Program Quick Notes: This fall will celebrate CU's 75th season as the "Buffaloes," as the nickname was adopted in 1934... There were no changes in CU's full-time coaching staff for the first time since the 1987-88 seasons... Colorado's 148-81-4 record dating back to the start of the 1989 season is the 20th best in the nation over the last 19 years... CU owns the nation's 12th best road record since 1988 (59-38-1)... In 2006, Colorado had the 20th most alumni active in the NFL (27 players), the third most in the Big 12 ... Colorado had 11 of its 13 games televised in 2007, upping its total to 148 of 221 dating back to 1990 (67%), 111 of 148 since the inception of the Big 12 (75%) and 24 of its last 29 regular season non-conference games (83%)... CU has been ranked 292 times in its history, the 21st most all-time... Since 1989, CU has played the fourth most ranked teams in the nation (95), trailing Florida (105), Florida State (99) and Michigan (98); Ohio State has also played 95... Colorado has scored in 235 straight games, the fourth longest active streak in the NCAA (and the ninth longest all-time).

2008 COLORADO PLAYERS-TO-WATCH

May 1, 2008

CHA'PELLE BROWN, CB 5-7, 180, Jr., 2L

In 2007, he played in all 13 games, including seven starts, all of which came as the nickel back in 4-2-5 or 3-3-5 formations against passing teams... In 531 snaps from scrimmage in the regular season, he finished the year with 42 tackles (34 solo), the fourth most by a defensive back on the team with the highest ratio of solos to assists... He tied for second on the team with 10 third down stops, while his 12 pass deflections ranked a team best... He also had an interception, a quarterback hurry, a caused interception and a touchdown save... A top game was against Nebraska: five tackles, two third down stops, two pass deflections and an interception he returned 51 yards inside the Husker 5 that set up a TD... He had a career high 12 tackles (11 solo) against Missouri, giving him 21 tackles against the Tigers in two career games, and he also had nine in the win at Texas Tech and seven against Kansas... He added six tackles, two inside-the-20, on special teams coverage units.

MATT DILALLO, P 6-1, 190, Jr., 2L

At first glance it might appear that he suffered the proverbial sophomore slump in 2007, but one has to look inside-the-numbers: while his average was 40.1 for 61 kicks, over three-and-a-half yards lower than his freshman season, he was asked to do more with less. Less field to be exact, as the average yardline for his punts was the CU36 (as compared to the 31 in 2006), and he responded with 22 punts inside-the-20, tied for the second most in school history for a single season... He won the punting battle over the opponent in seven games, and his hang time along with CU's coverage units limited the opponent to a 6.9 average on returns... He had six punts of 50 or more yards, and also placed four inside-the-10 and three inside-the-5, with just three touchbacks... He was the unanimous first-team Freshman All-American in 2006, as he finished fourth in the Big 12 and 15th in the NCAA with a 43.7 average)... He was just the third player to lead CU in punting as a freshman.

D.J. DYKES, SS 6-2, 210, Sr., 1L

He started all 13 games at strong safety in 2007, playing 743 snaps from scrimmage in the regular season, the third most on the defense... He was second on the team in tackles with 83 (60 solo, which also ranked second), with a team-best six touchdown saves... He also recorded seven third down stops, four hurries, three pass deflections, two forced fumbles and three tackles for zero... His one interception on the year was a huge one, coming in the fourth quarter against Oklahoma and thought not leading directly to a score, it helped keep momentum on CU's side as the Buffs rallied for the win (it was OU's lone play in a span where CU had 20)... He matched his collegiate career best with 11 tackles (six solo) against Arizona State, as he posted at least four stops in every game and had six or more in nine contests... He finished fourth in CU's special teams point standings with 13, on the strength of seven tackles (four solo, one inside-the-20), three downed punts, a knockdown block, and a unique one for sprinting: he raced some 20 yards upfield to fair catch a punt with four seconds left in the first half at Baylor, enabling Kevin Eberhart to kick a 54-yard field goal on the next play. The coaches named him the defensive player of the week for the Oklahoma game.

CODY HAWKINS, QB 5-11, 190, Soph., 1L

He started all 13 games, setting every major CU freshman passing record and earning honorable mention Freshman All-America honors from *The Sporting News* and collegefootballnews.com... Those frosh marks included passing yards (2,693), completions (239), attempts (424), touchdown passes (19) and interceptions (15, though seven were tipped or deflected); he ended the regular season with 70 consecutive passes without throwing a pick... In defeating both Nebraska and Oklahoma, he became the first freshman quarterback to defeat both in the same season (only two other quarterbacks did it, and for a total of four times)... He was the recipient of the Derek Singleton Award, as selected by his teammates, for spirit, dedication and enthusiasm... His 19 touchdown passes were the fourth most in a single season (record: 22, Koy Detmer in 1996), and he did have three more in the bowl game but CU doesn't count bowl stats (Detmer had three in the Holiday Bowl that year anyway)... He had nine 200-yard passing games, tying the school record with six in a row at one point, with his season high his one 300-plus game, when he threw for 306 against Florida State (topped by 322 versus Alabama in the Independence Bowl)... He opened his career by throwing at least one touchdown pass in his first nine games, setting a record for the start of a career as well as tying the overall one for any point during the season.

GEORGE HYPOLITE. DT 6-1. 285. Sr.. 3L

On the official preseason watch lists for the Lombardi Award, Outland Trophy and Ronnie Lott Award... He played in all 13 games, starting 12 in earning first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors from both the *Associated Press* and the league coaches in 2007, when he also picked up a very prestigious honor when he was one of 11 members named to the AFCA's Good Works Team for his community service work... In 684 snaps from scrimmage in the regular season, he racked up 44 tackles (34 solo), the most by a lineman, and tied for the team lead with 11 tackles for loss... He had a team-best six quarterback sacks (8.5 total for his career), the most sacks by a defensive tackle since 2002... He also had seven hurries, six tackles for zero, five third down stops, an interception, a pass deflection and a near sack... He had a season and career-high 10 tackles versus Florida State and had eight against Iowa State; he had three tackles for loss in each game, and also had three in the opener against CSU... An honorable mention All-Big 12 selection by the coaches in 2006.

Brandon Nicolas, DT 6-3, 290, Sr., 2L

Earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors from the *Associated Press* and the league coaches... He was selected as the recipient of the Regiment Award by the coaching staff, which is presented to the player who makes the greatest contribution with the least recognition... In playing 711 snaps from scrimmage in the regular season, he played the second highest percentage of team snaps by any defensive lineman at CU over the last 15 seasons (85.7)... He recorded 37 tackles (28 solo) in tying for the team lead in tackles for loss with 11, which ranked him seventh in the Big 12; that count included three quarterback sacks... He was second on the team in tackles for zero with 11, meaning 22 of his 37 tackles went for zero or minus yardage... He also had 10 third down stops (tying for second), three pressures, two pass deflections and a caused interception. He had a season high six tackles versus Florida State (five solo, three for losses), with five in the opener against CSU.

DANIEL SANDERS, C 6-3, 325, Sr., 3L

One of 42 preseason candidates on the official watch list for the Dave Rimington Award (was also on the list in 2007)... He started all 13 games at center, playing 951 snaps—all but 10 of the team's 961 total including the Independence Bowl... He led the team in knockdown blocks with 88.5 and tied for the team lead with five touchdown blocks; he did not allow a quarterback sack, allowed only five pressures and was called for just two penalties in grading out to 80 percent or higher eight times in 12 regular season games... He peaked at 90 percent or higher three times, including a top game grade of 91 percent at Iowa State... His 14.5 knockdown blocks at Texas Tech were a team single-season high, and he had 10 or more three times... The only 10 snaps he did not play came late in the blowout win over Miami... After missing the 2006 season opener with an injury, he started the other 11 games and played all but six snaps the rest of the season, finishing with 655 total... Nicknamed "Girthy" for his size, he can also play guard if the need arises.

RYAN WALTERS, FS 6-0, 200, Sr., 3L

Started 12 games including the Independence Bowl, missing the Iowa State game due to injury... He finished fifth on the team in tackles with 63 (31 solo), as he was in for 705 snaps from scrimmage... He had five pass deflections, four third down stops, three near-sacks, two forced fumbles, two pressures and a fumble recovery... He had a career-high 16 tackles in the season opener against Colorado State (8 solo), and had seven tackles in four other games, versus Arizona State, Texas Tech, Missouri and Nebraska... His one interception on the season was a big one, coming late in the third quarter against No. 3 Oklahoma; it led to a CU touchdown that cut the deficit to 24-17 in what would eventually be a 27-24 CU win... He was presented with the Tiger Bussey Award at CU's postseason banquet for his perseverance over adversity, injury and/or illness... He was a preseason first-team All-Big 12 selection by both *Athlon* and *The Sporting News*... Earned Big 12 Conference Defensive Player of the Week honors against Texas Tech as a sophomore, when he had two interceptions, four tackles and two third down stops... He returned a fumble 95 yards for a touchdown against Kansas that same year, the second longest fumble (and any kind of miscellaneous) return in CU history.

PATRICK WILLIAMS, WR 6-2, 205, Sr., 3L

In 2007, he played in all 13 games, starting six, making 27 receptions for 265 yards (9.8 per)... He also had six rushes for 37 yards (6.2 per)... He opened the year with five catches for 59 yards at Colorado State, with another top game against Kansas (3-50)... He had at least one catch in 11 games and two or more nine times, including versus Alabama in the bowl game (2-29)... He was the Iron Buffalo Award winner for the wide receivers, as he was the selection for the honor for the player at each position who represents hard work, dedication, toughness and total poundage in the weight room... He is 20th all-time in receptions (74) and is 28th in receiving yards (748) at Colorado... For the second straight season, he was involved in CU's first offensive play of the year; he gained 24 yards on a reverse, the longest initial rushing play of the year in CU history... He set the one for receiving his sophomore year (42 yards), so he likely is the only player in the nation to own both records... He has caught at least one pass in 32 of 38 career games.

OTHERS TO KEEP AN EYE ON

Several other players have the opportunity to stand out for the Buffaloes in 2008 and some could easily wind up contending for All-Big 12 honors or better. Some of those include:

Jalil Brown, CB (6-1, 205, Soph., 1L)—The recipient of the team's Bill McCartney Award for special teams achievement in 2007, he led the team with 31 special teams points, with 25 coming in the last six games of the year... He compiled his point total on the strength of 13 tackles (10 solo, three assisted, two inside-the-20), seven knockdown blocks, five forced fair catches, two first downfield credits that altered returns, a forced fumble and a downed punt... Enters the fall second at right cornerback, but should work his way into the lineup in nickel formations if not for some rotation at corner.

Marcus Burton, ILB (6-0, 255, Jr., 2L)—He is back after taking a redshirt year for sitting out the 2007 season due to academic ineligibility... He had 29 tackles as a true freshman in 2005, with a 99-yard interception return for a TD at Oklahoma State, but missed the last quarter of his sophomore year due to a fractured tibia.

Patrick Devenny, TE (6-3, 240, Jr., 1L)—He saw spot duty in 2007 (caught just one pass, but it was for a touchdown versus Miami-Ohio), but is coming off a tremendous spring, where he led all receivers in the three major scrimmages with 12 catches for 244 yards and three touchdowns, all team bests as was his 20.3 average per reception... A converted quarterback, he had moved between the two positions throughout his career before finally settling in at tight end in the spring of 2007.

Brad Jones, OLB (6-3, 225, Sr., 3L)—He had 72 tackles last fall (45 solo), with six for losses including a pair of quarterback sacks... He also had nine third down stops, seven hurries, five tackles for zero and three passes broken up... Though it didn't count in the statistics, he had a huge sack at Texas Tech, thwarting a two-point conversion try that kept the Buff lead at 12 (31-19) in the second half... He matched his career high with 10 tackles (seven solo) at Arizona State, and he posted nine stops against Missouri and had eight on two occasions, versus Colorado State and Kansas... He was also third on the team in tackles with 72 (41 solo) as a sophomore.

Brian Lockridge, TB (6-4, 260, Sr., 3L)—He showed a small glimpse of what might be in store for the future as he was explosive at times... He was the third leading rusher on the team with 213 yards, averaging 5.6 yards per carry with one TD... He had CU's two longest runs of the season, a 47-yard run that set up a touchdown at Iowa State, and a 43-yard scoot for a touchdown that closed the scoring against Miami-Ohio... He had his best games against those two schools, as versus Miami he rushed 14 times for 90 yards and the score, while netting 61 yards on five tries at Iowa State... He earned 10 first downs, earning three of them on third down in four attempts.

Maurice Lucas, DE (6-4, 260, Sr., 3L)—Played in all 13 games last fall, including eight starts, as he started to come into his own at left defensive end. In 487 snaps from scrimmage in the regular season, he posted 30 tackles, including 24 solo, five for losses, two quarterback sacks and three stops for zero... He also had three third down stops, two hurries and a pass broken up... He had both his sacks, for 16 yards in losses, in the season opener against Colorado State in Denver, when he also recorded a season- and career-high eight tackles (six solo). He also had five tackles at Iowa State (three solo, two for zero), and posted four against Missouri.

Scotty McKnight, WR (5-11, 180, Soph., 1L)—He rebounded from a broken ankle in spring to become the first freshman wide receiver, true or redshirt, and just the second frosh ever to lead the Buffs in receiving... An honorable mention Freshman All-American by both *The Sporting News* and collegefootballnews.com, he caught 43 passes for 488 yards (11.3 average) and four touchdowns... *TSN* named him first-team Freshman All-Big 12, as he set school freshman records for receptions and yards, and missed tying the touchdown mark by one. He had a great debut, with eight catches for 106 yards and a touchdown; he caught at least one pass in every game.

Ryan Miller, OT (6-7, 315, Soph., 1L)—He played for the first time in the fourth game of the 2007 season against Miami-Ohio and cracked the starting lineup three games later... When all was said and done, he played in nine games and started six at right offensive tackle in earning first-team Freshman All-America honors from *The Sporting News*... He became the first tackle to play as a true frosh at Colorado since 1989 and was just the ninth true freshman to start a game on the offensive line at Colorado since freshmen were allowed to play again in 1972... He played 514 snaps from scrimmage, grading out to better than 80 percent four times, and allowed just one quarterback sack.

Josh Smith, WR (6-0, 180, Soph., 1L)—He played in 11 games (three starts) as a true freshman, bouncing back after being sidelined early after suffering a severe kidney bruise with mild lacerations during a CU scrimmage in mid-August... He came back with a vengeance, catching 23 passes for 451 yards, a team-best 19.6 average per reception (no touchdowns)... He was 23rd in the Big 12 in receiving yards per game (45.1)... He caught at least two passes in 10 of the 11 games he appeared in, having only been shutout against Missouri... He caught two passes for 103 yards at Baylor, his 51.5 yards per catch being among the all-time top game averages in CU history; he had 40 or more yards in six games... He also rushed the ball 10 times out of various calls and formations for 34 yards... He's already 69th on CU's all-time receiving yards list.

Demetrius Sumler, TB (5-10, 215, Soph., 1L)—He played in 12 games (three starts) in 2007, finishing second on the team in rushing with 335 yards (on exactly 100 carries, or 3.4 per)... He scored four touchdowns via rushing, when he had 24 carries exceed five yards and eight longer than 10; he also caught six passes for 41 yards and a score... He earned 15 first downs, five on third down... Top games included Miami-Ohio (14 for 91, 1 TD), Colorado State (16-85-1) and Baylor (15-38-2)... Exited spring practice No. 1 on the depth chart at tailback.

