THIS WEEK'S GAME:

Fresh off a 36-30 victory in three overtimes over Clemson, the Miami Hurricanes will host the Colorado Buffaloes in their home opener at 12:00 noon Saturday at the Orange Bowl. Miami is now 1-1 and ranked 12th in the polls. It is the latest home opener for the Hurricanes since 1990. The last loss in a home opener was Sept. 13, 1997, a 23-12 loss to Arizona State.

Colorado is 2-0 this season, having defeated Colorado State and New Mexico State. The two schools have played seven times with Colorado leading the series 5-2. They have not played since 1993, when Miami won a thriller 35-29 on the road, and this is the first game between the two teams in the Orange Bowl since 1975. The Buffaloes are the first non-ranked opponent Miami has faced this year, and this is UM's first of three non-conference games this season.

In their thrilling victory at Clemson, the Hurricanes scored in all three overtime periods. For the game, Tyrone Moss scored three touchdowns and rushed for 139 yards on a career-high 31 carries. QB Kyle Wright, getting his first victory in his second start, completed 16 of 26 passes for 152 yards and one touchdown. Wright directed seven scoring drives in the game, including on all three possessions in overtime. For the season, Moss has two 100-yard games and a total of 241 rushing yards. That is the best start for a Miami running back since Frank Gore rushed for 245 yards in the first two games of the 2003 season.

Defensively, the Hurricanes rank 17th in the country. UM ranks 11th in defensive passing efficiency and 28th in run defense.

MIAMI-COLORADO SERIES HIGHLIGHTS

- Miami trails Colorado in the all-time series, 2-5, but won its last meeting with the Buffaloes, 35-29, in Boulder on Sept. 25, 1993. The Hurricanes built a 35-15 lead with a little more than eight minutes remaining in the fourth quarter on a 123-yard performance by Donnell Bennett before CU quarterback Kordell Stewart and receiver Charles Johnson led a late surge to bring the Buffs within 35-29 with five minutes remaining in the game. Warren Sapp and the Hurricanes defense thwarted the comeback attempt, which ended when Stewart's fourth down pass to Johnson fell incomplete with 12 seconds remaining in the game.
- The Hurricanes' other win in the series also came in Boulder with a 24-3 season-opening victory on Sept. 17, 1966.
- This will be the third time the teams have met in Miami, with Colorado winning the previous matchups, 9-7 in the first meeting between the Hurricanes and Buffaloes on Oct. 13, 1961, and a 23-10 loss on Oct. 10, 1975.
- UM and Colorado have met once in the postseason, with the Buffaloes coming out on top 31-21 in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston on Dec. 28, 1967.

DEFENSE PICKING UP WHERE IT LEFT OFF

The Miami defense entered the 2005 season opener with 181 combined career starts, making it the most experienced defense in the Larry Coker era. In the September 5 opener at Florida State, experience proved significant as the Hurricanes contained one of the best rushing tandems in the country and limited the Seminoles to 170 yards of total offense. Miami held Clemson to 90 yards rushing (65 of them on one play, a quarterback run) in its next game, a triple-overtime win. In fact, in the Clemson game, Miami held CU running backs James Davis and Reggie Merriweather to 27 yards on 15 carries. The performances were an improvement from the defense that allowed an uncharacteristic 155.0 rushing yards per game in 2004, but still ranked in the nation's top 20 in several other categories.

MOSS ROLLING OUT OF THE BACKFIELD

Junior running back Tyrone Moss has gotten off to a quick start this season, rushing for 241 yards on 52 carries in the first two games of the season. He has rushed for back-to-back 100-yard rushing games (102 at FSU, 139 at Clemson) to open the season for the first time since Frank Gore opened the 2003 season with three straight 100-yard games. Only Gore and Dyrall McMillan (1996) accompany Moss in opening a season with back-to-back 100-yard games rushing in the last 40 years but Moss is the only one to do it against a pair of ranked opponents. Moss also scored a career-high three touchdowns in UM's 36-30 triple overtime win at 20th-ranked Clemson last week, including the game-winner in overtime on a 25-yard jaunt down the right sideline. The three rushing TDs were the most by a Hurricane since Willis McGahee ran for six against Virginia Tech on Dec. 7, 2002.

