Colorado's Sports Information Department welcomes and encourages your interest in Colorado Soccer. We will make every effort to meet your needs in covering the Buffs. MEDIA SERVICES

Weekly media releases containing updated team and individual statistics, information on upcoming games, Big 12 Conference standings and the latest NSCAA Division I poll will be available every Tuesday morning throughout the season. Game notes, media guides and roster information can be picked up before every game at the scorer's table at Prentup Field. Copies of the match statistics and postgame release can be emailed to your outlet following each game, home or away.

PRENTUP FIELD

All home games will be played on campus at Prentup Field, located on CU's East Campus at 33rd and Colorado. Admission, and parking in the adjacent lot, are free.

INTERVIEW POLICIES

Interview requests should be made directly through the CU Sports Information Department. Please contact Lindsay Lew to request access to athletes. Both athletes and staff will be on the field and available to the media following a brief cooling off period at the conclusion of all games. Buff practices are held on Prentup Field, from 8:00 a.m. to approximately 9:30 a.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and approximately 7:00 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. on Wednesdays. Players and coaches may speak with the media after practice. The coaching staff is generally available in their offices weekdays from 9 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and after practices. Practice times may vary. Please feel free to call any member of the coaching staff during the day at 303-492-0632, however to contact a student-athlete, we ask that you go through the sports information office.

DURING THE GAME

Statistics are available at halftime and at the end of the game. There are currently no phone lines available at Prentup, but wireless internet access is available for the 2007 season. Please see Allie Musso or Jordan Edwards at the game for login information.

Coming off one of the best seasons in Colorado soccer history, CU head coach Bill Hempen will welcome his biggest and perhaps most talented group of newcomers to an experienced core of veteran players to try and pick up where the Buffaloes left off in 2006.

WHAT RETURNS

Colorado returns 13 letterwinners from a year ago and eight starters from the first CU team to make the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament. There will be an experienced player in every level of the lineup for Bill Hempen, with all of his minutes at goalkeeper returning and seven other starters back in Boulder.

The majority of offense returns as 78.5 percent of the goals scored (33-42) 64.7 percent of its assists (22-34) and 72.8 percent of its shot takers (86-118) will resume competition this fall.

Individually, the Big 12's leading scorer, CU's single season record holder and U.S. U-20 player **Nikki Marshall** will be back (37 points) along with **Alex Cousins** (17 points), **Nikki Keller** (9 points) and four other Buffs with goals a year ago. Those three were starters either at forward or in the midfield in all but one of CU's 24 games in 2006.

Also returning from regular appearances in the starting lineup a year ago are **Michelle Wenino**, **Jess Quador**, **Allison Kidd**, **Brittany Dornseif** and the two-header monster in goal of **Kirstin Radlinski** and **Kara Linder**. Dornseif started every game in 2006, while the other three started at least half. Radlinski and Linder saw action in 20 and 12 games, respectively.

WHAT DOESN'T

The Buffs lose 14 letterwinners from 2006 but just three starters, a nice change from a year ago when CU had to replace over half of the starting lineup. Three seniors graduated in Katie Griffin, Laura Munnely and Allie True, all of whom were seasoned veterans and full-time starters during their respective tenures. Griffin moved on as CU's all-time leading scorer, while Munnely left the owner of virtually every participation record on the books at CU. That class was the winningest in school history and the first to make four-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances as a group.

Also leaving the team were eight non-starters; freshmen Caitlin Choun, Kelly DuChene, Megan Down, Libby Doyne, Shea Kelly, Kyrna Wheeler, sophomores Megan Manthey and Kris Kauftheil and junior Maura Gentile. Manthey had the most experience of the group, spending the beginning of 2006 as a starter.

WHAT'S NEW

Bill Hempen will welcome the largest recruiting class in CU history to Boulder this fall as 18 new faces join the Buffs for this season. Two transfers returning home to Colorado will bolster the roster in juniors **Gianna DeSaverio** (Arizona) and **Genna Gorman** (Tennessee), who were both first team all conference performers at their previous stops.

CU has had great success with homebound transfers as former Colorado prep standouts Kathryn Grandinetti and Jessica Keller were immediate impact players upon their returns to Boulder in the fall of 2003 after stints at Kentucky and Miami, respectively.

The 16 remaining newcomers are all freshmen except for one sophomore, **Tobie Rippy** (Glendwood Springs, Colo.), and hail from seven different states. The group includes: **Kaylee Boryla** (Centennial, Colo.), **Julia Burnett** (Edwards, Colo.), **Jaclyn Cardarelli** (Medfield, Ma.), **Cortney Charlesworth** (Lawrenceville, Ga.), **Heidi Daugherty** (Camas, Wash.), **Michaela DeJesus** (Dublin, Calif.), **Amanda Foulk** (Broomfield, Colo.), **Brooke Hickerson** (Littleton, Colo.), **Mel Hicks** (Federal Way, Wash.), **Maddie Kawa** (Naperville, Ill.), **Kym Lowry** (Vancouver, Wash.), **Amanda Raley** (Louisville, Colo.), **Lauren Sandford** (Newport Beach, Calif.), **Taryn Vitacca** (Sandy, Utah) and **Natalie Weeks** (San Ramon, Calif.).

THE FORWARDS

The Buffs' front line will sport a somewhat new look in 2007. Returning is the 2006 Big 12 Freshman of the Year and the conference's leading scorer in sophomore Nikki Marshall, who had the most productive offensive season in CU history with 17 goals. She was partnered for the latter half of 2006 with junior Alex Cousins, who moved from her spot in the midfield to a role up top, which resulted in five goals and seven assists on the season for her. Also figuring into the mix at forward will be senior Allison Kidd, who has played both up top and in the midfield in her three year career.

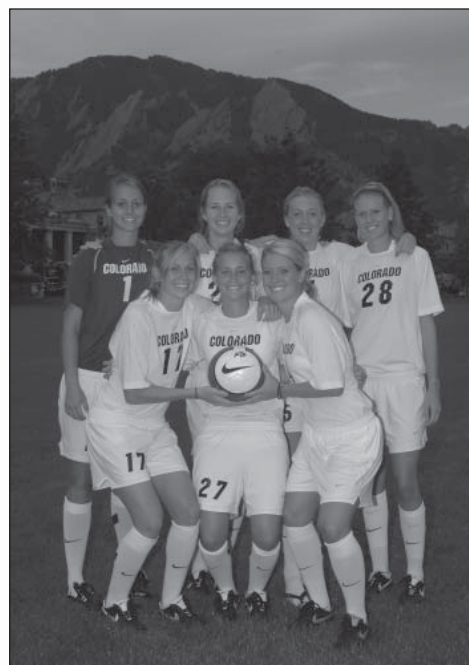
That trio will likely be bolstered by a pair of newcomers in transfers Gianna DeSaverio and Genna Gorman, both of whom were industrious scorers at their previous institutions. Also factoring in will be junior Amber Bettenhausen, who tore her ACL the day before training camp started a year ago, and who has now been sitting for two full seasons because of injuries.

THE MIDFIELD

The midfield will return all but one player who saw action a year ago. CU will need to replace Allie True in the midfield, the only Buff to start all 24 games there last season, but a myriad of returning players saw action there a year ago.

Junior Nikki Keller saw 24 games of action a year ago, mostly at outside midfield and figures to return there in 2007. Cousins is a midfielder by trade and although she spent time up front in 2006, she should return to her offensive center midfield role this season.

Sophomore Jess Quador started off her freshman campaign in the defense, but moved to a role in the defensive central midfield and did a solid job learning on the fly, also scoring three gamewinning goals in her





23 games of action. She will push for a spot in the center midfield again this season.

THE DEFENSE

The heart of the defense for four years departed in the form of Laura Munnely, but her leadership of a very young Buff defense a year ago will pay dividends this season as the deepest area of CU's roster.

Junior Michelle Wenino saw action in 16 games for the Buffaloes last year and in the spring emerged as the probable heir to Munnely's throne in the center of CU's defense. She is joined by senior Brittany Dornseif, who started all 24 games a year ago in the back and is the most veteran player on the Buffs roster.

A pair of sophomores saw a lot of duty last year as Kelly Ross and Mary White each had a lot of action in the lineup for Hempden on defense, playing mostly on the outside.

THE KEEPERS

Junior Kirstin Radlinski and sophomore Kara Linder battled it out last season for the starting job, with the initial nod going to Linder to start the season. Linder posted a record of 6-2-1 in that span with a 1.08 goals against average, however Radlinski worked her way back into the lineup in Big 12 play and solidified her spot for the rest of last season. She finished with 20 appearances, a record of 8-3-3, a 1.09 GAA and three shutouts.

Last season is over, and the duo will each start training camp this fall with a clean slate and a shot at the starting job. Linder is the more athletic of the pair while Radlinski has more big game experience and showed good leadership in the back a year ago. One of them will have to win the job in 2007, it will not be based on their performances of 2006.

THE SCHEDULE

After an exhibition at Northern Colorado, the Buffaloes will open the regular season on the road for the second-straight year, this time down the road at Denver on August 31. It will be a rematch of last year's second round NCAA Tournament match played in Denver and marks the first time since 2003 that the teams have opened the season against one another. That will be followed by a trip back to Denver to take on Fairfield for the first time.