IN-DEPTH LOOK AT THE BUFFALOES

OFFENSE

Quarterback

VETERANS: Cody Hawkins, Soph., Nick Nelson, Sr. REDSHIRT: Matt Ballenger, Fr.-RS. TRANSFER: Kyle Black, Soph.

Hawkins started all 13 games in 2007 as a redshirt freshman, setting 10 major school records along the way including five freshman marks; he became the first freshman, true or redshirt, to start an entire season and at times showed both inexperience and incredible moxie. Perhaps what sums that up best is after coming to within one of tying the season interception record of 15 (though seven were tipped by defenders or bobbled first by receivers), he finished the season with 70 straight passes without throwing one. He improved upon his efforts last fall by following up with a solid spring (a 148.2 QB rating in the three scrimmages), and the coaches have already named him the starter for the 2008 season. The good news is that two other players shined in spring drills as well, including Nelson, last year's back-up. He had a 150.0 rating in scrimmages and has developed soundly, as has redshirt frosh Matt Ballenger (133.0). All three proved to make solid decisions and also will share another important role: in CU's no-huddle offensive sets, they are integral to relaying in the plays. Black was used on occasion to mix things up in the spring, as his past history as an option quarterback offers a different look.

Running Back / Fullback

The competition was brisk in the spring, though Lockridge missed the last week after being diagnosed with a sports hernia. This is the most unsolved position on the team, as the arrival of three heralded national recruits in August will take things up another notch. Sumler and Lockridge looked very good at times in games last fall, while Moyd and Nabors saw mainly special teams action. Nabors worked hard enough to earn a scholarship, so there basically is no telling how tailback will shake out at this point. One thing is for certain, most of these guys are explosive and when the three newbies arrive, including the nation's top running back recruit Darrell Scott, the coaches will be figuring out how to utilize all and get them on the field. Ray Polk was a bruising back as a prep, and Rodney Stewart, one of the last to commit to the Buffaloes, is a potential phenom as a kick returner. There figures to be a multiple rotation at tailback to keep people fresh, though it has yet to be determined how the carries will be determined; do look for the one guy who emerges at the top of the depth to be a 20-plus attempt per game back.

> Fullback Cantrell had an outstanding spring, and Behrens looks to building on a sophomore season where his playing time increased as the year progressed. Burgner joined the team as a walk-on in spring drills, and one thing is for sure, he loves to hit.

Offensive Line

After having seven bodies or less in spring practice the last two years, the coaches felt like they hit the jackpot with 13 in the fold this past spring. Practice was noticeably better because of it, as the linemen were fresh at the end of practices and scrimmages. Sanders is the anchor, as the Remington Award candidate has been a rock at center; Miller joins him as a returning starter who is ready to blossom into one of the conference's best tackles. Head is the only other player with starting experience, and he's fighting Faatagi and Iltis at right guard, while three redshirt frosh will duke it out at left guard (Bahr, Daniels and Behrens). Solder moved to tackle from tight end for spring drills and rapidly progressed at the position to where he's penciled in on the left, or quarterback's, blind side. Adkins and Tau are in the mix, as will be three top recruits in the fall, as the numbers will finally be healthy across the entire line.

Receiver

Rotation, rotation is the game plan here, though McKnight, Smith and Williams were favorite targets a year ago (93 catches, 1,204 yards combined) and all had good springs. Who are the "go-to" guys? Still likely up for grabs; a year ago McKnight was in that role early, though by season's end, Dusty Sprague (the ninth all-time leading receiver in school history) and tight end Tyson DeVree were the popular go-to men. But receivers only accounted for six of the 19 touchdown receptions a year ago (McKnight 4, Sprague 2) and the coaches would like to see that number greatly inflated, along with fewer dropped passes, several which came at key times. There is good speed at the position, and with the maturation of Celestine and Simas, who redshirted, CU might be deeper at receiver than most believe. The surprise among the group is Espinoza, who caught the coaches' attention last year on scout team duty and had quality moments in the spring at both receiver and kick returner.

Tight End

Geer's status this fall is up in the air as he awaits the outcome of a court case due to an off-field incident; he did not participate in spring drills, which gave Devenny a chance to play with the first team and shine, leading the team in receiving in the three main spring scrimmages. Walters, a transfer from New Mexico, and Shanahan have limited game experience and the only other tight end on the roster, Tompane, was a spring walk-on. Nate Solder switched to offensive tackle leaving just four tight ends on the roster for the spring, and the position is ripe for competition in August with the arrival of three top national freshman recruits at the position.

Fall Additions: Ryan Deehan, Will Pericak, Ryan Wallace (recruits). Key Losses: Tyson DeVree, Joe Sanders (graduation).

DEFENSE

Defensive Front

Hypolite and Nicolas are the anchors of the defensive front, though for them to be at their most effective the depth needs to come through; the two played 84 percent of the snaps last year (1,395 out of 1,660), a number that would have been higher had Hypolite not missed most of the Nebraska game with a hamstring injury. The pair also had nine of the 12 sacks by the defensive front a year ago, so the coaches are looking to improve the pass rush; Lucas (two sacks) and Herrod are candidates to bolster it, but in the spring scrimmages, no one player made a living in the backfield so the tweaks and improvements will continue into August. There are six freshman redshirts who will be vying for playing time, including Goree, Obi and Shields, top recruits from a year ago, and the return of a healthy Hudgins from an Achilles injury should instantly improve the group. Brace shifts from the inside to the outside and looked like he found a new home in the spring. Defensive line coach Romeo Bandison wants to play up to 10 players per game to keep people fresh, but in his first two seasons in Boulder, he's really had only six regulars both season to utilize in that capacity.

Inside Linebacker

The Buffs have to replace Jordon Dizon, runner-up for the Butkus Award, and that is never easy. The only player returning who had any snaps at inside linebacker a year ago is Smart, a former walk-on who played 677 snaps in racking up 80 tackles. Burton returns after being academically ineligible for 2007, and it remains to be seen what he can do; he didn't see much scrimmage action as a sophomore, but Dizon and Thaddaeus Washington played the bulk of the snaps in '06. Sipili missed last year as well due to a campus suspension for an off-field incident, and he figures to make a run at one of the starting spots. Stengel saw special teams action last fall but looked good in the spring and could be a factor, while Katoa, one of the nation's top linebacker prospects, is awaiting a campus ruling on his situation as he was involved in an off-campus incident after reporting to CU early. Four of the eight players have yet to see any collegiate action: Ahles, Goldberg, Gouin and Hartigan. Come fall, Jon Major, the state of Colorado's top recruit will be in the mix, as could be Douglas Rippy and Paul Vigo; Vigo played linebacker in high school but the coaches aren't sure where he'll wind up in the fall.

Outside Linebacker

Jones was the fourth-leading tackler last season and was third as a sophomore (72 total both years), but hasn't made his presence known in opposing backfields for whatever reason (four TFLs in 2007, half-a-sack in '06). He was pushed hard by an up-and-coming Beatty in spring drills and the two are expected to battle it out through fall drills. Vaiomounga saw most special teams action as a true freshman but had some solid moments in the spring. Joining the cast in the fall is JUCO All-American Shaun Mohler, who could wind up playing on the inside or possibly at defensive end if he adds some pounds.

Fall Additions: Shaun Mohler (JC transfer). Key Losses: none.

Secondary

The secondary was young a year ago, and players like Jalil Brown and Jimmy Smith learned on the run, but the group is much more experienced on the whole. Still, All-Big 12 cornerback Terrence Wheatley, a second round NFL draft pick (New England), leaves a hole, as does super-sub Lionel Harris. Walters is the senior leader of the group, and he should be full-go come August camp after missing spring drills while recovering from shoulder surgery. There were only four healthy bodies at safety in the spring, as Adams was also recovering from surgery and Bret Smith suffered a torn ACL and he's out until September; Dykes was steady and improved while Perkins blossomed at safety in the absence of the regulars. McKay and Brown ended the spring atop the depth at the corner positions, but most of the battles will wage well into fall camp. CU has it's fair share of nickel and dime schemes, so it's imperative several of the redshirt frosh in the group step up.

CU replaced All-America kicker Mason Crosby with Kevin Eberhart last year, and Eberhart made a good number of clutch kicks, including game winners against Colorado State and No.3 Oklahoma; but he was a senior so the Buffs are again faced with coming up with a reliable kicker. Davis, who had signed on with Boise State prior to his two-year Mormon Mission, transferred to Colorado, as did Goodman from Wyoming; Davis has a stronger leg but Goodman was more accurate in the spring, but the coaches aren't concerned at this point and are confident. DiLallo's average was down but it was partly due to a higher number of kicks he needed to place inside-the-20, but both he and Suazo were inconsistent at times during the spring but they are expected to come around. Drescher has handled all snaps for placements and punts the last two seasons, and McKnight was the holder for every placekick a year ago, so they're likely locked in. The main three return men all graduated: Terrence Wheatley and Hugh Charles on kickoffs and Chase McBride on punts, so the competition there is wide open; Josh Smith and Jason Espinoza got long looks in the spring, and incoming frosh Rodney Stewart is expected to be a factor once he hits campus.

2008 COLORADO FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

May 1, 2008

As the third year of the **Dan Hawkins** Era approaches at the University of Colorado, excitement is once again in the air surrounding Buffalo football. The same program that won four Big 12 Conference North Division titles earlier this decade, along with the 2001 league crown, has been rebuilding the last two seasons, and while the project is not complete, the optimism around the 2008 Buffaloes is high.

Colorado has 40 lettermen returning from last season, 18 on offense, 20 on defense and two specialists, though just eight have earned three letters and just another 13 with two. Those include 14 starters (six offense, eight defense), but in Hawkins' system, where several positions have multiple personnel shuttle in and out, the number of starters aren't truly reflective of the overall experience returning.

Those players were the core of a group that helped jump the Buffs' record from 2-10 in Hawkins' first year to 6-7 in 2007, including a postseason bowl invitation. The three-and-a-half game improvement tied for the ninth best nationally (and without the benefit of an easy non-conference schedule many ahead of the Buffaloes feasted on), and the team became just the third in school history to gain over 1,000 yards more on offense (1,027 actually) than the previous season, joining the 1957 and 1999 squads.

After his first year, Hawkins when asked what grade he would give himself for the season, and he responded with "an F." While not issuing a self-grade publicly following year two, one would likely think it would be in the "C" range as Hawkins pointed out on several occasions that his team was a few plays from being 10-3 or 11-2 for the season, but also just a few plays from going 2-10 again.

"There is a real danger in assuming you won two (games), then six and that means you will win eight, nine or 10 this year," Hawkins said. "We have to go back to Part A and figure things out all over again. We will be emphasizing all of the little things that make teams great. We have to go back to the basics and all of the tangible and intangible things. We always have to keep evolving and reinventing ourselves to stay ahead of the curve."

One factor that will certainly help is something that hasn't happened in 20 years at Colorado. For the first time since between the 1987 and 1988 seasons, the entire full-time coaching staff has remained intact. Continuity in the early stages of either building or rebuilding a program is vital, and CU has it on a key front.

In the spring and into fall camp, the coaches were and are looking to create a solid two-deep across the offensive line, as there are no less than seven redshirt freshmen vying for spots. CU's sixth all-time leading rusher, Hugh Charles, has graduated, and the battle for the top tailback spot waged in the spring among the returnees, and will again in August when three heralded recruits hit campus.

Defensively, the Buffs want to shore up the pass rush, find a replacement for All-America Jordon Dizon at linebacker, and fill several holes in the secondary created by both graduation and injury, especially the cornerback spot occupied by Terrence Wheatley. Both Dizon and Wheatley were second round draft picks into the NFL in April.

The most significant change during spring drills came on the offensive side of the ball. With the players now more accustomed to the system on offense, and with the timing (game clock) rules changing for the fourth time in as many years, it was time to take things up a notch. The coaches instituted a no-huddle offense, one that will produce more plays and keep the defense from making wholesale substitutions. It figures to be particularly a big hit in home games, when the visitor isn't used to the altitude at Folsom Field. In fact, Hawkins had hoped to install it a year ago, but the offense hadn't progressed enough for the staff to be comfortable with it.

One of the major keys to the no-huddle in experienced leadership at quarterback, as CU now has that with **Cody Hawkins** entrenched as the starter. Signals coming in from the other quarterbacks to call the plays from offensive coordinator Mark Helfrich will keep them involved in the happenings as well, and both **Nick Nelson** and **Matt Ballenger** did well in the spring. The pair shined on the field as well when Hawkins was one of the two learning the signals and sending them in. This alone already has the offense well ahead of this time a year ago, which is important since the offense as a whole is still very young.

"Offensively we will only have four or five upperclassmen who will play," Hawkins said. "We just don't have many on the offensive side of the ball, so there are a lot of young pups that will have to grow up in a hurry." At times in 2007, there were times where as many as seven freshmen were in the game at the same time. But they performed admirably for the most part, and had just one anxious moment in relation to CU's 235-game scoring streak, waiting until there was just 3:39 left in the game to extend it in a 16-6 loss to Florida State. CU scored a touchdown on fourth down, and then had the confidence to bounce right back and drive inside-the-15 on the possession, though coming up empty. Hawkins felt the Buffs did a lot of growing up in that game and it paid off two weeks later when Colorado upset No. 3 Oklahoma.

Hawkins isn't the first to believe that you build your team first in the trenches, and in year three, there are finally some bodies on the offensive line. The non-starters in games last year were in for just 237 plays, meaning the starters played 95 percent of the snaps. For the first time in several years, the Buffs will be two if not three-deep across. A year ago, about two-thirds of the quarterback sacks and tackles for losses by the opponent came after halftime, when the line would wear down. So between more bodies to shuffle in and out and ever-improving conditioning, things are in place for the O-line to become a strong suit for this team.

An eligible **Erick Faatagi**, a senior guard, and moving sophomore **Nate Solder** from tight end to tackle really bolstered the group in the spring. Rimington award candidate, senior center **Daniel Sanders**, anchors the line, and the rapidly maturing sophomore, **Ryan Miller**, who was thrown into the fire as a freshman are the stalwarts. Neither guard spot is solidified heading into fall drills, but the coaches like what they have in the cupboard.

Replacing Dizon at linebacker will be no easy task, and some top national recruits enrolling in the fall will certainly help down the road if not immediately. But don't count out those on the roster now; remember, Dizon reported as a running back as a freshman. The development of **Jeff Smart**, a former walk-on, is the latest feather in the cap of long-time linebacker coach **Brian Cabral**. "In the Independence Bowl, we were going, 'Look at that play Jordon made. Oh wait, that was Jeff Smart.' He is fully capable of having a Jordon-type season," Hawkins said.

Senior **Brad Jones** has been entrenched for the last two seasons at outside linebacker, and he's posted some nice numbers, but he was pushed hard by sophomore **B.J. Beatty** in the spring; whatever the result there, figure the play to be taken up a notch.

