Extra Points

The KU defense ranks third in the Big 12 allowing the opposition to convert on 29.1 percent of its third down chances. Opponents have converted 34-of-117 third down tries.

The KU defense ranks third in the Big 12 by allowing 112.2 rushing yards per game. KU has held three different opponents to less than 65 total rush yards. Only Oklahoma (85.6 ypg) and Nebraska (93.2 ypg) have been better at stopping the run.

KU linebacker Nick Reid ranks second in the Big 12 with 10.4 tackles per game. He is just one of two Big 12 players who average more than 10 tackles per contest. He is also third in the conference with an average of 1.19 tackles for loss per contest.

Saturday's game against Colorado marks the second time in KU's last six games that the Jayhawks will square off against a team that did not participate in a bowl game last year. In all, eight teams that saw action in bowl contests a year ago highlight the 2004 KU football schedule. KU opponents coming off bowl appearances in 2003 include Tulsa (Humanitarian Bowl), Northwestern (Motor City Bowl), Texas Tech (Houston Bowl), Nebraska (Alamo Bowl), Kansas State (Fiesta Bowl), Oklahoma (Sugar Bowl), Texas (Holiday Bowl) and Missouri (Independence Bowl).

Cornerback Charles Gordon has four interceptions this year. Only one other Jayhawk (Remuise Johnson, 6) has had more picks in a season for the 'Hawks since 1985.

Scene Setter

The University of Kansas (3-5, 1-4 Big 12) football team returns home for the first time since Oct. 9 when the team hosts Colorado (4-4, 1-4 Big 12) on Nov. 6. Kickoff against the Buffaloes is scheduled for 12:30 p.m. from KU's Memorial Stadium. The Jayhawks are 3-1 at home this season and are outscoring the opposition by an average of 17.2 points per game on their home turf.

The Jayhawks are coming off a 13-7 loss at Iowa State despite holding the Cyclones to just 192 yards of total offense (141 rushing, 51 passing) in the game. ISU parlayed two field goals and a defensive touchdown (30 yard fumble recovery) into the victory. KU scored its first touchdown with 3:04 remaining in the fourth quarter and was driving in the game's final minute before an Iowa State interception sealed the game for the Cyclones.

Colorado enters the game against Kansas on the heels of a 31-7 loss at the hands of Texas on Oct. 30 in Boulder, Colo. The Buffaloes took a 7-0 lead on a 37-yard interception return by Terren Wheatley in the first quarter, but the Longhorns scored 31 unanswered points in the second and third quarters to grab the win.

The Coaches

KU head coach Mark Mangino (11-22, .333), who was a driving force in the successful turn-around of two Big 12 Conference football programs prior to his arrival in Lawrence, is in his third season as head football coach at the University of Kansas. Last year, Mangino led the Jayhawks to their first bowl appearance since 1995 when the team faced North Carolina State in the Mazda Tangerine Bowl.

Behind a solid work ethic and attention to detail, Mangino's plan to resurrect the Kansas football team is paying dividends. His eye for talent has shone brightly as each of the last two Big 12 Offensive Newcomers of the Year have been represented by Jayhawk football players -- quarterback Bill Whittemore in 2002 and center Joe Vaughn in 2003.

Colorado is coached by Gary Barnett (38-32, .543), who is in his sixth season as the team's head coach. Prior to his arrival in Boulder, Barnett spent seven years as the head coach at Northwestern where he led the Wildcats to two of their first three bowl appearances in school history. He led Northwestern to a 35-45-1 record during his stay in Evanston and is 81-85-2 all-time as a head coach.

A Quick Look at Colorado

Colorado (4-4, 1-4 Big 12) heads into the matchup against the Jayhawks after falling to Texas 31-7 last week in Boulder, and has lost four of its last five games. CU averages 21.8 points per game and has allowed an average of 23.8 points per contest. Quarterback Joel Klatt has completed 134-of-222 passes for 1,454 yards and five touchdowns. Running back Bobby Purify is CU's primary rusher as the senior has run for 673 yards on 137 carries. Three different Buffaloes -- linebacker Jordon Dizon, defensive back Dominique Brooks and linebacker Brian Iwuh lead the CU defense.

