OPENING TIP: Colorado will celebrate Senior Day on Saturday, recognizing the careers of its three seniors: **Kara Richards, Hannah Skildum** and **Dina Piterniece**. The Buffaloes have had recent success on their annual senior recognition date, winning five straight and eight of the last 10. CU's last loss on Senior Day came against Kansas State, to close out the 2002-03 home schedule.

BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP: Colorado will begin play at the 2009 Big 12 Championship Tournament with a first round game on Thursday, March 12, at the COX Convention Center in Oklahoma City, as either the No. 11 or No. 12 seed. Colorado is 11-16 overall, residing in 12th place in the Big 12 Conference standings at 3-12. The Buffaloes have dropped four straight and seven of their last eight games. Colorado could still finish as high as a tie for 10th place in the final league standings, but in terms of seeding for the upcoming Big 12 Championship, the Buffaloes will be either the No. 11 or No. 12 seed. To be the No. 11 seed, Colorado would have to beat Kansas State and have Missouri lose at Texas Tech on Saturday. The Buffaloes and Tigers would finish with identical 4-12 league records. In this scenario, since the teams split and would have identical records against every other team in the league, a "Draw" for seeding purposes would have to take place (see page 8 for Big 12 seeding and tie breaking procedures).

As for CU's possible first round opponent for the Big 12 Championship, it will be either Iowa State, Kansas State or Texas. If Colorado can claim the No. 11 seed, the Buffaloes will play Texas as the Longhorns are locked in to the No. 6 seed. If Colorado beats Kansas State, and remains the No. 12 seed, the Buffaloes would have a rematch with the Wildcats in the first round on March 12. If Colorado loses to K-State, the Buffaloes would be seeded No. 12 and their opponent would depend on the Iowa State-Kansas game later Saturday night in Ames. An Iowa State win would clinch a first round bye for the Cyclones, thus setting up a CU rematch with Kansas State as the No. 5 seed. If Iowa State loses to Kansas, Kansas State would jump ahead by virtue of a tiebreaker and take the first round bye, leaving an Iowa State-Colorado first round matchup.

THE BUFFALOES: Sophomore guard/forward **Brittany Spears** leads Colorado and ranks third in the Big 12 in scoring at 18.1 points per game. Her 489 points rank 13th on CU's single-season list and she needs just 11 to become the seventh different player (11th time overall) to reach 500 in one season. She needs just 39 points to become the 22nd player in team history to reach 1,000 and is on pace to be the second-fastest to that plateau. If Spears could reach that milestone this season, she would join CU Athletic Hall of Famer Lisa Van Goor as the only players reach 1,000 as a sophomore.

Spears has 11 games with 20 or more points this season, most recently equalling a personal Big 12 best with 26 against Missouri. Spears has eight double-doubles this season, one more than her total from last season, five of which have come during Big 12 play. She was named MVP of the Paradise Classic after averaging 16 points, seven rebounds and three blocks per game. She has the highest individual scoring output in the Big 12 this season, notching 36 against UMass in the first round of the Coors Classic, a Classic record and tying for the third best total in team history (Jasmina Ilic scored 36 against Nebraska on Jan. 4, 2006). Spears, who was named to the Coors Classic All-Tournament Team, ranks second in the Big 12 in minutes (35.4 mpg), sixth in rebounding (7.9 rpg), eighth in steals (1.9 spg) and 3-point percentage (.328), 10th in blocks (1.0 bpg) and field-goal percentage (.429), 11th in 3-pointers made (1.5 3mpg) and 14th in free-throw percentage (.718).

Senior center **Kara Richards** is finishing her season, and career, as strong as anyone, ranking second on the team in scoring (13.0 ppg) and rebounding (7.3 rpg) while leading the way from the floor at 56.8

percent (137-of-241). Over the last four games she is averaging a team-best 20 points and 9.0 rebounds per game while shooting 58.2 percent from the field (32-of-55). Richards recent scoring surge has allowed her to soar in the Big 12 rankings. She is second in the Big 12 in overall field goal percentage (.568) and ranks 10th in rebounding and 14th in scoring. She has three of her five career double-doubles

in the last five games, including a 12-point, 10-rebound effort against Missouri. Richards has five double-digit rebounding efforts this year, all coming during Big 12 games including back-to-back games of 15 rebounds to start the conference season. Richards was named to the Paradise Classic All-Tournament team averaging 14 points and seven rebounds while hitting 71 percent from the field (12-of-17). Richards has eclipsed the 20 point mark five times this season, and three times in the last four games.

Junior guard **Bianca Smith** is third on the team in scoring at 9.6 points per contest and is Colorado's leading 3-point shooter with 63 on the season, ranking second in the Big 12 (2.3 3mpg). Smith had one of the most memorable stretches in team history in January making 20-of-33 (.606) over a four-game span. During that four game run, Smith twice tied the school record for 3-pointers made in a game (7) and in one half (5). She has five games of 5-plus 3-pointers this season and she has hit 50 percent or better from 3-point range in nine games. Named to the Paradise Classic All-Tournament team, Smith had a game-high 23 points against Hawaii on 6-of-7 from 3-point range, a personal best from downtown in terms of accuracy. She's third on the team in rebounding at 4.0 per game, a substantial improvement from her career 1.7 average entering this season. Smith has six or more rebounds in eight games including a career high 12 -- all defensive -- against Arkansas-Pine Bluff, her first double-digit rebounding total.

True freshman guard **Alyssa Fressle** has given the Buffaloes good all-around play. Fressle leads all Big 12 freshmen in steals (1.7 spg), assists (3.5 apg) and minutes (31.1 mpg) and is third in scoring at 7.9 per game. Overall in the conference rankings she is fifth in assists, 11th in steals and 12th in assist-to-turnover ratio (0.9). She tied her personal best and team season high with eight assists at Iowa State and is averaging 5.0 assists over the last five games.

Sophomore guard **Kelly Jo Mullaney** has returned to the starting lineup for the past five games and has responded with her best stretch of games to date. She is averaging 9.4 points over the last five contests, while shooting 48 percent from the field (19-of-40). She scored a career-high 20 points at Iowa State hitting 8-of-11 from the floor, including a perfect 4-of-4 from 3-point range. Overall Mullaney is fifth on the team in scoring, averaging 5.3 points per game.

Mullaney replaced sophomore **Britney Blythe**, who had started the previous 15 games. Blythe has had her best moments during the Big 12 season, where she has scored 36 of her season's 57 points. She had a career night against Baylor, hitting her first four 3-point field goals for a personal-best 12 points. Blythe, who finished the night a career-best 4-of-6 from the field, had made just 1-of-12 3-point field goals this season and 5-of-33 in her career prior to the Baylor game.

Guard **Hannah Skildum** made her second start of the season at Iowa State, replacing Fressle. Skildum's minutes have picked up lately as the senior captain has played double-digit minutes the last seven games. One of CU's better defensive players, Skildum had five blocked shots in the past four games including a career-best three in the win over Kansas on Feb. 18.

ABOUT THE WILDCATS: No. 21 Kansas State is 22-6 overall and is fifth in the Big 12 standings at 9-6. The Wildcats still have a shot to be among the league's top four seeds, and receive a first round bye, at the Big 12 Championship. In order for that to happen, KSU would need to defeat Colorado and hope Iowa State loses to Kansas in Ames later Saturday night. Kansas State has dropped three of its last five, but picked up an encouraging 66-50 win over No. 15 (AP)/16 (WBCA) Texas in Manhattan on March 4. The Wildcats have lost their last four road games and are just 2-5 away from home during

BOULDER - Bianca Smith hit one of the biggest 3-pointers of her young career. Too bad the Colorado sophomore can't remember it.

Smith's long jumper from the corner broke a tie game and lifted the Colorado Buffaloes to a 73-68 win over No. 15 Kansas State on Saturday night.

Yet she couldn't recall one detail of it. The shot remained a blur.

"I think there was so much adrenaline, I forgot those last few minutes," said Smith, who finished with 17 points, hitting five 3-pointers. "It felt great to come back and hit the big shots late in the game."

That's what Colorado needed to beat its third ranked team this season. Colorado (15-11, 4-9 Big 12) has now won two straight after dropping six in a row.

"It's nice to get our swagger back," said Jackie McFarland, who scored 17 of her 19 points in the second half.

The Wildcats (18-8, 10-3) have lost two in a row, and had their seven-game road winning streak halted. Kansas State also tumbled out of a tie with Baylor for the conference lead.

Kansas State coach Deb Patterson had a simple explanation for the loss — defense. She wasn't pleased with the fact Colorado shot nearly 47 percent from the field.

"I don't think we were good in any aspect defensively," she said.

She also blamed the Wildcats' woes on foul trouble. Marlies Gipson, the team's second-leading scorer, played just 17 minutes due to foul trouble, and eventually fouled out with 5:49 remaining. She scored just six points, all in the first half.

Ashley Sweat was in a similar predicament and fouled out late in the game after scoring 15 points.

The Wildcats were led in scoring by Shalee Lehning, who finished with 19 points. Kimberly Dietz, who's from Boulder, had 16, hitting four 3-pointers.

Part of the Wildcats' problem was trying to guard McFarland. The Buffaloes senior made a decision to drive more to the hoop after having more assists (5) than points (2) in the opening 20 minutes.

With Kansas State keeping a close watch on McFarland, Brittany Spears and Smith were the beneficiaries. Spears finished with a team-high 20 points, hitting four 3-pointers.

"They're in the gym all the time and they can shoot the 3," Colorado coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "I thought they showed a lot of mental toughness down the stretch."

Spears' 3-pointer with 1:44 remaining momentarily gave the Buffaloes a 66-64 lead, but then Lehning tied it up with two free throws.

Smith hit a 3-pointer with just under a minute remaining to give the Buffaloes a 69-66 lead.

After Lehning glided in for a layup with 44 seconds left, the Buffaloes worked the shot clock down and Whitney Houston launched a 3-pointer that bounded off the back of the rim.

McFarland grabbed the rebound, went back up and was fouled as she made the shot, completing a three-point play with 16.1 seconds left to seal a win for Colorado. With the three-point play, she passed former CU All-American Shelley Sheetz for third place on the Buffs' all-time scoring list. McFarland now has 1,778 points in 113 career games.

the Big 12 schedule. Kansas State boasts the third best scoring defense in the nation, allowing opponents just 52.3 points per game. The Wildcats average 62.5 points themselves and shoot 44 percent from the field, third best in the Big 12. Kansas State does a great job taking care of the ball, committing just 13.7 turnovers per game, the sixth best mark in NCAA Division I.

Junior forward Ashley Sweat leads Kansas State and ranks fourth in the Big 12 in scoring at 16.6 points per game. Sweat also ranks fifth in the conference in free-throw percentage (.833) and is seventh in field-goal percentage (.484). Senior forward Marlies Gipson is second on the team in scoring (12.5 ppg) and rebounding (6.6 rpg) and is the Big 12's second-best shot blocker with 81. All-Big 12 point

guard Shalee Lehning leads conference and ranks second in the nation in assists at 7.6 per game, and is KSU's top rebounder at 7.2 per contest. Junior guard Kari Kincaid is the Wildcats' top 3-point shooter, with 47 on the season.

SERIES RECORDS: This will be the 63rd meeting between Colorado and Kansas State with the Buffaloes holding a 32-30 series lead. The Wildcats won the first meeting of the season, 72-60 in Manhattan on Feb. 21, but overall Colorado has won three of the last five in the series. The Buffaloes will be looking to salvage split of the season series for the second straight year. It would be the first time the two teams have split their regular season series in back-to-back seasons since 1998-99. Prior to the Buffaloes recent success, the Wildcats had won eight straight from 2003-06. CU holds a 16-10 lead over Kansas State in Boulder, winning the last two. Kathy McConnell-Miller is 3-4 against Kansas State as a head coach, all with Colorado.

