**STARTERS:** Colorado made back-to-back NCAA Tournaments appearances (2011-12 & 2012-13) for the first time since 1961-62 & 1962-63 (50 years) • In 12 NCAA Tournament appearances, the Buffs are 10-14 (.417) with two Final Fours (1942 & 1955) • The 2012-13 NCAA Appearance is CU's first at-large invite since 2002-03 • Head Coach Tad Boyle is the first CU head coach since Sox Walseth to lead the Buffs to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances.

**SCHOOL FIRST:** For the first time in 112 years of CU basketball, the three consecutive post-season appearances (2010-11 NIT semifinal, 2011-12 NCAA 3rd Round, 2012-13 NCAA 2nd Round) - are a school-first in post-season play • Boyle is the first CU men's coach to guide the team to

three straight 20+ winning seasons.

**SEASON NOTES:** The 69 victories over the last three years, most wins in any three-year span in school history • No. 1 in Pac-12 Conference-only defense (62.2 ppg.) • No. 1 in Pac-12 Conference Team (all games) 3-Point Defense (32.0) • Defeated four ranked opponents, a first since 2002-03 • Won three-straight road conference games for the first time since 2000-01 • Charleston Classic Champions • No. 19 AP/USA Today Coaches' Poll (Nov. 26); AP No. 23 ranked (Nov. 19).

**TOP-10 LISTS:** Andre Roberson had 347 rebounds, the second most a CU player has ever had in a season • Spencer Dinwiddie scored 505 points, the ninth most of any sophomore • Josh Scott tied for 10th among CU freshman with 317 points, in addition was No. 6 in rebounding (178) and No. 7 in blocks (24) • Xavier Johnson was No. 8 in rebounding (159); No. 13 in points (295); No. t-13 blocks (15).

**COORS EVENTS CENTER:** Seven home sellouts (school record) • 12 of 15 home games exceeded 10,000 fans (school record) • Season total (155,884); Season average (10,392); Conference total (94,371); Conference average (10,486) - all school records • 16 sellouts in three years with 13 wins • Second Pac-12 attendance average (all games); third in conference-only games • Sold out the home/season opener (10,611) in attendance. Largest non-conference home crowd to see a season/home opener.

**PAC-12 AWARDS:** In a vote of the Pac-12 Conference coaches, Andre Roberson was named Defensive Player of the Year, conference first team and to the All-Defensive team; Spencer Dinwiddie was named to the conference first team; and Josh Scott was named to the Pac-12 Conference All-Freshman team.

**NEUTRAL COURT:** The Buffs were 4-2 (.667) on a neutral court winning the Charleston Classic in November (3-0), then going 1-1 (.500) at the Pac-12 Tournament, and 0-1 at the NCAA Tournament • Since the 2011-12 Pac-12 Tournament in Los Angeles (4-0) and the NCAA Tournament in Albuquerque (1-1), the Buffs are 9-3 (.750) • Head Coach Tad Boyle teams are 13-8 (.619) on neutral courts during his three years. The 13 wins trails Sox Walseth (1956-76, 33 wins) and Ricardo Patton (1995-2006, 18 wins) in school history.

**2012-13 Pac-12 TOURNAMENT REVIEW:** The 2011-12 Pac-12 Tournament Champions were the No. 5 seed defeating No. 12 Oregon State, 74-68 in the opening round, then falling to No. 4 seed Arizona, 79-69 in the quarters. CU took 2 of 3 meetings from the Beavers this season, while the Wildcats took 2 of 3 from the Buffs.

**20 WINS, AGAIN & THEN SOME:** The Buffaloes have won at least 20 games in each of Tad Boyle's three seasons at CU - a school record for three consecutive years • Boyle is the first CU coach to win 20+ games in a season, three times • Incredibly in 112 years of CU basketball there's been seven seasons of 20 wins or more, Boyle owns three • CU has won 21 games for the third-straight year (24 wins previous two seasons) • 21 wins is the fifth time a CU team has won that many games in a season.

**FROM ESPN'S JAY BILAS:** From his final Top 68 Sunday (March 17): "36. Colorado doesn't foul its opponents (24.7 FTA/FGA), but it doesn't turn them over either (206th with a 19.4 defensive turnover percentage). Spencer Dinwiddie is one of the best defenders in the country, and Andre Roberson is the best defensive rebounder in the country. Look up "relentless" in the dictionary, and you'll see Roberson's picture.