In the secondary, the Buffaloes actually lose both starting corners from a year ago. In addition to Wheatley heading into the NFL, **Benjamin Burney** had off-season shoulder surgery to repair a couple of chronic problems, and he will redshirt this fall. Hawkins, who feels the same way about cornerbacks as he does linemen ("you can never have enough of them, especially in this league where you play a lot of nickel and dime schemes"), saw some marked improvement last fall, as the opponents' completion percentage dropped almost a full 10 points (from 66.9 to 57.3). But the Buffs still ranked 103rd nationally in passing yards allowed, though was a bit higher in pass efficiency defense (73rd). A healthy **Ryan Walters** and improving **Daniel Dykes**, both senior safeties, will certainly help improve those numbers.

What will aid the secondary is an improved pass rush, and it has to come from up front. Senior tackles **George Hypolite**, on every major preseason watch list for defense after his All-Big 12 season a year ago, and **Brandon Nicolas** are the anchors of the defensive front. But they need to be spelled more often so they are fresher later in games; the two played 84 percent of the snaps last year (1,395 out of 1,660). The pair also had nine of the 12 sacks by the defensive front (and 10 of 18 hurries), so a potential increase in numbers falls to the ends. Senior **Maurice Lucas** had two sacks, both in the opener against Colorado State, and sophomore **Marquez Herrod** are the likely candidates to harass opposing signal callers.

Special teams play was much better last fall than the previous year on most fronts, and Colorado was one of just six teams in the regular season to be ranked in the top half of the nation in the five major special team categories in the NCAA. Kevin Eberhart did a fine job in replacing two-time All-American Mason Crosby at placekicker, but he was a senior himself and the job is again up for grabs, this time between two transfers, sophomore **Aric Goodman** (Wyoming) and freshman **Jameson Davis** (Boise State). Two of the technical positions are locked up, as look for **Justin Drescher** to handle the long snapping duties and **Scotty McKnight** to be the holder, or "pinner," as Hawkins likes to call the position. All return positions are open as CU's top three a year ago have graduated.

Intangibles always play a key role, things like leadership, injuries and how a young team deals with a tough schedule. Injuries were down a year ago, in part due to improved conditioning, and the malady "du jour" were concussions for whatever reason. So first up in prepping for '08 are for leaders to develop over the summer, as guys like Dizon and (offensive tackle) **Tyler Polumbus** need to be replaced.

"There were some really solid people in that senior class," Hawkins said of his second CU team. "It will be interesting to see how we mature into those spots. Leadership, more than anything else, is going to play an important role in the development of this team."

The Buffs must contend with one of, if not the, toughest schedules in the nation. Non-league opponents include Colorado State (in Denver), West Virginia at home (on a Thursday night, CU's first weeknight game at Folsom Field since 1990), and Florida State in Jacksonville. In addition to the usual five North Division rivals in Big 12 play, the rotation for the South opponents change this fall, and the Buffs pickup Texas and Oklahoma State at home and will travel to Texas A&M.

The 2008 season also marks the 75th that Colorado will be known as the Buffaloes, adopting the nickname officially in 1934. In the spring game, "Ralphie V" debuted as CU's live buffalo mascot, continuing a tradition that started with the original Ralphie in 1966.

HEAD COACH DAN HAWKINS

May 1, 2008

Dan Hawkins was named the 23rd head football coach in University of Colorado history on December 16, 2005, officially taking over the reins of the program on New Year's Day 2006.

He has completed two seasons at Colorado with an 8-17 record, his seventh season as a head coach on the Division I-A level with a 61-28 mark. He is the 13th active winningest head coach with an overall career mark of 100-40-1 (70.8 winning percentage) in 12 seasons, which is the ninth best mark for those coaches with at least 100 games under their belts.

Hawkins, 47, came to Colorado from Boise State, where he compiled a 53-11 record in five seasons as head coach. That included three 11-plus win seasons, and 31-game winning streaks in both Western Athletic Conference play as well as at home on Boise State's famous blue artificial turf field. His teams won or shared four WAC titles, including three outright under his direction.

In the modern history of Division I-A football, only Bob Pruett (Marshall, 58-9), Bob Stoops (Oklahoma, 55-11) and Pete Carroll (Southern California, 54-10) won more games in their first five seasons than Hawkins' 53 at Boise State (a number also matched by Miami's Larry Coker).

In his first year at Colorado, the Buffaloes posted a 2-10 record, his first losing season as a head coach. Offensive struggles were the biggest contributor to the mark, as CU finished 102nd nationally averaging just 291.4 yards per game. Defensively, CU fared a bit better, allowing 340.9 yards per game and ranked 66th overall, though were stingy against the run, as opponents averaged just 112.4 per outing (30th nationally). And there were other positives, most notably the fact that his Buffaloes were in every game, fighting until the end despite being outmanned at several positions. Evidence of that was the fact that CU was plus-8 in turnover margin, a rarity for a team eight games under .500. CU played turnover-free in a school record four games on the season, and cut its penalties nearly in half from the previous year.

His second CU team improved by three-and-a-half games to a 6-7 mark, and earned him his first bowl invitation as the Buffalo coach, against Alabama in the PetroSun Independence Bowl. Still in a rebuilding mode as evidenced by 29 lettermen who were underclassmen (including 16 freshmen, seven true), and battling depth problems and injuries at key positions like linebacker, the secondary and the offensive line, the Buffs made a lot of progress. CU opened the year with a thrilling 31-28 win over Colorado State in Denver in overtime, and along the way knocked off No. 3 Oklahoma, 27-24, and secured a tough road win at Texas Tech, the 31-26 win the Red Raiders' lone home loss of the year. Colorado ended the regular season with a resounding 65-51 win over Nebraska, and top player honors included Jordon Dizon being named the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and a Butkus Award finalist. It marked just the fifth time in school history that CU defeated both NU and OU in the same season. Alabama got the best of the Buffs in the bowl game, however, 30-24.

His overall record includes a **39-12-1** mark in five seasons as the head coach of Willamette University (Salem, Ore.), where he won or shared three conference titles between 1993 and 1997. Thus in 10 years of combined conference play between Boise State and Willamette, Hawkins' teams won or shared seven league championships while going a remarkable **58-6-1**, including six undefeated seasons, in league play (a 90.0 winning percentage).

He was 37-3 in WAC conference games, leading the Broncos to outright championships in 2002, 2003 and 2004 with 8-0 league marks, and the co-title in 2005 with a 7-1 record. At one point Hawkins guided the Broncos to a league record 31 consecutive victories, a streak that began late in his first year and continued well into his fifth campaign. His winning percentage for overall and league games stands as the highest in WAC history.

In 128 career games as a head coach, his teams have never been shut out, scoring at least one touchdown in all but two games while being held below 13 points just nine times (four times at CU, and only once at Boise State). The Broncos scored 40 or more points in 37 of his 64 games, as BSU averaged 41.6 points per game in his time there, the top figure in the nation for the five-year period between 2001 and 2005 (ahead of Texas and Texas Tech, who averaged 40.3 and 38.4, respectively). That included 50 or more points 19 times and 20-plus on an amazing 59 occasions.

Boise State also won 28 games by 25 or more points under Hawkins, and 43 by double-digits; however, his teams also excelled in close contests, as the Broncos were 10-5 in games decided by seven points or less. His teams were well balanced across the board, as evidenced by the Broncos owning top 10 marks for five-year NCAA numbers in his tenure not only in scoring, but also in total offense (3rd, 465.7 yards per game), passing offense (10th, 274.6), rushing defense (6th, 107.8) and kickoff returns (1st, 23.5 average for 245 total returns).

At Boise State, Hawkins had a knack for molding a talented group of players and coaches into a dominating force, part of the reason he was named the WAC Coach of the Year on two occasions (2002, 2004) and was a finalist for the 2004 Paul "Bear" Bryant College Football Coach of the Year Award.

Hawkins took over the Boise State program on December 2, 2000, replacing Dirk Koetter, whom he had served as assistant head coach, after he took the head coach position at Arizona State. Hawkins had joined the BSU staff in 1998, and coached the tight ends and special teams in addition to assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator duties. Hawkins also oversaw a highly successful community service and public involvement program for the Bronco football team during this time.

Before ascending to Boise State's head man, as tight ends coach Hawkins helped developed a wealth of Bronco talent. In each of his first four seasons on the Bronco staff, a Boise State tight end earned either first or second team all-conference honors. Twice Bronco tight ends were drafted into the National Football League, most notably Jeb Putzier, who earned first-team All-WAC honors in 2001 after putting together the most productive season by a tight end in school history and would be a sixth round draft pick by the Denver Broncos. Special teams also blossomed under his direction, with top national rankings by teams or individuals in kickoff returns, placekicking and punting.

Koetter would serve as head coach in his final game, the 2000 Crucial.com Humanitarian Bowl, but Hawkins took over leading the team in practice and preparation for the game, which Boise State defeated UTEP, 38-23. Though Hawkins served in his assistant coaching role in that game, his work as head coach was already evident to close observers of the program.

As just the eighth head coach in the school's 33-year history, on the surface, Boise State went 8-4 in his first season in 2001. But the Broncos were transitioning from the old Big West Conference, in which they had claimed back-to-back titles, into the stronger Western Athletic Conference. Hawkins met the challenge by posting a 6-2 league mark, tying for second overall, doing so after opening with losses to No. 21 South Carolina and Washington State, who would appear in the national rankings some three weeks later.

His biggest win that season came on October 20, and had an indirect link to his future school, Colorado, at the time. He took his Bronco team on the road where it would defeat Fresno State, 35-30, ranked eighth in the nation with a 6-0 mark at the time. Fresno State began its season with a 24-22 win over the Buffaloes in Boulder and had designs on crashing the BCS (Bowl Championship Series) until being derailed by Hawkins' Broncos, the school's first-ever over a ranked opponent.

That set the stage for the next three seasons, when the Broncos strung together consecutive records of 12-1, 13-1 and 11-1 in posting a 24-0 record in WAC conference play in 2002, 2003 and 2004.

The WAC championship won in 2002 came in just the school's second year in the league and was the first to go undefeated in league play since BYU did so in 1996. Along the way, BSU overwhelmed its eight league opponents, scoring an average of 51.1 points per game while owning a victory margin of 37.2 points, which broke BYU's league mark of 34.0 set in 1979. Boise State led the nation in scoring (45.6), total offense (501.5) and passing efficiency (169.4) and led the WAC in five defensive categories, with Hawkins' success recognized at the conference and regional levels as he was selected the WAC Coach of Year, and the Co-Coach of the Year for Region 4 by the American Football Coaches Association (the latter with Oklahoma's Stoops).

The Broncos appeared in the nation's top 25 late in the year, and following a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the Humanitarian Bowl, Boise State was ranked No. 12 in the final *USA Today* Coaches Poll (and No. 15 in the Associated Press ballot).

It was more of the same in 2003, as the 13-1 Broncos again appeared in the rankings in November and ended the year ranked 15th by the coaches and 16th by the Associated Press. The only setback came at Oregon State (a 26-24 defeat) in the third week of the season; the Broncos would end the year with 11 straight wins (which started a 22-game winning streak, the longest in the nation by the end of the 2004 regular season). The season was culminated by a 34-31 win over No. 19 TCU in the Fort Worth Bowl on the Horned Frogs' home turf.

Hawkins' 2003 team again produced the top offense in the nation averaging 43.0 points per game, and in the five major offensive categories in football, Boise State was ranked among the top 10 in four of them. The defense was no slouch either, as the Broncos was ranked among the top 12 in three categories (rushing defense, pass efficiency and scoring defense). Quarterback Ryan Dinwiddie was the league's Offensive Player of the Year and was one of five Broncos to be named first-team All-WAC.

Despite all those accomplishments, Boise State entered 2004 unranked, but at least on the national radar. After a 53-34 win over Oregon State in the second game of the year, the Broncos entered the rankings at No. 23 and were a regular from that point on. BSU survived scares from BYU, Tulsa and San Jose State (winning the latter 56-49 in two overtimes) to finish the regular season undefeated at 11-0 and ranked its highest ever — 10th — in both major polls (and ninth in the final BCS Standings). In one of the season's most anticipated bowl games, and arguably the most intriguing non-BCS bowl since the creation of the system some seven years earlier, Boise State dropped a 44-40 thriller to 10-1 and No. 7 Louisville in the Liberty Bowl.

That 2004 team prided itself on all-around excellence, with top rankings in all three phases of the game, placing in the top 21 nationally in nine major statistical categories including scoring (second), punt returns (third), total offense (fourth) and rushing defense (10th). BSU was ranked either first or second in 16 conference categories and had 16 players earn some kind of All-WAC recognition for a second straight year.

Important to note about the 2004 season was that it might have been Hawkins' best coaching job to date in his illustrious career. Despite returning just 10 starters from the '03 team, he guided the Broncos to their first perfect regular season since the school moved to four-year status in the 1960s. The team spent a school record 13 consecutive weeks in the national rankings and peaked at No. 7 in the BCS Standings in early November.

His final team there in 2005 went 9-4, but had only four senior starters, the lowest total among all 119 I-A schools while also playing one of the toughest schedules in school history. That squad rallied from a 0-2 start, winning nine of the final 10 games in earning a fourth straight bowl berth. Three of the four losses came at the hands of ranked teams, including Hawkins' finale in the MPC Computers Bowl, a 27-21 setback to No. 19 Boston College; the Broncos spotted BC a 27-0 lead in that game, only to see a fourth quarter rally come up just short. Despite some

inexperience at the onset, the team of largely underclassmen finished in the top 25 in eight statistical categories including scoring (ninth), sacks (17th) and rushing offense (19th).

Overall, 20 of his players at Boise State earned first-team all-WAC honors, with three earning some kind of All-American mention and 10 either being drafted or signing as free agents with National Football League teams. Including his three years as an assistant coach, Hawkins helped the Broncos to an overall record of 79-21 and six conference championships in eight years, including Big West titles in 1999 and 2000.

Hawkins' first collegiate head coaching position was at Willamette University in Salem, Ore. He took over the program in 1993 after Willamette suffered two straight losing seasons, including a 1-8 campaign the year before his arrival. He would guide the Bearcats to five straight winning seasons between 1993-97, including two appearances in the NAIA playoffs.

Under his guidance, Willamette was 39-12-1, including a 13-1 record and a runnerup finish for the NAIA National Championship in 1997. The Bearcats had finished the regular season with a No. 7 national ranking and won three playoff games, including one in overtime, to reach the title game before succumbing to Findlay (Ohio), 14-7.

He was named the 1997 District Five Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, and was selected three times as the Mount Hood League (Columbia Football Association) coach of the year. Those accolades came in 1995 when Willamette was co-conference champion, and 1996 and 1997 when the Bearcats won the outright conference title with undefeated records in league play.

Hawkins spent time as both an offensive and defensive coordinator before taking over as head coach at Willamette. In 1992, he was in charge of the Sonoma State University defense. From 1988-91, Hawkins was the offensive coordinator at the College of the Siskiyous (Calif.), helping lead the team to the Golden Valley Conference championship in 1991.

Hawkins began his coaching career with his alma mater, Cal-Davis, serving as the head freshman coach as well as the linebacker coach for the varsity in 1984. After three years at UC-Davis, he served as head coach at Christian Brothers High School in Sacramento in 1986 and 1987.

He was born November 10, 1960 in Fall River Mills, Calif., and graduated from Big Valley High School in Bieber, Calif., where he lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track. At UC-Davis, he lettered four times at fullback for coach Jim Sochor; as a junior, he was a member of UCD's NCAA Division II runner-up team.

