OSU Opens Big 12 Play Against Colorado

With an unbeaten non-conference slate behind them, Oklahoma State's Cowboys begin Big 12 Conference play Saturday when OSU entertains Colorado. Kickoff at Boone Pickens Stadium is set for 1:05 p.m. Oklahoma State is 3-0 after wins over Montana State, Florida Atlantic and Arkansas State. Colorado will come to Stillwater with an overall record of 2-1 with victories over Colorado State and New Mexico State and a 23-3 loss at 12th-ranked Miami (Fla.), last weekend.

OSU-CU: Series History

Saturday will mark the 44th meeting between Oklahoma State and Colorado and the Buffs have a 25-17-1 overall series edge. Oklahoma State won big at Boulder a year ago behind tailback Vernand Morency's 165 yards and two touchdowns. D'Juan Woods had a 53 yard touchdown reception and Luke Frazier added a 20 yard touchdown in the victory over Colorado. OSU's win a year ago snapped a two-game losing streak to Colorado, although the Buffaloes have won 10 of the last 12 against Oklahoma State. The Cowboys are 10-11-1 against CU in Stillwater.

OSU-Colorado On the Air

Saturday's game against Colorado will be broadcast live on the Cowboy Radio Network with Dave Hunziker, John Holcomb and Robert Allen describing the action. Hunziker returns for his fifth season as the radio voice of OSU football. Holcomb is the sports director of Tulsa's KOTV (CBS), and is beginning his first season as the analyst in the Cowboy broadcast booth. Allen returns for his fourth season on the OSU sideline. The radio broadcast begins one hour prior to kickoff.

This Date in OSU Football History

October 1, 1988 — Oklahoma State's 13th-ranked Cowboys outdueled Tulsa 56-35 in Stillwater. OSU gained 545 yards of total offense, including a 33 carry, 304 yard performance by eventual Heisman Trophy winner Barry Sanders. Junior quarterback Mike Gundy completed 15 of 24 passes for 242 yards and a touchdown.

Three Looking for Four

When Oklahoma State takes the field Saturday afternoon against Colorado, the Cowboys will be looking to win for a fourth-consecutive time in 2005. It would mark a second-straight year for O-State to open with four-straight wins and be the eighth time since 1983 for an Oklahoma State team to be unbeaten at a similar point in the season.

OSU Last Week

Oklahoma State spent four days on the practice field during its open week. The Cowboys ran their record to 3-0 with a 20-10 win over Arkansas State at Boone Pickens Stadium on Sept. 17. After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter, OSU scored 13 unanswered points and had a 13-7 lead before Arkansas State put its final points on the board with a 26 yard field goal. Tailback Julius Crosslin iced OSU's victory with a one yard TD run early in the fourth quarter. Redshirt freshman Bobby Reid made his first-career start against Arkansas State and responded by completing eight of 21 passes for 148 yards and a touchdown. He also rushed 10 times for 18 yards. Wide receiver D'Juan Woods caught four passes for 198 yards and a touchdown, and tailback Mike Hamilton carried the ball 16 times for 88 yards. Oklahoma State's defense was again impressive. The Cowboys limited the Indians to just three points over the final three quarters. OSU's defense registered four sacks against Arkansas State and had three other tackles behind the line of scrimmage.

Colorado Last Week

Quarterback Joel Klatt passed for 228 yards but threw two interceptions as Colorado fell to 12th-ranked Miami (Fla.) 23-3 at a hot and humid Orange Bowl. Miami kept Colorado off the scoreboard until the 11:57 mark of the fourth quarter when Mason Crosby connected on a 58 yard field goal. Colorado had two possessions inside the Miami 20 yard line, but failed to score on both. In addition to Klatt's 228 passing yards, Colorado rushed for 103 yards. The Colorado defense allowed Miami 394 total yards, 271 through the air and 123 on the ground. Colorado had more time of possession than Miami, 33:41 to 26:19.

