QUICKLY: CU has won three straight games and nine of their last 11 dating back to last year • CU plays their next nine games in the Centennial State, eight of them at home • The Buffs had a season-low seven turnovers against the Bulldogs, making the Buffs 6-3 since 2010 when committing single-digit miscues (Buffs had seven in home win vs. CSU last year) • Head Coach Tad Boyle is 3-2 all-time against CSU, 1-0 at CU.

YOUTH MOVEMENT: Freshman guards Askia Booker and Spencer Dinwiddie are already paying dividends early in their career. Booker is shooting 55.0 percent from the field (11-of-20) and averaging 12 points over his last three games; Dinwiddie, a starter in all six games, scored a game-high 16 points with seven rebounds in the home win over Georgia.

MAN ON THE BOARDS: After the win at Air Force game, Coach Boyle told AP one word that described Andre Roberson, "He is a madman." Averaging a double-double (11.2 ppg., 12.0 rpg.) and looking to become CU's first double-double guy since Stephane Pelle in 2001-02 (12.8 ppg., 10.8 rpg), Roberson has nine career doubles, four this year. In addition to 17 games w/ 10 or more rebounds. Against Georgia, Roberson tied a career-best 15 rebounds w/ 15 points.

LAST YEAR vs. CSU: The Buffs rallied from a three-point halftime deficit with a 65 percent shooting display in the second half forcing overtime and 90-83 win in Boulder. The 90 points for any of the two teams was a high in nine years in the series. Since 2001 and five games played at Moby Arena (CU leads 3-2), the average points per game is 75.6 to 75.2 in favor of CSU.

HOME COURT: With their 70-68 win against Georgia, CU has now won 26-straight home games in non-conference play. The Buffs were 12-0 last season; 8-0 in 2009-10; and won their last four in 2008-09. The streak is second all-time in school history. The Buffs won 35 in a row from Dec. 4, 1976 thru Dec. 5, 1981.

SCORING: Of the school-record 38 games played last season, Alec Burks led the Buffs in scoring 26 times, while Cory Higgins led six times. This year, CU has had a variety of leading scorers through six games (Carlson Brown twice; Spencer Dinwiddie, Austin Dufault, Andre Roberson, Nate Tomlinson each with one.

BETTER THAN LAST YEAR: Andre Roberson has grabbed 10 or more rebounds in five of six games. With 72 rebounds already this year, compared to 48 boards after six games last year, the 6'7 rebounding machine is averaging 12 a game. He's 47th overall on the school's rebounding list (369, 8.4 rpg.).

ASSIST-TURNOVER RATIO: Point-guard Nate Tomlinson scored 16 of his team-high 19 points at Air Force with a career-tying four, three-pointers. Tomlinson leads the Buffs with 20 assists (9 turnovers). The senior from Sydney, Australia has a career 1.66 assist-to-turnover ratio ranking eighth all-time at CU.

NATE IN THE RECORD BOOKS: Nate Tomlinson's four treys at Air Force gave him a total of 123 passing Chauncey Billups (120, 1995-97) for 10th place. Tomlinson made one trey against Georgia and now has 124. Up next on the list is Cory Higgins at ninth (125, 2007-11); Mack Tuck (126, 1993-96); Levi Knutson (2007-11) and Donnie Boyce (1991-95) are tied for sixth (129).

In assists, Tomlinson has 317 assists over his four years (3.2 apg.) for 11th place in the CU record book. Cory Higgins is 10th (320); Billy Law is ninth (321).

BLOCKS: Andre Roberson is on the outside of the top-26 in career blocked shots. With 49 currently, he's four from tying Larry Vaculik (53, 1975-78).

IRON MAN: Senior forward Austin Dufault is CU's ironman having played a team-high 106 games, the most of any CU player on this year's team. That's 27th all-time. With 100 career starts, that's seventh. On the boards, Dufault is steadily moving up the ladder with 406, good for 38th overall.

COUNTDOWN TO 1,000: Senior guard Carlson Brown scored 854 points in three years with Utah. Entering his final collegiate season, Brown has scored 91 points as a Buff (16.2 ppg.) giving him 945 career points. In 104 career games played, he is averaging 9.1 ppg.

SAN JUAN RECAP: The Buffs went 1-2 at the Fifth Annual 5-hour ENERGY® Puerto Rico Tip-off in San Juan. The same record they achieved back in November 1998. The Buffs lost to Kentucky (64-52) and Xavier (74-61), and defeated American-Puerto Rico (101-56). CU last won a mid-season tourney in 2003 when they won the Pepsi Classic in Charlotte defeating Louisiana-Lafayette (75-56), Charlotte (76-74) and Loyola-Chicago (76-72).

