# CU welcomes annual invasion of Kansas fans

**WAVING THE WHEAT IN BOULDER**

Rather than telling his young basketball squad to brace itself for the inevitable horde of Kansas fans invading the Coors Events Center on Saturday, Colorado coach Jeff Bzdelik is asking his players to embrace the overall atmosphere.

"KU fans are great," Bzdelik said Thursday.
"There will be enthusiasm in this building. There will be spirit in this building. Whether fans are for you or against you, that's a good thing.

"It's all part of the pageantry, especially at the collegiate level. I applaud their fans for what they do."

Colorado (8-7, 0-1 Big 12) probably will get its biggest home crowd of the season against Kansas (12-4, 1-0). But in recent years, a third or more of the fans cheer for the Jayhawks. Tipoff is at 1:30 p.m. (KMGH-TV).

"I've heard about the Kansas fans coming in here," CU freshman forward Austin Dufault said. "That's just the way it's going to have to be until we start beating them."

Colorado was hoping to play its best basketball of the season by the start of the Big 12 schedule, but that's not the case. The Buffaloes have lost four of their past five games, winning only against Division II Western State. In its league opener, Colorado was mauled 107-62 at Missouri on Wednesday, getting outscored 27-5 to end the first half.

Look for two freshmen, 6-foot-9 forward Trey Eckloff (three points, five rebounds against

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Missouri) and guard Ryan Kelley (19 points off the bench), to get more playing time against Kansas. Eckloff, a Cherry Creek High product, may be a candidate to start.

Colorado committed a season-worst 26 turnovers against the Tigers.

"We need to strap it on against Kansas," Bzdelik said. "It's got to come down to our guys saying enough is enough, in terms of being manhandled all the time."

Kansas is the reigning national champion, but no current Jayhawk has started a game against Colorado. However, junior guard Sherron Collins (18.5 points) and 6-11 sophomore center Cole Aldrich (15.3, 9.8 rebounds) have developed into two of the Big 12's best players. And KU's newcomers were rated among the nation's best recruiting classes.

"We have a nice ballclub," Kansas coach Bill Self said. "But we haven't displayed the consistency, intangibles or toughness to win on the road."

Invariably, Kansas players remark after a game in Boulder that it does not feel like a regular road game.

"We know the crowd is going to be half them, half us," CU junior guard Dwight Thorne said.
"But at least it's going to be a packed house. It's going to be something our young guys haven't experienced. I'm interested to see how they react."