T-MOSS ANSWERS CALL IN FIRST START

Junior Tyrone Moss made his first career start in the season opener against Florida State and posted 102 yards on 23 carries against a Seminoles team that allowed just one 100-yard rusher during the regular season in 2004. Moss' production exceeded the opening day average of 98.8 yards by Miami's starting running backs on opening day in the last five seasons (Frank Gore in 2003-04, Willis McGahee in 2002, Clinton Portis in 2001 and James Jackson in 2000). He also became the 33rd Miami running back to surpass 1,000 yards for his career (see sidebar, page 9), joining the club with a six-yard jaunt on his eighth carry of the first quarter against FSU. Below is a look at how Moss compares to each of Miami's opening day running backs in the last five seasons and how Miami's last five regular-season starters performed in their first career starts.

ON THE WRIGHT TRACK

Sophomore starting quarterback Kyle Wright followed the steady trend of first-time starting quarterbacks at Miami with a solid performance against Florida State on Sept. 5. Wright showed poise beyond his years as the game went on and finished with 232 yards on 16-of-28 passing with two interceptions and a touchdown. He left no doubts about his toughness, walking away from a record nine sacks and refusing to slide when scrambling out of the pocket. He did all this against the then-14th-ranked Seminoles, the highest-ranked opponent a Miami quarterback has had to face in his starting debut since Kenny Kelly led the Hurricanes to a 23-12 win against No. 9 Ohio State in 1999. Wright returned against Clemson to complete 16-of-26 passes with no interceptions and a touchdown. In the three overtimes, Wright led three scoring drives (two touchdowns and one field goal), in addition to four scoring drives in regulation.

Bernie Kosar and Steve Walsh each led UM to national championships in their first seasons as the starting quarterback. In 1983, Kosar quarterbacked Miami to its first-ever national title as a redshirt freshman. He did not play at all in 1982. In 1987, Walsh quarterbacked Miami to its second national title as a third-year-sophomore (the same as Wright). As a redshirt freshman in 1986, Walsh played in just two games, completing 1 of 2 passes for five yards — the same number of games played as Wright but with fewer pass attempts. Miami's other national championships were quarterbacked by: Craig Erickson (1989, his first full season as a starter), Gino Torretta (1991, his first full season as a starter; had just four previous starts two years earlier); and Ken Dorsey (2001, second full season as a starter).

FROSH START

Freshman safety Kenny Phillips, the *USA Today* High School National Defensive Player of the Year in 2004, told reporters and teammates during training camp that he wanted to lead the team in interceptions this year. Now reporters and teammates alike are starting to take the remark a bit more seriously. Phillips earned his first career start in the Hurricanes' 36-30 triple-overtime win at Clemson last week and was clutch with a game-ending interception in overtime to ensure UM's first win of the season. Phillips is tied for the team lead in interceptions with Marcus Maxey and made a team-high 13 tackles in his first career start.

BACK FOR MOORE

Junior wide receiver Ryan Moore looked like his old self against Florida State on Sept. 5, hauling in three passes for 69 yards and scoring Miami's only touchdown. He followed up that performance with four receptions for 54 yards at Clemson, including two receptions for first downs in overtime. Moore earned freshman All-American honors in 2003 after making 44 receptions for 637 yards and three TDs. Injuries plagued Moore in 2004, limiting him to six games and nine catches for 85 yards and two touchdowns. He is healthy now, and it showed on his 34-yard TD catch at Florida State, his longest reception in two seasons. Moore has already surpassed his yardage total from the 2004 season and has seven receptions for 123 yards in 2005, a career-high 17.6 average per reception.

OLSEN'S PERFORMANCE ONE FOR THE AGES

Sophomore tight end Greg Olsen had a profound impact in the season opener against FSU with a game-leading eight receptions for 137 yards, including four third-down receptions for 64 yards on Miami's last drive of the game. Olsen was rewarded for his efforts with the John Mackey Tight End of the Week Award from the John Mackey Foundation. It was also the best performance by a UM tight end in nearly 20 years. Not since Willie Smith had 140 yards receiving against Maryland in 1985 has a Hurricanes tight end produced so many yards in a game. JENNINGS BREAKING UP THE ACC

Senior cornerback Kelly Jennings, Miami's most experienced starter on defense, was touted by head coach Larry Coker as being one of the most consistent performers on the team in the preseason. That has translated to the regular season, in which Jennings has broken up five passes through two games this season to lead the Atlantic Coast Conference. His five breakups tie his total from the 2004 season (12 games) and are only one away from the career high of six he set during his freshman and sophomore seasons. He knocked down three passes against Florida State and had two against Clemson, including a near-interception that preceded Kenny Phillips' game-sealing pick in overtime.