MORE SMITH FROM DOWNTOWN: Bianca Smith, who set a CU single-season record with 80 3-point field goals last year, has established herself as one of the Big 12's most dangerous outside shooters. After starting the season by hitting just 12 of her first 49 3-point attempts (.245), she has hit 51-of-113 (.451) over the last 19 games and 31-of-67 (.463) over the last 12. She tied the single-game school record for 3-pointers made in one game (7) and in one half (5) twice in a three game span in which she was 15-of-25 (.600) from downtown.

CU players have now made seven 3-pointers in one game seven times with Smith leading the way with three of those instances. Her seven 3-pointers at Missouri was only the second time it had been achieved on the road, the other belonging to Annan Wilson who was CU's first player with seven 3-pointers doing so at Kansas State on Jan. 14, 1989.

Five 3-pointers in one half has now been done five times, with Smith recording three of them. Kate Fagan, at Syracuse on Dec. 31, 2002, and Shelley Sheetz at Tennessee on Dec. 20, 1993, are the other two.

Smith had a career night in terms of accuracy in the win over Hawaii hitting 6-of-7 from 3-point range en route to 23 points. She is second in the Big 12 in 3-point field goals made (63) and fourth in percentage (.389). In league only games she is second in 3-pointers made (33) and 3-point percentage (.402).

She is fifth on CU's all-time list for 3-point field goals with 175 and 3-point attempts at 471. Smith's 143 3-pointers over the last two seasons is the second best mark in team history for a two-year span and she needs seven more to pass Kate Fagan's record mark of 149 between 2002-04:

SPEARS' 400 DOUBLE: **Brittany Spears** is the fifth player in CU history to score 400 in her first two seasons in Boulder and the fourth to do it in freshman-sophomore campaigns (Debbie Descano scored 400 as a junior and senior after transferring to CU after her sophomore season). One member of the current 400 Double Club had a great seat to witness Spears join the group, as current CU Director of Basketball Operations **Tracy Tripp** was the third member, scoring 860 points over the 1985-87 seasons.

With 961 career points, she is the second highest scorer in team history through a sophomore season, trailing only CU Athletic Hall of Fame member Lisa Van Goor (1,288). She is already 25th on CU's all-time scoring list and needs 39 points to become the 22nd player in team history to reach 1,000.

Spears has already moved into several of Colorado's career Top 10 lists. She is currently eighth in blocked shots (80) and 3-point attempts (301) and ninth in 3-point field-goals made (98).

MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR MINUTES: **Brittany Spears** achieved a rare feat by playing all 40 minutes in three straight games, beginning with the win at Missouri and continuing with home games against Texas Tech and Nebraska. She became the first player to play 40 or more in three straight since the 1999-2000 season when Mandy Nightingale played all 40 minutes in back-to-back home games against Kansas State and Texas and then played 44 of 45 minutes in an overtime loss at Baylor. As for playing every minute for three straight games, that hadn't happened since Diane Hiemstra played all 40 for four straight during in February 1984 (at Kansas, vs. Iowa State, vs. Oklahoma State, at Kansas State). Hiemstra also had a string of three straight one year earlier, playing every minute of CU's final three games of 1983 (vs. Kansas, at Oklahoma, vs. Kansas State).

Spears' minute streak came to an end during the second half of the Kansas game in Lawrence as she went to the bench at the 12:20 mark after picking up her fourth foul. That stopped a span of 172 consecutive minutes played by Spears, dating back to the first half of the Oklahoma game. Spears ranks second in the Big 12 in minutes in both overall (35.4 mpg) and conference only games (37.5 mpg).

RICHARDS REBOUNDS: Senior **Kara Richards** had 10 rebounds against Missouri, becoming the 18th player in team history to secure 500 rebounds. Richards currently ranks 18th on CU's all-time list for rebounds with 512. She is averaging 7.3 this season, a career best and a drastic improvement from the two per game she averaged as a junior. Richards has been especially tough on the offensive boards, ranking fourth in the Big 12 at 3.3 per game. Her numbers have increased during the Big 12 schedule as she is third among league players with 3.9 per contest. Her total of 89 offensive rebounds this year is 28 more than her overall rebounding total in 30 games as a junior.

SHE CAN SHOOT TOO: **Kara Richards** tops the Buffaloes and is second in the Big 12 in field goal accuracy this season at 56.8 percent (137-of-241) and is on pace to finish her career among the best in team history. Her career percentage of 53.0 currently ranks 10th on CU's all-time list. Richards' best season in terms of accuracy was

actually her sophomore year in 2006-07 when she ranked second in the Big 12 at 57.9 percent, trailing only teammate Jackie McFarland on the league's overall charts. Her mark in 2006-07 is the 12th best single-season percentage in team history.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12: Colorado seniors **Hannah Skildum** and **Kara Richards** were named to the Academic All-Big 12 Conference Women's Basketball Team, the league office announced on March 5.

Skildum is a first team member, while Richards was named to the second team. The league academic honor is the first for both players.

Skildum, a native of North Oaks, Minn., has played in 26 games for the Buffaloes this season, logging two starts. A team tri-captain, she is averaging two points and just under two rebounds per game. She is CU's active leader in games played with 119 and will likely end her playing career on CU's Top 15 list for all-time appearances. A member of the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll, Skildum is scheduled to graduate in May with her bachelor's degree in communications.

Richards, a native of Graham, Texas, is second on the team in scoring (13.0 ppg) and rebounding (7.3 rpg) while leading the Buffaloes in field goal accuracy at 56.8 percent. A team tri-captain, Richards ranks 11th in blocked shots (74) and 18th in rebounding (512) on CU's all-time list and is on pace to finish among the Top 10 players in school history in field-goal percentage. Richards, who has twice been named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll, graduated in December 2008 with her bachelor's degree in history.

Nominated by each institution's director of student-athlete support services and media relations offices, the women's basketball academic all-league squad consisted of 34 first team members combined with nine on the second team. First team members have recorded a 3.20 or better GPA, while the second team are those with a 3.00 to 3.19 GPA. To qualify student-athletes must maintain a 3.00 GPA or higher either cumulative or in the two previous semesters and have participated in 60 percent of her team's scheduled contests.

Since the formation of the Big 12 for the 1996-97 season, CU's women's basketball team has had 57 Academic All-Big 12 selections, including 38 first team honorees.

AGAINST RANKED TEAMS: Colorado is 50-116 all-time against ranked teams, after falling to No. 25/24 Iowa State on Feb. 25. The Buffaloes are 0-9 this season against ranked teams and 3-13 over the past two years. Prior to the 2007-08 season, the Buffs had suffered 23 straight losses against ranked opponents from 2004-07.

CHALLENGING START TO LEAGUE PLAY: Colorado put the wraps on the toughest start to the conference schedule for any Big 12 team this year, playing four straight against ranked teams including a pair of Top 5 opponents. The Buffaloes played well in home losses to No. 6/5 Baylor and No. 3/2 Oklahoma, but struggled in lopsided road decisions at No. 22/22 Oklahoma State and No. 16/17 Texas. The resulting 0-4 start to league play is the first for the Buffaloes in the program's 35-year history, but it's also the only time CU has opened conference action with four straight ranked teams. Colorado opened the 2002 Big 12 season with three straight games against ranked league opponents. The Buffaloes, who were ranked themselves between No. 14-21 during that stretch, lost all three of those matchups, falling to No. 3 Oklahoma, No. 21/20 Texas and No. 14/18 Kansas State. That stretch was the final three games of a five-game span against ranked opponents as the Buffaloes ended nonconference play with a loss at No. 20 Florida and win over No. 21/22 LSU. CU's four straight against ranked teams were the most

since that same five-game stretch during the 2001-02 season. The Buffaloes would go on to play a school record 16 games against ranked teams that season, winning six. CU's tough schedule paid dividends that season as the Buffaloes won 14 of their final 16 games, advancing to the 2002 Elite Eight.

BALANCED SCORING ATTACK: Colorado had its most balanced scoring attack in over two years as five players scored in double-digits during the Buffs 73-57 win over Idaho State. **Brittany Spears** and **Kara Richards** each had 14 points, **Julie Seabrook** and **Bianca Smith** each had 12 and **Alyssa Fressle** had 11. It was almost six in double-digits as **Kelly Jo Mullaney** had eight off the bench. It was CU's first game with five in double-digits since a 77-71 win at Kansas on Feb. 1, 2006. Current CU senior **Hannah Skildum** was one of the five with double digits in that game, scoring 11 off the bench as a freshman.

SOUTHERN GAME CANCELLED: Colorado's home game with Southern University scheduled for Friday, Dec. 12, was cancelled due to inclement weather. A rare southern snow storm, which left 3-5 inches in and around the Baton Rouge area the morning of Dec. 11, shut down many businesses, schools and flights. Southern's travel plans were cancelled and the Jaguars were not able find travel alternatives to Boulder for the Dec. 12 date. The game will not be rescheduled in 2008-09.

CU women's basketball season ticket holders and fans who purchased single game tickets for the Southern contest can redeem their tickets for Saturday's finale if they haven't traded in for a game earlier in the year already. For more information, contact the CU Athletic Ticket Office at 303-49BUFFS or 800-87BUFFS.

SCORING EARLY AND OFTEN AT COORS: The Buffaloes offense started the season red hot, breaking the 80-point mark in their first two games (89.5 ppg). It was the first time CU opened the season with back-to-back 80-plus point games since the 2002-03 campaign when the Buffs began with home wins over Rice (85-66) and Detroit Mercy (86-43). The 179 combined points were CU's most since 2000-01 when the Buffs scored 189 in wins over Albany (93-43) and Howard (96-45).

HOUSTON TO MISS SEASON, DALE RETURNS: Junior guard **Whitney Houston** will miss the 2008-09 season after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in her left knee on Sept. 24 during team individual workouts. She had successful surgery in October and will be able to use her redshirt season and have two years of eligibility remaining.

Houston has averaged 6.1 points and 1.8 assists for the Buffaloes in 59 games over the past two seasons. She was a starter in 20 of those and was in the mix for the starting point guard position once again. Houston was CU's leader in scoring (4.3 ppg) and assists (1.4 apg) among those that primarily came off the bench in 2007-08 and averaged 6.5 points and just under two assists over the final 15 games.

Sophomore guard **Chelsea Dale**, who underwent successful surgery to stabilize ligaments in her right ankle in early September, made her season debut against UMKC, playing in the final two minutes of the game. She saw action in 12 games as a true freshman in 2007-08.

BUFFS PICKED 11TH...AGAIN: For the third straight season Colorado was picked to finish 11th in the annual Big 12 Conference Preseason Coaches Poll.

Oklahoma was picked to win the 2009 title with seven first place votes and 124 points overall. Texas, earning one first place vote, edged out Iowa State for second place with 95 points. The Cyclones, who actually claimed a pair of first place votes came in third with 93. Baylor was fourth with 89 (and one first place vote), followed by Texas A&M (85), Oklahoma State (79, and one first place vote), Kansas State (71), Nebraska (56), Kansas (41), Texas Tech (36),

Colorado (18) and Missouri (15).

TOUGH SCHEDULE: Colorado once again faces a tough schedule with no less than 17 games against 2008 NCAA or WNIT tournament teams. Seven of CU's opponents are currently ranked in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches and six are in the Associated Press Top 25, and it has been as many as eight during various points of the season. Oklahoma, Texas A&M and Baylor are in the Top 10 of both.