**SECOND NATIONALLY:** Andre Roberson finished second nationally in rebounding (behind Siena's O.D. Anosike, 11.4), however was the first player from a major BCS school to finish at the top since 2008-09 and fourth since 1995-96.

**FRESHMEN/SOPHOMORE DUO RECORDS:** Askia Booker and Spencer Dinwiddie already hold the CU freshmen record for combined points (677), now they own the sophomore record as well with 915 points. Dinwiddie (505) & Booker (410) are the first sophomore tandem in 45 years (1968-69) to lead the team in scoring. They broke the Cliff Meely (23.8, 667 pts.) and Ron Smith (12.6, 214 pts.) as sophomores, who had 881 points. Meely/Smith led CU to the Big 8 title, finished in third place at the NCAA Midwest Tourney, and a 21-7 record (first 20-win season in school history). As freshmen, Dinwiddie (360 pts.) and Booker (317 pts.) combined for a school-record 677 points.

**ALONE AT THE TOP:** After only three years, Andre Roberson stands alone as the only CU MBB player with 1000 points (1,012), 1000 Rebounds (1,045), 150 blocks (150), 150 steals (164), 100 assists (119).

**RECORD BOOK WATCH:** Andre Roberson is just the second CU men's player to eclipse the 1,000 rebound plateau (Stephane Pelle {pay-lay}: 1,054, 1999-2003) • With 1,045 boards, Roberson needs 10 rebounds to break the record • 12 double-doubles this season (37 career, 4th at CU).

**TOP JUNIOR NATIONALLY:** Andre Roberson finished second nationally in rebounding at 11.2 per game in Division I and is the only junior to have that many, no other junior is close. Roberson missed two games in 2012-13 due to a viral illness. Last year, he finished third nationally in rebounding (11.1).

**5TH PLACE OR BETTER:** It was the third straight year CU finished the conference season in fifth place in the final standings

(twice: Pac-12, once: Big 12). The three conference placings of fifth place or better is the first time since the 1968-71 seasons (Cliff Meely years), CU finished that consistent among the top-five in three-consecutive seasons (1968-69: 1st; 1969-70: t-3rd; 1970-71: t-5th).

**HOME SWEET HOME:** The Boyle coaching staff is an impressive 44-7 (.863) at the Coors Events Center.

- CU has sold out seven of 15 games during 2012-13 (Colorado State: 11,708; Stanford: 11,212; Arizona: 11,120; Oregon: 11,013; Arizona State: 10,926; Wofford: 10,611; Air Force: 10,607).

- 11,708 against CSU was the most attended game - men's or women's at the CEC.

- 16 sellouts (2012-13: 7; 2010-11: 5; 2011-12: 4). CU is 13-3 in those games.

- 12 of 15 home games have exceeded 10,000 fans (school record).

- CU is second behind Arizona in all games attendance (avg.: 10,392) & third in conference games (avg.: 10,486) behind Arizona & UCLA.

- CU sold out the home/season opener with 10,611 in attendance. It was also the largest non-conference home crowd (essentially in school history) to see a season/home opener.

- CU's home win over California (70-57) on Senior Day (Feb. 26, 2012) was the 500th game at the Coors Events Center.

- School record for conference-only attendance in 2012-13 (10,486) and first time ever conference home games average over 10,000. Previous two seasons: 9,809 (2010-11) and 9,160 (2011-12), first time 9k in back-to-back seasons.

- The men's basketball team is 357-158 (.693) at the Events Center in 35 seasons.

- In 2011-12, CU set a school-record for conference total attendance (82,442) breaking the 2010-11 total of 78,472. *Entering the final home game (OSU), the figure is 73,253.*

- CU set a school-record in 2012-13 for average attendance 10,392. Breaking last year's 7,804.

- According to *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, CU went from 4,637 fans in 2009 to 7,804 in 2012 for a 68% increase. The 68% makes CU the biggest gainers in attendance and a No. 1 ranking. Among the top 10 schools listed, CU is the only Pac-12 school that improved in attendance, while five Pac-12 schools decreased in attendance.

**DOUBLE-DOUBLES:** Andre Roberson was a double-double machine for the second season in a row. Since 2011-12, D-I players with the most double-doubles: O.D. Anosike, Siena (41), Mike Muscala, Bucknell (37), Keith Rendlman, UNC-Wilmington (36), Jack Cooley, Notre Dame (33), **Andre Roberson, Colorado (32).**

**DINWIDDIE/FT LINE NATIONALLY:** Spencer Dinwiddie is one of the few guards who can get to the line without taking many shots. Division I Guards, Fewest FG Attempts Per FT Attempt (min. 150 FGA).