NEXT YEAR: The University of Colorado men's basketball team will be one of eight schools invited to participate at the 2012 DIRECTV Charleston Classic presented by Foster Grant, Nov. 15, 16 and 18 at TD Arena in Charleston, S.C. The tournament to be held

Thursday, Friday and Sunday, features the Buffaloes, Baylor, Boston College, Charleston, Dayton, St. John's and Southern Illinois. This marks the fifth straight year CU will be participating in a mid-season tournament. Presently the Buffs are participating at the 2011 5-hour ENERGY® Puerto Rico Tip-Off in San Juan. Last year they participated at the iBN Las Vegas Classic; in 2009-10 at the EA Sports Maui Invitational; and in 2008-09 at the Rainbow Classic in Honolulu. The 2012 Charleston Classic will feature 12 games over the three days. Each team will compete in one game per day, advancing through a bracket-tournament format. The two teams that remain undefeated throughout will face off in a championship match Sunday, Nov. 18.

ROOT SPORTS: The CU men's basketball team will be featured live eight times on ROOT SPORTS™ during the 2011-12 season. The network's schedule also includes five Pac-12 matchups. All eight telecasts are at the Coors Events Center where CU set four attendance records a year ago during its 24-win campaign, the most victories in school history. Eighteen of the 24 wins under head coach Tad Boyle occurred at home, including five sellouts. Drew Goodman will handle play-by-play duties for all CU men's basketball broadcasts, along with former CU women's basketball coach Ceal Barry (analyst) and Alanna Rizzo (sideline reporter). All CU men's basketball events air throughout the Rocky Mountain territory and will be available nationally on DIRECTV and DISH Network.

CRASHING THE BOARDS: Andre Roberson made a name for himself in Boulder last year shattering the freshman record with 297 rebounds. By the way, he also set the fresh-

SOX WALSETH COURT: The Coors Events Center basketball floor was named after legendary Colorado basketball coach Sox Walseth in 1996. He is CU's all-time leader in men's basketball victories with 261, then added another 77 victories coaching the CU women from 1980-83, including an impressive 43-0 at home. Walseth is the first at CU and only a few to coach both the men's and women's basketball teams at the same school. With the men, CU won three Big Eight titles and coached 20 different CU teams from 1957-1976. He was inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame in 1998 and the CU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2002.

man record for steals (51) and blocks (42) in his initial season becoming just the fourth Big 12 Conference player to lead all three categories for his team (others were: Michael Beasley, Kansas State; Antoine Wright, Texas A&M; Kevin Durant, Texas).

BLOCKS & BOARDS: Andre Roberson became the sixth CU freshman to lead the team in blocked shots (the others: Shane Harris-Tunks, David Harrison, Stephane Pelle, Carlton Carter, Matt Bullard). In addition, Roberson was 100th nationally in rebounding per game (7.8 rpg.) and tied for fifth nationally in freshman rebounding (only player with zero starts). Of the top six freshman rebounders, Roberson ranked second of the six per 40 minutes on the glass.

BOYLE SIGNS FIVE TO NATIONAL LETTERS OF INTENTS: University of Colorado basketball head coach Tad Boyle and his coaching staff announced Nov. 11 they have signed five student-athletes to National Letters of Intent to continue their education and playing career at CU beginning next season (2012-13). The five incoming freshmen, three of them from the Centennial State, are believed to be the best men's basketball class ever formed at CU. The 2012-12 class was ranked #21 by ESPN.

General - "I want to start out by saying obviously we all want to win basketball games, and nobody is more passionate about that than Colorado fans. I want everyone to understand, though, it's not just about basketball, it is about graduating student-athletes. I'm proud to say that last year we had all five of our seniors graduate on time in May. This staff will not recruit a player, unless he is capable of meeting the expectations set here at the University of Colorado, and that is to graduate and develop a work ethic, which all of these recruits have shown."

On The Coaching Staff - "This job is about we, not about me, and our staff does an unbelievable job when it comes to recruiting. The work ethic that I talked about our players having, that all starts with our coaching staff. There is no staff in the nation that has a greater work ethic than this staff, and that rubs off on the players. When we recruit players we don't look for a specialist (a player only good at one aspect of the game), we want a well rounded athlete that can compete in all phases of the game. That goes for our coaches too, we want well rounded coaches, not specialist, and this staff exemplifies that."

On Evaluation Process - "We have to do a great job as a staff in evaluating each prospect. The last thing we are concerned about is who else is recruiting a certain player. If we do our job evaluating kids, then we are going to get the player and person that we want to be a part of our family. Our number one criteria in recruiting a player, is character and all five of these guys in this class have exceptional character."

On Josh Scott - "Josh improved more in one year than any other player I have ever recruited, which is very encouraging to see. We recruited him hard and early, and luckily we did because after he recovered from his surgery everyone else in the country quickly realized how talented this player was. He is highly

skilled and is a terrific young man who comes from a terrific family. He has a bright future ahead of him, just like all of these recruits."

On Wesley Gordon - "Wesley has tremendous skill, size, and athleticism, and is another guy that demonstrates he has skills you can't coach which thrills us. You look for upside in recruits, and just like (Xavier Talton) Wesley is a tremendously talented young man with incredible upside and we are really looking forward to seeing him improve as a player."