HOME AT THE CECC: Colorado is traditionally tough at home with a 330-105 all-time record at the Coors Events/Conference Center (.759). The Buffaloes have won 10 or more games in a season at the CECC in 20 of the previous 30 years including a 15-6 mark in 2007-08. The Buffaloes have enjoyed five undefeated seasons (1980-83, 1992-94) at the CECC.

BUFFS ON TV: Colorado's regular season schedule featured seven games that were televised either regionally or nationally, all at home and on FSN Rocky Mountain. Colorado was 2-5 in televised games during the regular season and all Big 12 Championship games

will be televised as well. First round games are televised by COX Cable in the Oklahoma City area. All remaining games from the quarterfinals to the championship are televised nationally on FSN. CU has appeared on 72 regional or national telecasts over the past eight seasons.

UP NEXT: Colorado will participate in the 2009 Big 12 Championship, scheduled for March 12-15, at the COX Convention Center in Oklahoma City.

Big 12 Conference Championship Seeding and Tiebreakers:

The seeding for the Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship will be based upon regular-season competition.

First-Round Byes. The four teams with the best records (percentage wise) in the 16 regular-season Conference games shall earn first-round byes.

Remaining Seeds. After the four teams have been awarded first-round byes and ranked as the No. 1 through No. 4 seeds (based upon winning percentage), all remaining teams will be ranked in order No. 5 through No. 12 for seeding in the championship.

Tiebreakers. The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the championship seeds if ties exist. (For tiebreaking procedures teams will be grouped in two divisions based upon established guidelines. Iowa State, Kansas State, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska are in one division and Baylor, Oklahoma State, Texas A&M, Texas Tech, Oklahoma and Texas are in the other division.)

(a) If two teams are tied and they are from different divisions, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.

(b) If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed.

(c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).

(d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest-ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.

(e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest-ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.

(f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.

(g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken first by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among the tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number of tied teams is reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tiebreaker, followed by steps (c) through (f).

(*Note: When comparing against the 'highest'-ranked team(s) in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth-place teams did against the first-place teams combined, and vice-versa.)

Draw. In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining any portion of seeding, the following procedure will be used:

(a) The drawing will be conducted in public or with media attendance;

(b) Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing; and,

(c) A single slip of paper with names representing each of the tied institutions will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest to lowest.



Kathy McConnell-Miller
Head Coach
Fourth Season

When Kathy McConnell-Miller took over the University of Colorado program three years ago, there's no question the Buffaloes were rebuilding and the team was a work in progress.

In three seasons at Colorado, there is no question that McConnell-Miller's Buffaloes have made progress and the program is heading in the right direction.

McConnell-Miller's three seasons at Colorado have been marked by significant improvement each year. From a nine-win season her first year in Boulder, to a 13-17 mark in 2006-07, this past season she guided the Buffaloes to a 19-15 record and the team's first winning season and postseason berth since the 2003-04 campaign.

McConnell-Miller experienced quite a few firsts during CU's memorable 2007-08 season. She led Colorado to its first Associated Press national ranking in four seasons, peaking at No. 23, and in the process became the 22nd person in NCAA Division I women's history to coach and play for an AP ranked team.

McConnell-Miller's Buffaloes beat three ranked teams in 2007-08 – another first in four years – and finished ninth in the tough Big 12 Conference at 5-11. With a league-record eight Big 12 teams advancing to the NCAA Tournament, CU gained the conference's automatic bid into the WNIT where the Buffaloes proceeded to advance to the semifinals before falling to eventual tournament champion Marquette. It was CU's first ever appearance in the semifinals of a postseason event and for McConnell-Miller, she claimed the first three postseason wins of her head coaching career (3-3).

The signs of progress were also evident in her second season, 2006-07, when the Buffaloes finished tied for seventh in the Big 12 at 6-10. CU's six league wins in 2006-07 were more than the previous two years combined (3-13 in 2005-06 and 2-14 in 2004-05) and the Buffs won their first Big 12 Tournament game since 2003.

McConnell-Miller, who officially became the sixth head coach in the history of CU women's basketball on April 27, 2005, presided over the development of Jackie McFarland, one of the top players in the Big 12 over the past four years. McFarland was a two-time AP honorable mention All-American and three-time All-Big 12 selection including back-to-back first team honors in 2007 and 2008. All-league selections are nothing new to McConnell-Miller as she has had at least one first or second team all-conference performer in each of her nine seasons as a collegiate head coach.

The Buffaloes have also had academic success in the McConnell-Miller era. In her three seasons, McConnell-Miller has coached 10 Academic All-Big 12 Women's Basketball team members and helped guide McFarland to three ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America honors, including first team acclaim in 2007-08.

She has done well with the players inherited from legendary CU head coach Ceal Barry, but she has also excelled in bringing in her own players. This past season she brought in Brittany Spears who proceeded to have one of the best seasons of any CU freshman in team history. Spears was named to the Big 12 All-Rookie Team and earned honorable mention to the all-conference team. She led all Big 12 freshmen in scoring, rebounding and blocks and became the first player in CU history to record 50 blocks, 50 steals and 50 assists in one season.

McConnell-Miller, who from day one has established a family type atmosphere in the lockerroom and a fighting spirit in her players, and her staff have two Top 40 recruiting classes, including the No. 29 class in 2006 according to the All-Star Girls Report. What was remarkable about the class of 2006 is McConnell-Miller and her staff didn't even have the chance to start on the recruiting trail until April when they arrived in Boulder. Despite that late start, McConnell-Miller and her staff managed to sign five top 150 players, including Whitney Houston and Aija Putnina who made significant contributions in their first two seasons.

Before arriving at CU, McConnell-Miller spent six seasons as head coach at the University of Tulsa where she constructed an impressive turnaround of the Golden Hurricane program. Before her arrival in 1999-2000, Tulsa had just one winning season in its 14-year history, an overall record of 81-250 (.324), and was actually dropped as a varsity sport for nine years following the 1986-87 campaign. In her six seasons at Tulsa, McConnell-Miller recorded a program-best 91 wins (15.2 wins per year), winning seasons in three of the last four years and two postseason appearances.

She left as Tulsa's all-time leader for coaching victories with a record of

91-88 and owns the longest tenure in school history by a women's basketball coach. McConnell-Miller, who earned WAC Coach of the Year honors in her rookie season as a collegiate head coach in 1999-00, led Tulsa to 14 or more wins in five of her six campaigns.

Under the direction of McConnell-Miller, Tulsa placed at least one player on either the All-WAC first or second team, each of her six seasons. McConnell-Miller also had the Golden Hurricane excelling in the classroom sporting four ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first and second team performers. Tulsa players also earned 23 All-WAC Academic Team honors. One of McConnell-Miller's prize players was Allison Curtin who was an AP honorable mention All-American for the Golden Hurricane and was drafted by the Houston Comets in the first round of the 2003 WNBA Draft.

Prior to her appointment at Tulsa, McConnell-Miller spent four seasons on Theresa Grentz's staff at the University of Illinois (1995-99). She was an assistant coach for her first three years before being promoted to associate head coach for her final season. The Fighting Illini posted an overall record of 76-45 and advanced to three NCAA Tournaments with McConnell-Miller on the bench. Illinois won the Big Ten Conference Championship in 1997 and twice advanced to the Sweet 16. While at Illinois, McConnell-Miller was vital in the signing of a pair of recruiting classes that ranked among the top five in the nation.

McConnell-Miller coached with Grentz for a total of six years as she went with Grentz to Illinois from Rutgers University in 1995. McConnell-Miller was a Rutgers assistant for two seasons (1993-95), helping the Lady Knights post a pair of winning campaigns, the 1994 Atlantic 10 Championship and a spot in the NCAA Tournament.

Her first collegiate assistant coaching job came at her hometown school, the University of Pittsburgh. She joined the Panthers in 1991 and served as the recruiting coordinator. She was also an assistant coach for the 1993 Big East All-Star Team which played in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

She is a member of the Western Pennsylvania Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, and was inducted into the Seton LaSalle High School Hall of Fame in October of 2006.

McConnell-Miller enjoyed a four-year playing career at guard for the University of Virginia (1985-89). She played in four NCAA Tournaments with the Cavaliers including a pair of Sweet 16 appearances and the 1988 Elite Eight. McConnell-Miller earned her bachelor's degree in rhetoric and communications from Virginia in 1989.

One of eight children, she is one of six McConnell siblings who attended college on a basketball scholarship. Four McConnell's are presently in the coaching ranks, three at the college level and one at the high school level. Her older sister, Suzie McConnell Serio is currently the head coach of Duquesne University and was the head coach of the Minnesota Lynx of the WNBA for three seasons (2003-06).

Born on Sept. 24, 1967, McConnell-Miller and her husband, Brad Miller, have three children: Brice (9), Mackenzie (7) and Macie (3).

#22 Brittany Spears, 6-1, Sophomore, Forward, Pasadena, Calif. (Pasadena/Notre Dame Prep)

This Season:

- Leads Colorado and ranks third in the Big 12 in scoring (18.1 ppg).
- Also on the Big 12 charts ranks second in minutes, sixth in rebounding, eighth in steals and 3-point percentage, 10th in blocks and field-goal percentage, 11th in 3-pointers made and 14th in free-throw percentage.
- Recorded her 15th career double-double, eighth this season and fifth in Big 12 play with 25 points and 12 rebounds at Kansas State.

- Her 489 points are 13th on CU's single-season list and needs just 11 to become the seventh different player (11th time overall) to score 500 in one season. Needs 39 points to become the 22nd player in team history with 1,000 and is on pace to be the second fastest, trailing only Lisa Van Goor. If she reaches that milestone this season, she would join Van Goor as the only players to reach 1,000 as a sophomore.

- The fifth player in team history with 400 points in each of her first two seasons, and the fourth to do it as a freshman-sophomore.

- Played all 40 minutes in a three-game stretch starting with the Missouri game. She is the first CU player to play 40 or more minutes in three straight games since Mandy Nightingale in 2000. In all played 172 consecutive minutes over five games (Oklahoma to Kansas).

- Named MVP of the Paradise Classic averaging 16 points, 7 rebounds and 3 blocks over the two game tournament. Averaged 26 points in the two games of the Coors Classic, earning All-Tournament honors.

- Scored a career high 36 points against UMass, a Classic record and tying for the third best total in team history (Jasmina Ilic scored 36 against Nebraska on Jan. 4, 2006). She also set Classic records for field goals in one game (12 vs. UMass) and field goal attempts over two games (40).

Career:

- On CU's career charts ranks eighth in career blocks (80) and 3-point attempts (301) and ninth in 3-pointers made (98).

- Named to the All-Big 12 Rookie team and received honorable mention to the all-

conference team.

- Named Big 12 Rookie of the Week four times in 2007-08, becoming the first CU player to earn four Big 12 weekly honors in the same season.

- The fourth different player, and second freshman, in team history to accomplish 450 points and 250 rebounds.

- The first player in team history to record 50 assists, 50 blocks and 50 steals in the same season and just the second to reach 40 in all three categories. Raegan Scott did it twice, as a junior in 1995-96 and senior in 1996-97.

- Second in scoring (472), tied with Erin Scholz (1993-94) for second in blocks (52), third in rebounds (259) and fifth in steals (57) on CU's all-time freshman charts.

- Ranked first among freshmen in the Big 12 in scoring (13.9 ppg), rebounding (7.6 rpg) and blocked shots (1.5 bpg) and was also second in steals (1.7 spg) third in free-throw percentage (.817) and fourth in assists (1.9 apg).