Head Coach Gary Barnett

Gary Barnett is three games into his seventh season as head coach at Colorado. He will bring a school record of 44-34 into Saturday's game at Boone Pickens Stadium and a 15-year career record of 87-90. Barnett guided Colorado to an 8-5 record a year ago, and the Buffs won the Big 12 North Division title, eventually losing to Oklahoma in the conference championship game. Under Barnett, Colorado has registered winning seasons four of the past six seasons and won the North Division three times (2001, 2002 and 2004). Prior to arriving in Boulder, Barnett spent seven seasons at Northwestern, winning a Big 10 title in 1995.

More on the Buffs

The defending Big 12 North Champions will come to Boone Pickens Stadium with a 2-1 record and one week after suffering its first loss of the season. Colorado opened the 2005 season with a 31-28 win over in-state rival Colorado State and followed that with a 39-0 shutout win over New Mexico State. Colorado comes to town averaging 399.3 y ards of total offense and allowing 320 yards per game. Colorado is seventh in the country in defending the rush, allowing just 74.3 yards per game. CU boasts a pair of the best specialists in the country. Kicker Mason Crosby is seventh nationally, averaging two field goals per game. Punter John Torp is second in the country with an average of 49.6 yards per punt.

Head Coach Mike Gundy

Mike Gundy has opened his first season as Oklahoma State's head coach with three straight wins and will be looking for a fourth when the Cowboys entertain Colorado Saturday afternoon. Gundy began his OSU head coaching career with a 15-10 win over Montana State at Boone Pickens Stadium and followed that with a 23-3 win vs. Florida Atlantic and a 20-10 win over Arkansas State. The 37-year-old Gundy was named Oklahoma State's head coach on Jan. 3, 2005. In a relatively short time, he has already established a no-nonsense expectation, both on and off the field, and guided the Cowboys through the adversity of the death of a teammate.

First-Year Coaches

If Oklahoma State wins its conference opener Saturday over Colorado, the Cowboys would be 4-0 in the first season of a head coach's tenure for the first time since 1984 when Pat Jones' troops were 4-0 before losing at Nebraska. Gundy and Jones would be the only head coaches in Oklahoma State history to start their first seasons at 4-0. Here is a look at the first

As a Player

Mike Gundy was Oklahoma State's starting quarterback from 1986 through 1989. He earned his first start as a true freshman against Illinois State on Sept. 27, 1986. The Cowboys won that game 23-7 and, before Gundy completed his Oklahoma State career on Nov. 18, 1989, he would help lead OSU to 29 victories, record two of the school's three 10-win seasons, and help guide the Cowboys to back-to-back bowl games. Gundy passed for 1,525 yards as a freshman, 2,106 as a sophomore, 2,163 as a junior and 2,203 yards as a senior. He is Oklahoma State's career leader in passing yards (7,997) and total offense (7,749), and he still holds the single-game passing mark of 429 yards in a 1989 win over Kansas.

As a Coach

Just a year after completing his playing eligibility at Oklahoma State, Gundy joined Pat Jones' Cowboy staff as the wide receivers coach. He then coached OSU's quarterbacks from 1991-93, and became Jones' offensive coordinator prior to the 1994 season. He remained at Oklahoma State as quarterbacks coach in the first two years of the Bob Simmons era before going to Baylor, where he coached quarterbacks and was the passing game coordinator in 1996. In 1997, he moved to Maryland where he coached receivers, quarterbacks and was the passing game coordinator. In 2001, Gundy returned to his alma mater, where he was assistant head coach and offensive coordinator until being named head coach in January.

Off the Field

Gundy was born Aug. 12, 1967, in Midwest City, Okla., to Ray and Judy Gundy. He and his wife, Kristen, have three sons: Gavin, Gunnar and Gage. His brother, Cale, is a member of the football staff at Oklahoma, and his brother-in-law, Craig Strickland, is a former OSU player and current Arena League quarterback.

Young but Ready

Oklahoma State's Mike Gundy is the youngest head coach at the Division I-A level. He is five months younger than Shane Montgomery, the coach at Miami (Ohio), and more than a year younger than Rutgers' Greg Schiano. The list of NCAA Division I-A's youngest coaches is below.