Kansas - Colorado Series Notes

This year's game marks the 57th consecutive meeting (starting in 1948) and 65th overall between the two schools ... KU and CU also played seven other times prior to World War II ... Colorado holds an all-time 39-21-3 advantage ... The team with the most rushing yards in the game has won each KU-CU contest since 1993, a streak of 11 games ...

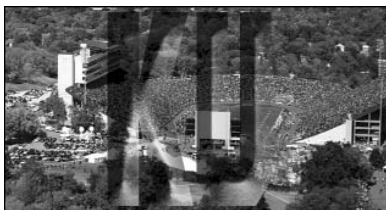

In six of the last seven games, the home team has walked away with the win ... The last Kansas victory in Lawrence occurred in 2000 when the Jayhawks defeated the Buffs, 23-15 ... KU is 13-16-3 all-time against the Buffs in Lawrence.

Getting Started on the Right Foot

No team in the Big 12 conference has played better in the first quarter of games this season than the Kansas Jayhawks. The KU defense has not allowed a first quarter touchdown all season and the Jayhawks are outscoring the opposition 51-8 in the first stanza.

Barmann's Numbers

Kansas quarterback Adam Barmann has completed 54 percent of his pass attempts this season and currently ranks fifth in the Big 12 in touchdown passes (12) and eighth in passing yards per game (178.4). At Nebraska on Oct. 2, Barmann aired out a career-high 49 pass attempts. At Northwestern on Sept. 18, Barmann recorded career-bests with 30 pass completions and, on Sept. 11 against Toledo, Barmann completed 24-of-34 passes for a career-best 310 yards while tying a career mark with four touchdowns. He has thrown a touchdown pass in all but two games this season and has four multiple touchdown contests.

Swanson Continues To Make Strides

Kansas quarterback Jason Swanson made the most of his playing time against Kansas State on Oct. 9 as he completed four-of-seven pass attempts for 52 yards and a touchdown in the fourth quarter while leading the Jayhawks to a come-from-behind victory over the Wildcats. Last week at Iowa State, Swanson completed a career-best 7-of-14 pass attempts and also collected a career-best 45 yards rushing in the game. Swanson, a native of San Diego, Calif., has seen action in five games this season.

Receivers Making Plays

Wide receiver Brandon Rideau's numbers last season were solid for a player who only had 29 receptions and one touchdown after his first two years on campus. He finished the 2003 season with 51 catches, 677 yards and six touchdowns. On Oct. 30 against Iowa State, Rideau had a pair of receptions and moved into a tie for second place on KU's all-time receptions list with 117 career grabs. He needs just 16 more receptions this season to become the school's all-time leader on that list. On Sept. 18 against Northwestern, the senior caught seven passes for 84 yards and tied a career-best with two touchdown receptions. On Sept. 4 against Tulsa, the Beaumont, Texas, native blocked a pair of punts and was named the Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week. He leads the 2004 club in catches (37), touchdowns (5) and receiving yards per game (51.1).

Last season, junior Mark Simmons led the way for Jayhawks in yards per catch (19.2) and tied Gordon for the team lead with 769 receiving yards. His seven touchdowns were a team-high and the third-best single-season total in school history. This season, Simmons is second on the team in receptions (32), receiving yards (352), and yards per game (44.0). His 20 yard touchdown catch against Iowa State on Oct. 30 was the 12th of his career and tied him for third on KU's all-time TD receptions list.

While many believed his transformation into a cornerback this season would severely impede his ability to post impressive offensive numbers, sophomore Charles Gordon caught a pair of passes in the Tulsa game, including a seven-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter -- KU's first TD of the season. Last week against Iowa State, the Santa Monica, Calif., native hauled in a season-high three catches. Gordon has caught at least one pass in six of KU's eight games this year, including a pair of touchdowns, while still leading the team with four interceptions on defense.