-- Overall in the Big 12 was fourth in defensive rebounds (5.8 rpg), seventh in blocks, eighth in overall rebounding, ninth in 3-point percentage (.312), 11th in 3-point field goals (1.7 3mpg) and field-goal percentage (.425) and 13th in steals and scoring.

- Her career high of 24 points came in her Big 12 debut against Missouri. It was the second-best output by a Buff in her conference opener, trailing only the 25 scored by CU Athletic Hall of Famer Shelley Sheetz at Nebraska in 1992.

- Named CU's Rookie of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year.

- A 2006 graduate of Pasadena High School who spent the 2006-07 academic year at Notre Dame Prep School in Fitchburg, Mass.

- Two-time Pacific League and Pasadena Star-News Player of the Year for Pasadena High School

- Averaged 23 points, 10 rebounds and eight assists as a senior guiding Pasadena to its first league title since 1991.

BOULDER - Brittany Spears had a game-high 23 points to lead Colorado to an 86-59 win over UCF Sunday afternoon at the Coors Events Center in the season opener for both teams.

Spears, just one off her career high of 24 points, set last season against Missouri, was 9-of-17 from the field with three 3-pointers and added eight rebounds and five steals.

She scored 15 of CU's first 21 points as the Buffaloes built a 21-11 lead in the first 8:09 of the game. Spears totaled 18 points in the first half, a career-high for one period, as Colorado led 41-28 after the first 20 minutes.

The Buffaloes pressured UCF into 31 turnovers and held the Knights to just 34 percent from the field.

"I felt nice to be out there playing someone other than the (male) practice players," Spears said.

Colorado struggled from the free-throw line, making just 16 of 26 attempts and was out rebounded 52-35, but it was an overall good start for a team debuting a new starting back court. True freshman guard **Alyssa Fressle** fought off two early fouls to finish with 10 points, three rebounds and four steals. Sophomore point guard **Kelly Jo Mullaney**, making her official CU debut, had two points, three rebounds and one assist, but overall handled the UCF pressure well.

"I thought I could have done a little better," Fressle said. "I think (the early fouls) may have shaken me up a little, but that's just something to learn from."

Colorado's front court, the topic of much discussion during the off season, had a productive afternoon. Fifth-year senior center **Kara Richards** had 13 points on 5-of-6 from the field with seven rebounds and two blocked shots. Freshman **Julie Seabrook** came off the bench to score five points and four rebounds while **Courtney Dunn** had six points on a pair of 3-pointers.

"The stat line on Kara is what we see every day in practice," CU head coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** said. "She's got the heart of a lion and the work ethic of a Division I athlete. For us to be able to go forward and continue to do what we want to do, Kara's a huge key to that. Her consistency is going to be a major factor."

The Buffaloes fell into a little foul trouble in the second half with Richards picking up her fourth foul with 16:27 remaining and Spears notching her fourth with 13:56 left, but the Buffaloes didn't miss a beat.

Junior guard **Bianca Smith** took over from that point as the Buffaloes pulled away and led by as much as 33 late in the game. Smith had 14 of her 16 points in the second half, tied a personal best with six rebounds and added two assists and two steals. Senior guard/forward **Hannah Skildum** added nine points, a game-high five assists, three rebounds and two blocks.

"It was a tough opening game," McConnell-Miller said. "When you think about the time we had to prepare from October to November 16, just their (UCF) style of play was difficult to prepare for. I was proud of our girls."

Emma Cannon led UCF with 19 points and 17 rebounds. Aisha Patrick also logged a double-double for the Knights finishing with 12 points and 10 rebounds.

BOULDER - Senior center Kara Richards scored a career high 25 points and grabbed eight rebounds to vault Colorado to a 93-63 win over instate rival Colorado State Wednesday night at the Coors Events/Conference Center

Brittany Spears matched her own personal best with 24 points and grabbed 10 rebounds for her eighth career double-double as the Buffaloes move to 2-0 for the first time since the 2003-04 season.

Colorado used an 11-0 run to open the second half to pull away from the Rams (0-2). The Buffaloes shot 57 percent in the second period, outscoring Colorado State 51-28.

Richards dominated the inside in her best all around game in a Colorado uniform. She was 8-of-12 from the field and a perfect 9-of-9 from the free-throw line.

"I became a little bit more aggressive," Richards said. "I started calling for the ball more. As a post, the only way I'm going to have a good game is if the guards get me the ball and we have guards that can all do that."

Richards reached 20 points for the fifth time in her career and surpassed her previous career best of 24 points set twice in her freshman year in 2005 (vs. Manhattan and Iowa State).

The teams played a tight and entertaining first half. Spears hit her first five shots from the floor and scored 10 of CU's first 12 points, and the Buffaloes hit a solid 49 percent from the floor in the first 20 minutes (16-of-33). But the Rams stayed within striking distance. Although the Buffaloes never trailed in the game, Colorado State stayed within three to eight points throughout the first 20 minutes. CSU's Kandy Beemer and Bonnie Barbee each hit a pair of 3-pointers as CU's lead at halftime was just 42-35.

CSU cooled off considerably in the second half hitting just 29 percent (11-of-38) from the field. Richards also went to work, scoring 18 of her 25 points and grabbing six of her eight rebounds in the final 20 minutes.

"I started on the defensive end, but initially we just went right inside and just tried to establish a presence," CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "I thought Kara [Richards] really dominated on the interior, she was phenomenal. I think the adjustments defensively gave this team the extra bounce, the extra step that they needed. I think the adjustments were big; not necessarily what I said, but what they did."

Coming off a poor performance from the free throw line against UCF in its season opener, making just 16 of 26, Colorado responded in a big way by making its first 17 free-throw attempts of the game and finishing 22-of-24 from the line. The 17 straight made to start the game were CU's best since its school record 19-of-19 performance against Nebraska on Feb. 7, 1987.

Facing her former team, sophomore guard Kelly Jo Mullaney scored 14 points and dished out six assists. The Buffaloes had a well rounded game from junior Bianca Smith who had nine points and a career-high eight rebounds.

Richards wasn't the only CU frontcourt player to have success on the blocks Wednesday. Freshman Julie Seabrook had nine points on 4-of-5 shooting and five rebounds while sophomore center Courtney Dunn had six points and four rebounds.

Beemer finished with 15 points and four assists to lead Colorado State while Barbee pitched in 13.

BOULDER – Colorado sophomore Brittany Spears scored a career-high and Coors Classic record 36 points, but UMass rallied from a late eight-point deficit to hand the Buffaloes a 70-62 loss in the first round of the 22nd Annual Coors Classic, Friday night at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

The loss puts Colorado (2-2) in Saturday's consolation game against Drexel (2-3) at 5 p.m. MST. Minnesota (5-1) defeated Drexel 74-50 in Friday's early game and will play UMass (3-2) in the championship game at 7:30 p.m. MST.

Spears' 36 points tied for the third best total in team history, matching Jasmina Ilic's total against Nebraska on Jan. 4, 2006, and just two off the school record of 38 held by current Director of Operations Tracy Tripp against Oklahoma State on Feb. 4, 1987 and Susan Horner against Weber State on Mar. 10, 1979.

Spears also set career-highs in field goals made (12) and attempted (25) and free throws made (9) and attempted (11). Her 25 field goal attempts tied a Coors Classic record.

Despite Spears' record night, Colorado struggled as whole from the field. The Buffaloes shot just 36 percent overall (22-of-61) and just 25 percent from 3-point range (7-of-28). UMass' zone defense caused some trouble for CU and led to rushed shots.

"When teams sit in zone, we have four shooters on the floor," CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "We took shots too fast, and took dumb shots. UMass took advantage. We weren't taxing them defensively and didn't play on both ends of the floor."

Colorado trailed for nearly all of the first 27 minutes of the game, but took its first lead since the opening seconds at 50-48 on an Alyssa Fressle 3-point field goal that capped a 10-2 CU run with 13:07 remaining in the game.

Tied at 52 with 9:21 remaining, Colorado looked like it was beginning to pull away as the Buffs scored eight straight on a Spears layup and back-to-back 3-pointers by Spears and Bianca Smith.

UMass made the final and most important push though, outscoring Colorado 18-2 over the final 6:57 of the game. CU missed 7-of-8 down the stretch, gaining only a Spears layup which came with just 42 seconds remaining to end a string of 15 straight points by the Minutewomen.

"I wish we could play that game over again," Spears said. "We need to play better defense. We need more ball pressure and to use more time on offense. We are just rushing shots. We have to believe in each other."

UMass forward Teya Wright recorded a double-double with 24 points and 13 rebounds. Guards Kim Benton and Stefanie Gerardot each scored 12 points and were a combined 7-of-15 from 3-point range. The Minutewomen made 11 3-pointers, hitting 39 percent from downtown.

Fressle finished with 11 points, six rebounds and four steals. Smith had nine points and six rebounds. Spears added nine rebounds and four assists to her strong statline

"We are in a similar position to where we were a year ago," McConnell-Miller said. "The sign of a really good team is one that is able to put the last possession, the last game behind them. That's what we have to do."

BOULDER – Drexel forward Gabriela Marginean scored 26 of her game-high 32 points in the second half to lead Drexel to a 67-63 win over Colorado in the consolation game of the 22nd Annual Coors Classic Saturday at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

Colorado (2-3), which dropped both games of its Classic for the first time in team history, fell for the second straight night after holding a late second half lead.

The Buffaloes led 56-49 with 6:33 remaining in the game when Drexel went on a 12-3 run over the next 2:11. Marginean made six consecutive free throws during that stretch and was a perfect 12-of-12 from the line during the game, tying a Coors Classic record and setting a mark for a CU opponent.

After CU's Brittany Spears tied the score at 61 with a pair of free throws, Marginean responded with a jumper to give the Dragons a 63-61 lead with 2:10 remaining.

Both teams traded missed shots and with 33 seconds remaining, Spears scored on a layup to tie the score at 63. Once again Marginean responded, giving the Dragons a 2-point lead with 17 seconds left. The Buffaloes never got the chance for a last shot to tie or win. Marginean, who added eight rebounds, closed out the game with a steal in the CU backcourt and went coast-to-coast for a layup and her 12th straight point.

Colorado led UMass 60-52 with just under seven minutes left on Friday before the Minutewomen ended the game on an 18-2 run.

Colorado freshman Alyssa Fressle had the best game of her young career in a losing effort. She scored a career-high 19 points on 8-of-14 from the floor, and scored in just about every way – 3-pointers, short jumpers, and layups in transition. Fressle filled out the box score nicely with four rebounds, three assists, three steals and topped it off with a blocked shot.

Senior Hannah Skildum finished with 10 points on 4-of-7 from the field, her first game in double-digits since last year's Coors Classic game against Siena (11). Senior Kara Richards had 12 points and four rebounds before fouling out with 4:48 remaining in the contest.

Spears, who was named to the five-player All-Tournament team, had 16 points and nine rebounds. She finished the weekend with Classic records for points (36) and field goals (12) in one game (both against UMass) and a 2-game record for field goals attempted (40).

Drexel kept the game close early at the line. The Dragons, who ranked second in NCAA Division I in free-throw percentage last year, hit their first 11 free throws and finished 12-of-14 for the first half. The problem facing Drexel was free throws were the only shots going down in the first half. The Buffaloes held Drexel to just four field goals – one off CU's opponent record for one half – and none over the final 12:51 of the first half.

The drought allowed Colorado to close the half on a 20-6 run and take a 29-21 advantage into the locker room, led by Fressle who scored 12 points in the first 20 minutes.

