A GREAT DAY FOR GU PLAGEKIGKERS

The 925 miles that separate Denver and Green Bay seemed a lot closer for former University of Colorado All-American placekicker **Mason Crosby** on September 1.

While awaiting his fate on either making the roster of the Packers and beginning his career in the National Football League, there was no better way for Crosby to bide his time by catching his old team on television and watching the Buffaloes beat Colorado State in overtime, 31-28. His former teammate and practice partner for four years, senior Kevin Eberhart, made a 22-yard field goal to send the game into the extra period and then connect on a 35-yard boot to win it.

"It was good to have the distraction. Ever since the game ended on Thursday night (referring to Green Bay's final preseason game against Tennessee), it's been a waiting game," Crosby said. "So being able to watch some college football was a great way to keep my mind from wandering, and fortunately I found a restaurant across from our hotel that was showing the CU-CSU game. It was the perfect way to pass some time while my fate was decided here.

"We were supposed to find out around 3 p.m., and that's right about when Kevin made the winning kick. I was really into the game and kind of lost track of the time."

"I have to say it was kind of weird watching he whole team playing and not being out there with them," he added. "But I knew Kevin would come through. He's an excellent kicker, and he helped me to keep pushing myself my entire time at CU. It's a great way for him to start his senior year and as the full-time kicker, and I am sure he's excited about it. I'll probably give him a call (Sunday) when everything settles down. I know how it is when you make a couple of kicks like he did, you want to celebrate with your family and enjoy it.

Crosby realized the similarities in this year's game to the 2005 contest, when he made two field goals in the final two minutes that also produced a 31-28 win over the Rams. "When it was nearing the end and we were down 28-25, I knew in my heart that we were going to get the ball back. Chase (McBride) had a really good (punt) return, and I knew that if we couldn't score a touchdown, Kevin would tie it up. I was happy to see him step up and take the reins and get after it. I knew he would do it and I am really proud of him and really everyone for coming back the way they did.

"I didn't know what was happening with me until about 3:45, that's when I got the news. So it really was a great day, watching the old team win and a good friend coming through in the clutch, not once but twice, and topping it off by solidifying my spot on a new team. You couldn't script it any better."

THE QUOTE FROM '07 GAMP

Credit freshman **OL Ryan Miller** with the quote of CU's 2007 camp; he said the following on media day when asked if CU's record last year (2-10) was any kind of factor on his college decision: "Have you talked to Coach Hawk lately? He is on fire. This entire program is on fire. Two-and-10 is a number and a few (other) games were winnable. With the summer conditioning and spring practices, I think that this team can and will do better this year."

LATE BIO

Several walk-ons joined the program either in camp or on the first day of school. One who has already contributed is **PK Tyler Cope**; he had a good camp and won the regular kickoff job, debuting in the season opener against Colorado State. His bio appears:

6-1, 180, Fr., HS, Portland, Ore. (Jesuit)

AT COLORADO: This Season (Fr.)—He had a good fall camp and emerged from it as a candidate to handle some occasional kickoff chores. He kicked very well in scrimmages and had several touchbacks kicking from the 30. He joined the team as an invited walk-on for August drills.

HIGH SCHOOL—He earned first-team All-State and All-League honors his senior year at placekicker, as he connected on 6-of-8 field goals (long of 39) and converted on 83-of-86 PAT kicks for 103 points. He set a state record for PAT's made in a season. As a junior, he was perfect on the year, converting all three field goal attempts (39 long) and all 12 PAT kicks. In earning two letters under coach Ken Potter, Jesuit was 14-0 his senior season (state champs) and 13-1 his junior season (state champs). He lettered four times in track, participating in the state meet all four years, and earned first-team All-State honors as a senior in the 4x400 meter relay. As a junior, he was first-team All-State in the 300-meter hurdles (he took second in the event) and the 4x400-meter relay, helping Jesuit capture the state title; he also earned All-League

honors in the 400 and the hurdles. He also lettered once in soccer (defenseman), helping his team to runner-up honors in the state tournament.

