

SPRING FOOTBALL HISTORY

For 40 years, spring practice traditionally ended with a game between the Colorado Varsity and Alumni. Back at the turn of the century, an Alumni team usually served as the season opener for the varsity (13 times all told, with the Varsity owning an 11-0-2 edge in those games). The Varsity held a 20-3 edge in the old format of the spring series, which started back in 1953 under then head coach Dal Ward. After a pair of games, the series became dormant until 1963 when it was revived by Eddie Crowder. There was no game between 1974 and 1976, and the 1978 game was cancelled due to a blizzard.

A new format for the Varsity-Alumni game (implemented in 1988) had the alumni playing in the first and third quarters, with the first team of the varsity playing the second and fourth quarters. They were pitted against the second- and third-team members of the varsity, resulting in a competitive and fun game. The alumni and first-team varsity always wore black. This format was discontinued following 1992 for competitive reasons.

COLORADO PERSONNEL HISTORY

The University of Colorado has been blessed with a fiercely loyal athletic staff through the years, starting right at the top. CU has had only five faculty representatives since the end of World War II and has had but four athletic directors in its history. Not including coaches, 21 people have worked at least 15 years for the athletic department in various capacities. Five have worked over three decades: athletic director **Harry Carlson** (38 years), current associate AD **Jon Burianek** (37), sports information director and assistant/associate athletic director **Fred Casotti** (35), equipment manager **Silver Akins** (34), and business manager/assistant AD **Kayo Lam** (31). The most famous all-time short stint at CU? That could be **Wayne Duke**, who was SID for a year (1950) before eventually becoming commissioner of the Big Ten Conference. Here's a look at who's held some of the more notable managerial and support positions in the history of CU athletics:

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

JON BURIANEK



Senior Associate Athletic Director/Facilities Development & Business Affairs

Jon Burianek is in his 37th year with the CU athletic department, his 22nd as the associate athletic director for internal affairs. He was named a senior associate AD on July 1, 1999, with the added responsibility of facilities development to his role.

Burianek, 59, was also CU's athletic ticket manager from 1970 to 1987. He assumed those duties in 1970, as he is truly one of the athletic department's "home grown" veterans. His first job was a student assistant in the business office while

attending CU in the late 1960s. After becoming ticket manager, his duties were expanded in 1979, as he became an assistant athletic director.

He attended the University of Colorado and was a chemistry major, and also attended the University of Oslo (Norway) as a junior in 1966-67, studying in the same field. When he returned to Boulder that summer, he began working in athletics, and the following year, he became basketball ticket manager while still an undergraduate.

In fact, his 36 years of full-time service to the department now ranks second all-time among non-coaches at the University and third overall. CU's first athletic director, Harry Carlson, spent 38 years with the program; Frank Potts, who coached the cross country and track teams for 41 years, is the only other person to serve CU athletics longer. In 1984, Burianek was awarded the "Honorary C" for his contributions to CU athletics.

Entering 2004, he has worked 389 consecutive CU football games (home, road and neutral), as the streak started with Colorado's 49-19 win at Air Force in 1970. He stopped counting long ago how many men's and women's basketball and volleyball games he has worked... after reaching 1,000 (the number is likely approaching 1,500).

Burianek was the tournament manager for the 1985, 1989 and 1996 NCAA West Regionals, hosted by the University and held in Denver, and served in a similar capacity for the 1990 Final Four. He is a past president of the Collegiate Athletic Business Management Association, and has been an officer in the organization since 1985.

Born August 29, 1945 in Chicago, Ill., Burianek attended Pueblo South High School where he lettered in cross country, track, and golf. He is married to the former Nancy Tilden of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. They have three children, Amanda Miller, Jason (24, who lettered in football at CU and is now a high school coach in Illinois) and Elsa (21). The Burianek family resides on a farm on the outskirts of Boulder, and they raise cattle and pigs and participate regularly in stock shows around the region.

JOHN MEADOWS



Senior Associate Athletic Director/External Affairs

John Meadows is in his sixth year as the senior associate athletic director for external affairs, as he joined the Colorado staff on February 1, 1999.