He is married to the former Misti Rae Ann Hokanson, a registered nurse, and they are the parents of four grown children, Ashley, Brittany, Cody (a sophomore quarterback at Colorado) and Drew (a freshman at Boise State this fall).

2007 GAME SUMMARIES

GAME #1—COLORADO 31, COLORADO STATE 28 (OT)

(September 1; Denver)

DENVER — Kevin Eberhart dutifully waited for his chance playing behind two-time All-American Mason Crosby the last three seasons, and when the Colorado senior placekicker had his chance in the spotlight, he connected on field goals to force overtime and then to win the game as the Buffaloes defeated in-state rival Colorado State, 31-28.

The Buffs rallied from 11 down against the Rams, the second time in three years CU was down by that many and came back to claim the victory, both by the same final score. Crosby was the hero in 2005, and this time around Eberhart made clutch kicks from 22 yards out with 13 seconds left in regulation, and then the game winner in overtime from 35 yards after Terrence Wheatley snuffed out CSU's overtime chance with an interception in the end zone.

Both teams scored touchdowns on their first possessions, as the score was 14-14 just three minutes into the second quarter. Redshirt freshman Cody Hawkins got off to a good start, completing his first five passes, two of which went for touchdowns to Scotty McKnight and Tyson DeVree. Thing settled down a bit in the second quarter, and Eberhart's 38-yard field goal just before the halftime gun gave the Buffs a 17-14 lead heading into intermission.

CSU took its first lead of the game with an impressive opening drive in the second half, and then used the recovery of a fluke squib kickoff, which bounded off CU's R.J. Brown, to score quickly and take a 28-17 just five minutes into the second half.

From that point on, it was all CU, as the Buff defense stiffened in holding the Rams to just five first downs and 79 yards on their last six possessions. Meanwhile, Colorado inched closer as Hawkins led the Buffs on a 14-play, 86-yard march that culminated with a Demetrius Sumler 3-yard touchdown run that pulled the Buffs to within five. The CU coaches elected to go for two, which proved big after Hawkins connected with Riar Geer for the deuce to cut the lead to 28-25.

Special teams play was a deciding factor in this game, and the Buffs dominated their northern counterparts in a big way. The last blow came with two minutes left, when Chase McBride returned a punt 43 yards to the CSU 34. An interference penalty on fourth down that prevented a Patrick Williams catch moved the ball to the 14, and three plays later Eberhart made the first of his two late kicks to send the game into an extra session

Wheatley made the pick of a Caleb Hanie pass on a third-and-goal play from CU's 9-yard line, as linebacker Jordon Dizon forced Hanie to throw on the run with Wheatley in the right place to snare the pass, which was CSU's only turnover of the game.

CU ran three short yardage plays that kept the ball near the middle of the field, giving Eberhart a straighter shot at the winning points, which he made with ease.

Sumler led all CU ground gainers with 86 yards, while Hawkins completed 18-of-31 passes for 201 yards and two scores. McKnight caught eight passes for 106 yards and a score, the most receiving yards in a first career game by any Colorado receiver.

ILB Jordon Dizon racked up 22 tackles, the most by a Buffalo since 1997 (28 by Hannibal Navies versus Missouri)... WR Patrick Williams ran a reverse for 24 yards on the first play of the game, the longest rush on the first play of the season; he also owns the longest reception mark of 42 which he set in 2006 against Montana State... CU had 10 different players pile up a combined 26 special team points, one of the highest single-game totals in school history... The last six CU-CSU games have been decided by 26 points... This was the first overtime game in the series, and CU's first in a season opener; it was one of only two overtime games involving I-A/FBS teams over the first weekend. CU is now 74-39-5 in season openers, with a 9-5 mark against CSU; QB Cody Hawkins won his debut to raise the mark to 6-1 against Colorado State for CU signal callers who had their starting initiations against the Rams; Terrence Wheatley's 68-yard kickoff return in the third quarter was the longest by a Buff since Oct. 18, 2003, when Jeremy Bloom returned one 88 yards for a TD at Kansas State; Wheatley's interception in overtime gave him 10 for his career, tying him for eighth on CU's all-time pick list... Colorado scored in its 223rd straight game... Hawkins' touchdown pass to McKnight with 12:52 left in the first quarter was CU's quickest first score of the season since 1989, when Eric Bieniemy scored from a yard out against Texas just 1:15 into the game... McKnight had a great coming out party, as after suffering a broken ankle on the first day of spring practices, he rebounded to earn the top spot atop the grouping at the "Z" receiver position. He had eight receptions for 106 yards and a score, the first Buff to have a hundred yard receiving day since Evan Judge had 108 yards at Kansas State in 2005... Ten freshmen (two true) saw their first collegiate action in the game: CB Jalil Brown, WR Kendrick Celestine (true), PK Tyler Cope (true), QB Cody Hawkins, DE Marquez Herrod, WR Scotty McKnight, OG Wes Palazzi, CB Jimmy Smith, TE

GAME #2—ARIZONA STATE 33, COLORADO 14

(September 8; Tempe)

TEMPE, Ariz. — Colorado matched the game time temperature with a hot start by zooming to a 14-0 lead, but the Buffaloes cooled off as the evening progressed as Arizona State shut CU out from the first quarter on in rallying for a 33-14 victory.

The 102 degree reading at kickoff was the warmest ever in school history, and it didn't seem to bother the Buffs in the least as Terrence Wheatley picked off a Rudy Carpenter pass just under a minute into the game and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 CU lead.

Coupled with a stout early defensive performance, the Sun Devils went three plays and out three times in their first four possessions, while Colorado started three of its four drives inside ASU territory. But the Buffs struggled moving the ball and couldn't capitalize on great field position for their first six drives, which on average was the ASU 44, and managed just one score from those six opportunities, that coming on a 10-yard pass from Cody Hawkins to Scotty McKnight.

After spotting CU the two-score lead, ASU came back with 33 unanswered points in just under 17 minutes. After finally getting their wake up call, the Sun Devils started with a

19-point scoring blitz in the final four minutes of the first half to wrestle momentum away from the Buffs. Carpenter hit Michael Jones on a 12-yard scoring pass to cap a 12-play, 80-yard march to get on the board, and then pulled to within 14-13 on a 26-yard interception return by Troy Nolan, though the PAT kick sailed wide.

Following a CU punt, ASU had another crack in the half, though starting at its own 14 with 1:25 left. Using the two-minute offense to perfection and also capitalizing on a key fourth down play along the way, Carpenter drove the Sun Devils 86 yards in 71 seconds, finding Kyle Williams on a 22-yard pass play for the go-ahead score.

Arizona State used two short scoring drives for touchdowns in the third quarter to pull away from the Buffs, as both possessions started on CU's side of the 50 and took just nine plays between them.

The Sun Devils doubled up the Buffs on offense, owning a 407-204 edge in yards, and for the second straight week the opponent had as substantial advantage in time of possession (nearly an eight-minute edge for ASU). It was just the eighth time since 1993 that the Buffaloes had a two-score lead at any point in a game and didn't hold on for the win.

GAME NOTES

The 102 degree temperature at kickoff was the warmest in school history, eclipsing the 99 degrees at kick on Sept. 21, 2002 at UCLA... Arizona State became just the 11th school (out of 47 with multiple games) to win its first two games in the series with Colorado; the fourth Pac-10 team to do so, joining Oregon State, UCLA and USC... Arizona State had 12 penalties, including seven of the personal foul variety, as CU earned a school record seven first downs by penalty... All seven Colorado penalties were on the offense... CU was without the services of tailback Hugh Charles, who missed the game with a strained hamstring; the Buffs running game never got untracked, netting just 49 yards on 23 tries when allowing for sacks and kneeldowns... CU was 1-of-22 on second down trying to earn a new set of downs, quite often leaving long situations on third down tries, as Colorado was 4-of-13, with the average distance-to-go from 9 yards... DT Brandon Nicolas recorded his first career quarterback sack in the game... P Matt DiLallo's first two punts were inside-the-20 boots, as his first four of the season were such before recording a touchback on his third kick of he game... CU is now 1-3 in ASU Sun Devil Stadium, 1-2 in Fiesta Bowls and 0-1 against host Arizona State... QB Cody Hawkins suffered his first loss as a starting quarterback dating back to Pop Warner ball, as he is now 60-1... It was CU's seventh straight road games, dating back to a 30-16 loss at lowa State in 2005, its longest road losing streak since dropping 10 in a row over the 1980 and 1981 seasons (0-5 both years; CU won its last road game in '79 and their first in '82)... CB Terrence Wheatley returned a first quarter interception 35 yards for a touchdown, the second INT for a score in his career. His first came his sophomore year on Oct. 30, 2004 in Boulder when he returned one 37 yards for CU's only touchdown in a 31-7 loss to No. 8 Texas. GAME #3—FLORIDA STATE 16, COLORADO 6

(September 15; Boulder)

BOULDER — The opportunities were there for a second straight week but the Colorado Buffaloes couldn't capitalize before a "blacked-out" crowd of nearly 53,000 and a national television audience as the Florida State Seminoles escaped their first-ever trip to Boulder with a 16-6 victory.

In a game where CU dominated both the possession time and the play count on a warm night, Florida State did not wear down until late in the game, holding the Buffaloes scoreless for over 56 minutes until Colorado broke through with a touchdown to extend the nation's fifth longest active scoring streak to 225 games.

But the Cody Hawkins 11-yard pass to Tyson DeVree in the end zone, on fourth down at that, came quickly (eight plays and 71 yards in 58 seconds), but was just too late. CU got the ball back and again drove deep into FSU territory, but were rebuffed with two seconds remaining on a Tony Carter interception, his second of the game, with his theft in the end zone all but preserving the win.

The teams dueled to a scoreless tie after one quarter, but the Seminoles took command of the scoreboard in the second, using a 36-yard touchdown run by

Antone Smith to take a 7-0 lead and then a 31-yard field goal by Gary Cismesia to work to 10-0 lead. Cismesia would add field goals from 27 yards in the third and 37 early in the fourth to build a secure two-score lead for FSU.

Colorado couldn't swing momentum back its way until its final two drives in the game, though an interception by Brad Jones was ruled an incomplete pass by the Atlantic Coast Conference officiating crew, with no stoppage of the game for a review of the play. It happened on the second play of the second half, and had it been allowed, CU would have been in business inside the FSU 30.

Regardless, CU had its chances, driving four times deep into Seminole territory but could only produce the one score. Two missed field goals didn't help the Buffaloes, along with crucial wild center snaps in the shotgun that cost CU 31 yards in losses at inopportune times.

The CU defense had little to apologize for, containing Florida State to just 221 yards on offense and to 1-of-13 conversions on third down.

GAME NOTES

Florida State improved to 2-1 on the season, while the Buffs dropped to 1-2... The 8:15 p.m. kickoff was the latest in Folsom Field history, and with the game taking 3 hours and 31 minutes, the ending time of 11:46 was the latest a game ever ended in Boulder in CU annals... in any sport (the previous latest ending for football was 11:27; a women's NCAA regional game ended at 11:39 in the early 90s)... Colorado had allowed 173 yards in the first quarter in two games (86.5 per), but FSU mustered just 22 in the opening stanza... CU held the ball for 11:39 in the first quarter, only the second quarter in the first nine that the Buffs held an advantage... Matt DiLallo had his first 50-plus yard punt of the season (55 in the second quarter); it came on his 12th kick of the season (the average LOS for his punts was the CU 46; six of his first nine were inside-the-20)... The Buffaloes had 33 rushing yards in the first half, one more than for the entire game the previous week at Arizona State, but had 60 yards in losses in the second half to finish at minus-27; at one point, CU rushed nine straight times for negative yards... Two true freshmen saw action in the game WR Josh Smith (who started), and TB Brian Lockridge... The scoreless first quarter was just the second involving the Buffaloes over the last 48 games (dating back to 2003); the only other was the 2006 Kansas State game... Colorado attempted 54 passes, tied for the second most in school history; CU tried 55 against Washington State in 2003, and then later that year tossed 54 against Kansas. The 34 completions were the second most, trailing only the 38 against Kansas in '03. This was the 35th 300-yard passing game in CU history... Colorado's defense limited Florida State to 221 yards of offense on 55 plays; the Seminoles picked up 81 of them on their only two plays longer than 20 yards in the game. Of the 55 plays, 36 gained three yards or less. It was the fewest yards by an opponent since New Mexico State had 181 in Boulder on Sept. 10, 2005... Florida State

GAME #4—COLORADO 42, MIAMI-OHIO 0

(September 22; Boulder)

BOULDER — Cody Hawkins threw for two touchdowns and ran for a third as he was one of many stars on offense and defense as Colorado stifled Miami (Ohio) at every turn in defeating the RedHawks, 42-0.

The Buffaloes, unable to get anything going on the ground the previous game against Florida State, had three different players run for 90 or more yards just seven days later, picking up 359 rushing yards as a team. With Hawkins passing for 275 more, Colorado amassed 634 total yards, or 495 more than its visitors from Oxford, Ohio.

Colorado needed a fourth down pass to get on the scoreboard as time dwindled in the first quarter. Hawkins floated a 1-yard toss to tight end Tyson DeVree to open the scoring, capping a 16-play, 72-yard drive that used almost eight minutes on the clock. The Buffs came right back with an 80-yard drive to go up 14-0 early in the second quarter, utilizing a Hugh Charles 22-yard run and then a 24-yard Hawkins to Josh Smith pass to get inside the MU red zone. Demetrius Sumler knocked it in from the 1 to complete the drive.

Hawkins topped off CU's next scoring effort with a 1-yard run, and then piloted a

successful two minute drive to end the half, engineering a 10-play, 84-yard march in just 1:45 and finishing it off with a 3-yard touchdown pass to sophomore tied end Patrick Devenny, his first reception and score of his career, which also came in his first career game played.

If the game wasn't already salted away, Charles burst through the line and scored from 17 yards out to put CU ahead 35-0 with 32 seconds left in third quarter, basically sealing the outcome. Brian Lockridge polished things off with a 43-yard run with just over nine minutes left in the game.

Charles (123), Sumler (91) and Lockridge (90) combined for 314 rushing yards, helping CU to dominate in first downs (33-6) and time of possession (40:24 for Colorado).

Miami only ventured into Colorado territory three times, and had just 11 yards of offense for nine plays on the Buff side of the 50, never penetrating deeper than the CU 38-yard line. The RedHawks were held under 100 yards in both rushing (44) and passing (95) in being limited to 139 yards overall.

