THE GAME: The University of Colorado will host San Jose State University on Tuesday, Dec. 22, at 8 p.m. at the Coors Events/Conference Center. This will be the second game of a double header as the CU men will host Cal State Northridge at 5:30 p.m.

BROADCAST: All Colorado women's basketball games can be heard live on KKZN AM 760. Mike Rice will handle play-by-play duties with USA Basketball's Carol Callan providing the color commentary. Live internet audio of all CU basketball games is available on BufsRadio, a subscription service through CUBuffs.com. Live internet video streaming of Tuesday's game is available on BufsTV, also a subscription service through CUBuffs.com. Please note the BufsRadio audio and BufsTV video are separate subscriptions.

OPENING TIP: The Buffaloes have been perfect at home so far this season at 6-0, their best start at the Coors Events/Conference Center since winning their first eight home games of the 2003-04 season.

THE BUFFALOES: Colorado is 7-2 after eight games for the second time in three seasons (2007-08). The Buffaloes had no trouble coming off an eight-day layoff for finals by crushing Southern Utah 88-36 in their last outing on Dec. 19. Colorado is out to build some momentum heading into Big 12 Conference play which begins on

Saturday, Jan. 9, when the Buffaloes will host Missouri in a 12 p.m. game televised nationally on FSN. Tuesday's game with San Jose State will be CU's second of a string of six at home that ends with the Missouri game.

Colorado's last three win streaks of five or more games have happened in this portion of the season, leading up to or including the first Big 12 game of the season. CU won its final five nonconference games in 2008-09, won 11 straight in 2007-08, which included the league opener at Missouri, and in 2004-05, CU won its final five contests before the league schedule started.

TEAM NUMBERS, BUFFS OFFENSE RED HOT AT HOME:

Colorado is averaging nearly 72 points per game and shooting 43 percent from the field. The Buffaloes have hit 80-plus points in their last three home games and shot a combined 49 percent (96-of-196) in those three wins. It's the first time CU has scored 80-plus in three straight at home since the final two games of the 2002-03 season (NCAA Tourney wins over BYU and North Carolina) and the 2003-04 season opener (Old Dominion).

CU is averaging 8.0 3-pointers per game, ranking second in the Big 12 and 13th in the NCAA through games of Dec. 20. The Buffaloes are also the No. 1 free throw shooting team in the Big 12 at 76.3 percent (100-of-131) and rank 21st nationally. Colorado is averaging 40.7 rebounds per game, and winning the battle of the boards by 5.4 per game.

SPEARS' HOT START: **Brittany Spears** is off to a great start as she leads the Buffaloes at 19.3 points, 9.3 rebounds, 2.4 steals and 1.7 blocks per game. She has four double-doubles on the season which currently ties for second in the Big 12. On the league charts she ranks third in scoring, overall rebounding and defensive rebounds (6.3 drpg), fourth in steals, sixth in blocked shots and minutes, eighth in free-throw percentage (.824) and ninth in 3-point field goals (2.2 3mpg) and offensive rebounds (3.0 orgp). Spears has made 29 of her last 52 field goal attempts (.558) including 10-of-14 from 3-point range (.714).

SMITH OFF THE BENCH, SAME RESULTS: After starting the entire 2008-09 season, senior guard **Bianca Smith** has come off the bench for eight of the first nine games of 2009 without missing a beat. She is averaging 13.4 points and 2.8 rebounds per game and is still displaying her sharp-shooting abilities. Smith leads CU and is third in the Big 12 with 26 3-pointers in her first nine games. She also leads CU and is the Big 12's best free throw shooter making 19 of her first 20 attempts on the season (.950).

Through Dec. 20, Smith ranks third in the Big 12 in scoring for those players primarily coming off the bench (starting less than half of a team's games). Here are the current leaders:

FRESHMEN THRIVING: Freshmen **Chucky Jeffery** and **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** have made major contributions to Colorado's solid start.

Jeffery is third on the team in scoring at 9.0 points per game and is second in steals (2.3 spg) and third in rebounds (5.3 rpg). She tops all Big 12 freshmen in steals and is tied for fifth overall in that category on the league charts. Jeffery was named to the 2009 Omni

Hotels Classic All-Tournament Team. Over the two games she averaged 12.5 points, 5.5 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 2.5 steals and shot 61 percent (11-of-16).

On the team charts, Malcolm-Peck second in rebounding (5.7 ppg) and blocks (1.4 bpg) and fourth in scoring (7.7 ppg). On the Big 12 charts, Malcolm-Peck is tied for fifth in offensive rebounds (3.2 orpg) and is seventh in blocks.

GETTING 'ER DUNN: Senior center **Courtney Dunn**, who has started seven straight games prior to the Southern Utah contest, had a career night against Denver, logging personal bests with 16 points, 5-of-7 from the field and 4-of-4 from the line. Her 16 points equaled her total for the first five games of the season combined. Her previous career high was nine against Kansas (1/22/08), a mark she eclipsed in the first half alone (14).

MULLANEY'S HOME COOKING: No one was looking more forward to CU's trip to Minnesota than Minneapolis native **Kelly Jo Mullaney**, and she responded in a big way. Against Illinois-Chicago, Mullaney came off the bench to score 13 points and record a career-high seven rebounds in the win. She also played well in the classic final against Minnesota with nine points on 3-of-4 from the field.

HOUSTON WE HAVE A RETURN, DESPITE BUMPS: Junior **Whitney Houston** made her much anticipated return to the CU lineup against UC Irvine. Houston redshirted last year after a preseason knee injury forced her to miss the 2008-09 campaign. She finished with 11 points on 5-of-10 shooting with two steals in 26 minutes. Houston hit a couple of big buckets down the stretch, including a layup which gave the Buffaloes their first lead at 54-52 with just 1:37 left in the game.