Colorado led by as many as 13 early in the second half (40-27) before Drexel chipped away at the CU lead. The Dragons shot 53 percent in the second half (16-of-30) and 88.5 percent from the free throw line for the game (23-of-26).

Drexel guard Jasmina Rosseel finished with 10 points and six rebounds. Andrea Peterson chipped in nine points and six rebounds.

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. – Colorado was limited to a school record low 13 first half points and never recovered as Seton Hall claimed a 77-40 decision Tuesday evening at Walsh Gymnasium.

Colorado (3-4) trailed 43-13 at halftime in a period filled with missed shots and mistakes. The Buffaloes shot just 19 percent in the first half (5-of-27) and committed 12 turnovers.

Colorado missed its first six shots and added four turnovers as Seton Hall scored the first 11 points of the game. The Buffaloes didn't score until junior Bianca Smith hit a 3-pointer at the 15:08 mark of the first half.

Seton Hall (6-1) kept right on trucking along. The Pirates made 7-of-9 to open the game and 63 percent overall in the first half (17-of-27).

The Buffaloes, who have lost nine straight road games dating back to last season, struggled with Seton Hall's pressure defense and never could get into a rhythm. Most of CU's 12 first-half turnovers came on errand passes and the Pirates took advantage, outscoring the Buffaloes 16-2 off turnovers in the first 20 minutes.

"The caliber of (opponent) and the youth of our team is contributing to the outcome of these games, but right now we're looking like we don't have a solid point guard," CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "Not that Kelly Jo (Mullaney) isn't a solid player or Britney Blythe isn't a solid point guard, but we're just not getting into (our offense) right now, we're totally on our heels half the time."

Seton Hall's defense held Colorado's top two scorers, Brittany Spears and Kara Richards, to just one point in the first half – a Spears' free throw. The duo was a combined 0-of-12 from the field, several of the misses coming from point-blank range.

CU's 13 first half points eclipsed the previous low of 14 for a first half, done twice, and most recently at Pacific on Nov. 18, 2004. It's the second lowest total regardless of half, trailing only the 10 scored in the second half of a game against Texas Tech on Jan. 17, 1998.

Spears finished with a team-high 13 points, most coming at the tail end of the second half. Britney Blythe scored a season-high seven points and had three rebounds off the bench while sophomore center Courtney Dunn had five points and three rebounds.

The Buffaloes fared better in the second half, scoring 27 points and hitting 43 percent, but it took a Kelly Jo Mullaney jumper in the key with one second remaining to get Colorado to 40, tying for the 10th lowest total in team history and the lowest since an 86-40 loss at Baylor on Feb. 22, 2006.

"It got away from us early. If we would have put forth the energy and execution that we did in the last 14 minutes, it's a different game," McConnell-Miller said. "(Seton Hall) got hot early and it gave them a little confidence. We looked so stiff and so methodical on open layups and shots. Seton Hall noticed it, the sign of an experienced team and a team that really wants it, and they attacked and came at us good."

Seton Hall dominated the front court, outrebounding the Buffaloes 52-24 and outscoring them in the paint 34-8. The Pirates were led by Noteisha Womack who recorded a double-double with 12 points and seven rebounds. Ebonie Williams and Nicole Emery each had 16 points for Seton Hall. Kandice Green had eight points and 10 rebounds off the bench.

BOULDER – Bianca Smith scored 21 points, nailing six 3-pointers to lead Colorado to a 71-49 win over UMKC Saturday night at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

Smith, who had been hitting just 24.5 percent from 3-point range through seven games (12-of-49) hit her first four attempts and finished the night 6-of-8 from long range, the most accurate night from downtown in her career.

"That's hard work paying off," Smith said. "I've been in the gym shooting night in and night out."

Colorado (4-4) sprinted out to a 22-6 lead thanks to Smith's four first half 3-pointers. On the defensive end, the Buffaloes forced 12 UMKC turnovers in the first seven minutes of the game accounting for 12 points.

Once Colorado's shots stopped falling, UMKC (4-7) was able to climb back into the game. Chazny Morris and Heather Davis hit back-to-back 3-pointers to spark a 17-1 UMKC run during CU's shooting slump and a Davis layup with 42 seconds left tied the game at 24.

Spears' 3-pointer allowed the Buffaloes to take a 27-26 lead at halftime, but UMKC came right back in the second and led 33-29 with 16:50 remaining. Needing a spark, Smith hit her fifth 3-pointer and after a Spears steal, Kara Richards connected on a layup as CU retook the lead at 34-33.

After a Morris 3-point play briefly put UMKC back on top, the Buffaloes took over. Spears scored the next four points to give CU the lead for good as the Buffaloes outscored the Kangaroos 37-13 over the final 15:21 of the contest.

With Smith providing the first half fireworks, Spears and Richards stepped up to put the game away in the second half. Richards, who had three fouls in the first eight minutes of the game, scored 10 of her 15 points and grabbed six of her eight rebounds in the second period. Spears scored 12 of her 19 points in the second 20 minutes.

"It was a tale of two halves," CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "The difference in the game was Kara being on the floor in the second half. We need to emphasize her being on the floor for us to be successful."

Spears added seven rebounds, three assists and three steals to her totals. Sophomore point guard Britney Blythe, making her first career start, added seven points and dished out a career-best five assists with no turnovers.

Morris led UMKC with a game-high 23 points and 10 rebounds.

BOULDER- Four Colorado Buffaloes scored in double digits to help the Buffs to a 76-63 victory over the Saint Louis Billikens at the Coors Events/Conference Center on Monday night in the first ever meeting of the two schools.

Colorado's starting line-up tallied 67 of the team's 76 points, led by Brittany Spears, who had 21 points on 8-of-10 shooting from the floor, 3-of-3 from 3-point range, and 2-of-2 from the free throw line. Bianca Smith finished the game with 16 points including 6-of-6 on free throw attempts. Kara Richards added 15 and Alyssa Fressle contributed 11 of her own.

"From a preparation standpoint, this lineup gets us off to a good start offensively and defends, which is exciting," CU coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said.

The Buffaloes held a solid lead over the Billikens all game, but it was definitely a tale of two halves for CU, who looked a little different team in the second half.

Colorado (5-4) pulled away from Saint Louis (4-8) midway through the first half after a 10-0 run over 2:20. Spears and Smith hit back-to-back 3-pointers to get things going. Fressle added to the Buffs' momentum when she stole the ball from the Billikens and took it down the court for a fast break layup. Spears put up another layup in the paint and the Buffs found themselves ahead 23-13 at the 8:07 mark.

Colorado finished out the first half strong, outscoring Saint Louis 40-23 at half. The Buffs shot 61.9 percent from the 2-point range, 57.1 percent from outside the arc, and 90.9 percent from the free throw line. They held Saint Louis to under 40 percent on shooting. The team forced 12 Saint Louis turnovers and recorded six steals, scoring 11 points off Billiken giveaways.

The Buffaloes gained their biggest lead—26 points (53-27)—seven minutes and six seconds into the second half, but were outscored by the Billikens 18-6 over the next 5:11. The Buffs' shooting in the second half was much lower than in the first: 43.5 percent from the 2-point range and only 20 percent from behind the arc.

"I don't like that we gave up 40 points in the second half," McConnell-Miller said, "which I attribute to being unfocused at times. We didn't exercise the mental toughness this team has."

Nonetheless, Colorado finished the game shooting above .500 for both field goals (23-of-44) and free throws (25-of-29) for the second time this season. Tonight's shooting percentages were both the second highest totals of the season, the highest coming against the Colorado State Rams on November 19.

Despite the Billikens outshooting the Buffs 40-36 in the second half, Colorado never held less than an 11-point lead in the half. Smith tallied 11 of her 16 points in the second half to help the Buffs hold their steady lead.

Colorado got into foul trouble in the second half as both Richards and Britney Blythe fouled out within the last four minutes of the game. But the team pushed through and held onto their win to boost their record to 1-0 all-time against Saint Louis.

Theresa Lisch led the Billikens with 28 points, including 9-for-9 free throws.

BOULDER -- Freshman Julie Seabrook had a big night off the bench, recording career highs with 12 points and 13 rebounds to lift Colorado to a 73-57 victory over Idaho State Tuesday night at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

Seabrook, replacing senior Kara Richards who fell into early foul trouble, recorded her first double-double in a season-best 27 minutes.

With the win, Colorado (6-4) records its first three-game winning streak of the season while moving to two games above .500 for the first time since opening the season with two wins.

Seabrook's double-double off the bench was key, but it was a team effort that led the Buffs to victory.

Four other Buffaloes also scored in double digits—the first time Colorado has had five players score in double digits this season. Sophomore Brittany Spears and Richards each tallied a team-high 14 points, Richards doing so in only 15 minutes of floor time. Spears also recorded her third double-double this season grabbing 13 rebounds. Junior Bianca Smith contributed 12 points, nine of which came from behind the 3-point line. Freshman Alyssa Fressle added 11 points of her own.

"I am happy with the balanced scoring," CU coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "Most important was the rebounding, assist-to-turnover ratio, and balanced scoring -- all were positives for us."

The Buffaloes started and ended the game strong, never allowing the Bengals to take the lead in the game, but the Bengals gave the Buffs a scare early in the second half when they cut the Buffs' lead to only five.

Colorado showed Idaho State (3-10) that it meant business early with a layup from Richards only 15 seconds into the game. A 7-0 run gave Colorado a 19-8 lead at the 13:21 mark. Smith dished out back-to-back treys and Richards added two consecutive buckets from the paint as the Buffs began to pull away.

Richards, who scored more than half of the Buffs' first 19 points, recorded her second foul at the 9:56 mark, and that's when it was Seabrook's turn to step up and take over for Richards under the basket.

"I was happy to come in and fill Kara's shoes and step-up," Seabrook said.

It didn't take much time for Seabrook to make her presence known. Not long after fellow freshman Fressle put up three layups in a row, Seabrook kept the freshmen frenzy going by sinking two free throws and putting up a layup of her own. After yet another 3-pointer by Smith, Seabrook grabbed a rebound off a Fressle miss and scored on the put back to put the Buffs up 34-21 with 4:09 left in the first.

Colorado entered the second half with a 13-point cushion (39-26), but the Buffaloes soon saw their lead dwindle as the Bengals started out the second half just as quick as the Buffs had started out the first with a layup by Idaho State junior Oana Iacovita 17 seconds in.

Over the next 3:47, the Bengals went on 6-0 run as the Buffs shot 0-for-7 from the field during that span. The Bengals seemed to have the momentum as they came within just five points of the Buffs lead, but fouls would hurt Idaho State as Colorado recorded 17 of its 34 second-half points off of free throws. Colorado shot 17-for-28 from the line in the second.

Those 17 free throws proved key in helping Colorado regain a steady lead, as the Buffs finished the game with a 16-point advantage.

Three players led Idaho State by scoring in double digits. Freshman Sheila Adams and Colorado native, senior Cara Lambert, both came off the bench to contribute 25 combined points. Adams scored a career-high 15 points, including three baskets from behind the arc. Senior Michelle Grohs added another 13 points for the Bengals.

HONOLULU -- Alyssa Fressle scored 16 points and dished out seven assists to lead Colorado to a 63-55 win over Pepperdine Saturday in the first game of the 2008 Paradise Classic at the Stan Sheriff Center on the University of Hawaii campus.

Colorado (7-4) wins its fourth-straight overall and ends a streak of 10 losses in a row away from Boulder dating back to January 2008.

Brittany Spears led all scorers with 18 points and eight rebounds. Kara Richards had 16 points and seven rebounds.