Senior tight end Lyonel Anderson has been hot of late, hauling in an average of 2.6 catches per game over the last five contests. Against Kansas State on Oct. 9, Anderson hauled in his first career touchdown to give KU a 7-0 first quarter lead and at Iowa State on Oct. 30, he caught a key fourth-down pass on KU's scoring drive late in the game.

Rideau Among KU's Elite

With two receptions against Iowa State on Oct. 30, senior wide receiver Brandon Rideau moved into a tie for second place on KU's all-time receptions list. Rideau is currently 16 catches shy of tying Willie Vaughn for first place on the Jayhawks' career catches list and must average 5.6 receptions during KU's last three contests to become the all-time leader.

Linebackers Solid

Middle linebacker Gabriel Toomey is part of a veteran group of linebackers looking to solidify a defense which ranked 85th nationally in 2003 and allowed an average of 412.6 yards per game. Toomey, a junior transfer from Iowa Central CC, originally signed with Oklahoma but left Norman after a redshirt season. He finished second on the team last season with 121 tackles and was a second-team All-Big 12 selection (AP and *Fort Worth Star Telegram*). He is currently tied for fifth on the team with 41 tackles and also has five TFLs.

Nick Reid came to KU as a quarterback but permanently switched to the defensive side of the ball during his freshman campaign. In 2003, Reid led the team with 133 tackles and was named honorable-mention All-Big 12. The Derby, Kan., native leads the team with 83 total tackles is currently second in the Big 12 with an average of 10.4 stops per game.

Kevin Kane may be the hottest of all KU linebackers at this point in the season. The Parkville, Mo., native, is coming off a career-best 12 tackle performance against Iowa State that saw him also collect two tackles for loss and a forced fumble. Currently, Kane ranks third on the team with 45 total tackles, and is tied for second on the club with eight TFLs.

Banks Floodman, a KU captain, earned honorable-mention All-Big 12 honors last season after starting all 13 contests and recording 93 tackles. The Wichita, Kan., native averaged 7.2 tackles per game as a sophomore and was the winner of the Nolan Cromwell

Award for Leadership at the team's annual postseason awards banquet. He is tied for fifth on this year's team with 41 total stops.

Block Party

The Jayhawks recorded a rare trifecta against No. 2 Oklahoma on Oct. 23 in Norman. In the game against the Sooners, KU blocked a punt (Brandon Rideau), a field goal attempt (Charles Gordon) and a PAT (Kevin Kane).

Keeping the Point Totals Down

In its eight games this season, the Jayhawks have allowed and average of 20.5 points per contest. The difference is quite notable as KU allowed 30 or more in 11 of 12 games during the 2002 season -- Mark Mangino's first year as head coach at Kansas.

Green Moves Into Top 10

Against Iowa State on Oct. 30, junior running back Clark Green passed Charlie Hoag and moved into ninth place on KU's career rushing list. Green now has 1,925 career rushing yards during his two-plus years in Lawrence. The Tampa, Fla., native, is 45 yards shy of moving into a tie for eighth place. Green also moved past former KU great John Riggins and into in ninth place on the school's career all-purpose yards list. He now has 2,907 all-purpose yards (1,925 rushing, 962 receiving, 20 return) in a KU uniform.

Defense Improved

KU's 21-3 win over Tulsa on Sept. 4 marked the first time Kansas has held an NCAA Division I-A team without a touchdown since defeating Missouri, 21-0, in 1999. After a second-quarter field goal, KU's defense seemed to get better as the game progressed. Tulsa collected 124 yards of total offense in the first half, but the Jayhawks held the Golden Hurricane to just 17 yards in the second stanza. Throughout the game, KU kept constant pressure on Tulsa quarterback James Kilian as he collected just 91 passing yards on the night.

