K-State looks to keep hope alive in the Rockies

With just two regular-season games remaining on its schedule, Kansas State hits the road for the final time in conference play Saturday, when the Wildcats travel to Folsom Field for yet another critical Big 12 North battle against Colorado in Boulder.

The game, which kicks off at 12:30 p.m. (MST)/1:30 p.m. (CST), is once again a lose-and-stay-home-for-the-holidays proposition for K-State (4-5, 2-4 Big 12), which came about as close as possible to seeing its 11-year bowl streak go by the boards last week at Missouri after falling behind the Tigers by 21 points.

However, in one of the greatest rallies in school history the Wildcats rose from the dead to outscore Mizzou 35-3 over the final 38 minutes of the game to claim their second conference win in the last three weeks.

Colorado (5-4, 2-4 Big 12) is coming off a come-from-behind win of its own as the Buffaloes overcame a 14-point deficit at Kansas, then held on for a 30-21 win over the Jayhawks to snap a two-game skid.

Amazing as it may seem, both teams remain alive in the Big 12 North race, despite their 2-4 conference records. Of the two, K-State has the least complicated route to the Big 12 Championship game. With a victory over the Buffaloes, K-State would then need only to defeat Iowa State in its regular-season home finale and have Nebraska lose at either No. 2 Oklahoma this week or vs. Colorado Nov. 26 to win the North.

No tube time again for Cats, Buffs

After appearing as part of the Big 12's weekly television package in three of the last four games, Kansas State will be off the air this week as there is no live telecast scheduled for the Wildcats' matchup with Colorado. It marks the second straight season that the Cats and Buffs will not be televised after appearing on the tube either regionally or nationally for nine consecutive seasons between 1994 and 2002.

Kansas State-COLORADO series hits sixty

Kansas State and Colorado will be meeting for the 60th time Saturday, when the Wildcats and Buffaloes square off in Boulder... The K-State-CU series dates to Nov. 16, 1912, a 14-6 Wildcat victory in Manhattan... The Buffaloes lead the all-time series, 41-17-1... Colorado has also won 24 of the 28 meetings in Boulder... Since the formation of the Big 12 in 1996, however, Kansas State has won 5-of-7 games, including two of the four games played in Boulder... In fact, half of Kansas State's total victories at Folsom Field have come in their last three visits to CU... K-State won last year's game in Manhattan, 49-20... The Wildcats' 49 points were their most ever against the Buffaloes... Kansas State will be looking to post back-to-back wins over the Buffs for the first time since winning four straight between 1997-2000... The only other time the Wildcats scored consecutive wins over Colorado occurred in the first two games of the series played in 1912 and 1939... Prior to last year's 29-point K-State win, four of the previous five games were decided by 10 points or less... Since 1995, the road team has won four of the nine games, with each team winning twice in the opposition's home stadium... Prior to Bill Snyder's arrival at K-State, the Buffaloes dominated the series, with the Wildcats winning just 12 of 44 meetings... CU leads the series 9-5-1 since.

K-State/CU connections

- ▶ Colorado assistant trainer Derrick Fitts previously worked with Kansas State's nationally-ranked women's basketball program and acted as supervisor of the student training staff at Kansas State.
- ▶ Two members of CU's speed-strength and conditioning program have ties to K-State. Director of speed-strength and conditioning, Greg Finnegan, received his master's in exercise physiology from Kansas State in 1994 and was twice a member of the Dean's List. Assistant speed-strength and conditioning coach Sarah Ramey began working on her master's in kinesiology while a graduate assistant Kansas State.
- ▶ Kansas State sophomore wide receiver Yamon Figurs and senior cornerback Cedrick Williams as well as Colorado cornerback Gerett Burl played junior college ball at Garden City Community College in Kansas.
- ▶ K-State's senior center Mike Johnson and CU sophomore linebacker Jason Ackermann are both products of Boulder's Fairview High School.
- ▶ Wildcat senior offensive tackle John Doty and Buffalo sophomore linebacker Ben Carpenter are both alums of Dowling High School in Des Moines, Iowa.

Homecoming kings

In addition to senior center Mike Johnson, sophomore quarterback Allen Webb also hails from the state of Colorado. Webb prepped at Denver's Chatfield High School before signing a Letter of Intent with Indiana and spending a redshirt season with the Hoosiers. An all-state selection and team MVP as a senior, Webb is the grandson of former Denver Mayor Wellington Webb.

First to worst, not so fast my friend

After facing the Big 12's top defense a week ago at Missouri, Kansas State will take on the conference's No. 12-ranked unit this week at Colorado. The Buffaloes are yielding an average of 430.7 yards per game to rank 99th nationally in total defense. But, don't let those number fool you. Opponents have not been able to do much with those yards as the Buffs are giving up an average of 23.4 points per game, which ranks seventh in the Big 12 and 51st in the country. CU also leads the Big 12 in red zone defense.

What's the score?

Kansas State's offense has not been blowing the doors off opponents like they have in recent years, but the Wildcats have been respectable nonetheless this season. K-State is averaging 30.2 points per game to rank sixth in the Big 12 and 34th nationally. The Cats, who average a slightly-better 30.7 ppg in Big 12 play, have also not been held below 21 points through nine games in 2004. As a result, it is likely that Colorado will have to up its 17.5 ppg average in Big 12 games in order to come out on top Saturday.

Double-time

Kansas State will look to string together its first back-to-back victories of the season Saturday, when the Wildcats travel to Colorado. K-State was unsuccessful in its three previous attempts this season and has not won consecutive games since winning seven in a row to close out its 2003 pre-bowl slate. During that seven-game run, the Wildcats were victorious in road games on Nov. 8 at Iowa State and Nov. 15 at Nebraska.

Double-time, take two

In addition to seeking their first consecutive wins of the season, the Wildcats will be out to secure their first back-to-back wins over Colorado since winning four straight between 1997-2000. That run included Kansas State wins at Folsom Field in both 1998 (16-9) and 2000 (44-21)..