CU's home opener will be on a Thursday, kicking off the Prentup Field season on Sept. 6 against 2006 NCAA foe Utah. The teams met a year ago in Salt Lake City, the Buffs winning that match 2-1. Then on Saturday, Sept. 4 CU will face BYU at home for the first time, having played the Cougars three times in Utah to date and going 0-3 in those matches. Hopefully a change of scenery will benefit the Buffaloes.

Then it's on the road for a pair of games at the University of Virginia, with CU facing the Cavaliers of the ACC for the first time in school history on Sept. 14. That will be followed by a match with New Mexico in Charlottesville on Sept. 16.

Colorado will host the Colorado Soccer Classic at Prentup Field for

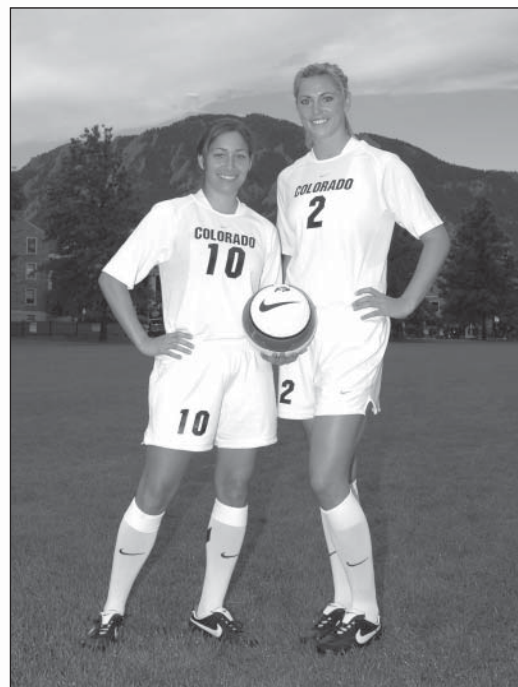
its final non-conference home matches of the season. Pac-10 power Stanford comes to Boulder for the first ever meeting between the schools on Friday, Sept. 21. That will be preceded by Denver facing Drake. On Sept. 23 the teams will switch it up with the Buffs playing Drake and DU taking on Stanford. A trip to Laramie on Sept. 25 to take on Wyoming will be CU's final tuneup before Big 12 play gets underway.

The Buffs get a three game homestand to open Big 12 play, first facing Texas Tech on Sept. 28. This marks the second year in a row that the Lady Raiders have traveled to Boulder as a quirk in the conference schedule sent them away from home to take on CU again. That weekend will also be CU's homecoming and soccer alumnae weekend in Boulder.

Then the Buffaloes will have a week to rest up before taking on Nebraska on Oct. 5 at Prentup Field. The teams tied a year ago in Lincoln in double overtime. On Oct. 7, Iowa State will come to Boulder to try and avenge a hard-fought 1-0 loss in Ames a year ago. CU will go to Texas the following weekend to take on Baylor on Friday, Oct. 12 in Waco. CU won that contest a year ago 1-0 in Boulder on senior day. Then it's to College Station where CU will try to make it two in a row over the Texas A&M Aggies. The Buffs posted their first-ever win over A&M last year in double-overtime in the Big 12 Tournament by a score of 3-2.

The friendly confines of Prentup Field will be a welcome sight for the final time of the season on Oct. 19 against the Kansas Jayhawks with an early 3 p.m. kickoff. The teams met twice a year ago with the Buffs winning 4-0 in Lawrence and then tying 1-1 in the Big 12 Tournament with CU advancing on penalty kicks. CU will celebrate senior day on Oct. 21 against the Missouri Tigers, who topped the Buffs 3-0 a year ago in Columbia in what was widely regarded as the worst performance of the year for CU. Seniors Brittany Dornseif and Allison Kidd will attempt to make that wrong a right in their last regular season appearance in Boulder.

The Big 12 schedule sends CU on the road for its final three regular season games this season. First on Oct. 26 the Buffs will take on Oklahoma in Norman. That will be followed by CU's second-straight trip to Stillwater to face Oklahoma State on Oct. 28. Colorado will wrap up 2007 in Austin, Texas, taking on the Texas Longhorns. The teams met twice in 2006, with Texas winning 2-1 in Boulder and then the teams tied in the Big 12 Championship game by a score of 1-1. Texas won the tournament title on penalty kicks.



HEAD COACH BILL HEMPEN



After six seasons in Boulder, head coach Bill Hempen has produced a team that battles for the Big 12 Conference championship year in and year out.

When he arrived in Boulder in the summer of 2001, he found himself inheriting a team that though close, had yet to put together a winning Big 12 season. He started to put the pieces in place that would make Colorado Soccer a success.

It then took just two seasons to orchestrate the biggest single-season turnaround in CU and Big 12 history, and one of the best in the nation when his 2002 squad went 10-8-2 and finished fifth in the league just a year after his first team struggled at 3-11-1 to finish 10th.

It would take just one more year to turn naysayers into believers as the Buffs went from 10th to first with the program's first conference title, a 15-4-1 record, nine shutouts, a 14-match unbeaten streak, the school's first national ranking in the sport, a Big 12 Coach of the Year title for Hempen and the program's first NCAA Tournament bid in 2003.

While Hempen took a leap of faith to leave a Duke program that he started in 1988, he credits others that leapt along with him for bringing Colorado its first conference crown in 2003.

Along with the efforts of his assistant coaches, he credits 2003 Big 12 Player of the Year Fran Munnelly's commitment to come to CU during that 3-11-1 season, "She must have seen my passion and commitment to make it work here. My track record, the locale and University was good enough for her to come here."

Since his arrival in Boulder during the summer of 2001, Colorado soccer has reinvented itself.

He won his 50th game at CU when the Buffs topped UNC 3-0 on Oct. 10, 2005, and coached his milestone 350th game on Oct. 17, 2004 and the record breaking 7-0 shutout against Texas Tech gave the 17-year veteran his milestone 200th career victory.

He is among the all-time winningest coaches in NCAA Division I women's soccer history, with 231 career wins, good for 19th on the active list.

"What this means is that I've been doing this a long time," said Hempen after the match. "It's really an honor and a tribute to all the kids that have put up with me over the years and to my first team at Duke (1988) who also contributed to this."

As the program enters its 12th season, one need only look at Hempen's leadership when charting its future. Since his arrival, the Buffs have gone 69-43-15 (.616) overall and 30-22-8 (.580) in Big 12 Conference play. Included in five straight top-five league finishes is the 2003 Big 12 Championship and that season's player, rookie and coach of the year in addition to 20 player appearances on All-Big 12 teams. Colorado has claimed eight spots on all-region teams, and boasts a three time All-American in Fran Munnelly, who was also named to the Big 12 10th Anniversary team in 2005.

In the classroom, 49 players have been named to Academic All-Big 12 teams while the 2003 squad won the athletic department's most improved honor for a team as its aggregate grade point average rose .44 from the previous academic year. In 2005, senior goalkeeper Jessie Keller was named a CoSIDA District VII Academic All-Region Soccer Team member, the first in CU history.

When hired on June 5, 2001, Bill Hempen came to Boulder with eight NCAA Tournament Appearances, three ACC Coach of the Year honors, 1992 National Soccer Coaches Association of America National Coach of the Year recognition, and one of the winningest programs during the last decade under his belt.

He came to Colorado from Duke, where he had been the Blue Devils' head coach since the program's inception in 1988.

He led the Blue Devils to eight appearances in the NCAA Tournament and had a career record of 162-100-16 (.676) in Durham. He was the NSCAA National Coach of the Year in 1992, and was also named Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year three times (1992, 1994 and 1997) while directing Duke to the 16th most wins in the country (124) in the 1990s.

Hempen's Duke teams finished the season ranked in the national polls nine times with their highest finish coming in 1994, a No. 4 ranking following Duke's first ACC regular season title and a win over 13-time national champion North Carolina to snap the Tar Heels' 101-game unbeaten streak.

The 1992 season was among Hempen's finest, as he





He married then-Duke assistant coach and 1990 Colorado graduate Stephanie Poncher in 1999. The couple has a 7-year-old daughter, Emma, and a 5-year-old son, Lucas.

He also has significant experience with the United States

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH PAUL HOGAN



The constant of Bill Hempen's tenure at Colorado has been the presence of associate head coach Paul Hogan. Hogan has been Hempen's right hand man since his arrival prior to the 2001 season.

Paul Hogan is in his seventh season at Colorado, his second as associate head coach as he was promoted August 22, 2006.

During his time in Boulder, Colorado has won the 2003 Big 12 Championship, appeared in four NCAA tournaments and have earned five straight top-five league finishes.

In addition to his duties as assistant coach on the Boulder campus, Hogan is also in his fifth season coaching the Colorado ODP teams.

Prior to his arrival in Boulder, Hogan spent three seasons at Allegheny where he guided the Gators to a 35-16-7 (.686) overall record and 17-6-2 (.739) North Coast Athletic Conference mark while producing 16 All-NCAC players.

