


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
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



























- The CU campus is home to about 200 classic rural Italian-style buildings of Colorado sandstone.

- Colorado has 26 ski and snowboard resorts, many of which are within a three-hour drive from Boulder.








- The U.S. News & World Report ranked CU-Boulder 34th among the nation's Top 50 Public National Universities in its 2009 Best Colleges issue. The rankings were based on factors such as academic reputation, retention, faculty resources, student selectivity and financial resources.
- ➤ Sixteen CU-Boulder graduate school specialty programs were ranked in the top 50 in the nation, including five in the top 10 in the U.S. News and World Report's 2009 America's Best Graduate Schools issue.
- ► The University of Colorado at Boulder ranks third in the nation for the number of graduates currently serving as Peace Corps volunteers.



- ► Boulder boasts more than 300 sunny days each year.
- Boulder's Third Flatiron towers 1,400 feet high, a few hundred feet higher than the Empire State Building.






- Denver is the nation's 24th-largest city with a population of just under 600,000 while the metro area is the 16th-most populous with just over three million people.
- ▶ Boulder is not considered a suburb of Denver, but from CU's campus, it is just a half-hour drive to downtown Denver. Boulder and Denver are situated such that Boulder is close enough to a big city and yet far enough away.
- ▶ Denver is one of the few cities in the country where all four major professional sports team's stadiums are located downtown.
- ▶ Invesco Field at Mile High (home to the NFL's Denver Broncos), Coors Field (home to MLB's Colorado Rockies) and the Pepsi Center (home to the NBA's Denver Nuggets and NHL's Colorado Avalanche) are all less than 15 years old. All are located in the downtown Denver area and are viewable from each other.
- ► Denver is known as the Mile High City because the official altitude of the city is exactly one mile above sea level at 5,280 feet.
- ▶ Denver was established during the gold rush in the 1850s and is one of the few cities in the world that was not built on a road, railroad, lake or river when founded. It just happened to be where the first few flakes of gold were found.







- Colorado's humidity averages about 38 percent. California averages about 50 percent, Texas 69 percent while the southeast averages 70 percent and the midwest 72 percent.
- ► Lower levels of humidity give Colorado a temperate climate. Places where humidity is higher, cold feels colder and hot feels hotter.
- ➤ Colorado boasts 255 sunny days per year and over 320 days where the sun will shine, adding to more hours of sunlight than Miami or San Diego.












- ► The Winter X Games have called Colorado home 10 of the 13 years of its existence, including the last eight in world-famous Aspen.
- ► Colorado has spectacular man-made places from different historical eras. Red Rocks is a one-of-a-kind amphitheater just a half-hour from Boulder while Mesa Verde National Park highlights archeological sites over 700 years old.
- ▶ At an average of 6,800 feet, Colorado is the nation's highest state. Elite athletes from all over the world flock to Boulder to benefit from high altitude training.



- ► The Colorado Rapids enjoy success in major league soccer while newer additions to the Denver pro sports scene like the Colorado Mammoth (national lacrosse league) won the championship in 2006 and the Colorado Crush won the Arena Bowl in 2005.

# Jeff Bzdelik

Jeff Bzdelik enters his third year as the University of Colorado men's basketball head coach. Named the 17th men's basketball head coach on April 4, 2007 in school history, Bzdelik continues the foundation of success on and off the court of Buffaloes basketball.

Although his second year at the helm was not a successful season based on victories, Bzdelik (buzz-DEL-ik) and his staff continued onward and upward in

numerous and positive steps toward a successful season despite a 9-22 campaign. With one senior and one junior and core of underclassmen, the Buffaloes youth of freshmen and sophomores attributed for 72.3 percent of the team scoring marking the highest of any Buffs since the Big 12 began play in 1996-97. Falling short of the scoreboard by single-digits in 11 games by 50 total points (average of 4.6 ppg.), saw the Buffs competitive on a nightly basis.

Off the court, CU made greater strides in the classroom earning the athletic departments most improved honor, as its aggregate GPA rose .318 (to 2.718) over the last two semesters, the largest jump of any CU athletic team since late 1990s. During the spring 2009 semester, the men's team achieved their highest grade point average on record a 2.937. The 2.937 GPA shatters the spring 2001 semester of 2.744.

Of the 14 CU sports listed (track and field listed as one) during the spring semester, men's basketball was eighth overall among the school's varsity sports and second among men's sports.

In his first season on the Boulder campus, Bzdelik and his staff saw a mix of positives and negatives in their 12-20 campaign. CU remained competitive despite its lack of depth losing nine games by an average of 4.8 points. The defense allowed opponents an average of 64.4 points per game, its lowest in 46 years, while committing 13.4 turnovers a game – another school-low in 28 years.

Bzdelik, 56, came to Colorado from the United States Air Force Academy, where he guided the Falcons to a 50-16 record (a 75.8 winning percentage) in two seasons from 2005-07. During those two seasons he led the Falcons to a 2005-06 NCAA Tournament and a 2006-07 NIT Final Four appearance.

Bzdelik brings 31 years of coaching experience to the Boulder campus from the collegiate to the professional ranks. He returned to the college game in 2005-06 after 15 seasons as both a coach and scout in the NBA, including two-and-a-half seasons as head coach of the Denver Nuggets.

