GAMEDAY INFORMATION

BREAKFAST AT JONES

The Red Raiders are back home Saturday and face their final opponent from the Big 12's North Division. Texas Tech and Colorado kickoff at 11 a.m. from Jones AT&T Stadium. Both teams are coming off losses: Tech, a 41-10 setback at Missouri, and Colorado, a 19-14 home loss to Kansas. Saturday's game is the fifth of the season at Jones AT&T Stadium with one more to play against Oklahoma in the regular-season finale.

RADIO COVERAGE

The Texas Tech Sports Network is comprised of 48 stations and the game can be heard on Sirius Satellite Radio (140) and XM Radio (242). **Brian Jensen** will handle the play-by-play duties, while **John Harris** and former Red Raider quarterback **Sonny Cumbie** serve as analysts. **Armen Williams** will comb the sidelines for the network. Flagship station 1340 KKAM and KFMX 94.5 carry the games in Lubbock.

TELEVISION COVERAGE

ABC is televising the game live from Jones AT&T Stadium. **Dan Fouts** (play-by-play), **Tim Brandt** (analyst) and **Todd Harris** (sideline) will call the action this weekend. Kickoff is set for 11 a.m.

ROAD TO THIS POINT

The Red Raiders are 6-2 (2-2 in Big 12 play) on the season and are coming off a 41-10 loss at Missouri last weekend. Texas Tech opened the season with wins over three-straight Conference USA opponents, before dropping its conference opener at Oklahoma State, 49-45. Tech bounced back with three straight wins against Northwestern State, Iowa State and Texas A&M, all in Lubbock. The Buffaloes are 4-4 (2-2 Big 12) after dropping a 19-14 decision to Kansas in Boulder last weekend. Colorado opened the season with a win over Colorado State, before dropping games to Florida State and Arizona State. CU won three straight prior to dropping the last two.

RED RAIDERS IN THE POLLS

After a brief showing in the polls, the Red Raiders dropped out following last week's loss, but are receiving votes. Red Raider opponents earning top 25 status include Texas (16/17), Oklahoma (4/4) and Missouri (13/13). (USA Today/AP)

ON THE HORIZON

The Red Raiders travel to Baylor (Nov. 3) and Texas (Nov. 10), before closing the regular season against Oklahoma (Nov. 17) at Jones AT&T Stadium.

TEAM NOTES

GOING BOWLING, AGAIN

For the 15th-straight season, Texas Tech fans will be spending part of their holidays at a bowl game. The win over Texas A&M makes the Red Raiders bowl eligible with a 6-2 overall record. Texas Tech is the only program of the current Big 12 member institutions to be eligible for the postseason every year of the league's existence and the only program with an overall winning record each season since 1996.

DEFENSE MAKING STRIDES

The Texas Tech SWARM defense continues to make strides under newly named interim defensive coordinator Ruffin McNeil. Prior to McNeil taking over the defense just after the Oklahoma State game, the Red Raiders were allowing 405.5 yards of total offense per-game and 28.3 points-per-game. Since the OSU game, the Red Raider defense has allowed an average of 298.2 yards and 18.0 points-per-game.

OFFENSE LED BY UNDERCLASSEMEN

Of the 11 starters on offense, only one is a senior. WR Danny Amendola is the veteran of the group and is surrounded by a wealth of talent from freshman WR Michael Crabtree to junior QB Graham Harrell. The current starting lineup is composed of a freshman, five sophomores, four juniors and a senior.

TURNAROUND ON THIRD DOWN

After finishing the 2006 season in a disappointing 73rd place, Texas Tech has dramatically improved itself in third-down situations. Through eight games, the Red Raiders rank **second** nationally with a 52.0 percent success rate on third downs (53-of-101).

OFFENSE AVOIDS THREE AND OUT

Anytime a team averages 45.0 points per game, it's safe to say that the offense is operating efficiently. That statement holds true for the Texas Tech offense that has also racked up 4,462 total yards and 225 first downs through eight games. What might speak more to the offense's productivity, though, is the fact that the Red Raider attack has had only eight drives stall after three plays so far in 2007.

TECH APPROACHING LAST YEAR'S RUSH TD TOTAL

Texas Tech has put the ground game to use this season. The Red Raiders had five rushing TDs last season in their first four games, followed by a five-game drought in conference play without a rushing score. Fast forward to today and Tech sits with 13 scores from its running game in seven contests this season, matching last year's season total. The Red Raiders have scored on the ground in each game this season.

TD-to-INT RATIO IS STILL IMPRESSIVE

Accuracy has been a trademark early this season for the Texas Tech passing game. Red Raider quarterbacks have thrown 35 touchdown passes and eight interceptions in eight games. The ratio is 4.4:1 (TD-INT). Last year's squad had the best ratio in school history for a season at 3.5:1.

PUNTING UNIT RANKS NATIONALLY

The opposition is finding it difficult to get a decent return against the Red Raiders' punting unit this season. Tech opponents are averaging a mere 5.2 yards per return, which ranks the Tech punt return defense 14th nationally.

The longest return allowed by Tech this season was 12 yards in the opener at SMU and again against the Aggies

PLAYING A GOOD GAME OF KEEP AWAY

Texas Tech quarterbacks threw 11 interceptions last season, the lowest single-season total since 2001 (11). In eight games this season, Tech has thrown four.

