The Ideal Environment



Colorado's humidity hovers near 30 percent year round. Lower humidity and higher altitude means a world-class environment that dozens of Olympic and other world-class athletes call home.



Colorado truly has four distinct seasons, but none of them are extreme. Over 250 sunny days per year and low humidity make it comfortable most of the time, and with over 320 days where the sun will shine mean Colorado has more hours of sunshine than both Miami and San Diego. Summer highs average about 80, while winter snow storms usually melt within 24 hours in the metro area.



Minds To Match Our Mountains

- ◆ CU-Boulder was ranked a "Best Buy" in the 2004 edition of *The Fiske Guide to Colleges*, receiving a four-star rating (out of five) for academics and five stars each for the social life and quality of life ratings.
- ◆ CU-Boulder ranked second in *Outside* magazine's 40 Best Colleges in 2003. The magazine ranked the top 40 schools that "turn out smart grads with top-notch academic credentials, a healthy environmental ethos and an A+ sense of adventure."

Why Colorado Volleyball?

Academic Success Under Aiu

- ◆ In Aiu's tenure, 40 players have combined for 119 semesters with a 3.0 GPA or higher (summer not included).
- ◆ Five Players have 10 semesters with a perfect 4.0 GPA.
- ◆ The 12 returning players in 2005 combined for 11 3.0 semesters in 2004-05.
- ◆ Eight Buffs earned 11 spots on the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll and two – Allison Barnes and Nicole Carr – were named to the Volleyball Academic All-Big 12 team.

Athletic Success Under Aiu

- ◆ Of the 22 players Aiu has recruited for scholarship, eight were on the Fab 50 list, eight were high school All-Americans and eight were their respective state's Player-of-the-Year.
- ◆ Aiu's 1997 team qualified for the Sweet 16, he was named Big 12 and District V Coach-of-the-Year.
- ◆ Aiu's 1998 team set new NCAA records for kills per game and assists per game.
- ◆ The Buffs have appeared in the AVCA/USA Today rankings 103 times in their history, and in 58 of the 110 polls since Aiu took over.

Preseason Trips

Every other season, head coach Pi'i Aiu takes the team on a trip during the preseason practices before the start of the school year.

The entire team and staff participate in the team-building excursion as practices are held in local gymnasiums.

In 1998, Aiu took the team to Estes Park for practice and also took some time off to climb some mountains in Rocky Mountain National Park.



The 2000 Buffs visited Sara Fredrickson's hometown of Pagosa Springs and took a day to visit historical Mesa Verde.

In 2002, the Buffs trained near Avon, Colo., and enjoyed a mountain biking expedition in the Glenwood Springs area.

In 2004 the Buffs traveled to the Vail area, home of junior Lara Bossow, for hiking and other activities.

In addition to these preseason trips, CU volleyball annually participates in other outdoor activities to promote team unity, such as rock climbing.