His two-year win total of 50 victories at the Academy was a school-best in any two-year span of the 51-year history of Air Force basketball, while his 26 victories in 2006-07 was also a school high. He's the only coach to have won at least 24 games in back-to-back seasons. Bzdelik guided the Falcons to a 31-1 home record, including a 15-0 mark in 2005-06 and 16-1 in 2006-07.

In 2005-06, Bzdelik led the Falcons to a 24-7 record and the school's fourth appearance ever in the NCAA Tournament. He also led the Falcons to a 12-4 record and second place finish in the Mountain West Conference. Air Force also capped the season leading the nation for the fourth consecutive season in scoring defense.

"Jeff symbolizes all the essential leadership qualities that are important to successfully direct the Buff basketball program and represent the University of Colorado with class and distinct," Bohn said. "His high level of professionalism, competitive spirit, work ethic and integrity makes him the perfect choice for our world class institution."

"With the hiring of Jeff Bzdelik, the University of Colorado at Boulder has made a strong statement about our values as well as our athletic aspirations," said then-CU Chancellor Bud Peterson (2006-09). "Coach Bzdelik's experience, commitment to excellence, concern for his players as scholar-athletes, along with his intensity and attention to detail, are a perfect fit for the type of environment we are creating here at CU."


Prior to returning to the college ranks with the Air Force Academy, Bzdelik was the Denver Nuggets head coach for two-and-a-half seasons (2002-2005). He was named head coach in August of 2002 after spending one year as a scout for the Nuggets. Bzdelik engineered one of the biggest turnarounds in NBA history during his second season in 2003-04, leading the Nuggets to the playoffs for the first time since 1994-95 while posting a 43-39 record. The 26-game improvement over the previous year was the sixth-best in NBA history.

Bzdelik also became the first coach in league history (since the adoption of an 82-game schedule) to guide a team to the playoffs the year after winning less than 20 games. In his first season, Bzdelik earned NBA-wide praise for Denver's competitiveness, work ethic and never-give-up attitude. Despite having the youngest team in franchise history, Bzdelik's team shattered the franchise record for scoring defense by more than five points per game, giving up only 92.4 per outing. In addition, the Nuggets led the league in turnovers forced (17.1 per game) and had six of the top 12 marks for single-season scoring defense.

Surprisingly to many, he was let go by the Nuggets after just 28 games into the 2004-05 season, with the team off to a 13-15 start. But that decision would eventually become Air Force's and now Colorado's gain.

From 1995-2001, Bzdelik was an assistant coach under Pat Riley in Miami, holding the title of Assistant Coach/Director of Scouting during the final two years. With the Heat, he was responsible for the preparation of all game plans, video coordination and statistical data as well as player development.

In 2000, he was recognized by The *USA Today* as one of the NBA's top five assistant coaches. In the 1998 Pro Basketball issue of *Sports Illustrated*, he was voted as the NBA's best advance scout by league general managers.

Prior to his tenure with the Heat, Bzdelik spent the 1994-95 season as the lead scout for Riley and the New York Knicks. He also served as an assistant coach with the Washington Bullets from 1988-94 and was Wes Unseld's first assistant in 1993-94. In addition, he coached the Bullets summer league team in 1988 and 1994.

The Illinois native began his coaching career in 1978 at Davidson (N.C.) College. In 1980, he was named an assistant coach at Northwestern University where he spent six seasons and was instrumental in the Wildcats' first NIT appearance in school history.



He then accepted his first head coaching position at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County, one he would handle for two years before moving on to the NBA.

During the 1986-87 season at UMBC, his squad was cited by The Sporting News as having "One of College's Biggest Turnarounds," in the school's inaugural season in Division I. After going just 11-44 the previous two seasons as a Division II program before Bzdelik's arrival, UMBC went 12-16 in his first year and 13-15 in 1987-88 in Division I. His teams excelled in the classroom as well, posting a 2.86 grade point average during his tenure.

Bzdelik is a 1976 graduate of the University of Illinois-Chicago, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education. He earned four varsity letters in basketball at UIC and was named team MVP as a senior in 1975-76. He still holds the school record for the best free-throw percentage in one season, shooting 88.1 percent (59-for-67) from the line in 1975-76 and still ranks among UIC's all-time leading scorers.



Bzdelik also spent six years in the Army National Guard during the early to mid 1970s.

In June 2008, Bzdelik was one of six coaches invited by the USO (United Service Organizations) to visit and experience the Persian Gulf called "Operation Hoop Talk: Talking Hoops with the Troops."

During the tour, Bzdelik and the coaches visited Bethesda and Walter Reed Hospitals in Washington, D.C., visiting wounded military personnel and toured multiple military posts in Kuwait City and Iraq. The coaches also posed for photos, signed autographs and spent quality time talking with military about the game of basketball, in addition helping boost troop morale bringing a touch of home to those in uniform.

"It keeps things in perspective," said Bzdelik on how the experience affected him. "As a coach you are in awe of the collective will, of sacrificing the individual for the collective good, of unselfishness, and dedication. And the military is the best example of this. I want to rally this message to my team, and hopefully that will help them grow. I would go back tomorrow. There is special spirit there that engulfs one, and you just feel it, and want to be around it."

Bzdelik was born December 1, 1952 and graduated from Prospect High School in Mount Prospect, Ill. He is married to the former Nina Bernardzik, who was a standout volleyball player at UIC from 1974-76 and is a member of the Flames' Athletic Hall of Fame. They are the parents of two children, Brett (20) and Courtney (18).