Gundy Milestones

- Sept. 20, 1986 Gundy took his first snap as a true freshman when Pat Jones started him in the second half against Houston. The Cowboys lost the game 28-12, but OSU's new quarterback completed 12 of 22 passes for 163 yards and a touchdown.
- Sept. 27, 1986 Gundy made his first collegiate start in Stillwater against Illinois State. He finished the day with nine completions in 20 attempts for 121 yards and no touchdowns. Oklahoma State won the game 23-7.
- October 25, 1986 Gundy scored his first collegiate touchdown, a four yard run against Kansas in Stillwater. It was also his first 200 plus yards passing performance as he completed 20 of 36 for 275 yards and a touchdown.

 Oklahoma State defeated Kansas 24-6.
- Sept. 19, 1987 In a 35-29 Oklahoma State win over Wyoming in Stillwater, sophomore quarterback Mike Gundy had the first 300 yard passing game of his collegiate career. Against the Wyoming Cowboys, Gundy completed 24 of 34 for 325 yards and a pair of TDs.
- October 21, 1989 On a 65 yard pass to wide receiver Curtis Mayfield, Gundy became the Big Eight Conference's leader in career total offense. OSU lost to Nebraska 48-23.
- Nov. 4, 1989 In a 37-24 win over
 Kansas at Lawrence, Gundy had the
 best day of his career and the best
 day of any OSU quarterback in school
 history. He completed 27 of 35 passes
 for 429 yards and two touchdowns.
 He also scored on a pair of one yard
 runs in the win over the Jayhawks.
- Nov. 18, 1989 In his final collegiate game as a player, Gundy completed 25 of 41 passes against Iowa State for 315 yards and a pair of TDs.
- Feb. 8, 1990 Oklahoma State head coach Pat Jones announced that Mike Gundy would join his staff to coach the wide receivers.
- Dec. 7, 2000 Gundy returns to
 Oklahoma State as assistant head
 coach and offensive coordinator.

OSU Football will cover the state like a blanket when 30 stations join the Network, from Altus to Bartlesville, from Guymon to Idabel. Dave Hunziker enters his fifth season as the play-by-play voice of the Cowboys, while John Holcomb, sports director at the CBS affiliate KOTV in Tulsa, will provide expert analysis for his initial season. Robert Allen will provide sideline reports for the fourth year and co-host the postgame callin show.

Honoring Vernon

Oklahoma State players will wear a helmet sticker with the initials "VG" throughout the 2005 season, and the Cowboys also recognized their late leader in another way in the first game of the season. Oklahoma State's first kick cover unit had just 10 players. In pregame ceremonies prior to the season opener, associate head coach and special teams coordinator Joe DeForest told a crowd of more than 43,000 that they and Vernon would be the team's 11th man.

Cowboys Stingy on Defense

Through three games of the 2005 season, Oklahoma State's defense has been consistently stingy. In the season opener against Montana State, the Cowboys allowed just one touchdown and a field goal. The following week at Florida Atlantic, OSU's "D" allowed just a second-quarter field goal. Against Arkansas State, OSU allowed a first-quarter touchdown and a fourth-quarter field goal. That's a grand total of two touchdowns and three field goals through 12 quarters of the 2005 season, and the Cowboys have not allowed a second half touchdown all season.

Where They Rank

Oklahoma State's defense is allowing an average of just 7.7 points per game, the third-lowest average in the country. Only Nebraska and Virginia Tech are allowing fewer points per game.

More on the Defense

Going into Big 12 Conference play, Oklahoma State is 55th in the country against the rush (126 ypg) and 20th in the country in pass efficiency defense (98.85). Oklahoma State's average of 265.3 yards allowed through three games is fourth in the Big 12 and 14th nationally. Overall, the Cowboys are ranked in the top 20 nationally in four of five defensive categories.

Against the Pass

Oklahoma State is allowing just 139.3 yards per game through the air, ranking as the 10th best average in the nation and second best in the Big 12 Conference. Those numbers are even more impressive considering OSU faced two talented quarterbacks in the first two weeks of the season. In the season opener, Oklahoma State limited Montana State record setter Travis Lulay to 205 yards and held Florida Atlantic's Danny Embick to 91 yards on seven completions.

Duren has led the OSU defense in tackles two of the past three seasons and is fifth on that list through three games of 2005. For the season, Duren has 14 total tackles. Duren entered the 2005 season with 251 career tackles. His three-game total of 14 stops gives him 265 and ties him with Harry Cheatwood for 19th on OSU's career tackle chart.