ACADEMICS—He is majoring in Mechanical Engineering at Colorado. He was an honor roll student all four years in high school. As a senior, he was a member of the National Honor Society and won his school's photography award.

PERSONAL—Born February 2, 1989 in Ann Arbor, Mich. His hobbies include golfing, fishing, skiing and camping and he has also worked as a professional photographer. His father, Bret, played soccer at Santa Clara. zA great uncle, Chuck Lamson, played collegiately at Wyoming and played five seasons as a safety in the NFL with Minnesota (1962-63) and the Los Angeles Rams (1965-67). He has aspirations of serving as an engineer in the military after his football playing days conclude.

- With the injury to PR Chase McBride, Robinson was the primary punt returner against Baylor, returning one punt for 42 yards before leaving the game with a leg contusion.
- Robinson started his career at cornerback before making the transition to offense in 2005. His main contributions during his career have come by way of his return game; he was the successor to Jeremy Bloom in the punt return category.
- He often fields punts in traffic, sacrificing his average. But his abilities
 have led to a new special teams point category: Field Position Saves;
 His knack for fielding punts in traffic came during his first year on the
 job when the special teams unit rarely set up to block for punt returns,
 electing to go for the block instead.
- You could say he is morally opposed to making fair catches: "I just feel
 like any returner can get back there and fair catch. I feel like if I don't
 fair catch and something happens, like the gunner coming down
 misses me, I can turn it into a big play. I'm going to get tackled
 anyway, so..."

Human Interest:

 He is roommates with fellow wide receiver and punt returner Chase McBride.

HUGH CHARLES Tailback 5-8, 190, Sr.

- With his 83 rushing yards against lowa State, Charles moved into seventh on the all-time rushing list, as he finished the game with 2,490 yards for his career, passing Herchell Troutman (2,487).
- Charles ran for 121 yards on 20 carries against Texas Tech, marking the 10th 100-yard rushing game of his career.
- Charles rushed for a career-high 171 yards on 22 carries against Kansas State, marking his fourth-consecutive 100-yard game.
- Charles had his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game against Baylor, carrying the ball 19 times for 109 yards. He moved past his position coach, Darian Hagan, into 15th place on the Buffs' all-time rushing list. Said Hagan after the game: "If I would have known that he wouldn't have played in the second half."
- Charles had his second consecutive and seventh career 100-yard game against Oklahoma. He bruised the Sooners with 110 rushing yards, including a 25-yard score in the second quarter. He was also the Buffs' most effective receiver, catching five passes for 48 yards.

Charles, continued

 He pulled up with a strained hamstring on a 15-yard reception against CSU (fourth play of the game). He missed the ASU game, snapping a streak of 36 straight games in which he had played; the only other was the first game of his freshman year.

Hawkins' Take:

- "I've been on him every day—every time I see him I just keep reminding him about passion. He's so strong and so fast and so powerful that he's got to run with that Walter Payton kind of passion, and if he does he can be one of the better backs in the conference."
- His weight room numbers are off the charts. Though he stands only 5'8, 190 lbs., he is first on the team in the power clean (374 lbs.), tied for third in the hang clean (391 lbs.), third in the squat (635 lbs.), second in the bench press (420 lbs.) and third in the 40-yard dash (4.53; although he has been clocked as fast a 4.34).

Human Interest:

- He earned his solo pilot's license in a Cessna 172 as a sophomore in high school and FSN did a 2006 feature on him as he took a reporter and cameraman up flying with him (CU's BuffVision has footage).
- He enjoys skiing, fishing and wakeboarding in his spare time. He has also taken up golf recently: in his short time playing, he is generally an 18-handicap.

- Williams caught five passes for 59 yards in the opener against CSU: several of them key plays: Two of his receptions came on third-and-long situations in a key fourth quarter touchdown drive in which the Buffs drove 86 yards to bring them within a field goal of the Rams. He also had a 31-yard reception with under a minute left in the first half which set up a field goal. He drew a pass interference penalty on fourth down late in the fourth quarter which led to the tying field goal and forced overtime.
- Williams' confidence is seemingly the only thing that has kept him from reaching the next level. Offensive Coordinator Mark Helfrich "complimented" Williams after he had a pair of touchdown receptions in the first fall scrimmage: "He's made more plays the last two days in practice than he did all last year."