# Associate Head Coach



# Steve McClain

Steve McClain enters his third year with the Colorado coaching staff and second year as the associate head coach.

McClain joined the CU staff in 2007 after serving as the 19th head coach at the University of Wyoming from 1998-2007. For nine seasons, McClain led the Cowboy program through one of its most successful periods in school history posting the fifth highest winning percentage in school history (57.7 percent) and achieving a 157-115 record.

"To have someone like Steve McClain with his successful background as a head coach is a real asset to the University of Colorado," Bzdelik said. "He brings energy, experience, leadership and knowledge."

McClain's teams averaged 17 wins per season through his nine years.

In four of his nine seasons, Wyoming appeared in postseason play

advancing to the second round in each of the 2002 NCAA and the 2003 National Invitational Tournaments. UW also advanced to the second round of the 1999 NIT and appeared in the 2001 NIT.

In conference play, McClain's teams captured two of the first seven Mountain West Conference titles, sharing the title for the 2000-01 season and winning it outright in 2001-02. The outright title in 2001-02 was Wyoming's first outright championship in 20 years.

McClain, 47, coached two All-Americans during his stint Laramie. Josh Davis was an Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American in his senior season of 2001-02. Prior to the 2002-03 season, Marcus Bailey was one of only 50 players nationally named to the John R. Wooden Award Preseason All-America team.

In five of nine seasons that McClain coached in the MWC, at least one Cowboy earned All-Mountain West Conference first-team honors: Josh Davis (1999-2000 and 2000-01); Marcus Bailey (2000-01 and 2001-02); Uche Nsonwu-Amadi (2002-03); Donta Richardson (2002-03) and Jay Straight (2004-05).

The high point of the Cowboys' return to national prominence was Wyoming's appearance in the 2002 NCAA Tournament marking the school's first appearance since 1988. It was in that season, McClain engineered one of his best Cowboy teams earning Coach of the Year honors by his fellow coaches, winning a school-best 22 victories (the most since 1987-88) and advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

His 2001-02 Cowboy squad broke two of the nation's longest winning streaks. With its 73-66 win over No. 6 ranked Gonzaga in the opening round of the 2002 NCAA Tournament, Wyoming broke the Bulldogs 14-game winning streak, a then-school record. Earlier in the year at Utah, the Cowboys 54-46 defeated the Utes breaking Utah's 48-game home win streak against conference opponents, which was the longest conference winning streak in the country. The Cowboys ended the season among the Top-32 teams in the country.

In the 2000-01 season, McClain earned Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year honors from CollegeInsider.com, and garnered the same honor from MWC media members for the 1999-2000 season.

McClain and his Wyoming teams won 18 or more games five times with a trio of consecutive 20-win seasons from 2000-2003 marking the first time three 20-win seasons was accomplished in 15 years on the Laramie campus.

Also during his nine seasons, the Cowboys defeated three Top-25 ranked opponents — No. 20 TCU on Jan. 14, 1999; No. 24 Utah on Feb. 28, 2000; and No. 6 Gonzaga on March 14, 2002.

His Wyoming squads were consistent contenders in the conference race during his tenure. UW finished in the top half of the conference in six of McClain's nine seasons at UW.

Prior to his head coaching experience in Wyoming, McClain was an assistant at Texas A&M in 1998, he also served as an assistant coach at Texas Christina University from 1994-98. While at TCU, McClain helped lead the Horned Frogs to a Top-25 ranking and NCAA Tournament appearance in 1998 under head coach Billy Tubbs.

The year prior to the Tubbs' staff taking over in Fort Worth, TCU posted a record of 7-20. Three years later, the Horned Frogs posted a 22-13 record, advanced to the Championship Game of the 1997 Western Athletic Conference Tournament and played their way into the Second Round of the National Invitation Tournament. In 1998, TCU joined the elite programs in the country, posting a 27-6 record and leading the nation in scoring at 97.2 points per game.



The Horned Frogs earned an NCAA Tournament bid in 1998, and ended the season ranked No. 15 in the final Associated Press poll. TCU also became the first team in Western Athletic Conference history to go undefeated in league play, posting a 14-0 record in 1998 on way to winning the WAC Pacific Division title.

Not only did McClain enjoy success as an assistant coach, but he brought to Wyoming an outstanding record as a head coach. In 1994 as the head coach at Hutchinson Community College in Hutchinson, Kan., he won the National Junior College Championship in only his third season, and was named the National Junior College Coach of the Year.

At the junior-college level, McClain compiled a 91-16 (.850) record in three seasons, and his teams were known as high-scoring squads. His 1994 National Championship team averaged 90 points per game on way to a 35-4 (.897) record. In 1992-93, the Hutch Dragons compiled a 29-5 (.853) record, averaged 92.6 points and ended the season ranked No. 11 in the NJCAA. His first season as head coach, 1991-92, Hutchinson posted a 27-7 (.794) record.





Prior to becoming head coach at Hutchinson, McClain served as an assistant coach there for five seasons, helping guide the Dragons to the 1988 NJCAA National Championship. Before coaching at Hutchinson, he was also an assistant coach at Independence Community College in Independence, Kan. (1985); Sioux Empire Junior College in Iowa (1984); and his alma mater Chadron State College in Chadron, Neb. from 1982-84.

