Other Tidbits / Did You Know?

- **Romeo Bandison** lists as the one person he most would most like to meet as American entrepreneur Russell Simmons, the co-founder of the hip-hop label Def Jam among his many accomplishments.
- **Greg Brown** scored on his first play at UTEP as a collegian and never came close to scoring again.
- **Brian Cabral** was the special teams captain of the Super Bowl champion 1985 Chicago Bears; however, he did not appear in the infamous Super Bowl Shuffle song and video recorded that season. He was on hand to participate, but the session was running two hours late and he had to get to another appointment. He let us in on this secret: *"It was pretty prophetic; we filmed it in week seven."*

- You could say he is morally opposed to making fair catches: "I just feel like any returner can get back there and fair catch. I feel like if I don't fair catch and something happens, like the gunner coming down misses me, I can turn it into a big play. I'm going to get tackled anyway, so..."

Human Interest:

- He is roommates with fellow wide receiver and punt returner Chase McBride.

Hawkins' Take:

- "I've been on him every day—every time I see him I just keep reminding him about passion. He's so strong and so fast and so powerful that he's got to run with that Walter Payton kind of passion, and if he does he can be one of the better backs in the conference."
- His weight room numbers are off the charts. Though he stands only 5'8, 190 lbs., he is first on the team in the power clean (374 lbs.), tied for third in the hang clean (391 lbs.), third in the squat (635 lbs.), second in the bench press (420 lbs.) and third in the 40-yard dash (4.53; although he has been clocked as fast as 4.34).

Human Interest:

- He earned his solo pilot's license in a Cessna 172 as a sophomore in high school and Fox Sports did a feature on him last fall as he took a reporter and cameraman up flying with him (our BuffVision department has footage).
- He enjoys skiing, fishing and wakeboarding in his spare time. He has also taken up golf recently: in his short time playing, he is generally an 18-handicap.

- He combined to complete 31-of-53 passes for 358 yards, two touchdowns and three interceptions in three fall camp scrimmages.

3 **JIMMY SMITH**

- A talented corner with good size (6'2, 200 lbs.), Smith had an excellent spring, winning the team's Hale Irwin Award, given to the most improved defensive back.



4 **PATRICK WILLIAMS**
Wide Receiver
6-2, 200, Jr.

- Williams caught five passes for 59 yards against CSU: several of them key plays: Two of his receptions came on third-and-long situations in a key fourth quarter touchdown drive in which the Buffs drove 86 yards to bring them within a field goal of the Rams. He also had a 31-yard reception with under a minute left in the first half which set up a field goal. He drew a pass interference penalty on fourth down late in the fourth quarter which led to the tying field goal and forced overtime.
- He led off the game with a 24-yard gain on a reverse, the longest first rush of the season in CU history; he thus owns a unique pair of records, as he caught a 42-yard pass on the first play last season, the longest pass play in school annals. So he owns the longest rush and reception to open any season in Buffalo history.
- One of the more experienced wide receivers on the Buffs' roster, Williams will be counted on to fulfill his potential in his junior season.

COLORADO FOOTBALL INDIVIDUAL PLAYER NOTES

- Williams' confidence is seemingly the only thing that has kept him from reaching the next level. Offensive Coordinator Mark Helfrich "complimented" Williams after he had a pair of touchdown receptions in the first fall scrimmage: "He's made more plays the last two days in practice than he did all last year."

From There to Here:

- Injuries sabotaged his true freshman season in 2004. He spent much of the fall with *both* hands in casts after a pair of freak circumstances led to broken bones in each. One hand was injured after becoming tangled in a defender's face mask.
- In high school, he was a quarterback in an option offense, leading to his slow progression as a wide receiver.

Human Interest:

- The deeply religious Williams can be seen kneeling and praying each time he leaves the football field.

- After beating CSU in his first collegiate start, Hawkins improved to 60-0 as a starting quarterback going back to Pop Warner ball. His 201 passing yards were more than QBs Bernard Jackson or James Cox had in any game in 2006.
- Hawkins was officially named the starting quarterback on August 19, the day after CU's second scrimmage of the fall. He had the advantage of being far more familiar with the playbook than Nick Nelson, and he won the job because of his consistency in executing plays.
- He combined to complete 31-of-49 passes for 369 yards, four touchdowns and one interception in three fall camp scrimmages.
- Going back to his grade school days, he has always been a quarterback. In organized games, from sixth grade through his senior year as a prep, his teams were a combined 59-0.