QUICK PASSING NOTE

Texas Tech quarterbacks have thrown for 37,142 yards during the Mike Leach tenure – or 21.1 miles. The offense has also accounted for 293 passing scores since 2000 as compared to the 232 thrown the previous 20 seasons.

RED RAIDERS STEADY IN SCORING STREAK

The run began with a 16-13 win over Texas A&M on Oct. 25, 1997, a week after dropping a 29-0 decision to then-No. 2 Nebraska. During its current run, the Red Raiders have scored 10+ points in all but five games.

TECH IN MIDST OF WINNING SEASONS STREAK

Texas Tech currently ranks fifth nationally with 12-straight winning seasons. Florida State leads with 30, while Michigan (22), Florida (19), Virginia Tech (14) and Tech comprise the top five.

SIXTEEN DIFFERENT RECEIVERS HAVE CATCHES

Texas Tech's quarterbacks have a cornucopia of talent at which to throw and have spread the wealth this season. Sixteen different Red Raiders have caught passes in 2007. Aside from WR Michael Crabtree's national-leading 88 receptions, eight other receivers have double-digit receptions as well. WR Danny Amendola has 71 receptions followed by IR Eric Morris and RB Shannon Woods with 37 and 34, respectively. Edward Britton and Grant Walker have 21 apiece, while L.A. Reed and WR Lyle Leong check in with 13 each. RB Kobey Lewis has 11. Amendola and Morris have been the other go-to guys for Tech QBs with five and four touchdown receptions. Eight different players account for Texas Tech's 35 receiving touchdowns.

KEEPING GOOD COMPANY

Texas Tech ranks third among Big 12 members with consecutive eight-win seasons. Texas leads the group with eight, while Oklahoma has done it in the last six seasons. Texas Tech has done it each of the last five years.

TEXAS TECH SCORING UNDER LEACH

Texas Tech has scored 30 or more points in 60 games during the Leach era and has won 51 of those games. The Red Raiders are 26-4 under Leach when scoring 40+ and 19-0 when scoring over 50. On the flip side, Tech is 10-25 when scoring 29 points or less.

MAKE THAT THREE IN A ROW, SEVEN-STRAIGHT

Texas Tech continued its mastery over rival Texas A&M as the Red Raiders took a 35-7 win over the Aggies for its third-straight win in the 66-year history of this series. Texas Tech has won seven-straight games over the Aggies at Jones AT&T Stadium and 10 of the last 13 overall meetings. Texas A&M's last win in Lubbock was a 31-6 decision back in 1993.

TOTAL DEFENSE AGAINST ISU AMONG TOP 10

under 300 yards of total offense, including Iowa State. The Cyclones managed 287 yards, and had only 159 through three quarters. The total is the 10th-best single-game performance for Tech in a league game under Leach.

PASSING GAME MATCHES GAME TD RECORD

Two quarterbacks, Graham Harrell and Taylor Potts, combined for eight touchdown passes in the win over Northwestern State. The total matches the school record set first against Texas A&M in 2003 and matched later that season at Baylor.

DEFENSE THRIVES IN FIRST GAME UNDER RUFF

The Texas Tech defense responded to the change in defensive coordinators last week with an impressive performance against Northwestern State. After holding the Demons to 126 yards in the first half, the Red Raiders turned it up a notch and held NSU to minus-eight yards in the second half. The 118 yards of total offense is a defensive record for Tech.

Debut of Coach Ruff's Defense

- ▶▶ Tech limited NSU to one second half first down and nine for the game
- ▶▶ Five of NSU's first downs came in the first quarter
- ▶▶ Tech stifled the Demons to the tune of 2.1 yards per play
- ▶▶ NSU completed only 40 percent of its passes against a stingy Tech secondary

SCORING OUTPUT AMONG SCHOOL'S BEST

Texas Tech's 75 points against Northwestern State rank fourth on the school's all-time scoring list and marks the seventh 70+ game in the program's history and third under Mike Leach.

Seniors Chris Parker (CB), Danny Amendola (WR), Paul Williams (LB) and junior Graham Harrell (QB) were elected captains for the 2007 season in a vote by their teammates.

PROUD TO BE A TEXAN

Of the 44 names listed on the offensive and defensive depth charts, 36 hail from the state of Texas. Additionally, both punters, both kickers and both deep snappers are from the Lone Star State. Nineteen of the projected 22 starters are Texans.

REACHING OUT

Fifteen players on this year's roster originated from other states, including Hawaii, Georgia, California, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, Louisiana and Arkansas.

COMING IN DROVES

Over the course of Mike Leach's career at Texas Tech, 2,409,534 fans have enjoyed Red Raider football at Jones AT&T Stadium (compared to 1,953,683 during the 90s). Over the three previous seasons, the average attendance was 51,453 – or 97.3 percent capacity.

LEACH IN EIGHTH SEASON

Mike Leach is in his eighth season as head coach of the Red Raiders. He is the third winningest coach in Texas history, trailing Spike Dykes (82-67-1) and Pete Cawthon (76-32-6). He has 62 coaching victories during his seven-plus seasons.

LEACH vs. NON-CONFERENCE

Mike Leach is 29-8 in non-conference games, including the last 11-of-13, dating back to the start of the 2005 season. Leach has only dropped back-to-back non-conference games once – the Alamo Bowl against Iowa in 2001 and the opener in 2002 at Ohio State.