Born August 15, 1962, McClain is a native of Orient, Iowa and is a 1984 graduate of Chadron State College. McClain is married to the former Kim Van Asselt of Hutchinson, Kan. They are the parents of a son, Dylan (8).

Clark enters his fifth year under the tutelage of CU head coach Jeff Bzdelik with three years with the Buffaloes and two successful years at the Air Force Academy.

Clark is responsible for off-campus recruiting, scouting the opposition, the Jeff Bzdelik Basketball Summer Camps, and the day-to-day operations of the Buffaloes basketball program.

"Derrick is a rising star in this business; his energy and professionalism takes a back seat to no


one," Bzdelik said. "His foundation as a coach is under the tutelage of Mike Dunlap."



# Assistant Coach Drew Long






As an assistant coach, Bailey aided Indiana University-Southeast to their first-ever NAIA National Tournament appearance in 1996-1997.

# HOME COURT ADVANTAGE

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# BIG 12 CONFERENCE







- ➤ The Big 12 Conference has established a consistent level of national success on the field and in the classroom as it enters its 14th season in 2009-10.
- ➤ Since it began play in 1996-97, the Conference can boast of 34 team crowns and over 400 individual NCAA Championships.
- ➤ For the fourth time in its 13-year history a Big 12 student-athlete won the Heisman Trophy. Over the past five seasons a total of 13 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including each of the past 12 seasons.





► The Big 12 leads all conferences with its six appearances in BCS title games. League squads have played for the football national championship six times in the last nine years with berths in 16 BCS games overall, including two each in 2007 and 2008. The Big 12 led all conferences with five teams ranked in the final 2008 BCS Standings. In addition, an all-time high nine league players earned consensus All-America recognition this past season, more than any other conference.



In basketball, 10 women's and nine men's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past eight seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. The six men's Final Four participants since 2002 are tied for the most of any conference.

➤ The Big 12 had a national player of the year honoree for the third straight year.



## NATIONAL COMPARISONS

- ➤ The Big 12 has the nation's best winning percentage in NCAA competition over the last two years and during the past seven seasons (since 2003).
- ► The Big 12 has had five different players named Consensus All-America over the last three years. The total of five is at least two more than any conference in America.
- ➤ The Big 12 had eight teams with 20 victories or more in 2008-09, tied for the most of any league. The total was a Big 12 record for one season.
- Since 2002, the Big 12 has had more NCAA regional finalists than any other conference and DOUBLE the amount of all but one league.
- ▶ In the last eight years (since 2002), the Big 12 has had 20 teams reach the Sweet 16. The total is more than all but one conference in the country.
- ► The Big 12 had nine NCAA victories after the first two rounds in 2009 - the most in league history. The total was also second nationally.

- ➤ The Big 12 had eight teams a year ago with at least eight conference wins, the first time that has happened in league history.
- ► The Big 12 recorded a .769 winning percentage and a league-record 153 victories in non-conference games last season. The win total was second in the nation and the most non-conference wins per team of any league.
- ► The Big 12 set a league attendance record and surpassed the two-million mark for the third consecutive season. Prior to the current string, the league had never drawn more than two million fans.
- ▶ Institutions can also nominate studentathletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 225 scholars have received over 1.3 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 13 years of the program.
- ► The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.



- ▶ The Big 12/Pac-10 Hardwood Series enters its third year after starting competition during the 2007-08 season.
- ▶ The majority of the games are scheduled for December 3-6, with three taking place outside the four-day series window. The matchups are new for 2009, after two straight campaigns of the same home-and-away meetings.
- ▶ In 2010, the contests will be return games from this year and take place from December 2-5.
- ► Last season, the two leagues split the Hardwood Series outings, 6-6.
- ▶ In all games played between the two conferences during 2008-09, the Big 12 held a 10-7 edge. The Pac-10 holds a 13-11 advantage in the first two years of the Hardwood Series.
- ➤ A season ago, the 12 contests averaged more than 10,000 fans and in two years games from the event have seen 244,029 fans go through the turnstiles.



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

## Colorado History

A program first known as the Silver and Gold, won its first game back on Jan. 10, 1902 and have engineered 1,113 victories in 107 years.

Colorado has been a member of five conferences, joining the Rocky Mountain Conference in 1909, and then the Mountain States in 1937. The Buffs became a member of the Big Seven Conference in 1947, which became the Big Eight in 1958, and now are a member of the Big 12 Conference as teams from the Big Eight and Southwest Conferences merged in the 1996-97 season.

A total of 17 coaches have guided the Buffs to victory, but none more so than past leaders Forrest B. "Frosty" Cox, H.B. Lee, Russell "Sox" Walseth, Ricardo Patton and third-year coach Jeff Bzdelik.





Cox spent 13 years roaming the Balch Fieldhouse from 1936-50 collected a 147-89 (.623) record with his 1937-38 team reaching the championship game of the National Invitation Tournament before falling to Temple. Cox's teams won four Mountain States Conference (MSC) titles and he concluded his CU career with the best won-lost percentage (.623) of any CU coach of more than one season.

Some of CU basketball's finest moments were orchestrated by Lee from 1951-56. In four short seasons he guided the Buffs to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in eight years (1953-54). During that season, the Buffaloes established themselves as a contender defeating NCAA runner-up Kansas on Feb. 2 (70-62). The following year (1954-55), CU performed a feat



not familiar in present day basketball, sweeping the Jayhawks in the season series, a feat only accomplished four other times (1948-49, 1958-59, 1961-62, 1962-63).