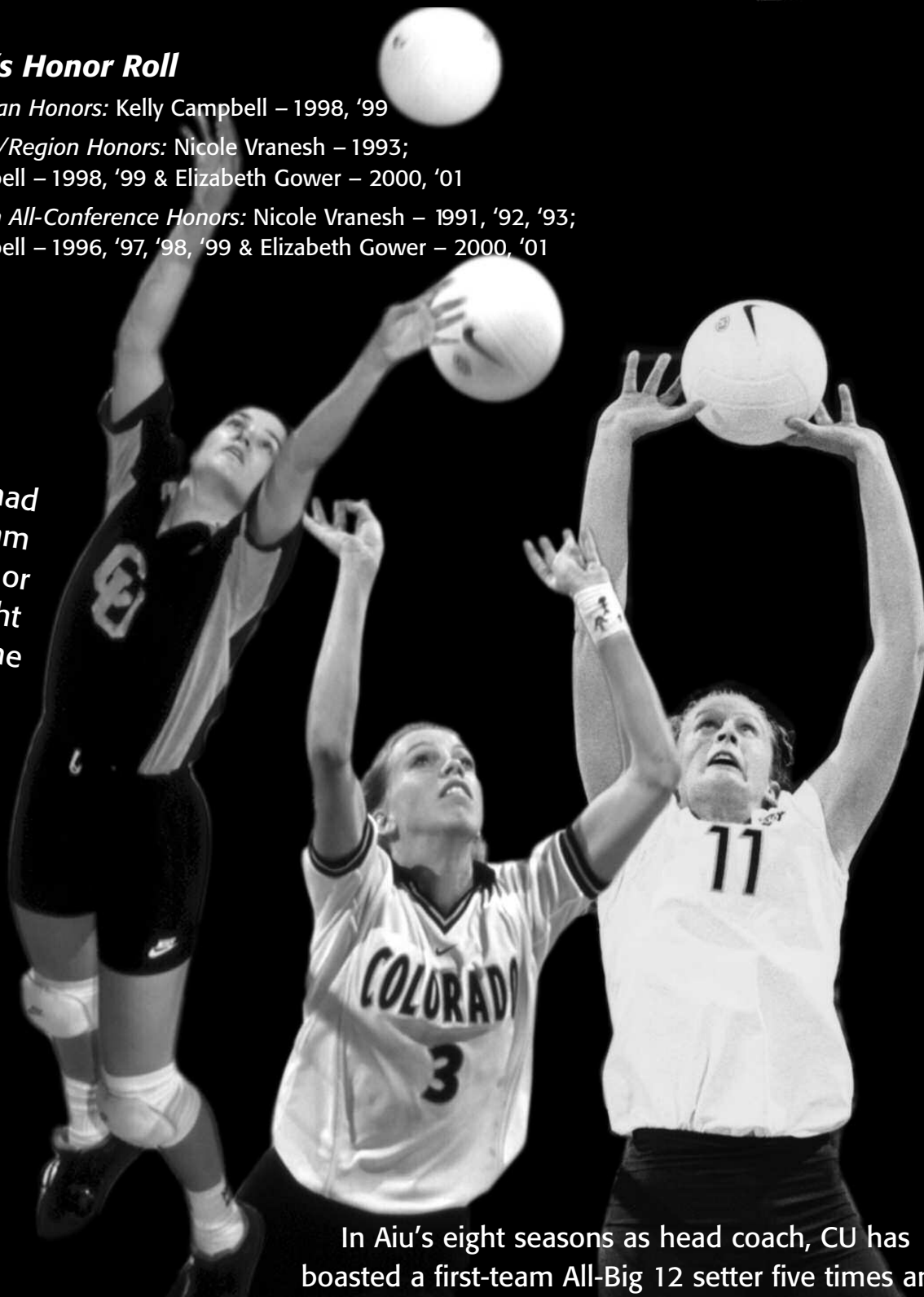

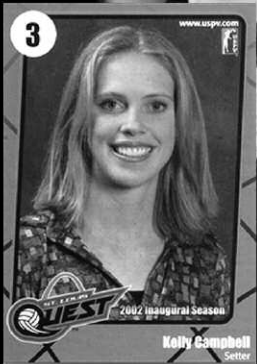

CU NCAA Tournament Tid-Bits

- ◆ Nebraska is the only Big 12 team with more NCAA Tournament appearances than CU since 1991.
- ◆ The Buffs have hosted the tournament four times, and have NEVER LOST an NCAA tourney match at home, holding a perfect 5-0 mark.
- ◆ The Buffs are 8-3 in the NCAA Tournament when not playing on the opponents floor.
- ◆ Aiu holds five of the program's eight NCAA victories, and has advanced past the first round in four of his seven appearances.
- ◆ From 1989-01, CU played in 13 straight postseason tournaments, 12 NCAA Tourneys and the WIVC Tourney in 1990.
- ◆ CU has advanced to 15 postseason tourneys in the last 16 years.

The Big 12 Conference of Champions



The Big 12 celebrates its 10th anniversary season of competition in 2005-06. While there have been many proud accomplishments in the first nine years of the conference, the league and its members are also excited and poised for a bright future.

Over the past nine years, 24 different teams and over 200 individuals have won NCAA Championships. This past season marked the most successful in conference history. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time. Texas captured its fourth women's outdoor track & field crown, along with its sixth national championship in baseball. A total of 23 individual event titles were also claimed by the Big 12.

Eight football squads have played in BCS bowls in the last six seasons. The Big 12 leads all conferences with four appearances in the National Championship game. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Student Services

The CU Athletic Department Student Services group is comprised of Sports Medicine, Strength and Conditioning, Student-Athlete Development (including the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program), Equipment and Apparel, Sports Video and food service. All units of Student Services are integral to the educational and athletic experience for student-athletes. They work collaboratively to prepare our young people both athletically and personally.

The Speed Strength & Conditioning staff is committed to the health and development of the student-athlete. They strive to prevent injuries and their training programs focus on improving all aspects of athletic performance. They work on improving strength, power, lineal speed, lateral speed and agility, first step quickness, balance and body control. By improving performance in each of these areas the goal is not to make a better weight lifter, but a better athlete.

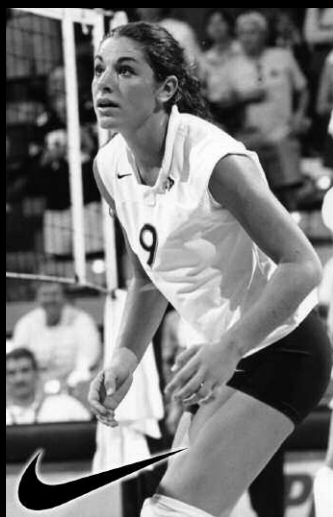


The CU sports medicine staff is one of the most respected in the country. Having one of the best treatment and rehabilitation facilities located in the Dal Ward Athletic Center, the staff is on hand 24 hours a day, seven days a week to work with student-athletes.

CU has been a proud member of the NCAA's CHAMPS Life Skills Program in 1996. Since then, athletic department personnel have worked diligently to provide student support and services in the five commitment areas. Specifically, the CU Life Skills Program facilitates educational opportunities and resources to: help students adjust to the challenges of university life and being a Division I student-athlete; assist students in their personal growth and career development, provide



opportunities to develop their leadership skills and be positive, contributing members of their communities. In 2003-04, the Department of Athletics, in conjunction with the campus community, implemented a new life skills class and additional life skills programming in its continued efforts to enhance the student-athlete experience within the university setting by providing an environment that promotes the full development of each student-athlete.