Wildcat road show

Kansas State, which plays its final road game of the season Saturday at Colorado, notched its first win away from home last week at Missouri. Since the inception of the Big 12, no team has won more conference road games than Kansas State. The Wildcats, who have won 66 percent of their Big 12 away contests, are 23-12 when playing on the Big 12 road over the past eight seasons. During that span, Kansas State has failed to win at least two Big 12 road games only during the 2001 campaign, when the Wildcats went 1-3. From 1996 through 2000, K-State won no fewer than three Big 12 road games in each season. The Cats also won three games in 2002 before going 2-2 last year.

League ledger

Though Kansas State's 2-4 conference ledger this season is nothing to crow about, the Wildcats still own one of the best records in league play since the inception of the Big 12 Conference. K-State recorded its 51st Big 12 Conference victory at Missouri last week and now stands 51-19 all time in league games since 1996. Only Nebraska and Texas with 52 Big 12 wins each have won more Big 12 tilts than the Wildcats.

Cats' nine lives down to one

They say that cats have nine lives. However, in an 11-game college football season its more like five. And with five losses in nine games, Kansas State is on its last one if it wants to extend its string of 11 consecutive bowl berths. With two games to play, the Wildcats must win out to hit the magic six-win mark and go bowling for the 12th straight season.

Combinations and permutations on the road to Kansas City

Though Kansas State's outlook for a return trip to Kansas City for the Big 12 Championship game is far from a lock, the Wildcats chances certainly look better than they did a week ago. Still, K-State has no margin for error in its final two games and must win out to claim a fifth Big 12 North Division title. Victories over Colorado and Iowa State in the coming weeks would give Kansas State the head-to-head edge over all remaining contenders in the North, with the exception of Nebraska. However, a stumble by the Huskers either this week at No. 2 Oklahoma or on Nov. 26 vs. Colorado would catapult the Cats past Nebraska and give K-State the opportunity to become the first team ever to repeat as Big 12 Champions.

Worst to first

Prior to last week's win at Missouri, Kansas State shared the Big 12 North cellar with Colorado and Kansas at 1-4 in league play. However, what a difference three weeks could make. If the Wildcats can pull off wins in their final two games, K-State will have vaulted from last to first in the division. And its not like K-State hasn't done it before. Just last year the Cats opened Big 12 action with losses at Texas and Oklahoma State and was mired in the North basement before going on a six-game sizz to close out the regular season.

Wildcats hoping for another November to remember

The sun may not shine a whole lot in Kansas during the month of November, but for Kansas State it's been a time to make hay. With its 2004 postseason hopes hinging on every game and the Wildcats needing to win out in order to extend one of the nation's longest bowl streaks, K-State need only to look to recent history for inspiration. We pointed out previously Kansas State's dominance over the last five games of the season in recent years. That number now stands at a stunning 38-5 since the start of the Big 12 Conference in 1996. A big part of that success has been the Wildcats' scintillating record in November games. Since the start of the 1991 season, K-State is has won over 85 percent of its November contests, going 40-7 during the last 14-plus seasons. Since the inception of the Big 12, the Cats have been even better, winning 90 percent of their November tilts and posting a 27-3 record during the eight-plus years of the league, including unblemished marks in 1997, 1998, 2000, 2002, 2003 and thus far in 2004.

Been there, done that

Though the Wildcats have all but disappeared from the national scene, recent history has shown that Kansas State is one of the most resilient programs in all of college football as three-game losing streaks and slow starts in conference play have not been able to derail the Wildcats from reaching the postseason. During the 2001 campaign, K-State opened with four losses in its first six games, before Head Coach Bill Snyder guided the Wildcats to perhaps the most impressive mid-season turnaround in school history. That year, the Wildcats reeled off victories in four of their final five games to finish the regular season with a 6-5 record and earn a bid to play in the Insight.com Bowl. Last season's resurrection job by Snyder was even more impressive as K-State rebounded from three-straight mid-season setbacks with six consecutive Big 12 wins before knocking off Oklahoma in the Big 12 Championship game and earning its first league title since 1934.

Whatever it takes

If one views the 2004 season as a whole, Kansas State's offense has hardly been one-dimensional. Rather, Kansas State has shown an ability to adapt on the fly and take advantage of whatever the opposing defense has presented. During non-conference play, K-State came out of the gates as one of the nation's top rushing teams, twice going over the 300-yard mark on the ground and averaging over 250 yards per game. But once Big 12 play started and defenses began stacking against the run, the Wildcats successfully went to the air in their first three games and averaged 266 yards per game passing. Against Nebraska, it was back to the ground as K-State ran wild with 294 yards rushing.

Kansas State's ability to take what opposing defenses are giving them couldn't have been more perfectly exemplified than in the Wildcats' last two games. Versus Texas Tech, K-State totaled 415 yards with 167 on the ground and 248 through the air. One week later, those numbers were almost exactly flipped at Missouri, as the Wildcats gained 373 total yards behind 225 on the ground and 148 via the pass.

As a result, Kansas State owns one of the most balanced stat sheets in the Big 12. With 180.8 yards per game rushing and 187.4 yards per game passing, the Wildcats are one of just four teams in the league currently topping over 180 yards in both categories on average. The three others are Oklahoma, Texas A&M and Nebraska.

Wildcat offense beginning to hit on all cylinders

Kansas State's offense may have been directed by different quarterbacks at times during in each of the last three games, but one would hardly know it from looking at the stat sheets. The Wildcats have averaged over 400 yards of total offense in the last three weeks for their best three-game total offense mark (1,206 yards) of the season. K-State rolled up 418 yards against Nebraska with Allen Webb at the controls, as the sophomore gouged the Huskers for 271 yards of total offense. Against Texas Tech, it was Dylan Meier's turn under center and he responded with a career best 332 yards of total offense - the most by a K-State quarterback since Eli Roberson totaled 403 yards at Nebraska last season. Last week, the duo split the game (Meier in the first half and Webb in the second) as K-State amassed 373 total yards in its come-from-behind win at Missouri.