Linebackers, Part II

Oklahoma State's linebackers are some of the most experienced and talented in the league and have played to form through the first three games. In addition to Paul Duren, whose season is detailed above, Lawrence Pinson, Jamar Ransom and Rodrick Johnson are turning in solid seasons. Pinson is OSU's No. 2 tackler through three games with 21 total stops. He also has a sack, three quarterback hurries and a pass deflection. Ransom is third on the tackle list with 20 and also has two sacks, two passes broken up, one fumble recovery and three forced fumbles. Ransom had a career-best 11 tackles in OSU's win over Arkansas State last week.

Thompson Still Tops Tackle Chart

A year ago, strong safety Jamie Thompson led Oklahoma State's defense with 85 total tackles. Three games into the 2005 season, Thompson is back on top of the tackle chart. In the season opener at Boone Pickens Stadium, Thompson led the OSU defense with 11 tackles, all of which were primary stops. He also had two sacks for minus 12 yards and forced a fumble. In OSU's Thursday night win at Florida Atlantic, Thompson had seven tackles. Against Arkansas State he had six tackles and a sack. The 6-0, 190 pounder from Sparr, Fla., was an All-Big 12 second-team selection in 2004 and is capable of more significant honors in 2005.

Reid Makes First Start

Redshirt freshman Bobby Reid made his first career start at quarterback against Arkansas State. The Houston, Texas, product responded positively by throwing for 148 yards on 8 of 21 passing and a touchdown as well as rushing for 18 yards. For the season, Reid has completed 13 of 33 attempts for 217 yards and a touchdown.

Donovan Sees First Defensive Action

Sophomore Donovan Woods, who moved from quarterback to safety prior to the Arkansas State game, saw his first game action on the defensive side. Woods, who was a standout defensive player in high school, was credited with two tackles, including one for minus two yards.

Redden Shines in Kicking Game

Transfer Bruce Redden has provided a positive answer to any questions that may have existed about the Cowboys' kicking game. Through three games, "Sunshine" has been flawless. He is five of five in field goals and five of five in extra point tries. His 20 points for the season matches Julius Crosslin's for the team scoring lead. Against Arkansas State, Redden nailed a 52 yard field goal, his career long. For the season, Redden is 1 of 1 from 20-29 yards, 2 of 2 from 30-39 yards, 1 of 1 from 40-49 yards, and 1 of 1 from 50 yards or more.

Hamilton Top Rusher

After reaching the 100 yard mark for the first time in his career at Florida Atlantic, tailback Mike Hamilton nearly eclipsed that mark again against Arkansas State. Hamilton had 16 carries for 88 yards, an average of 5.5 yards per carry, against the Indians. Through three games, Hamilton is Oklahoma State's leading ground gainer with 246 yards on 50 attempts. Going into Big 12 Conference play this weekend, Hamilton is the ninth-leading rusher in the league.

More on the Rushing Numbers

Through three games, Oklahoma State is averaging 187.7 yards per game on the ground. The Cowboys are fifth in the Big 12 Conference and 35th nationally in r ushing offense. Oklahoma State rushers are averaging 4.7 yards per carry.

Sizing Up the Line

Through three games, Oklahoma State has employed the same starters across the offensive front. The combined group of O-line starters represents substantial experience, including Corey Hilliard (21 starts), Charlie Johnson (21 starts), Kellen Davis (19 starts) and David Koenig (6 starts). That's a combined 67 starts between those four players. The only starter across OSU's offensive front without previous starting experience is center David Washington, a redshirt freshman from Guthrie. Oklahoma State's 2005 offensive line averages 6-4 by 287.5 pounds.

D'Juan's Streak Continues

Oklahoma State's junior receiver has now caught at least one pass in his last 13 games. In Oklahoma State's win over Arkansas State, Woods caught four passes for 108 yards, including 41 yard scoring strike from Bobby Reid. Through three games, Woods has caught eight passes for 176 yards and two touchdowns. He is averaging 58.7 yards per game and 22 yards per reception. A year ago, D'Juan caught 33 passes for 690 yards and six touchdowns. That followed a 2003 season during which he caught 31 passes for 479 yards and one touchdown. With nearly two seasons of eligibility remaining, D'Juan has 1,401 career receiving yards and is in eighth place on OSU's career receiving list. Woods was an All-Big 12 second-team selection a year ago and is aiming higher in 2005.