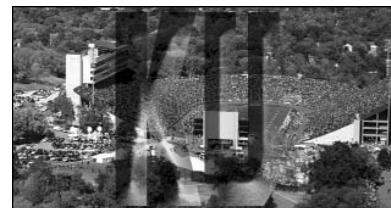
Against Toledo on Sept. 11, the Jayhawk defense shined again, forcing five turnovers, including a pair of interceptions (Nick Reid, Tony Stubbs). The KU secondary held the Rockets' top receiver, Lance Moore to just three catches for nine yards -- including a long of four yards. Moore had 103 catches in 2003.

At Northwestern on Sept. 18, the KU defense was solid for the majority of the game as it held Wildcat quarterback Brett Basanez to just 192 yards through the air. Entering the contest, Basanez was averaging more than 370 passing yards per contest.

On Oct. 2 at Nebraska, the Jayhawks forced four turnovers in the game and allowed the fewest points (14) in the series against the Cornhuskers since 1973. Cornerback Charles Gordon recorded a pair of interceptions while linebackers Nick Reid and Banks Floodman combined for 15 total tackles, forced a fumble, and collected a sack.

In KU's game against Kansas State on Oct. 9, the Jayhawks held running back Darren Sproles to just 73 yards rushing and no touchdowns -- nearly 60 yards below his season average.

For the second time this season, the KU defense held a team without an offensive touchdown (also vs. Tulsa) as the Jayhawks limited Iowa State to just two field goals on Oct. 30. However, the Cyclones were able to cross the goal line with their defensive unit and secure a 13-7 victory in Ames, Iowa.

Rushing Highs Set Against ISU

Junior running back Clark Green had his best game of the season on Oct. 30 at Iowa State as he carried the ball 11 times for a season-best 37 yards. Quarterback Jason Swanson also set his career rushing-high as he led the team with 45 rushing yards against the Cyclones.

Randle Looking to Run

Sophomore running back John Randle set a career-high with 105 rushing yards against Nebraska on Oct. 2 -- the most yards allowed on the ground by the NU defense up to that point in the season. In KU's game against in-state rival KSU, Randle led the Jayhawks to victory with a career-high tying 105 yards rushing, including a game-securing 43-yard run with 3:16 left in the fourth quarter. The Wichita, Kan., native, also led all KU receivers in the contest with five catches for 51 yards and a touchdown. With his two consecutive 105-yard rushing games, Randle became the first Jayhawk since 1996 to run for 100 yards in back-to-back contests.

Three-Way Threat

After an outstanding freshman campaign in 2003 that saw him earn first-team freshman All-America honors from *The Sporting News*, as both a wide receiver and kick returner, Charles Gordon has switched primarily to the defensive side of the ball in 2004. Gordon played just four games in the team's defensive backfield last season, but spent much of this year's training camp preparing for life as a cornerback. However, Gordon still sees a number of snaps on the offensive side of the ball -- which is good news for KU quarterbacks. In fact, Gordon scored the team's first touchdown of the season on a seven-yard reception in the third quarter against Tulsa, and, on Sept. 25 against Texas Tech, Gordon scored on a 20-yard pass play in the second quarter to give the Jayhawks a 30-5 lead.

On Oct. 2 at Nebraska, Gordon turned in his finest game as a defender. The Carson, Calif., native recorded a pair of interceptions, including a nifty, one-handed grab deep in KU territory. He also forced a fumble, broke up a pass and collected three tackles. Against Iowa State on Oct. 30, Gordon collected his team-leading fourth interception of the year and finished the game with six total tackles, while catching a season-high three passes on offense. Against No. 2 Oklahoma on Oct. 23, Gordon set a career-high with nine total tackles.

Picking Off Passes

Eight different Jayhawk defenders have intercepted at least one pass this season, including four from sophomore cornerback Charles Gordon and two apiece from senior safety Tony Stubbs and sophomore safety Rodney Harris. Through eight games, KU has 13 picks as a team, bettering the season totals from each of the last three seasons. The last time KU had more than 12 interceptions in a season occurred in 1996 when the team collected 15 INTs.