Churn and burn

After not being able to top 150 yards on the ground in three straight games to open Big 12 play, the Wildcats have averaged 229 yards rushing over the last three contests and appear to have gotten their running game untracked big time. Against Nebraska, two Wildcats topped the century mark and K-State came within six yards of hitting the 300-yard plateau on the ground for the third time this season, ripping a Blackshirt defense that previously ranked No. 2 nationally against the run for 294 yards. Quarterback Allen Webb led the way with a career-best 147 yards on a K-State quarterback record 34 carries, while Darren Sproles added 135 yards on 22 attempts. Against Texas Tech it was Dylan Meier and Sproles who teamed up, combining for 167 yards on 34 carries. Last week at Missouri, Sproles shouldered the brunt of the load, galloping for 160 yards on 20 carries, while Webb (52 yards) and Meier (15 yards) combined for another 67 for a total of 225 yards vs. a defensive unit that had yielded just 146.2 yards per game.

Rushing to victory

Outgaining an opponent on the ground has been crucial to the Wildcats' fortunes in 2004. Kansas State outrushed Western Kentucky, Louisiana-Lafayette, Nebraska and Texas Tech en route to victories in three of the four games. However, in four K-State's five losses this season the Cats have been outdistanced on the ground.

That trend carries back even further if you delve into Kansas State's recent history. Over the last 36 games, the Wildcats have outgained their opponents on the ground in 29 contests. In those 29 games, K-State is a sparkling 25-4. But in the eight games the Cats were outrushed, K-State is a combined 1-7, with the lone win coming last week at Missouri as the Tigers outgained the Wildcats, 239-226.

Thus far in 2004, K-State, which ranks No. 30 nationally in rushing on this week's NCAA chart with 180.8 yards per game, has outgained the opposition 1,627 to 1,314 on the ground for an average of 35 yards per game.

Winning the stat war

Kansas State Head Coach Bill Snyder said after the Wildcats' loss to Texas Tech that the team was better than its record at the time indicated. And K-State's 2004 statistics certainly bear that fact out. Through nine games, Kansas State has outscored the opposition 272 to 262 this season. The Wildcats have also been statistically much more impressive than the opposition, outdistancing their foes in first downs, rushing yards and total offense. K-State has also been the superior place-kicking team, making 11-of-13 attempts compared to 4-of-8 by the opposition and even has 17 fewer penalties than their opponents this season.

Fourth quarter is ours

Teams will often put four fingers in the air at the end of the third quarter to signify that the fourth quarter is theirs. But for Kansas State it truly has been. The Wildcats have outscored their opponents by a whopping 92-58 margin in the fourth quarter this season.

Drive engineering

Kansas State has shown a keen ability to string together long drives this season. Through nine games, the Wildcats have engineered 13 scoring drives of 75 or more yards this season, including eight in the last five weeks. K-State has also chewed up five minutes or more on the clock on 10 separate scoring drives, while taking double-digit snaps on 16 others.

Ball hogs

Kansas State, which leads the Big 12 in time of possession, has held the possession edge in five of its last seven games and 6-of-9 this season. In fact, K-State has held the ball over 35 minutes in 4-of-9 games this year and is averaging a TOP of just under 34 minutes for the season (33:54). K-State held the ball for over 33 minutes and ran 66 plays at Kansas on the heels of posting a TOP of 40:28 on 90 plays at Texas A&M. Against Nebraska, the Wildcats amassed a time of possession of 37:53 minutes on 84 plays. And talk about keeping your defense off the field, Kansas State has run over 75 plays in five separate games this season, with three plus 80-play outings.

In the zone

Kansas State continues to be one of the Big 12's best red zone teams, especially since the start of conference play. Through nine games, K-State has converted 32-of-38 (.842) red-zone opportunities into points. However, the Wildcats have been even better in Big 12 games, scoring on 21-of-24 (.875) chances to rank fourth in the conference.

Cat QBs taking care of the ball

Kansas State's quarterback duo of Dylan Meier and Allen Webb have done a solid job of taking care of the ball in recent weeks. In fact, the Wildcats' interception totals in 2004 are one of the most improved areas on the team over last season. Through nine games, K-State's QBs have tossed just six interceptions on 262 attempts, including two in the last five games on 163 passes. Through nine games last year, Kansas State's signal-callers had double that figure on fewer passes, throwing 12 picks on just 217 attempts. Prior to Meier's fourth quarter interception against Texas Tech, K-State's quarterback had gone 13 straight quarters and 112 consecutive attempts without a pick.

Wildcat defense has been tough after the break

Despite ranking 42nd nationally in total defense, Kansas State has been tough on opponents in the second half, especially in the last three games. Against Nebraska, Texas Tech and Missouri, the Wildcats yielded an average of just 121 yards after intermission. And though the Wildcats have given up 31 total points in the second half over the last three weeks, 14 of those points were actually scored on K-State's punt unit. As a result, opposing offenses have averaged just 5.7 second-half points against the Wildcats' defense in the last three games.

Defense holding opposing offenses below season averages

Since the start of Big 12 play, Kansas State's defense has held five of their six opponents below its season average for total offense entering the game against the Wildcats. In fact, K-State's first five Big 12 opponents were held to an average of 116.3 yards under what they had previously produced. Only Oklahoma (-51.4 yards) and Texas Tech (-79.4 yards) were able to get within 100 yards of their season averages as K-State held Texas A&M (-164.3 yards), Kansas (-100.6 yards) and Nebraska (-185.8 yards) significantly below what they had previously totaled. Missouri, which produced 101.1 yards more than its season average last week, is the only opponent to break the trend.

Fate no friend of K-State's scoring defense

The Kansas State defense may be yielding 29.1 points per game this season to rank 79th nationally, but a quick look inside the numbers reveals that the unit has been put in a number of tough spots. Of the 40 scoring drives the Wildcats have given up this season, 12 have opened inside K-State's 45-yard line with five of those starting in the red zone and two -- Nebraska's return of a botched punt snap and Texas Tech's punt return -- requiring no drive at all. On the flip side, the K-State defense has been solid when it has had some room to work with. Of the 65 drives opponents have started inside their own 30, Kansas State has yielded points on just 17.

Kansas State's defense has also been the victim of turnovers. Through eight games, K-State's foes have scored 72 of their 262 points (27 percent) following Wildcat turnovers, meaning that each K-State miscue has cost the Cats nearly four points. On the flip side, K-State has tallied just 41 of its 272 points (15 percent) following turnovers.