From There to Here:

- Injuries sabotaged his true freshman season in 2004. He spent much
 of the fall with both hands in casts after a pair of freak circumstances
 led to broken bones in each. One hand was injured after becoming
 tangled in a defender's face mask.
- In high school, he was a quarterback in an option offense, leading to his slow progression as a wide receiver.

- He made his first career start against lowa State, subbing in for the injured Terrence Wheatley.
- McKay recorded three PBUs against Missouri in just 36 plays from scrimmage (one was a knockdown on a fade route in the end zone).
 He had recorded just one PBU in 254 career plays before his performance.
- McKay is second on the team with 17 special teams points, including eight total tackles (seven solo) and a forced fumble.
- McKay sprinted downfield as a gunner on a fourth-quarter punt against Oklahoma and reached Oklahoma return man Reggie Smith before Matt DiLallo's punt arrived. Instead of committing a penalty by touching or tackling Smith too soon, McKay did what he was coached to do—he stopped in front of Smith serving as just enough of a distraction to cause Smith to muff the punt. CU long snapper Justin Drescher recovered. The Buffs took control on the Sooners' 16-yard line and scored the tying touchdown three plays later.
- A supremely talented athlete, McKay was stuck behind veteran Terrence Wheatley at cornerback in 2006 (Wheatley played all but one defensive snap during the course of the season).

Human Interest:

 He found his way to CU because his high school teammate was Darian Hagan Jr., the son of running backs coach Darian Hagan.

 Hawkins' record-tying string of games (nine) with a touchdown pass came to an end against Missouri. In his first nine career games he tied the school record for the most consecutive games with a touchdown pass, matching Koy Detmer's mark set in 1996.

Kleenex Kid:

 Hawkins was hit high early in the game against Texas Tech and played most of the game with a Kleenex up his nose because he couldn't stop it from bleeding. Result: his first game without an interception.

Hawkins, continued

- Cody Hawkins after the Oklahoma win: "Unfortunately, everybody's been kind of making fun of us for the 'woulda, coulda, shoulda,' but finally we went out and we 'shoulda' and we 'do-da.'
- Hawkins was officially named the starting quarterback on August 19, the day after CU's second scrimmage of the fall. He had the advantage of being far more familiar with the playbook than Nick Nelson, and he won the job because of his consistency in executing plays.
- He combined to complete 31-of-49 passes for 369 yards, four touchdowns and one interception in three fall camp scrimmages.
- Going back to his grade school days, he has always been a quarterback. In organized games, from sixth grade through his senior year as a prep, his teams were a combined 59-0.

Dan Hawkins' Take (after Cody's first win against CSU):

• "I thought he did OK. He would be the first one to tell you he missed a few throws. But in general, not bad. I was more pleased with the overall team effort. He has been around this so many times. He has been on the bus, and he's been on the big stage so for him it's just another day in the park. We knew emotionally he wasn't going to have a problem. He knows the greatest joy is going out there saying that I have the guts to play in front of 65,000 people and lay it on the line."

Helfrich's Take:

"He makes almost every routine play and that's a big deal as a quarterback—just making every play that's there. And then the difference-maker-type plays, those are the ones you have to make a majority of to be on the greater side of good. Cody has worked toward that."

Human Interest:

- On signing day of 2006, Hawkins went to school with a letter of intent for both Boise State and Colorado signed by his mother. Even Dan Hawkins did not know he committed until the letter was faxed to the
- After CU's 31-28 win over CSU in his first collegiate start, Hawkins improved to 60-0 as a starting quarterback going back to Pop Warner ball. His 201 passing yards were more than QBs Bernard Jackson or James Cox had in any game in 2006. The streak finally ended at Arizona State the following week, but you could never tell from his demeanor. He's a learn from experience and move forward kinda guy.
- Coach Hawkins said that he believes that former major leaguer Bill Buckner made a real difference when it came to Cody's confidence as a young athlete. He was his baseball coach and the combination of Buckner believing in him (Cody was a pitcher) and the expectations and demands placed on him really had an impact.