HESTER A TRIPLE THREAT

Miami junior Devin Hester is one of college football's most dangerous players, and he plays in all three phases of the game — offense, defense and special teams. In fact, in 2004 against Clemson, he started as UM's tailback on offense and as the nickel corner on defense. For the 2004 season, Hester scored six touchdowns — three on punt returns, one on a kickoff return, one on an 11-yard run against North Carolina and one on a blocked field goal in the Peach Bowl against Florida.

LONG TIME WAITING FOR MAXEY

Senior starting cornerback Marcus Maxey is one of the most experienced Hurricanes, having played in 35 games throughout his career. However, it wasn't until 3:50 remained in the second quarter of Miami's season opener against FSU that he got the first interception of his career (and the team's first of the season), picking off Drew Weatherford at the Miami 39-yard line on first down.

100 & 100

Greg Olsen's 137 yards receiving and Tyrone Moss' 102 yards rushing against Florida State marked the first time since the second game of the 2003 season that Miami had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in the same game. Frank Gore ran for 127 yards and Kevin Beard caught seven passes for 164 yards against Florida.

PUNTER MONROE BECAME A WEAPON IN 2004

After learning the ropes as a true freshman in 2003, punter Brian Monroe became a weapon in the field position battle in 2004. He averaged 41.2 yards per punt, pinned opposing offenses inside their 20-yard line on 20 of his 64 punts (31 percent), doubling his mark of 10 inside-the-20 kicks for the entire 2003 season. Of those 20 punts, 11 were downed inside the opponent's 10-yard line. Opponents returned only 26 punts for 140 yards last season with an average of just 5.4 yards per return. Monroe had 14 punts fair caught. The Hurricanes allowed only one punt return longer than 13 yards all season (39 yards by Clemson's Justin Miller) and only two punts longer than nine yards.

Also, his 41.7 gross average in 2004 was the eighth-best single-season average in UM history and was a drastic improvement from the 35.7 mark he posted as a freshman. He more than doubled his punts over 50 yards in 2004 (7) from 2003 (3). Monroe also had the longest punt in the last 24 years by a UM punter, a 67-yarder against Wake Forest. His value as a punter is complemented by his skills as a holder and kick-off man. Head coach Larry Coker also considers him one of the best athletes on the team. Monroe's numbers below show his development between his freshman and sophomore season.

So far in 2005, Monroe has punted 14 times for a 40.6-yard average, with 5 kicks inside the 20 and a long of 52. Opponents have returned six punts for 57 yards.

MIAMI MEDIA POLICIES

Post-Game Interviews

The athletic staff at the University of Miami is aware of the importance of media coverage and places great importance on the role of the media insofar as it interacts with their respective duties. To ensure the most workable situation for members of both entities, the following procedures must be observed.

1. The University of Miami football program will observe the customary cooling-off period as granted by the NCAA. Following the game's conclusion and after the team has left the field, media members may assemble outside the locker room. Upon conclusion of the cooling-off period, a UM SID representative will guide media into the locker room.
2. Miami head coach Larry Coker will be brought directly to the interview room upstairs from the UM locker room as soon as he dismisses the team. The locker room will be open to media as soon as possible after coach Coker departs for the interview room.
3. Miami's locker room is open to all media.
4. Postgame quotes will be provided for Hurricanes home games.

Each visiting team will set its own post-game interview policy, which will be announced on the press box public address system during the fourth quarter. Check with the opposing team's sports information staff if you have further questions.

It is our sincere desire to make the post-game procedure run as smoothly as possible. Remember, both groups have important tasks and are under extreme pressure.

The Miami Athletic Department is not responsible for problems incurred by any member of the media not following the above procedures. Security personnel will facilitate only those following the proper guidelines. If you encounter a problem while following this procedure, please inform a member of the UM Sports Information staff immediately.

PEATTIE ON PACE AND ON POINT

There is little debate as to whether or not Carlos Huerta is the best kicker in UM history. Huerta holds school records for extra points (178), consecutive extra points (157), field goals (73) and points scored (397). However, junior kicker Jon Peattie may change that notion before his time is done in Coral Gables. Peattie is on pace to challenge many of Huerta's records and is poised to steadily ascend UM's all-time career kicking lists. He already owns the school record for field goals in a season (22 in 2003) and in a game (5 vs. West Virginia in 2003) and ranks in the top 10 twice for points scored kicking in a season (fourth, 103 in 2003 and eighth, 90 in 2004). In two-plus years, Peattie has made 40 field goals (seventh all-time), scored 206 points (seventh all-time) and is just one of three Hurricane kickers to convert 10 or more consecutive field goal attempts (Dane Prewitt, 13; Huerta 11). How Peattie stacks up to UM's best kickers is listed below.