Colorado had 359 rushing yards in the game, the first time it topped 300 yards on the ground since going for 331 against Iowa State in Boulder on Nov. 16, 2002 (a 41-27 win) and its most since 372 at Missouri the week before (Nov. 9, 2002, a 42-35 overtime win)... Colorado's 634 yards on offense tied for its 11th most in its history, the highest team total since setting the school record with 767 against San Jose State in 1999... Colorado ran 93 plays in the game, 15 for zero yardage (11 incompletions) and four for negative yards (including the last two plays of the game on kneeldowns)... CU's 33 first downs tied for the eighth most in its history, the most since 34 against NMSU in 2005 (its 40:24 in possession time was the first 40-plus minute effort since 40:14 in that same game against the Aggies); 12 different Buffs earned first downs... Colorado's first scoring drive took 16 plays and consumed 7:48; both season highs for plays and time in a scoring drive. It's the longest time-wise since a 15-play, 75-yard drive that took 7:51 against Iowa State last year; it's the most plays since a 17-play drive (55 yards, 7:55) against Kansas in 2004... This was the first five-plus touchdown game by the Buffs in the Dan Hawkins Era, and just the second 4-TD game... Colorado topped 200 yards in both rushing (359) and passing (275), improving to 33-2 since 1989 when hitting 200 in both... The 386-yard improvement in rushing from the previous week (-27 vs. Florida State) was a school best, topping the 349 yards CU picked up between the Stanford (153) and Missouri (502) games in 1991... Colorado's defense posted its first shutout since a 34-0 win at Oklahoma State in 2005, limiting Miami to 139 yards of total offense, the lowest by an opponent since Baylor mustered just 114 yards on Nov. 13, 1999 (a 37-0 CU win in Waco). Color

GAME #5—COLORADO 27, OKLAHOMA 24

(September 29; Boulder)

BOULDER — Oklahoma scored late to pad the final score in its 2006 game with Colorado; the Buffaloes' answer a year later was the ultimate as Kevin Eberhart made a 45-yard field goal to complete the fourth biggest comeback in school history as CU dealt the No. 3 Sooners a stunning 27-24 defeat.

Eberhart's kick topped off a Colorado rally after Oklahoma had built a 24-7 lead by the middle of the third quarter, as he "sandwiched" the 20-point rally with a 41-yard field goal on the front end that had cut the lead to 24-10 with 4:10 remaining in the quarter. That was his career long, until he bested it when the Buffs needed it most. He drilled the kick as time ran out, only the fourth such instance in school history where the Buffs won on a score as time expired, and the second field goal.

In-between, Cody Hawkins threw a pair of touchdown passes, one on fourth down and the other following a muffed punt deep in the Sooner end that would eventually help CU end a 14-game losing streak to ranked teams.

For the third time in four games, Tyson DeVree snared a scoring toss from Hawkins on a fourth down play, none bigger than this one as it polished off a 62-yard march. Hugh Charles (23 yards) and Byron Ellis (12) had a pair big running plays on the drive. That cut the Sooner lead to 24-17 on the second play of the fourth quarter.

With just under five minutes remaining, Reggie Smith muffed a Matt DiLallo punt, as Gardner McKay raced down on the coverage unit to distract him enough to cough up the ball. Justin Drescher recovered at the Oklahoma 16, and three plays later, Hawkins hit Dusty Sprague with a 15-yard dart into the end zone for the tying score.

The Buffs then snuffed out the Sooners in three plays, and Michael Cohen's 45-yard line drive punt was perfect for a big return. Chase McBride delivered, returning the kick 31 yards to the midfield stripe. A 16-yard pass from Hawkins to Kendrick Celestine set CU up at the OU 35, and three running plays moved the ball eight yards closer as time ticked down to the 2-second mark, setting up Eberhart's heroics.

Oklahoma took a 7-0 lead late in the first quarter, capitalizing on the first of two D.J. Wolfe interception returns. Sam Bradford hit Juaquin Iglesias on a 13-yard touchdown pass after the Sooners took over at the CU 11. The Buffs tied it two possessions later when Hugh Charles dashed around the right side for a 25-yard scoring run. OU built a 17-7 halftime lead, the second touchdown coming on an impressive 3-play, 80-yard drive capped by a 34-yard run by Allen Patrick. A Garrett Hartley field goal capped an 11-play drive 48 seconds before intermission.

Colorado's defense shined for a third straight game, holding the Sooners to 37 points under their scoring average, as well as 332 yards below its average offense per game entering the game. OU had just 230 yards offensively, its fourth lowest total ever against a CU team; exactly half of the yards came on just four plays, meaning the potent Sooner attack spent most of the day stifled as it went three-and-out six times on the afternoon.

GAME NOTES

The Buffs snapped a 5-game losing streak to the Sooners, as Colorado's last win over OU had been a 38-24 verdict in Boulder in 1999; two of the losses came in Big 12 Championship games (2002, 2004)... The Sooners' touchdown with 1:40 left in the first quarter following an interception was the first against the CU defense in nearly seven quarters; had the Buffs reached seven full quarters, it would have marked the first time in 30 seasons CU held an opponent without a TD that long (season finale in '77, a 23-0 shutout over Kansas State, and the first three quarters of the '78 opener against Oregon)... In the first half, OU averaged 7.8 yards on first down (13 plays, 102 yards), while CU netted just 1.8 (13 plays, 24 yards); Colorado did bounce back to average 5.8 per try in the third quarter and 4.5 for the game... Colorado dominated time of possession for a second straight week (38:54, including 21:30 in the second half); that was likely a factor in CU outgaining the Sooners 219-56 after halftime... This was Dan Hawkins' first win over a ranked team at Colorado, and his third in 13 games as a head coach; his other two wins over ranked teams came against #8 Fresno State (35-30 in 2001) and #19 TCU in the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl (34-31)... Colorado improved to 7-5 in Big 12 Conference openers... Thirty-five years ago, the Buffs toppled No. 2 Oklahoma in Boulder, 20-14, in the signature anniversary game for CU in the series his year... Oklahoma had been held to 24 points or less in a half just twice in its non-conference game schedule, much less to that few in a game; the Sooners came in with 246 points and a 61.5 average, but the latter number "dropped" to 54.0... CU's rally from 17 down tied the fourth largest comeback in school history; it was the biggest in a decade, when CU came back from 18 down (35-17) at lowa State to win 43-38 on Nov. 8, 1997.

GAME #6—COLORADO 43, BAYLOR 23

(October 6; Waco)

WACO, Texas — Cody Hawkins passed for 293 yards and two touchdowns, Demetrius Sumler scored three times and Kevin Eberhart tied a school record with five field goals as Colorado raced to a 40-9 third quarter lead in coasting to a 43-23 win over the Baylor Bears.

The victory snapped a 7-game road losing streak for the Buffaloes, which had not won outside the state's borders since a 23-20 verdict at Kansas State in October 2005.

Sumler's 7-yard catch early in the second quarter was the second touchdown thrown by Hawkins and propelled the Buffs to what turned out to be an insurmountable 17-0 lead. It came after CU dominated the first period, with Hawkins and Dusty Sprague playing catch on the first possession of the game. Sprague caught three passes for 81 yards on the drive, with the last one a 26yard bullet for the game's first score. Eberhart missed his first field goal attempt early in the quarter, but came back to drill a 41-yard effort later in the quarter for a 10-0 CU lead.

Sumler scored on a 3-yard run just two plays after Ryan Walters recovered a Baylor fumble at the Bears 26-yard line. Hawkins completed a 23-yard pass to Kendrick Celestine to the three, setting up Sumler's touchdown and a 24-3 CU lead. After a Baylor touchdown, Eberhart kicked three field goals in the next six minutes to run the lead to 33-9; within that trio of kicks was a career-best 54vard kick as time expired in the first half, a play that was possible because D.J. Dykes sprinted some 30 yards up field to fair catch a short Baylor punt with just four seconds left before halftime.

The second half dragged a bit, especially since it was a hot, humid evening. Sumler added his third score on a 2-yard run midway through the third quarter to give CU its big lead at 40-9; the Bears added a couple of late cosmetic scores well after the game was decided, with Eberhart closing the Buff scoring with a 30-yard chip shot, as his first four efforts were all in excess of 40 yards.

Hugh Charles ran 19 times for 109 yards and Hawkins completed 17 of 26 passes in pacing a balanced Buffalo offense. Eberhart tied the school mark for field goals made (5), attempted (6) as well as points scored by a kicker for a game (19).

Baylor quarterback Blake Szymanski also entered the record book, as he completed 36 of 60 passes, both school marks, for 410 yards.

GAME NOTES

Colorado opened 2-0 in the Big 12 for the sixth time in the 12-year history of the conference (previously done in 1996, 1998, 2001, 2002, 2005) ... Colorado's 30-point first half was its highest since half leading Texas A&M 31-10 at intermission on Oct. 8, 2005... the 43 points were the most since a 44-13 win over Kansas that same season (Oct. 22) and were the second most points by the Buffs in the last 41 games... CU is now 19-4 the week after playing a top 5 team dating back to 1986... Colorado has now doubled its win total over last year's 2-10 mark; it's the 16th time in school history (118 seasons) that the Buffs will have at least doubled its win total from the previous season. This tied for the seventh quickest in doing so, but the second fastest in the last 75 seasons (1892, 1894, 1907, 1917, 1933, 1985)... The 60 passing attempts by Baylor were the fifth-most ever against CU (the most since Texas Tech set the record of 65 against CU in 2002); the 36 completions tied for the third most... The last team to throw for over 400 yards against CU was Colorado State, with 403 in the 2004 season opener... WR Dusty Sprague came in with eight catches for 93 yards and almost equaled the yards on CU's first scoring drive, as he caught three passes for 81 yards on CU's 7-play, 82-yard possession to open the game; he finished with five for 95 and the score... TE Nate Solder made his first career start tonight... ILB Jordon Dizon made his first interception of his career, coming in the first quarter; **DE Alonzo Barrett** had his first career interception, and the first interception by a CU defensive lineman since **DE Abraham** Wright at Oklahoma State on Oct. 1, 2005... TB Cory Nabors saw his first career action, in the first half on kickoff coverage; DT Eric Lawson played for the first time as a Buff (in the fourth quarter)... This was the 27th time in CU history the Buffaloes had a 100-yard rusher and receiver in the same game, the first time since it happened three times in 2004 (TB Hugh Charles 20-122 rush; WR Josh Smith 2-103 receiving).

GAME #7—KANSAS STATE 47, COLORADO 20

(October 13; Manhattan)

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Kansas State won the battle on every front, offense, defense and special teams, as the Wildcats gained over 200 yards rushing and passing in running away from the Colorado Buffaloes, 47-20.

K-State jumped to early leads of 10-0 and 17-3, and the Buffs were on their heels from the on-set, playing catch-up the entire evening. Though still a 10-point game after an impressive touchdown drive early in the second half, CU only had the ball one time after the first quarter needing just one score to tie or take the lead. A huge special teams play by the Wildcats sealed the verdict.

Hugh Charles' 1-yard touchdown run cut the KSU lead to 30-20 with 4:37 left in the third quarter, and the Wildcats came back with a 39-yard Brooks Rossman field goal to inch the lead back to 33-20. The Buffs stalled on their next possession, and when punter Matt DiLallo couldn't cleanly handle a low snap, K-

State's Daniel Gonzalez had an opening to block the kick, with Courtney Herndon scooping the ball up and taking it six yards for a touchdown.

Four Colorado turnovers (three interceptions) contributed to 10 KSU points along with going 2-or-14 combined on third and fourth downs kept CU from getting into any kind rhythm. Ten of CU's 16 possessions used less than 1:45 of clock time, none of which produced points. Defensively, K-State ran off a season-high seven plays of 20 or more yards against the Buffs, including the longest play from scrimmage on the year, a 68-yard James Johnson touchdown run that closed the scoring.

Despite Charles finishing the game with a career-high 171 yards, the Buffs were unable to string back-to-back wins together away from home for the first time in consecutive weeks since 1994.

CU had scored in seven consecutive quarters entering the game, extending that to 10 before being shutout in the fourth quarter... FB Jake Behrens gained 23 yards on a rush to open the game on his first career touch; his first career reception in the second quarter (1-yard) was his first collegiate touchdown... First career starts tonight were made by Behrens, TB Brian Lockridge and OT Ryan Miller... PK Tyler Cope made his sixth solo tackle on kickoff coverage in the first half, the most by any CU kicker in recent memory... QB Cody Hawkins extended a pair of school records, as he threw a touchdown pass in his seventh straight game from his career on-set, and well as an interception for the seventh straight game. The record for the most consecutive games with a touchdown pass at any time in a career is nine (Koy Detmer, the first nine games of the '96 season)... PK Kevin Eberhart made both his field goal tries to extend his streak to seven; he made the second longest of his career (50 yards) in this game... CU had a punt blocked for the first time since the Arizona State game last year; the last time an opponent scored a touchdown on a blocked punt return was in the 2005 Big 12 Championship game, when Brandon Foster recovered the ball in the end zone for a Texas touchdown... GAME #8-KANSAS 19, COLORADO 14

BOULDER — An expected offensive shootout never materialized with defense ruling the roost as the No. 15 Kansas Jayhawks left Folsom Field a winner for the first time in 12 years in dealing the Colorado Buffaloes a 19-14 setback.

Ill-timed and costly turnovers thwarted CU's chances of knocking off the 11th undefeated, ranked team at Folsom since 1989. The biggest may have come late in the first quarter, as after stopping KU cold on its first two possessions, the Buffs drove to the Jayhawk 13-yard line where Hugh Charles lost control of the ball while trying to stretch for a first down, with Kendrick Harper recovering for KU. Colorado had a sure three and may have taken it for six, setting a different tone for the game.

Instead, Kansas took over and drove to the CU 31, where Scott Webb made a 48-yard field goal to put the Jayhawks up 3-0 just 78 seconds into the second quarter. That lone score stood at halftime, as the Buffs were well into KU territory three times before the halftime gun, with only a missed field goal, an interception and an incomplete pass into the end zone to show for it.

Colorado stormed out of the lockerroom and drove 80 yards in 10 plays to open the third quarter, with Cody Hawkins executing a perfect fake "fumble" in throwing to a wide open Tyson DeVree for a 27-yard touchdown. Hawkins pretended to fumble the ball, and with several offensive linemen yelling, "Fumble!," Kansas bought it and left DeVree all by himself.

But the lead was short-lived, as KU countered with a 58-yard drive in just five plays to go

(October 20; Boulder)

up 10-7, the big play a 27-yard pass from Todd Reesing to Marcus Henry that set Kansas up at the Buff 2. Jake Sharp took it in from there, and KU moved ahead for good. Webb added a 35-yard field goal two minutes later to make the score 13-7.

The backbreaker came after CU punter Matt DiLallo pinned KU at its 6-yard line with 2:31 left in the third. The Jayhawks methodically marched 94 yards in 15 plays, converting four third down plays and using over seven minutes of possession time (7:08) with Reesing connecting with tight end Derek Fine on a 4-yard TD throw. Reesing was stopped short on a 2-point try, and the 'Hawks were up 19-7 with 10:23 to play.

After swapping three downs and out possessions, the Buffs used another 10-play, 80-yard drive to cut the lead down to five. A pair of passes from Hawkins to DeVree gained 34 yards, and then a 27-yard reception by Patrick Williams had CU in business at the KU 5. From there, Hawkins hit Byron Ellis with a 5-yard throw as he leaped into the end zone.

The game had a storybook feel to it, but it was not meant to be for the Buffs. CU stuffed KU and forced a punt, taking over at its own 42 with 2:16 left. But a sack (with a face mask that was at first called and then waved off), fumble and two incomplete passes, the last of which went in and out of Josh Smith's hands, ended the rally.

Kansas improved to 7-0 with the win, but was held well under its season averages of 50.3 points and 515.8 yards of total offense.