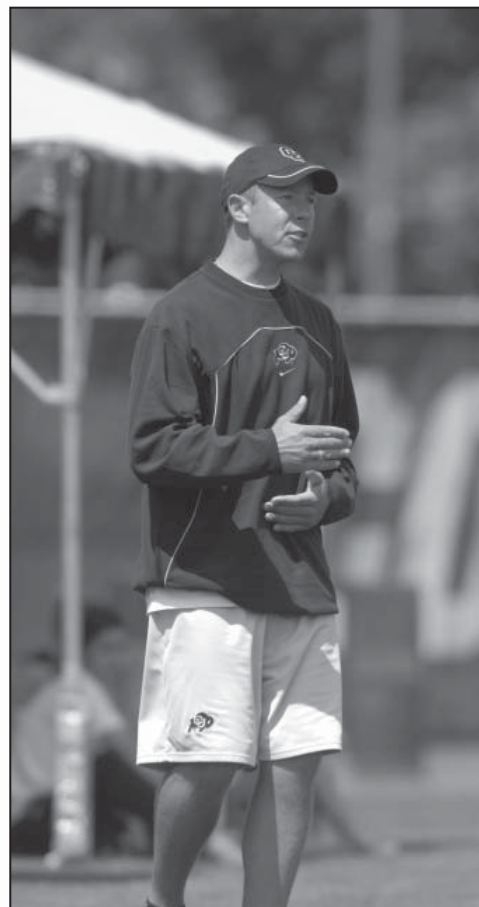
His three Gator teams finished no lower than third in the final NCAC standings and his 1999 squad won a school record six conference games, matched by the 2000 team, earning Hogan conference coach of the year accolades and Allegheny NCAC Newcomer and Offensive Player of the Year postseason honors.

Hogan made the leap to head coach in April 1998 from Duke where he was an assistant for the 1996 and '97 seasons. He assisted the Blue Devils to a two-year record of 28-11. In 1997, Duke finished 15-5-0, 4-2-0 in Atlantic Coast Conference action and won the ACC tournament championship. Over his two seasons, Hogan helped coach three All-Americans and 11 All-ACC selections.

Previously, Hogan spent one season contributing at his alma mater as a volunteer, the University of Charleston (W.V.). He helped Charleston to a 17-3 record and an NCAA Division II playoff berth in 1995.

Hogan graduated from Charleston in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in sports science. There, he was a three-time All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference selection at goalkeeper. He earned All-South Region honors from the National Soccer Coaches Association in both 1993 and 1994, and led the Golden Eagles to WVIAC championships in 1992 and 1994.

Born August 22, 1972, the Monroe, N.Y. native is a 1990 graduate of Washingtonville High School. He is the oldest of two and his younger sister Nancy also played soccer at Elon College in North Carolina. In what little free time he has, Hogan likes to golf.



ASSISTANT COACH ALLI HUNT



Alli Hunt is entering her third season as assistant coach after filling the void of a second assistant coach that had been vacant since the end of the 2003 season.

A four-year letterwinner and starter for Wake Forest and head coach Tony da Luz, the Demon Deacons went 41-30-8 overall and 10-16-3 in Atlantic Coast Conference play from 2001-04. Hunt played in four NCAA Tournaments as an undergraduate, as the Demon Deacons dropped first round matches during the 2001, '03 and '04 championships and advanced to the second round in 2002. She started 71 of 79 career matches and her career line includes 49 shots, a single score, 13 assists and 15 points.

As a freshman, she was an ACC All-Freshman Team selection and picked by Soccer Buzz to the Southeast Region All-Freshman Team. She saw action in 18 games with 11 starts and assisted on the gamewinning goal in a 1-0 shutout win over North Carolina State.

The most productive season of her career, her sophomore campaign, she started all 22 matches and led the team with a season high seven assists which tied the single season school record.

Hunt was named to the 2003 Wake Forest adidas Women's Soccer Classic All-Tournament team as a junior. She started all 20 matches for the Deacons and had nine shots and a single assist on the 10-7-3 season.

As a senior she started all 19 contests and had four points on the season, including one score and a pair of assists. Her lone goal proved to be the gamewinner on a penalty kick against Maryland. And one of her two assists on the season was against CU in a 1-2 loss during the WF adidas Women's Soccer Classic. The win was CU's first in six attempts against ACC teams. She capped her collegiate career as an All-ACC and All- Southeast Region pick.

A Charlotte, N.C. native, Allison Meredith Hunt was born July 31, 1983 in Charlotte. Prior to playing at Wake Forest, she captained and was named the 2000 season MVP of her club team, the '81 Ladies Blue, which she led to the 1998 and 2000 North Carolina state championship and the Region III semifinals. She captained the state and region team in the Olympic Development Program, and has also been invited to five national camps. Hunt led her state team to the 2001 Region III championship. She attended the select Adidas ESP Camp two years. In prep play she was a two-time conference player of the year and the 2000 Region II Player of the Year at Charlotte Country Day School. A three-time all-state selection, three-time all-region selection and three-time all-conference selection, she led Charlotte Country Day to the state semifinals three straight years and also played basketball.

She is a second generation ACC student-athlete as her mother, the then Ginny Bauer, swam and dove at North Carolina where she was the ACC diving champion in the mid 1970s.

Her hobbies include reading, watching the Food Network and beating Paul daily at the "meg" game.

THIS SEASON: With the valuable playing experience that she has gained the past two years, Cousins will step into a leadership role and to help groom some of our younger players. The coaches expect more production from Alex and see her being the most dominant midfielder. She will continue to provide the team with passion and some light moments.

SOPHOMORE (2006): Was the second-leading scorer for the Buffs with five goals and seven assists on the year. Cousins was also named a First Team Academic All-Big 12 selection, one of four Buffs to earn academic accolades. She scored the game-tying goal against Texas on Nov. 5 in CU's 1-1 tie with the Longhorns in the championship game. She saw action in all 24 games and started all but one, playing 2,078 minutes on the season. Cousins led Colorado in assists with seven, the second-highest single season total in school history. Her 17 total points were the 13th highest single season total in CU history, and her five goals were good for 16th all time.

FRESHMAN (2005): Cousins started 12 of 24 games as a freshman, playing mostly in the midfield but also seeing time up top. She managed 30 shots on the season, including eight on goal in 1,169 minutes of play. She scored her first career goal in the Big 12 Championship game against Texas A&M, tying the game off a cross from Laura Munnelly at the 63:40 mark.

HIGH SCHOOL: A four-year letterwinner, following her junior and senior seasons Cousins was named the team's most valuable player, first-team all-Northern Conference in '04, and first-team all-Front Range in '05. *Rocky Mountain News* All-Colorado, first-team all-state and the *Denver Post*'s 5A Player of the Year after leading the state in assists as a junior. She was all-Colorado and first-team all state both seasons. The Lambkins were the 2003 and '04 Northern Conference Champions and the 2004 and '05 5A state runners-up. Cousins played club ball for the Colorado Girls Soccer Academy which was the State Cup runners-up in 2004.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Cousins graduated with a 3.9 gpa and was FCHS's Student of the Year in '05. She was Colorado High School Athletic Association (CHSAA) Academic Team Champion and first-team Academic All-State performer from 2003-05 and was Fort Collins' CU Junior of the Year. A possible anthropology major, after college she would like to go into the Peace Corps and travel abroad. Cousins earned recognition on both the Fall and Spring Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll and was able to maintain a GPA between 3.00-3.49 as a freshman during the Fall soccer season.

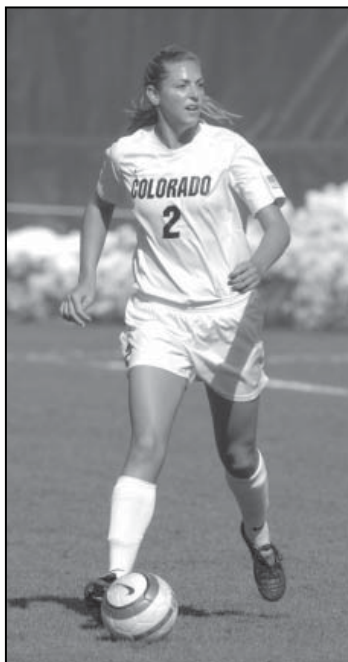
THIS SEASON: Dornseif will be the anchor of the defense. As a senior leader on the squad, the coaches expect her to be the dominant center back that she can be.

JUNIOR (2006): After coming off the bench as a sophomore, Dornseif laid claim to a starting spot in the defense that she owned for the entire season. She played in all 24 games, starting all but one, and played 2,085 minutes, coming out of just seven games and logging 17 complete outings. As the season progressed she became a dominant defensive player in the air. Notched her first career assist on Nikki Marshall's second goal at Kansas, and then scored her first career goal a week later against Texas A&M. She registered 10 shots on the season, three on goal. She also scored the fifth and result clinching penalty kick in CU's draw with Kansas in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament.