She sat out the Illinois-Chicago game due to a slight concussion sustained in the UC Irvine game, but returned against Minnesota two days later and put up nearly identical numbers, scoring 10 points on 5-of-10 shooting while dishing out three assists.

ABOUT THE SPARTANS: San Jose State is 3-7 overall, but has won its last two with both on the road. In fact, the Spartans are 2-0 in true road games this season. After starting 1-7, San Jose State stunned then No. 22 ranked California 68-66 in Berkeley, and backed that up with a 84-81 overtime win at Sacramento State on Dec. 18. The win over Sacramento State gave San Jose State one more win than it had the entire 2008-09 season (2-28). The Spartans are averaging 62.4 points per game, but giving up 70.3 to their opponents. SJSU is shooting 41 percent from the field and 65 percent from the free-throw line. Turnovers have hampered the Spartans in early games, averaging 22.1 per outing over their first 10 games.

Senior guard Chasity Shavers leads the Spartans in scoring at 16.1 points per game. She had 25 points in SJSU's overtime win over Sacramento State. Much like Colorado, San Jose State's second best scorer comes off the bench. Junior Samantha Marez averages 10.5 points per outing and is shooting a team-best 49.5 percent from the floor. Senior Shaunna Ridge is the Spartans' top rebounder pulling down 6.1 per game while pitching in 7.5 points. Junior guard Sayja Sumler leads the Spartans in assists at 3.1 per contest and is averaging 7.4 points per game.

SERIES RECORDS: This will be the first meeting between Colorado and San Jose State. The Buffaloes are 32-12 against teams currently in the Western Athletic Conference. CU's last game against the WAC came against Hawaii last season, a 67-55 win in Honolulu. Overall the Buffaloes have won their last three against the WAC dating back to the 2005-06 season.

Kathy McConnell-Miller is 7-7 as a head coach against San Jose State, with all 14 games coming while she was at Tulsa.

San Jose State has never beaten a Big 12 Conference team. The Spartans are 0-7 all-time against the Big 12, most recently losing to Kansas 93-49 on Dec. 3, 2008.

NUGGETS FROM THE SOUTHERN UTAH GAME: Colorado's 88-36 win over Southern Utah entered the Buffaloes' record book on several fronts:

- Colorado's 42 point halftime lead (53-11) tied for the second largest in team history. The Buffaloes also held a 42 point lead against Colorado State on Nov. 16 1979 (63-21). The school record is a 44 point lead CU had against Bowling Green on Nov. 23, 2001 (53-9).

Southern Utah's 11 first half points tied for the fifth fewest by a CU opponent in any half. The school record is 8 set against Kansas State on March 7, 1992 (46-8).

Colorado's final winning margin of 52 points are CU's most since a 96-44 win over Bowling Green on Nov. 23, 2001.

Southern Utah's 36 total points tied for the 10th fewest allowed in team history and the fewest since giving up 35 to Kansas on Jan. 16, 2002.

SPEARS EARNS BIG 12 HONOR: Junior **Brittany Spears** was named the Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Co-Player of the Week by a media voting panel for games from Nov. 16-22, the league office announced on Nov. 23.

Spears was named to the Minnesota Subway Classic All-Tournament team after averaging 23 points and 10 rebounds in two games. She scored 19 points and pulled down seven rebounds in a season-low 25 minutes in the 63-49 win over Illinois-Chicago. She then recorded her 17th career double-double and second of the season with a game-high 27 points and 13 rebounds against Minnesota in the tournament final. She reached a double-double before intermission with 16 points and 10 rebounds in the opening 20 minutes. Spears hit 10-of-20 shots from the field and added four assists and four steals.

Spears earns her fifth career Big 12 weekly honor, and first as Player of the Week. She earned four Big 12 Rookie of the Week citations as a freshman in 2007-08. It's also the first Big 12 weekly honor for the Buffaloes since Alyssa Fressle gained Rookie of the Week honors in the final week of the 2008-09 season.

IMPRESSIVE POINT SWING: The 63 point swing from last year's 77-40 loss to Seton Hall to this year's 80-54 win is the second largest in a series in team history (games no longer than two seasons apart). The Buffaloes had a 67 point swing against Idaho State during the 1981-82 season. Here are the top point swings in team history.

FRESHMAN DEBUTS: A pair of true freshmen made their collegiate debuts and made significant contributions to the Buffaloes comeback win against UC Irvine. Forward **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** got the starting nod and responded with six points, 11 rebounds, three blocks and three steals. Guard **Chucky Jeffery** came off the bench and registered four points, seven rebounds, three assists and two steals.

Malcolm-Peck's start marked the fourth straight year the Buffaloes have had a freshman in the initial season starting lineup. The three others: Bianca Smith in 2006, Brittany Spears in 2007 and Alyssa Fressle in 2008.

REBOUNDING WOWS: Colorado has enjoyed early success on the boards. The Buffaloes began the season with back-to-back 50-plus rebounding efforts, corralling 50 against UC Irvine in the season opener and improving on that mark with 52 against Illinois-Chicago.

Colorado had just one game all of 2008-09 with 50 or more rebounds, notching 51 against Arkansas-Pine Bluff on Dec. 2. CU's 52 rebounds against Illinois-Chicago were its most since recording 58 at Colorado State on Dec. 1, 2007.

The Buffaloes back-to-back 50-rebound effort was the teams first since stringing together three straight from Nov. 20-24, 2001 (50 vs. San Diego, 59 vs. Bowling Green, 50 vs. Houston). CU wasn't able to get a third 50-rebound game this time, grabbing just 24 against Minnesota, but it should be noted that both teams shot right at 50 percent from the field in that game, leaving rebounds at a premium (UM won the rebounding battle 32-24).