DEMETRIUS SUMLER Tailback 5-10, 210, RS-Fr.

- He scored three touchdowns against Baylor, two on the ground and one via the air.
- Sumler was one of three CU tailbacks to rush for at least 90 yards against Miami (Ohio) with 14 carries for 91 yards and a touchdown.
- Taking over for an injured Hugh Charles, Sumler was the primary tailback against CSU, rushing 16 times for 85 yards and a touchdown. He was also the workhorse against ASU, carrying the ball 16 times, and against FSU, carrying the ball eight times.

Sumler, continued

- Sumler, who finished his high school career as the San Diego area's career rushing leader, is the most powerful running back on the Buffs' roster and the player most physically suited for goal-line situations.
- He is not a burner and does not possess "breakaway speed," but he is fully capable of ripping of 40 or 50-yard runs, according to coaches.

Hawkins' Take:

"He's a blue-collar guy. He never misses a cut; he always maximizes every run, and if there is a crease there he is good at getting leverage and getting back to where he needs to be. I think that whole mentality brings a lot to the offense. I think you can use him anywhere. He's not a 4.4 guy but he's fast enough. We really felt like last year probably could have played and probably could have helped us. He probably felt like that, too. But I think he is a lot stronger and his body is put together a little bit better. We have total confidence in him. He is a very, very productive player."

- · Dykes became the primary punt returner against Baylor after Stephone Robinson left the game with a leg contusion. In his first return, he sprinted 30 yards to field the punt at the Baylor 38-yard line, setting up a Kevin Eberhart 54-yard field goal as time expired in the first half.
- · Dykes snagged his first career interception as a Buff when he caught a tipped pass from teammate Benjamin Burney with 6:28 left in the fourth quarter against Oklahoma. OU Coach Bob Stoops called it the turning point of the game: "I thought that the turning point was the one down the middle when (Juaquin Iglesias) was wide open and it just goes off his fingers. With that, we would've had a big play and it would've put us in scoring position again but then (Colorado) gets it. That, to me, was when all momentum switched and we never got it
- He has some physical limitations, especially in space, but he makes up for it by being a smart player with great instincts. He reminds some of former safety Tom Hubbard, Defensive MVP in the 2004 Houston Bowl.

From There to Here:

- Transferred from Idaho, where he started for the Vandals his freshman and sophomore seasons. Coming from Southern California, he didn't like the town of Moscow: "It's just a slow place, a quiet place. And it just really wasn't the environment for me. On top of that, this would have been my senior year there, and I would have had three head coaches in four years."
- He came to CU because he played against Hawkins and Boise state twice and thought he wouldn't have to re-establish himself as a player by catching on with someone who knew him.

Hawkins' Take:

"He's smart, he's tough, he's a playmaker and gets himself into the right position and works hard. Those guys usually surface in life, and he certainly has. Like I like to say, he has great countenance. I think that lends itself to productivity."

- He was on the Ray Guy Award watch list at the beginning of the year.
- He was presented the Bill McCartney Award in the spring, given to the team's most improved special teams player.
- He had his moments as a freshman, only the third to ever handle the punting chores at CU, and he set a school frosh record for the longest punt with a 73-yard kick against Colorado State in Denver.
- A left-footed punter like his predecessor John Torp, he is on track to be a four-year starter.

Human Interest:

- He was mentored by kicking/punting guru Tony Bugeja, a former placekicker for the Osceola Ghost Riders of the World Indoor Football League. DiLallo is from the Palm Beach area where Bugeja also coached soccer and did volunteer instructional work with local punters and kickers.
- DiLallo is a pre-med major and aspires to be a surgeon.

 Walters left the Missouri game late in the second half on a stretcher with a head injury. He was taken to Boulder Community Hospital where all tests came back negative. He spent Saturday night in the hospital as a precaution, and he did not play against lowa State.

