QUICKLY

It's the 2008 edition of national letter-of-intent day, as high school seniors around the nation were allowed to sign on the dotted line starting at 7:00 a.m. local time on Wednesday, February 6... The signed letters are express mailed in, but can be confirmed by FAX... The full team total cannot exceed 85 scholarships at any point, or a maximum 25 qualifiers any single year... The NCAA maximum is 56 recruiting visits allowed; the Buffs did not "bank" any from last year and have utilized 44 of the 56 to date; CU can pickup a maximum six of those unused visits to bank toward next year, and can have 62 for the 2009 class... The list of signees and their biographies are later in this packet.

Looking ahead to this fall, there are a few Colorado players who should be in the mix for some individual honors. Topping the list are seniors-to-be DT George Hypolite, a first-team All-Big 12 performer this past fall, OLB Brad Jones, NT Brandon Nicolas, C Daniel Sanders (a Rimington Watch List member) and FS Ryan Walters. Juniors CB Cha'pelle Brown, TE Riar Geer and P Matt DiLallo are worthy of a look, and then there's a slew of underclassmen that could emerge as honors-type players as the program evolves under coach **Dan Hawkins**. Several could emerge as All-Big 12 Conference candidates (or even All-America) with breakout seasons.

RECRUITING REVIEW

Over the past 36 years, the bulk of CU's recruits have come primarily from three states: Colorado (223), California (193) and Texas (102). Here is a look at CU's **bigh school only** recruiting numbers since 1973, the year students were again able to participate as freshmen. It includes signed recruits who might not have reported to campus for whatever reason, unless that player signed again and counted toward a subsequent class; this prevents double counting. (*—denotes how many members of the class were future NFL draft picks; 1 in every 5.8 CU recruits since 1973 has been drafted into the pros):

BUFFS MAKE PRESENCE KNOWN IN RAIDING BEST-IN-WEST SQUAD

One of the most prestigious teams is the *Long Beach Press-Telegram's* Best-In-West squad, which the paper started selecting in 1977. The first-team consists of 20 top players from the Mountain and Pacific Time zones (and Alaska and Hawai'i). When all was said and done, USC plucked off six of the 20; next on the list? Colorado. CU signed four/three off the list: **TB Darrell Scott** (ranked first, the top point getter, receiving 208 out of a possible 210), **ILB Lynn Katoa** (No. 6 on the list), **ILB Jon Major** (No. 17) and **OT Bryce Givens** (No. 20). Four schools snared two, Arizona State, Notre Dame, UCLA and Washington, with Arizona, and BYU and Texas signing one each.

STATE-BY-STATE

The below chart indicates the last time a player from each state was on the CU roster (includes transfers and walk-ons; had to suit for at least one game). Rosters were available back to 1928; going into 2008, only two states, Rhode Island and Vermont, have never produced a CU player, with eight not having a prep recruit. CLASS NOTES

Colorado five-instate recruits all were members of the All-Colorado teams by the *Rocky Mountain News* and/or *Denver Post*... Colorado inked players from nine states overall, with the last two classes representing 15 different states (16 total in **Dan Hawkins**' three classes)... After being shutout in Texas last year (for the first time since 1983), the Buffs landed two from the Lone Star State this time around... Here are some quick tidbits about the **21** members of this year's recruiting class:

WR Chance Blackmon is not used to losing; high school, Tatum (Texas), went 42-4 during his three years as a member of the varsity... DL Curtis Cunningham had a 4.2 grade point average, on a 4.0 scale, during the fall semester of his senior year while playing football. Wow... OL Ryan Dannewitz has done something most people wish they've had the chance to: visit the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. ... PK Jameson Davis signed on to play football at Boise State for Hawkins in 2005, but left shortly thereafter to serve his two-year Mormon Mission is Guatemala; they did not have a scholarship for him upon his return and he chose to seek out Hawkins and special teams coach Kent Riddle at Colorado.