Against UC Irvine, **Brittany Spears** led the way with 14 while **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** grabbed 11 in her CU debut. It marked the first time the Buffs had two players reach double-digits in rebounds since **Brittany Spears** and **Julie Seabrook** each had 13 against Idaho State on Dec. 30, 2008. In the Illinois-Chicago game, the rebounds were well distributed. No one had double digits, but six players had four or more rebounds and all 10 that played had at least one.

Back to UC Irvine, Malcom-Peck's 11 rebounds, six of which came on the offensive end, put her in some exclusive CU company. Her 11 boards are the third most in team history by a freshman in her CU debut and the most in 27 years:

Chucky Jeffery had seven rebounds in her debut. She is one of eight different players, a list that includes Brittany Spears (at San Francisco, 11/16/07), to reach that number in her first collegiate game.

MEMORABLE COMEBACK: Colorado's comeback from a 14-point halftime deficit to win against UC Irvine ties for the third-largest margin achieved in team history. The Buffaloes trailed the Anteaters 33-19 at the break before outscoring them 42-23 in the final 20 minutes.

Colorado came back from 19 down against the University of Washington on Dec. 21, 1982, at the Guisti Tournament in Portland, Ore. CU trailed 35-16 at halftime before winning 67-65. Colorado came back from 15 points down against Kansas State on Jan. 31, 2007, that game included a 23-0 second half run.

CLIMBING THE LADDERS: Junior **Brittany Spears** and Senior **Bianca Smith** continue to make their impressions on the CU record book.

Spears, who became just the second player in team history (Lisa Van Goor) to reach 1,000 points as a sophomore, is 17th on CU's all-time scoring list with 1,176. She is 14th in rebounds with 570, needing 17 to catch Crystal Ford (1985-89) for 13th place. Spears is also seventh in blocked shots (100), eighth in 3-pointers made (121) and attempted (361), 16th in field goals made (436) and 18th in steals (134).

Smith is fourth in career 3-point field goals made (201) and third in attempts (539). She made her 200th career 3-pointer in the win over Southern Utah on Dec. 19. She needs just three more to pass Jenny Roulrier (1998-02) for third place on CU's all-time list. Smith, who currently has 26 3-pointers on the season, would need 77 total this year to break Shelley Sheetz's career mark of 252, but it's possible. Smith holds CU's single-season mark hitting 80 from downtown in 2007-08.

CAPTAINS NAMED: Before the season opener head coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** announced that **Brittany Spears**, **Whitney Houston** and **Bianca Smith** were named captains for the 2009-10 season. Smith is a captain for the second straight year while Houston and Spears are first time captains. CU captains are voted on by the players.

BUFFS IN OPENERS: Colorado is now 31-5 (.861) all-time in season openers and started the season with a home game for the 24th time in 36 seasons. Colorado is an outstanding 34-2 (.944) all-time in home openers. Colorado has never lost its overall season opener when played at home (24-0).

TOUGH SCHEDULE: Colorado once again faces a tough schedule with potentially 16 games -- or 55 percent of the regular season schedule -- against 2009 NCAA or WNIT tournament teams. Seven of CU's 2009-10 opponents are ranked in the current Associated Press poll while six are ranked in the USA Today/ESPN/WBCA Coaches poll.

HOME AT THE CECC: Colorado is traditionally tough at home with a 336-106 all-time record at the Coors Events/Conference Center (.760). The Buffaloes have won 10 or more games in a season at the CECC in 20 of the previous 31 years. The Buffaloes have enjoyed five undefeated seasons (1980-83, 1992-94) at the CECC.

BUFFS ON TV: Colorado's regular season schedule features nine games that will be televised either regionally or nationally, eight of which are at home. CU opened its first of eight FSN Rocky Mountain games on Dec. 2, against Denver. FSN Rocky Mountain will also televise home games against Virginia (Jan. 2), Missouri (Jan. 9), Iowa State (Jan. 16), Oklahoma State (Jan. 24), Nebraska (Jan. 30), Texas (Feb. 10) and Kansas (Feb. 16). The games against Missouri and Oklahoma State will be televised nationally on FSN as part of the network's Big 12 package. Colorado's game at Kansas State (Jan. 20) is set to air on FSN Kansas City.

Colorado was 2-5 in televised games during the 2008-09 regular season. CU has appeared on 72 regional or national telecasts over the previous eight seasons.

BUFFS SIGN THREE: **Shae Kelley**, **Ashley Wilson** and **Brittany Wilson** have signed National Letters of Intent to play basketball and continue their education at the University of Colorado in 2010-11, CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller announced Nov. 12, during

the NCAA early signing period. Kelley, a 6-foot forward from Denver, is a two-time All-State honorable mention and All-Denver Prep League pick out of East High School. Kelley will be the fifth Denver Public Schools player to suit up for the Buffaloes and the first since Montbello's Nikki Weddle (1997-99). Ashley and Brittany are identical twin 5-8 guards from Long Beach, Calif. Playing for one of the most storied programs in Southern California, the Wilson twins have won three consecutive CIF Division I state titles with nationally-ranked Long Beach Poly.

SMITH GAINS FULL SEASON: Senior guard **Bianca Smith** was formally released from the National Letter of Intent she originally signed at the University of Tulsa earlier this summer, allowing her to gain back the semester of eligibility she would have otherwise had to surrender this season. Smith is now eligible to play the entire 2009-10 season for the Buffaloes. Smith, a native of Missouri City, Texas, had signed an NLI in November 2004 with Tulsa, who at the time was coached by current CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller. When McConnell-Miller took over the Colorado program in

She never enrolled at Tulsa, but was faced with sitting out two full seasons, one for not honoring her NLI commitment to Tulsa and a second for transferring to another NCAA Division I school. Smith was able to use her redshirt year to fulfill the NCAA transfer obligation, sitting out the 2005-06 season. She successfully petitioned the NLI Appeals Committee in 2005 to gain one semester back, but was still faced with losing one semester under the NLI commitment.