 Walters made a diving interception off a tipped pass against Oklahoma in the third quarter which led to a touchdown, cutting the deficit to seven points.

From There to Here:

- He nearly saved the day for the Buffs against Kansas in 2006. With the
 Jayhawks up 20-9 and driving inside the Colorado 10-yard line to seal
 the win, Walters caught a Todd Reesing [Kansas QB] fumble at the 5yard line and returned it 95 yards for a touchdown, bringing the Buffs
 to within five points of Kansas.
- He started to develop as an excellent young player as a redshirt freshman. During the spring of 2005, he was the recipient of the Dick Anderson Award for the most improved player on defense.

Human Interest:

 He grew up in the apartments that overlook CU's practice fields. He lived there while his father, Marc, played quarterback for the Buffs from 1986-89.

- Cope serves as CU's kick off specialist; he has made eight total tackles (seven solo) this season on special teams. However, none have been of the "last man to get him" variety; he kinds of sneaks in there. He actually enjoys going up to make the tackle, although he says he would rather kick the ball deep enough where there is either a touchback or the returner is tackled before he can get to him.
- Cope has the edge over senior placekicker Kevin Eberhart in kick off distance, but Everhart has the edge in hang time. But as Hawkins said, "If you kick it out of the end zone it doesn't matter what your hang time is."



- Lockridge suffered a concussion in practice the Tuesday before the Oklahoma game, but didn't tell trainers until Thursday of that week. He was held out of the Oklahoma game but has played in every game since.
- He had 14 carries for 90 yards and a touchdown against Miami (Ohio) with two potential touchdowns called back: a 9-yarder which was originally called a touchdown but then re-spotted at the 1-yard line and a 56-yarder voided because of a holding call.

Lockridge, continued

Fast Food Nation:

• Lockridge has a problem most Americans would love to have: he has to eat fast food. In high school, his body fat index was too low and he would cramp up all the time; he even tore both of his hamstrings because his body was too tense. After one workout, his whole body cramped up and he was basically paralyzed from the neck down. He was given three IVs before he could move again. Doctors basically told him that he was eating too healthy. He began taking fish oil pills, and now before games or hard workouts he eats fast food—although he doesn't like it—and hasn't had cramps since!

Hawkins' Take:

"He has a lot of speed, but he also has a different style in that he'll pour it up in there and has no trepidation about that, he'll just throw a rock on the gas pedal and go. He's kind of like an energizer bunny, the guy just has a tremendous spirit about him; he reminds me a lot of (former defensive end) Abe Wright in terms of that. He is a guy who will return a punt, catch it, run all the way down, hand it to the punter and be standing there before you even know that he just ran 100 yards. His biggest asset is his speed but that is also complimented by his attitude and his style; he's not afraid to put his pads down and hammer it up in there, even though he isn't the biggest guy."

- McKnight has led the team in receptions and receiving yards in five of the Buffs' 11 games, including the first four of the season.
- He is battling with Josh Smith for the receiving yards record as a freshman.
- McKnight was one of Cody's Hawkins' go-to receivers against CSU, catching eight passes for 106 yards and a touchdown. His 106 receiving yards were the most by any player in CU history in his debut. His touchdown came on a 32-yard catch which capped the Buffs' first drive and put them on top 7-0.
- One of the Buffs' most consistent route-runners, McKnight vaulted himself to the top of the depth chart at the "z" receiver grouping in fall camp.
- He broke his ankle during the first day of spring football, but was fully recovered by the start of fall camp.

Helfrich's Take:

 "The word consistent would apply to him. He is catching the ball really well; he's not the fastest guy in the world but he runs consistent good, clean routes."

Human Interest:

- He attended an Elite 11 Quarterback Camp in Mission Viejo before his senior year of high school, where he shagged balls, caught passes and struck up a friendship with future teammate Cody Hawkins.
- He trained with, and got a serious sales pitch from former CU wide receiver John Minardi.