TE Ryan Deehan had the kind of unwanted media attention no one would desire; his family lost their Poway, Calif., home to the Southern California wildfires and once it was found out he was a highly touted recruit, the media descended on him. Many of his teammates as well as schoolmates were affected by the fires, but Poway found the resolve to go 12-0 and win the CIF San Diego area title. The last recruit from Poway was a decade ago, as ILB Drew Wahlroos signed in the 1998 class... **S Vince Ewing** is the first Buff from Carlsbad (Calif.) High School since eventual Butkus Award runner-up Ted Johnson signed in the spring of '91... **OT Bryce Givens**' father pitched two seasons in the major leagues with the Milwaukee Brewers (Brian Givens); the younger Givens doesn't have a fastball, but he has pancakes: 150 of them over his last two years as a prep.

QB Tyler Hansen is from a quarterback family, as his father played at San Diego State between 1978 and 1983; the younger Hansen was a "1-star" recruit until the services noticed Michigan and Iowa got interested in him after Colorado found him out; he jumped to a "3-star" prospect somehow in early July without playing a game... **DB Steven Hicks** will be reunited with his cousin this October 4 in Boulder, as Nic Redwine is a senior fullback with the University of Texas... **ILB Lynn Katoa** is the first prep recruit from Utah to sign with Colorado since 1991 (DT Kerry Hicks/Salt Lake City Highland); he was the lone member of the high school signees to graduate early and enroll in classes and thus will participate in spring drills... S Patrick Mahnke was the first commit of Colorado's 2008 class, pledging to the Buffs in early June 2007.

ILB Jon Major is CU's first recruit from Ponderosa since 1999 (ILB Dryden Dunsmore); along with Cunningham, he is one of two Colorado Chapter/NFF Scholar-Athletes in the class. Both will be honored February 18 at the Denver West Marriott in Golden... **B Shaun Mohler** was the only junior college transfer signed in this year's class; that's the fewest since the 2004 class had a single JUCO... **TE Will Pericak** will attend CU on a football scholarship; the school practically "owes" him that as he has an older brother (Tom) and sister (Zoe) who already attend CU. His mother, Wynn, is the assistant to the vice president of administration for the CU system (Leonard Dinegar). Pericak took Dan Hawkins' often-said advice of getting out of one's comfort zone; on New Year's Day, with his sister and a friend, he took part in the annual Polar Bear Plunge at Boulder Reservoir (it was about 22 degrees)... **TB Ray Polk's** father, Ray Sr., played four times against the Buffaloes while a member of the Oklahoma State football team between 1981-84; CU faces the Cowboys for the first time since 2005 on November 17.

If LB Douglas Rippy challenges you to a game of basketball with his cousins, you'd better bring Allen Iverson with you. He has three cousins who are or have played Division I college basketball: Chris Wright is a freshman forward at Dayton; James Davis signed a letter of intent to play at Toledo beginning this fall; and Greg Moore played at Cincinnati... Rippy and TB Rodney Stewart are the first high schoolers from Ohio to sign with the Buffs since 1996 (CB Ben Kelly/Mentor Lake Catholic, Solon)... TB Darrell Scott scored 99 career rushing touchdowns; couldn't they have found him one more somewhere?... OL Maxwell Tuioti-Mariner's cousin, Pisa Tinoosamoa is a linebacker for the St. Louis Rams... ATH Paul Vigo has an impressive resume in community relations work, and is also an avid boxer... TE Ryan Wallace has something in common with CU quarterback Cody Hawkins; in high school, Wallace's head coach was his father, Kevin.

Eleven members of the class were team captains, some for multiple seasons (Cunningham, Dannewitz, Deehan, Givens, Hansen, Hicks, Mahnke, Major, Pericak, Polk and Rippy).