SEPTEMBER STRONG UNDER LEACH

Texas Tech has a pretty good run going in the month of September in the Mike Leach era. Over the past eight seasons, the Red Raiders are 24-7 during the initial month of the season. Leach's teams have outscored the opposition 1,255-668 and are averaging 40.5 points per game. Leach is 14-1 at home in September, 9-6 on the road and 1-0 in his lone neutral site game.

TEN PLAYERS SEE FIRST STARTS AT SMU

Ten players received their first-starts at SMU: LT Rylan Reed, C Shawn Byrnes, RT Jake Johnson, WR Michael Crabtree, RB Kobey Lewis, NT Richard Jones, DT Rajon Henley, DE Brandon Williams, LB Chad Hill and CB Jamar Wall.

RED RAIDER FOOTBALL IN 83rd SEASON

The 2007 season marks the 83rd year of Texas Tech Football on the South Plains. Over that span, the program has 488 wins, 385 losses and 32 ties.

TECH DOMINANT IN OPENERS UNDER LEACH

Since arriving in Lubbock prior to the 2000 season, head coach Mike Leach has enjoyed tremendous success in season opening games. Leach boasts a near perfect 7-1 record in openers and an impressive 30-point average margin of victory in those wins. His offenses have averaged more than 450 yards per game in each of his eight kickoff contests, highlighted by the 653-yard output against Florida International in 2005. While Tech has averaged a stout 38.4 points per game in openers under Leach, the team has proven to actually be more efficient in the second half of those games. The Red Raiders have averaged 23.3 points in the third and fourth quarters of openers since 2000 versus 17.1 points in the first and second periods.

remaining in regulation, the Red Raiders mounted an improbable comeback, scoring 31 unanswered points, capped by Alex Trlica's career long 52-yard field goal as time expired to send the game to overtime. RB Shannon Woods scored on Tech's first possession in OT, following a Minnesota field goal, to give Tech the win.

Prior to the Insight Bowl, the most dramatic may have been the 2005 victory at Nebraska with 12 seconds to play. QB Cody Hodges scrambles on fourth down for the Red Raiders and found Joel Filani streaking in the back of the end zone. An argument could be made for the Texas A&M game last, when Graham Harrell hit Robert Johnson with a 37-yard strike in the final two minutes.

BUILD IT AND THEY WILL COME

One result behind Mike Leach's construction of one of the nation's most powerful offensive attacks is increased attendance. Prior to his arrival in 2000, the season record for average attendance was 46,083 set during the 1979 season. In Leach's second season at Tech in 2001, Tech set a school mark of 46,101. The program topped the mark in 2003 (49,608) and again in 2004 (52,823). The mark in 2004 reflected a 101 percent capacity for the stadium. Tech averaged 50,874 this season. During the previous seven seasons, Tech averaged 47,148 in attendance, compared to 38,266 in the six seasons prior to that (1994-99). The attendance of 52,913 against SLU last year marked the sixth-straight game that 50,000-plus Red Raider fans made their way to Jones AT&T Stadium (52,882).

HIGH LEVEL OF PRODUCTION

Texas Tech's offense did a complete one-eighty when Mike Leach took over as head coach in 2000. Once a powerful rushing machine that produced two Doak Walker Award winners in the '90s, the offense has become one of the nation's most prolific passing units over the last seven seasons. Leading the charge has been a group of quarterbacks that has consistently been among the national leaders in nearly every passing category year-in and year-out. Kliff Kingsbury (1999-02) and B.J. Symons (2000-03) were both Davey O'Brien candidates and each won the coveted Sammy Baugh Trophy during their respective senior seasons. Sonny Cumbie (2001-04) and quarterback Cody Hodges (2002-05) were the starters during the 2004 and 2005 seasons, respectively. QB Graham Harrell became the first underclassman last year to lead the Red Raiders since Kingsbury's sophomore season in 2000.

LEACH AMONG SHUTOUT LEADERS

In eight seasons as head coach, Mike Leach has delivered seven shutouts. The total represents the most shutouts for a Texas Tech head coach since Dell Morgan's 20 blankings from 1941-50. Tech posted five shutouts during Leach's first three seasons, before reaching the sixth against Baylor in 2005.

LEACH QUICKLY MOVING UP WINS CHARTS

Eighth-year head coach Mike Leach has 62 wins in his career at Texas Tech and is in third place on the school's all-time wins list. Spike Dykes (1986-99) leads with 82 wins, while Pete Cawthon (1930-40) recorded 76.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

CRABTREE AMONG SEASON SCORING LEADERS

Throughout the history of Texas Tech football, only eight players have eclipsed 100 points in a season, including current WR Michael Crabtree, who leads the nation in scoring. With his fourth-quarter TD reception against Iowa State, Crabtree pushed his season point total to 102 (17 TDs). He is 32 points shy of the single-season record of 134, set by Byron Morris in 1993.

ANOTHER RECORD FALLS

This sounds redundant, but WR Michael Crabtree broke another record. The freshman receiving phenom has 1,320 yards this season which breaks the previous NCAA freshman yardage record of 1,265, set by USC's Mike Williams in 2002.

PRODUCTIVE TO SAY THE LEAST

While WR Michael Crabtree hasn't scored in the last two games, he still leads the nation in all receiving categories and scoring. He recorded his seventh-straight 100-yard receiving game against Texas A&M, which ties him with Lloyd Hill, who recorded a Tech record seven 100-yard games in 1992. The streak ended at Missouri as he grabbed 10 catches for 76 yards.