Colorado made its only trip to the Final Four falling to San Francisco in the semifinals, however redeeming themselves in the third place game, defeating Iowa. That season saw Lee's squad win a then-school-best 19 games and secure a pair of Big 7 titles (one shared).

From 1957-76, basketball was under the direction of Walseth. His 261 wins are the most by any coach in school basketball history. Walseth led the Buffs to back-to-back Big Eight Conference titles in 1961-62 and 1962-63, and both teams reached the NCAA second round before being eliminated by Cincinnati.

Walseth also engineered six Big 8 placings were his teams finished third or better in the conference, including three first place tallies (one shared). During the 1968-69 season, Walseth's team won a then-





school best 21 games and during his tenure won 14 or more games in a season, 11 times. His teams also had 13 winning seasons.

Today, CU now plays on the "Sox Walseth Floor" in the Coors Events/Conference Center, a tribute to Walseth's success as a Buff.

Ricardo Patton was the third-longest tenured head coach in Boulder with 12 years on the sideline (1996-2007). Patton's teams reached the 20-win season, three times, the most by any CU coach 1996-97 (22-10), 2002-03 (20-12), and 20-10 (2005-06). With a pair of NCAA Tournament berths (1996-97, 2002-03) and four NIT appearances (2005-06, 2003-04, 1999-2000, 1998-99). His 184 career victories, ranks second only behind Walseth.



Coaches are not solely responsible for the success of each season, and the Buffs had wealth have а outstanding talent on the hardwood in its proud past. Outstanding Buff performers range from CU's first All-American Jack Harvey; to Burdette Haldorson, who led CU to consecutive Big Seven titles in 1953-54 and 1954-55; Cliff Meely; Scott Wedman; Jay Humphries; Chauncey Billups to Richard Roby.

The "Big Burd," as Haldorson was called, won the league scoring race in both championship seasons, netting 21.3 and 23.9 points per game, respectively. After CU finished third in the 1955 NCAA Tournament, Haldorson was


selected to the AAU All-America team. His 13.8 rebounds per game that year is still a CU single season record. He also owns the record for most rebounds in a game, pulling down 31 in a 1952 effort against Oklahoma.

Meely became another familiar name to CU fans and opponents from 1968 to 1971. The sensational center-forward is CU's second all-time rebounder (971 boards, 12.1 avg.). In addition, Meely held a number of Big Eight scoring marks when his collegiate career ended in 1971. He was named an All-American as a senior averaging 28.0 points and grabbed 11.9 rebounds per game. The 1971 season capped a highly successful college career for Meely, as he led the Buffs to the conference title in 1968-69.

The next Buff to make an impact was Wedman, a sharp-shooting forward from 1971-74. Wedman came to CU from









Denver's Mullen High School and led the team in scoring and rebounding for two years, field goal percentage three years, and free throw percentage one year. After enjoying a successful 12-year stint in the NBA, Wedman concluded his professional career in 1987 with the Boston Celtics.

Arguably the best and most exciting Buff of the 1980s was Humphries from 1981-84. Humphries became the school's all-time assist leader (562) and then-eighth-leading scorer (1,306 points, 11.7 avg.). His specialty, however, was defensive play finishing as the Buffs' all-time leader in steals with 309 for a 2.8 average per game, and led the nation in hefts during the 1982-83 season with 115.

CU closed out the 1980s and began a new decade of Buffalo basketball with two greats, Shaun Vandiver and Stevie Wise. Both Vandiver and Wise were instrumental in the school's run through the 1991 National Invitation Tournament, CU's first postseason appearance since making the NCAA Tourney in 1969. And before it was over, the Buffaloes advanced to the NIT's Final Four in New York City, and eventually finished third.

Vandiver, a 6-10 center who transferred to CU in 1988 after leading Hutchinson CC to the junior college national championship, worked his way up the Buff charts finishing his three-year career



in Boulder as the Buffs' all-time leader in field goal percentage (.574, 750- of- 1307), as well as their No. 2 all-time scorer (1,876 points) and rebounder (962 boards). He currently stands third on the field goal percentage and rebounding lists, fourth in scoring.

Wise too, left his mark in the CU record books. Coming to Boulder as a guard in 1987, he managed to suit up for 119 games in a Colorado uniform, the fourthmost ever. Like Vandiver, he too loved to shoot, and is one of the Buffs' all-time three-point specialists, holding several of CU's three-point shooting marks. Wise is the No. 5 scorer (1,727 points) and ranks among the top seven in career minutes (3rd), steals (t3rd), and assists (7th).

Donnie Boyce marked the onset of the 1990s, as the Maywood, III., product took CU and the Big Eight by storm. After four incredible seasons in Boulder, Boyce walked away as the school's all-time leading scorer (1,995 points) and led the Buffs to an NIT bid at the end of his senior season, 1994-95.

Billups, CU's highest NBA Draftee (drafted third overall in the first round of the 1997 NBA Draft by the Boston Celtics) continued CU's tradition of great players as he made his mark early in his career. In only his fourth game as a freshman, Billups posted the first triple-

double in CU history. His 24-point, 11-assist, 11- rebound game against George Mason was a harbinger of great things to come for the 6-3 product from George Washington High School in Denver.