HISTORY AND THE "EXPERTS"

Recruiting services can provide a barometer outline in assessing talent and grading the various schools; however, remember most of recruiting is what coaches spot in their own evaluations, either from video or in person in summer camps, not to mention how well players are coached once in college. Here's a look back at all of Colorado's first-team Big Eight/12 performers (or better) over the past 19 years and the top honor each earned in their prep careers. The Buffs have had good success in both areas; CU has signed **168** high school all-Americans (prior to this year), and has nurtured several others into prominent careers. Of the **65** players listed below, **34** (or 52 percent) were high school all-Americans by the various services, meaning **31**, or 48 percent, were not:

In this same time frame (since 1989), CU has recruited **97** others with All-America honors who have completed their CU careers that never earned first-team all-league (though **57** of the **97** started at least one season). In this same span, **48** players who were not high school All-Americans have earned all-Big Eight/12 or better, with **129** such players earning starting positions. CU has four league titles and three other division titles in these 19 seasons.

ANNUAL HISTORY LESSON

The most players a Division I school can have on scholarship is **85**; it had been 95 for several years, until a four-year reduction that started in 1988 for Title IX purposes by the NCAA scaled it down to the current 85 over a four-year period (ending in 1992). At one time, there was no limit on the number of scholarships a school could offer (40 recruits were the norm back in the 1970s). Though with attrition, the average number of players on scholarship in Division I-A has hovered around 79 or 80, according to the AFCA figures. Colorado has **62** players on scholarship at present.

POSITION CHANGES / NON-RETURNEES

As of now, there are two position changes planned for spring drills: two safeties are moving to wide receiver, **Kyle Black** (Soph.) and **Jason Espinoza** (Fr.-RS), with another frosh redshirt safety, **Travis Sandersfeld**, moving over to outside linebacker. Sophomore **Nate Solder** will be a "slash" player, at least in the spring, as he will play both tight end, his position his first two seasons, and offensive tackle.

Nine players will not return from the 2007 squad for assorted reasons: WR Alvin Barnett, ILB R.J. Brown, PK Tyler Cope, OL Joe Fruechtel, ILB Greg McCudden, OL Wes Palazzi, DE Chris Perri, PK Justin Simmons and WR Jarrell Yates. Brown's career is done due to medical reasons (concussions); Cope, a walk-on, could no longer afford to attend CU and will attend college in his home state of Oregon; Fruechtel, McCudden and Simmons were also walk-ons.

SPRING PRACTICE SCHEDULE

Spring practice will begin Monday, March 17, and end with the spring game on Saturday, April 19. The tentative dates are as follows: **March 17-18-20; April 1-3-4-5-7-8-10-12-14-15-17-19**; a high school coaches clinic is set for April 3-5. The team is allowed 15 practices over 29 days; this is the third straight year spring ball will start prior to spring break, though this time around, there will be just one week of practice prior to break as opposed to two the previous two years. How the practice sessions will break down, per NCAA rules: three in shorts (no contact), four in pads (no tackling), four in pads (tackling allowed 50 percent or less of the time), four in pads (tackling allowed throughout).

COMBINE

The National Football League combine is this month at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis (February 20-26), with three Colorado Buffaloes (among 334 players) having currently been invited to participate: **ILB Jordon Dizon** (one of 34 linebackers), **OT Tyler Polumbus** (one of 49 offensive linemen) and **CB Terrence Wheatley** (one of 57 defensive ends). Those three plus **TE Tyson DeVree** were the only four Buffs to appear in any postseason all-star games. Other CU seniors will be showcased in CU's own pro timing day on March 19; Colorado was one of the first to host their own, starting in the late 1980s. Now most schools do it.