SOPHOMORE (2005): Dornseif saw action in 16 of CU's 24 games, with one shot on goal in that span. She played a season high 82 minutes in CU's overtime loss at Wyoming, and played over 30 minutes on five different occasions.

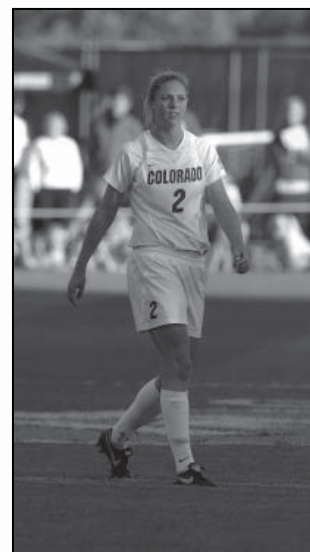
FRESHMAN (2004): After coming off the bench for an average of 30.4 minutes in 10 of the first 13 games of the season (she didn't play against Utah and Wake Forest), she started nine of the last 10 games, averaging 84.8 minutes, and going the distance in all but two contests. The exception was when she came off the bench for 32 minutes against Oklahoma when Bill Hempen started senior Ellen Falender on the left side as part of Senior Day. She had a pair of shots on the season, one each against San Diego and Denver and had a goal line save against Missouri in opening round of the Big 12 Tournament.

HIGH SCHOOL: Dornseif was an all-conference award winner and a first-team 5A all-state performer as a junior and senior at Arapahoe for coach Kirk Bast and the Warriors who took the 2003 Continental League title. On the club side, she played for the Colorado Real from 2000-02 before playing for Real and coach Jared Spires. Her Real team was the 2003 State and 2003 Surf Cup champions and runners-up at the Miami Orange Classic. In 2005 Real took second place in regionals.



IN THE CLASSROOM: A scholar-athlete as a junior and senior in high school, Dornseif is a psychology and Elementary Education major at Colorado with a better than 3.0 grade point average.

THIS SEASON: Keller is another one of the team's leaders. She can be a force in the Big 12 if she puts her mind to it. Keller is a very versatile player who can play in the midfield or up top and with consistency, she will be a key factor in production in terms of assists and goals.

SOPHOMORE (2006): Saw action in all 24 games, starting 23, playing mostly at outside midfield but occasionally seeing spot duty at forward. Keller scored three goals on the season, the first in CU's second game of the season vs. Alabama. She also scored against Wyoming after coming off the bench in that game following CU's double overtime draw at Nebraska, and she also scored CU's lone goal against Kansas in the Big 12 Tournament. Keller dished out a trio of assists, with two against Clemson and also the gametying assist in CU's come-from-behind win over A&M in the Big 12 Tournament. She saw 1,882 minutes of action, with 36 shots, 11 on goal.

FRESHMAN (2005): Keller started 20 of CU's 24 games in her first year, scoring four goals and notching four assists, good for 12 points and tying with Allison Kidd as CU's third leading scorer. She notched two game winning goals, against Pittsburgh and Iowa State. Her goal vs. Pitt was the first of her career, and came at the 83:11 mark. She managed a career high four shots on four different occasions and posted 42 on the year, 22 of which were on goal.

HIGH SCHOOL: Keller and the Ralston Valley Mustangs won four straight Jeffco League Championships and reached the 4A state quarterfinal rounds in 2002 and '04 and semifinal play in 2003. Keller was a second-team all-Jeffco performer as a freshman and first-team all-conference and second-team all-state as a sophomore, junior and senior. A three-sport athlete at Ralston Valley, Keller was a four-year letterwinner of the Mustangs' 4x100 and 4x200-m relay teams and has run the open 100 and 200 distances. Keller played her club ball for the Colorado Girls Soccer Academy, and coach James Harris. Keller was also recruited by Illinois and Denver.

THIS SEASON: Once Kidd returns to full health she will contribute speed and attacking flair. She is a tremendous 1 v 1 player and is expecting big things for her senior season. She is another player who the coaches expect more production out of. Kidd has the ability to be an All Big 12 performer.

JUNIOR (2006): Kidd made her season debut at BYU, playing 33 minutes in CU's 3-2 loss. That would be the fewest minutes of action for her, as she was inserted into the starting lineup for good on Oct. 6 vs. Texas A&M. Kidd scored her first goal of the season and the seventh of her career against Oklahoma. She then posted the gamewinning assists against Iowa State and Texas Tech. In CU's Big 12 Final draw with Texas, Kidd was the most prolific offensive player, managing eight shots against the stingy Longhorn defense. She would assist both of Katie Griffin's goals in the NCAA First Round victory over Colorado College in 90 minutes of play, one of two compete games she played on the season.

SOPHOMORE (2005): After recovering a torn ACL suffered the previous year, Kidd started 20 of CU's 24 games as a sophomore. She was CU's third-leading scorer with four goals and four assists, with three gamewinners to her credit. She had 46 shots on the season, including 21 on goal. Kidd scored the gamewinner in overtime against Texas in the Big 12 Tournament, just 1:06 into the period. She also had gamewinners at Texas earlier in the season, and against Missouri in CU's second-to-last home game of the year.

FRESHMAN (2004): Kidd was on pace to become Bill Hempen's fourth straight freshman to lead the team in scoring as she was fourth with four points (trailing then-leader Ashlie Mihalcin by two) when she tore her ACL at Iowa State in the conference opener. It was her second such injury as she tore her right in high school. Prior to the season-ending injury she started the first two games of the season at Georgia and at Air Force and came off the bench the last seven leading up to the ISU game. Her two scores on the

season came at the hands of Eastern Michigan and Denver. Sans the injury she took on National Anthem duties prior to Buff home games and also sang at a Buff basketball game.

HIGH SCHOOL: Kidd was the soccer team captain as a freshman, junior and senior at midfield on the pitch as well as all-district as a junior. As a senior her John Horn team were regional semifinalists. A member of the ODP state team since 1997 and Region III Pool team for three years, her D'feeters' club team was a WAGS finalist in 2000, '01 Surf Cup Finalist, '02 Surf Cup Champions and Orange Bowl Classic finalists a year later. A three-sport athlete at John Horn, she was a point guard on the basketball team and ran long sprints and relays



as well as jumped (long and triple) on the track team and has the school mark as a member of the 800-m relay team.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Kidd graduated as a member of the first, four-year class at John Horn. A Spanish major at CU, Kidd will also pursue a business minor.

PERSONAL: Born in Dallas on Oct. 28, 1985, Allison Marie Kidd is the daughter of David and Sylvia Kidd. Her older sister, Jena, played soccer at Stephen F. Austin and her younger sister, Lauren, is a high school senior.

BIG 12 NEWCOMER OF THE WEEK (AUG. 28, 2006)

THIS SEASON: With the goalkeeping position being a two horse race between Linder and Radlinski, Linder provides the back with compsure and is a great shotblocker. The battle for the starting job will be on going through the season. The goalkeeper who is most consistent and makes the least amount of mistakes will be the starter.

FRESHMAN (2006): Linder started her freshman year off in style, dueling NSCAAAll-Region goalkeeper Tyler Griffin to a scoreless shutout in the first game of the season, posting five saves in 110 minutes of action. She then backed that up with 57 mintues of scoreless action against Alabama, feat that earned her Big 12 Newcomer of the Week honors. Linder started the first eight games of the season and saw action in 12 total games, positing a goals against average of 1.08 and grabbing 26 saves in the process. She owned a record of 6-2-1 in the process, earning two solo shutouts and another three shared with Kirstin Radlinski.

HIGH SCHOOL: Linder helped her Lincoln East Spartans dominate Nebraska Class A prep soccer during her four year career. With 11 shutouts as a senior, Linder holds LEHS record for career shutouts with 39 and finished her high school campaign with a 51-7 record, allowing only 27 goals, with a 0.46 goals against average. A senior captain for the Spartans, she was named to the All-Nebraska Team, Super State first team, Class A All-State first team, All-Heartland Conference first team and the All-City first team. As a junior she captained the Spartans to the Class A State Championship with a record of 14-3, earning Academic All-State, Academic All-Heartland Conference, All-Nebraska Team, Super State first-team, Class A All-State first-team, All-Heartland Conference first-team and All-City first-team honors. Her sophomore year LEHS went 17-0 en route to the state championship, a season which saw her set the school record for shutouts with 13. Thanks to those efforts in net, she was named to the All-City first-team, the Super State second-team and the Class A first-team All-State. As a freshman, the Spartans went 16-3, were state finalists and won the Lincoln City Championship. On the club and Olympic Development side, Linder has been a member of the Nebraska State ODP team the last four years (2002-05) and the 2005 Nebraska/Iowa team. She is a member of the club team Sparta Velocity that has won the last five consecutive Nebraska State Championships (2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2006) under coach Lindsey Ingram, and Linder was a guest player for the Colorado Girls Soccer Academy in 2005.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Linder is planning on majoring in Integrative Physiology at Colorado.

PERSONAL: Kara Lena Linder was born April 12, 1988 in Lincoln, Neb. She is the daughter of Mike and Denise Linder. She has a younger brother, Luke, who is 16 years old. She is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and has volunteered for the March of Dimes.