Punt units makes amends at Mizzou

After struggling on both sides of the punt game all season, Kansas State's special teams units had a breakthrough game last week at Missouri. Behind freshman Tim Reyer and junior Jesse Martinez, the Wildcats averaged a season-best 44.8 yards on eight punts. Even more impressive, K-State netted 44.2 yards on each boot after ranking 105th in the nation in net punting (31.6) entering the game. The Cats' punt return unit also had a big day, bolstered by Yamon Figurs' 54-yard return that set up the game-tying touchdown.

Meier steps up in Big 12 play

Sophomore Dylan Meier has emerged as one of a number of bright spots for the Wildcats since the start of Big 12 action and ranks fourth in the Big 12 in passing yards per game, averaging 204.4 yards in league games despite playing in just 16 of 24 possible quarters. And Meier has been using all his options. In his five Big 12 games, the sophomore has connected with nine different receivers, with five hauling in 10 or more passes. Meier opened Big 12 play with 246 yards passing and three touchdowns at Texas A&M before passing for a career-high 249 yards and two scores in just one half of action at Kansas. Against No. 2 Oklahoma, the Pittsburg, Kan., product was nearly as good, completing 20-of-38 attempts for 242 yards and a touchdown. Versus Texas Tech, Meier hit a new career-high in total offense with 332 yards, including 248 yards on 26-of-41 passing.

Webb casts safety net at QB

After struggling in his first two starts as Kansas State's starting quarterback against Fresno State and Kansas, sophomore Allen Webb has made huge strides in the last three games. Starting in place of Dylan Meier against Nebraska, Webb led K-State to one of its best offensive performances of the year as the Wildcats rolled up 418 yards of total offense and broke into the win column in Big 12 play with a 45-21 win over the Cornhuskers. Facing a rushing defense that ranked No. 2 nationally and had allowed just 66.8 yards per game this season, Webb gashed the Huskers for a career-best 147 yards on a K-State quarterback record 34 carries. He also accounted for 24 of K-State's 45 points, scoring on touchdown runs of 13, 9, 8 and 1 yards. Through the air, Webb hit career highs across the board with 14 completions on 23 attempts with no interceptions for 124 yards. Webb's double 100-yard effort marked just the 10th time in K-State's 1,002-game history that a quarterback has both rushed and passed for over 100 yards in the same game. Last week against Missouri, Webb came off the bench to engineer one of the biggest comebacks in school history, helping the Wildcats overcome a 21-7 second-half deficit. Against the Big 12's No. 1 defense, Webb connected on 6-of-8 passes for 111 yards and a pair of scores. He also rushed for 57 yards on 12 attempts to finish the game with 168 yards of total offense in just over two quarters of work.

Pick your poison

Unlike last season, when Kansas State relied heavily on the talents of James Terry in the passing game, the Wildcats have employed a group effort in 2004. And with defenses stacked to stop K-State's high-powered running game, K-State's young receiving corps has to emerge as one of the Big 12's best units. In nine games, no less than seven Wildcats have rung up double-figures in receptions for the year. Sophomore Jermaine Moreira is leading the way with 31 receptions and ranks fifth in the Big 12 in catches during conference games. Classmate Yamon Figurs, who has 26 receptions on the season, with 20 in the last six games, ranks eighth on this week's Big 12 receiving yards chart for league games. Figurs also leads the Wildcats in yards per catch (18.4), which ranks third in the conference since the start of Big 12 action. Also in the mix have been running back Darren Sproles, who had a career-high 10 receptions out of the backfield against Texas Tech, along with senior tight end Brian Casey and senior receiver Davin Dennis, who are tied for fourth on the team in receptions for the season with 17, senior receiver Tony Madison, who is averaging 16.5 yards on 11 catches, and senior wide receiver Antoine Polite, who hauled in the game winner at Missouri.

Sproles gets back on a roll

After facing a bevy of stacked defensive fronts that held him below 100 yards rushing three times since the start of Big 12 play, running back Darren Sproles has returned to form in the last three games, averaging 126 yards per game against Nebraska, Texas Tech and Missouri in the last two weeks.

The senior lit up the Blackshirts for the third straight year with 135 yards on 22 carries and a pair of touchdowns for his 22nd career 100-yard rushing performance. Sproles then added 83 yards on the ground and two rushing scores against Texas Tech before topping the century mark for the third straight season against Missouri with 160 yards on 20 attempts.

Sproles, who ranks 12th on this week's NCAA rushing chart with a 121.8 rushing average, has twice topped 200 yards on the ground in a game this season, including a staggering 292-yard performance vs. Louisiana-Lafayette that re-set Kansas State's single-game rushing record.

The 292 yards, which topped the previous school mark of 273 yards set by Sproles vs. Missouri on Nov. 22, 2003, are the seventh-most in Big 12 history and the most by a Big 12 player since Colorado's Chris Brown rushed for 309 yards against Kansas on Oct. 12, 2002. It also marked the fifth time in an eight-game stretch that the senior rushed for more than 200 yards, including a 221-yard performance in the season opener vs. Western Kentucky.

Sproles tops 1,000 yards... again

Senior running back Darren Sproles became the first Wildcat to rush for over 1,000 yards in three straight seasons last week at Missouri and has now totaled 1,096 yards on the season. Sproles, who rushed for 1,465 yards as a sophomore in 2002 and a nation-leading 1,986 yards as a junior in 2003, already owns Kansas State's top two single-season rushing marks. He needs just 168 total yards in the last two games to pass Josh Scobey's 2001 total of 1,263 and take possession of K-State's top three single-season spots. If he passes Scobey, it would also be a K-State rushing record for an 11-game season. Sproles 2002 and 2003 totals were amassed in 13- and 15-game seasons, respectively.

Little Tank also eyeing NCAA Top 10

For his career, which includes just two-plus seasons as K-State's feature back, Darren Sproles has totaled an impressive 4,757 yards on the ground to rank third all-time on the Big 12's career rushing list. On the NCAA's career chart, Sproles ranks 18th all-time and is just 209 yards away from vaulting past Indiana's Anthony Thompson (4,965) into the top 10.