Meadows, 61, was a long-time executive with the Coors Brewing Company. He worked for over 33 years at Coors' main operation in Golden, retiring in early 1999 as the director of corporate relations, a position he held since 1984. In that role, he coordinated marketing and promotions, including building local, regional and national relationships with community

leaders in a number of cities. He also worked with different local chapters in the area of community relations with organizations such as the Urban League and the National Council of LaRasa.

He was also responsible for setting forth relationships with a variety of colleges and universities around the country, primarily in the markets where Coors had breweries (Colorado, Virginia and Tennessee). He developed corporate contributions and strategies with almost a dozen schools.

He started at Coors in 1965 as an ironworker apprentice. He went into brewery administration a year later, and spent a number of years (1966-81) working in employee, labor and industrial relations. He then spent four years (1981-84) as a manager in Coors' corporate relations department, and was named the director of the same area in 1984. In his last four years at Coors, he developed and implemented strategies for Coors in diversity management.

A long-time Boulder resident, Meadows has plenty of ties to CU. He lettered for the Buffs once in football, playing tight end and defensive end in 1960 and 1961. A history major, as a sophomore he was a member of CU's 1961 Big Eight championship team that went to the Orange Bowl. He caught three passes for 24 yards in the 25-7 loss to Louisiana State in that game

Born January 31, 1943 in Detroit, he graduated from Royal Oak High School, where he lettered in football, basketball and track. He is married to the former Lindalu Parker, a CU graduate, and they have four children, Robert, Brooke, Dodge and Sara. He is a former board member of the National Council of LaRasa and the Denver Urban League, two community service organizations. He is also currently on the advisory board for the Sportswomen of Colorado, and is a former board member of the Women's Sports Foundation.

CHRIS MAY



Associate Athletic Director/ Sport Programs & Revenue Development

Chris May is in his sixth year as an associate athletic director, his second for sport programs and revenue development.

He was promoted to associate AD for marketing and revenue development on July 1, 1999, and in November 2002, he took on administrative and supervisory responsibilities for men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and women's soccer. He was also given administrative responsibility for

men's basketball and was promoted to the senior management team for the department.

He is in his 20th year in the athletic department, as he joined CU in September 1985 as a ticket office staff member. Four months later, he switched roles and was named special assistant to the associate athletic director. He was named promotions director the following June (1986), when he also took over management of the athletic department's executive car club. He was promoted to assistant athletic director for marketing and promotions on July 1, 1990, and spent nine years in that capacity.

He oversees the entire marketing and promotions area, which generates over \$3 million annually from radio, television, signage and event sponsorships and sales, licensing, event development and the new video display boards, which were first installed for the 1999 season at Folsom Field. Also included in his duties are working with KCNC-TV and KOA-Radio, CU's official television and radio stations.

In 2002, May orchestrated a seven-year agreement with Learfield Sports to outsource the multi-media rights for all CU sports programming. Those rights include radio (Clear Channel), television (AT&T Broadband) and all in-stadium/arena sponsorships.

He is the committee co-chair for Athletics 2010, the department's strategic plan that serves as the blueprint for the future that includes four main goals of education, winning, facilities and culture. He is also the department's liaison for the Mile High Showdown, the annual football game against in-state rival Colorado State (held for six years in Denver before returning to the Boulder campus in 2004).

May, 41, graduated from Iowa State University with a B.S. degree in marketing in 1985. He lettered twice in track at Iowa State, running the 800-meters and on the relay teams. He earned his master's from CU in business administration in August 1988.

Born March 12, 1963 in Princeton, Ill., he graduated from Muscatine (Iowa) High School, where he lettered in cross country, track and basketball. He was inducted into Muscatine's Sports Hall of Fame in August 2002 for his role on the school's only undefeated 4x800 relay team. He is married to the former Joanne Crone, and they have two children, Lucy (9) and Jack (7).

KAREN MORRISON



Associate Athletic Director/ Compliance, Financial Aid & SWA

Karen Morrison is in her fifth year as associate athletic director at the University of Colorado, as she was promoted to the position on August 9, 2000. She was the assistant athletic director for compliance for two years prior to her promotion, and is in her 14th year overall associated with the CU athletic program. In 1998, she was also named CU's Senior Woman Administrator.

Morrison, 43, oversees several CU sport programs – women's basketball, volleyball, men's and women's skiing, men's and

women's golf and men's and women's tennis. She also directs the compliance and financial aid programs. Other aspects of her role include Title IX compliance, NCAA Certification and service on several department and conference committees. She is also a member of the senior management team for the department.