Dan Hawkins' Take (after CSU win):

- "I thought he did OK. He would be the first one to tell you he missed a few throws. But in general, not bad. I was more pleased with the overall team effort. He has been around this so many times. He has been on the bus, and he's been on the big stage so for him it's just another day in the park. We knew emotionally he wasn't going to have a problem. He knows the greatest joy is going out there saying that I have the guts to play in front of 65,000 people and lay it on the line."

Helfrich's Take:

- "He makes almost every routine play and that's a big deal as a quarterback—just making every play that's there. And then the difference-maker-type plays, those are the ones you have to make a majority of to be on the greater side of good. Cody has worked toward that."

- On signing day of 2006, Hawkins went to school with a letter of intent for both Boise State and Colorado signed by his mother. Even Dan Hawkins did not know he committed until the letter was faxed to the CU football offices.

- Sumler, who finished his high school career as the San Diego area's career rushing leader, is expected to fight for carries with tailbacks Hugh Charles and Byron Ellis. He is the most powerful running back on the Buffs' roster and the player most physically suited for goal-line situations.
- He is not a burner and does not possess "breakaway speed," but he is fully capable of ripping off 40 or 50-yard runs, according to coaches.

On his first collegiate touchdown:

- "I've got to give all the credit to the big guys up front. It was definitely something I've dreamed about since I was a kid, to get that first touchdown in college."

Hawkins' Take:

- "He's smart, he's tough, he's a playmaker and gets himself into the right position and works hard. Those guys usually surface in life, and he certainly has. Like I like to say, he has great countenance. I think that lends itself to productivity."

commit to CU together. Smith and Simas live with Kendrick Celestine, the third wide receiver in CU's freshman class.

- Voted as the offensive captain by his teammates, Jackson will play a "slash" role for the Buffs this season, possibly contributing as a quarterback, wide receiver, tailback and kick returner. Along with fellow senior Hugh Charles, Jackson is one of two primary "home run" threats in the Buffs' offense.
- He missed most of camp while focusing on his academics.
- He remains a long shot to play against CSU, but Hawkins declined to completely rule it out. A year ago, Jackson made his surprise debut against Colorado State, the first of 11 games he would start for the Buffs in 2006.

Human Interest:

- Jackson has a 2-year-old son named Jayden who lost an eye to cancer.

Hawkins' Take:

- "Bernard, he's got some extenuating circumstances that would be tough on me. We always talk about life not being fair in a sense, but he's got some obligations and some other things that are tough on any person. And then you're a person that's a student, and then you're a person that's a student playing football. That's not necessarily an excuse, but my heart goes out to the guy. He's got a lot of irons in the fire."

Dizon's 17 solo stops against the Rams are the third most in CU history.
- In his last two games (CSU and the 2006 regular season finale against Nebraska), he has accounted for 41 total tackles.
- Named the defensive captain by his teammates, Dizon enters his fourth year as a starter at linebacker and is the nation's fourth active leading tackler (280).
- He pushes his body so much during games that a post game IV has become commonplace.
- Asked where Dizon stacks up against some of CU's all-time linebacker greats like Barry Remington, Matt Russell, Greg Biekert, Kanavis McGhee and Alfred Williams, linebackers coach Brian Cabral said, "Not many of those guys have started for four years, so he's up there."

From There to Here:

- He was recruited as an "athlete," as the coaches figured to try him at a number of positions. He started his freshman camp at safety, but after five practices the coaches moved him to inside linebacker to see him in that role. It didn't take long for him to make an impression at linebacker, as he zoomed to the top of the depth chart after just six practices.
- In 2004, he was the starter at the "Will" inside linebacker spot, as he became the first true freshman inside linebacker to start a season opener in CU history. He was also just the sixth true freshman to start an opener in school history and the first since 1991.
- As a freshman, he easily broke the single-season record for tackles by a freshman (80; the previous record was 67 by J.J. Billingsley).

Cabral's Take:

- "He's a fourth-year starter and I'm expecting his best season yet. He's played in a lot of big games and has made a lot of plays for us."

Human Interest:

- A Hawaiian native, Dizon can often be seen trudging to class through slush, snow and 20-degree weather in his flip-flops.
- He perfected the art chasing wild boars on hunting trips when he was younger. His mother, an undercover narcotics police officer in Hawai'i, never allowed him to use a gun. Instead he tracked the animals with help from dogs, pinned them to the ground and killed them with a knife. But according to Dizon, he is not into that anymore. "Those days are over," he joked. "My knees are too bad for that. My eyesight is going. I'm getting too old for that kind of stuff."
- He has become an avid golfer, and after only 18 months of playing his high score is a 78; he won an informal tournament organized by teammates during the summer.