Big 12 All-Purpose record belongs to Sproles, NCAA top 10 in sight

Kansas State's Darren Sproles, who ranks No. 1 in the country in all-purpose yardage (190.9 per game), became the Big 12's career all-purpose yardage leader against Nebraska with 193 yards continues to add to his record. He enters the Colorado game with a staggering 6,463 career all-purpose yards to rank 12th in NCAA history. He needs just 50 more yards vault into the NCAA's top 10.

Sproles pockets third 1,500-yard season

Darren Sproles became the first player in Kansas State history to top 1,500 all-purpose yards in three consecutive seasons with 249 yards against Texas Tech. Through nine games, the senior has amassed 1,718 yards -- a K-State 11-game single-season record -- and now owns the top three single-season all-purpose marks in school history. Sproles set the current school record with a nation-best 2,735 yards during 2003. He also owns K-State's No. 2 mark after gaining 1,800 yards during the 2002 campaign.

All-purpose, all the time

Darren Sproles, the nation's all-purpose yardage leader, not only set the Big 12 Conference record for all-purpose yardage this season, he also re-set the Kansas single-game all-purpose record vs. Louisiana-Lafayette with 351 yards. In addition to his 292 rushing yards, he had a 25-yard punt return, a 35-yard kickoff return and six receiving yards, topping his previous best of 345 yards vs. Oklahoma in the 2003 Big 12 Championship game on Dec. 6, 2003. Including his 189-yard outing at Missouri, the senior has now produced over 100 all-purpose yards in 33 of the last 37 games with three plus 300-yard performances.

Kansas State Head Coach Bill Snyder

► Kansas State Head Coach Bill Snyder (William Jewell '62) is 131-60-1 (.684) in his 16th season at Kansas State... His 131 victories are more than triple the man in second place on the all-time coaching victories list at Kansas State (Mike Ahearn had 39 wins from 1905-10).
► Snyder won National Coach of the Year honors in 1991, 1994 and 1998.
► Snyder has directed one of the most spectacular turnarounds in college football history, as before his arrival it took K-State 51 seasons (1938-1988) to total just 130 wins... The 12 head coaches prior to Snyder's arrival in Manhattan combined to win 116 games from 1945-1988.
► Snyder is 85-27 the past eight seasons and ranks fourth in number of total victories over that stretch. Snyder's seven-year mark of 76-24 ranks sixth in the number of victories among coaches in Division I-A over that span, while his six-year win total is fifth nationally.

Hot in the home stretch

Since becoming Kansas State's starting running back, Darren Sproles has been nearly unstoppable over the final five games of the season. During 2002, Sproles topped 100 yards in all five games, averaging 121.6 yards per game on 104 carries with nine touchdowns. He was even better during 2004, going over 200 yards twice and totaling 867 yards on the ground on 125 attempts for an average of 173.4 yards per game with seven TDs. Sproles has kept that streak of averaging over 100 yards per game alive this season, opening K-State's five-game stretch run by averaging 126 yards against Nebraska, Texas Tech and Missouri.

Little man, big impact

Darren Sproles may stand only 5-foot-7, but his impact on Kansas State's fortunes on the field are difficult to overstate. In his 23 100-yard rushing games, the Wildcats have posted a stunning overall record of 20-3. However, in the 13 games he has started but failed to hit the 100-yard rushing mark the Wildcats are just 6-8.

On the straight and narrow

Though many programs have struggled in the kicking game in 2004, Kansas State has not been one of them thanks to the steady performance of senior place-kicker Joe Rheem. Rheem, a Lou Groza Award candidate, has connected on 11-of-13 field goal attempts (both misses were blocked), including a career-long 49-yarder at Kansas, and each of his 31 PATs. As a result, Rheem has jumped into Kansas State's top five in both career scoring and field goals made. With eight points at KU, the senior moved passed his brother, Jamie, and into second place on K-State's total points chart. He added five points each of the last two games and now has 279 for his career. He also ranks fifth all-time at Kansas State in field goals made with 36 and can move into the No. 2 spot with four more makes. Rheem, who ranks second in the Big 12 in kick scoring, is 34th on this week's NCAA field goal chart (1.22 per game). He also owns one of the longest consecutive PAT strings in the nation with 68 in a row and has gone over a year since his last missed PAT (10/18/03 vs. CU).

Archer on target

Sophomore linebacker Brandon Archer is yet another Wildcat who has emerged into a starter in 2004. The strong-side linebacker leads the Wildcats with 57 tackles this season and has hit double figures in stops three times on the year, including a game-high 11 tackles against Texas Tech last week. Archer, who also had 11 tackles in his first start against Fresno State, was credited with 10 against Oklahoma and also snared his first career interception against the Sooners, returning it 27 yards for a touchdown. Archer, who ranks 15th in the Big 12 in tackles during conference play with 42, notched his second career interceptions at Missouri and returned it 25 yards for a score. It is quite a step up in play for the sophomore, who saw action in all 15 games last season after redshirting in 2002, but posted just 15 tackles on the year, including nine solo stops, with one tackle for loss and a forced fumble.

Recap

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Darren Sproles ran for 221 yards and a touchdown on 42 carries, leading No. 12 Kansas State to a 27-13 victory over Western Kentucky in the season opener for both teams.

Sproles, the nation's leading rusher with 1,986 yards last season, extended his school record with his 20th 100-yard game. He has gone over 200 yards in four of his last six games. After his 32-yard touchdown run for a 17-6 lead in the third quarter, he needs two more TDs to tie Eli Roberson for the Wildcats' career record of 40.

Dylan Meier, a sophomore making his first start at quarterback as Roberson's replacement, threw for 183 yards and ran for 60 yards and one score. He was replaced by Allen Webb midway through a drive in the fourth quarter, and Webb capped that possession with an 8-yard run for a 27-13 lead with just over 6 1/2 minutes left.

Kansas State outgained the Hilltoppers 502 yards to 259.

Still, the Wildcats' 14th straight home-opening win was closer than it might have been.