**ONE-TWO BACKCOURT:** CU sophomores Askia Booker and Spencer Dinwiddie are one of the best guard tandems nationally, and No. 1 among major conferences. Overall, they're fourth out of four sophomore backcourts in leading their respective teams in points per game. They're the only combo guard duo from the list leading their team in scoring, assists and three-pointers made.

**VERSUS RANKED TEAMS:** The Buffs are 4-3 against ranked teams this season. Since 1961-62, the Buffs have not had a winning record against ranked teams in the same season. The 2002-03 Buffs were 4-4 (.500) against ranked teams. Also, in 1960-61, CU was 2-0 and in 1961-62, the Buffs won their only match up against a ranked team. Finally, the 1963-64 Buffs were 1-1 against ranked teams.

**UNDER 70, AND WE'RE NOT TALKING GOLF:** Prior to its loss Pac-12 Quarterfinal loss to Arizona, 79-69, CU held 11-straight conference opponents under 70 points (tied for 5th among conference schools since 2004-05 at CU

under 70 over the course of the entire 1962 Big 8 season.

**CHARITY STRIPE:** Spencer Dinwiddie etched his name in the CU record book making 33-straight free throws, third most in school history that spanned five games.

**CONFERENCE ROAD WARRIORS ...** Colorado has won three straight conference games on the road, a first since 2000-01; while not the loftiest of achievements, it hasn't been common at CU. Tad Boyle's teams have won two straight Pac-12 road games twice, something the Buffaloes managed only four times in the 15 years as a member of the Big 12. And in the 49 seasons Colorado was in the Big 7/Big 8 (1948-96), it won two straight league road games a grand total of 13 times.

**Three Straight:** Colorado last won three straight conference road games (Feb. 7-27, 2013 (at Oregon, at Oregon State, at Stanford); and from Jan. 20-Feb. 10 2001 (at Texas Tech, Nebraska and Kansas State). The Buffs won three straight twice in the Big 12 and six times in the Big 7/Big 8.

**Three of Four:** CU has won three of its last four Pac-12 road games, the fourth time it has done that under Boyle. It did it twice in the Big 12.

**Four Straight:** Colorado last won four straight conference road games in 1996-97 (at Missouri, Texas Tech, Baylor and Kansas State). It won four straight twice in the Big 7/Big 8 (1961-62, the last time it won as many as five in a row, and in 1963-64).

**Four of Five:** CU has won as many as four of five league road games just four times: 1996-97, 1963-64, 1961-62 (five in a row with a loss on either end) and 1954-55.

**Five of Six:** CU has done this just twice: in 1954-55 and 1961-62.

**TRENDS:** Spencer Dinwiddie has led the Buffs in scoring 15 times; Askia Booker eight times (including one shared); Josh Scott five times • Andre Roberson has led the Buffs in rebounding 27 times except six times this season (Xavier Johnson & Josh Scott: three times) • Dinwiddie led in assists 19 times (twice shared) • Roberson in steals 17 times (six shared) and blocks 21 times (seven shared).

**PEFECT GAMES:** Spencer Dinwiddie made CU history against Oregon State (Feb. 9); he recorded the top "perfect game" in Colorado basketball history when he scored the most points ever by a Buffalo without missing a shot. Norm Saunders set the mark, also on the road at Wichita State on Dec. 2, 1963; it was equaled some 24 years later by Dan Becker against Dayton in Boulder. He also took the most shots (14, six field goals, eight free throws) without missing, besting Becker's 12. CU's all-time perfect games:

### AGAINST RANKED OPPONENTS

- The Buffs have defeated two or more ranked teams eight times in the history of the AP poll, and three of those eight streaks have come under Tad Boyle. The longest streak is three games, accomplished twice, first spanning two seasons from December 12, 1960 to January 6, 1962; and then again in the 1991-92 season from February 5-19.
- Only four times have the Buffs defeated three or more ranked teams in the same season, with two of those four seasons coming under Tad Boyle in the last three years. The Buffs defeated four ranked teams in 2012-13, 2010-11, and 2002-03, and have three such wins in 1991-92.
- The Buffs have now defeated 53 ranked teams (AP poll) in its history dating back to 1949-50. Tad Boyle now has nine wins over ranked teams.
- In the history of the Coors Events Center (1979-80), the Buffs have now defeated nine top 10 ranked teams (AP poll) in the building's history. With the Buffs 71-58 win over No. 9 Arizona, three of those nine wins have been come under Tad Boyle. The Buffs defeated No. 5 Texas and No. 8 Missouri in 2010-11.