CRABTREE STRETCHES THE FIELD

Long criticized for being a "dink and dunk" offense, the Texas Tech spread attack has seen several of its critics silenced in 2007, thanks in large part to the emergence of redshirt freshman wide receiver Michael Crabtree, a big-play threat that has burst onto the scene in his first participating season. Crabtree leads the nation in catches (88), receiving yards (1,320), receiving touchdowns (17) and scoring (102) so far through eight games, but a look inside the numbers shows what a game-breaker he really is. Sixty of Crabtree's 88 catches have resulted in first downs or touchdowns for the Tech offense, and 32 of his receptions have gone for 15 or more yards. WR Michael Crabtree's debut at Texas Tech has been nothing short of outstanding, impressive, sensational, etc.... The redshirt freshman is having arguably the best freshman season in NCAA history for a receiver and leads the nation in receptions, receptions per game, touchdowns and scoring. In eight games, Crabtree has 88 receptions for 1,320 yards and 17 touchdowns. He has five three-TD games and one two-score outing.

849 yards this year, which is better than his previous three seasons combined. Additionally, he has five touchdown receptions. Along with WR Michael Crabtree, Amendola ranks among the nation's top 10 in receptions per game (8.9) and receiving yards per game (106.1).

DANNY MOVES THE CHAINS

Senior WR Danny Amendola enjoyed tremendous success in his first eight games at the Y-receiver position, notching single-game career highs in catches (14) against Oklahoma State and receiving yards (233) also against the Cowboys. Most notably, 36 of his 71 catches this season have resulted in drive-extending first downs or touchdowns, including his career-long 49-yard catch and run early in the second quarter at SMU. With an expanded role in the offense, and a wealth of experience under his belt, Amendola has already shattered his personal season bests of 34 catches and 395 yards set a year ago during the 2006 season. He currently has 71 receptions for 849 yards and five touchdowns.

MORE ON AMENDOLA

Amendola has 3,347 career all-purpose yards and ranks ninth on the Tech career list. He trails Tyrone Thurman (1985-88) in eighth place by 145 yards and Byron Morris (1991-93) by 475 yards. Amendola also is closing in on 2,000 career receiving yards and will become only the 11th player in school history to do so 150 yards from now. He currently has 1,850 career receiving yards.

BRITTON STEPS UP IN BACKUP ROLE

Sophomore WR Edward Britton was on the receiving end of a 68-yard touchdown pass from Graham Harrell for Tech's lone touchdown at Missouri. Britton, starting in place of an injured L.A. Reed the last two games, finished the Missouri game with two catches for 83 yards. In his first start against Texas A&M, Britton had three receptions for 39 yards and accounted for the first touchdown of the season from a Tech split end. Britton is averaging 14.6 yards on 21 receptions this season. He is the eighth different receiver to catch a touchdown pass for Tech this season.

RUNNING GAME COMES ALIVE

Texas Tech broke the 100-yard mark on the ground against Texas A&M for the second time this season. Tech's 108 yards follow the 111-yard performance at Rice. RB Shannon Woods is the primary back, leading with 439 yards on 84 carries and eight touchdowns. Backup RB Kobey Lewis is second with 31 carries for 116 yards and two scores.

THE GREAT WALL OF LUBBOCK

The Red Raiders enter the 2007 season with four new starters on the offensive line. The loss of 80 percent of the unit would worry some, but QB Graham Harrell welcomes the new unit and is anxious to get behind them and start playing.

"We had a great group last year, but this is the biggest group of guys I've ever played behind. I'm looking forward to the season and have nothing but the highest level of confidence in these guys."

Anchored by all-conference performer Louis Vasquez at right guard, the unit averages 6-feet-6 and 331 pounds. Three players stand at 6-7, another at 6-6 and one at 6-4. OG Brandon Carter is the heaviest at 374, while C Shawn Byrnes is 303.

BIG 12 PLAYERS OF THE WEEK THIS SEASON

WR Michael Crabtree and QB Graham Harrell earned Big 12 Offensive Player of the week honors on successive weeks following the Rice and Oklahoma State games. Crabtree blistered Rice for 244 receiving yards and three

touchdowns, while Harrell turned in the fourth-best single-game passing effort in NCAA history with 646 yards at Oklahoma State. Additionally, Harrell was voted the AT&T All-America Player of the Week by the fans twice.

TIGHTLY HOLDING ON TO STREAK

RB Shannon Woods has 260 career carries with no fumbles. The Big 12 Conference's leading returning rusher carried the ball 152 times last season and scored 10 times.

POTTS PERFORMS IN THIRD APPEARANCE

Redshirt freshman quarterback Taylor Potts has seen limited action as the back-up to junior Graham Harrell through five games of his first participating season. When he has played, however, Potts has shown the ability to orchestrate Tech's offensive attack with little drop-off in production. In last Saturday's non-conference finale against Northwestern State, the Abilene native completed an impressive 9-of-12 passes for 196 yards and three touchdowns. The three scoring strikes were the first of his young career and marked the most by a Tech back-up since B.J. Symons' posted the same total against Baylor on November 2, 2002.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

FRESHMAN HELPS ANCHOR THE MIDDLE

While the youth movement at several positions has been a common theme this year for Texas Tech, none has been more dwelled upon than the inexperience on the interior defensive line. Attrition and graduation have taken their toll at the position, but the handful of players defensive coordinator Ruffin McNeil does have at his disposal have elevated their play in recent weeks. True freshman Colby Whitlock has come on especially strong after earning his first start at Oklahoma State, and has racked up 21 tackles and two sacks playing opposite Rajon Henley on the inside. In fact, Whitlock's 16 solo tackles are second amongst defensive linemen on the team, and his three quarterback hurries rank second among all defenders.