"Our last two games on the road we didn't play Colorado Basketball and we know we're so much better than that," Fressle said. "Being in Hawaii its great not just off the court, but to also prove that we can win on the road."

Fressle, just three points and one assist off her career high, keyed big moments in each half for Colorado. She scored the first five points of a 7-0 run that gave Colorado its first lead at 14-12 in the first half and had big shots in the second as Pepperdine tried to close the gap.

Pepperdine led early 12-7 when Fressle made a baseline jumper to cut the lead to three. After a missed 3-point attempt by Pepperdine's Nakeya Isabell, Spears got the long rebound and immediately found Fressle on the break for the layup. Isabell fouled Fressle, who hit the free throw to tie the game at 12. The foul was costly for the Waves as it was Isabell's second and starting center and leading scorer Miranda Ayim was already on the bench with two of her own.

The Buffaloes took advantage with their best defensive half of the season. Pepperdine scored just one basket over the final 9:36 of the first half and the 17 points scored by the Waves was the lowest half total for a CU opponent this year. Richards scored eight straight points and Fressle hit a couple free throws as the Buffs extended their lead to nine at the half, 26-17.

"We played a very good Pepperdine team today," CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "We had to work hard and grind that one out. (Ayim and Isabell) got into foul trouble early and our players responded on the defensive end, challenging shots. It was a great team effort."

It was Spears' turn early in the second half as the sophomore scored 10 of CU's first 12 points as the Buffaloes built a 14-point lead (38-24) with 16:15 remaining. But Ayim and Isabell returned to the lineup and kept the game close. Ayim scored 11 of her team-high 15 points in the second half as the Waves cut the CU lead down to 48-44 with 6:44 left.

Richards and Bianca Smith each hit layups to put Colorado back up by eight, but the Waves chipped back to a 5-point deficit at 52-47 with 4:28 remaining. After Spears hit a jumper, Pepperdine answered with a Jazmine Jackson free throw.

Pepperdine, pressuring the Colorado back court all day to the tune of 20 turnovers, looked to get the ball back late again as the Buffaloes were struggling to get a shot off. But Fressle came through one final time, as a 24-foot 3-pointer to beat the shot clock gave the Buffaloes some breathing room at 57-48 just 2:49 left in the game.

Just five players scored for the Buffaloes as Kelly Jo Mullaney had eight off the Bench and Smith finished with five. Colorado had its best overall shooting performance of the season hitting 56.3 percent from the field (27-of-48) while holding Pepperdine to just 37.7 percent for the game (23-of-61).

"Alyssa and Brittany are two players we know we can go to and handle the pressure and make plays," McConnell-Miller said. They have both really made the transition to understanding defensive concepts, stopping scorers and they know what we are trying to accomplish. We saw some great effort on the defensive end and a better understanding of what we are trying to do."

HONOLULU -- Senior Kara Richards didn't lead the Paradise Classic in scoring, assists or even rebounds, but there is little doubt the difference in the Buffaloes with the fifth-year captain in the lineup.

Richards scored all 12 of her points and recorded all seven of her rebounds in the second half to lift Colorado to a 67-55 win over host Hawaii in the final game of the 2008 Paradise Classic at the Stan Sheriff Center.

Bianca Smith had a season-high 23 points and seven rebounds and Brittany Spears added 14 points and six rebounds, but it was Richards' presence that sparked a 25-6 CU second-half run that gave Colorado the tournament title, a fifth-straight win and its first win on an opponent's home court in eight tries.

Colorado opened up an early 22-7 lead thanks to the sharp shooting of Smith. She made her first five shots from the field, including four 3-pointers, scoring 15 points during that stretch.

Soon after Richards picked up her second foul with 11:12 remaining in the first half, the Rainbow Wahine began to claw their way back. Hawaii took advantage of 11 first half Colorado fouls by hitting 8-of-10 free throw attempts. Hawaii closed the gap to 33-29 with 1:31 left in the half on back-to-back 3-point field goals by Catherine Cho and Leliani Galdones.

Colorado extended its lead to seven at the half, 36-29, but Hawaii scored the first seven points of the second period, tying the game at 36 on Galdones' second 3-pointer of the game. With her team needing a spark, it was time for Richards to shine.

Richards halted the Wahine run, and put CU up for good, with a put back of a Kelly Jo Mullaney miss. She scored on the next possession as well, and following a Cho layup on the other end, Richards grabbed an offensive rebound that Spears converted into a 3-pointer to give Colorado a 43-38 lead.

Cho, who finished with a team-high 15 points for Hawaii (3-10), nailed one of her three 3-pointers to cut the CU lead to 45-41, but Richards again responded by scoring eight of CU's next 10 points during a 16-1 run capped off by a pair of Smith 3-pointers to give CU its largest lead at 61-42.

Smith, who joined Spears and Richards on the All-Tournament team, had a career best eight field goals and tied a season high with six 3-pointers, on just seven attempts. Spears, who averaged 16 points and seven rebounds over the two games was named MVP.

"I'm proud of those players for that recognition, but the last two days was certainly a team effort," CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "We enjoyed being here in Hawaii, enjoyed bonding, but the focus was coming in here and winning two games."

Freshman guard Alyssa Fressle tied a career-high by dishing out eight assists to go along with five points and two rebounds. Senior Hannah Skildum had six points and two rebounds off the bench.

BOULDER- Colorado sophomore Britney Blythe netted a career-high 12 points off of a career-best four 3-pointers, but it was not enough to lift the Buffaloes as they fell to No. 6 (AP)/5 (WBCA) ranked Baylor, 63-50, at the Coors Events/Conference Center Saturday afternoon.

The game was much closer than the final score read as the Buffs (8-5, 0-1 Big 12) trailed the Lady Bears (13-1, 1-0 Big 12) by only two points (50-48) with 7 minutes, 11 seconds remaining in both teams' first conference game of the season. Up until that point, the score had been tied eight times and the lead had changed six times.

But the Lady Bears pulled away in the last 6:52 of the game, going on a 13-2 run.

Right from the get-go, the game would prove to be very intense, and the speed of play quick, for both teams. In the first 4:16 of the game, the Buffs jumped ahead to a 10-6 lead off back-to-back jumpers by junior Bianca Smith and sophomore Brittany Spears, followed by Blythe's first trey of the night and another 3-pointer from Spears.

Colorado went into halftime trailing Baylor 35-28, but came out on fire after the half as they went on a 14-1 run over 5:57 to open the second half. Spears started this run with a layup 21 seconds into the half. That's when Blythe went into action nailing three consecutive 3-pointers and earning a standing ovation from the announced crowd of 3,273. Up until today's game, Blythe was only 5-for-33 from behind the arc in her career and 1-for-12 on the season. But she changed those numbers today as she went 4-for-6 from 3-point range, totals also serving as career highs for both 3-point shots and overall from the floor.

Smith followed Blythe's impressive performance with a 3-pointer of her own to give the Buffaloes their biggest lead of the game (42-37), but that's when the tables turned and Baylor followed solid Colorado play with a 12-2 run of their own over the next 3:32. This run brought Baylor ahead 49-44 with less than 10 minutes remaining in the game and the Lady Bears would hold onto this lead until the final buzzer sounded.

The Buffaloes recorded six steals, two blocks, and forced 15 Baylor turnovers on the night, but their strong effort was not enough to stop the explosiveness down low of the Lady Bears who, led by junior Danielle Wilson (16 points), outscored CU 44-14 in the paint, including 18 second chance points and 14 points off fast breaks.

"Baylor's best offense is on second chance opportunities. A lot of their leads are not on what they ran, but on broken plays and missed shots," said CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller. "We're not a front court team and that's where (Baylor) gets their points—in the paint."

Richards finished with a career-high and team season-high 15 rebounds and added nine points. Spears had a team-high 14 points and had six rebounds and two steals. Fressle had eight points, four rebounds and two assists.

Despite the outcome of the game, neither McConnell-Miller nor her players were upset with the team's effort. And they will look for the mental toughness the team showed against Baylor to carry them into the next stretch of games as they take on three more Big 12 South teams, all of which are currently ranked both in the Associated Press and WBCA Coaches polls

STILLWATER, Okla. – A long scoring drought cost Colorado in its season-opener against Baylor and another prolonged drought was the deciding factor again, but this time a lot earlier.

Colorado didn't score for the first 7 minutes, 49 seconds of the first half which allowed No. 22 (AP & WBCA) ranked Oklahoma State to finish the period on a 19-0 run as the Cowgirls claimed a 79-43 decision in a Big 12 Conference game Wednesday night at Gallagher-Iba Arena.

The Buffaloes (8-6, 0-2) shot just 28 percent in the first half (7-of-25), missing their final seven shots and committing six turnovers. CU had twice as many turnovers (14) as field goals in the period which resulted in 15 points for the Cowgirls.

Oklahoma State (12-3, 1-1 Big 12) meanwhile made 51 percent in the first half and an Andrea Riley 3-pointer to open the second to actually extended the Cowgirl run to 22-0 before Brittany Spears finally ended the Buffaloes drought with a 3-pointer with 17:57 remaining.

Colorado's top two scorers – Spears and Kara Richards – were held to a combined 20 points on 8-of-29 from the floor. Despite a season-low in field goal percentage, Richards (4-of-12) was CU's bright spot on the low post equaling a career-high with 15 rebounds, which she initially set Saturday against Baylor. She added nine points.

Spears led Colorado with 11 points, eight of which came in the second half, and recorded six rebounds, two blocks and two steals.

Oklahoma State scored the first eight points of the game as Riley and Taylor Hardeman each hit 3-pointers. Alyssa Fressle responded for CU with a 3-pointer of her own and a Richards layup settled the Buffaloes down at the start.

The Cowgirls, who made 7-of-11 from the field out of the gate, built their lead up to 17-9 but the Buffaloes were able to claw back. Spears scored her first jumper at 9:47 to cut the OSU lead to 21-15, but Tegan Cunningham cashed in on a turnaround jumper and scored a transition bucket after a CU turnover to give OSU a 10 point advantage.

The transition game served Oklahoma State well. Led by the All-American candidate Riley, the Cowgirls outscored CU 20-4 on the break. Riley recorded her fifth double-double of the season with 18 points and 12 assists. Kristin Hernandez was the game's high-scorer with 19 off the bench for OSU.

Fressle, who finished with nine points, scored at 7:49 on a baseline jumper to cut Oklahoma State's lead to 25-17, but that would be it for the Buffaloes for the half. Hernandez hit back-to-back 3-pointers out of the 8:00 media time out as OSU began its run.

Julie Seabrook had four points and five rebounds off the bench. Bianca Smith and Britney Blythe each had five points.

BOULDER - Colorado sank a season-high 10 buckets from behind the 3-point arc, but it wasn't enough to stop the powerhouse No. 3 (AP)/2 (WBCA) ranked Oklahoma Sooners as the Buffaloes dropped their fourth straight Big 12 Conference game, 72-58, at the Coors Events/Conference Center Wednesday night.

With the loss, Colorado falls to 8-8, 0-4 in the Big 12 while Oklahoma improves to 15-2 and remains atop the league standings undefeated at 4-0.

This marks the Buffaloes first ever 0-4 start to conference play. Oklahoma was the fourth straight ranked Big 12 Southern Division opponent that Colorado has faced to open its league schedule.

"We knew coming in what a tough stretch this was going to be," said CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller. "A lot of teams at this point could have fallen apart and lost their confidence, but there isn't a player on this team that is headed in that direction. We need to get better as a team as a result of these four games."