Hawk Notes

Kansas is playing its 115th season of football ... Running back Clark Green has caught at least one pass in 29 of his 33 career games ... Senior defensive end David McMillan has KU's longest starting streak as he has started the last 33 games for the 'Hawks ... Since 1999, the Jayhawks are 22-10 when scoring 21 or more points including the team's 31-28 victory over Kansas State on Oct. 9 ... Mark Simmons, Brandon Rideau and John Randle have caught at least one pass in every game this season ... Kansas has forced at least one turnover in 17 of its last 21 contests ... Since 1995, KU is 24-9 when a Jayhawk player rushes for more than 100 yards in a game.

Scoring Standards Set Against Toledo

The 63 points scored by KU against Toledo on Sept. 11 were the most by the Jayhawks against a Division I-A team since KU defeated New Mexico 68-7 on Oct. 5, 1968. KU defeated Division I-AA Cal State Northridge 71-14 on Sept. 11, 1999. In addition, KU's 49-point margin of victory was the largest since it defeated Cal-State Northridge 71-14 (by 57 points) on Sept. 11, 1999. The Jayhawks also tied a school record by lighting up the scoreboard with 49 points in the first half against the Rockets. KU also scored 49 points in a single half against Illinois State (first half, 1998) and St. Mary's (first half, 1912).

A Family Affair

Three sets of brothers are currently listed on the Jayhawk roster, including Greg and Gary Heaggans, identical twins Donnie and Ronnie Amadi and newcomer walk-ons Milan and Mitar Rudanovic. In addition, defensive lineman and Travis Watkins and fullback Brandon Watkins are cousins.

What's That Sign?

In a show of support for defensive end John McCoy and all of the U.S. troops around the globe, the University of Kansas football team has affixed McCoy's initials, "JM" to the back of its helmets during the 2004 season. The decals are Jayhawk gold in color and approximately one inch tall. McCoy, a senior from Richwood, Ohio, has been a member of the United States Army since July 2000. He was a member of the Lawrence-based 317th Quartermaster Battalion that departed for specialized training in late July. Last April, he received notice that his unit had been put on alert for mobilization. McCoy's career with the military began after his senior year of high school in Richwood, Ohio. Without a scholarship to an NCAA I university, McCoy made a goal to pay for college on his own. McCoy appeared in 12 games last season for the Jayhawks and recorded 11 tackles, including one quarterback sack.

Game-by-Game Post-game Notes

at Kansas 21, Tulsa 3

- A total of eight Jayhawks made their first career starts -- Derek Fine, Travis Dambach, David Ochoa, Matt Thompson, Theo Baines, Jermial Ashley, Rodney Harris and Kevin Kane.
- Senior Brandon Rideau blocked a pair of punts and was named Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week.
- Senior kicker Johnny Beck's 51-yard field goal in the second quarter was his best at Memorial Stadium since hitting a 52-yarder against UCLA as a freshman on Sept. 8, 2001.
- The three points KU allowed in the game were the fewest since the Jayhawks shut out Southern Illinois 42-0 on Sept. 23, 2000 and the first against an NCAA IA team since 1999 shutout of Missouri.
- Junior linebacker Kevin Kane recorded his first career interception mid-way through the fourth quarter.