DEFENSE ON THE SCOREBOARD

Junior safety Darcel McBath registered the first defensive touchdown of the season for the Red Raiders when he returned a fumble 16 yards for a touchdown that gave Tech a 27-0 lead with 5:09 remaining in the first half against Iowa State. Victor Hunter was credited with the forced fumble. The last time a Tech player returned a fumble for a touchdown was Chris Hudler at Oklahoma State (recovered the ball in the endzone) in 2005. McBath has also had two TD returns called back.

SOMEONE LIT A FIRE UNDER THIS GUY

Sophomore DE Brandon Williams has been a productive defensive linemen for the Red Raiders, dating back to last season. However, his current four-game run of hassling the opposing quarterback shows he has stepped up his game. Williams had nine tackles, a half sack, a tackle and a half for loss and forced fumble of Missouri QB Chase Daniel last weekend. Williams paces the defensive unit with nine and a half tackles for loss and four sacks this season.

OUT OF COMFORT ZONE SUITS DUNCAN

Redshirt freshman LB Brian Duncan received his fourth-straight start in Kellen Tillman's absence and has led the defense in tackles twice. Duncan recorded seven stops for the second-straight week at Missouri after doing the same against Texas A&M. He posted nine tackles, including seven solo stops, against Iowa State. In his first start, Duncan had five tackles in the win over Northwestern State. Duncan had been backing up Paul Williams at middle back, before getting the nod in the

last four games at strongside. He still says the middle is his natural position.

TECH HARASSING OPPOSITION BEHIND THE LINE

Texas Tech has already this season registered over half of last season's tackles for loss total (69). The Red Raiders have 49 tackles for loss in 2007, including a season-high 12 in the win at Rice. DE Brandon Williams leads the group with nine and a half.

AND THE QUARTERBACK, TOO...

Texas Tech picked up right where it left off a year ago. The Red Raiders made a 15-sack increase from 2005 to 2006, recording 33 sacks a year ago. This year's defensive unit has 18. The total ranks the Red Raiders in fourth place in the Big 12 standings. In the Rice win, the Red Raiders turned in a season-high six sacks, which marks the most in a single game since last year's game against Baylor.

WALL GETTING IN GOOD POSITION

Sophomore CB Jamar Wall leads the team with four interceptions this season, collecting his fourth at Missouri and second in as many games. He also ranks among the top 20 nationally in picks. On the season, Wall has 33 tackles and three pass breakups. His four picks are the most for a Red Raider since Ryan Aycock's six in 2003.

TECH GETTING HANDS ON THE BALL

Red Raider defenders have already forced 11 fumbles this year after knocking 17 balls away a year ago. Eleven different players have forced fumbles this season, including LB Paul Williams, who probably forced the biggest to this point. With UTEP at the Tech 2, trailing by two touchdowns and threatening to score with five minutes to play, the Tech defense held UTEP RB Marcus Thomas long enough for Williams to get a hand in and halt the drive. The Red Raiders recovered.

MAKING THE MOST OF IT

Senior LB Paul Williams has wasted little time adjusting to the starting lineup and accepting his role as a team leader. Williams is third on the tackles list with 46 stops and has three and a half tackles for loss. He also has two pass breakups, a sack and a forced fumble. Williams' career at Texas Tech has been a patient one. After appearing in 11 games on special teams during his freshman season in 2003, Williams sat out as a redshirt in 2004 to save a year and concentrate on learning the middle linebacker position. The next two years were spent as a backup to four-year starter Brock Stratton. He did earn his way into a starting slot at SAM for the final six games of 2006, but left little question as to his status entering the 2007 season.

GARCIA, McBATH PROVIDE SAFETY NET

The safety duo SS Joe Garcia and FS Darcel McBath are once again among the defensive leaders as they rank first and fourth, respectively, with 53 and 45 tackles. McBath has six pass breakups and an interception and Garcia has two breakups. Additionally, Tech's two interceptions against SMU were initially tipped by McBath.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

DUST OFF THE COBWEBS

Due to the efficiency of the offense, freshman P Jonathan LaCour has been a lonely man. When the Texas Tech offense was held scoreless by Texas A&M in the first quarter and forced to punt on back-to-back possessions for the first time this season, and LaCour was ready. While he is averaging a mere two punts per game, LaCour looked like a veteran against the Aggies. He punted three times and averaged 46.0 yards per, and also dropped two inside the 20, pinning the Aggies deep in their own territory.

MORRIS PUTS TECH IN GOOD POSITION

Junior IR/PR Eric Morris had his best day returning punts against Iowa State, averaging 21.5 yards per return. On the season, Morris is averaging 10.2 yards per return and ranks third in the Big 12 Conference.