PRO TIMING DAY

Colorado's annual pro-timing day is set for **Wednesday, March 19**, when around 40-plus scouts from most, if not all, of the 32 National Football League teams visit Boulder. They test CU's seniors from last fall in an assortment of drills. The schedule for the day is not finalized (they usually convene at 9 a.m. that morning for the traditional bench press and speed and agility tests (40-yard dash, shuttles, vertical jumps, etc.); testing will be done in the weight room and in Balch Fieldhouse. CU had 29 alums in the NFL last year, the second most in the Big 12 and tied for the 17th most in the nation. The current members of the CU team will go through similar workouts on Thursday, April 24, five days after the completion of spring ball. It is not to open to the public, as all scouts must register with the football office; media can attend but must wear their 2007-08 CU Athletics credential.

SCHOLLIES

Colorado will have 62 players on scholarship for spring practice; the last three walk-ons to be placed on scholarship were **WR Cody Crawford** (midseason in 2007) and **SS Daniel Dykes** and **WR Scotty McKnight** beginning this semester.

COUNTING CROWS TO HIGHLIGHT GRIDIRON BASH

Colorado will play host to one of the **Gridiron Bash** The **Ultimate Fan Competition** series for spring football this April (the day before the 2008 CU game). The event -- the first of its kind at Folsom Field and one of about 20 that will take place at Division I-A universities -- will take place during the afternoon and evening of **Friday, April 18** and include a live performance by renowned alternative-folk rock artists **Counting Crows**, as well as a giant pep rally introducing the team, appearances by coaches and former team legends, and a shortened practice, among other festive fan activities. Tickets go on sale today at the University of Colorado box office via CUBuffs.com and can also be purchased through www.gridironbash.com.

"Similar to the excitement surrounding Midnight Madness, there's also excitement around Spring Football, when schools hold practices and the Annual Spring Game to showcase their upcoming year's roster," said athletic director **Mike Bohn**. "Thousands of spectators come out each spring to watch CU football scrimmages, but that's typically where the 'fan experience' ends. Gridiron Bash extends the experience and enables fans to support their team, give back to their university and have a great time doing so."

In total, Gridiron BashTM is expected to bring participating universities in 2008 an estimated \$12 million resulting from gate and merchandise revenue, as well as the opportunity to raise funds through parking and concession sales. At the core of Gridiron BashTM is a fan contest --The *USA TODAY Bash for Cash Series* TM winners will establish which of the participating schools has the most passionate and supportive fans. The *USA TODAY Bash for Cash Series* TM winners will be determined by adding up the total attendance at the Gridiron Bash TM event and combining that with the number of fans who text/call in to vote for their school. The *USA TODAY Bash for Cash Series* TM winning university will receive a \$1 million contribution to their general scholarship fund, with second and third place schools receiving \$500,000 and \$250,000 respectively. CU releases player name, body part (but no right or left ID's), the general nature and playing status when it comes to reporting injuries. Status will be listed as either OUT, DOUBTFUL, QUESTIONABLE, DAY-TO-DAY or PROBABLE (or LIMITED if for spring or camp sessions).

GRADUATION STAT(U)S

Two of CU's 17 seniors on the roster graduated last spring: PK Kevin Eberhart (Aerospace Engineering) and TE Joe Sanders (Ethnic Studies). Six are on schedule to graduate this month (Dec. 21): DE Alonzo Barrett (Sociology), TE Tyson DeVree (Education), SS Lionel Harris (Sociology), OT Edwin Harrison (Communication), OT Tyler Polumbus (Business Management), WR Dusty Sprague (Business Management); all are fifth-year seniors. In addition, Eberhart was in position to earn his master's in Aerospace Engineering. Seven are likely May '08 candidates to walk: TB Hugh Charles (Sociology), ILB Jordon Dizon (Economics), TB Byron Ellis (Integrative Physiology), FB Samson Jagoras (Integrative Physiology), WR Chase McBride (Geography), WR Stephone Robinson (double in Business Management & Sociology) and CB Terrence Wheatley (Economics). WR Alvin Barnett (Ethnic Studies) and QB Bernard Jackson (Ethnic Studies) are candidates for next summer.