Morrison is on the NCAA Women's Basketball Selection Committee, being placed on the 10-member working board starting the 2000-01 season and is serving a five-year term. She is in her second year as the liaison from the Women's Basketball Committee to the NCAA's Women's Basketball Issues Committee. She also served as the Big 12 representative on the NCAA Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, spending four years on the NCAA Interpretations subcommittee of the Cabinet.

Morrison was appointed to the position in March 1997, after working as the assistant compliance coordinator since April 1996. Prior to that, she was an assistant coach for six seasons for Ceal Barry and the CU women's basketball team. She was on the staff of five Big Eight champion teams (regular or postseason), and two Elite Eight squads. She played a major role in the Buffs securing four top 20 recruiting classes and handled scheduling chores.

She also was an instructor in kinesiology for two years on the CU campus (1989-91), and worked for two years as an attorney with the Fort Collins law firm of Frey, Lach & Michaels, P.C.

Associate Athletic Director/Development

Andrew Plenn is wrapping up his first year on the Colorado staff, as he was named associate athletic director for development on November 25, 2003. He is responsible for all aspects of athletic fund raising, including major gifts, endowments, capital projects and the annual fund.

Plenn, 37, came to CU from his alma mater, the University of Maryland, where he was director of advancement projects for two years (1997-98) and the executive director of the Terrapin Club for five (1998-2003) before being promoted to assistant

athletic director for the annual fund in June 2003.

At Maryland, Plenn was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the annual scholarship fundraising program, special events, donor stewardship and benefit administration for the 7,800-member organization. He was a lead member of the development staff that exceeded its goal and raised more than \$20 million in private gifts towards the construction of Maryland's state-of-the-art Comcast Center. His event experience in coordinating donor related activities includes the 2002 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2002 Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl, 2002 Kickoff Classic and the 2001 and 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Final Fours. Membership in the Terrapin Club increased by 100 percent and scholarship contri-

butions increased over that percentage under his leadership. Prior to serving as the executive director, he worked as the department's director of advancement projects from 1997-98.

He earned a bachelor's degree in journalism with a concentration in public relations from Maryland in 1990. Before joining the athletic department on Maryland's College Park campus in 1997, he worked in the development offices at University of Maryland-Baltimore County (1991-92), Bishop McNamara High School (1992-96) and Villanova University (1996-97).

RUPH GEBRE-MARIAM



Assistant Athletic Director/Ticketing

Ruph Gebre-Mariam is his first year as CU's assistant athletic director for ticketing, as he was named to the position on May 28, 2004. It's his second "tour of duty" with athletics, as he first worked with the department as an undergraduate and then full-time upon his graduation. He is just the ninth ticket manager in CU's athletic history.

Gebre-Mariam, 36, graduated with a degree in marketing and international business from the University of Colorado in 1990. As a student, he worked in the ath-

JOHN KRUEGER



Assistant Athletic Director/Facilities

John Krueger is in his 19th year as a member of the athletic department, his sixth year as the assistant athletic director for facilities as he was promoted on July 1, 1999. In his position, he also continues to oversee CU's athletic facilities and grounds, the position he first was hired full-time for on August 1, 1986.

Krueger, 40, is responsible for all maintenance and scheduling for all facilities and grounds, as well as set-up procedures for athletic and special events. He also is the

liaison for events such as the Bolder Boulder, the Fourth of July Fireworks and numerous concerts and graduations. As a student at CU, he worked four years under the facilities director, first working for Mark Simpson as a freshman in 1982.

He was born October 11, 1963 in Oak Park, Ill. He graduated from Lyons Township High School (LaGrange, Ill.) in 1981, and graduated from CU in 1986 with a B.S. degree in economics. In his new role he is the chapter's liaison to the University and Western Golf Association and

MARK NELSON



Assistant Athletic Director/Academic Support Services

Mark Nelson is in his fifth year as the assistant athletic director for academic support services, as he joined the Colorado staff on May 30, 2000. He oversees all aspects of the academic needs of CU's 300-plus student-athletes.

Nelson, 40, came to CU from Utah State University, where he had spent five years as the Aggies' assistant athletic director for student services. He accepted the position under very difficult circumstances, as it

had been vacant for nearly a year and he had to reorganize it from practically square one. Prior to his position at USU, he worked three years as the academic advisor at Muskingum College, a Division III school in New Concord, Ohio.