KICK RETURN GAME MOVING UP

Experiencing the best kick return season under Leach, sophomore Ed Britton and junior L.A. Reed have taken the Red Raider kick return unit to another level. After finishing last season ranked 118th in kick returns, Tech made some adjustments in hopes of improving that number dramatically and now ranks among the top half. The unit is averaging 21.5 yards per return this season after struggling at a 15.9 yard clip a year ago. Reed has 15 and is averaging 22.9 yards, while Britton has 12 returns with a 26.0 yard average, which ranks second in the Big 12 and 35th nationally.

AUTOMATIC ALEX HOLDS NCAA RECORD

Senior PK Alex Trlica has successfully converted all 215 extra point attempts in his career. That number ranks as the best in NCAA history, surpassing former Tennessee Volunteer John Becksvoort for the most consecutive extra points made in a career. He has connected on 49 attempts this season.

Senior PK Alex Trlica became the third player and first kicker in Texas Tech history to reach the 300-point plateau. In his career as Tech's placekicker, Trlica has gathered his 335 points on 40 field goals and 215 extra point conversions. Over the course of his career, Trlica is averaging 7.6 points per game and led the team last year with 96 points.

PUNT TEAM ON THE SIDELINES IN 2007

Whether it's a product of offensive efficiency or the aggressiveness of the head coach, Texas Tech has punted a mere 15 times through eight games during the 2007 season. That number marks the second-fewest in the nation and the lowest amount of punts through eight games during Mike Leach's tenure in Lubbock. The resistance to punting certainly hasn't been the result of a personnel issue at the position, as true freshman Jonathan Lacour ranks second in the Big 12 Conference with a 42.7-yard average in his limited opportunities.

AMENDOLA IN ELITE COMPANY

Although his punt return duties are limited, WR Danny Amendola is still listed among good company; and he did return three against Northwestern State for 73 yards. Amendola and former Red Raiders Tyrone Thurman and Wes Welker are the only players in school history to have amassed more than 1,000 career punt return yards last season. Amendola stands in third place all-time with his 1,187 yards behind Welker's 1,761 and Thurman's 1,466.

TRLICA NEARING FIELD GOAL RECORD

PK Alex Trlica will add another feather to his cap with his ninth field goal this season. He already has five this year. The senior poked 13 through in 2005 and 15 last season, the highest single-season total under Mike Leach. His 15 field goals last year also are tied for sixth in Tech annals with Brian Hall (1976) and Scott Segrist (1988). Trlica has 40 career field goals and is in fifth place. Bill Adams (1977-79) holds the record with 43.

CLOSING IN ON 10,000

Harrell enters this weekend's game with 8,525 career yards and is rapidly closing in on 10,000 career passing yards. Only 46 players in the history of NCAA football have thrown for more than 10,000 yards in a career, including former Red Raider Kliff Kingsbury, who ranks eighth on the list with 12,429 yards.

HARRELL STRONG ON THIRD DOWN

Through eight games of what has to this point been a fantastic season for Harrell, his effectiveness on third downs in particular should not go unnoticed. For the season, the junior has completed 48-of-74 passes (64.9%) for 646 yards and six touchdowns in third down situations. Harrell's contributions have been a major factor in the offense's improvement in the third down conversion department this year.

HARRELL WINS AT&T HONOR – AGAIN

For the second time in three weeks, AT&T recognized Harrell as its All-America Player of the Week. Harrell recorded the eighth 400-yard game of his career with 425 yards against Iowa State. He also threw four touchdown passes and rushed for another in the win. Two weeks ago at Oklahoma State, Harrell turned in the fourth-best passing game in NCAA history with 646 yards and five touchdowns en route to winning the award, which is voted on by the fans.

RUSHING TOUCHDOWN TOTAL IN SIGHT

Harrell has three rushing scores on the season after eight games and is two shy of the record for a Leach-coached quarterback at Texas Tech. B.J. Symons rushed for five touchdowns in 2003. The only other player to rush for three was Cody Hodges in 2005.

HARRELL ON RECORD PACE

Harrell has several records approaching on the horizon, including some single-season marks set by former Red Raider QB and NCAA single-season passing leader B.J. Symons. Symons' 2003 season marked the best individual season in NCAA history. He finished that campaign with 5,833 passing yards on 470-of-719 passing and 53 touchdowns.

HARRELL MOVING UP QUICKLY

Harrell is moving up the Tech career passing yardage list and claimed second place during the win over Texas A&M. He also has made his mark on the career touchdown passes list and is in second place with 73 career scoring strikes, while his 32 TD passes this season rank sixth on the single-season list.

HARRELL HAS RECORD DAY AT OKLAHOMA STATE

Harrell put his stamp in the NCAA record books Saturday with his 646-yard performance at Oklahoma State. Harrell's yardage total mark is the fourth best single-game total in NCAA history. Additionally, he threw for five touchdowns and completed 46-of-67 passes. The game ranks second on the Tech single-game lists, behind B.J. Symons' 661 yards at Mississippi in 2003. The game at OSU was his ninth in his career with at least four touchdown passes.

HARRELL FEASTING ON NON-CONFERENCE FOES

In nine career starts against non-Big 12 Conference opponents, Harrell boasts a healthy 8-1 record. In those games, the junior from Ennis, Texas, has completed 69.2 percent of his passes (299-for-432) and posted an impressive 33:5 touchdown-to-interception ratio. Through four non-conference games of 2007, Harrell has completed 146-of-200 passes (73.0%) and has thrown 19 touchdowns to just two interceptions.