THIS SEASON: Marshall will be the dominant player she was in 2006. She has tremendous work rate and is composed in the final third. Her experience at the Pan Am games will only make her a better player. She has made strides as a player this spring and summer and the coaches are expecting big things once again this fall.

U.S. SOCCER (2007): Following her amazing freshman year, Marshall was invited to training camp in January of 2007 with the U-21 National Team on Jan. 6-13, and followed that up with an invite to the U-20 National Team camp Feb. 4-11.

FRESHMAN (2006): Marshall posted the most prolific offensive season in CU history in her first year in Boulder, scoring a school record 17 goals and three assists for 37 points, two of her 17 school records. She was the Big 12's leading scorer, just the second freshman to lead the Big 12 in goals scored in conference history. She was named Big 12 Newcomer of the Year, the third Buffalo to do so, joining Fran Munnelly (2002) and Katie Griffin (2003). Among her 17 goals were a school record seven gamewinners. She opened her freshman season with two scoreless games at Vanderbilt, but her debut at Prentup Field was historic. She netted four goals in the first 49 minutes of the game against Clemson, setting a school record for goals and points in a game. She added another two days later against Mississippi, and then netted goals at BYU and Utah to give her a school record four straight games with a goal. She added assists against Denver and Oklahoma to give her six games in a row with a point, another CU record. She scored her next goal on the road at Nebraska, followed by one at home against Texas, and then posted a repeat of her school record with goals against Iowa State, Texas Tech and Baylor and a pair of them at Kansas to close out the regular season. She was shutout in the Big 12 rematch with KU, but bounced back with the gametying and gamewinning goals in CU's thrilling double-overtime upset of No. 9 Texas A&M in the Big 12 semifinals. She wrapped up her season of scoring with the gamewinner in the second round of the NCAA Tournament against Denver. Marshall also set school records with two 10-shot games (at Nebraska, vs. Texas A&M) and averaged 1.54 points per game in her first season of college soccer. Her year was the most decorated in CU soccer history, as she was named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Week five times, to a media team of the

week three times, she was named National Player of the Week by Soccer Times, a first in school history, as well as being the only freshman named First Team All-Big 12 in 2006. Marshall earned Newcomer of the Year from the Big 12 and Soccer Buzz Central Region, and was also a First Team All-Region selection by Soccer Buzz. The NSCAA named her Second Team All-Region, while Soccer Buzz named her a Fourth Team All-American and a First Team Freshman All-American.

HIGH SCHOOL: Marshall had a highly-decorated prep career as a soccer, track and softball athlete. She graduated as the leading goal scorer in Skyline High School history, as she led the team in scoring all four years. After scoring an impressive 23 goals and dishing out 10 assists as a senior, Marshall wrapped up her prep career with 100 goals and 38 assists in high school play. While leading the Falcons to a 10-3-4 record, Marshall was named the 2006 Northern Conference player of the year, the all-region soccer player of the year for 2006, and the Skyline Falcon of the Year. She was a member of the 2005 Colorado State Cup Championship team from ODP pool in 2005. Marshall received an academic letter and was a three-time selection to the All-Northern Conference. She was named All-State her sophomore, junior and senior year as well as being named the *Longmont Times-Call* Soccer player of the year all three years. She also earned All-State honors in track (100m, 400m relay and long jump) as a junior, and was a state champion in the 800 medley her senior year.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Marshall is undecided in her major at CU, but will be enrolled in the School of Arts and Sciences and is interested in Journalism and Education.

PERSONAL: Nicole Sue Marshall was born June 2, 1988 in Thornton, Colo. She is the daughter of Mike and Kelly Marshall and has a younger sister, Shea (15). She is a passionate snowboarder and enjoys working at church camps and helping run soccer clinics for elementary school children.

THIS SEASON: Quador is a very hard working player and will battle for every 50/50 ball and will provide the 2007 team with a little backbone. The coaches expect her to be a defensive center midfielder or a defender. She should provide CU some more goals on set pieces.

FRESHMAN (2006): After a diagnosis of comparment syndrome in preseason nearly sidelined Quador for her freshman year, she became a reliable player off the bench in the early season before working her way into the starting lineup by season's end. Her three goals on the season were all gamewinners, giving her the second-most gamewinning goals of any Buff and making her the second-leading freshman scorer behind Nikki Marshall. 2006 SECOND TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12

THIS SEASON: Again the CU goalkeeping position is a two horse race between Radlinski and sophomore Kara Linder. Radlinski has more experience and is more of a vocal goalkeeper. The battle for the starting job will be ongoing through the season. The goalkeeper who is most consistent and makes the least amount of mistakes will be the starter.

SOPHOMORE (2006): Radlinski started her second year at Colorado backing up freshman Kara Linder in net, but by the middle of the Big 12 campaign she had won the starting job. She saw action in 20 games, starting 14, and posted three solo shutouts on the season, sharing another three with Linder. Radlinski owned a 1.09 goals against average and posted 68 saves in 1,483 minutes of play.

FRESHMAN (2005): Radlinski entered the season as backup to incumbent goalkeeper Jessie Keller, but was soon thrust into the fray when Keller broke her ankle against Kansas on Senior Day, Colorado's final home game of the season. The freshman responded with four shutouts and a goals against average of 0.92, the best in the Big 12. She had a .816 save percentage, grabbing 40 saves in her 11 appearances. She also shared three shutouts with Keller in her 880:21 minutes of play.

HIGH SCHOOL: As a freshman Radlinski set nine El Dorado school records, including shutouts (15) in guiding the Golden Hawks to the Empire League title that year and Century League crown as a sophomore and junior. With Radlinski in goal, El Dorado had a 52-22-6 record, advancing to the second round of CIF play in 2002, the quarterfinals in '03 and semifinals in '04. She also holds prep marks for single season (177) and career (345) saves and had a 1.06 goals against average as a junior as well as El Dorado's Female Athlete of the Year as a senior. She was a first-team all-league player for four years and all-CIF three. Radlinski played her club ball for Irvine's ISC Strikers premier team, the 2003 Pleasanton and 2004 Score-By-The-Shore tournament winners. She was the club's only keeper for six years. A two-sport athlete, she played on El Dorado's girls varsity tennis team as a member of the No. 1 doubles tandem since her sophomore year, and was named all-Century League as a sophomore, junior and senior and made the CIF tournament her sophomore and senior years.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Radlinski was a league scholar-athlete and a member of the honor roll in high school and has continued to excel at CU. An English and Pre-Education major, Radlinski maintained a 3.00-3.49 as a freshman in-season during the Fall of 2005 and was recognized for her hard work as she was honored in the Fall 2005 Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

PERSONAL: Kirstin Lynda Radlinski was born Aug. 28, 1987 in Fullerton, Calif. She is the daughter of Marc and Birgit Radlinski and the younger sister of Peter (26) and Alexander (22). Her hobbies include playing tennis.

2006 IN REVIEW



The University of Colorado soccer team used a mixture of experience and youth during the 2006 season to compile a 14-6-4 overall record and a 5-4-1 Big 12 mark. While the Buffaloes finished the regular season in fifth place in the highly competitive Big 12 Conference, they managed to advance to the finals of the Big 12 Tournament, where they lost to Texas in a shootout, and move on to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history.

Colorado opened the 2006 season with a double-overtime, scoreless tie against Vanderbilt in Nashville, Tenn. The evening saw the collegiate debuts for seven Buffaloes, as freshman goalkeeper Kara Linder became the first freshman to record a shutout in the season opener.

The Buffs defense continued to shine with their second straight shutout the next day with a 4-0 win over Alabama. It was a sophomore scoring parade as Michelle Wenino scored two goals and classmates Alex Cousins and Nikki Keller each added one of their own. CU finished with 30 shots, 14 of which were on goal, and wrapped up the road trip to continue back to Boulder for the home-opener.

Colorado opened their home slate in record fashion, topping Clemson University by a score of 5-1 in the fifth annual Colorado Soccer Classic. Freshman forward Nikki Marshall kicked off what would be a record-breaking season by scoring the final four goals of the game and setting a new school record. Her eight points were also a new record in the 11-year history of the program. The five goals was a home opener record, and the nine goals scored in CU's first three games were the most to open the season, with the plus eight goal differential also a record to open the season. The Buffs saw two players earn their first career points in Mary White and Marshall, and Keller had the first two assist game of her career.

Colorado's success continued with a 3-1 win over No. 23 Mississippi, adding to the best start in school history (3-0-1), and claimed their fourth Colorado Soccer Classic title. Cousins got the Buffaloes on the board in the 25th minute on a penalty kick and Marshall contributed less than a minute later with her fifth goal of the season and of the weekend. Freshman Caitlin Choun notched the final goal for CU for her first career goal.

Ranked at No. 21, the Buffaloes hit the road and put their streak to the test as they traveled to Utah to take on No. 22 BYU and No. 14 Utah. The Buffs suffered their first loss at BYU after fighting hard to come back from a three goal deficit to end the game at 3-2 in front of 4,742 fans. Senior defender Laura Munnely netted her first career goal while Marshall fired home her sixth goal of the season. The Buffs bounced back two days later when they defeated Utah 2-1 in come-from-behind fashion. Marshall would tie the game with her seventh goal on the season and senior Katie Griffin notched her first of the season, putting her at a career mark of 28 goals, starting her road to breaking former teammate and Colorado great Fran Munnely's career goal record.