BUFFS PICKED 11TH...AGAIN: For the fourth straight season Colorado was picked to finish 11th in the annaul Big 12 Conference Preseason Coaches Poll.

In one of the closest votes at the top in recent memory, Baylor was picked to win the 2010 title with five first place votes and 109 total points, edging out Texas and Kansas who tied for second with 106 points (3 first place votes each). Texas A&M was picked fourth with 87 votes and picked up the final first place vote. Defending champion Oklahoma was fifth (86), followed by Nebraska (80), Iowa State (59), Kansas State (44), Oklahoma State (41), Texas Tech (38), Colorado (22) and Missouri (15).

Kathy McConnell-Miller Head Coach Fifth Season

When Kathy McConnell-Miller took over the University of Colorado program four years ago, there's no question the Buffaloes were rebuilding and the team was a work in progress.

In four seasons at Colorado, there is no question that McConnell-Miller's Buffaloes have made progress and the program is heading in the right direction.

McConnell-Miller, 41, sports a 58-73 record in her four-plus seasons at Colorado and is 149-161 overall in 10-plus seasons as an NCAA Division I head coach.

Injuries, graduation and playing in the nation's premier women's basketball conference, the Big 12, hampered the progress her teams had built her first three seasons in 2008-09 as the Buffaloes struggled to an 11-18 mark and a 12th place finish in league play. But returning nine contributing players and adding the 32nd best recruiting class in the nation has the Buffaloes pointing in the right direction once again.

The 2009-10 season will mark the first year in which the Buffaloes are comprised completely of players coach McConnell-Miller brought to campus. She fared well with the players inherited from legendary CU head coach Ceal Barry, but she has also excelled in bringing in her own players. McConnell-Miller, and her staff, who from day one have established a family type atmosphere in the lockerroom and a fighting spirit in their players, have been committed to keeping Colorado's best players home, and have certainly succeeded on that front.

For three straight seasons, Colorado has landed at least one of the state's premier prep stars, beginning in 2007 with Aija Putnina, who contributed two solid seasons for the Buffaloes, including the 2008 WNIT run, before returning to her native Latvia to pursue a professional career. In 2008, the Buffaloes landed the consensus Colorado Player of the Year Alyssa Fressle out of Highlands Ranch, who made an immediate contribution and was rewarded with a spot on the Big 12 All-Rookie Team.

CU hit the state jackpot in 2009 with three All-Colorado caliber players; twins Meagan and Brenna Malcolm-Peck, Boulder natives who played at Horizon High School, and Chucky Jeffery, one of the top Class 4A players in 2009 for Sierra High School in Colorado Springs. The regional additions of Kailah Bailey and Melissa MacFarlane, both of Omaha, Neb., have given the Buffaloes their third Top 40 class in the last four years.

In 2006, Colorado had the No. 29 ranked class according to the All-Star Girls Report. What was remarkable about the class of 2006 is McConnell-Miller and her staff didn't even have the chance to start on the recruiting trail until April when they arrived in Boulder. Despite that late start, McConnell-Miller and her staff managed to sign five top 150 players, including Whitney Houston and Putnina who made significant contributions in their first two seasons.

Her first three seasons at Colorado were marked by significant improvement each year. From a nine-win season her first year in Boulder, to a 13-17 mark in 2006-07, in 2007-08 she guided the Buffaloes to a 19-15 record and the team's first winning season and postseason berth since the 2003-04 campaign.

McConnell-Miller experienced quite a few firsts during CU's memorable 2007-08 season. She led Colorado to its first Associated Press national ranking in four seasons, peaking at No. 23, and in the process became the 22nd person in NCAA Division I women's history to coach and play for an AP ranked team.

McConnell-Miller's Buffaloes beat three ranked teams in 2007-08 - another first in four years - and finished ninth in the tough Big 12 Conference at 5-11. With a league-record eight Big 12 teams advancing to the NCAA Tournament, CU gained the conference's automatic bid into the WNIT where the Buffaloes proceeded to advance to the semifinals before falling to eventual tournament champion Marquette. It was CU's first ever appearance in the semifinals of a postseason event and for McConnell-Miller, she claimed the first three postseason wins of her head coaching career (3-3).

The signs of progress were also evident in her second season, 2006-07, when the Buffaloes finished tied for seventh in the Big 12 at 6-10. CU's six league wins in 2006-07 were more than the previous two years combined (3-13 in 2005-06 and 2-14 in 2004-05) and the Buffs won their first Big 12 Tournament game since 2003.

McConnell-Miller, who officially became the sixth head coach in the history of CU women's basketball on April 27, 2005, presided over the development of Jackie McFarland, one of the top players in the Big 12 from 2004-08. McFarland was a two-time AP honorable mention All-American and three-time All-Big 12 selection including back-to-back first team honors in 2007 and 2008. All-league selections are nothing new to McConnell-Miller as she has had at least one first or second team all-conference performer in each of her 10 seasons as a collegiate head coach. The latest in her run of all-star caliber players is junior Brittany Spears who last season became just the second player in team history to reach 1,000 points by the end of her sophomore year.

The Buffaloes have also had academic success in the McConnell-Miller era. In her three seasons, McConnell-Miller has coached 12 Academic All-Big 12 Women's Basketball team members and helped guide McFarland to three ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America honors, including first team acclaim in 2007-08.

Before arriving at CU, McConnell-Miller spent six seasons as head coach at the University of Tulsa where she constructed an impressive turnaround of the Golden Hurricane program. Before her arrival in 1999-2000, Tulsa had just one

winning season in its 14-year history, an overall record of 81-250 (.324), and was actually dropped as a varsity sport for nine years following the 1986-87 campaign. In her six seasons at Tulsa, McConnell-Miller recorded a program-best 91 wins (15.2 wins per year), winning seasons in three of the last four years and two postseason appearances.