HARRELL NAMED TO THREE WATCH LISTS

After throwing for a Tech sophomore record 4,555 yards and 38 touchdowns last season, Harrell was named to the preseason watch lists for the Manning, Maxwell and Davey O'Brien awards. The Manning and the O'Brien awards are presented annually to the nation's top quarterback, while the Maxwell Award acknowledges the nation's top collegiate player.

Mike Leach, arguably one of the most innovative offensive coaches in the country, has not only transformed Texas Tech Football, but also the face of college football with an all-out aerial assault. This is evidenced by the number of programs incorporating more passing into their schemes than before. Leach's offense has become a hot, imitable commodity; but none have mastered it like the eighth-year Red Raider head coach.

Leading the nation's most prolific passing offenses in the country, Leach, who received the All-American Football Foundation's Johnny Vaught Head Coach Award, spreads the field with his exciting brand of football and guided the Red Raiders to four-straight NCAA passing titles and three-consecutive total offense titles during his tenure. Leach's offense produced school records in nearly every passing category in 2000, but surpassed those numbers in each of the last seven seasons. His seven teams have combined for over 151 team and individual records at Tech.

Texas Tech has established itself as one of the nation's leading producer of quarterbacks since the 2000 season. Quarterback Graham Harrell turned in the fourth-best single-season passing performance for a sophomore in NCAA history, throwing for 4,555 yards in his starting debut last year. Tech also won at least eight games for the fifth-straight season for the first time in school history. Cody Hodges and Kliff Kingsbury each posted nine-win seasons during their careers, while 2003 and 2004 signal callers B.J. Symons and Sonny Cumbie and Harrell each won eight games in their respective seasons as the starter.

In 2003, Symons, a Heisman Trophy candidate, capped off his senior season with an NCAA Passing Championship and an NCAA single-season record 5,833 passing yards. A year earlier, Kliff Kingsbury finished his senior campaign ranked in total offense (2nd), completions (1st), attempts (1st) and passing touchdowns (1st). The record-setting quarterback also set 17 NCAA records during his career and tied three other marks.

The Red Raiders have improved their total offensive numbers from 324.8 yards per game to as high as 582.8 yards per game since Leach's arrival. The last seven seasons rank as the top seven all-time at Tech in total offense, while scoring went from 23 points per game in 1999 to 32.5 points last season. The most significant increase has been in the passing game, where the Red Raiders averaged 369.5 yards per game in 2004 compared to 175.4 yards in 1999.

The running game has flourished as well under Leach. Running back Taurean Henderson rushed for 17 scores in 2005 to rank among the top scoring backs in the country. His touchdown total was the most for a Red Raider since Byron Morris rushed for 22 in 1993. The Red Raiders' 25 total rushing scores were the most for a Tech team since the 1996 campaign yielded 27.

Despite Tech's offense revolving around the pass, Leach has done a tremendous job of incorporating the running back position into the mix. Henderson finished his career with 303 receptions, which ranks first in NCAA history among running backs and fourth overall. Coupled with his talents on the ground, Henderson's NFL stock rose dramatically each season due to his versatility.

Additionally, recruiting has been one of the top beneficiaries since Leach's arrival in December 1999. The Red Raiders' 2006 recruiting class was once again ranked among the top 25. From his first class in the spring of 2000 to this year's list of newcomers, each class continues to get better. Not only is Texas Tech recruiting the Texas area, but Leach also is extending the reach of the program across the country.

The level of recruiting Leach and his staff have attained has reflected in the success of the team. One of the most recognizable areas is the offensive line. The unit has continually improved each season and boasts more size and strength than the past.

The Red Raiders are not solely known for their play on the scoring side of the ball. The Texas Tech defense also has flourished during Leach's six seasons. The Red Raiders tied for the national lead with three shutouts in 2000 and followed with others in 2001, 2002 and 2005. Combined with the six shutouts are six other games where the opposition was held without an offensive touchdown. Tech's shutout of Baylor in Waco during the 2005 season marked Tech's first blanking of a conference opponent on the road since the inception of the Big 12 Conference in 1996.

The play of the special teams has improved with each season as well. Placekicker Alex Trlica finished his junior season with a mark of 51-of-51 on extra points, marking only the seventh time in school history for a perfect season. Graduated punter Alex Reyes ranked among the Big 12's top punters during his final two seasons. Tech's kickoff, punting and return teams also have seen a

dramatic improvement in the last six seasons. Additionally, the Red Raiders rank among the top 15 programs in the country in returns (kickoff, punt, fumble and interception) for touchdowns since the 2000 season.

While leading the Red Raiders to 56 wins in his seven seasons, Leach is the only coach in school history to lead his first seven teams to bowl games. The 56 wins are the most in a Tech head coach's first seven seasons.

Although Leach's presence has been felt throughout the team, it also has been beneficial for the players individually.

Symons was the second Tech quarterback to receive The Touchdown Club of Columbus' Sammy Baugh Trophy (Kingsbury in 2002) and was named the Chevrolet Offensive Player of the Year. Symons capped off his senior season with an invitation to the 2004 NFL Combine. The Heisman Trophy candidate was the fourth in a line of Leach-coached quarterbacks to be mentioned as a candidate for the award – Tim Couch at Kentucky, Josh Heupel at Oklahoma and Kingsbury.