In addition, Peattie has not missed any of the 86 extra point attempts in his two-plus years at UM. He ranks sixth on Miami's extra points list behind Dane Prewitt (149 from 1992-95). Peattie is also second on Miami's all-time consecutive extra points list, but he has a ways to go before threatening Carlos Huerta's record of 157, set from 1988-91.

COKER'S COACHING CAREER OFF TO WINNING START

Now in his fifth season as Miami's head coach, Larry Coker has a record of 45-7, and has the seventh-winningest start through 52 games in the history of college football. Coker set a modern NCAA record for victories by a first-year head coach in 2001 with 12 wins. His 24-1 two-year start ranked as one of the finest by a head coach in the history of college football in terms of winning percentage. In terms of victories through two seasons as a head coach, Coker's 24 victories ranked third all-time, the most in 110 years. Coker's 35-3 three-year start was third all-time behind only Walter Camp and Barry Switzer. Coker's 31-1 record through 32 games tied Camp as the best start by a head football coach in the history of the sport through that span of games, edging out Switzer.

MIAMI'S RECORD ACCORDING TO ASSOCIATED PRESS RANK

UM is 237-58-2 all time in games while holding an Associated Press national ranking. Miami is 163-29-1 as a top 10 team and 129-16 as a top five team. The Hurricanes are 43-6 as the nation's No.1-ranked team. Miami has won 32 of its last 34 games when ranked No. 1.

MIAMI VS. ASSOCIATED PRESS-RANKED TEAMS

Miami is 97-109-2 vs. Associated Press-ranked teams since its first game against a ranked opponent against No. 18 Alabama in 1941. UM is 47-56 vs. AP top-10 teams since playing No. 6 Alabama in 1947, is 21-33 against AP top-5 teams since playing No. 3 Maryland in 1953, and is 10-7 against No. 1-ranked teams.

MIAMI VS. RANKED & UNRANKED OPPONENTS SINCE 1990

Since 1990, Miami has registered a 42-26 mark against Associated Press ranked teams and a 104-9 record against unranked opponents. Miami's loss to North Carolina last season marked the first loss to an unranked team since losing to East Carolina in 1999, a span of 65 games.

FOURTH QUARTER DOMINANCE

Over the last 19 seasons, Miami has been almost unbeatable when leading after three quarters. Since 1985, Miami has won 178 of 181 regular-season games in which it entered the fourth quarter with a lead. The three losses in this span occurred last year against Clemson (2004), East Carolina (1999) and West Virginia (1997). Prior to those three losses, UM's last loss when leading after three quarters was in 1984 against Maryland (42-40), after leading 34-21 heading into the fourth quarter.

IF MIAMI SCORES FIRST ...

Beginning with the 1983 season, the Hurricanes have gone 178-16 when scoring first. The last exception was last season's loss to Clemson, in which Miami followed its habit of jumping to an early lead when Frank Gore ran for a 23-yard touchdown at the 12:56 mark of the first quarter (Miami lost 24-17 in overtime). Miami scored first in eight of 12 games last season.

THE HURRICANES WHEN SCORING 30 OR 31 POINTS ...

- Miami has won 123 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points since a 31-30 loss at Notre Dame in 1988.
- Miami has won 144 consecutive games when scoring 31 or more points since falling 39-37 to UCLA in the 1985 Fiesta Bowl.
- Excluding bowl games, Miami has won 139 consecutive regular-season games when scoring 31 or more since a 47-45 loss to Boston College in 1984.

A TRADITION OF NON-OFFENSIVE SCORING

In 2004 the Hurricanes scored non-offensive touchdowns at an alarming rate. For the second straight year, UM finished the season with 10 non-offensive touchdowns — five on punt returns, one on a kickoff return, one on a fumble return, two blocked punts and one on a blocked field goal. In 2003, Miami scored 10 touchdowns via non-offensive means (special teams or defense) and one safety. The Hurricanes scored at least one non-offensive touchdown in seven games, scoring 62 points through non-offensive means in 2003. In 2002, the Hurricanes had seven non-offensive scores, including two interception returns, two fumble returns, one fake punt, one punt return and one safety. Miami led the nation in non-offensive scores in 2000 and 2001, scoring 11 touchdowns and one safety in 2001 for 68 points. The Hurricanes led the nation in 2000 with 13 touchdowns and one safety with 80 points coming from defense and special teams.