GAME NOTES

The 33 points were the lowest combined in the series since a 20-7 Colorado win in 1996; this marked the first time the winning team did not score at least 20 since a 17-10 CU win in 1986... CU went from 11 penalties the previous week at Kansas State (and 21 over the last two games) to four, none in the first half... Colorado averaged just 1.7 yards per first down play in the first half (15 plays, 26 yards), but came back to average 5.4 in the second (16-87)... Eleven different players earned CU's 18 first downs by rushing or passing (the 19th was by penalty)... Colorado made Kansas earn its yards in plus territory, as KU ran 33 plays on CU's side of the 50 for 127 yards (3.8 per)... KU came into the game the NCAA leader in kickoff return average (31.4), but averaged just 18.0 on two returns... **DE Alonzo Barrett** had his first quarterback sack of the season—and just CU's second in the last five games... **QB Cody Hawkins** had a touchdown pass for the eighth straight game, a CU record at the on-set of career by five(old mark was three) to move within one of the all-time record of nine, set by Koy Detmer during the 1996 season... **TB Hugh Charles** had his string of 100-yard games snapped at four, which had tied the fifth longest streak in school history; This was the 19th time that Colorado played the Sunflower State schools in back-to-back games, the sixth straight year at that; the Buffs have now dropped both games back-to-back for the second consecutive year but for just the fourth time in the 19; the Buffs have swept KU and KSU nine times in this fashion with the other six split. The two will play back-to-back again in 2008, 2009, 2012 and 2013... **PK Mason Crosby** attended the game, as the Green Bay Packer rookie traveled back to Boulder during his team's bye week... CU found out the morning of the game that former **TE Tennyson McCarty** ('97) had passed away; his body was found in the mountains, near a vehicle parked in a turnout on the Peak-to-Peak Highway northeast of Peaceful Valley. He was 32.

GAME #9—COLORADO 31, TEXAS TECH 26

(October 27; Lubbock)

LUBBOCK, Texas — In 2003, Colorado jumped to an early 14-0 lead here against Texas Tech, but couldn't hold the lead in an eventual five-point loss. Fast-forward four years later, where this time CU got up by that same score but this time did all the right things in leaving Jones AT&T Stadium with a five-point win, 31-26.

The win improved Colorado to 5-4 on the season and dramatically increased the Buffaloes' chances for a bowl invitation; it also enabled CU to sweep the three Big 12 South Division schools for the first time since 1998.

Hugh Charles rushed for 121 yards and a touchdown and caught five passes, one for a score, while Cody Hawkins threw for 123 yards and two TDs as the pair led CU's offense, which played a near-perfect game in the sense that it did not turn the ball over, did not allow a sack and had just one penalty.

But for CU to have won, it needed to neutralize the Red Raiders' high-powered offense, which came into the game ranked first overall (558 yards per game) as well as in passing (488 yards). The Buffaloes never let Tech establish any kind of consistent rhythm, harassing quarterback Graham Harrell all afternoon. Though he came close to getting his usual yardage, he threw 62 passes for 431, he was sacked three times, hurried nine times and most important, intercepted four times.

Terrence Wheatley made three of those picks, the first Buff to snare a hat-trick of interceptions in a game since 1982, with two coming in crunch time when the Red

Raiders tried to rally in the fourth quarter. He was named the Walter Camp National and Big 12 Conference defensive player of the week for his efforts.

The other theft was made by Jordon Dizon, whose 42-yard return for a touchdown early in the second half put the Buffaloes ahead, 24-6. Dizon, the nation's leading tackler, added another 12 to his stat sheet, including 10 solo.

Colorado built the 14-0 lead on its first two possessions in very workman like fashion. Charles' 31-yard run around the left side capped a 10-play, 91-yard drive for the first score, with Hawkins connecting with Riar Geer on a 2-yard fourth down pass for the second, polishing off a 12-play, 75-yard effort. All Tech could muster before halftime was a pair of Alex Trlica field goals, the second coming as time expired.

After Dizon's score, Texas Tech would never have the ball again needing just one score to tie or take the lead. After it cut the lead to 24-13, CU countered with another monster drive, one that covered 75 yards in 13 plays with Hawkins and Charles teaming up on a 6-yard TD pass and catch. TTU answered that with a score at the end of the third quarter, a Harrell to Michael Crabtree 19-yard touchdown pass that nearly was picked off by Wheatley.

Tech pulled to within the final margin with just 2:08 remaining, but CU forced that drive to take 17 plays and use up most of the remaining time, and when Tyson DeVree scooped up a Tech onside kick attempt, the win was cemented for the Buffs.

GAME #10-MISSOURI 55, COLORADO 10

(November 3; Boulder)

BOULDER — Chase Daniel threw five touchdown passes as Missouri became the first team to roll up over 500 yards of offense on Colorado in some four years as the No. 9 Tigers defeated the Buffaloes, 55-10.

The Buffs jumped out to leads of 7-0 and 10-7 but couldn't keep up with the potent Mizzou offense, as the Tigers put on a 24-point blitz in the second quarter to take a 31-10 halftime lead, then kept CU at an arm's length with 17 more in the third.

Daniel, an emerging contender for the Heisman Trophy, threw three of scoring passes in the first half, the last of which to tight end Chase Coffman built the 31-10 lead. He and Coffman then hooked up two more times in the third quarter. The only other player to ever throw for five TD's against the Buffaloes was Indiana's Tim Clifford in a 49-7 Hoosier win in Boulder in 1980.

Three Buff turnovers led to 17 Tiger points, the first with a tad bit of controversy, something not new to the series between these two. On the first play of the second quarter, CU quarterback Cody Hawkins appeared to have his arm going forward, but officials ruled a fumble on the play, giving the Tigers the ball at their own 48. Three plays later, Daniel hooked up with freshman speedster Jeremy Maclin on a 46-yard touchdown play, putting Missouri ahead for good at 14-10.

Colorado had struck first, thanks to an interception off a batted pass by defensive tackle George Hypolite. He snagged the ball at the MU 17 and returned it to the 11, where three plays later, Byron Ellis scored from two yards out for a 7-0 Colorado lead. The Tigers came right back, with Daniel hitting Martin Rucker on a short 3-yard TD pass, with the score set up by a 72-yard bomb to William Franklin to the CU 5 on the first play of the drive.

Defense then took over for both teams, as neither could do much on their next two possessions. After stopping the Tigers cold in three plays at the CU48, Alonzo Barrett blocked an Adam Crossett punt and the Buffs took over at the Tiger 37. CU picked up one first down and worked to a fourth-and-5 at the 7, where Kevin Eberhart kicked a 24-yard field goal for the 10-7 lead.

While Missouri was in the process of pulling away, the Buffs were stifled by the Tiger defense, which forced six straight three-and-outs following the Eberhart field goal. Colorado was held to a season-low 196 yards overall on offense, also a Missouri best defensively. MU had 598 total yards in running 87 plays to CU's 58.

Hawkins completed 12-of-25 passes for 100 yards and an interception, with no touchdowns for the first time in his college career. Daniel shined, as the junior was 26-of-44 for 421 yards with the five scores and one pick.

GAME #11—IOWA STATE 31, COLORADO 28

(November 10; Ames)

AMES, Iowa — It was a tale of two halves with a controversial ending as the Iowa State Cyclones rallied from a 21-0 halftime deficit to defeat the Colorado Buffaloes, 31-28.

In game that CU appeared to tie twice in the final seconds, the 21-point lead equaled the largest the Buffs had ever had in their history but did not finish with a win.

Iowa State completed a run of 31 straight points with 10 in the fourth quarter to take a 31-21 lead, its final score coming after CU's Hugh Charles' fumbled at the Buff 43; Alexander Robinson scored from nine yards out with 4:07 remaining. But the Buffs countered with a 64-yard drive in 10 plays that used just 81 seconds, with Cody Hawkins completing three passes to Dusty Sprague, including conversion throws on third and fourth down, and two to Scotty McKnight, the latter a 9-yard touchdown pass to pull CU to within three.

Colorado held Iowa State on the next possession and took over at its own 28 with 46 seconds left. A pair of 15-yard throws from Hawkins to Josh Smith set CU up at the Iowa State 42. After an incomplete pass, Hawkins hit Tyson DeVree twice, the first for eight yards but the second for just one on 3rd-and-2; with CU out of time outs and the clock running, the field goal team sprinted out onto the field, and Kevin Eberhart nailed a 50-yard kick to apparently tie the game. But the officials called a delay of game on the Buffs for snapping the ball before they signaled it ready for play, and penalized CU five yards. With the clock reset at :01, CU snapped it again

and Eberhart drilled a 55-yarder, but this time, the refs claimed CU did not snap it in time and the clock hit zero before long-snapper Justin Drescher hiked the ball.

The stage was set for the wild fourth quarter after each team had a three-touchdown period. The Buffs opened the scoring on the second play of the second quarter, with Hawkins sneaking in on a 1-yard keeper. The score held at 7-0 until Lionel Harris intercepted a Bret Meyer pass at the Iowa State 28 with 3:04 remaining, where two plays later Hugh Charles took it in from eight yards out and a 14-0 lead. The Buff defense held ISU to three downs and out with the offense taking over at the CU 8 with 1:43 left. Hawkins directed a six-play, 92-yard march, culminated with a 28-yard touchdown pass to Riar Geer on fourth down; that was set up by a 47-yard run by Brian Lockridge, CU's longest rushing play of the season.

Iowa State knotted the score in a seven-minute span in the third quarter. After taking over on the CU 43 when the Buffs came up short on fourth down, the Cyclones took just three plays to get into the end zone, as Robinson scored on a 13-yard run to close the gap to 21-7. Meyer and Todd Blythe then hooked up a two touchdown passes, the latter from 55 yards out that tied the game with 5:27 left in the period.

CU held the edge in offense, 419-351, as the Cyclones had most of their offense (191 yards) in the third quarter, simultaneously while the Buffaloes went five straight possessions without a first down.

GAME NOTES

This was the 500th road game in CU history (record of 255-227-18, 52.8 winning percentage)... It was also Coach **Dan Hawkins** 47th birthday (he dropped to 1-2 on the ol' b-day)... It was just the third time in school annals the Buffs couldn't hang on after building a 20-point or more lead; this loss matched the previous largest lead, also a 21-0 advantage at Kansas in 1950 in which the Jayhawks rallied for a 27-21 win... **Riar Geer's** 28-yard reception was the fifth by Colorado on fourth down this season, all by tight ends (his second, **Tyson DeVree** had the other three)... **S Lionel Harris** had his third career interception subbing for the injured **S Ryan Walters**; it led to a second quarter touchdown... **CB Terrence Wheatley** (foot) also did not dress, with **CB Gardner McKay** making his first career start in his place... **TB Brian Lockridge's** 47-yard run near the end of the first half was the longest by a Buff this season, besting his 43-yard TD run for a score against Miami-Ohio... The 55-yard field goal by Eberhart at the end of the game, had it been allowed, would have been a career long... **P Matt DiLallo** had only his third touchback of the season (56 punts)... **ILB Jordon Dizon** had three third down stops, as he tied school records for the most in a season (18) as well as for a career (47)... **TB Hugh Charles** had 284 all-purpose yards (161 kickoff, 83 rushing, 40 receiving) giving him 3,295 for his career, moving into sixth all-time... **Senior WR Dusty Sprague** became the ninth player in CU history to catch 100 passes, ending the day with 102 for 1,239 for his career; he also moved into the top 10 in all-time receiving yards... This marked the **233rd** consecutive game Colorado had scored in, adding to the fifth longest active streak in the nation and tying the ninth longest of all-time.

GAME #12—COLORADO 65, NEBRASKA 51

(November 23; Boulder)

BOULDER — Only one defense ever took over and it was only for quarter-and-a-half, but it was enough as Colorado used back-to-back interceptions to wrestle the lead and momentum away from Nebraska as the Buffaloes became bowl-eligible with a 65-51 win over the Cornhuskers.

On a day where the teams combined for 116 points, 1,128 yards and 54 first downs, the only zero on the scoreboard came in the third quarter when Colorado (6-6) started a run of 34 consecutive points to turn a 35-24 deficit into a 58-35 lead.

The Buffaloes game plan was to rush for 300 yards on the Husker defense, and though coming up just short with 277, CU also got 241 passing for a balanced attack that produced points in every quarter. But after barely breaking a sweat in taking a 17-7 lead late in the first quarter, Nebraska, playing its last game under coach Bill Callahan, stormed back with a 28-7 spree that had the Buffaloes on their heels.

And then Colorado's live buffalo mascot, Ralphie IV, perhaps making her final appearance at Folsom Field, led the Buffaloes out for the third quarter. The quarter CU had been outscored 123-59 coming into this game.

The Buffs earned one first down and then punted, and forced Nebraska into a third-and-12 from its 9. Husker quarterback Joe Ganz sat in the pocket and fired downfield, failing to see CU redshirt freshman corner Jimmy Smith peel off his man and make the interception. He returned his first career pick 31 yards for a touchdown and CU was within 35-31.

Then on Nebraska's very next play, Lionel Harris was in the right place at the right time to snare a tipped Ganz pass at the CU 45, returning it 32 yards to the Nebraska 23. A holding penalty backed the Buffs up 10 yards, but it was a minor inconvenience, as it took just four plays for CU to drive in for the go-ahead score, with Hugh Charles taking it in from 9 yards out and a 38-35 Buff lead.

The CU defense, which had allowed the Huskers 275 yards in the second quarter and 393 in the first half, held NU to just 40 in the third and on the Nebraska's next possession, Alonzo Barrett blocked a Dan Titchener punt. CU's Butkus Award finalist linebacker Jordon Dizon pounced on the ball and took it to the Nebraska 25, where four plays later, Charles scored again from the 1-yard line to make the score 44-35; the Buffs missed the PAT, but it would not matter in the long run.

Charles' run came after a 22-yard pass from Cody Hawkins to Dusty Sprague on a third-and-8 at the Husker 23; originally ruled a touchdown, replay review placed the ball at the half-yardline. The decision delayed CU taking a two-score lead by four seconds, and Nebraska would not be within a single score of taking the lead the rest of the way.

The Buffaloes finished their 34-point blitz with touchdowns from Scotty McKnight (a 10-yard pass from Hawkins), and a third Charles touchdown run, a 2-yard effort that put the Buffs up by 23 with just 4:16 remaining.

It was the first time in Charles' career that he scored three times in a game, one which he should remember as a fond farewell for the Folsom Field fans who chanted, "Hugh! Hugh!" much of the day. He had 327 all-purpose yards in the game (169 rushing, 125 returns, 33 receiving), the sixth-most in school history.

Nebraska rankled CU a year earlier by not taking a knee with 23 seconds remaining, scoring a cosmetic touchdown in a 37-14 win. This time around, the Huskers added two late fluff scores to avoid their fifth 20-plus point loss of the season.

And when CU got the ball back with 26 seconds left, the Buffs did the classy thing and took a knee, officially ending Nebraska's year at 5-7. For the second time in the last four seasons, a CU season-ending win has kept their rival out of the postseason, Nebraska's only two times it has remained home for the holidays since 1968.

Smith, who was one of two players subbing for injured All-Big 12 cornerback **Terrence Wheatley**, was the 14th Colorado player since 1992 to return his first career interception for a touchdown... Charles finished his career as CU's sixth all-time leading rusher with 2,659 yards, but used his all-around day to move up four notches and finish second in all-purpose yards with 3,622 for his career, trailing only Eric Bieniemy's 4,351-yard total from 1987-90... The 10th annual **Buffalo Heart Award**, presented by the "Fans behind the Bench," was awarded postgame to **ILB Jordon Dizon**; it annually goes to the senior who the fans believe has best exemplified heart, grit, determination and desire during their CU career... This was the highest scoring game in the series, eclipsing the 98 points scored six years ago to the day in a 62-36 Colorado win... GAME #13 (INDEPENDENCE BOWL)—ALABAMA 30, COLORADO 24

(December 30; Shreveport, La.)