NOTE: Over the last five years (2002-06), CU has had 95 of its 111 seniors, including medicals, graduate; that translates to 85.6 percent (with five of the 16 non-grads still in school and looking to graduate within the next year, while three are in the NFL). NCAA numbers will not match these (it doesn't allow a school to count transfers who graduate, i.e., Wayne Lucier in '02 or WR Mike Duren in '04), but it does count against a school if it had a player transfer. It's one of the reasons the numbers are skewed to be lower than they really are, especially at tougher academic schools like Colorado.

HEAD COACH DAN HAWKINS

Dan Hawkins has completed two seasons as head coach of the University of Colorado football program, seven years overall as a Division I-A head coach and 13 as a collegiate head coach. He owns an **8-17** record at Colorado, along with a **61-28** record in the Division I-A ranks (53-11 at Boise State) and an overall career mark of **100-40-1** including five years at NAIA Willamette (Ore.) College. In his final year at Willamette (1997), his team posted a 13-1 record, falling in the NAIA Championship game, before he moved on to Boise State where he was assistant head coach under Dirk Koetter, coaching the tight ends and special teams while coordinating recruiting. When Koetter left BSU for Arizona State after the 2000 season, Hawkins was promoted to head coach. He took the Broncos to four bowl games in five years, with his 2004 team compiling an 11-0 regular season mark and ascending to No. 10 in the national polls; in the most anticipated non-BCS bowl game to date, Boise dropped a thriller to No. 7 Louisville, 44-40. In the modern history of Division I-A football, only three coaches won more games in their first five seasons than Hawkins (53: bested by Bob Pruett, Marshall; Bob Stoops, Oklahoma; and Pete Carroll, USC). *Hawk's Handiwork:*

- ♦ Hawkins has been a head coach for 141 games (100-40-1), with that record and 71.3 winning percentage 10th in the nation for active coaches with 100 or more games coached for their career.
- In 13 seasons as a head coach, Hawkins' teams have never been shutout, had never dropped more than two games in a row in the same season (which happened just three times) until his first season at Colorado and had won at least eight games seven times (10-plus four times).
- ◆ A sample of what **Hawkins** tells his players: "You're in America, you're going to college, you live in Colorado. You have it better than 90 percent of the people in the world."
- Hawkins has used the term "conflama" when referring to some people's desire for conflict and drama (i.e., the reason someone like Jerry Springer and that lot is even on the air). He references the term when people on the outside of a program choose to look at the negative without choosing to understand why something may very well be the way it is.
- ♦ Hawk on depth charts: "To be honest, we really don't pay too much attention to depth charts, we run a lot of personnel in and out of there at several positions. For example, I view the defensive line like hockey; they're playing in shifts as we want them fresh." As a result, especially on offense at receiver, tight end and in the backfield, CU utilizes different "groupings" as opposed to following a depth chart.
- Hawk on the vertical passing game: "I love the long pass. As I've come along in this game, I've learned you've got to pound it and launch it."
- ♦ Hawk's philosophy on big wins, like CU's 27-24 win over No. 3 Oklahoma: "You enjoy it on Saturday, but come Sunday, it's in the vapor trail."
- One of his beliefs is, "Once is a mistake; twice is a behavior." He applies it to football, whether for things on or off the field, and to life.
- ♦ Hawk's response about potential for disaster after the 0-3 start in 2006: "There's always potential. When you get in your car and get out on the freeway, there's potential for disaster. I knew when I left Boise State there was potential for disaster. That doesn't scare me... there's also the potential for greatness. So you can hide behind the shadow if you want, but that's not living."
- Versus' Ron Thulin on Hawkins' optimism: "His glass isn't half-full, it's overflowing. He's not going to change. He said they are going to keep fighting and doing the little things everyday. I think everyone on our crew was ready to put on a football helmet after talking to this man yesterday. He is excitable and he cares." Chimed in analyst Charles Davis: "I was looking to get taped and get out to practice that day. If you're around him long enough you can't help but be positive."
- ◆ As with many coaches, at the end of practice, the team will run for turnovers, mistakes, missed field goals, etc. One day in 2006 after **PK Mason Crosby** missed a kick within his range, Hawk felt a little bad as he wondered to himself, "How many coaches are making their kids run for a missed 64-yard field goal?"
- ♦ **Hawkins** is one of the 60 Division I-A coaches voting in the *USA Today*/ESPN Coaches poll in 2007 (the seventh straight year he is a voter and the 21st straight year CU's head coach has participated).