He is a member of a newly formed national committee through the N4A (National Association for Academic Advisors in Athletics) and the NFL Continuing Education program. He is involved in looking at ways to enhance the working relationship between N4A and the NFL in helping former football student-athletes return to school and obtain their degrees. He is also the chair for the Big 12 Conference Director's of Student-Athlete Support Services Committee for 2004-05, and has been a member of the N4A Legislative Affairs Committee for the past nine years.

He graduated from Bowling Green State University in 1988, earning his bachelor's degree in social work. He was a two-time all-Mid American Conference offensive tackle at BGSU, and as a junior, he was on the Falcons' 11-1 team in 1985 that lost to Fresno State in the California Bowl but at one time was ranked No. 18 in the nation. He signed as a free agent with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1987 and participated in training camp. Following the completion of his undergraduate degree, he worked four years as a substance abuse counselor at The Toledo Hospital, in conjunction with earning his master's degree in rehabilitation counseling in 1992.

Born June 22, 1964 in Grand Forks, N.D., he graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School (Bloomington, Minn.) in 1982, lettering in football, basketball and track. He was a member of the state high school champion basketball team in 1982, unknowingly having some tie to his future CU job. CU skier Eric Meyer was also a T.J. alum, while the school it beat for the title, Duluth East, eventually produced CU track stars Kara and Kendall Wheeler. He is married to the former Jacquie Gierl, and they have three children, Lindsay (12), Jessica (10) and Kyle (6).

DAVID PLATI



Assistant Athletic Director/ Media Relations

David Plati is in his 21st year as the athletic department's director of media relations, and his 27th year overall in CU's Athletic Media Relations Office. He was promoted to assistant athletic director for media relations on July 1, 1988.

Plati, 44, assumed his current role on July 27, 1984, after serving for three years as the assistant SID. The youngest SID in the nation at the time of his hiring, he previously worked as a student assistant and statistician since coming to CU as a

freshman in 1978. He is now the dean of SID's in the Big 12 Conference.

Plati is also an adjunct instructor in CU's School of Journalism, teaching a sports media relations class, and since April 2001 has been CU's representative on the board of directors of the Colorado Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame.

While attending CU, Plati served four years as the information director for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. He also worked for the Colorado Golf Association and for the *Rocky Mountain News*.

He spent his senior year in college (1982) as the public relations director with the triple-A Denver Bears Baseball Club of the American Association. He has been a member of the Denver Broncos statistics crew since 1980 (and received game balls from the NFL team for their back-to-back Super Bowl wins). In the 1980s, he worked as a statistician for TBS for NBA telecasts and continues to work freelance for several networks, both television and radio, in a similar capacity. In 2004, he was appointed by major league baseball to serve as one of three official scorers for the Colorado Rockies baseball team.

He has worked as the media relations liaison for the Bolder Boulder 10K since 1987, and also served as a media relations assistant for the Colorado Open Golf Tournament for 12 years (1980-1991). He was the media coordinator for the 1985, 1989 and 1996 NCAA West Regionals, and was the local media coordinator and NCAA liaison for the 1990 Final Four. He also was the Hula Bowl's director of game week communications for four years (1995-98).

Plati co-founded the Rocky Mountain Athletic Media Relations Directors Association (RMARA) in 1989 with Bronco PR director Jim Saccomano, and basically serves as the group's executive director.

He graduated with a bachelor's degree in public relations, along with a minor in geography, from CU in 1982. He was a member of the journalism student council and wrote for *The Campus Press*.

Born April 19, 1960 in New Rochelle, N.Y., Plati graduated from Woodlands High School (Hartsdale, N.Y.) in 1978, where he lettered in football and golf (and was also the school's SID his senior year). In 1984, he was awarded an "Honorary C" for his service to Colorado athletics. His younger brother (Mark) was nominated for two Grammy Awards with David Bowie in 1998 (he was a guitarist in Bowie's band for five years), and also engineered the Song-of-the-Year for 1997 (Shawn Colvin's "Sunny Came Home"). BRIAN WINKELBAUER



Assistant Athletic Director/ Student Services

Brian Winkelbauer is in his fifth year as the assistant athletic director for student services, as he was promoted to the position on August 9, 2000. He is in his 11th year overall as a member of the CU athletic staff.