Despite the final outcome, Colorado held their own against Oklahoma in the first half thanks to consistent 3-point shooting (5-for-8, 62.5 percent) and solid defensive play, including six combined steals from Alyssa Fressle and Brittany Spears. The Buffs defense forced 17 Oklahoma turnovers, 11 of which came in the first half.

Colorado was neck-in-neck with the Sooners throughout the first half. Bianca Smith started the Buffaloes off with back-to-back 3-pointers to put her team up 6-2 just 2 minutes, 53 seconds into the game. CU achieved its biggest lead of the game—7 points (12-5)—after Fressle sank a jumper at the 14:07 mark, but the Sooners followed with a 10-0 run in less than two minutes, edging ahead of the Buffs 17-13 with 9:04 left in the half.

The Buffaloes hit the locker room at halftime tied with the Sooners 28-28 after Spears hit a trey with 38 seconds remaining on the clock.

"At halftime we really felt like we could play with this team," said Spears. "We had a confidence that we could win this game."

But being tied with Colorado was not good enough for the Sooners; so they stepped up at the beginning of the second half to pull away from the Buffs.

Oklahoma stormed to their biggest lead of the game, a 16-point margin (51-35) 7:55 into the second half after a 20-2 run over 5:37.

CU battled back, outscoring OU by six points over the next 3:33, to put themselves within 10 points with just over eight minutes remaining. But the Buffaloes just could not catch the Sooners as they held on to a double-digit lead throughout the rest of the game.

Spears led the Buffaloes with 21 points, including four 3-pointers, tying a career high, six rebounds and four steals. Smith added 15 points on 5-for-8 shooting behind the arc. Fressle tallied 12 points, four steals, and a block.

Four Oklahoma players scored in double digits. All-American Courtney Paris led her team with 19 points, 14 rebounds, and four blocks. Freshman Whitney Hand contributed 13 points, while Danielle Robinson and Ashley Paris added 10 points of their own.

COLUMBIA, Mo. - Colorado junior Bianca Smith had a season-high 25 points and tied a school record with seven 3-pointers to lead the Buffaloes to a 61-56 win over Missouri in a Big 12 Conference contest at Mizzou Arena.

Smith hit 7-of-11 from downtown, tying a single-game record that has been achieved a total of six times by four players. Smith, who also hit seven 3-pointers in a win against Texas last year, had five rebounds, four assists and hit a pair of free throws with 7 seconds remaining to ice the game as the Buffaloes (9-8, 1-4 Big 12) claimed their first Big 12 win of the year.

Senior Kara Richards had 15 points on 6-of-8 from the field to go along with nine rebounds. Sophomore Brittany Spears recorded 11 points and a game-high 13 rebounds for her fifth double-double of the season.

Colorado led by as much as 11 in the second half, but the Tigers (10-8, 1-4) clawed their way back to the shoulders of RaeShara Brown and Jessra Johnson. Brown, who had a team high 17 points, hit a free throw with 6:39 left to put Missouri back to within four at 54-50.

After nearly four minutes of scoreless action, which included a combined nine missed field goals and three turnovers by both teams, Smith tied the record with 3-pointer No. 7 to give CU a 57-50 lead with 2:58 on the clock.

Johnson, who ended with 14 points and six rebounds, scored twice for Missouri in the final minutes, including a short jumper which cut the lead to 59-54 with 1:24 left. Richards corralled an Alyssa Fressle missed shot and was fouled by Shakara Jones on her way back up, but she missed both free throws. Brown took advantage on the other end scoring in the lane to make it a one possession game, 57-54, with 0:44 left.

Sophomore point guard Britney Blythe, who had two points, three assists and two steals, missed a jumper just inside the free-throw line with the shot clock nearing zero, and .07 left in the contest, but Fressle pulled in the clutch offensive rebound. After Fressle cleared the ball, Brown was forced to foul Smith, who hit both free throws to clinch CU's third straight win over Missouri and third in five total trips to Mizzou Arena.

"I'm really proud of them right now," said Kathy McConnell-Miller, who picked up her 50th win as CU's head coach. "I thought we got a little careless at times in the second half, but we maintained our composure. We told them not to get too high or too low and not to get too excited when (Missouri) makes a run because these things happen."

"I think what you saw was the maturity of this team. Even with (the losses in) the first four games, I promised them we were getting better. We were composed and very passionate tonight against an extremely tough opponent. It was a real confidence booster."

Colorado, which has been prone to falling behind on the road early, did so once again as a 14-4 run gave the Tigers an 18-8 lead at the 13:18 mark of the first half. However, Saturday night the Buffaloes had an answer.

Richards scored 10 of CU's first 17 points, hitting 5-of-5 from the field, and a layup at 8:53 cut the Missouri lead to 20-17. But Richards picked up her second foul on the ensuing Missouri possession and sat for the rest of the half. That's when Smith took over.

Smith hit four 3-pointers after Richards went out of the game as the Buffaloes closed the half on an 18-9 run. After missing her first attempt in the opening minutes, she made her next five in the period, tying the school record for 3-pointers made in one half, a mark she also achieved in last year's Texas game and shares with Kate Fagan and Shelley Sheetz.

BOULDER- Texas Tech used a 14-0 run midway through the second half to defeat Colorado 66-60 Wednesday night at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

CU falls to 9-9, 1-5 in the Big 12, while TTU snaps a two-game losing streak and advances to 12-7, 3-3 Big 12.

Sophomore Brittany Spears led the Buffs with 26 points—her second-highest point total this season and a personal best for a Big 12 game. Freshman Alyssa Fressle and senior Kara Richards each had 13.

The first half was highlighted by runs for both teams. The Buffs started out on top jumping ahead to a 12-2 lead less than five minutes into the game.

Spears got the Buffs going by putting up Colorado's first eight points. She knocked down her first of four 3-pointers of the night, tying a career high. Then, 22 just seconds later, she stole the ball in the backcourt from Lady Raider Jordan Murphree and drove down the court for a layup. Spears capped her run off with another trey.

Smith followed Spears' lead and recorded a steal and driving layup of her own. Fressle followed with a jumper, and the Buffs found themselves on top by 10—their biggest lead of the game—at the 15:31 mark.

But CU's lead didn't last for long as Texas Tech took over for the next 10 minutes, pulling ahead 25-19 and outscoring the Buffs 23-7 during that time.

Colorado stormed back and shut Texas Tech down for the next 2:09 as they put up eight straight points. Richards swooshed her two free throws after being fouled by Kierra Mallard. Smith knocked down a shot from behind the 3-point arc and sophomore Kelly Jo Mullaney capped the run with a driving layup down the baseline as the shot clock expired and sank a free throw on the next possession after being fouled by Murphree to put the Buffs up by two with 1:36 remaining.

Despite the Buffs' comeback, Texas Tech went into halftime on top by three (30-27) after Mallard scored on a layup and senior Maria Moore knocked down a 3-pointer with 34 seconds remaining.

Colorado and Texas Tech were even in the first part of the second half. In fact they were tied 40-40 after Fressle hit a jumper at the 13:45 mark. But that's when Texas Tech stepped up and went on a 14-0 run over the next four minutes. They held their biggest lead (54-40) with 9:01 remaining in the game.

CU Coach Kathy McConnell-Miller explained how her team fell behind so quick: "We tried to go too much one-on-one there. We had three consecutive turnovers that led to easy buckets for them, and gave them momentum," she said. "I thought we were soft and tentative and they went right at us."

BOULDER—Brittany Spears connected on a baseline layup with five seconds remaining in the game to complete a furious Colorado comeback as the Buffaloes beat the Nebraska Cornhuskers 75-73 Saturday afternoon at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

The game was full of runs by both teams. The Buffaloes scored the first five points, but the Cornhuskers responded with an 18-3 run to open a 10-point lead. **Bianca Smith** scored a 3-pointer for Colorado with Spears right behind her with another two to get the Buffs within five (18-13) with 11:55 remaining in the first half.

Spears led the Buffs with 25 points and nine rebounds while Smith added another 21 points, all of which came from beyond the arc as she matched her school record seven three pointers in the game. It is the second time this season that Smith has scored over 20 and the seventh time for Spears.

Nebraska went on another 7-0 run to build a 12-point lead when once again Smith gave the momentum back to the Buffs. She hit three of her five first half 3-pointers in a one minute span to allow Colorado to crawl back to within six at 28-22.

Nebraska's Cory Montgomery, who had a team-high 24 points and nine rebounds, had an answer to Smith, hitting a 3-pointer of her own to spark the Huskers on a 14-4 run for a 42-28 lead with just under two minutes left.

Despite committing 18 first half turnovers which led to 19 Nebraska points, the Buffaloes narrowed the gap to eight at halftime when **Kelly Jo Mullaney** drove the length of the court for a layup as the buzzer sounded.

The Buffs came out in the second half looking like a different team. CU cut its turnovers down to eight in the second half and wasted no time, cutting the deficit down to three with a 7-2 run to open the half.

"Most importantly they started to take care of the basketball," head coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** said. "[They] had the confidence that we could win."

Nebraska built its lead back up to eight (50-42), but when Smith hit her record-tying seventh 3-pointer at 12:03, it tied the score at 58 and neither team would build a lead of more than three the rest of the contest.

Moments later, **Kara Richards** scored on a layup to give CU the lead at 62-61, their first since an 8-6 advantage early in the first half.

From the 10-minute mark on, the lead changed six times with two ties thrown in. The Buffaloes held onto the lead for two minutes before the Cornhuskers tied it up at 68 with 4:45 remaining.

That didn't stop the Buffs from answering right back as Mullaney gave CU a 70-68 lead on a jumper with the shot clock winding down. After a Yvonne Turner free throw, Spears gave CU a 72-69 lead on a layup at the other end.

Montgomery hit a pair of free throws to pull Nebraska to within one and the Huskers regained the lead at 73-72 as Turner converted a steal into a bucket on the other end with only 1:20 remaining.

With 49 seconds left in the game, Spears went to the line to tie the game up 73-73. A turnover by Turner on the other end gave Colorado the ball to set up Spears' game winner.

Colorado shot 55 percent in the game, its best mark this season in the Big 12 and second-best percentage of the season.

Richards finished with 14 points and six rebounds while Mullaney had 10 points and four rebounds off the bench.

Dominique Kelley had 16 points while Turner had nine points, seven assists and four steals.

LAWRENCE, Kan. — Kara Richards scored 17 points and grabbed seven rebounds for Colorado but a big Kansas run in the first half was the difference in a 65-54 Jayhawks win in Big 12 Conference action Wednesday night at Allen Fieldhouse.

Kansas (13-7, 2-5 Big 12) rallied for a 21-4 run over the last eight minutes of the first half as the Buffaloes (10-10, 2-6 Big 12) dropped their third straight in Lawrence.

Sophomore **Brittany Spears** had 10 points and seven rebounds but struggled from the field, along with the rest of the Buffaloes in the first half, missing all seven of her shots in the first 20 minutes. Colorado shot just 29 percent (7-of-24) in the first period and made just 3-of-15 inside the 3-point arc.

Danielle McCray had a game-high 24 points with six rebounds and four assists for Kansas. Sade Morris had 13 points and Aishah Sutherland scored 12 off the bench, hitting 6-of-8 from the field.

Foul trouble hampered the Buffaloes as well. Three Colorado starters Richards, **Alyssa Fressle** and Spears each had two fouls and Richards was on the bench for the majority of KU's first half run.

Colorado jumped out front early, making its first four 3-point attempts, one each by Fressle, **Bianca Smith**, **Britney Blythe** and **Courtney Dunn** as the Buffaloes led 14-11 at the 8:15 mark.