As a sophomore, Billups would lead Colorado to its first NCAA appearance (1996-97) in 28 years and earn many postseason accolades, including first-team All-Big 12 honors and first-team All-America kudos from Basketball Weekly. In two years, Billups scored over 1,000 points, becoming only the 20th player in CU history to accomplish that feat.

Seven-footer David Harrison made his presence felt during the 2001-02 season being named to the Big 12 All-Freshman team and leading the Buffs in scoring (13.9 ppg.). The only one other player in CU history to stand over seven feet was Frank Wilcox in 1955-56. Harrison rewrote the CU record book in field goal percentage finishing the season with a stellar 63.8 percentage from the field and third overall nationally, in addition to making his name synonymous with the CU blocked shot record section. His 106 swats for the 2002-03




season shattered the previous mark of 73 becoming the first player in school history and in the Big 12 Conference to record a pair of triple-doubles. Harrison also broke the school record for career blocks (225) despite playing only three years and opting for the NBA (29th overall, first round, Indiana Pacers, 2004 NBA Draft).

Also during this span, Stephane Pelle emerged as a four-year standout becoming the first CU player in 11 years to average a double-double during 2001-02 campaign. With 12.8 points and 10.8 rebounds per game, Pelle was named to the Big 12 All-Underrated team. Pelle capped his four-year career with 1,367 points and 1,054 rebounds becoming the first CU men's basketball player to secure both 1,000 plateaus. He also became CU's all-time rebounding leader and seventh overall scorer.

In 2002-03, CU enjoyed one its finest seasons to date, capping it with a NCAA Tournament berth and the upset of four nationally ranked teams – all at home for the first-time ever. With 20 season victories, a feat only accomplished in 1996-97 (22-10) and the other under Walseth in 1968-69 (21-7).

The Buffaloes saw the arrival of freshman Richard Roby in 2004-05 becoming the first freshman since Billups (1995-96) to lead CU in scoring with 16 points per game. Roby became the first CU player since 2003-04 and only the fourth player since 1996-97 to be named All-Big 12 first team. CU also reached the national stage by being ranked in back-to-back ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Polls, a school first since the 1996-97 campaign. In 2007-08, Roby set the school scoring record becoming the first male player to eclipse the 2,000-point barrier netting 2,001 points. He would go on to set numerous school records over his outstanding four-year career.






## Russell "Sox" Walseth

Russell "Sox" Walseth, the legendary University of Colorado basketball coach who was likely the first and one of only a few to have coached both the men's and women's basketball teams at the same NCAA school, passed away on Jan. 28, 2004 at the age of 77.

A player, coach and administrator, his time at CU spanned 38 years, starting as an athlete in the 1940s when he lettered a combined six times in both basketball and baseball. Taking over the reins of the men's program for the 1956-57 season, Walseth proceeded to coach the next 20 Buffalo teams. The winningest coach in CU men's basketball history with a 261-245 record, the Buffs won three Big Eight titles under his direction, in 1961-62, 1962-63 and 1968-69. He was the Big Eight Conference coach of the year on five occasions, and his most prominent players included Ken Charlton, Jim Davis, Cliff Meely, Scott Wedman and Dave Logan.






All three of his Big Eight champion teams represented the conference in the NCAA regional tournaments (in those days, only one school could advance from a conference). Eventual NCAA champion Cincinnati eliminated the Buffs in the first two appearances, while his third tourney team may have represented his best coaching job in his tenure as he piloted a sophomore dominated team to the league title and an NCAA berth. He retired from coaching for the first time in the spring of 1976 and remained on in an administrative position with the athletic department. But four years later (1980), and CU hit with budget woes, then athletic director Eddie Crowder asked him if he would come out of retirement to help the program to which he had devoted much of his adult life.

Sox answered that call and would coach the CU women's team between 1980-83, then known as the "Lady Buffs," compiling an impressive 77-21 record. That mark included an incredible 43-0 record at home, and once again, he earned coach of the year accolades. The basketball floor at the Coors Events/Conference Center is named after him. In 1998, he was inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, and four years later in 2002, he was a member of the fourth class inducted into the University of Colorado Athletic Hall of Fame.



## Colorado's All-America Selections



JACK HARVEY **1939 & 1940** 


In his back-to-back All-America campaigns, Jack Harvey led the Buffs to two conference championships and a trip to the NCAA Tourney in his senior season. During those two years, CU posted an amazing 31-8 mark and received recognition as the No. 1 team in the land.

Known for his tough defense, Harvey proved to be key in numerous Buff victories. He was also an outstanding ball handler for a big man and was a key component in the CU fast break. A solid All-Conference performer, Harvey is the only CU cager to be selected twice as an All-American.




Known for his defense, Jim Willcoxon continued Coach Frosty Cox's tradition of talented cagers. Willcoxon helped anchor the 1937-38 and 1938-39 Big Seven Championship teams with tough play on the defensive end. He also led the Buffs to national prominence with strong showings on East Coast road trips.

His hard-nosed style of play earned him both All-Big Seven and All-America honors as a senior.







## ROBERT DOLL 1942

Bob Doll was the big-play man for coach Frosty Cox's 1941-42 Big Seven Championship squad. Doll, along with fellow All-American Leason McCloud, helped lead CU to a 16-2 record and the NCAA Western Tournament finals as a senior.