Winkelbauer, 36, has primary responsibilities in the area of student services, including sports medicine, strength and conditioning, equipment, sports video, life skills and training table. He is also the staff advisor of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (or SAAC).

The student-athletes selected him as the Year for his contributions and time ded-

the 2001-02 Staff Member of the Year for his contributions and time dedicated to the success of the members of CU's 17 intercollegiate programs.

He worked five years as the special assistant to the athletic director, as he was appointed to the position in February 1996. He was hired by then-athletic director Bill Marolt to the newly created position, and then continued in that capacity under Dick Tharp. He had previously worked two years as the business manager for the Golden Buffalo Scholarship Fund. He first joined the CU staff from Wasson High School in Colorado Springs, where he taught instrumental music for two years.

MIKE SMITH



Director of Equipment

Mike Smith is in his sixth year as director of equipment, and his 10th year as football equipment manager, as he was hired full-time on August 1, 1995. He is an EMC, or certified equipment manager, a status he has earned for his years of service in the profession.

He also works closely with NIKE, as CU and the sports shoe and apparel giant have been partners since 1996. He has worked with NIKE to help create new technologies that the CU football program has been the first to experiment with.

Smith, 34, returned to his alma mater from Utah State University, where he was head equipment director for one year. Prior to his employment in the Aggies athletic department, he worked for IN2 Sports for two years as a team sales specialist.

He has also worked five Hula bowls (1998-2001, 2004) as its equipment and operations manager, coordinating the many needs of almost 100 of college football's most outstanding players.

Justina Boyd is in her second year on the Colorado athletic staff, having joined the Buffaloes in March 2003 as the school's first-ever director of the CU CHAMPS Life Skills Program.

Her primary focus is to coordinate programming in the area of personal development, career development and campus and community service for CU's 300-plus student-athletes, all while working in harmony with academic and athletic commitment.

Kristin Colon is in her 12th year in the CU athletic department, her ninth as the Golden Buffalo Scholarship Fund Director. She had worked the previous three years as the director of the Golden Buffalo Volunteer Network prior to her promotion

Colon, 37, started working in the department as an intern in November, 1992, after working three years as Travel Director with Maritz Travel, based out of St. Louis, Mo.

She graduated from Scripps College in 1989 with a bachelor's degree in psychol-

ogy, with an emphasis in communications. At Scripps, she lettered four times in soccer, earning all-conference honors three times, and also participated in water polo for three years. Director of Sports Video

Tom Doyle is in his sixth year as director of sports video, returning to the CU staff for his second "tour of duty" in August 1999. He oversees the day-to-day operations of scouting video for all varsity sports

Doyle, 42, was CU's assistant director of sports video in 1996 and 1997 under Bill Wong before serving as the director of football video at the University of North Carolina for the 1998 season. Prior to coming to CU for the first time, he was the video coordinator at his alma mater, East Carolina for six years (1991-96). He gradu-

ated from ECU with a bachelor's degree in communications in 1991.

He is a 12-year veteran of producing videos for coaching staff uses in scouting and evaluation, as his expertise led to him serving as a two-time vice president of the Collegiate Sports Video Association, a professional group of national video directors. DAVE GIORDANO



Director of Sales & Marketing/ Club Seats & Suites

Dave Giordano is in his fourth year as the director of sales and marketing for CU's club seats and suites. The construction of the new structure atop the east side of Folsom Field was completed prior to the 2003 season.



BILL HARRIS



Alumni C-Club Director

Bill Harris is in his fourth year as the Alumni C Club Director, as he was named to the position in May 2001. He is responsible for developing relationships with letterwinners in all sports, maintain communication with them, provide opportunities for them to return to campus and coordinate various alumni functions and activities.

Harris, 62, has continued on a part-time basis in CU's Alumni Association office, where he has been working since October 2000, to strengthen the Black Alumni Association on campus.

Also known as "Buffalo" Bill Harris, he lettered three times in football at CU between 1961 and 1963, leading the team in rushing as a junior with 582 yards in 1962. He is one of 47 play-

ers in school history to have rushed for over 1,000 yards in a CU career, as he is 26th on the all-time list with 1,486. He still stands 24th all-time in all-purpose yards, as he amassed 2,411 via rushing, receiving and returns. (For a peek at what Bill looked like as a student, refer to the H's under all-time lettermen.)

