CU Football: Game 1 (Pigskin Classic) -- Tennessee at Anaheim, Aug. 26, 1:00p MDT

QUICKLY... The defending Big Eight champion Colorado Buffaloes (11-1-0, 7-0 league in 1989) open their second century of intercollegiate football against the Tennessee Volunteers (11-1-0) in the inaugural Disneyland Pigskin Classic on Aug. 26 in Anaheim, Calif. The game, which will be played at Anaheim Stadium, is the first college game of 1990, and will be telecast nationally on NBC-TV (Don Criqui and Bill Walsh will call the action, with Ahmed Rashad on the sidelines)... Colorado finished as the nation's No. 4 team in 1989, with Tennessee (tri-champions of the Southeastern Conference) closing in the No. 5 position... Included in the contingent that will accompany Colorado to the Pigskin Classic are a 30-member pep band, cheerleaders, and of course, Ralphie, CU's live buffalo mascot... A crowd of about 45,000 is expected for the game.

HISTORICALLY... The Buffaloes completed their first 100 years of college football in fine fashion in 1989, as CU captured the Big Eight title, posted its first undefeated regular season since 1937 (going 11-0) and earned the school's first No. 1 national ranking. Only a 21-6 loss to Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl prevented the Buffs a happy ending to a storybook season. With an all-time record of 521-339-32, Colorado is one of 28 teams to have won 500 or more games in NCAA history, as CU is 24th on the all-time win list and is tied for 24th in all-time in winning percentage (.602). Only Oklahoma and Nebraska from the Big Eight rank ahead of CU on each list, and only seven Division I schools (Notre Dame, Michigan, Penn State, Purdue, Minnesota, Navy and Miami, Ohio) have played more seasons of intercollegiate football than Colorado. In Boulder, the Buffs are 211-109-8 in 56 seasons on the "hilltop" (Folsom Field). Against Big Eight opposition, CU owns a 149-157-10 all-time log against the seven league schools (138-135-7 in Big Seven/Eight games, 105-103-3 in Big Eight matchups).

SEASON OPENERS... Colorado is 62-34-4 (64.0%) in season openers, which includes a 45-17-1 mark in Boulder and a 17-17-3 mark on the road. This will mark the first time that CU has ever opened a season on a neutral field, and is the first time since 1983 (at Michigan State) that CU will open the year away from home. The Buffs are 3-5 in season openers under Bill McCartney, are 1-2 against Southeastern Conference teams (all against Louisiana State), and are 1-3-1 in campaign starters played in the Pacific Time Zone (0-1 in California).

COACH BILL MCCARTNEY... Bill McCartney is entering his ninth season at the reins of the CU football program, and has compiled a 46-45-1 record through eight campaigns. ("Mac" is 39-20 over the last four seasons, and is 32-11 since the start of the 1986 conference season.) CU's win over Nebraska last Nov. 4 evened Mac's record at 44-44-1, the first time since he was 1-1 in 1982, and the following week's win at Oklahoma State put him over .500 for the first time in college coaching career. "Mac" has been the Buff pilot for 92 games, topped only by Eddie Crowder (119), Dal Ward (110), Fred Folsom (102) and Myron Witham (96). Those same four are also the only ones ahead of McCartney in number of seasons coached (Folsom 15, Witham 12, Ward and Crowder 11 each) and in victories (Folsom 77, Crowder 67, Witham and Ward 63 each). In the Big Eight, McCartney is 29-26-1 in conference games (25-10 since 1985), and is second only to Tom Osborne of Nebraska in longevity in the league. He is "the assistant dean" of coaches at CU, as golf coach Mark Simpson is in his 15th season. McCartney will celebrate his 50th birthday two weeks from today (Aug. 22).

MCCARTNEY SIGNS 15-YEAR PACT... On July 26, Bill McCartney signed a new, 15-year contract that will keep him as the head coach of the Buffaloes for the remainder of his coaching career. The contract is retroactive to July 1, 1990. McCartney, who will turn 50 on Aug. 22, is 46-45-1 in eight seasons at CU, including last year's 11-1 record. He is fifth in longevity in CU football history, both in seasons and games (92). He is a two-time coach-of-the-year in the Big Eight Conference and was the unanimous national selection in 1989. The contract has a base salary of \$130,000 for the 1990-91 year, including expense allowances. McCartney's radio and television income plus other outside revenue come in addition to the contract. "I'm just delighted to have the contract," Mac said. "There are very few guys in coaching who get a chance to look beyond the foreseeable future. Our family couldn't be more appreciative or excited."