**HOME COURT:** CU went 12-3 (.800) at home this season and 44-7 (.863) at the Coors Events Center under the Boyle coaching staff • CU has played in front of 10,000 fans in attendance 12 of 15 home games (largest crowd a school record vs. Colorado State: 11,708; smallest vs. Texas Southern: 8,325)

- Fourth straight year with at least 12 wins at the Events Center.

**Pac-12 HALL OF FAME:** The Pac-12 Conference honored 11 former student-athletes and one former coach with their induction into the Pac-12 Men's Basketball Hall of Honor. The induction occurred on Saturday, March 16, during a ceremony prior to the Championship Game at the 2013 Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament

held at the MGM Grand Garden Arena in Las Vegas, Nev. The individuals inducted are: Jason Gardner (Arizona), Dennis Hamilton (Arizona State), Shareef Abdur-Rahim (California), **Cliff Meely (Colorado)**, Chuck Rask (Oregon), Charlie Sitton (Oregon State), Ron Tomsic (Stanford), Lucius Allen (UCLA), Forrest Twogood (USC), Keith Van Horn (Utah), Nate Robinson (Washington) and James McKean (Washington State).

**20-REBOUND CLUB:** Andre Roberson has a pair of 20 rebound games this season (Stanford, at Fresno State), becoming the 17th and 18th time in school history a CU player to have 20 or more in a game • Roberson is the 10th player to reach the 20-rebound plateau and fifth player to have multiple 20-rebound games. The others: Burdette Haldorson (4), Jim Davis (3), Cliff Meely (2), Jamahl Mosley (2) • Roberson is the first CU player to grab that many multiple times since Mosley accomplished it twice during 2000-2001 (vs. Missouri, vs. Baylor at KC). Prior to Mosley, it hadn't happened since Meely did it in during the 1969-70 and 1970-71 seasons. Roberson and Mosley are the only two players to accomplish the feat in the past 43 years.

**TWEET:** "Nobody has a home court advantage like CU does. We have the altitude, the attitude (we have a Chip on our shoulders) and the C-Unit." - A CU fan following men's basketball on twitter

**10+ PPG.:** In each season under Coach Boyle, the Buffs have had four players average in double figures. In 2012-13, Spencer Dinwiddie (15.3), Askia Booker (12.4), Andre Roberson (10.9), and Josh Scott (10.2) Last year, Carlton Brown, Andre Roberson, Austin Dufault, and Nate Tomlinson ended the season averaging 10 or more a game; and in 2010-11, Alec Burks, Cory Higgins, Levi Knutson and Marcus Relphorde averaged over 10 a game.

**20-POINT SCORERS:** This season, CU had five players score 20 or more points in a game (Dinwiddie: 8; Scott: 2, Booker: 2; Roberson: 1, Johnson: 1). Last season, the Buffs managed only two players over 20-points in a game (Andre Roberson: 3; Carlton Brown: 3).

**ROAD LOSS = HOME WIN:** In three years as CU's head coach, Tad Boyle and the Buffs are 10-2 in games with a road loss then following the next game with a home victory. CU was 5-2 in 2010-11; 3-0 (2011-12), and 3-0 this year.

**ANDRE & ARIELLE:** The Roberson's are the only brother/sister tandem on the 2012-13 basketball rosters from the same school in the Pac-12 Conference (only pair to make NCAA Tournament). They're one of five brother/sister tandems on 2012-2013 basketball rosters in Division I. The Big Ten has two tandems, followed by one each in the ACC, Mountain West and the Pac-12 Conferences. CU has another brother/sister pair on the ski team with freshmen Maria and Gustav Nordstrom from Sweden.

**TAKING CARE OF BALL:** CU committed only seven turnovers in its home win over Colorado State (Dec. 5). Overall, it's the 13th time under the Boyle-watch the Buffs committed seven or less turnovers in a game (9-4). Ironically, CU committed seven turnovers two years ago in its 90-83 (ot) win in Boulder against CSU.