He relocated back to Colorado in 2000 from Paramus, N.J., where had resided since 1974. He was a healthcare executive for over 25 years, with extensive experience in administering acute medicine, as well as long-term and ambulatory care, personnel, community medical outreach programs and regulatory agencies. He spent most of that time as an administrator at the Bergen Pines Community Hospital before completing his medical career as the vice president of operations for the Bergen (County) Regional Medical Center where he oversaw a \$25 million budget. He also was active in the community, ranging from New Jersey Supreme Court Arbitrary Committee and Community Chest work to 14 years coaching little league baseball.

An at-large member on the board of the Colorado chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame, he was a board member for several years for the Bergen County chapter and received their Distinguished American Award in 2001.

He attended CU from 1960 through 1964, but finished up his bachelor's degree in Education at Montclair (N.J.) State University in 1968, and then earned his master's in both Sociology and Business from MSU in 1972.

Following his playing days at CU, he was drafted by the NFL's New York Giants. He went on to play three years in the Canadian Football League, for Ottawa in 1964 and then Calgary in 1965-66.

Born May 30, 1942 in New Jersey, he is a graduate of Hackensack High School. He is married (Susan), is the father of two, son Trevor and daughter Lisa, and is the grandfather of two.

PREMA KHANNA



Director of Marketing

Prema Khanna is in her first year as CU's director of marketing, as she was promoted to the position July 7, 2004. She is in her third year overall the department, having worked two years as promotions manager for the Buffaloes after joining the staff in August 2002. She is responsible for coordinating marketing efforts for football, basketball and volleyball ticket sales, as well as promotions both on and-off the fields and courts, including game day atmosphere.

Khanna, 33, came to Colorado from Texas Tech, where she worked two years as

the director of marketing and promotions. She got her start at Missouri, her alma mater, as a graduate assistant in 1995, and was hired full-time the following year as marketing and promotions coordinator. In 1997, she was promoted to assistant director of marketing and held that position for the next three years before moving on to Texas Tech in 2000.

She graduated from the University of Missouri with a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1995, and earned her master's degree in sports administration from MU in 1997.

DERIC SWANSON



Director of BuffVision

Deric Swanson is in his sixth year as the Director of BuffVision, coordinating all aspects of production involving the \$3.6 million video display board operation for athletics (first installed at Folsom Field for the 1999 season). He's the only BuffVision director CU has ever had.

Swanson, 30, came to CU from Ascent Sports, Inc., in Denver, where he had worked for a brief time as the manager of game entertainment and video production. He had previously worked three-plus seasons with the Colorado Rockies Baseball Club, first as a stadium camera operator,

and then as video production coordinator, including shooting, editing, producing and directing features and programming. He also worked the 1998 Major League Baseball All-Star Game at Coors Field, shooting and scripting special features leading up to and following the event.

In 2003, CU won a Golden Matrix Award for "Best Overall Video Display" in the university division at the Information Display and Entertainment Association (IDEA) conference in Atlanta. He was present to accept the award, along with assistant Jim Fairchild. The following year, BuffVision was awarded two distinctions for the 2004 Aurora Awards, a Platinum Best of Show statue for BuffVision In-Game Entertainment Graphics/Design and a Gold Award for The Buffalo Stampede, CU's coaches' show.

In 2004, he was selected as the CU Athletic Staff Member of the Year by the Student-Athletic Advisory Committee, and was honored with a CUSPY Award for the honor.

He has worked as an independent contractor with the NFL's Denver Broncos and the NHL's Colorado Avalanche, working for the latter as an in-game director for the 1998-99 season. He also works as a freelance photojournalist, producer and editor, handling video production for private business and community groups. His clients have included Winter Park Resorts, US West, Colorado State University, the National Sports Center for the Disabled, and Colorado Time Systems.

He has worked numerous times as a production assistant for regional sports productions, including for Turner Sports, Mountain Mobile Productions and TCI Digital TV.

He is a 1996 graduate of Colorado State University, earning his bachelor's degree in technical journalism and broadcasting. He graduated Magna Cum Laude.