The Buffs returned home to take on in-state rival Denver in a rain storm and lightning delay battle that ended in Colorado's favor after freshman Jess Quador netted her first career goal, giving CU the 1-0 victory.

The No. 11 Buffaloes opened the Big 12 season at Prentup Field by continuing the best start in school history with a record of 6-1-1 overall as they topped the University of Oklahoma by a score of 2-1. The two veterans, junior Allison Kidd and senior Allie True, netted their first tallies of 2006 and the Buffs held on for the win.

Back on the road again, CU traveled to play Oklahoma State where they were upset, 2-1, in a second half battle. Cousins responded to an early second-half OSU goal with one of her own coming off a free kick to tie the game just two minutes later. The Buffs were unable to battle back, however, once the Cowgirls took the lead again and halted CU's three-game winning streak.

After a quick return home, Colorado had to turn right around and head to Lincoln, Neb. where they took on the Nebraska Cornhuskers and fought hard for 110 minutes before the game ended in a 1-1 tie. Once Nebraska got on the board, Marshall followed up her own shot that hit the post and tucked her second opportunity away to tie the game, which continued in to two overtimes in which both teams were unable to capitalize on.

Colorado returned to Boulder for a three game homestand against Wyoming, No. 8 Texas A&M and No. 11 Texas. The Buffs started things off with a 2-0 win over Wyoming after second half goals by Quador and Keller. The following week the defending Big 12 regular season and tournament champions, Texas A&M, came to town and jumped to an early lead on the No. 17 Buffaloes, who were unable to finish their chances, falling 3-0 in Boulder. The competition didn't let up as the Buffs dropped their second straight, falling to Texas by a score of 2-1. Marshall got CU on the board in the first five minutes but the Longhorns were the only ones able to find the goal for the remainder of the game.

Colorado found themselves searching for answers as they traveled to Missouri and were shutout 3-0 and handed their third consecutive loss. The Buffs wrapped up the road trip with a collective effort to blank Iowa State 1-0 thanks to a Marshall goal coming late in the second half. The win marked the 99th overall victory in school history and marked the start of a season turn-around that took the Buffs to a new level.

Back in Boulder for what they thought would be the final homestand of the season, the Buffaloes captured the 100th win of the program's short history after dominating Texas Tech 3-0. Things started off with a Quador header off of a corner kick in the 18th minute of the game and continued when Marshall exploded through the TTU defense and scored just five minutes later. Griffin would join in just seven minutes after that with a goal of her own, which proved to be the final goal of the match. Marshall's goal was her 11th of the season and gave her a new school record for goals scored as a freshman, passing teammate Griffin's freshman record of 10.

Colorado went on to celebrate Senior Day in honor of seniors Griffin, Munnely and True and pulled away with a 1-0 victory over Baylor. Marshall sent a ball that hit the left post and bounced off the keeper in the goal to give the Buffs the 1-0 lead. With what proved to be the final goal of the game, Marshall tied Griffin for the overall single-season scoring record with her 12th goal and set a new single-season points record with 26.



2006 IN REVIEW

Already guaranteed a spot in the Big 12 Championships in San Antonio, Texas, the Buffs traveled to Lawrence, Kan. to take on the Jayhawks in the final regular season game. Colorado showed no sign of letting up as they shut out Kansas 4-0, finishing fifth in the Big 12 Conference. The Buffs got two goals from Marshall and one apiece from True and Cousins to match CU's second-highest scoring tally of the season. With 14 goals Marshall broke the record for goals in a season and claimed a spot as the Big 12 Conference leading scorer.

The No. 23 Buffaloes battled Kansas for the second straight game and came out winners in penalty kicks in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament. Keller was the lone Buff to score in regulation as the two teams ended in a 1-1 tie and both were unable to capitalize after two overtimes. After Cousins made the first shot, Radlinski denied KU's Emily Strinden, giving CU the 1-0 lead. Griffin, Munnely and Kidd all finished their penalty kicks, as did KU's next three. Dornseif stepped up to take the final kick for the Buffs and with her conversion Colorado advanced to the semifinals of the tournament for the second straight year.

In order to advance to the Championship game, CU would have to upset No. 1 seed and 11th ranked Texas A&M. Colorado managed to score a stunning come-from-behind 3-2 double overtime victory over the Aggies, becoming the fourth team not seeded in the top four in the Big 12 Tournament to advance to the final game in the 11 year history of the tournament. It was the biggest comeback in school history and the second come from behind win of CU's season. After trailing 2-0 early in the first half, the Buffaloes came out in the second half a completely different team. True hit a hard shot through the Aggie defense and despite the chaos in front of the net, Dornseif managed to slide through and bury the ball into the back of the net to cut the score to 2-1, giving Dornseif her first career goal. Marshall followed up with the gametying goal with just 3:30 left in the game and the two teams found themselves heading into overtime. Both squads battled through the first 10 minutes scoreless and would go to two overtimes for the second straight year, with the Aggies scoring the gamewinner in the second overtime in 2005. The Buffs would make sure that wasn't the case this time as Cousins fed Marshall a ball which she one-timed into the net giving CU its first win over Texas A&M in 16 tries and CU's second-straight trip to the Big 12 Tournament Championship game.

In the Big 12 Championship game against No. 9 Texas, Colorado found themselves tied for the third time in the tournament after regulation, 1-1. The championship was decided on penalty kicks, which Texas won 5-4. After a 0-0 tie at halftime, Texas jumped to a 1-0 lead early in the second half. With under 12 minutes to play, Griffin set up a free kick which she sent high into the penalty area about 15 yards out of the goal. Cousins rose up and hammered home a world-class header in the upper right hand corner of the goal, hitting it so hard that it got caught in the side netting, tying the game 1-1 and sending it into overtime, which the Longhorns won 5-4. Colorado had four players named to the All-Tournament team: Cousins, Dornseif, Marshall and Keller.

Following the completion of the Big 12 season, Colorado had three players recognized on the All-Big 12 Conference soccer teams. Marshall was named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Year and also earned a spot on the All-Big 12 First Team, as well as the Big 12 All-Newcomer Team along with fellow classmate Quador. Senior Munnely was named to the All-Big 12 Second Team as the 10th Buffalo in history to do so.

The Buffs earned their fourth-straight appearance, and a No. 4 seed, in the 2006 NCAA Soccer Tournament, and were also selected as one of 16 hosts for the first and second round games. Playing host to locals Colorado College and the University of Denver, as well as the University of Kentucky from the SEC, Colorado was matched up with the CC Tigers in the first round.

When the Buffaloes would need a goal the most, they turned to the most prolific goal scorer in school history. Senior captain Griffin scored two second half goals to lead Colorado to a 2-1 comeback win over Colorado College, advancing them to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the third year in a row.

In the second round of NCAA tournament play, Colorado survived the elements and a Denver comeback to top the Pioneers 2-1 and give the Buffaloes their first-ever trip to the NCAA Soccer Women's College Cup Sweet



16. Griffin was taken down by a DU defender after 32 minutes of scoreless play and she stepped up and buried the penalty kick to give CU the 1-0 lead in the first half. As the weather turned from sunny and 40 degrees to rain and eventually heavy snow in mid-30 degree temperatures, the Pioneers took a free kick and sent it through the Colorado defense where it skipped into the goal untouched at the 76:11 mark. The Buffs fought back and took the lead when Marshall followed her own shot that bounced off the post and put it in to give the Buffs a 2-1 lead with 10 minutes to play. Denver would not be able to capitalize the rest of the game and Colorado would move on to the third round of the tournament to face No. 1 seed Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind.

In Colorado's first-ever trip to the third round of the tournament, the Buffaloes saw their season come to an end with a 3-0 loss to top-ranked Notre Dame in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Women's College Cup. The Buffs worked hard and fought until the final minute, but the Fighting Irish did not let up as Colorado ended perhaps their finest season yet with a record of 14-6-4.

Colorado wrapped up with 42 goals, the second-most in program history, as well as 14 wins, also the second-most for Colorado. They finished the regular season with a four-game winning streak, which carried over into another five games in a row unbeaten in the postseason with just a pair of double-overtimes to mar their record.

Munnely, Griffin and True wrapped up their careers as the winningest class in CU history. As a group, they were the only group to make four trips to the NCAA Tournament. Munnely finished her career as CU's leader in games played and started with 91 of each and having played 8,178 minutes, missing just 20 minutes along the way. Griffin is CU's all-time leader in goals scored with 32 in her career.

At the conclusion of a stellar season, the Buffs found plenty of honors for their outstanding play. Standouts Marshall and Munnely were both named National Soccer Coaches Association of America Second Team All-Central Region selections. The pair was also named First Team All-Central Region by Soccer Buzz online magazine, while Griffin earned second team honors for the first time in her career. Marshall also earned Regional Freshman of the Year honors, as well as a First Team Freshman All-America selection and Fourth Team All-America selection, becoming the first player named to the Freshman First Team and the second named to the overall All-America team.