ROAD-SWEET-ROAD: BUFFS 12TH BEST IN ENEMY STADIUMS SINCE '88

The Buffaloes have enjoyed a lot of success on the road over the last 20 seasons. CU has been victorious 59 of the last 98 times in enemy stadiums with a **59-38-1** overall road record (a 60.7 winning percentage) since the start of the 1988 season. That stands 12th nationally (ninth in raw wins) and third among Big 12 Conference teams in this span; only 11 schools have won 60 percent of their away games in this time frame. During this time frame, CU won a school record 10 straight road games between 1994 and 1996. The Buffaloes own a **48-26-1** mark in their last 74 road conference games (Big 8 & Big 12—six losses at Nebraska, three at Kansas State, two at Iowa State, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and Texas Tech; and one each at Baylor, Oklahoma State and Texas A&M; the tie was at K-State in 1993). CU is **23-25** on the Big 12 road since 1996 (**2-2** in 2007). The chart to the right does not include neutral site games, despite some being anything but (i.e., Colorado vs. Texas at Irving for the '01 Big 12 title.)

Colorado has the nation's 20th best record over the last 19 seasons, or since the start of 1989, CU has posted a **148-81-4** record. THE BUFFALOES IN THE BIG 12

The Big 12 Conference has wrapped its 12th season, and the Buffaloes are tied for the second most division titles won with four, trailing only Oklahoma's six. Just seven of the schools in the conference have won a division title, with Missouri the first "newbie" to do so in six years. A closer look:

- ⇒ Big 12 Division Titles (including 2007): Oklahoma 6, Colorado 4, Nebraska 4, Texas 4, Kansas State 3, Texas A & M 2, Missouri 1.
- ⇒ Big 12 Championship Game Records: Oklahoma 5-1, Nebraska 2-2, Texas 2-2, Texas A & M 1-1, Kansas State 1-2, Colorado 1-3, Missouri 0-1.

CU VS. THE BIG 12 NORTH: Colorado owns the best record in intra-division competition going back to the start of the 2001 season against Big 12 North Division rivals, as the Buffaloes are **22-13**; other records: Nebraska 21-14, Kansas State 19-16, Missouri 16-19, Kansas 14-21 and Iowa State 13-22. Colorado is **13-5** at home in this stretch versus the North, the only losses to NU (2003, 2005), KSU (2006) and KU and MU (2007).

TV LAND

Colorado has had **148** of its last **221** games dating back to 1990 broadcast nationally or regionally (67 percent). That included 11 games in 2007, seven in 2006, 10 in 2005, nine in 2004, seven in 2003, 12 in 2002, 10 in 2001, plus 7 in 2000, 9 in both 1998 and 1999, 10 in 1996 and 1997. Since 1996, when the Big 12 began, **111** of CU's **148** games have been either nationally or regionally televised, an impressive 75 percent (the second most in the Big 12 Conference in that time frame). In addition, CU has had **24** of its last **29** non-conference games televised on a national or regional basis.