She left as Tulsa's all-time leader for coaching victories with a record of 91-88 and owns the longest tenure in school history by a women's basketball coach. McConnell-Miller, who earned WAC Coach of the Year honors in her rookie season as a collegiate head coach in 1999-00, led Tulsa to 14 or more wins in five of her six campaigns.

Under the direction of McConnell-Miller, Tulsa placed at least one player on either the All-WAC first or second team, each of her six seasons. McConnell-Miller also had the Golden Hurricane excelling in the classroom sporting four ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first and second team performers. Tulsa players also earned 23 All-WAC Academic Team honors. One of McConnell-Miller's prize players was Allison Curtin who was an AP honorable mention All-American for the Golden Hurricane and was drafted by the Houston Comets in the first round of the 2003 WNBA Draft.

Prior to her appointment at Tulsa, McConnell-Miller spent four seasons on Theresa Greutz's staff at the University of Illinois (1995-99). She was an assistant coach for her first three years before being promoted to associate head coach for her final season. The Fighting Illini posted an overall record of 76-45 and advanced to three NCAA Tournaments with McConnell-Miller on the bench. Illinois won the Big Ten Conference Championship in 1997 and twice advanced to the Sweet 16. While at Illinois, McConnell-Miller was vital in the signing of a pair of recruiting classes that ranked among the top five in the nation.

McConnell-Miller coached with Greutz for a total of six years as she went with Greutz to Illinois from Rutgers University in 1995. McConnell-Miller was a Rutgers assistant for two seasons (1993-95), helping the Lady Knights post a pair of winning campaigns, the 1994 Atlantic 10 Championship and a spot in the NCAA Tournament. Her recruiting expertise was well documented at Rutgers as her last class was rated as the 14th-best nationally, giving McConnell-Miller back-to-back Top 15 classes.

Her first collegiate assistant coaching job came at her hometown school, the University of Pittsburgh. She joined the Panthers in 1991 and served as the recruiting coordinator. She was also an assistant coach for the 1993 Big East All-Star Team which played in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

She is a member of the Western Pennsylvania Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, and was inducted into the Seton LaSalle High School Hall of Fame in October of 2006.

McConnell-Miller enjoyed a four-year playing career at guard for the University of Virginia (1986-90). She played in four NCAA Tournaments with the Cavaliers including a pair of Sweet 16 appearances and the 1988 Elite Eight. McConnell-Miller earned her bachelor's degree in rhetoric and communications from Virginia in 1989.

One of eight children, she is one of six McConnell siblings who attended college on a basketball scholarship.

Four McConnell's are presently in the coaching ranks, three at the college level and one at the high school level. Her older sister, Suzie McConnell Serio is currently the head coach of Duquesne University and was the head coach of the Minnesota Lynx of the WNBA for three seasons (2003-06).

Born on Sept. 24, 1967, McConnell-Miller and her husband, Brad Miller, have three children: Brice (9), Mackenzie (8) and Macie (4).

#2 Bianca Smith, 5-9, Senior, Guard, Missouri City, Texas (Bellaire)

This Season:

- Became the fourth player in school history to make 200 career 3-pointers, reaching the mark against Southern Utah.

- CU's second leading scorer, coming off the bench eight of the first nine games. Her 13.4 points per game are the third best among players primarily coming off the bench

BOULDER - Whitney Houston returned with a rush on Sunday. It almost made her year's absence worthwhile. Almost.

In her first game back after missing last season due to knee surgery, the junior point guard hit a layup and a three-pointer in crunch time to help push the Colorado women's basketball team past UC Irvine 61-56 in CU's season opener.

The Buffaloes trailed 33-19 at halftime. Rallying from that 14-point deficit at intermission ties for the third-largest comeback in school history.

Houston's layup gave the Buffaloes their first lead (54-52) of the game. Then she followed with her trey from the top of the key to allow CU breathing room it hadn't enjoyed for most of the afternoon.

"I guess I can say we needed it," Houston said of her late heroics. "It's my responsibility as a point guard . . . to give us that spark."

That she could provide it when necessary is a testament to her perseverance. "When you (miss) a year, nobody can duplicate that time off," Buifs coach Kathy McConnell-Miller said. "She's still finding her role and trying to figure it out."

Houston and teammate **Bianca Smith** finished with 11 points each, seven fewer than team high-scorer **Brittany Spears**, who opened her junior season with a double-double (18 points, 14 rebounds).

Attribute it to a case of opening afternoon jitters at the Coors Events Center, maybe the weekend snowstorm or perhaps something else outlandish, but it would have been difficult to imagine the Buifs starting more ineffectively. CU quickly found themselves behind 18-7 with 10 minutes to play in the half.

McConnell-Miller said her team's first half "was not up to expectations," adding UCI "came in with the mentality to win." While she was "proud of the way my team fought back to win," she said she doesn't want the Buifs to continue to put themselves in that position."I don't like having to come back," she said.

How did the slow start happen? For starters, CU hit just four of its first 15 shots (26.7 percent) from the field and had trouble stopping UCI (0-2) in transition.

Rebounding was an early problem, too, with the Buifs finding themselves out-boarded 16-7 with 7:48 left in the half. They managed to right themselves on the boards (CU outrebounded UCI 50-32 for the game), but their shooting stayed frigid through the opening half.

By halftime, CU was only 8-of-28 from the field (28.6 percent) and UCI was up 33-19, with Smith-Williams' dozen points - which included three-of-three from behind the arc - leading all scorers and keying a pair of 10-0 runs.

CU scored nine points to open the second half, pulling to within five (33-28) before UCI coach Molly Goodenbour called a timeout with 16:33 to play.

The five-point deficit was as close as the Buifs had been since trailing 22-17. But after an Anteaters turnover out of the timeout, **Alyssa Fressle** hit a short jumper in the lane and CU had trimmed the margin to 33-30.