TERRENGE WHEATLEYCornerback

- Wheatley (foot) did not play against Iowa State and is day-to-day.
- Wheatley suffered a foot injury against Missouri. He came back in and played after the injury but was taken back out with the game out of reach. Said Dizon after the game: "His elbow is like a melon right now, if you could see it right now it's disgusting. I know he hurt his ankle but he's a really tough guy and I take my hat off to him for playing as well as he did with his injuries and toughing it out."
- Wheatley had three interceptions including two on back-to-back possessions in the fourth quarter as Colorado held off high-scoring Texas Tech, 31-26. In addition to his three interceptions, Wheatley added seven tackles (all solo) and one pass breakup. He became the first player in 25 years to intercept three passes in a game for Colorado (tied the school record shared by seven others), one of eight in the NCAA to have three this season. He is now tied for third on CU's all-

- time interception list with 14 (with Dick Anderson), trailing only John Stearns (16) and Chris Hudson (15).
- With a jarring hit on OU's Joe Jon Finley, Wheatley forced an incomplete pass on third down in the fourth quarter, forcing the Sooners to punt to the Buffs for their game-winning drive.
- On the third snap from scrimmage against ASU, Wheatley stepped in front of a Rudy Carpenter pass and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown. Both of his interceptions returned for scores have come against formidable quarterbacks. His other one, back in 2004, came off of former Texas QB Vince Young.
- The Denver Broncos have Champ Bailey; the Colorado Buffaloes have Terrence Wheatley. A legitimate Jim Thorpe Award candidate—although he was not named a semi-finalist—Wheatley has all the physical tools to be a lockdown corner.
- He is likely the fastest player on the Buffs, as he has been clocked at a sub-4.3 in the 40-yard dash.
- He has had four surgeries on his wrist, missing the 2005 season after having a metal plate inserted in his wrist. His last surgery was performed the day after CU's final 2006 game against Nebraska.

From There to Here:

 His first career interception came as a sophomore in 2004, as he scored CU's only touchdown of the day against Texas. He intercepted a pass by Vince Young and returned it 37 yards for a score.

Hawkins' Take:

"When the pro scouts come by, I just jump on the table for that guy. I think he is a very solid individual, he is a hard worker, he is a smart guy, he is dependable, he is very, very consistent and he is a special player. I could see that guy, if he continues, being an All-American type player. It is awesome to have him in the return game, too, because we know how fast he is and now that his wrist is healed up and it's not as big a problem as it was last year, he can do some great things there. But he is a great kid, he really is."

Human Interest:

- He goes by the nickname "T-Wheat."
- He jokes that with the metal in his wrist he can play football but he can't make it through the security line at the airport.

- Ellis had the first receiving touchdown of his career against Kansas, a 5-yard score late in the fourth quarter to bring the Buffs to within five points of the Jayhawks.
- CU's bulkiest tailback, he's a solid inside runner and is often called upon in short yardage situations. An added benefit is that he has good hands and offers another option out of the backfield. He is CU's best running back in pass protection.

- Why was Brown named special teams captain? Though he played in only three games, Brown has racked up 12 special teams points; Only

- two players had more than 12 special teams points all of last season (Terry Washington, 20; Ben Carpenter, 15).
- Playing in his first career action on defense against CSU, Brown started for the Buffs and had a solid effort with six total tackles and a third down stop. Defensive coordinator Ron Collins said Brown made many mistakes but they were all correctable.
- Special teams coach Kent Riddle frequently shows a highlight reel of Brown's kamikaze-like heroics on special teams during meetings.
- Brown is one of only two former walk-ons since 1980 to be named a team captain (QB Joel Klatt being the other).
- He was put on scholarship when he returned from Big 12 Media Days in San Antonio in July.

Hawkins' Take:

"When he asked me why I put him on a scholarship I said 'Well because you're a tough guy, you're a hard worker, you're a good leader, you do things right and you're the kind of guy we want in the program and we want to reward that.' He will do whatever, whenever. He gets it done in the classroom, he's there early and he's there late. He's a no-excuse guy, a tough guy and I think he's one of those guys where in a good system, which I think we have, that you can compensate sometimes for some physical things for some mental and intangible things."