Kansas State led 10-6 at half-time and 20-13 after three quarters and struggled to convert red zone opportunities for much of the game.

The Wildcats scored easily on their opening possession, capped by Meier's 9-yard run midway through the first quarter for a 7-0 lead. But Sproles fumbled at Western Kentucky's 18 on Kansas State's next drive, and Charles Thompson recovered for the Hilltoppers.

Western Kentucky converted turnover into Lerron Moore's 13-yard TD run with just over 10 1/2 minutes in the half, cutting the lead to 7-6. But the Hilltoppers missed the point after and could not capitalize on a successful onside kick.

Penalties killed another drive for Kansas State later in the second quarter, taking the Wildcats out of field goal range after they had reached Western Kentucky's 32.

The Wildcats then had first and goal on the 3-yard line with more than a minute left in the half -- but fumbled two exchanges and had to settle for Joe Rheem's 22-yard field goal as time expired for a 10-6 lead.

After Sproles' TD and Rheem's 19-yard field goal put the Wildcats up 20-6 in the third quarter, Justin Haddix's 5-yard pass to Earl Clayton in the closing seconds of the period got the Hilltoppers within 20-13.

Haddix finished 10-for-21 for 182 yards passing, and Maurice Perkins had five catches for 126 yards for the Hilltoppers.

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Fresno State was able to keep Darren Sproles under wraps, holding the senior to just 37 yards rushing, as Fresno State knocked off Kansas State, 45-21, at KSU Stadium.

Paul Pinegar threw two touchdown passes to Matt Rivera and ran for another score to lead the way for the Bulldogs.

Dwayne Wright added 76 yards on the ground and a pair of scores as Fresno State notched its second road win over a team from a BCS conference in seven days.

Kansas State led 7-0 before it took a snap thanks to a Bret Jones 42-yard interception return for a touchdown less than 3 1/2 minutes into the game.

But things went downhill quickly for the Cats, who mustered just 2 yards of offense in the first quarter and trailed 31-14 at the half.

Jones grabbed his second pick to thwart a potential touchdown drive in the third quarter and Maurice Mack added his first career interception, but the turnovers did little to stem Fresno State's momentum.

In addition to his ground attack, Wright also caught three passes for 65 yards before being hurt on a 61-yard swing pass in the fourth quarter -- a play that set Bryson Sumlin's 4-yard TD run for a 45-14 lead. Sumlin finished with 68 yards rushing, while Pinegar was 17-for-30 for 244 yards.

The Wildcats showed a spark of life in the second quarter when Dylan Meier replaced first-time starter Alan Webb at quarterback and sparked a 56-yard touchdown drive with a 47-yard TD pass to Davin Dennis that got the Wildcats within 17-14. But that is as close as Kansas State would get as Pinegar connected with Rivera from 10 yards out for a 24-14 lead. Then, after Adam Jennings' 40-yard punt return to K-State's 11, Pinegar scored from the 2 to make it 31-14.

On the ensuing possession, Meier once again had the Wildcats on the march. But an interception by James Sanders deep in Bulldogs' territory in the closing seconds of the first half snuffed out any chance for K-State to take the momentum into halftime.

Webb returned to the game to start the second half but tossed an interception to Richard Marshall, and the Bulldogs capitalized with Pinegar's 29-yard swing pass play to Rivera for a 38-14 lead.

A Sumlin touchdown from 45 yards out stretched the lead to 45-14 with just under five minutes to play. Sproles, who finished with 178 all-purpose yards for the game, took the resulting kickoff 79 yards to the Bulldog 19 to set up the final score of the game when Brian Casey fumbled into the end zone after catching a 13-yard pass, and Tony Madison fell on it for a TD.

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Darren Sproles ran for a school-record 292 yards and a touchdown and quarterback Dylan Meier added a pair of rushing scores as the Wildcats ran past Louisiana-Lafayette 40-20 before 47,914 at KSU Stadium.

Led by Sproles, who also smashed the K-State all-purpose record with 351 yards, the Wildcats ground out 393 yards via the run for the seventh-most productive rushing effort in school history.

Unlike the previous week, Sproles got off to a fast start, posting his collecting his sixth career 100-yard rushing quarter in the first 15 minutes by totalling 104 yards on just 12 carries.

By intermission, the senior had rolled up 195 yards, including a 35-yard touchdown run.

A pair of filed goals by place-kicker Joe Rheem and a Meier TD pass to tight end Brian Casey helped Kansas State build a 20-7 halftime lead.

After the break, Sproles ripped off runs of 16, 11, 9 and 9 yards in an 80-yard TD drive on Kansas State's first possession of the third quarter. Meier capped the drive from a yard out to make it 27-7.

Marvin Simmons intercepted a Jerry Babb pass on the next Ragin' Cajun possession to set up another Rheem field goal as the Wildcats' lead swelled to 30-7.

Babb, however, rallied Louisiana-Lafayette with a 9-yard touchdown run to help close the gap before galloping 80 yards early in the fourth quarter to set up a 1-yard plunge from Chester Johnson that sliced the K-State lead to 30-20 with just over 10 minutes to go.

But a Davin Dennis 41-yard return on the ensuing kickoff gave Kansas State excellent field position once again and the Wildcats took advantage as Meier went over from 5 yards out for his second score of the game.

A fourth field goal in the final minutes gave Rheem a career high in makes as the senior finished a perfect afternoon with 13 points and put the finishing touches on the victory.

Junior college transfer Brett Jones collected a team-high eight tackles in his first extensive playing time off the bench to lead the defense, while junior safety Jesse Tetuan also got into the act with his first interception of the year.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Kansas State turned out to be its own worst enemy in its 2004 Big 12 opener, setting up three short Texas A&M touchdown drives with turnovers as the Wildcats were knocked off by the Aggies 42-30 at Kyle Field despite getting a career night from sophomore quarterback Dylan Meier.

Courtney Lewis ran for three touchdowns to lead the way for Texas A&M, sending the Aggies to their third straight win.

Meier connected with eight different receivers en route to a 29-for-45 passing performance that included three touchdowns and was just four completions off the K-State single-game record.