A put-back by freshman **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** made it 33-32 and completed CU's 13-0 run to open the second half. With 14:15 to play, Smith-Williams' two free throws finally earned UCI its second-half points.

But just as suddenly, the Anteaters were off and running again, outscoring the Buifs 12-2 over the next 4 minutes to reclaim a double-digit advantage (45-34) with just under 10 minutes remaining.

UCI matched its biggest lead of the afternoon - 14 points - on a layup by Kim Barnes that made the score 50-36.

But Houston and the Buifs weren't done. Smith's three-pointer and a three-point layup by Spears helped bring them to 52-48 with 4:03 left.

A pair of free throws by Spears half a minute later pulled CU to 52-50. She tied the score at 52-52 on a short jumper, then watched her roommate, Houston, give the Buifs their first lead with 1:38 to play.

After Houston's clutch three-pointer, **Kelly Jo Mullaney** and Smith added two free throws each in the final 17.6 seconds to seal the win.

MINNEAPOLIS - Kelly Jo Mullaney was focused on returning home, and **Kathy McConnell-Miller** saw it on the floor.

In front of numerous family members and friends, Mullaney scored 11 of her 13 points in the second half to help propel Colorado to a 63-49 win over Illinois-Chicago in the opening game of the 2009 Subway Classic at Williams Arena on the campus of the University of Minnesota.

Mullaney, a Minneapolis native who won a state championship with The Breck School on this floor in 2004, hit 4-of-7 from the field, including two 3-pointers, and corralled seven rebounds to give the Buffaloes their second straight 2-0 season start.

"Kelly Jo's preparation this week was unlike anything I had seen from her in her past three years at Colorado," McConnell-Miller said. "She was focused, determined and had a confidence about her we hadn't seen before. She wanted to come back home and perform at her best. She played a great floor game tonight and we're just proud she was able to do that in Minnesota."

Junior **Brittany Spears**, who battled foul trouble and played an unusually low 25 minutes, still led Colorado in scoring with 19 points. She nabbed seven rebounds and was a perfect 6-of-6 from the line.

The Buffaloes (2-0) will face Minnesota on Sunday at 5 p.m. MST. UIC falls to 0-3 and will play the Gophers on Saturday.

Colorado led the entire way, but could not distance themselves from the Flames until late. Both teams were stone cold in the first half. CU held Illinois-Chicago to just 21 percent shooting in the first 20 minutes, but didn't fare much better on its end making only 25 percent (7-of-28).

The Buffaloes looked to be on the brink of pulling away as they built a 14-6 lead with 8:38 remaining in the first half, but the Flames scored eight straight to tie the game at 14. Mullaney then scored her first points on a put back of a **Chucky Jeffery** miss to give CU the lead for good. **Bianca Smith** followed with a 3-pointer to widen the gap back to five before the Buffaloes settled for a 21-17 halftime lead.

UIC cut the lead to 28-25 early in the second half on a Jasmine Bailey 3-point play, but the Buffaloes had an answer for each Flames' run, and Mullaney was in the middle them all. After Bailey's free throw, Mullaney missed a field goal at the other end but got her own rebound and kicked it out to Smith for her second 3-pointer of the game that sparked a 16-8 run that included a Mullaney 3-pointer. The Flames crept back to within 44-40 when Taylor Foulks hit her second 3-pointer of the game with 6:34 left. Mullaney responded on the other end with a 3-pointer of her own, and after a stop, Spears hit one from deep to give CU its first double-digit lead. Mullaney followed that with a long two of her own to put CU in front 52-40 with 5:01 remaining.

"It was really exciting, I love being back home and having all my family and friends here," Mullaney said. "

Colorado was much improved shooting in the second half, making 46 percent (12-of-26). The Buffaloes cemented the game at the line. CU was 14-of-18 from the free throw line in the second half, 18-of-23 overall.

Smith ended with 10 points. Senior **Courtney Dunn**, making her first career start, responded with seven points and career highs with eight rebounds and three blocks. **Melissa MacFarlane** and **Brenna Malcolm-Peck** each made their collegiate debuts.

"We had some different combinations out there," McConnell-Miller said. "It was a good feeling to be able to go to our bench and get the minutes we did."

Colorado dominated the boards for a second straight game, outrebounding UIC 52-35. The Buffaloes had 17 second-chance points.

Bailey had 11 points and eight rebounds to lead UIC.

BOULDER - Colorado head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller was expecting her freshman class to have an impact this season, and so far that's exactly what is happening.

Freshmen Meagan Malcolm-Peck and Chucky Jeffery combined for 23 points, 13 rebounds and seven steals to help lift Colorado to a 62-50 win over Georgia Southern in the first round of the 2009 Omni Hotels Classic Friday at the Coors Events/Conference Center.

The Buffaloes, 3-1 overall for the first time since 2003-04, will play Harvard in the championship game on Saturday at 7 p.m. Earlier on Friday, Harvard held off New Orleans 60-57. Georgia Southern and New Orleans will play in the consolation game at 4:30 p.m.

CU junior Brittany Spears led all players with 20 points.

Malcolm-Peck had a career-high 12 points, on 5-of-8 shooting, with seven rebounds, three blocks and two steals.

"I think the goal is always to contribute however you can and just make an impact," Malcolm-Peck said. "So whether it's hustling and getting a rebound and kicking out to Bianca [Smith] to get a three or anyway you can help the team. I just focus on that and its fun."

Jeffery had 11 points, six rebounds and five steals in 19 minutes of playing time. Jeffery has started the last three games while Malcolm-Peck has started all four.

"When I start I feel like I have to do well so I can stay on the floor and get my team off to a good start," Jeffery said. "Like (coach) said I need to let the bad things go and move forward."