TWENTY-EIGHT SEE FIRST CU ACTION IN 2007

A total of 28 players stepped on to the field wearing a Colorado Buffalo uniform for the first time in 2007. Twelve players had their first taste of collegiate action in the opener against Colorado State, with three more hitting the field for the first time at Arizona State and two others in game three against Florida State. In game four, the floodgates opened again with seven players making their first appearance. In 2006, 19 players saw their first action, with 14 taking the field for the first time in the opener; 16 saw their first action in 2005 while 24 did so in both 2004 and 2003. EIGHTEEN PLAYERS MAKE FIRST CAREER START IN 2007

Eighteen players made their first CU career starts in 2007 (12 offense, 6 defense). Five came in the opener: QB Cody Hawkins, WR Scotty McKnight, OG Wes Palazzi and TB Demetrius Sumler and one on defense, SS Daniel Dykes. At Arizona State in game two, ILB Jake Duren was in for the first play, and against Florida State in CU's home opener, ILB R.J. Brown, TE Joe Sanders and WR Josh Smith were out there for the first play. ILB Jeff Smart made his first start against Miami-Ohio in game four, just days after he was awarded a scholarship. WR Kendrick Celestine and OG Kai Maiava trotted out there for the first play against Oklahoma in game five, while TE Nate Solder did the same at Baylor. FB Jake Behrens, TB Brian Lockridge and OT Ryan Miller made their first starts at Kansas State. Later in the year, CB Gardner McKay and DE Chris Perri got the opening nods in the Iowa State game. Twenty-four players made their first career starts in 2006, the third-most over the last 23 seasons (15 offense, nine defense). The 24 first-time starters in 2006 were the third-most over the last 23 seasons and were the most since 1998, when there were 27 first-time starters for the Buffaloes, 17 on offense and 10 on defense. The high came in 1984, when 29 made their first starts (15 on offense). The annual number of first-time starters since 1984:

SCORING STREAKS

The Buffs have scored in a school record 235 consecutive games, last being shutout on November 12, 1988 by Nebraska in Lincoln (7-0). CU has scored in 124 straight games at home (last shutout: a 28-0 loss to Oklahoma on Nov. 15, 1986 in a game where the Sooners did not *attempt* a single pass). The Buffs have scored in 92 consecutive road games (120 including neutral sites). The Buffs have scored in 150 straight league games (all 100 in Big 12 play, including the four title games, and their final 50 in Big Eight competition, dating back to the '88 shutout at Nebraska). CU has scored in 125 straight games against non-conference opponents (last shutout: a 44-0 loss at home to LSU on September 15, 1979). The home shutout losses to Oklahoma in '86 and LSU in '79 are the only two times CU has not scored at Folsom Field over the course of the last 263 games (all the way back to 1963). CU has been shutout just seven times in its last 466 games (dating to October 5, 1968), but only four schools have administered them: Oklahoma (three times), Nebraska (twice), Louisiana State and Michigan. *Big 12 Conference Consecutive Game Scoring Streaks (through 2007):* Colorado 235, Nebraska 151, Kansas State 140, Texas Tech 130, Oklahoma 121, Kansas 63, Missouri 63, Iowa State 51, Texas A&M 51, Texas 46, Oklahoma State 33, Baylor 11. CU is the last team to shutout both Kansas State (12-0 in 1996) and Oklahoma State (34-0 in 2005).

SCORING STREAKS II

The school record **235** consecutive games in which Colorado has scored is the **fourth** longest active streak in the nation. Since the start of the 1993 season, just six Division I-A/FBS schools have scored in every game. The list, through all games of the 2007 season:

ANATOMY OF THE SCORING STREAK

Colorado has more often than not extended its scoring streak rather quickly. In the 235-game run, CU has scored on its first possession 94 times, plus another three occasions where it scored on returns on its first touch of the game. The Buffs have scored in the first quarter 163 times during the streak, and had it extended by halftime 213 times. Colorado has a **150-81-4** record during the scoring streak, averaging **35.6** points in the wins and **16.2** points in the losses (and 23.5 the four tied games). The Buffs have had only nine occasions where they were delayed extending the streak in the fourth quarter.