SHREVEPORT, La. — It was a game of two halves, or rather a game of fifths. Alabama owned a commanding 27-0 lead after the first 24 minutes of play, and though Colorado dominated the last three-fifths of the game, the Buffaloes fell short in their comeback, succumbing 30-24 to the Crimson Tide in the 32nd Annual PetroSun Independence Bowl.

A pair of Leigh Tiffin field goals and three touchdown passes to three different receivers by John Parker Wilson built a 27-0 lead for Alabama with 12:20 to play in the second quarter. At that juncture, the Crimson Tide also owned staggering edges in total yards (235-27), first downs (12-1) and total plays (27-12). CU picked up one first down on its next possession but then had to punt, followed by 'Bama moving from its 20 to the CU 44 in five plays with six minutes left in the half.

Then the play that would swing momentum to CU for the first time all game occurred. Wilson had completed 13-of-15 passes to that point, but Ryan Walters intercepted his next throw at the Buff 22 and returned it to the Alabama 43. From there, the offense finally exuded some confidence and marched into the end zone in eight plays, capped by a 4-yard pass from Cody Hawkins to Tyson DeVree.

The Buffs forced Alabama to punt and took over on their own 45 with 1:11 to play in the half. Hawkins and DeVree hooked up on three straight pass plays that picked up 29 yards and had CU in field goal range at the Tide 26-yard line. Hawkins spiked the ball to stop the clock and after a 1-yard pass to Patrick Williams, CU had a 3rd-and-9 at the 25 but the clock was running under 10 seconds. The Buffs took a chance for the end zone, and it paid off when Hawkins hit a streaking Dusty Sprague for the score with just four seconds on the clock. When the smoke cleared, Hawkins completed 8-of-9 passes on the two touchdown drives that brought the Buffs to within 27-14 at halftime.

Walters' interception and increased pressure on Wilson (one sack, four hurries) threw the Tide's offense off track. UA ran just six plays for 28 yards in the third quarter, but the

Buffs couldn't capitalize. CU drove to the 'Bama 29 to open the half, but Kevin Eberhart missed a 48-yard field goal. He came back and made a 39-yard field goal that cut the lead to 10, though it was a bit of a letdown for the Buffs who had started the drive on their own 3 and had marched to the Tide 24 before a holding penalty helped stall the drive.

CU drove to the Alabama 30 on its next possession before a sack of Hawkins by Wallace Gilberry, the defensive player of the game, disrupted the drive. The teams wound up trading punts, and after CU regained possession, Hawkins was intercepted at the CU 22 by Darren Mustin. CU's defense stiffened and forced a third Tiffin field goal, but it put Alabama up 30-17 with 4:36 remaining.

The game was not over, however, as Colorado drove 69 yards in five plays in just 45 seconds. Hawkins hit DeVree for 27 yards to the 'Bama 42, and then Williams for 28 more to the 14. After two incomplete throws, he found DeVree in the back of the end zone for the touchdown, with Eberhart's PAT kick pulling CU to within one score, 30-24.

The Tide earned two first downs after CU kicked off deep, eventually punting into the end zone with one second left. From its own 20, the Buffs tried the 'ol "pass it and lateral it to whoever you can," picking up 25 yards in the process from Hawkins to Scotty McKnight, who pitched it to Daniel Sanders and he to Cody Crawford. But time ran out on CU.

Colorado rallied to outgain the Tide, 397-388, basically dominating the last 36 minutes. Hawkins (322 yards, 3 TDs) and DeVree (9-94 receiving) were CU's offensive stars, while Walters (8 tackles, an interception, one sack and one PBU) and Butkus Award runner-up Jordon Dizon (14 tackles) led the Buff defense.

Alabama took a 27-0 lead and at one point had outgained the Buffs, 271-52; CU "won" the rest of the way, 24-3, with an edge of 345-117 in total offense from late in the second quarter on... CU had 397 yards, its most ever in a bowl setback... Colorado had four penalties (for 30 yards), the fewest in a bowl since it also recorded four in the '95 Fiesta. The low is just 1, attained in the '90 Orange... With FS Ryan Walters' second quarter interception, Colorado extended its run to at least one interception in its last 14 bowl games; the streak started in the '91 Orange Bowl. Walters is the 32nd Buffalo to pick off a pass in a bowl game, and his 35-yard return was the seventh longest in CU bowl history... QB Cody Hawkins passed for 322 yards and 3 TDs, just third 300-yard passing game in school bowl history (behind 371 by Koy Detmer in the '96 Holiday Bowl and 333 by Joel Klatt in the '04 Houston Bowl)... TE Tyson DeVree caught nine passes for 94 yards and 2 TDs, with the nine receptions the second most in CU bowl annals (trailing 10 by Daniel Graham in the '02 Fiesta); his two scores tied the school record... Alabama was the first team to score on the first possession in a bowl against the CU defense since the 1996 Holiday Bowl, when Washington's Corey Dillon scored on a 2-yard run to give the Huskies a 7-0 lead just 2:56 into the game... CU has now also scored in all 28 of its bowl games in its history, and has scored in 39 of their last 47 bowl quarters, dating back to the 1993 Fiesta... The loss did cause CU to record back-to-back losing seasons for the first time in 22 years (a six-year run between 1979-84); it was the 17th longest active run in the NCAA without going below .500 two straight years.

KNOW COLORADO FOOTBALL 2008

2007 QUICK SUMMARY

Colorado had some memorable moments in 2007, though finishing with a 6-7 record, ending a run of 22 years where the Buffaloes did not suffer back-to-back losing seasons. That's the bad news; the good news is that it is obvious to all that the team made tremendous strides under second-year head coach Dan Hawkins. The season opener was a thriller, as it took overtime to knock out in-state rival Colorado State, 31-28. The Buffs then dropped tough non-league games at Arizona State and then at home to Florida State, before prepping for conference play with a 42-0 win over Miami, Ohio. The Buffs finished third in the Big 12 North, going 4-4 in league play, and that included a 3-0 mark against the Big 12 South, as the North schools ended years of domination by the South in the season series. Two of CU's most impressive outings of the season came against those rivals, none bigger than a 27-24 win over No. 3 Oklahoma in Boulder; the Buffs fell behind 24-7, but clawed their way back and won on a Kevin Eberhart 45-yard field goal as time ran out. A month later, CU ventured into Lubbock where it had never won in four outings but would leave with a 31-26 win over Texas Tech. CU wrapped the regular season with a 65-51 win over Nebraska, earning an Independence Bowl bid in the process against Alabama. The Crimson Tide stormed to a 27-0 lead, but once CU collected itself, it outscored 'Bama 24-3 over the last two-and-a-half quarters (limiting Alabama to 115 yards in that stretch), but fell just short in losing, 30-24. Senior inside linebacker Jordon Dizon was a consensus All-American, and finished as the runner-up for the Butkus Award, while cornerback Terrence Wheatley and defensive tackle George Hypolite joined Dizon as first-team All-Big 12 performers.

COACHING STAFF INTACT

There were no changes in CU's full-time coaching staff this off-season, as the same 10 full-time coaches will return for the 2008 season. This is the first time since the 1989 season that the full-time coaching staff remained intact, as Colorado's '88 and '89 staffs were identical. At least one change occurred in every year between 1989 and 2007, for a variety of reasons: several assistants were named head coaches, others moved on to the National Football League, in two cases there were deaths (Ben Gregory, Tom McMahon), and of course the two head coaching changes in the period provided for the most overhaul.

BIG 12 MEDIA DAYS—This year's Big 12 Conference Football Media Days will take place July 21-23 in Kansas City; Colorado is scheduled on Tuesday, July 22, between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. **Dan Hawkins** and three players (**DT George Hypolite**, **C Daniel Sanders** and **FS Ryan Walters**) will be in attendance.

RALPHIE IV

Colorado's latest live mascot, **Ralphie V**, made her debut at CU's spring game on April 19. As with Ralphie IV, she was donated to CU from a Ted Turner ranch, this time from Vermejo Park Ranch in Northern New Mexico. She was born in October 2006 and was named "Blackout" by CU's Ralphie Handlers as she was the darkest calf in the herd. Now a year-and-a-half old, she weighs in the 700-750 pound range and is lightning fast (she should grow to 1,300). Ralphie program directors **Ben Frei** and **Kevin Priola** worked with **Barney Coppedge** the Bison Manager at Vermejo to bring Ralphie V to Colorado. They continue to supervise the housing and training of both Ralphie IV and Ralphie V. **Gail Pedersen**, assistant to athletic director **Mike Bohn**, coordinates the entire Ralphie program for the athletic department. **Ralphie IV** is not officially retired by any means; she will make some special appearances which could include returning to lead the team on the field for a special game or two.

POSITION CHANGES / NON-RETURNEES

There were a few position changes during spring drills: safeties **Kyle Black** (Soph.) and **Jason Espinoza** (Fr.-RS) both moved to wide receiver, while **Nate Solder** shifted from tight end to offensive tackle.

Ten players will not return from the 2007 squad for assorted reasons: WR Alvin Barnett, ILB R.J. Brown, PK Tyler Cope, OL Joe Fruechtel, OG Kai Maiava, ILB Greg McCudden, OL Wes Palazzi, DE Chris Perri, PK Justin Simmons and WR Jarrell Yates. Brown's career is done due to medical reasons (concussions); Cope, a walk-on, could no longer afford to attend CU and will attend college in his home state of Oregon; Fruechtel, McCudden and Simmons were also walk-ons. Maiava moved to fullback but only practiced there sparingly before being dismissed from the team in April.

IN THE POLLS

Colorado was not ranked in the final regular season *Associated Press* (media) or *USA Today Coaches* polls of 2007 and was last ranked in 2005, when the Buffs peaked at No. 21 in the November 6 coaches' ballot (No. 22 in the AP and Harris Interactive), but dropped out after a Nov. 12 loss at Iowa State. CU was ranked three times in 2005, reaching No. 18 in the BCS Standings at one point (Nov. 6) and had returned to the polls after a 25-month hiatus on October 9. Dating back to the 1989 preseason, CU has been ranked in **185** of the last **310** polls (*AP*; 60%), which includes a tremendous run of 143 consecutive between 1989 and 1997 (the 10th longest streak of all-time). CU has been ranked **292** times in its history, the 21st most all-time. Since 1989, CU has played the fourth most ranked teams in the nation (95), trailing Florida (105), Florida State (99) and Michigan (98).

SPRING ATTENDANCE

Former head coach **Bill McCartney** challenged the 1,500-plus in attendance at CU's annual recruiting luncheon in Denver (Feb. 7) to help fill Folsom Field for the spring game. He asked for everyone to stand up who would work hard to bring 50 people with them, and CU promoted the game for a month and timed advertising on radio and TV to heat up in the 10 days prior to the game. The result fell short of filling the stadium but did produce a CU spring record crowd of 17,800. That was the 26th largest crowd for a spring game in the nation; a survey of FBS schools produced 108 that supplied an attendance figure: the national average worked to **12,996**; take out the top 10 and the bottom 10, the 88 in the middle averaged **9,589**. Forty-two schools drew 10,000-plus, with 66 under that figure, and the median number was 6,000. 20TH BEST IN THE NATION SINCE 1989

Colorado has the nation's 20th best record over the last 19 seasons, or since the start of 1989, CU has posted a **148-81-4** record. From opening 1-0 in '89, through the 10th game of the 2005 season, the Buffs owned one of the top 10 overall records in the nation (<u>247 consecutive weeks</u>); that was snapped with a loss to Nebraska late in 2005. HISTORICALLY

Colorado is in its second century of intercollegiate football, as the Buffaloes wrapped up their 118th season of competition having played **1,113** games with an all-time record of **658-419-36**. CU currently stands 17th on the all-time win list and is 23rd in all-time winning percentage (.607; 21st for those schools with at least 50 seasons in Division I-A). Only Texas, Oklahoma and Nebraska from the Big 12 rank ahead of CU on each list, and only 12 Division I schools have played more seasons of intercollegiate football than Colorado. In Boulder, the Buffs are **285-139-10** in 84 seasons on the "hilltop" (Folsom Field). Against Big 12 opposition, CU is **249-216-13** against the other 11 members of the conference, formed in 1996.

ROAD-SWEET-ROAD: BUFFS 12TH BEST IN ENEMY STADIUMS SINCE '88

The Buffaloes have enjoyed a lot of success on the road over the last 20 seasons. CU has been victorious 59 of the last 98 times in enemy stadiums with a **59-38-1** overall road record (a 60.7 winning percentage) since the start of the 1988 season. That stands 12th nationally (ninth in raw wins) and third among Big 12 Conference teams in this span; only 11 schools have won 60 percent of their away games in this time frame. During this time frame, CU won a school record 10 straight road games between 1994 and 1996. The Buffaloes own a **48-26-1** mark in their last 74 road conference games (Big 8 & Big 12—six losses at Nebraska, three at Kansas State, two at Iowa State, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and Texas Tech; and one each at Baylor, Oklahoma State and Texas A&M; the tie was at K-State in 1993). CU is **23-25** on the Big 12 road since 1996 (**2-2** in 2007). The chart to the right does not include neutral site games, despite some being anything but (i.e., Colorado vs. Texas at Irving for the '01 Big 12 title.)

THE BUFFALOES IN THE BIG 12

The Big 12 Conference has wrapped its 12th season, and the Buffaloes are tied for the second most division titles won with four, trailing only Oklahoma's six. Just seven of the schools in the conference have won a division title, with Missouri the first "newbie" to do so in six years. A closer look:

- ⇒ Big 12 Division Titles (including 2007): Oklahoma 6, Colorado 4, Nebraska 4, Texas 4, Kansas State 3, Texas A & M 2, Missouri 1.
- ⇒ Big 12 Championship Game Records: Oklahoma 5-1, Nebraska 2-2, Texas 2-2, Texas A & M 1-1, Kansas State 1-2, Colorado 1-3, Missouri 0-1.

CU VS. THE BIG 12 NORTH: Colorado owns the best record in intra-division competition going back to the start of the 2001 season against Big 12 North Division rivals, as the Buffaloes are **22-13**; other records: Nebraska 21-14, Kansas State 19-16, Missouri 16-19, Kansas 14-21 and Iowa State 13-22. Colorado is **13-5** at home in this stretch versus the North, the only losses to NU (2003, 2005), KSU (2006) and KU and MU (2007).