BUFFS FIRST IS A FIRST... For the first time in 45 years of media polling, Colorado has been ranked first in the Big Eight Summer Football Poll. Colorado edged out Nebraska in the balloting of 91 Big Eight area media representatives for the honor, as CU had 681 points on the strength of 53 first-place votes, to 654 on 35 firsts for NU. Rounding out the poll were Oklahoma (570, with the other three first place tallies), Iowa State (400), Missouri (346), Oklahoma State (296), Kansas (218) and Kansas State (211).

THE BUFFS IN THE BIG EIGHT... Since the Buffs switched gears from a passing to rushing offense back in 1985, CU has firmly established itself in the first division of the Big Eight Standings. Here's a look at the league standings (conference games only) since CU made the move: OKLAHOMA 32-3; NEBRASKA 30-5; COLORADO 25-10; OKLAHOMA STATE 21-14; IOWA STATE 15-20; MISSOURI 9-26; KANSAS 5-29-1; KANSAS STATE 2-32-1. CU has posted a winning record in league play for five straight seasons, another school first (the previous best before this streak was three). And a trivia note about CU in all of its conference history: in 100 years of football, CU has finished outright in last place in any conference race only three times: 1890, 1898 and 1915.

OPPONENTS OVERALL... The 12 teams on the Buff schedule this year posted a combined 71-65-0 record (52.2%) in 1989. The five non-league teams combined for a 37-21-0 (.638) mark, and 10 of those losses were by 10 points or less (seven by a touchdown or less). Four teams (Tennessee, Illinois, Washington and Nebraska) earned invitations to bowl games, and those squads combined for a 39-9 record. Only one team on the schedule, Kansas State, lost 10 or more games last year, compared to three in 1989.

SPECIFICS... ● Coach Bill McCartney holds a Noon press conference in the Flatirons Club every Monday. An informal luncheon will be served starting at 11:30, with "Mac" beginning the interview session promptly at Noon. The first of these will be held on Monday, Sept. 3. ● McCartney can also be heard Monday's during the year via telephonic press conference through the Big Eight Conference, as all eight league coaches participate. McCartney is on weekly at 11:05 a.m. mountain time. For more information, call the Big Eight office (816/471-5088). ● KOA-Radio in Denver (850am) originates the 26-station CU Football Network, with sports director Larry Zimmer in his 17th year as the play-by-play voice of the Buffs. Kent Greshong in his sixth season adding color commentary, and former Buff Bobby Anderson provides pregame and postgame lockerroom coverage. ● The Bill McCartney TV Show airs Sunday nights on KCNC-TV (Channel 4 in Denver) at 10:35 p.m. Former Buff Dave Logan ('75) is in his fifth year as the host of the program. ● McCartney also has two weekly radio shows which can be heard on KOA: every Monday, McCartney can be heard for five minutes at 8:45 a.m., and on Wednesday's between 6 and 7 p.m., Zimmer hosts the hour long "Bill McCartney Show", which originates from the Holiday Inn (Oliver's) in Boulder.

TRAVEL PLANS... Colorado will depart for Anaheim on Friday, August 24, at 8:00 a.m., arriving at LAX Airport at 9:15. The Buffs will practice on Friday and Saturday, both of which will be closed to the public (and to opponent media). No player interviews will be allowed following the completion of the press conference on Friday. The Buffs will return to Colorado immediately following the game on Sunday. SCHEDULE TRIVIA... ● **Out-of-the-Gate:** The Buffs face more than one team from the same conference in the non-league portion of its schedule for the first time in three years. In 1990, CU will play Stanford and Washington of the Pac-10; the last time CU faced more than one team from the same league was in 1987, when three Pac-10 teams (Oregon, Stanford and Washington State) appeared on the schedule. Oddly enough, all five of the aforementioned games were/are in Boulder. ● CU has one more year of playing Oklahoma and Nebraska back-to-back in the conference season. The two "Big Reds" have appeared in succession on CU's schedule in 1954, 1956, 1958, 1960, 1962 through 1966, and of course, last year. The Buffs swept the pair in 1960 and in 1989, split in '56, '58 and '65, and dropped both in the other years. The 1989 sweep of CU and NU marked the first time CU had beaten both in the same year since 1961. ● For only the second time since 1980, a team from the Western Athletic Conference is not on the CU schedule, but the Buffs will open 1991 playing host to Wyoming (Sept. 7).