He was born May 24, 1974 in Oakland, Calif., and attended two high schools. His father was stationed in the Azores, Portugal, and he spent two years at Lajes High School, where he lettered in football, soccer, volleyball and basketball. After moving to Colorado, he graduated from Liberty High School in Colorado Springs, where he lettered in football.

He played volleyball on CSU's club team for three years. He is single

LISA VAN GOOR



Events Coordinator

Lisa Van Goor is in her fifth year as CU's events coordinator, joining the athletic department staff on August 15, 2000.

She didn't have to travel very far from her previous job, as she had worked for one year as the events coordinator for the School of Arts & Sciences with the University of Colorado Foundation.

She was a member of the second class to be inducted into CU's Athletic Hall of Fame, entering in 1999 with Gil Cruter, Burdie Haldorson, Kayo Lam and Joe Romig; that quintet joined the late Byron White, the sole inductee in the inaugural

class, as the first six to be honored with induction.

Van Goor, 42, lettered four years in basketball at Colorado between 1981 and 1985, and her number 25 is one of just three jerseys officially honored for the sport at CU and the only one for the women. She is still CU's all-time leading scorer (2,067 points), rebounder (1,154) and blocked shot leader (289). An all-Big Eight performer for 1982-83, she was named to the conference's honorable mention all-decade team for the 1980s as she was one of the most dominant performers in early days of NCAA Division I women's basketball. She graduated from CU with a degree in EPO biology in 1986.

She enjoyed a seven-year career playing professional in Europe, as she was on six different teams in three countries: Spain, Italy and France. An all-star performer, she was once second in the league in scoring while playing with Kerrygold, based in Las Palmas in the Canary Islands. Spain.


She graduated from Elmira College in 1999 with her bachelor's degree in business


FOOTBALL STATISTICS CREW

Team Physician

Dr. Eric McCarty is in his second year working with the CU athletic program, joining the sports medicine team in July 2003. But he's certainly no stranger to the University or to Boulder.

McCarty, 39, accepted the Chief of Sports Medicine and Shoulder Surgery position in the Department of Orthopedics at CU's Health Sciences Center in Denver, enabling him to return to his home state where he starred as both a prep and collegian.

He earned his M.D., with honors, in 1993 from the University of Colorado School of Medicine in Denver, and did his internship residency at Vanderbilt in orthopedic surgery between 1993 and 1998. Shortly thereafter, he spent a year at The Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City, where he received a fellowship in sports medicine and shoulder surgery. While residing in New York, he worked with the NFL's New York Giants.

McCarty has been the recipient of over three dozen awards in his professional career, and has had papers published on 15 occasions while contributing to several others.

SPEED-STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

GREG FINNEGAN



Director of Speed-Strength & Conditioning

Greg Finnegan is in his second year as Colorado's director of speed-strength and conditioning, joining the Buffalo staff on May 28, 2003 after serving five years as the assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars of the National Football League.

Finnegan, 35, is no stranger to college athletics, as prior to working five seasons with the Jaguars, he spent two-and-a-half years as the director of Speed, Strength & Conditioning at Boston College. Prior to be

named as BC's top man, he was an assistant at both BC (six months) and Kansas State (two years).

At Jacksonville, he performed a variety of duties, including developing and implementing strength, speed and conditioning programs; research methods to improve all areas of the program (speed, strength, power, balance, agility, flexibility, conditioning, supplementation and injury prevention), consult and advise the athletes on proper nutrition, and developing instructional methods of teaching technique. He was on the staff of the '99 Jaguar team that posted a 14-2 regular season record and advanced to the AFC Championship game. At Boston College, he oversaw the conditioning programs for 33 varsity teams, one of the largest Division I-A programs on the East Coast.

Finnegan has worked with some of the best football players in the country, including former Buffaloes Deon Figures, Chris Hudson and Chris Naeole, as well as Tony Boselli, Mark Brunell, Jimmy Smith and Fred Taylor, all while with the Jaguars.

He earned bachelor's degree in 1992 from Cornell University, where he was the first-team all-lvy League center in both 1989 and 1990 and team captain his senior season in 1991. He received his master's from Kansas State in 1994 in exercise physiology, and it was in Manhattan where he began his career as a graduate teaching assistant. Ramey, 24, worked one year as a graduate assistant at Kansas State, which followed a five-month internship with Mike Boyle Strength and Conditioning in


Winchester, Mass.