**ATTENDANCE:** CU's season finale crowds of 10,105 was the 12th crowd over 10,000 this year and 14th over 9,000, both school bests. The total for the 15 home games was 155,884, the highest gross total in school history; the 10,392 average works to 94 percent of capacity (11,064) of the Coors Events Center this season and finishes second in the Pac-12 this season to Arizona (14,131). Under Tad Boyle, the Buffs have now enjoyed the best three consecutive years in attendance numbers ever (421,028, an 8,255 average for 51 games; no previous coach averaged over 6,500 for a three-year run). **The University of Colorado men's basketball team celebrated the 2012-2013 season with their end of the year banquet Wednesday, April 10 at George Boedecker Jr. Practice Gym inside the Coors Events Center.**

**Jay Humphries Assist Award** *(CU's all-time leader with 562 and played from 1980-1984)*

**2012-13:** Spencer Dinwiddie – led CU in assists with 99.

**2011-12:** Nate Tomlinson – led CU in assists with 108.

**2010-11:** Alec Burks – led CU in assists with 112.

**Stephane Pelle Rebounding Award** *(CU's all-time leader w/ 1,054 and played from 1999-03)*

**2012-13:** Andre Roberson – led CU in rebounding for the third straight season (347). The 347 rebounds are the second most ever in a single season. Roberson also set the school record for most rebounds by a junior.

**2011-12:** Andre Roberson – broke the school-record for rebounds in a season with 401, in addition to setting the school mark for defensive rebounds in a single-season with 290.

**2010-11:** Andre Roberson – set the freshman rebounding record with 297, and became the first freshman in school history to lead team in rebounds, steals (51) and blocks (42).

**Chauncey Billups MVP Award (voted by the players)** - *(CU's last All-American named in 1997, eighth overall in school history. In two years with the Buffaloes, Billups led the Buffs to the NCAA Tournament [second round]; Averaged 18.5 points, 5.6 rebounds, 5.1 assists in 55 games played. Also made 120 three-pointers and shot 85.7 percent from the free throw line).*

**2012-13:** Spencer Dinwiddie – Led CU in scoring with 15.3 points per game and a team-best 82.5 percent from the free throw line. He was also named a Pac-12 Conference first team selection and his 15.3 average was tied for the eighth in the conference (all games). Dinwiddie also led the Buffs with eight, 20+ point scoring games.

**2011-12:** Carlton Brown – Led the Buffs in scoring in his only year (12.6 ppg.). Brown earned the Pac-12 Tournament Most Outstanding Player award helping the Buffs win four games in four days en route to the conference championship. He averaged 15.8 points, 4.8 rebounds 2.3 steals per game. He shot 50 percent from the field and scored the game-winning basket with an uncontested dunk in the final seconds against Arizona in the conference title game.

**2010-11:** Alec Burks – Led CU in scoring with a 20.5 points per game average, the highest scoring average in a single season over the 20-point plateau in 16 years. Burks also scored a school record 779 points breaking a 40-year mark. Also unanimous Big 12 Conference selection who also led the Buffs in assists with 112.

**Most Improved Player (voted by the players)**

**2012-13:** Xavier Johnson – Ranked first on the team in field goal percentage (51.5) and averaged 8.9 points (fifth on team) and 4.8 rebounds per game (third on team). In 18 starts: 51.4 FG% (1st); 5.9 rpg. (2nd); 71 FGM (2nd); 11.0 ppg. (t-3rd); 19 treys (3rd); 9 blocks (3rd). On the all-time freshman list was No. 8 in rebounding (159); No. 13 in points (295); No. t-13 blocks (15).

**2011-12:** Austin Dufault – Averaged a season-best 11.1 points and 4.4 rebounds per game during his senior year. Also recorded a season-high in three-pointers (23), assists (33), defensive rebounds (107), field goals made (151), attempts (311), and minutes played (975).

**2010-11:** Levi Knutson – Saved his best season for last, finishing third in team scoring with an 11.7 points per game average and making 81 three-pointers, the most by a CU player since 2003-04. He also shot a season best 50.6 percent from the field, in addition to 47.4 percent of his shots from the three-point arc. Knutson also grabbed a season-best in rebounds (110), steals (22), blocks (2), and tied a season-high in assists (31). Knutson was named co-Big 12 Conference Sixth Man of the Year.