Dizon's Take:

· "He hasn't played a snap at linebacker, but he was named a captain of the team. That's self-explanatory. The whole team respects him."

Human Interest:

- His father is a Marriott Hotel executive, and his profession brought Brown and his family all over the world. Usually attending international schools, often taught by English citizens, Brown played soccer in Saudi Arabia and Vietnam and rugby in Australia.
- · Playing for Punahou High School, he played against current teammate Jordon Dizon (Waimea High).
- He came to CU as an invited walk-on at the advice of Jeff Cabral, an assistant on the Punahou staff and brother of CU linebacker coach Brian Cabral.

He was hoisted by teammates in the lockerroom during the postgame fight song and was named the Big 12 Special Teams Player of the week for his efforts.
- He is a former walk-on, but the tag was removed only recently, as he was awarded a scholarship prior to the start of Big 12 play.
- · McBride was CU's starting punt returner against CSU. His third return, a 43-yarder in the fourth guarter, set up the Buffs at the CSU 34-yard line, where they would eventually tie the game with a field goal.

From There to Here:

• He spelled roommate and teammate Stephone Robinson as the punt returner at Kansas last season after Robinson had fumbling problems.

Human Interest:

- He garnered 11 all-state awards in high school, staring at Colorado's Broomfield High School (four times in football and basketball and three times in baseball). After hurting his foot, CU and Colorado State backed off recruiting him so he went to Wyoming. He transferred to CU after his freshman season.

- Eberhart made two kicks (of 50 and 55 yards, respectively) at the wacky end of the Iowa State game, neither of which ended up counting.
- Eberhart is just 4-of-9 on his first attempt in a game this season; after the first kick is out of the way though he is a combined 10-of-13.
- Eberhart kicked five field goals against Baylor, tying a school record. It was the first time a CU kicker had five field goals in a game since Jeremy Aldrich accomplished the feat against Kansas in 1999. Succeeding All-American and the mega record-setting Mason Crosby as the team's primary placekicker, as he resumed his career with a bang, nailing 3-of-4 field goals against CSU, including the 35-yard OT winner. He is the first Buff to kick a game-winning field goal in overtime. He also drilled a 22-yarder with :13 left to tie the game.

Eberhart, continued

• Eberhart had the misfortune of being in the same recruiting class as Crosby and took a back seat to Crosby when he could have been starting for many Division 1 teams.

From There to Here:

• He actually saw game action before Crosby, as he was just the third placekicker in CU history to play as a true freshman. After he missed two field goals at Florida State (22 and 42 yards), Crosby took over.

After pacing back and forth across the sideline and not finding his helmet, he sat down and convinced the doctors and linebackers coach Brian Cabral he could play by passing a test consisting of play calls and coverage recognitions (not to mention the standard medical tests). After the game, he downplayed his "injury": "I don't have a concussion; I just got my bell rung a little bit. I had a bit of a headache but that's all. If you took out every football player that got a headache during a game you'd probably be short on players."
- Dizon scored the first touchdown of his career against Texas Tech when he read Graham Harrell's first pass of the second half perfectly, picked it off and returned it 42 yards into the end zone.
- In addition to his four sacks and seven tackles for loss, Dizon leads the team with 13 tackles resulting in no gain (TFZ).
- Dizon made the first interception of his career—at any level—against Baylor.
- Dizon totaled just five tackles against Miami (Ohio), but with CU's offense dominating the time of possession, the RedHawks only had 49 offensive plays.

Dizon, continued

- Dizon racked up 23 total tackles against CSU (23 on defense; one on special teams). His 22 tackles on defense was the most by any CU player in nearly a decade—since LB Hannibal Navies had 28 tackles against Missouri on Nov. 1, 1997. Dizon's 17 solo stops against the Rams are the third most in CU history.
- He pushes his body so much during games that a halftime and post game IV has become commonplace.
- Asked where Dizon stacks up against some of CU's all-time linebacker greats like Barry Remington, Matt Russell, Greg Biekert, Kanavis McGhee and Alfred Williams, linebackers coach Brian Cabral said, "Not many of those guys have started for four years, so he's up there."
- Since 1990, the Buffs have sent 15 linebackers to the NFL. Those players combined to start 19 games as true freshmen at Colorado. Dizon *himself* started 11 games as a true frosh.