PRENTUP FIELD

Prentup Field, located on the East Campus of the University of Colorado at Boulder, has been the home of Colorado Soccer since 2003. The field had been the home of the now-defunct Colorado baseball team before the women's soccer team took over in 2001.

Prentup combines the very best of what Boulder has to offer, with beautiful Colorado mountain views and a lush pitch courtesy of CU's turf management team.

The Buffaloes have always enjoyed great home advantages in Boulder. CU formerly played its matches at Pleasant View Soccer Complex in North Boulder. This facility had an award-winning match field for CU to play on and nine surrounding fields for training.

During that time, the Buffaloes compiled a home record of 50-28-4, a winning percentage of .646. The Buffs also played host to over 3,000 fans on Sept. 2, 1998 when they hosted then-defending national champion North Carolina.

Upon the arrival of coach Bill Hempen, the Buffs started training at Prentup in the spring of 2002 while it was still a baseball field.

In the spring of 2003, the soccer team was granted exclusive use of Prentup, and work began to re-landscape the field. All remnants of the baseball field except for the outfield fence were razed, and the turf began a major makeover.

Prentup Field is now a 160,000 square foot facility that contains a 120x75 yard game field along with a practice area. It is a native soil field and is equipped with an automated irrigation system. When the irrigation was installed and the field was graded in July of 2003, the turf management team produced a playable soccer facility from seed in just 33 days.

Each week, the field is painted and mowed 3-4 times in preparation for matches and practices under the supervision of Ryan Newman, along with a collection of other maintenance practices.

The Buffs trained at Prentup from 2002-04, and finally in the fall of 2004, they played their first-ever match there, defeating Northern Colorado by a score of 3-0 on October 1, 2004. In 2005, Prentup became CU's full time home, with the Buffaloes posting a record of 7-1-1 in their first full season and an all-time mark of 18-3-0.

Capital improvements to the facility are ongoing. An athletic department fund-raising campaign in the summer of 2005 helped raise funds to put in bleachers for 1,200 people, a new scoreboard, nets behind the goals and iron entrance gates adorned with the CU logo into the venue. Additional funds in advance of the 2006 NCAA Tournament added more bleachers, bringing the seating capacity of Prentup Field to 2,000 people.

While there are bleachers for 2,000, fans of CU soccer bring lawn chairs and blankets to sit on as well in the open areas, continuing some of the community feel of Pleasant View at the current home.

In the fall of 2006, Prentup played host to its first-ever NCAA Tournament action. The Buffaloes welcomed the University of Kentucky, Colorado College and the University of Denver to Boulder. Denver defeated Kentucky 3-0 in the first round, while CU topped CC 2-1 in front of a facility record 1,871 fans. DU and CU met in the final, with Colorado topping Denver 2-1 in front of 1,619 fans to advance to the Sweet 16.

Prentup Field has been home to University of Colorado athletics for almost 40 years, as the venue is named after former CU baseball coach Frank "Chief" Prentup. The field, formerly known as Varsity Field, was

renamed after the former coach in 1978. The complex remained a popular venue until the varsity baseball team was removed in 1980.

The field was used by several different entities within Colorado athletics after 1980. The club baseball team played there, and CU's mascot Ralphie was even known to have taken practice runs there.

The complex is located just west of CU's Potts Field track & field complex and ski building. Amenities for Buffalo soccer fans include concessions, rest rooms and free parking and game programs.

1998 Milestones

- Colorado opened the season with a 2-0 loss to 1997 national champion North Carolina in front of a school record 3,000 fans.
- With 36 saves in one weekend, including a school record 19 against BYU on Sept. 11, Sloane Cox became Colorado's career saves leader with 189 (passing Nina Bjornstad who had 158).
- Shawn Kenyon became the first Buff to record 100 shots with No. 100 coming against Utah on Sept. 13.
- CU earned their first ever win in a Big 12 Conference opener with a 3-0 win over Oklahoma on Oct. 2.
- Cox notched the first ever point for a CU goalkeeper with her assist of Jessica Wollow's second goal on Oct. 2 vs. Oklahoma.
- CU ran into its program-worst losing streak with the fifth consecutive loss to Denver 1-0 on Oct. 18.
- With a 6-0 loss to Missouri, the final game of the season, Cox finished her career as the holder of every Colorado goalkeeping record. In addition to her 200th save of the season, Cox also recorded the 333rd save of her career, and had six shutouts.

- Cox was also named Big 12 Athlete of the Week for September 2 (first player in program history to earn the honor) and CU Athlete of the Week for November 1.
- Teri Fildey was named TCI Student Athlete of the Week for September 5.
- Five players were named to the Academic All-Big 12 first team: Fildey, Cartmell, Matassa, Kenyon, Pascoe.
- Melissa Cartmell led the Buffs offense with 50 shots, six goals, two assists and 14 points.
- Assistant coach Kim LeMere was inducted into the University of Hartford's Alumni Hall of Fame on April 17.

2001 Milestones

- Bill Hempen was named head coach of the Colorado Soccer team in June, replacing Austin Daniels.
- Hempen earned his first win at Colorado with the 2-1 decision over Wyoming on Sept. 2.
- Hempen coached his milestone 300th career game vs. Missouri, however the Buffs fell 2-0 in the match.
- Colorado bounced back from a 10 game winless streak with a win over Colorado College 1-0 on Oct. 21. The win also ended a four-game scoreless streak that dated back to Oct. 7 at Oklahoma.
- When Hempen cleared his bench and substituted the entire field late in the first half vs. Kansas, he set a program mark for most players in a game as the Buffs played 24 by the final buzzer.
- Tiffany Booth netted her first career goal to secure CU's first Big 12 Conference victory of the season, a 2-1 win over Texas Tech.
- CU's eight freshmen made more than an immediate impression on the coaching staff as five freshmen scored seven of Colorado's 17 goals on the season and have dished off six of the team's 17 assists.
- Colorado's 2-2 tie against No. 9 Texas A&M was the programs best result vs. a ranked team since a 3-2 win over then-No. 22 Baylor in 1997.
- The Buffs scored 17 goals by 12 different players, the most players to get in the goal column in the program's history.

- Freshman Fran Munnelly was named Big 12 Newcomer of the Week Sept. 23.
- As of Oct. 18, Munnelly took the lead as CU's all-time frosh leader in points (13), second in goals (5), assists (3) and shots (47) with at least five games left to play.
- Senior goalkeeper Sara Erskine was named Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week Oct. 29.
- Colorado cracked into the NSCAA/adidas Central Region Rankings for the third time in program history at No. 10.
- CU extended the school record unbeaten streak to six games with the win over Oklahoma State on Oct. 27.
- Freshman defender Ashlie Mihalcin was named to the Soccer America Team of the Week
- The Buffs finished the season with a 9-7-2/4-4-2 Big 12 record and advanced to their fourth Big 12 Conference Tournament.

- Munnelly was named to the 2002 NSCAA Division I All-Central team and was tabbed a freshman All-American and second-team all-region. Bugay was a third-team all-region pick and head coach Hempen earned Region Coach of the Year Runner-Up by Soccer Buzz Magazine.

- The 3-0 victory over Northern Colorado on Oct. 9 marked head coach Bill Hempen's 50th win at Colorado.
- With a 1-0 win over Kansas on Oct. 16, the Buffs jumped into first place in the Big 12 Conference.
- Goalkeeper Jessica Keller went down with a season-ending ankle injury on Oct. 16, ending her career tops among all CU keepers all-time in goals against average with 0.83, wins with 26 and shutouts with 16.
- Colorado took the second seed in the Big 12 Conference Tournament and advanced to the championship game for the first time, falling 2-1 to Texas A&M in double overtime.
- Fran Munnelly was named to the Big 12 Soccer 10th Anniversary Team.
- Five Buffs earned All-Big 12 Honors. Fran Munnelly was named to the First Team for the fourth consecutive year. Katie Griffin, Laura Munnelly and Allison Kidd were all named to the second team. Nikki Keller was a Big 12 All-Newcomer selection.
- Going into the Big 12 Tournament, Colorado was tops in the conference in defense, leading the league in league play in goals allowed (eight), goals against average (0.78), and shutouts (six).
- CU advanced to the NCAA Division I Soccer Tournament and moved past the first round with a shootout win over UC Riverside on Nov. 12. The Buffs dropped their second round game 3-0 to UCLA, who went on to the finals.