at Kansas 63, Toledo 14

- The 63 points scored by KU against Toledo were the most against a Division I-A team since the Jayhawks defeated New Mexico 68-7 on Oct. 5, 1968.
- KU's 49-point margin of victory was the largest since it defeated Cal-State Northridge 71-14 (by 57 points) on Sept. 11, 1999.
- The last time Kansas scored 28 points in a single quarter was on Oct. 11, 2003, when the Jayhawks put 28 on the board in the second quarter against Colorado. The last time KU scored 28 in a quarter at home was Sept. 20, 2003, in the first stanza against Jacksonville State. Kansas' 28 points in the first quarter were the most in an opening stanza against a Division I school since 1965 when such records have been kept.
- The 49 points scored by KU in the first half were the most points scored in a half against Toledo by any opponent.
- KU's nine PATs by Scott Webb marked the most in a single game in KU history. The previous record was eight PATs for a game held by four others with the last by Jeff McCord vs. UAB in 1994.
- Sophomore running back John Randle scored a career-high three TDs in the first half for a career total of six. Randle's 55-yard reception was a career-long. Randle rushed for a career-high 104 yards, surpassing his 77 yards (nine carries) vs. UNLV last season. His 79 receiving yards also marked a career-high.
- Sophomore quarterback Adam Barmann's four touchdown passes tied a career-high. Barmann also threw four TDs against Texas A&M last season.
- Fullback Brandon McAnderson (Lawrence, Kan.) recorded his first career rushing attempt and first TD late in the fourth quarter.

at Northwestern 20, Kansas 17

- Charles Green hauled in a career-long 49-yard catch in the second quarter.
- Freshman kicker Scott Webb connected on his first career field goal, a 27-yard attempt in the second quarter.
- Freshman punter Kyle Tucker made his first career appearance, booting a 46-yard punt in the third quarter on his first career kick.
- Senior wide receiver Brandon Rideau tied a career high with two touchdown receptions (2 vs. Texas A&M, 11/1/03).
- Northwestern's fourth quarter touchdown were the first points KU had given up in the fourth quarter this season.

Texas Tech 31, at Kansas 30

- Kansas had four interceptions to mark its third multi-interception game of the season and seventh under head coach Mark Mangino. The last time KU had four interceptions in a game was Oct. 10, 1998 at Baylor.

- Texas Tech's five points in the first quarter were the first points scored on Kansas in the first quarter this season.
- Texas Tech broke the record for largest comeback by a KU opponent as KU held a 30-5 advantage in the game. The previous mark was a 19-0 KU advantage against Colorado in 1961 -- a CU 20-19 win.
- Rodney Harris recorded his first career interception in the first quarter.
- Charles Gordon's first pass attempt of the season was good for a touchdown. Gordon attempted two passes last season.

at Nebraska 14, Kansas 8

- KU led Nebraska 2-0 after the first quarter marking the first time the Jayhawks led the Huskers since a 9-0 lead in the 1999 game.
- Kansas trailed at half for the first time this season. The Jayhawks were tied at the half against Tulsa and at Northwestern.
- With three interceptions, Kansas recorded its fourth multi-interception game of the year and the eighth game under head coach Mark Mangino.
- Sophomore Charles Gordon made his first career interception early in the first quarter. The pick was the Jayhawks' ninth of the season. Gordon added a second interception in the fourth quarter, the 10th for KU this year.
- Randle's 105 rushing yards were the most by an opponent against Nebraska this season.
- Freshman punter Kyle Tucker booted eight punts in the game marking a KU season-high and a career high.
- Tucker booted a 57-yard punt in the fourth quarter to establish a career high. His previous high was a 46-yard kick against Northwestern.
- Junior Rodney Harris picked off his second interception of the season in the fourth quarter, KU's third of the game and 11th of the season. In 2003, the KU defense collected 12 interceptions for the entire season.
- Sophomore quarterback Adam Barmann set a career high for passing attempts in a game with 49. His previous high was 48 at Northwestern earlier this season.