But Meier's performance was not enough to overcome the miscues that started A&M drives at the K-State 12, 5 and 2.

The Aggies quickly scored touchdowns on all three. Their other scoring drives were fast, too - 80 yards in four plays, 69 yards in five plays and a three-play, 67-yarder in the final minute, when it looked like they might just be running out the clock.

A&M ran just 43 plays, while the Wildcats had 90. Kansas State also the ball for more than twice as long as the Aggies -- 40 minutes, 28 seconds to 19:32.

That would usually mean big numbers for Sproles, the nation's leader in all-purpose yards at 250 per game, but he was held to 61 rushing and 48 receiving. And 35 of his rushing yards came on the opening drive, when Kansas State marched 63 yards on 12 plays to take an early 7-0 lead.

Sproles committed K-State's first two turnovers, leading to A&M's first touchdown and another in the third quarter that gave the Aggies back the momentum they'd just lost and led to the TD that put them up 28-17.

After an interception helped A&M stretch the lead to 35-17, Meier rallied the Cats with two fourth-quarter touchdown passes to Jermaine Moreira. K-State then was driving for the go-ahead points with under two minutes left but on fourth down from the 38, Meier avoided sack and flicked the ball to Sproles. He scooted between a few defenders only to run into one of his linemen five yards shy of a first down.

Reggie McNeal then iced the game for A&M with a 62-yard sprint on third down in the final minute to produce the final score of the game.

McNeal completed just 7-of-12 passes for 129 yards, including a 29-yard touchdown pass to Terrence Murphy, but led the Aggies on the ground with 84 yards and eluded several potential sacks.

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Dylan Meier came off the bench and passed for 249 yards and two touchdowns and ran for a third in the second half, but it was not enough to help the Wildcats overcome an inspired Kansas effort as the Jayhawks snapped Kansas State's 11-game stranglehold on the Sunflower State Showdown with a 31-28 victory Saturday night at Memorial Stadium.

Kansas (3-3, 1-2 Big 12), which had not won a game in the series since 1992, led 7-6 at the half and 17-6 late in the third quarter before Meier, who replaced starter Allen Webb to open the second half, guided the Wildcats to a pair of long touchdown drives to give Kansas State (2-3, 0-2 Big 12) a 21-17 lead with 13:20 remaining in the fourth quarter.

However, the Jayhawks struck back behind a 31-yard touchdown reception by Mark Simmons and a 43-yard run by John Randle with 3:16 to play to go on top for good.

Brian Casey hauled in an 8-yard touchdown from Meier with just over 2 minutes left to get the Wildcats within three points. But K-State was unable to come up with the ensuing on-sides kick and Kansas was able to run out the clock.

Randle rushed for 105 yards to lead Kansas.

The first half was more of a defensive battle, with Kansas drawing first blood behind a 53-yard drive on their second possession and took their first lead over Kansas State in eight years when Barmann hit Lyonel Anderson with a 2-yard TD pass.

The drive appeared to be stalled when Barmann's pass into the end zone fell incomplete on third-and-14, but Bret Jones was flagged for pass interference, giving Kansas a first down on the 3.

Kansas State's Joe Rheem booted a career-long 49-yard field goal early in the second quarter to make it 7-3. He also made a 37-yarder with 2:01 left in the half.

Recap

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Kansas State stood toe-to-toe with No. 2-ranked Oklahoma for three quarters, but the Sooners proved to be too much down the stretch as OU held on for a 31-21 victory before 52,310 at KSU Stadium.

Dylan Meier passed for 242 yards, including a 38-yard touchdown strike to Yamon Figurs, and ran for another score to lead Kansas State to an early lead.

Jason White threw for four touchdowns, two each to Travis Wilson and Mark Clayton to pace the Sooners. Oklahoma also got 130 yards on the ground from freshman Adrian Peterson.

Kansas State led three times but couldn't hold onto its lead as Oklahoma scored the final 14 points of the game.

The Wildcats went up 21-17 with just under 10 minutes left in the third quarter, courtesy of White's only miscue of the day. On first down from his own 27, White threw into the left flat -- straight to Wildcat linebacker Brandon Archer, who returned it 27 yards for a touchdown.

But White redeemed himself on Oklahoma's next possession, throwing a 15-yard scoring pass to Clayton for a 24-21 lead. Clayton's 8-yard TD catch made it 31-21 midway through the fourth quarter, capping a drive on which Peterson carried seven times for 46 yards.

Darren Sproles, Kansas State's All-America running back, was held largely in check both by Oklahoma's defense and Kansas State's pass-first game plan.

Sproles, finished with 34 yards on only 13 carries, but tied former quarterback Eli Roberson's school record for career touchdowns with a 1-yard burst for a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Wildcats had a chance to go up by double figures later in the first, but linebacker Rufus Alexander sacked and stripped Dylan Meier in Oklahoma territory and then recovered the fumble at his 46. That set up White's 17-yard pass to Wilson, tying the score at 7.

The Sooners, who went three-and-out on their first two possessions, fell behind 14-7 on Meier's 38-yard pass to Figurs early in the second quarter. But on Oklahoma's next possession, White and Wilson hooked up twice for 55 yards, the last time on a 14-yard touchdown pass to make it 14-14.

Oklahoma took its first lead, 17-14, on Trey DiCarlo's 26-yard field goal with just more than three minutes left in the half.

Scott Edmonds blocked DiCarlo's 40-yard attempt on Oklahoma's first possession of the third quarter, for his second career blocked field goal.

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Backup quarterback Allen Webb rushed for 147 yards and scored four times and Darren Sproles broke two offensive records as Kansas State rolled past Nebraska 45-21 before 52,234 fans at KSU Stadium.

In just his third career start, Webb scored on runs of 13, 8, 1 and 9 yards as K-State notched its first Big 12 game of the year. He would have tied Kansas State's single-game record with five TDs if he hadn't fumbled just as he was starting to cross the goal line in the fourth quarter.

The win was the Wildcats' third straight over the Huskers and the fourth in the last five years.

Nebraska was able to stay in the game with two long pass plays and a defensive touchdown but collapsed in the fourth quarter with three consecutive turnovers that led to two Wildcats touchdowns.