THE VERTICAL GAME

Dan Hawkins noted that one thing missing from CU's offense his first season in 2006 that was prevalent of his past offenses at Boise State was the vertical passing game. "By the end of the season, we'd always be up in the 70s or 80s in the number of pass plays over 20 yards," he said. He was definitely on mark with his assessment. In 2006, CU had just 35 total, 18 rushing and 17 passing, the Buffs' fewest overall 20-yard plays since 2000 (38) as well as pass plays of 20 yards or more since 2002 (23, also the last time CU had a quarterback quit the team after the season began). Colorado did have 18 rushing plays of 20 yards or more, and while not an overly large number, it was its most since 2002 and higher than nine of the totals in the 13 season snapshot below. In 2007, CU had 58 plays of 20 yards or longer (66 percent more than last season, more than doubling the pass play count). Here's a look at CU's 20-plus plays in recent memory, going back to 1994, when CU had a high of 76 plays over 20-yards, almost equal in nature (37 rush, 39 pass):

Most improved offenses

Colorado gained 1,027 more yards on offense in 2007 than it had in 2006; it was just the third time in school history the Buffs gained over 1,000 yards more on offense than the previous season, joining the 1957 and 1999 teams that also did so in the same number of games. The '57 team gained 1,167 more yards then the '56 team, and the '99 Buffaloes picked up 1,093 on the '98 squad. Nationally, it turned out to be not all that common, as just 20 teams turned the trick this past fall. Here's a look at teams that have to date gained over 1,000 yards than they did in 2006, provided they played as many or fewer games this season as last year (*—denotes one more game in 2006 than thus far in 2007):

TWENTY-EIGHT SEE FIRST CU ACTION IN 2007

A total of 28 players stepped on to the field wearing a Colorado Buffalo uniform for the first time in 2007. Twelve players had their first taste of collegiate action in the opener against Colorado State, with three more hitting the field for the first time at Arizona State and two others in game three against Florida State. In game four, the floodgates opened again with seven players making their first appearance. In 2006, 19 players saw their first action, with 14 taking the field for the first time in the opener; 16 saw their first action in 2005 while 24 did so in both 2004 and 2003. EIGHTEEN PLAYERS MAKE FIRST CAREER START IN 2007

Eighteen players made their first CU career starts in 2007 (12 offense, 6 defense). Five came in the opener: **QB Cody Hawkins, WR Scotty McKnight, OG Wes Palazzi** and **TB Demetrius Sumler** and one on defense, **SS Daniel Dykes**. At Arizona State in game two, **ILB Jake Duren** was in for the first play, and against Florida State in CU's home opener, **ILB R.J. Brown, TE Joe Sanders** and **WR Josh Smith** were out there for the first play. **ILB Jeff Smart** made his first start against Miami-Ohio in game four, just days after he was awarded a scholarship. **WR Kendrick Celestine** and **OG Kai Maiava** trotted out there for the first play against Oklahoma in game five, while **TE Nate Solder** did the same at Baylor. **FB Jake Behrens, TB Brian Lockridge** and **OT Ryan Miller** made their first starts at Kansas State. Later in the year, **CB Gardner McKay** and **DE Chris Perri** got the opening nods in the lowa State game. Twenty-four players made their first career starts in 2006, the third-most over the last 23 seasons (15 offense, nine defense). The 24 first-time starters in 2006 were the third-most over the last 23 seasons and were the most since 1998, when there were 27 first-time starters for the Buffaloes, 17 on offense and 10 on defense. The high came in 1984, when 29 made their first starts (15 on offense). 3-0 VERSUS THE BIG BAD SOUTH

The North Division schools have taken their lumps, not only in games but also publicly, but perhaps things are changing; they are for Colorado. The 31-26 win at Texas Tech gave the Buffaloes a season-sweep against the South Division, the third time CU has done so. This was the eighth time in 12 years that CU won the season series with the South schools. Colorado is 21-15 all-time against the South in the regular season, the best mark of any North Division team. The Buffs also have won the season series against the South in 1996 (3-0), 1998 (3-0), 1999 (2-1), 2000 (2-1), 2001 (2-1), 2002 (2-1) and 2005 (2-1). Seems some had forgotten that the North was the dominant division in this league at the on-set, and these things are in fact cyclical; thanks to CU and Kansas (which also went 3-0), the North won the season series over the South by two games (10-8), its first claim on inter-division play since 2001.

SPRING GAME ATTENDANCE

It started in February when former CU head coach **Bill McCartney** challenged the 1,500-plus in attendance at CU's annual recruiting luncheon in Denver (Feb. 7) to help fill Folsom Field for the spring game. While filling Folsom didn't happen, the 17,800 in attendance did set a spring record. CU has now had 10,000 or more fans four times attend its final spring scrimmage/game, with the previous best prior to this year of 13,642 in 1989 when many came out to honor **Sal Aunese**, the CU quarterback stricken with stomach cancer the previous month. The next two games drew 11,336 and 10,382 respectively. The national average worked to **12,996**; take out the top 10 and the bottom 10, the 88 in the middle averaged **9,589**. Forty-two schools drew 10,000-plus, with 66 under that figure, and the median number 6,000. CU's crowd ranked 26th in the nation, as just over 1.4 million fans turned out to watch football in the spring. One of the most prestigious teams is the *Long Beach Press-Telegram's* Best-In-West squad, which the paper started selecting in 1977. The first-team consists of 20 top players from the Mountain and Pacific Time zones (and Alaska and Hawai'i). When all was said and done, USC plucked off six of the 20; next on the list? Colorado. CU signed four/three off the list: **TB Darrell Scott** (ranked first, the top point getter, receiving 208 out of a possible 210), **ILB Lynn Katoa** (No. 6 on the list), **ILB Jon Major** (No. 17) and **OT Bryce Givens** (No. 20). Four schools snared two, Arizona State, Notre Dame, UCLA and Washington, with Arizona, and BYU and Texas signing one each.

Colorado five-instate recruits all were members of the All-Colorado teams by the *Rocky Mountain News* and/or *Denver Post...* Colorado inked players from nine states overall, with the last two classes representing 15 different states (16 total in **Dan Hawkins**' three classes)... After being shutout in Texas last year (for the first time since 1983), the Buffs landed two from the Lone Star State this time around... Here are some quick tidbits about the **21** members of this year's recruiting class:

WR Chance Blackmon is not used to losing; high school, Tatum (Texas), went 42-4 during his three years as a member of the varsity... DL Curtis Cunningham had a 4.2 grade point average, on a 4.0 scale, during the fall semester of his senior year while playing football. Wow... OL Ryan Dannewitz has done something most people wish they've had the chance to: visit the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. ... PK Jameson Davis signed on to play football at Boise State for Hawkins in 2005, but left shortly thereafter to serve his two-year Mormon Mission is Guatemala; they did not have a scholarship for him upon his return and he chose to seek out Hawkins and special teams coach Kent Riddle at Colorado.

TE Ryan Deehan had the kind of unwanted media attention no one would desire; his family lost their Poway, Calif., home to the Southern California wildfires and once it was found out he was a highly touted recruit, the media descended on him. Many of his teammates as well as schoolmates were affected by the fires, but Poway found the resolve to go 12-0 and win the CIF San Diego area title. The last recruit from Poway was a decade ago, as ILB Drew Wahlroos signed in the 1998 class... **S Vince Ewing** is the first Buff from Carlsbad (Calif.) High School since eventual Butkus Award runner-up Ted Johnson signed in the spring of '91... **OT Bryce Givens**' father pitched two seasons in the major leagues with the Milwaukee Brewers (Brian Givens); the younger Givens doesn't have a fastball, but he has pancakes: 150 of them over his last two years as a prep.

QB Tyler Hansen is from a quarterback family, as his father played at San Diego State between 1978 and 1983; the younger Hansen was a "1-star" recruit until the services noticed Michigan and Iowa got interested in him after Colorado found him out; he jumped to a "3-star" prospect somehow in early July without playing a game... **DB Steven Hicks** will be reunited with his cousin this October 4 in Boulder, as Nic Redwine is a senior fullback with the University of Texas... **ILB Lynn Katoa** is the first prep recruit from Utah to sign with Colorado since 1991 (DT Kerry Hicks/Salt Lake City Highland); he was the lone member of the high school signees to graduate early and enroll in classes and thus will participate in spring drills... S Patrick Mahnke was the first commit of Colorado's 2008 class, pledging to the Buffs in early June 2007.

ILB Jon Major is CU's first recruit from Ponderosa since 1999 (ILB Dryden Dunsmore); along with Cunningham, he is one of two Colorado Chapter/NFF Scholar-Athletes in the class. Both will be honored February 18 at the Denver West Marriott in Golden... **B Shaun Mohler** was the only junior college transfer signed in this year's class; that's the fewest since the 2004 class had a single JUCO... **TE Will Pericak** will attend CU on a football scholarship; the school practically "owes" him that as he has an older brother (Tom) and sister (Zoe) who already attend CU. His mother, Wynn, is the assistant to the vice president of administration for the CU system (Leonard Dinegar).

Pericak took Dan Hawkins' often-said advice of getting out of one's comfort zone; on New Year's Day, with his sister and a friend, he took part in the annual Polar Bear Plunge at Boulder Reservoir (it was about 22 degrees)... **TB Ray Polk's** father, Ray Sr., played four times against the Buffaloes while a member of the Oklahoma State football team between 1981-84; CU faces the Cowboys for the first time since 2005 on November 17.

If LB Douglas Rippy challenges you to a game of basketball with his cousins, you'd better bring Allen Iverson with you. He has three cousins who are or have played Division I college basketball: Chris Wright is a freshman forward at Dayton; James Davis signed a letter of intent to play at Toledo beginning this fall; and Greg Moore played at Cincinnati... Rippy and TB Rodney Stewart are the first high schoolers from Ohio to sign with the Buffs since 1996 (CB Ben Kelly/Mentor Lake Catholic, Solon)... TB Darrell Scott scored 99 career rushing touchdowns; couldn't they have found him one more somewhere?... OL Maxwell Tuioti-Mariner's cousin, Pisa Tinoosamoa is a linebacker for the St. Louis Rams... ATH Paul Vigo has an impressive resume in community relations work, and is also an avid boxer... TE Ryan Wallace has something in common with CU quarterback Cody Hawkins; in high school, Wallace's head coach was his father, Kevin.

SCORING STREAKS

The Buffs have scored in a school record 235 consecutive games, last being shutout on November 12, 1988 by Nebraska in Lincoln (7-0). CU has scored in 124 straight games at home (last shutout: a 28-0 loss to Oklahoma on Nov. 15, 1986 in a game where the Sooners did not *attempt* a single pass). The Buffs have scored in 92 consecutive road games (120 including neutral sites). The Buffs have scored in 150 straight league games (all 100 in Big 12 play, including the four title games, and their final 50 in Big Eight competition, dating back to the '88 shutout at Nebraska). CU has scored in 125 straight games against non-conference opponents (last shutout: a 44-0 loss at home to LSU on September 15, 1979). The home shutout losses to Oklahoma in '86 and LSU in '79 are the only two times CU has not scored at Folsom Field over the course of the last 263 games (all the way back to 1963). CU has been shutout just seven times in its last 466 games (dating to October 5, 1968), but only four schools have administered them: Oklahoma (three times), Nebraska (twice), Louisiana State and Michigan. *Big 12 Conference Consecutive Game Scoring Streaks (through 2007):* Colorado 235, Nebraska 151, Kansas State 140, Texas Tech 130, Oklahoma 121, Kansas 63, Missouri 63, Iowa State 51, Texas A&M 51, Texas 46, Oklahoma State 33, Baylor 11. CU is the last team to shutout both Kansas State (12-0 in 1996) and Oklahoma State (34-0 in 2005).

SCORING STREAKS II

ANATOMY OF THE SCORING STREAK

Colorado has more often than not extended its scoring streak rather quickly. In the 235-game run, CU has scored on its first possession 94 times, plus another three occasions where it scored on returns on its first touch of the game. The Buffs have scored in the first quarter 163 times during the streak, and had it extended by halftime 213 times. A closer look (*—includes score on a kickoff return to start the 1998 Aloha Bowl; an interception return prior to the first offensive possession in the 2002 Alamo Bowl; and an interception return for a score on the first touch against Arizona State in 2007):

Colorado has a **150-81-4** record during the scoring streak, averaging **35.6** points in the wins and **16.2** points in the losses (and 23.5 the four tied games). The Buffs have had only nine occasions where they were delayed extending the streak in the fourth quarter.

SCORING DUEL JUST 25 MILES APART

Colorado has scored in 235 straight games dating back to 1988; down the road, the NFL **Denver Broncos** have scored in 245 consecutive contests, the longest active streak in the professional ranks, one which dates back to 1992. Their fiercest rivals inflicted the last shutouts of each: Nebraska and the Raiders (then in L.A.). Combined, the pair has scored in 480 straight games. Many traits are eerily similar; the Broncos have extended it on their first possession 96 times in the first quarter 161 times and by halftime on 233 occasions, although have had to wait to extend it in the fourth quarter just twice.

And if you add in Air Force's streak of 181 games, the Front Range trio has a 661-game streak going among them through games of the 2007 season.

TV LAND

Colorado has had **148** of its last **221** games dating back to 1990 broadcast nationally or regionally (67 percent). That included 11 games in 2007, seven in 2006, 10 in 2005, nine in 2004, seven in 2003, 12 in 2002, 10 in 2001, plus 7 in 2000, 9 in both 1998 and 1999, 10 in 1996 and 1997. Since 1996, when the Big 12 began, **111** of CU's **148** games have been either nationally or regionally televised, an impressive 75 percent (the second most in the Big 12 Conference in that time frame). In addition, CU has had **24** of its last **29** non-conference games televised on a national or regional basis.

CAPITAL RETURNS

CU's success often correlates directly with if it owns a hefty margin in return yards, as was the case in the 2001, 2002 and 2004 seasons—when the Buffs won the Big 12 North. The Buffs had advantages of **854-417** (2001), **803-607** (2002) and **574-499** (2004) in return yards, which includes all return yardage other than those on kickoffs (in 2006, the opponent had the upper hand at **390-277**, but for 2007, CU had **677** and owned a **269-yard** edge on the enemy). And the Buffs have **41** return and/or non-offensive touchdowns over the last nine seasons (37 regular season, four bowl game), tied for the seventh most in the nation for this span. GRADUATION STAT(U)S

Fourteen of CU's 17 seniors on the 2007 roster graduated by May 2008: PK Kevin Eberhart (Aerospace Engineering) and TE Joe Sanders (Ethnic Studies) graduated in May '07, with four earning their degrees in December: TE Tyson DeVree (Education), OT Edwin Harrison (Communication), OT Tyler Polumbus (Business Management), WR Dusty Sprague (Business Management). Eight more earned degrees in May '08: DE Alonzo Barrett (Sociology), TB Hugh Charles (Sociology), ILB Jordon Dizon (Economics), TB Byron Ellis (Integrative Physiology), SS Lionel Harris (Sociology), FB Samson Jagoras (Integrative Physiology), WR Chase McBride (Geography) and WR Stephone Robinson (double in Business Management & Sociology); and in addition, Eberhart earned his master's in Aerospace Engineering. CB Terrence Wheatley (Economics), WR Alvin Barnett (Ethnic Studies) and QB Bernard Jackson (Ethnic Studies) are candidates for next summer; Wheatley is very close, but took the semester off to train for the draft.

NOTE: Over the last six years (2002-07), CU has had 110 of its 128 seniors, including medicals, graduate; that translates to 85.9 percent (with six of the 18 non-grads still in school and looking to graduate within the next year, while four are in the NFL). NCAA numbers will not match these (it doesn't allow a school to count transfers who graduate, i.e., Wayne Lucier ('02), WR Mike Duren ('04) and DeVree, Jagoras and McBride in '07, but it does count against a school if it had a player transfer. It's one of the reasons the numbers are skewed to be lower than they really are, especially at tougher academic schools like Colorado.