at Kansas 31, Kansas State 28

- Senior tight end Lyonel Anderson scored his first career touchdown, a two-yard reception in the first quarter.
- The last time KU led Kansas State at halftime was on Oct. 10, 1992, when the Jayhawks took a 17-7 lead at the break. KU went on to win that game 31-7 in Lawrence.
- Sophomore Charles Gordon's interception in the first quarter marked his third of the season and of his career.
- Gordon's 49-yard punt return in the third quarter marked his season-long.
- John Randle's two touchdowns brought his total to seven on the season (four rushing, three receiving). It was Randle's third multiple-TD game of the season.
- Junior Jermial Ashley's blocked field goal in the fourth quarter was the first by a Jayhawk since Kevin Kane blocked one at Texas A&M on Nov. 1, 2003.
- Junior Jason Swanson's touchdown pass to Mark Simmons in the fourth quarter was his first career TD toss as a Jayhawk.
- With his TD catch in the fourth quarter, Simmons moved into a tie for fourth place on the KU all-time TD receptions list (11).
- In the series with Kansas State, KU's 31 points marked the most against the Wildcats since Oct. 10, 1992 (31 points). KU won that game 31-7.
- The victory marked KU's second come-from-behind win of the season. Tulsa led KU 3-0 in the season-opener.

at No. 2 Oklahoma 41, Kansas 10

- Sophomore Charles Gordon blocked his first career field goal in the first quarter. It marked the second-straight game KU has blocked a field goal as junior Jermial Ashley blocked a kick versus Kansas State on Oct. 9.
- In the second quarter, sophomore QB Adam Barmann connected with senior WR Brandon Rideau for a 78 yard touchdown pass. The play was Kansas' longest play from scrimmage this season, and the longest catch of Rideau's career.
- Junior RB Clark Green passed former Jayhawk Arnold Snell for seventh place on the KU all-time rushing attempts list.
- Rideau was credited with his team-best third blocked punt of the season in the third quarter.
- Senior PK Johnny Beck connected on his fourth consecutive field goal in the last three games to end the first half.
- Freshman punter Kyle Tucker's 45.3 average was his season high passing the 42.8 average against Kansas State Oct. 9.
- Sophomore Charles Gordon was credited with a career-high nine tackles. His five assisted tackles were also a career high.
- Junior Ronnie Amadi was credited with a career-high six tackles. His five solo stops were also a personal best.
- Sophomore Rodney Harris' seven total tackles tied his career high - 7 at Northwestern Sept. 18, 2004. His five assisted stops were a career high.

at Iowa State 13, Kansas 7

- Kansas was shutout in the first half (10-0) for the first time since Northwestern held the Jayhawks scoreless (14-0) in the first half last year on August 30, 2003.
- Iowa State led 3-0 after the first quarter marking the first time this season KU trailed after the first period.
- Junior CB Ronnie Amadi made his first career start.
- Sophomore Charles Gordon picked off his fourth interception of the season on Iowa State's first drive of the game. The pick was the Jayhawk's 13th of the season, marking the most since KU intercepted 15 passes in 1996.
- On offense, Gordon recorded a season-best three pass receptions for 18 yards.
- Sophomore David Ochoa saw his first action of the season at center, after starter Joe Vaughn was sidelined in the first quarter.
- Junior QB Brian Luke saw his first action of the season when he was inserted in the second quarter.
- Junior RB Clark Green passed Charlie Hoag for ninth place on the KU all-time career rushing yards list. Green's career total moved to 1,925 yards.
- Green set season highs with 11 carries for 37 yards. His previous highs were six carries (done 4 times) and 25 yards (at Northwestern).
- Green passed John Riggins on the KU all-time career all-purpose yards list. With 37 rushing yards and two receiving yards today, Green's career total now stands at 2,907 (1,925 rush, 962 receiving, 20 return).
- Junior QB Jason Swanson collected a career-high 45 rushing yards. His previous high was 10 yards last week at Oklahoma.
- Rideau passed Isaac Byrd for ninth place on the KU all-time career receiving yards list. Rideau's career total now stands at 1,448 receiving yards.
- Rideau had two catches to move into a tie for second place with Richard Estell on the KU all-time career receptions list with 117 career catches.
- Simmons grabbed his third touchdown pass of the season to move his career total to 12, which ties for third place with Isaac Byrd and current teammate Brandon Rideau on the KU all-time career touchdown receptions list.
- Junior LB Kevin Kane recorded his first career forced fumble in the fourth quarter.