On Chris Jenkins - "Chris is a guy with all the tools to become a great player for us. He has great size, athleticism, and skill which are essential. Chris has a chip on his shoulder, and I am not trying to compare him to Alec (Burks), but Alec was a kid that showed up every day, whether it was workouts, practice, or games with a chip on his shoulder and that is what made him so great. I see that in Chris, he has a fire in his belly, and that will serve him very well throughout his career here."

On Xavier Johnson - "Xavier comes from a great school (Mater Dei HS) that is excellent in not only athletics, but also academics. Xavier is another kid with all the tools to become as good as he wants to be. When we recruit, we are looking for players that have things we can't coach, and you see that in Xavier when you watch him play. This is a kid that can be a really special player for us one day, and we look forward to coaching him."

On Xavier Talton - "This is a guy who wants to be a Buff, the guys that want to be here can bring in a different attitude and it can be something really special. We try to simplify the recruiting process as best we can, so if a player can pass, dribble, and shoot we want to be recruiting that player, and Xavier is certainly a guy that can do all three of those things. Xavier is a young kid for his class, he is still only 17, and that's good for us because he has shown a lot of maturity and there is a ton of room for this kid to improve and we look forward to helping him do that."

GEORGE BOEDECKER JR. COURT NAMED

The University of Colorado celebrated donor George Boedecker, Jr. Friday, November 11, prior to the Buffs season opener against Fort Lewis at the Coors Events Center by naming the upper gym in its new practice facility the George Boedecker Jr. Court. Less than an hour later, ironically, Boedecker took his place on the visiting bench, as he is in his third season serving as the assistant coach for the visiting Skyhawks.



"Coach (Bob) Hofman and I have the duty to represent Fort Lewis in an hour in the gym," Boedecker said. "Everybody will be friends at the end, but we'd love to kick the Buffs' rump."

Based on a gift from Boedecker to help fund CU's new basketball and volleyball practice facility, along with his major gifts that built the football practice bubble and CU's new golf practice facility, there is also a wall located just outside the now renamed upper court in the practice facility saluting Boedecker.

"Again, 11/11/11 will always go down as a special day and we're proud to unveil this gym with his name on it," CU Athletic Director Mike Bohn said. "George and I grew up in Boulder as kids. He's a treasure to the community. He built the bubble and now he's helped build this facility for the Buffs and put his name in this gym."

Hofman, Fort Lewis' head coach, is a CU graduate, former player and assistant coach. He played for CU until 1974 and then in the late '70s, he coached in Balch Fieldhouse and the Coors Events Center for both CU and Fairview High School. He then became the coach at Fort Lewis and played against the Buffs in 1985. He interviewed for the CU head job in 1990 and this is his first trip back to coach in the Events Center since 1985.

Boedecker played for Hofman at Fairview High School from 1978-80 and is in third year as an assistant coach under Hofman. At that same time Boedecker was at Fairview, Bohn was enrolled at Boulder High School.

"Mike and I had a friendship and maybe some fisticuffs as young children," Boedecker said. "But we all came back and we're all Buffs. Coach Hofman and I are Buffs first and foremost. I'm wearing a watch he gave me from the last Big Eight Championship. In the Pac-12, we will win a lot of championships."

Pac-12 vs. Big 12 IN AIR MILES: From the David Plati (CU Associate AD/Sports Information Director) book of research, here's the difference in air miles between CU traveling to the 11 Pac-12 sites compared to what CU experienced in the 11 sites of the Big 12. The breakdown is only 1,982 more (or 180 miles per school, or only 30 additional minutes based on a conservative airspeed of 360 mph; 20 minutes at 450 mph). However, once pulled into the gate at the closest airport, whereas CU was, via car, van or bus, a collective 13 hours from the airport to the respective campuses in the Big 12, it will be just a shade over five hours (5:05) for the Pac-10 campus sites, with all less than an hour away (if making one connection on the way to Washington State, otherwise it's the only site with a drive time over an hour if you fly into Spokane; compared to six in the Big 12, four of which were two-hours plus). That also lowers the average distance to just 137 miles more per school. The numbers:

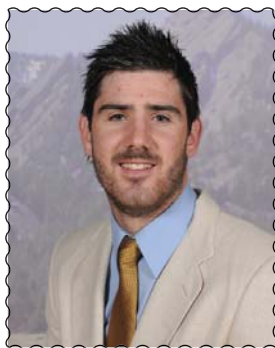

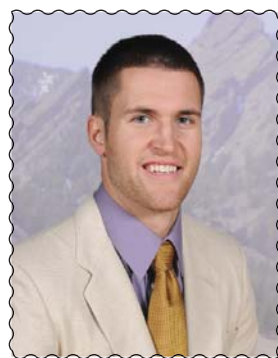