From there Kansas began to heat up, after making just 5-of-13 to start the game, Kansas made 9-of-14 to close the half. The Jayhawks shot 53 percent overall on the night.

After Dunn's 3-pointer, Morris scored on a layup and Nicolette Smith gave Kansas its first lead at 16-14. Blythe nailed a jumper to tie the game, but KU guard Kelly Kohn came off the bench to hit back-to-back 3-pointers which gave Kansas a 24-16 lead with 3:33 remaining.

Dunn answered with a layup off a Spears pass at the 3:09 mark, but that was it for the Buffaloes as Kansas closed half on an 8-0 run.

Kansas led by as much as 15 in the second half, but Colorado made a late run to keep the game close. Spears and Richards scored 25 of their combined 27 points in the second half and a 10-2 run fueled by the duo cut the Kansas lead to 55-48 with just 4:34 left.

Colorado was much better in the second half from the field, hitting 60 percent (15-of-25).

But Kansas answered every threat from there and its lead never dipped below seven. McCray scored the Jayhawks' final six points to close out the game. Kansas kept pace with CU's shooting, hitting 54 percent of its own in the second half (14-of-26).

COLLEGE STATION, Texas –The weather was warm in South Texas Saturday, approaching the mid 60's, but the shooting on the Reed Arena floor was anything but for Colorado.

The Buffaloes shot just 30 percent from the field as No. 8 (AP/12) (WBCA) Texas A&M opened up a big early lead en route to a 79-50 Big 12 Conference victory.

Colorado (10-12, 2-8 Big 12) drops its third straight game overall and 17th straight on the road against a Big 12 Southern Division foe. Texas A&M (19-5, 7-4 Big 12) rebounds from a loss at Texas Tech earlier in the week for its 10th win in 11 tries this season.

Sophomore **Brittany Spears** had a game-high 25 points and recorded her second straight double-double by adding 10 rebounds, but she was Colorado's only player to reach double-digits. Senior **Kara Richards** had seven points and seven rebounds while **Kelly Jo Mullaney** had six points off the bench.

Unable to get its inside game established early, Colorado went to the outside but made just one of its first 12 field goal attempts, a Spears drive and layup, as Texas A&M built a 20-4 lead in the first 10 minutes.

The Buffaloes fell into foul trouble as well. Starting guard **Alyssa Fressle** had three early fouls and was held to just two points on 1-of-6 from the field before fouling out with 9:25 left. Junior **Bianca Smith**, the Big 12's second leading 3-point shooter, was nearly shut out, missing her first four shots, three from downtown, before hitting a 3-pointer in the closing minutes for her only points.

Colorado made just 17-of-56 from the floor on the afternoon and made just 8-of-28 (28%) in the first half. Texas A&M meanwhile shot 44 percent in the first half, hitting on 15-of-34. Danielle Gant scored all 12 of her points in the first half as the Aggies led 38-16 at the break.

Even Spears was not immune to CU's shooting bug. Despite scoring 10 of CU's 16 first-half points, was 5-of-15 from the floor in the first period and finished the game with nine field goals on a career-high 26 attempts.

A 9-0 run early in the second half gave the Buffaloes some life. With Texas A&M leading 50-24 with 15:52 remaining in the game, Spears scored on a layup and hit a 3-pointer following an Aggie turnover. CU freshman **Julie Seabrook** hit a pair of free throws and Mullaney scored a driving bucket after an A&M miss to cut the Aggies' lead to 50-33 with 13:32 left.

Attempting to cut the lead down even further, Colorado missed its next four shots. Texas A&M then regrouped and put the game away. Sydney Colson broke A&M's scoring drought and Takia Starks scored six straight as the Aggies answered CU's spurt with a 9-0 run of their own.

"I don't think (Colorado) quit once," CU head coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** said. "There wasn't one possession (that they did). I thought they played really hard. We were just outmatched. If we can take what we learn from this game and get better for our next opponent which is Kansas. If they show up on Monday with Colorado on their chest, they have responded. They have put this game behind and we have grown in areas that we needed to grow."

Texas A&M had four players score in double-digits led by Tanisha Smith who had a double-double off the bench, finishing with 15 points and 10 rebounds. Tyra White had 12 and Starks ended with 11.

Seabrook had a personal Big 12 high six rebounds off the bench. Sophomore **Chelsea Dale** pulled in three rebounds in a career-most 14 minutes. Texas A&M outrebounded Colorado 50-32.

BOULDER - Four Colorado players scored in double digits to lift the Buffaloes to a 69-62 win over Kansas in a Big 12 Conference battle Wednesday night at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

With tonight's victory, Colorado redeems itself after a 65-54 loss to the Jayhawks in Lawrence two weeks ago. The Buffaloes (11-12, 3-8) now pull ahead of Kansas (13-11, 2-9) in Big 12 play and remain in a tie for ninth place with Missouri, a 52-43 winner over No. 16 Kansas State on Wednesday.

Junior **Bianca Smith** and sophomore **Brittany Spears** each knocked down a game-high 18 points. Smith shot 4-for-6 from 3-point range and contributed three steals and an assist. Spears also tallied seven rebounds, three steals, and a block. Sophomore guard **Kelly Jo Mullaney**, who started for the first time in 15 games, gave the Buffs great intensity and hustle on the floor.

CU head coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** was very happy with Mullaney's performance: "The sets we run with her in, we were able to push the ball. A lot of our points early on were off transition offense. I'm definitely happy with what Kelly Jo brought today," she said.

Mullaney saw 38 minutes of playing time and added a personal Big 12-best 13 points, an assist, and a steal.

Senior center **Kara Richards** recorded her first double-double of the season and the third of her career with 10 points and 10 rebounds on the night. Richards also logged a season-high three steals.

It was an intense game right from the get-go. CU jumped out on top first after a Smith steal set up Mullaney and freshman **Alyssa Fressle** for a fastbreak give-and-go which ended with a three-point play after Mullaney was fouled on her layup and netted the basket and the extra point. CU outscored the Jayhawks 10-2 to open the game.

The Buffs jumped ahead to as much as a 12-point lead in the first half, but the Jayhawks shut the Buffs out for 6 minutes and 35 seconds. Kansas came within one point of Colorado's lead on this run, but the Buffs stayed on top until half, entering the locker room with a 31-28 margin.

CU held onto its lead in the second half until the 8:53 mark when Jayhawk Nicolette Smith shot a trey from downtown giving Kansas a 50-48 lead, its first of the game.

The game was back-and-forth over the next 7:20 and no team held more than a four-point lead. The Buffs and Jayhawks were tied with just over two minutes left, but successful free throw shooting allowed CU to pull ahead as the team went 9-for-10 from the charity stripe to close out the game.

Senior **Hannah Skildum** gave the Buffs a spark off the bench tonight, contributing four points, two rebounds, an assist, a steal, and a career-high three blocks in 14 minutes of play.

With tonight's performance, Spears became the fifth player in CU history to score 400 points in each of her first two seasons and only the fourth to do it as an underclassman.

Smith led Kansas with a team-high 15 points, Krysten Boogaard added 13, and Danielle McCray and Sade Morris contributed 11 and 10 points respectively

AMES, Iowa. -- Senior **Kara Richards** had 21 points and 10 rebounds, but hot Iowa State shooting led to a 76-63 win for the No. 25 (AP)/24 (WBCA) ranked Cyclones over Colorado in Big 12 Conference action Wednesday night at Hilton Coliseum.

Colorado (11-14, 3-10) dropped its sixth straight against Iowa State (20-7, 8-5) who had been coming off a sub-par shooting performance, making just 27 percent from the field and only 3-of-16 from 3-point range in their last game, a 58-47 loss at Kansas on Sunday.

Wednesday the Cyclones were 10-of-20 from 3-point range, led by Kelsey Bolte who was 5-of-6 from downtown and finished with a game-high 23 points.

Iowa State also took full advantage of its trips to the foul line. The Cyclones hit 24 straight free-throw attempts before missing their last two. By contrast, the Buffaloes took just seven shots from the charity stripe, making five.

Kelly Jo Mullaney scored a career-high 20 points, 17 of which came in the first half, on 8-of-11 from the field. She hit all four 3-point attempts, also a career high.

Bolle hit her first three 3-point attempts to help the Cyclones build an early 14-8 lead. Mullaney then went on a tear. The sophomore guard hit her first seven attempts from the field, including three 3-pointers. She scored 13 in a row to lead the Buffaloes back and when Richards connected on a layup with 6:12 left, Colorado took its first lead of the game at 25-24.

Alison Lacey and Ashley Arlen answered with back-to-back 3-pointers and Iowa State went on an 8-0 run to take a 32-25 advantage. Richards brought the Buffs back to within five at halftime, 36-31, scoring CU's last eight points of the period.

Brittany Spears scored the first four points of the second half to cut the Iowa State lead to one (36-35), but Iowa State broke open the game with a 14-1 run over the next four minutes. Colorado got the lead back down to 10 at 52-42 after consecutive 3-pointers by **Bianca Smith** and **Alyssa Fressle**, but Lacey hit a 3-pointer to spark a 21-9 ISU run.

Fressle had eight points and tied a career-high and team season high with eight assists. The Cyclones held Spears, CU's leading scorer, to just eight points on 3-of-10 from the field.

Lacey had 20 points for the Cyclones, including 10-of-10 from the free-throw line. Nicky Wieben had 19 points and two blocks.

BOULDER- The University of Colorado women's basketball team fell behind early and was never able to gain the lead as they dropped their third straight game, losing to the University of Missouri 66-55 at the Coors Events/Conference Center Saturday afternoon.

Colorado drops into last place in the Big 12 at 3-11, 11-15 overall. Missouri improves to 13-14, 4-10.

"This was a very disappointing game," CU Head Coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** said. "We started flat and I thought we finished flat...From start to finish they played with more energy than we did."

The Tigers are among the league leaders in turnover margin and Colorado found this out first hand as MU scored 32 of its points off 23 CU turnovers.

Sophomore **Brittany Spears** put up a game-high 26 points and senior **Kara Richards** recorded her third double-double in the past four games with 12 points and 10 rebounds, but their efforts just were not enough to dent Missouri's lead.

Mizzou caught the Buffs off guard as they stormed to a 13-2 lead less than five minutes into the game. During this run, the Tigers forced five Colorado turnovers, netting 11 of their 13 points off CU giveaways—two of which came from MU steals.

Not only did Colorado have trouble hanging onto the ball, but the Buffaloes also had a hard time getting their shots to lay. They made only one of their first five attempts, a jumper by sophomore **Kelly Jo Mullaney** at the 17:38 mark.

Spears helped the Buffs narrow the gap, as she led her team on a 7-0 run in the last 1:45 to close out the half. First she threaded a perfect pass to **Courtney Dunn** who broke free under the basket for a layup. Spears followed this with a deep 3-pointer and then a driving layup with nine seconds left in the half.

When the halftime buzzer sounded, the Buffs only trailed by four (33-29). But the second half didn't go Colorado's way as they shot only 32 percent from the field (8-for-25) and 25 percent from behind the 3-point arc (3-for-12) during the last 20 minutes.

Mizzou out-rebounded CU 35-31 on the game, including 14 offensive rebounds—11 of which came in the last 8:16.

"We just didn't dig enough or get the rebounds," McConnell-Miller said. "They had too many second and third opportunities in the last two minutes."

Junior **Jessra Johnson** led the Tigers with 19 points. Three other players also finished in double digits: **Alyssa Hollins** (14), **RaeShara Brown** (14), and **Shakara Jones** (12).