The Buffaloes jumped out to a 10-0 lead, hitting four of their first six shots including 3-pointers by Malcolm-Peck and Spears. Conversely, Georgia Southern made just one of its first 10.

But that start quickly faded as the Buffaloes went cold, and were bit by the turnover bug at the same time the Eagles started heating up.

Colorado missed 10 straight shots which allowed Georgia Southern to counter the Buffs' opening run, with a 14-0 run of their and led 17-14 with 6:13 left in the half. Turnovers didn't help the Buffaloes cause either. CU committed 22 in the game, 13 of which came in the first 20 minutes.

CU rebounded to take a 21-20 lead at halftime. Both freshmen starters keyed big second half runs to allow the Buffs to put the game away.

With the Buffaloes up 27-26, Malcolm-Peck hit a 3-pointer and followed that up with a steal and layup to ignite a 17-7 run that put CU up 44-33 with 10:20 left. Carolyn Whitney and Candice Ivy had consecutive buckets for the Eagles to cut the CU lead to seven.

Jeffery took care of the next CU run. The Colorado Springs native had five points, three offensive rebounds and two assists as the Buffaloes outscored the Eagles 13-3 over a six minute span. Colorado had its largest lead at 57-40 with 3:32 remaining in the game, before a late Eagles' run narrowed the gap.

"We came back in the second half and played with great intensity, which we were talking a great deal about at halftime," McConnell-Miller said. "There were some great moments tonight."

Whitney led Georgia Southern with 11 points and eight rebounds. The Eagles committed 25 turnovers and shot just 26 percent from the field.

BOULDER - Freshman guard Chucky Jeffery hit a driving layup with five seconds remaining to give Colorado the Omni Hotels Classic title with a 67-65 win over Harvard in the Championship game at the Coors Events Center.

After Harvard's Victoria Lippert sank two free throws to tie the game at 65-65 with 0:35 left, the Buffaloes put the ball in the hands of Jeffery for the final possession. Jeffery, who finished with 14 points, ran the clock down at the top and left of the 3-point arc and broke down the middle of the lane for the decisive score as the shot clock expired.

Harvard guard Brogan Berry raced down the court with the ball, but her 30-foot 3-pointer bounced off the front of the rim as Colorado improved to 4-1 overall for the first time since 2003-04.

"It's real exciting," Jeffery said. "Being a freshman and having the coaches trust me enough to put the ball in my hands to make the last shot feels real good. I'm so excited."

Jeffery's chance was born from a similar possession at the end of the first half. Leading 31-29, CU ran down the clock late in the first half where Jeffery was able to get into the paint to score to put CU up four with :07 left. However, she went too early, giving Harvard time to get set on the other end where Christine Matera connected on a 3-pointer at the buzzer.

Despite going too early, CU head coach Kathy McConnell-Miller knew Jeffery was an option at the end.

"Why put the ball in a freshman's hands? The determining factor at that point was how Chucky handled that possession at the end of the first half; we had set it up for a drive and she had gone a little too early, but with that said she made it."

It was also the Harvard defense. The Crimson were clamping down on CU's outside shot, which had generated nine 3-point buckets during the game. Jeffery had also been able to get to the rim on three possessions before the final drive.

"At the end of the game we basically ran a variation of the play and at that time really dictated the time she went to the rim and had our two shooters spotted up waiting on her. She executed it and I'm proud of her.

Her shooters on the wings were captains Brittany Spears and Bianca Smith, and even though they didn't get the call on the final play, there wouldn't have been a final play for Jeffery if it wasn't for their strong performances.

Smith had a season-high 22 points off the bench, hitting 6-of-11 3-point shots. Spears recorded her third double-double in five games with 11 points and 11 rebounds. Jeffery, Smith and Spears were each named to the All-Tournament team. Spears, who had 20 points in Friday's game against Georgia Southern, was the Tournament MVP.

Emma Markley led Harvard Saturday night with 24 points, on 10-of-15 shooting, and four blocks. Her 10 blocks over the two games, set a Classic record.

CU was fighting from behind all night. The Crimson led by as much as nine in both halves, while the Buffs' largest lead was four.

Harvard led 46-37 with 14:35 remaining, when the Buffaloes, led by Smith tightened the game for good. Smith hit two of her six 3's to cut the Harvard advantage to 48-43.

Jackie Alemamy made good on a long 3-pointer to put HU back up by six. Spears countered with a couple free throws and HU led 52-47.

The Buffaloes gobbled up that lead with a pair of 3-pointers. Freshman Meagan Malcolm-Peck hit the first one from the corner and Kelly Jo Mullaney hit one from the top of the key to give CU a 53-52 lead. The score stayed within four points for the rest of the way.

BOULDER - Pay-back is sweet, and the Colorado women's basketball team savored it Sunday afternoon.

Even sweeter, though, is progress - and that's what Buffaloes coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** savored most during her team's 80-54 dismantling of Seton Hall at the Coors Events Center.

"Everyone's asked me what I'm most pleased about," McConnell-Miller said following the Buffs' atonement for last season's dismaying 37-point loss. "I'm most pleased about what's happened over a 12-month period - how our returning players have bought in, stay focused, how they've embraced our younger players . . . I'm most pleased about our development and our progress."

Still, avenging that December debacle in South Orange, N.J., was important to McConnell-Miller's players.

"Last season was an embarrassment . . . it was important for us to come out today and get a 'W,'" said CU junior forward **Brittany Spears**, who responded with her 19th career double-double and fourth of the season. She scored 24 points and collected 12 rebounds, with her five three-pointers a career best.

CU freshman **Chuckie Jeffery** added a career-high 19 points and six assists, while sophomore **Alyssa Fressle** contributed a season-best 10 - all in an early second-half run that helped the Buffs ice the game. Senior Bianca Smith chipped in with 11, including three of CU's 11 three-pointers.