Known as an outstanding rebounder, Doll controlled the paint in many CU wins. He was also renowned for his shooting prowess, finishing second to McCloud in scoring.

An unanimous All-Big Seven selection, Doll was selected to All-America teams by Look, Pic and Time magazines. He was also tabbed as MVP of New York's Metropolitan Tournament as a sophomore and was a huge factor in CU's three conference titles in a four-year span. After graduation, Doll went on to play for the Boston Celtics.

## LEASON MCCLOUD 1942

The leading scorer for the 1942 Big Seven Champion Buffs, Leason McCloud was Coach Frosty Cox's "go-to guy." Known for his silky-smooth shot, McCloud was also a great passer and rebounder.

McCloud was key in CU's NCAA Western Tournament semifinal win over Kansas, pacing the Buffs with 19 points. His play caught the attention of national media and he joined fellow Buff Bob Doll on the Look, Pic and Time magazines' All-America squads and was a unanimous All-Big Seven selection.



## BURDETTE HALDORSON 1955

Burdette Haldorson was virtually unstoppable in 1955. Prior to the season, Coach H.B. Lee said, "We'll be just as good as Haldorson. We need the big man to play well for us." And play well he did, leading CU to a conference championship and a third-place finish in the National Collegiate Tournament. The big man led the Big Seven in scoring at 23.9 ppg and set what still stands as a CU record with an amazing 346 boards on the year. For his efforts, the Amateur Athletic Union tabbed Haldorson a first-team All-American.

Haldorson's talents were nationally recognized, as the standout was selected to the 1956 & 1960 U.S. Olympic teams. Upon graduation, Haldorson turned down a \$7,000 contract with the NBA's St. Louis franchise. He did continue playing, however, and led amateur powerhouse Phillips 66 to a National Industrial Basketball League title.

Haldorson joined Cliff Meely as the only two Buffs to have their jerseys retired in 1994, and was named to the CU Hall of Fame in 1999.

## KEN CHARLTON 1963


Ranking eighth on CU's all-time scoring charts, Ken Charlton battled through a history of knee problems to lead Colorado to two Big Eight titles and in 1963, Charlton was named an All-American by the United States Basketball Writer's Association and Look magazine.

Along with his penchant for scoring, Charlton was also a force inside, ranking in the top 10 on the CU rebounding charts with 671 career caroms. He also succeeded in the classroom and was named an Academic All-American in 1963 as well.

Buff Coach Sox Walseth said of Chalrton's play, "On a leg and a half, he's better than anyone else in the Big Eight." Charlton was elected to the inaugural class of the CU Hall of Fame in 1998.







## CLIFF MEELY 1971

In 1971, Cliff Meely was a scoring machine. He tallied a CU-record 729 points and set a Big Eight record with 427 points in conference. Coach Sox Walseth said of Meely, "He is the most complete player I have ever coached."

Known for his quickness and agility, Meely could play any position on the floor. He was named to several All-America teams as a junior and senior and played in numerous all-star games after graduation.

Meely went on to play in over 300 games in the NBA for the Houston Rockets and the Los Angeles Lakers.

## CHAUNCEY BILLUPS 1997

One of CU's top perimeter threats in hoops history, Chauncey Billups graced the CU campus for two seasons before departing for the NBA. As a sophomore in 1997, Billups was named a first-team All-American by Basketball News, becoming the eighth All-American in Colorado history.

Known for his playmaking skills and ability to penetrate, Billups also led the Buffs to their first NCAA Tournament in over two decades, where CU topped perennial power Indiana in the opening round.

Billups went on to be the third pick in the NBA draft in June and is still enjoying success in the pros.

In 2004, Billups helped lead the Detroit Pistons to the NBA title. Billups was also named The NBA Finals Most Valuable Player.






## Chauncey Billups

One of the most talented players in Colorado basketball history, Billups helped transform the Buffaloes into an NCAA tournament contender in the two years he played at CU. His hard work, dedication and exceptional basketball skills not only drew the attention of college basketball aficionados, but of professional teams as well. Billups was the No. 3 overall selection of the first round of the NBA Draft in 1997 by the Boston Celtics. As a captain of the Detroit Pistons, Billups led the team to the NBA championship in 2004 earning the NBA Finals Most Valuable Player award by averaging 21 points and 5.2 assists in the five games.







## **Donnie Boyce**


Atlanta Hawks, 1995 • San Antonio Spurs, 1996-97

Colorado's all-time leading scorer, Donnie Boyce completed his collegiate career in 1994-95 with 1,995 career points. However, Boyce's career ended prematurely when he broke his leg during the first half of CU's 1995 Big Eight Tournament game against Oklahoma. During his career in Boulder, Boyce was named All-Conference three times, twice on the league's first team. Boyce also held school records for games started (107), field goals attempted (1,648), free throws made (480) and free throws attempted (721).
In four consecutive seasons (1991-95), Boyce led the Buffaloes in scoring, and

led the Big Eight in scoring (league games only) as a junior (26.8 ppg). A gifted player on all levels, Boyce will be remembered as one of the greatest players in CU and Big Eight history.

Bullard joined the Rockets as a free agent in 1990, and was a member of Houston's 1994 NBA Championship team. He is the third-leading three-point shooter in franchise history.