More Special Teams Notes

Freshman punter Matt Fodge is having a solid rookie season for the Cowboys. Through three games, Fodge is averaging 38.5 yards per punt. Two of his punts have gone for touchbacks, four have been fair caught, and nine have been downed inside the opponents' 20 yard line. Daniel McLemore continues to be solid in Oklahoma State's return game. McLemore leads the Cowboys in both kick and punt returns. He has returned five punts for an average of 10.2 yards per return. He has also returned three kickoffs for 80 yards, an average of 26.7 yards per return. McLemore is 40th in the country this week in punt returns and does not have the minimum number to be included in kick return stats.

Odds and Ends

Oklahoma State opens the Big 12 season with back-toback home games (Colorado and Missouri). It is the first time since 1995 the Cowboys have had two straight home games at the top of the conference schedule. In '95, OSU opened the season at home vs. Nebraska and came back (after four non-conference games) to host Kansas State ... If the Cowboys can win Saturday against Colorado, it would be the first back-to-back wins over the Buffs since 1987 and 1988 when OSU won 42-17 in Stillwater and 41-21 at Boulder ... As a player, Mike Gundy was 2-2 against Colorado. CU posted a 31-14 win in 1986 in Stillwater, Gundy's first season. After the back-to-back OSU wins in 1987 and 1988, Colorado won in Stillwater in 1989 by a 41-17 margin ... Saturday's 1:05 p.m. start will snap a string of four straight nighttime kickoffs by the Cowboys. OSU's last daytime kickoff was Nov. 27 last year at Texas Tech ... The Cowboys have not had their final open date of the season. After league games against Colorado, Missouri, Texas A&M, Iowa State and Texas, OSU will be open on Nov. 5 before completing the regular season against Texas Tech (Nov. 12), Baylor (Nov. 19) and Oklahoma (Nov. 26).

Construction Update

Construction on the north side of Boone Pickens Stadium will continue through the 2005 season. All seating areas will be open, but some fan amenities on the north side will be temporary. Concessions and restroom facilities will be temporary throughout the season. The north side construction will be completed prior to the start of the 2006 season. Installation of Oklahoma State's new playing surface, Football Pro, was completed just before OSU's season opener against Montana State. The synthetic surface is one of the best available and was installed by Millennium Sports Technologies of Littleton, Colo.

Then it comes to success, the Oklahoma State football program can boast about more than three straight bowl trips.

In the classroom, the Cowboys are among the best, not only in the Big 12, but in the nation.

In 2004, the team earned a

Distinct Honorable Mention AFCA Academic Achievement Award after graduating 94 percent of the seniors.

Also in 2004, 12 Cowboys earned Academic All-Big 12 honors with six being named to the 1st Team.

Those on this year's roster are Darnell Smith and

Paschal Smith.

A year earlier, the Cowboys set a school record by having 14 players on the Academic All-Big 12 list.

Five were named to the 1st Team, including current Cowboys Paul Duren and Darnell Smith, as well as the late Vernon Grant.

Over the past five years, OSU has had two players that stand out above most football players in the nation.

Pormer Cowboy tight end Billy Bajema not only excelled on the field, but he proved to be just as skilled in the classroom.

In 2004, the National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete award worth \$18,500 was given to Bajema, as well as being named a 1st Team Academic All-American and an Academic All-Big 12 team member.

He also became the first Cowboy to earn three consecutive Verizon Academic




All-District honors (2002, 2003, 2004).

Currently, Bajema is attempting to earn a roster spot with the San Fransico 49er's after being selected in the seventh round of the 2005 NFL Draft.

Ineman Kyle Eaton finished his undergraduate degree with a 4.0 GPA and was also awarded the National Football Foundation
Scholarship in 2002 as well as an NCAA postgraduate and a Big 12 postgraduate scholarship.

Eaton is also one of three Cowboys to earn multiple Verizon Academic All-District honors by earning the distinction in 2000 and 2002.

By the time Eaton graduated, he was a 10-time member of President's Honor Roll.