Kingsbury, a 2002 All-Big 12 first-team quarterback and sixth-round draft pick of the Patriots, led the Big 12 Conference in several passing categories over his final three seasons and was a Heisman Trophy candidate in 2002. He also was named the Verizon Academic All-American of the Year for football and was awarded an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in a ceremony in New York City.

In 2004, inside receiver Trey Haverty became the first Associated Press All-American since Montae Reagor in 1998, when he was selected to the third team following last season's campaign. Free safety Dwayne Slay earned first-team All-America honors from *Sports Illustrated* last season, marking the first in seven seasons. Slay was one of the country's most punishing tacklers last season and led the conference and finished second nationally with eight forced fumbles.

In addition to Slay, linebacker Lawrence Flugence and defensive end Aaron Hunt also gained national attention during their careers. Both were named to All-America teams in 2002 and were listed as candidates for various national awards. Hunt was drafted in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos, while Flugence signed a free agent contract with the Carolina Panthers. In 2003, strong safety Ryan Aycok was one of the top defensive players in the country, reeling in six interceptions and 101 tackles.

Texas Tech sent five players to the 2007 NFL Combine, tied for the most for Tech in the history of the event. Leach has coached several quarterbacks that have gone on to the NFL, including Kingsbury, Couch, Heupel and Symons. While at Tech, 13 players have been drafted and 18 others have signed free agent contracts. Guard Manny Ramirez was selected in the fourth round of the 2007 NFL Draft, while wide receiver Joel Filani and defensive end Keyunta Dawson was taken in the sixth and seventh rounds by Tennessee and Indianapolis, respectively. Offensive tackle E.J. Whitley was chosen in the seventh round of the 2006 draft by the Dallas Cowboys, while center Dylan Gandy was selected by the Indianapolis Colts in the fourth round of the 2005 NFL Draft. Offensive tackle Daniel Loper and linebacker Mike Smith were picked in the fifth and seventh rounds, respectively, in 2004 by the Tennessee Titans and Baltimore Ravens.

The team continues to make strides academically as well under Leach. In 2006 eight players were working on postgraduate degrees. For the last seven years Tech has been recognized as one of the nation's top institutions for consistently being above a 70 percent graduation rate, according to the American Football Coaches Association.

Prior to coming on board at Texas Tech, Leach, in just one season at Oklahoma, directed a Sooner offense that went from one of the worst in the Big 12 Conference to one of the best. Under Leach's tutelage, Heupel was named 1999 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year. For his efforts, Leach was nominated for the 1999 Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country.

Leach guided an Oklahoma offense that went from 11th in the Big 12 in 1998 to first in 1999 and 101st in the nation to 11th. In just one year, OU's total offense numbers improved from 293.3 to 427.2 yards per game.

The rise in passing and scoring offense categories is just as impressive. Oklahoma went from last to first in the Big 12 in passing offense in one year, from 107th in the country to ninth. Under Leach, the Sooners improved from 109.9 yards passing per game to 321.7 yards per game.

In 1998, Oklahoma was last in the Big 12 and 101st in the country in scoring offense at 16.7 points per game. In 1999, the Sooners improved to second in the league and eighth in the country in scoring at 36.8 points per game, an increase of just over 20 points per game.

Under Leach, the Oklahoma offense set six Big 12 Conference and 17 OU records. The Sooners were one of only two schools in the nation to have six players with 20

or more receptions in 1999.

Prior to joining Bob Stoops' Oklahoma staff, Leach served as offensive coordinator for Hal Mumme at the University of Kentucky and Valdosta (Ga.) State University.

For two years at Kentucky under Mumme, Leach coached the Kentucky "Air Raid" offense that was one of the most explosive in Southeastern Conference history. Under Mumme and Leach, the Kentucky offense set six NCAA records, 41 Southeastern Conference records and 116 school records in 22 games.

Kentucky's offense produced more than 500 yards of total offense in seven separate games, including a school-record 801 against Louisville.

Leach's Kentucky offense featured the talented Couch, who passed for 4,275 yards and 34 touchdowns as a senior.

Named 1996 Division II Offensive Coordinator of the Year by *American Football Quarterly* magazine, Leach helped Mumme lead Valdosta State to a 40-17-1 record. The 1993 Blazer offense smashed 66 school records, 22 conference records and seven national records. In 1994, Valdosta State advanced to the Division II playoffs with Leach's offense shattering 80 school records, 35 conference records and seven more national marks.

Leach and Mumme first teamed up at Iowa Wesleyan College in 1989. From 1989 to 1991 he served as offensive coordinator and line coach for an offense that led the NAIA in passing yardage one season and finished second the other two. Iowa Wesleyan passed for more than 11,000 yards in Leach's three seasons and broke 26 national records.

Leach has also made coaching stops in Pori, Finland, where he served as head coach in the European Football League (1989), as well as one-year assistant stints at College of the Desert (1988) and Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo (1987).

After graduating with honors from Brigham Young in 1983, Leach earned a Master's Degree from the United States Sports Academy and his law degree from Pepperdine University, where he graduated in the top one-third of his class.

The oldest of six siblings, Leach and his wife, Sharon, are the parents of four children; Janeen (21), Kim (17), Cody (10) and Kiersten (8). Janeen will begin medical school at Texas Tech this fall, after graduating from BYU in the spring.

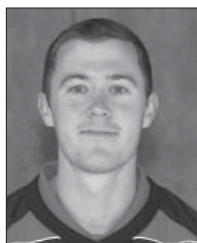