THE COLORADO-TENNESSEE SERIES... This is simple... it's the first meeting ever between the two schools on the gridiron, as the two have seldom met in any other sport. The Volunteers own a 2-0 edge in men's basketball (the games were at the start of the 1980's), the Lady Buffs own a 1-0 lead in women's hoops, and the rest of play between the two has been when they've met on the tennis court or have been in the same golf tournament.

COLORADO VERSUS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE... Colorado is 2-6 against members of the Southeastern Conference, with most of those games coming against Louisiana State (1-5). The Buffs are 1-0 against Alabama ('69 Liberty Bowl) and 0-1 versus Auburn ('72 Gator Bowl). CU has opened the season three times against an SEC team, all versus LSU (1971, 1973 and 1974). The Buffaloes will play a team from the Southeastern Conference (Tennessee) for the first time since 1980, when the Buffs lost 23-20 at Louisiana State.

TENNESSEE VERSUS THE BIG EIGHT CONFERENCE... Tennessee has seen less of the Big Eight than CU has of the SEC, as the Volunteers are 4-1 against Big Eight opposition. Tennessee is 2-0 against Kansas, 1-0 versus Iowa State, and 1-1 against Oklahoma. The last time the Vols lined up against a Big Eight team was in 1982, when UT defeated Iowa State, 23-21.

TENNESSEE NOTES... ● Tennessee is coached by **JOHNNY MAJORS** (Tennessee '57), who is 93-54-6 in 13 seasons at the reins of the Volunteers. He is 150-97-8 in 24 years as a college head coach, which makes him the 16th active winningest coach in college ball. He is 0-5 against Colorado, all games coming while he was head coach at Iowa State (1968-72). ● Tennessee is coming of its best season (11-1) since posting a similar mark in 1970, as UT's only loss last year was a 47-30 loss at Alabama (that loss cost UT the outright SEC crown, as Alabama and Auburn also posted 6-1 records in league play, thus all three tied for the crown). ● UT averaged 408.5 yards per game on offense (246 rush, 163 pass) last year and allowed 351.2 defensively (107 rush, 244 pass). The Vols averaged 28.6 points per game and allowed 17.0.

EARLY GRADUATES... Four of CU's 25 seniors have already graduated and have enrolled in graduate course work for the fall. CB David Gibbs and CB Dave McCloughan (both marketing majors) are enrolled in CU's M.B.A. program, while TE David Brown and SS Tim James (both sociology majors) will be taking graduate courses in criminology.

NEXT UP... Colorado will have 10 days off to prepare for Stanford, which will visit Boulder on Sept. 6 in the first Thursday night game in Folsom Field's history. Kickoff is 6:07 p.m. and the game will be live on ESPN. Tennessee, however, will have only five days off before hosting Pacific on Sept. 1.

COACHES CORNER/with Bill McCartney... On His Team Overall -- "I feel strongly that we legitimately have a good team. However, we can ill afford to get some of these guys hurt, because if we do, we will drop off some. We're going to be ready to play, and we've got to prepare them for playing against great players and to play all-out football. You don't tiptoe into this kind of a schedule." **On Tennessee** -- "Tennessee might be the best team we're going to play. They've won 16 of 17 playing in what is generally thought to be the toughest conference in college football today, and they have 17 starters back. They're loaded; they have a great tailback, a tremendous deep threat in the passing game, and I read an article to our team that listed both of their offensive tackles as number one draft choices. Tennessee was real good on offense a year ago, and I look for that offense to be just as, if not more explosive. Defensively, they weren't quite as good by comparison on defense, so they went out and hired Larry Lacewell. That defense will be sticky, as with Lacewell's knowledge of the Big Eight, he knows our offense well. This will be a real tough opener, as tough as they get, but you have to like this kind of challenge to open the season." **On Differences Between 1989 and 1990 Buffaloes** -- "This team is going to fight, there's no questions about that, as we have some flat-out competitors. Now whether they get the focus and if they're team oriented like a year ago, that chemistry has to unveil itself on game day. The Orange Bowl game taught us that Notre Dame was mentally tougher than us, and this year's team has to learn from that, draw on those intangibles and go back out and regain the momentum we had last year."

PRESEASON TEAM RANKINGS... Colorado has been listed in every publication's preseason top 10 through August 16, with the biggest ones due out in the next week. Two publications, the Football News (which teams with Mutual Radio) and Game Plan Magazines have selected CU the preseason No. 1 pick, the second time CU has been afforded that honor in its history (Sports Illustrated tabbed the Buffs atop its list in 1972). If either AP or UPI has Colorado among its top 10, it will mark the first time since 1972 that the Buffs will crack a wire service preseason top 10 since 1972, when both tabbed CU second.
