a school record for wins and claiming their first of two straight SPC crowns. A McDonald's All-American nominee, she was ranked as the 25th best point guard in the nation by *ESPN HoopGurlz*. Thomas played in the TABC All-Star game, was the MVP of the Westbury Christian Rotary Tournament and on the All-Tournament team for the HISD Tournament. Thomas also lettered twice in track & field, participating in the 100 meters, shot put and triple jump, and in softball where she played center field. She played club basketball for the DFW Elite program.
