

CU earns rare win on links

Women's golf team victorious for fourth time in program history

AUSTIN, Texas -- For just the fourth time in the 14-year history of the Colorado women's golf program, the Buffs left a tournament as winners Monday.

CU finished with a three-round score of 928, one better than Texas Tech and Texas State, at the Texas State Challenge at Wolfdancer. The tournament was the last of the fall season for the Buffs.

"Although the win came as a bit of a surprise, I am very proud of the team," Colorado coach Anne Kelly said. "We had a frustrating finish to the second round but they all kept fighting. Even though it felt like we weren't having a very good day, they all hung in there and that was key. Everyone helped in the win and didn't give up."

Freshman Emily Childs led the way for CU, finishing sixth. Childs was in fourth after two rounds, but dropped back after a final-round 77. Despite the rough round, she was just six strokes out of the lead and still managed to record her third top-10 finish of the season.

"I didn't play my best in this tournament, but I was able to keep it together and I am happy that I made the top-10," Childs said.

Fellow CU freshman Emily Talley finished in a tie for 11th place. Talley also wrapped up the fall portion of the season with three top-10 finishes.

Junior Dominique Pytlewski finished in a tie for 24th, while Stephanie Simich (42nd) and Christine Kim (45th) rounded out the scoring for the Buffs.

As a team, CU finished with four top-five performances in the fall. The Buffs finished sixth in the other tournament they played, marking the first time since the 2004-05 season that CU placed in the top 10 in all its events.

The Buffs will have a long break, but hope to build on their victory during that time for next semester's first tournament, the San Diego State Spring Invitational on Feb. 15.

"Although we aren't com-pletely satisfied with how we played, it's always fun to win and we will try and use that energy to keep them working over the off season and get ready for the spring," Kelly said. "We have some great tournaments lined up and we will be looking forward to getting back out there."

CU women earn golf title

Behind freshman Emily Childs' sixth-place finish, the University of Colorado women's golf team won the season-ending Texas State Challenge at Wolfdancer Golf Club near Austin, Texas, on Monday.

Childs carded a three-round, 11-over-par 227 on the 6,141-yard course. Texas Tech's Megan Dowdy and Iowa State's Victoria Stefansen tied for medalist honors at 5-over 221. Colorado's team score of 928 was one stroke better than second-place Texas Tech and Texas State. It was the Buffaloes' fourth tournament victory in their 14-year history.