Winning their fourth consecutive game and fifth straight at the Events Center, the Buffs improved to 6-1, with that start the program's best since 2003-04 when former coach Ceal Barry's team opened 12-1.

The Buffs led by nine (39-30) at halftime, but were up by as many as 14 on two previous occasions. The best the Pirates (5-4) could do in the first 20 minutes was fashion a pair of early ties and pull to 21-19 before CU went on a 9-2 run.

Meagan Malcolm-Peck, a 6-foot-2 freshman, keyed that spurt, scoring seven of the Buffs points in the run and finishing with that total.

Spears was more than the Pirates could handle in the first 20 minutes, hitting seven of her eight field goal attempts - including four of five treys - for 18 points. (She averages 18.7.)

CU hit 31-of-58 field goal attempts (53.4 percent) and was 11-for-21 (52.4 percent) from behind the arc.

The Buffs had to survive themselves in the opening 6 minutes, when they suffered a turnover a minute. But that dirty half-dozen was all CU would commit for the remainder of the half, and their first-half assist total (12 on 16 field goals) doubled their errors. They finished with a season-best 21 assists.

It was a far better effort by the Buffs than in last season's meeting, when they managed but 13 first-half points on the Pirates' home court and trailed 43-13 in a blowout victory Seton Hall later would tout as "perhaps its finest performance of the season."

Fueled by 10 points from Fressle, the Buffs opened the second half with a 14-2 run and took their largest lead to that point - 53-32 - with 14:45 remaining.

Four minutes later, CU increased its advantage to 61-36 on a free throw by Jeffery and her layup on the next possession. But Seton Hall followed with a 15-2 run to make the final 6:42 more interesting than the Buffs had planned.

The Pirates closed to 63-51 before a pair of free throws by Spears and a trey by Jeffery righted the Buffs and sent the Pirates packing.

McConnell-Miller said even with the big leads, she never felt that relaxed or in control of the game. "I am never to the point where I feel like we can rest . . . I like to reinforce that we teach them to play every possession as if the score is tied. I hope at no point that I ever let up or think that it was in hand."

With the exception of a lapse here and there, her team played like it got the message. Seton Hall got it, too.

FORT COLLINS - Following the bad example set by their male counterparts 24 hours earlier, the Colorado women's basketball team played in spurts Friday night and paid for it with an ugly loss.

Colorado State, with only eight available players, overcame miserable early shooting and a 16-point first-half deficit to defeat CU 69-61 in Moby Arena. On the same court Thursday night, the CSU men outworked and overran the CU men, 77-62.

"I told them this was one that was going to stick with us all week," Buffaloes coach **Kathy McConnell-Miller** said. "We need to learn how to put teams away. We need to learn how to be efficient down the stretch."

CU (6-2) was everything but efficient, losing its big first-half lead, its momentum and eventually unraveling to lose for the first time in five games.

Senior **Bianca Smith** led the Buffs with 19 points, while **Brittany Spears** added 15 and **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** 12. Four of the Rams' eight players finished in double figures, led by Chantilla Van Grinsven with 16.

CU led for the final time, 55-54, on a layup by Spears with 2:57 to play. But from that point, CSU (7-3) went on a 7-0 run to move ahead 61-55. The Buffs never got closer than four points for the remainder of the game, self-destructing with four of their 16 turnovers in the final 2:20.

Meanwhile, the Rams put the game away by making 11 of 12 free throws in the final 1:52. They finished the game 27-of-33 from the foul line while the Buffs hit 9-of-11.

CSU also outrebounded CU 45-43, including 15 offensive rebounds, and outscored the Buffs 20-13 in second-chance points.

At times, McConnell-Miller said, the Buffs "played extremely hard . . . they really wanted it. But at times, I thought whether it was a lack of communication on defense or a quick shot that led to a run by them, it wasn't a lack of preparation or effort."

"It was just a mindset of we settled . . . often and early in the shot clock."

Not much went right for the Rams in the early going, but taking advantage of the Buffs' proclivity for fouling was among them. CU committed 11 first-half fouls, reaching seven fouls (single bonus) with 10:49 left in the half and 10 fouls (double bonus) at 4:14 before intermission.

As a result, CSU hit 10-of-13 first-half free throws - and needed every one of them. A little over 13 minutes into the first half, the Rams had connected on only one of 14 field goal attempts (7.1 percent) and had fallen behind by 16 (27-11).

But what had all the earmarks of a possible blowout suddenly changed. Then, CSU found its range - relatively speaking. Over the final 5:03 of the half, the Rams outscored the Buffs 12-4 and went to the locker room trailing 31-23.

Of letting CSU back into the game before intermission, McConnell-Miller said, "Whether I let up, whether I went too deep in the bench - I'll take responsibility for that . . . they capitalized and we sent them into the half on a little momentum."

Still, CSU's first-half shooting was horrid and CU's wasn't much better. The Rams hit only five of their 28 (17.9 percent) field goal attempts, while the Buffs were 11-for-32 (34.4).

Outscoring the visitors 11-2 over the first 4 minutes of the second half, CSU pulled to 33-32 on a pair of Van Grinsven free throws then took a 34-33 lead - the Rams' first since 3-2 - on a layup by Natalie van den Adel.

The Buffs answered with a 7-0 run - five of the points came courtesy of Spears - to reclaim a six-point lead (40-34). Just as quickly, though, CSU leashed scorer Kim Mestdagh (19.4) scored seven consecutive points and Erin Cooke hit a layup - and the Rams went back ahead 43-42 with 11:51 left.

The next 4 minutes belonged to Smith and the Buffs. Relishing her off-the-bench role, the senior hit back-to-back treys to push CU in front 50-46.

Over the next 6 minutes, five of the game's 13 lead changes occurred. But in the final 1:30, the Rams went up six points and the Buffs foun