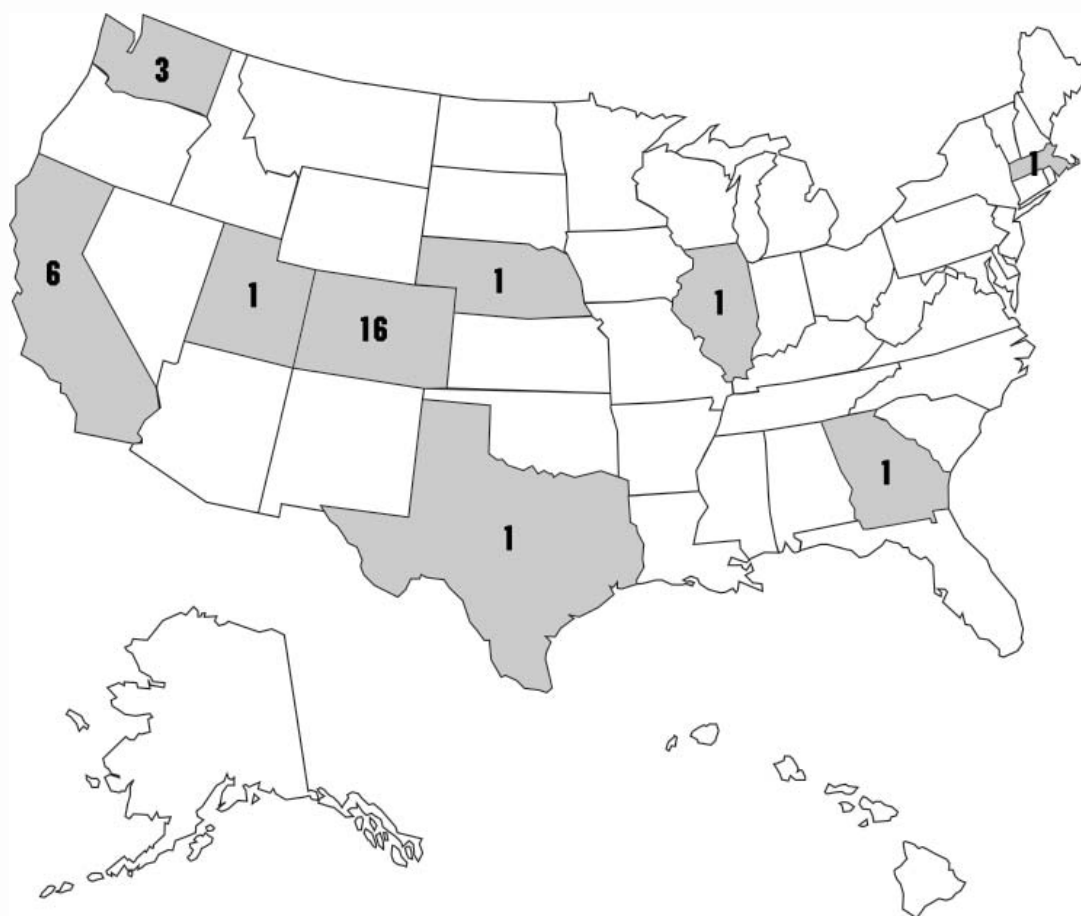

BIG 12 CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

In 2003, when Jen Thais said in a preseason press conference that her season goal was, "to make the NCAA Tournament and to be nationally recognized. What I'm hoping... what I'm expecting, is to surprise people," little did she know what kind of impact that prediction would have on the eighth team in Colorado soccer history... and the nation for that matter.

A record breaking season was approached in four phases. Phase I were the preseason exhibition games where the Buffs shutout Northern Colorado 4-0 and Air Force 3-0.

Phase II consisted of CU's non-conference schedule where the Buffs came out virtually unscathed at 7-1. In the season opener, they held defending national champion and then-No. 2 Portland scoreless for 87 minutes before suffering a 1-0 defeat. The Buffs would regroup and close out the remainder of the non-conference season 7-0, beating teams by a 17-2 scoring margin. It was during Phase II that CU picked up its first-ever win against a top-10 ranked opponent when it handed then-No. 9 Denver a 3-0 blanking, just days after the Pioneers had upended Portland.

Enter Phase III... the Big 12 Conference season. The Buffs came away from the '03 season 8-1-1, the crescendo of the season being a 3-1 win over nemesis Nebraska in the season finale for both teams in below freezing temperatures on a pitch covered in ice. Colorado's 25 season points was the fourth highest in league standings history. At the conclusion of the regular season, the Buffs came away with the coach, player and rookie of the year, a first-team All-Big 12 pick, three second-teamers and five of their nine newcomers named to the All-Newcomer team.

With 25 school single-season, class and career records shattered, Colorado entered the final phase of the season, Phase IV... the postseason. They went into the eighth Big 12 Conference Tournament as the No. 1 seed for the first time in program history, and a week later the Buffs entered their first NCAA Tournament as just one of 16 seeded teams.

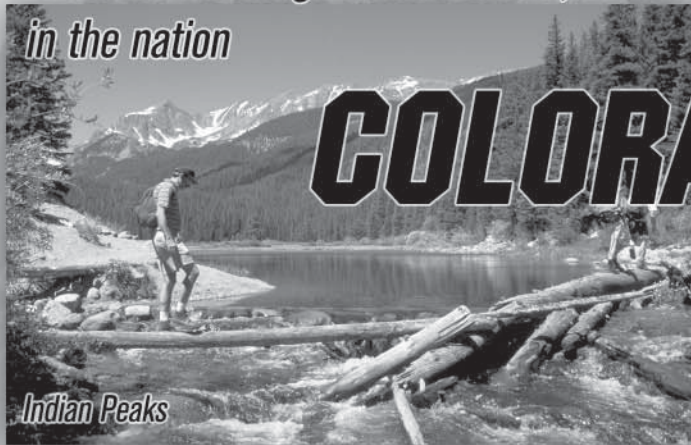

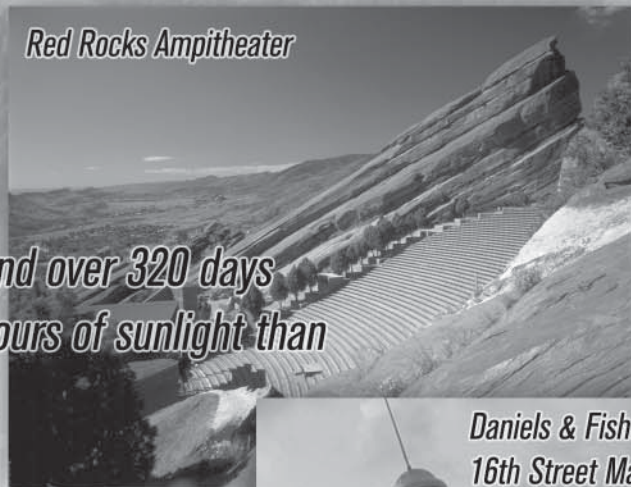

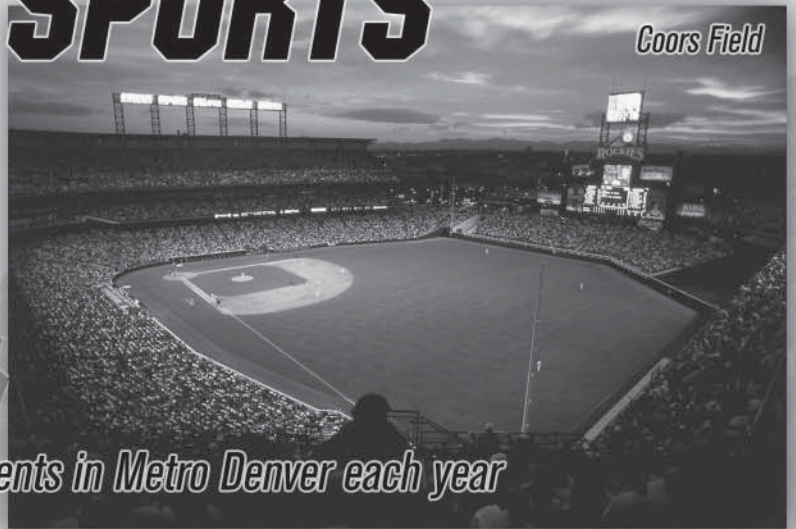

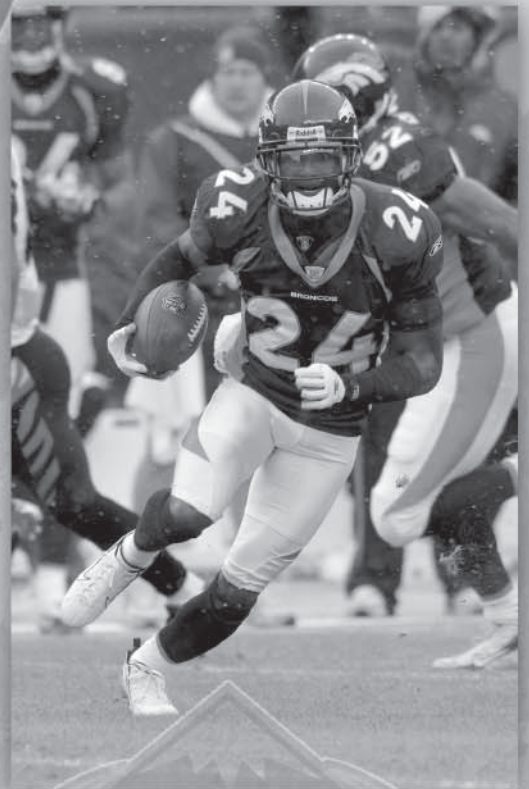