**THREE ROAD GAMES/ONE HOME:** CU went 2-2 in a grueling slate that only six other schools among the six BCS Conferences have played this non-conference season. The Buffs played three of four true road games during the non-conference season. The others were Utah, Alabama, DePaul, LSU, Miami, Villanova). LSU is the only school playing three straight road non-conference games.

**BUFFS IN THE NBA:** For the first time ever, four former CU basketball players were on opening day NBA rosters in 2012. Chauncey Billups (Clippers), Alec Burks (Jazz), Cory Higgins (Bobcats) and Chris Copeland (Knicks). Copeland played at CU from 2002-06. Last year, Billups, Burks and Higgins were the first CU trio since the 1992-93 season when Matt Bullard, Jay Humphries, Alex Stivrins were on NBA rosters.

**CU/EUROPEAN TRIP:** For the second time in its history, the CU men's basketball team traveled to Europe and played a five-game exhibition tour (August 13-22) going 2-3. The Buffs played twice in Paris; twice in Belgium and once in Holland. The last time CU took an international trip was May 20-30, 1997 when then-CU head coach Ricardo Patton went 2-2 against teams from England and Germany. In September of 2006, Patton took his team to Vancouver, British Columbia for three games (3-0 record). Later that season, CU went 20-10 and lost in the first round of the NIT.

**NATIONALLY RANKED: 2 WEEKS:** The Buffs were ranked nationally for two weeks coming in at No. 23 in the Associated Press poll (Nov. 19-25) and No. 19 in both polls (Nov. 26-Dec. 2). The No. 23 ranking was the first time the program has been ranked in a major poll since earning back-to-back No. 25 rankings in the Coaches Poll during the 2005-06 season. In the AP poll, it is the first ranking since appearing at No. 24 in the final poll of the 1996-97 season, when Chauncey Billups led the Buffs to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

**BUFFALO TIDBITS:** MBB season ticket sales have increased to over 6,666 season tickets (as of Dec. 29), an increase of 69% over last season (previous record set last season was 3,941) • CU started this season 6-0 for the first time since 1989-90 (finished 12-18). The six wins were the most ever in the month of November • In his three years at CU, Boyle is 15-4 in December (13-1 at home; 1-1 on neutral courts; 1-2 on the road. In November, he is 13-6 and 8-0 at home).

**CENTENNIAL STATE:** There are six freshmen on the 2012-13 roster, three of them from the Centennial State. The class is believed to be the best men's basketball class ever formed at CU • ESPN has ranked the class No. 22 • The six freshmen are the third most on any CU roster at one time.

**CALIFORNIA + CU = BUFFS:** The CU men's basketball team have five student-athletes from the state of Colorado and four from California, the most ever on a CU men's basketball roster from those two states combined since 1982-83. The five Colorado players match the most on a roster at one time since the 1992-93 season.

**WHY CU AND NOT UC?** A question often asked of many former Big Eight schools: Why is it the University of Colorado, but the moniker is CU and not UC? (The same applies at Kansas—KU, Missouri—MU, Nebraska—NU and Oklahoma—OU). "Midwestern casualness," said CU historian, the late Fred Casotti. It has always been this way at Colorado, for whatever reason, and at the other four—but seemingly nowhere else in the USA (except for Tulsa, but its midwest, too). In the 1950s, there was a concerted effort to eliminate the use of "CU" on the Boulder campus, both as a symbol and in speech, but Casotti said that no one would buy into it. "Nobody would change," he said. "It's easier to say than U of C, UC sounds like slang or something (as in 'you see'), and it was traditional. By trying to eliminate it, they reinforced it.

**Vital stats/storylines:** Averaged 21.8 points, 7.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 0.8 blocks during his junior season • Hopkins can shoot, going 60 percent from the field as a junior, including 37 percent from beyond the arc and 57 percent from the free throw line • Scored 20 or more points 16 times last season and led his state's Section II in points, steals and assists in a 22-7 season that saw Basha advance to the second round of the AIA Division I playoffs • Rated a four-star prospect by Rivals.com, the 29th best shooting guard and the nation's 109th best prospect overall • Other western schools pursuing him included Washington State, Oregon State, Arizona State, New Mexico, Boise State, Colorado State, USC and UTEP • Played AAU ball last spring and summer for the Compton Magic.

**CU scouting report:** A multi-purpose guard who can play the point, the two spot and the wing • Passes, dribbles and shoots at a high level • Strong chance he will be Arizona's player-of-the-year this season as a high school senior.