SCORING DUEL JUST 25 MILES APART

Colorado has scored in 235 straight games dating back to 1988; down the road, the NFL **Denver Broncos** have scored in 245 consecutive contests, the longest active streak in the professional ranks, one which dates back to 1992. Their fiercest rivals inflicted the last shutouts of each: Nebraska and the Raiders (then in L.A.). Combined, the pair has scored in 480 straight games. Many traits are eerily similar; the Broncos have extended it on their first possession 96 times, in the first quarter 161 times and by halftime on 233 occasions, although have had to wait to extend it in the fourth quarter just twice.

And if you add in **Air Force**'s streak of 181 games, the Front Range trio has a 661-game streak going among them through games of the 2007 season.

Dan Hawkins falls in line with most, if not all, head coaches when it comes to turnovers, and that they are one of the single most important factors in winning or losing ball games. He has penalties and rewards daily in the practice dependent on the number of turnovers committed or forced. Gary Barnett drilled home to his teams the importance of taking care of the football, which he learned from the legendary Bill McCartney. Statistics back up the argument, as the below will show that it is definitely better to take than to give over the last 19 seasons, in which CU owns the nation's 20th best overall record:

Here's where several Buffs from last year's team rank or ranked on some of CU's all-time statistical charts through the 2007 season (Note: Colorado does not count bowl stats into career totals to protect past history):

- ⇒ **TB HUGH CHARLES** ended his career sixth in rushing yards (2,659), second in all-purpose yards (3,622), fifth in yards from scrimmage (3,211), tied for 27th in receptions (60, tied for the second most by a RB), 49th in receiving yards (552, sixth most by an RB), and tied for 38th in scoring (102 points).
- ⇒ ILB JORDON DIZON finished fourth in total tackles (440), first in solo stops (293), first in third down stops (48), 11th in TFL's (35), 21st in sacks (12).
- ⇒ **PK KEVIN EBERHART** tied for 11th in field goals made (16), tied for 13th in field goals attempted (26) and tied for 48th in scoring (87 points).
- \Rightarrow **TB BYRON ELLIS** finished 81st in rushing yards (534).
- ⇒ **QB CODY HAWKINS** is 11th in passing yards (2,693), is ninth in completions (239), is tied for 10th in attempts (424), is eighth in touchdown passes (19) and is tied for 17th in interceptions (15).
- \Rightarrow WR SCOTTY McKNIGHT is 47th in receptions (43) and is 63rd in receiving yards (488).
- ⇒ **KR STEPHONE ROBINSON** finished seventh in punt return yards (647), fifth in punt returns (79), seventh in kickoff return yards (867), tied for fourth in kickoff returns (49) and fifth in combined kick return yards (1,514).
- \Rightarrow **WR JOSH SMITH** is 69th in receiving yards (451).
- \Rightarrow WR DUSTY SPRAGUE wrapped his career ninth in receptions (103) and ninth in receiving yards (1,261).
- ⇒ CB TERRENCE WHEATLEY tied for third in interceptions (14), tied for seventh in pass deflections (29), second in kickoff return yards (1,350) and kickoff returns (56).
- ⇒ WR PATRICK WILLIAMS is 20th in receptions (74) and is 28th in receiving yards (748).

3-0 Versus the Big Bad South

The North Division schools have taken their lumps, not only in games but also publicly, but perhaps things are changing; they are for Colorado. The 31-26 win at Texas Tech gave the Buffaloes a season-sweep against the South Division, the third time CU has done so. This was the eighth time in 12 years that CU won the season series with the South schools. Colorado is 21-15 all-time against the South in the regular season, the best mark of any North Division team. The Buffs also have won the season series against the South in 1996 (3-0), 1998 (3-0), 1999 (2-1), 2000 (2-1), 2001 (2-1), 2002 (2-1) and 2005 (2-1). Seems some had forgotten that the North was the dominant division in this league at the on-set, and these things are in fact cyclical; thanks to CU and Kansas (which also went 3-0), the North won the season series over the South by two games (10-8), its first claim on inter-division play since 2001.