## Jim Creighton


Atlanta Hawks, 1975-76

After playing in the shadows of Cliff Meely for two years, Creighton came into his own during his junior and senior seasons. He quickly became a stalwart performer for the Buffs. Not big for a center (6-7, 190), Creighton played much bigger with his great jumping ability. Following an excellent senior season, he was named to the NCAA's District V All-Star squad.

Creighton enjoyed a one-year stint with the Atlanta Hawks. Used primarily for his defensive ability, he played in 32 games, averaging one point and 1.4 boards per game.

## Jim Davis

## St. Louis/Atlanta Hawks, 1967-72 • Houston Rockets, 1972 • Detroit Pistons, 1972-75

Davis guided Colorado to two Big Eight championships during a brilliant threeyear career. During that time, Davis emerged as one of the school's all-time top rebounders (863 boards) and scorers (1,110 points). In addition to being a fine rebounder and scorer, Davis was also known for his defensive skills.

As a professional ball player, Davis played for three different clubs, St. Louis/Atlanta, Houston and Detroit. His most successful seasons were spent with St. Louis/Atlanta as he averaged 7.9 points per game and totaled 1,484 career boards.

## Robert Doll

## **Boston Celtics**, 1948-50

One of the key players for Coach Forrest "Frosty" Cox's 1941-42 Big Seven championship squad, "Ichabod" Doll was known for his aggressive defense as he was named a unanimous first-team All-Conference player following his senior season. That same year, he also garnered All-America honors in Look, Pic and Time magazines.

Doll played in 94 games for the NBA's Boston Celtics over a span of two seasons. He held down a 7.3 point-per-game average during that span.

## Pat Frink

## Cincinnati Royals, 1968-69

Known as an excellent shooter, Frink finished his career at Colorado as the second leading scorer in Buff basketball history at that time (1,288 points). He accomplished that feat even though he missed the 1966 season due to a knee injury. Frink was also chosen as a member of the second-team academic All-America squad in 1968.

After graduation, Frink went on to play professionally with the Cincinnati Royals for one season. While a member of the ABA team, he played in 48 games and averaged 2.6 points per game.

## **Chuck Gardner**

## Denver Rockets, 1967-68

Chuck Gardner led the Buffs his senior year in scoring (20.2 ppg), rebounding (9.8 rpg), field goal percentage (.524) and free throw percentage (.650). A two-time All-Big Eight selection, Gardner was also chosen as a scholastic All-American his senior season. His excellent touch around the basket and dangerous hook shot enabled him to be an outstanding inside scorer.

Although he only played one year professionally, he did record some notable marks with the ABA's Denver Rockets. In 42 games, he averaged 4.7 points and 3.2 boards per game.

Pat Frink currently ranks No. 14 on CU's all-time scoring list. He also holds the No. 27th place in single-season scoring with 472 points.

Humphries had an outstanding career at CU, as he was elected twice for both All-America and All-Conference honors. Humphries is the current all-time leader in both steals (309) and assists (586), evidence of both his great quickness and ball-handling abilities.

Humphries finished his career with the Utah Jazz, after spending four seasons with Phoenix and four with Milwaukee. He reached two milestones in 1992-93, tallying his 4,000th assist and 8,000th point. He averaged a career-high 15.3 points per game in 1989-90, and never averaged under 7.5 ppg. Humprhies joined the Jazz on draft day '92, when he was traded from Milwaukee to Utah.

## **Cliff Meely**

## Houston Rockets, 1971-76 • Los Angeles Lakers, 1976

One of two players in Colorado basketball history to have his jersey number retired (20), Cliff Meely was named an All-American following the 1970-71 season. Meely was truly a graceful performer who could shoot from anywhere on the court. He finished his career at CU possessing eight Big Eight Conference marks and 16 school records, including CU's all-time scoring record (1,940 points, 24.3 ppg). Meely transferred to CU as a junior college All-American from Northeastern JC. While there, he scored 40 or more points on five separate occasions.

Meely played in more than 300 professional games over six seasons with the NBA's Houston Rockets and Los Angeles Lakers. He averaged 8.7 points and 5.6 boards per game throughout his career with the Rockets, only playing in 20 games with the Lakers at the end of the 1975-76 season.

Stivrins led Colorado in rebounding both years he was a Buff, and finished sixth in the country in 1985. He finished his collegiate career at CU with averages of 13.9 points and 10.4 rebounds per game.

His first year in the NBA was spent with the Seattle SuperSonics, in 1985-86. Following that he played in both the CBA and the Italian League before returning to the NBA ranks in 1992-93. That season, he had stints with four different teams.

## **Scott Wedman**

Kansas City Kings, 1975-81 • Cleveland Cavaliers, 1981-82 • Boston Celtics, 1982-87

Wedman provided the backbone for CU basketball in the early '70s. Head Coach Sox Walseth called Wedman "one of the best we've ever had here." With his great touch, he was smooth as silk with the ball, and was also a big factor on the boards. Wedman's outstanding play earned him All-Big Eight honors in both his junior and senior seasons.

Wedman began his professional career with the NBA's Kansas City franchise, where he played for six seasons. While there, he averaged 17.4 points per game and 6.0 rebounds in 466 games. He was traded to Cleveland for the '81-82 season and then was sent to Boston where he averaged 5.6 points per game in 301 contests.



more convenient access to the CECC playing floor, weight room, lockerroom and sports medicine facilities within the Events Center.