From There to Here:

- He was not recruited at all out of high school, not even by the University of Hawaii. His mother travels a lot to New York and suggested he attend a football camp on the mainland. Dizon had gotten brochures from CU linebackers coach Brian Cabral who recruits Hawaii heavily, so he decided to attend camp at Colorado. His high school had about a 700-student enrollment, but there were only about 20 kids on the football team because sports aren't that big in Hawaii. He played running back throughout high school and only weighed about 195 lbs. as a senior. Coming to Colorado, he had never played a snap on defense. He started his freshman camp at safety, but after five practices the coaches moved him to inside linebacker to see him in that role. It didn't take long for him to make an impression at linebacker, as he zoomed to the top of the depth chart after just six practices. Dizon said he hoped all along he would get to be coached by Cabral who had recruited him. "He was like a God to me. I mean he won the Super Bowl with the Chicago Bears and played with Mike Singletary." Dizon said in high school he never even dreamed of playing college football.
- In 2004, he was the starter at the "Will" inside linebacker spot, as he became the first true freshman inside linebacker to start a season opener in CU history. He was also just the sixth true freshman to start an opener in school history and the first since 1991.

• As a freshman, he easily broke the single-season record for tackles by a freshman (80; the previous record was 67 by J.J. Billingsley).

Cabral's Take:

"He's played in a lot of big games and has made a lot of plays for us.
 Jordon is the heart and soul of our defense. He obviously makes a lot of plays in games, but practices every day like he is playing the game."

Human Interest

- A Hawaiian native, Dizon can often be seen trudging to class through slush, snow and 20-degree weather in his flip-flops.
- He perfected the art chasing wild boars on hunting trips when he was younger. His mother, an undercover narcotics police officer in Hawai'i, never allowed him to use a gun. Instead he tracked the animals with help from dogs, pinned them to the ground and killed them with a knife. But according to Dizon, he is not into that anymore. "Those days are over," he joked. "My knees are too bad for that. My eyesight is going. I'm getting too old for that kind of stuff."
- He has become an avid golfer, and after only 18 months of playing his high score is a 78; he won an informal tournament organized by teammates during the summer.

His toughness and intelligence is what has allowed him to play in front of some other guys as a true freshman."

Human Interest:

- His father, Scott Mahoney, was an offensive lineman for the Buffs from 1969-71.
- His biggest role models are his brothers. His middle brother, Kaluka, is a linebacker for USC, and his oldest is in the U.S. Coast Guard.
- Has an uncle, "The Rock," Dwayne Johnson, a famous modern day wrestler and former Miami Hurricane football player.

He loves Colorado; he is a very humble kid, he's a blue-collar guy and he is a guy that when he is in your football program everybody knows that he is a marquee player and a marquee guy too. He is a guy that sets the bar not only for the talent that you want but also your attitude and approach to off the field, school and everything else. I totally see him as a guy that can come in here and be an All-American and help us win a National Championship and get drafted by the Broncos."

Grimes' Take:

"Ryan's gotten way, way, way, way better. He's come so far. He comes from a high school program where they almost never threw the ball. You don't throw the ball, and you don't know how to pass block - that's something that takes a long time to learn. He's gotten better and better every week at that. Obviously he's got lots of potential, and I think he's got his best football in front of him."

- A starter at guard his sophomore season and part of his redshirt freshman season, Sanders leads the offensive line as the starting center

 He had an outstanding fall camp as a freshman in 2005 that moved him to second on the depth chart at nose tackle behind thenincumbent senior Vaka Manupuna. The coaches never considered redshirting him.

Human Interest:

- Hypolite's confidence is certainly evident on the football field, but he carries that swagger everywhere he goes. To wit: he claims to be undefeated in 'Rocks, Paper, Scissors.'
- One of the more outspoken members of the team, Hypolite interned for the CU's marketing department and helped sell season tickets.