**Boyle's take:** "There's not a lot of things he can't do on the basketball court. He's an elite level athlete with a good frame who can run and jump. He's certainly one of the top players in the state if not the top player in the state, in our opinion. Arizona State was heavily after him as well as other Pac-12 schools."

**Hopkins' take:** "I feel like I fit in with the team and I love the campus • I just like the school in general."

### TRE'SHAUN FLETCHER

Position: Wing • Height: 6-6 Weight: 195  
High School: Lincoln (Tacoma, Wash.)

**Vital stats/storylines:** In his junior season, was named MVP of the Narrows League, as well as first team all-are and second-team all-state • Averaged 18 points, 11 rebounds and five assists in Lincoln's 18-8 season • Rivals.com rated him a three-star prospect • Scholarship offers came from Arizona State, Washington State, UCLA, Boise State, Cal Poly, Gonzaga, Oregon State and Santa Clara • Played AAU ball with the Northwest Panthers, whose coach, Gary Ward, called Fletcher "a legitimate 6-foot-6 with a 6-foot-9 wingspan • Multi-skilled, played some one, some two and some three (positions). Ward also described Fletcher as "crafty" and "sometimes a little too unselfish, he is a really good player."

**CU scouting report:** Lefthander with a great skill package • More of a true wing • Handles ball well and shoots well.

**Boyle's take:** "He's really a good passer for his position. He's long, athletic, runs the floor well and is great in transition. We think he'll fit in very well with what we're looking to do here. Bottom line is, he can do a lot different things to help you win."

**Fletcher's take:** "I feel like Colorado is a good fit for me. I love the coaches, the players and the system. I feel like I am a very versatile player. I can guard positions one through three, I can shoot it, I can dribble it and I can pass it. I think colleges like my length, too. I can get in and bang with the fours and fives, too. I just need to put on a little bit more muscle and get my dribbling better and I will be set."

### DUSTIN THOMAS

Position: Combo forward • Height: 6-7 Weight: 210  
High School: Pleasant Grove (Texarkana, Texas)

**Vital stats/storylines:** Pleasant Grove won 29 games last season, with Thomas a big reason for the success • He was 3A Region II District 15 MVP after averaging 20 points, 14 rebounds, five assists and five steals • Made an astounding 48 percent of his three-point attempts • Rivals.com ranks him as a three-star prospect • Schools offering him a scholarship included Oklahoma, Texas-Arlington and Lehigh, with interest being shown by Kansas State, Texas, SMU and Tulsa • Pleasant Grove coach Billy Brewer said Thomas is very comfortable shooting from behind the arc: "Three-point range is pretty easy for him. We run a motion offense and we are going to run until they get the ball in his hands • Dustin can also dribble penetrate and he can go in the post. He can do whatever he wants to do so we try to get the ball in his hands."

**CU scouting report:** At 6-7, probably not as explosive or as athletic as Andre Roberson, but shoots the ball extremely well from the perimeter and can put the ball on the floor • Can play inside and out • Plays with extraordinary energy and can rebound.

**Boyle's take:** "The thing that makes Dustin special is his love for the game, his motor. And shooting, he can really stroke it. But what sets him apart is his love for the game. Every time I talk to him he's going to the gym or on his way back. There's not a day that goes by that he's not trying to get better as a basketball player. I think if anything we've got to kind of tone him down a little; he loves the game and his desire to be great is unquestionable."

**Thomas' take:** "Going up there (to visit Boulder), I didn't know what to expect. Everything about Colorado was perfect. It is like a big family out there. At first, I didn't even think Colorado would have been where I would choose to go. But once I got out there, it completely turned my impression about it. I loved everything about it. The players made me feel like family. The coaching staff was just real up front and I trust them • They won the Pac-12 last year and you can tell the fans really show them a lot of love. It is just real fun to be around it and I wanted to be a part of that."

The Buffaloes' prospects begin with the best-kept secret in college basketball: Andre Roberson, a 6-7 jumping jack who was the nation's third-leading rebounder last season (11.1 per game) while leading the Pac-12 in blocks (1.9). Roberson's improvement enabled the Buffaloes to win the Pac-12 tournament and reach the NCAA tournament for the first time in nine years. While Colorado lost three starters, it is bringing back its three most talented players in Roberson, 6-5 sophomore guard Spencer Dinwiddie and 6-1 sophomore

guard Askia Booker. "We'll be more talented, but not as experienced," Boyle said. Six freshmen have also entered the program, most notably Josh Scott, a 6-10 forward from Colorado Springs who Boyle said "can really score it"; and Xavier Johnson, a 6-7 forward who played at Mater Dei High in southern California. Looking ahead, one of the main questions that needs to be answered is whether Roberson can provide leadership that is commensurate with his talent. We've been talking to him this summer about doing that." If Roberson can find his voice, then the Buffaloes will be ready to make some noise in the much-improved Pac-12.