The 2005 Hurricanes have yet to score a non-offensive touchdown.

Photographers

NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the playing field and outside the 25-yard line. In order to provide adequate working space for those shooting, there are two photo restraining lines surrounding the Orange Bowl playing field. The front line is for photographers and television camera operators actually shooting the contest.

Broadcasts

Those entities requiring live or taped radio or television broadcasts must notify and receive approval at least one week in advance from Mark Pray at 305-284-3231.

Game Day Press Policies

Only working press will be admitted to the Orange Bowl press box. The 100 seats will be issued according to the following criteria:

1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area, and student newspapers from UM and opponent's schools.
2. Other daily newspapers, with preference to those that regularly cover UM.
3. Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting.
4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover UM.
5. Scouts. Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status.

Non-Conference Road Game Credentials

Writers covering UM on a regular basis may make requests for non-conference road credentials with the UM Sports Information Office. Credential requests are faxed to the opponent school by Monday two weeks prior to the contest.

Conference Road Game Credentials

Writers covering UM on a regular basis should make all requests for conference road credentials directly with the home team.

HURRICANES IN THE NFL

As of September 12, the University of Miami had 43 former players on NFL rosters. HURRICANE 1,000-YARD RUSHERS

Thirty-three Hurricanes have surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for their careers since Miami started playing football in 1926. The newest member to the 1,000-yard club is junior Tyrone Moss, who broke the barrier with his eighth carry of the game against Florida State on Sept. 5 with a six-yard run. Moss is currently tied for 23rd on Miami's all-time rushing list with 1,197 yards. The junior rushed for a career-high 139 yards at Clemson and moved past Bob McDougal (1,098), Speedy Neal (1,102), Pete Banaszak (1,107), Harry Ghaul (1,108), Keith Griffin (1,167), Jim Vollenweider (1,169) and Terry Fox (1,177) on the all-time list. THE LAST TIME THEY MET

GAME 3 - (3) MIAMI 35, (13) COLORADO 29

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1993 - FOLSOM FIELD, BOULDER, COLO.

Donnell Bennett ran for 123 yards and two touchdowns as third-ranked Miami held off a furious fourth-quarter surge from 13th-ranked Colorado in the 35-29 victory at Folsom Field in front of 52,391.

Miami led the entire game, but the win was not secured until Colorado's comeback and possible game-winning drive ended just 17 yards short of the goal line in the closing minutes. The Hurricanes gained a 35-15 lead with 8:50 remaining in the fourth quarter on James Stewart's 26-yard touchdown run, giving Miami an apparently comfortable cushion.

Colorado's Kordell Stewart hit Charles Johnson for a 7-yard scoring strike on the ensuing possession to chip away at the lead. The Buffaloes recovered an onside kick and quickly marched down the field. James Hill scored on a 5-yard jaunt to bring the Buffaloes within 35-29 with 5:04 on the clock.

The drama wasn't over. Chris Hudson stripped the ball from James Stewart at the Miami 43-yard line with 2:07 to give the Buffaloes one more chance. Kordell Stewart drove CU down to the 11 before an offensive grabbing-the-face-mask penalty set back the Buffaloes. Miami was finally able to breathe a sigh of relief when Kordell Stewart's fourth-down pass from the 17 fell incomplete.

Bennett scored on a 2-yard run in the first quarter to open the game's scoring. Mitch Berger answered with the first of his three field goals, a 54-yarder at the end of the first quarter. Colorado found itself down 21-6 at half-time, with Berger sandwiching a 44-yard field goal in between a 45-yard scoring run from Bennett and a 25-yard TD pass from Frank Costa to Chris T. Jones.

A.C. Tellison hauled in a 37-yard pass from Costa to put the Hurricanes up 28-6 early in the third quarter. Rashan Salaam found the end zone for CU on a 7-yard run in the third to make it 28-12, Miami.

Costa threw for two touchdowns and 246 yards on 18-of-27 passing in just his third career start. Jones led the Hurricanes with 77 yards on four receptions. Kordell Stewart connected on 22-of-40 attempts and a game-high 252 yards, including eight passes to Johnson for 111 yards.