Sproles rushed for 135 yards on 22 carries and scored on two short runs. His first, a 2-yard sprint, broke the school career record with his 41st touchdown. He also scored on a 3-yard run and raised his career all-purpose yards total to 6,010, breaking the Big 12 record held by former Heisman Trophy winner Ricky Williams of Texas.

But Webb got the Wildcats off to a fast start, guiding Kansas State on touchdown drives of 75 and 49 yards on its first two possessions.

Sproles turned a short pass into a 16-yard gain and Webb hit Yamon Figurs for 23 yards, setting up his 13-yard TD run to make it 7-0.

Five minutes later, with the help of Sproles runs of 18 and 16 yards, Webb increased K-State's edge to 14-0 with an 8-yard run.

K-State had 134 total yards to Nebraska's minus-2 when Cory Ross took a shovel pass from Joe Dailey and sped 63 yards to the 20.

On the next play, Brandon Jackson took a handoff and bulled through the middle of the Wildcats' defense to make it 14-7.

Sproles' record-breaking TD run had put the Wildcats up 21-7 when Terrence Nunn got behind the secondary and hauled in Dailey's pass for a 55-yard gain.

Three plays later, Jackson took it in from the 2 and the Huskers, despite being thoroughly outplayed, trailed only 21-14.

The Wildcats went up 24-14 in the final seconds of the half on Joe Rheem's 40-yard field goal.

Nebraska's Daniel Bullocks pulled the Huskers within 24-21 after picking up an errant punt snap and scoring from 10 yards out. But that's as close as Nebraska would get as K-State scored the game's final 21 points.

After Webb's 1-yard run put Kansas State on top 31-21, the Cats turned consecutive NU miscues into points, with Webb going 9 yards on one play and Sproles scoring on a 3-yard TD run.

Recap

MANHATTAN, Kan. — A 90-yard punt return by Texas Tech and a crucial interception that ended a potential Kansas State scoring drive were enough to stop the Wildcats' comeback bid dead in its tracks as K-State suffered a 35-25 homecoming loss to the Red Raiders before 48,338 at KSU Stadium.

Sonny Cumbie passed for 326 yards and two touchdowns and Taurean Henderson rushed for 93 yards and a pair of scores to lead the Red Raiders.

Tech, which led 14-7 at the half, opened a 28-10 lead and appeared to be on cruise control when Danny Amendola burst up the left sideline with his 90-yard punt return with 4:31 left in the third quarter.

But the Wildcats, who got 248 yards passing and another 84 on the ground from quarterback Dylan Meier, used a safety and a 40-yard touchdown run by Darren Sproles in a span of 37 seconds to get back in the game.

It was the 42nd career rushing TD for Sproles, who finished the game with 83 yards on the ground and 10 receptions for another 79 yards.

Trailing 28-19, the Wildcats appeared to have a first-and-goal at the Texas Tech 9 but were penalized for throwing two forward passes on the same play.

On the next play, Tech defensive end Adell Duckett intercepted Meier's pass and returned it 24 yards to the Kansas State 43.

Henderson then burst through a big hole up the middle on the Red Raider's next snap and went 43 yards for a touchdown to extend the Red Raiders' advantage to 35-19 with 5:22 to go.

K-State drove 75 yards a few minutes later, with Meier scoring on a 2-yard run. But a pass for a two-point conversion failed and the Wildcats were unable to come up with an ensuing on-sides kick.

Texas Tech led at halftime only 14-7 despite amassing 278 total yards to just 100 for the Wildcats. Tech's Alex Trlica missed field goals of 50 and 41 yards in the second quarter when drives stalled on third-and-10 and third-and-21 plays.

Kansas State got on the board with 5:45 left in the second quarter with a surprise play on second-and-goal from the 5.

The Wildcats lined up in a single wing, with Meier flanked wide. Sproles took the snap and dashed up the middle for the score.

Joe Rheem then kicked a 28-yard field goal to cap the opening drive of the second half and pull the Wildcats within 14-10. But that's as close as Kansas State would get as Texas Tech's big plays were enough to keep the Cats from ever taking the lead.

Recap

COLUMBIA, Mo. — Quarterback Alan Webb came off the bench to throw two touchdown passes and Darren Sproles ran for a pair of scores as Kansas State rallied from a 21-point deficit to beat Missouri 35-24 before 63,412 at Faurot Field.

Kansas State scored 21 points in the fourth quarter against the Big 12's top-ranked defense to win its 12th straight over the Tigers. The comeback also tied for the largest deficit overcome in school history, equaling the 21-point deficits K-State overcame against Iowa State and Oklahoma State during the 1999 campaign.

Webb, who had started three games, stepped in for starter Dylan Meier on two first-half series, then opened the second at the controls to spark the come-from-behind win.

Webb, who rushed for 52 yards on 12 attempts, threw just eight times but completed six attempts for 111 yards, including a 20-yard touchdown strike to Antoine Polite that gave the Wildcats the lead for good, 28-24, with 9:39 remaining.

Three plays later, Brandon Archer intercepted a Brad Smith pass that was tipped by Derek Marso and returned it 25 yards for an 11-point cushion, effectively putting the game out of reach.

However, the game did start out that way as Missouri jumped out to a 21-0 lead. Kansas State running back Darren Sproles then broke loose for touchdown runs of 10 and 74 yards, the latter with just over eight minutes left in the third quarter to pull the Wildcats within a touchdown.

Sproles, who topped the 100-mark for the third straight year against Mizzou, finished with 160 yards on 20 carries and went over the century mark in rushing for the third consecutive season.

K-State then tied the game at 21 on the second play of the fourth quarter as web hit wide receiver Jermaine Moreira on a 8-yard middle screen to cap a 7-play, 42-yard drive that was set up by 54-yard punt return by Yamon Figurs.

Missouri running back Damien Nash, who rushed for 118 yards on 12 carries, bolted 66 yards to set up a Joe Tantarelli 24-yard field goal that put the Tigers back on top 24-21 with 13:08 left.

It proved be Mizzou's final points of the day as Polite and Archer would go on to ice the game for Kansas State with their fourth-quarter scores.