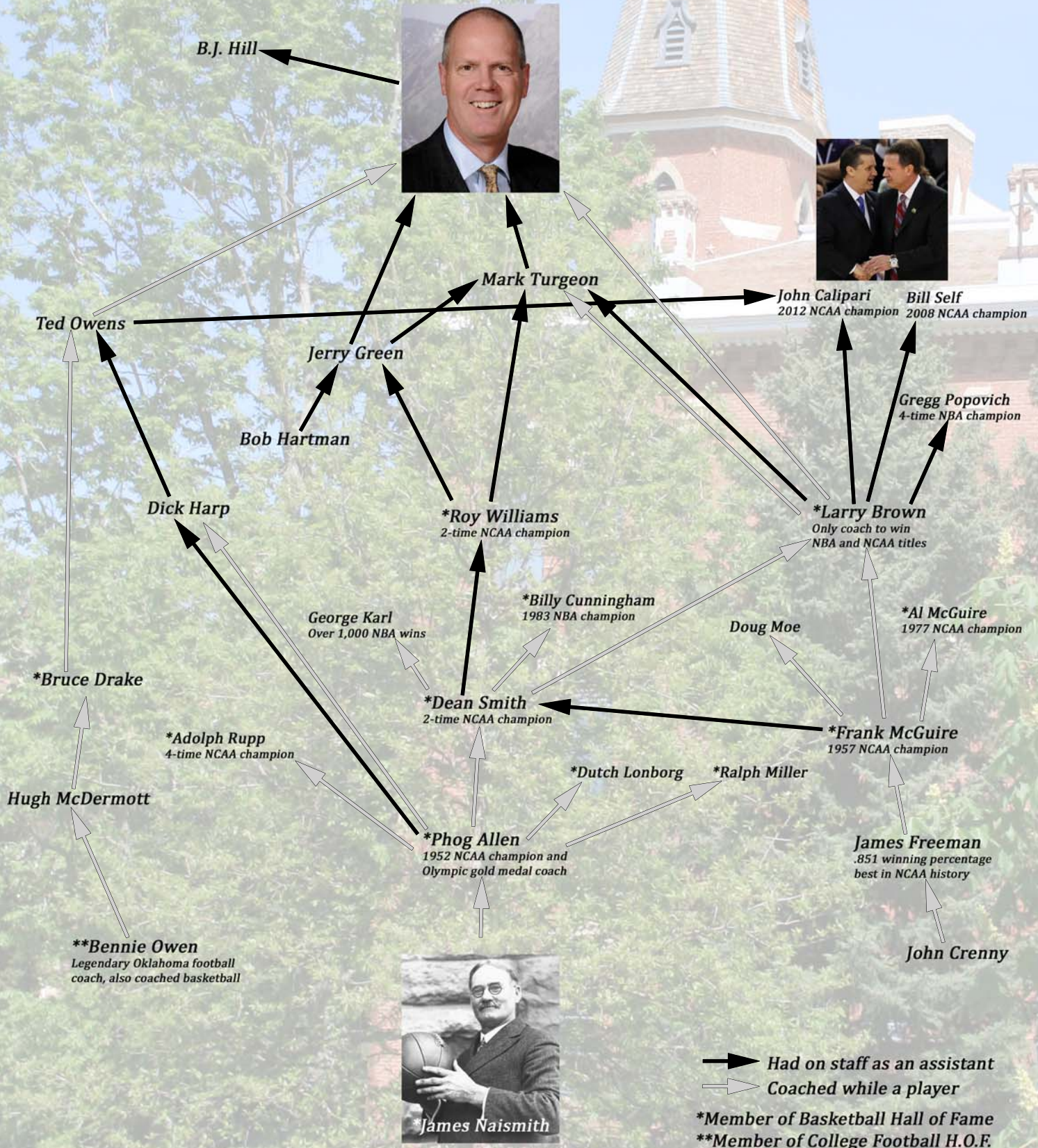