- Five players saw action in their first games as Hurricanes: QB Kirby Freeman, CB Randy Phillips, WR Terrell Walden, TE DajLeon Farr, and DT Dwayne Hendricks.
- FS Kenny Phillips made his first career start as a true freshman in his second game.
- The Hurricanes have won 21 of their last 26 games against AP-ranked teams.
- The Hurricanes are just the second first-time visitor in the last 28 years to win at Death Valley. The two schools had met six times previously, all in Miami. Miami leads the series 5-2.
- In back-to-back games this season, the Hurricanes lost to Bobby Bowden's Florida State team and defeated Tommy Bowden's Clemson team.
- Tyrone Moss rushed for 139 yards on a career-high 31 attempts, his second consecutive 100-yard of the season and fifth of his career.
- The Hurricanes are 39-1 when leading after three quarters under Larry Coker. The only loss was last year's overtime loss to Clemson.
- Jon Peattie became the ninth player in Miami history to score 200 points for his career. He entered today's game with 194 points and now has 206 points.
- Devin Hester moved into sixth place on Miami's career list for kickoff return yards, passing Chuck Foreman, who had 882 yards on kickoff returns from 1970-72. Hester now has 907 yards on 31 returns.
- The Hurricanes are now 2-2 in overtime games. Clemson lost for the first time ever in overtime and is now 5-1.

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP) - Tyrone Moss' 25-yard touchdown run in the third overtime lifted No. 13 Miami to a 36-30 victory over No. 20 Clemson Saturday.

Moss bounced out to the right side for his scoring run and safety Kenny Phillips intercepted Charlie Whitehurst when the Tigers (2-1, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) got their chance in the third extra period. Phillips' play ended the game and gave the Hurricanes (1-1, 1-1) a reason to forget their 10-7 loss at Florida State nearly two weeks ago.

Moss finished with 139 yards rushing and three touchdowns, two in overtime. His 1-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter put Miami up 20-10, while his 3-yard scoring run gave the Hurricanes a brief 27-20 lead in the first overtime.

Miami seemed like it would have its Death Valley revenge after Moss' first score with 14:20 left in the game. But the Tigers (2-1, 1-1), who have already rallied in the fourth quarter to beat Texas A&M and Maryland this season, did it again to force overtime. Whitehurst had a 1-yard quarterback sneak touchdown to cut the lead to three points with 2:58 to go. After forcing the Hurricanes to punt, Whitehurst led a 46-yard drive that ended with Jad Dean's tying field goal from 27-yards out.

Trailing 10-6 in the third quarter, Moss carried six times on a 47-yard drive that ended with Wright's 8-yard touchdown pass to Quadtrine Hill. On the next series, Kyle Wright let loose with his longest pass of the game, a 40-yard strike to Sinorice Moss that moved Miami to Clemson's 6. Two plays later, Tyrone Moss finished the drive with his 1-yard score to give Miami its 10-point, fourth-quarter lead.

Miami vs. AP-Ranked Teams

- Miami has won 21 of its last 26 games against ranked teams, dating back to the 2000 season.
- Miami is 82-103-1 vs. AP-ranked teams since its first game against a ranked opponent in No. 18 Alabama in 1941.
- Miami is 38-54 vs. AP top-10 teams since playing No. 6 Alabama in 1947.
- Miami is 21-32 against AP top-5 teams since playing No. 3 Maryland in 1953.
- Miami's victory over No. 1 Florida State on Oct. 7, 2000, extended UM's record to 10-7 against No. 1-ranked teams. Of those 16 meetings with No. 1, six of the past eight were against FSU.

Miami's AP Rank

- UM is 231-47-2 all time in games while holding an AP national ranking.
- Since 1983, Miami is 160-25 as a top 10 team and 130-15 as a top 5 team.
- The Hurricanes are 42-6 as the nation's No. 1-ranked team. Additionally, Miami has won 32 of its last 34 games while ranked No. 1.
- Prior to their last rank atop the AP poll (Dec. 8, 2002), UM was last No. 1 on Dec. 6, 1992.

UM BEGINS 2005 EIGHTH AND NINTH IN THE POLLS

Miami received a preseason No. 9 national ranking by the Associated Press and a No. 8 ranking in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches' Poll.

- In the AP Poll, the Hurricanes begin the season ranked among the top 10 for the 10th time in 15 seasons. UM has been among the top five seven times since 1991.
- In the Coaches' Poll, the Hurricanes began the season ranked among the top 10 for the 10th time in 14 seasons. The top 10 ranking marks the sixth such preseason ranking for UM since 1994 as the Hurricanes were ranked sixth to begin the 2000 season, second to start 2001, first to begin 2002, third to begin 2003 and sixth last season.
