Getz rushed for a career-high 218 yards on just 17 carries in a 49-21 home win over Idaho State. He averaged 12.8 yards per carry and scored a career-high

three touchdowns (scoring on runs of nine, 63 and 41 yards). He scored the first three touchdowns on the day for Air Force to stake the team to a 21-0 lead mid-way through the second quarter. His 218 yards are the most by a Falcon since Chad Hall had a school-record 275 vs. Army in 2007. His 218 yards are the sixth most in a single-game in school history. Getz is just the sixth player in Air Force history to rush for 200 or more yards in a game. He had 286 career rushing yards and one touchdown entering the game. His first touchdown run came on fourth-and-two.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (1-0, 0-0 RMAC)

Vince Coach (Junior, Linebacker, Indianapolis, Ind./College of DuPage/Lawrence North HS)

Coach tallied a game-high 16 tackles, including a sack, and recorded an interception to lead the Grizzly defense, which played a pivotal role in the Grizzlies' 17-9 season-opening win over Dixie State. Coach had four solo stops in the game, which saw the Grizzly defense record six total turnovers and six sacks along with a pair of key fourth-down stops in the fourth quarter.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies began the 2012 season with a win for the third straight year as they recorded six turnovers to get past Dixie State (Utah), who they have opened against in each of the last four years. The Grizzly defense came up with four interceptions and two fumble recoveries to go along with six sacks and a pair of key fourth-quarter, fourth-down stops. Two of the Grizzlies interceptions, the second of which allowed the Grizzlies to hold on to the win with just 21 seconds left, came in the end zone. The Grizzly defense allowed just three total points in four red-zone defensive opportunities. Four different Grizzlies had 10 or more tackles including Coach (see POW nomination), Brent Lush (Tucson, Ariz.), James Ackel (Riverside, Calif.) and Derek Mathiason (Centennial, Colo.). Lush made 15 stops while Ackel had 14. Mathiason chipped in 10. True freshman Derek Simmons (El Paso, Texas) recorded the game-saving interception on the final defensive play of the game, just two plays later after breaking up a potential touchdown pass in the corner of the end zone. The Grizzlies are now 3-0 all-time at home against Dixie State and have a 4-2 lead in the all-time series, which dates back to 2006, when the Red Storm moved to the Division II ranks. The Grizzlies had a +5 turnover margin (6-1) in Saturday's night's victory, which came despite being out-yarded 419-255. The six forced turnovers are the most for any Grizzly defense since Dixie State committed seven in the first meeting with the Grizzlies back in 2006, a 37-7 ASU home win. The Grizzlies now begin a stretch of three straight road games facing Wayland Baptist (Texas) next Saturday in Plainview, Texas. Saturday's contest will be the first ever meeting between the programs. Quarterback Cody Davies and wide-out Drew Edwards (Longmont, Colo.) had their first career touchdowns on the same play, a 44-yard third quarter connection that gave the Grizzlies their 17-9 lead. That play was the Grizzlies' longest of the night. The NAIA Pioneers played their first game in 72 years on Saturday, falling 59-21 to Monterey Tech of Mexico, although they considered it an exhibition. Saturday's contest will be their first home game since 1940.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (0-1, 0-0 RMAC)

Jake Cimolino (Sophomore, Running Back, Fort Bragg, Calif.)

Cimolino led the Mavs rushing attack with 125 yards on 17 carries at Humboldt State. He averaged 7.4 yards per carry and scored his first touchdown of the 2012 season on a 41-yard run in the third quarter. Cimolino rushed for more than half the Mavs' rushing yards (216) and had CMU's longest run (41) in the game. He led the team in receiving with six catches for 64 yards and one touchdown. With 2:20 remaining in the game, Cimolino caught a 30-yard touchdown pass from Deke Cisco. He had one punt return for 20 yards.

Team Notes: CMU head coach Russ Martin's head coaching debut at Humboldt State. He was named CMU Head Football Coach in January. The Mavs season opening game vs. Humboldt State marked the second straight year CMU has opened up against HSU. CMU out rushed HSU 216 yards to 182 and tallied 21 first downs to the Lumberjacks' 15. Jake Cimolino scored two of the Mavs' three touchdowns and led the team in rushing and receiving. CMU will travel to Division IAA University of Northern Colorado on Saturday at 1:35. The game will be televised LIVE on Altitude Sports.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (1-0, 0-0 RMAC)

Matt Brown (Sophomore, Quarterback, Limon, Colo.)

Brown led the Orediggers to a 56-17 season-opening win over visiting William Jewell on Saturday at Harry Campbell Field in Golden. Making his first career start at quarterback, Brown accounted for 395 of Mines' school-record 690 yards of total offense. He finished the game 23-for-30 for 358 yards through the air with four touchdown passes, posting a quarterback rating of 220.9. He added six carries for 37 yards and led his team to six touchdowns and a field goal in eight total drives.

Team Notes: The Orediggers (1-0) opened their season with a 56-17 win over William Jewell on Saturday at Harry Campbell Stadium in Golden. With the win, head coach Bob Stitt became the all-time winningest football coach in Mines history with 85 wins. Sophomore quarterback Matt Brown, making his first career start, accounted for 404 yards of a school record 690 yards of offense in the win. Brown completed 23-of-30 passes for 358 yards and four touchdowns while also carrying nine times for 46 yards. Senior wide receiver Cody Renken caught a team-high seven balls for 99 yards while tight end David Pawelek added 105 yards on six catches and Diamond Gillis pulled down two touchdowns on four catches and 80 receiving yards. Dan Palmer led the rushing attack with 89 yards on 12 carries, while Tevin Champagne added two rushing touchdowns (three total) on eight carries for 40 yards. Alex Laudenslager led the defense with eight tackles while junior defensive tackle Kelly Zimmerman added seven tackles, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup. Mines will look to keep the momentum rolling next week when the squad faces South Dakota Mines at 6 p.m. in Rapid City, S.D.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (1-0, 0-0 MWC)

Cory James (Freshman, Linebacker, 6-0, 235, Del Rio, Texas).

James registered his first career start for Colorado State against rival Colorado. In his first game since sustaining a torn left anterior cruciate ligament halfway through his senior year of high school, James compiled seven total tackles (6 solo), three sacks, four tackles for loss and a forced fumble. His first sack as a Ram came on Colorado's first possession, forcing the Buffs back 12 yards. His second sack came midway through the second quarter to set up a long third down and two plays later, James notched his third sack and forced a fumble before Lanston Tanyi recovered for CSU. This play ended an eight play drive for the Buffaloes. James is the first Ram to record three or more sacks in his first career game.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (1-0, 0-0 RMAC)

J.B. Matthews (Sophomore, Tailback, 5-11, 191, Aurora, Colo./Rangeview HS)

In his first collegiate start, Matthews was solid offensively against No. 24 West Texas A&M. He carried the ball 23 times for 153 yards (6.7 yards per carry), a scored a touchdown. Along with teammate Chris Ashe, who played in his first collegiate game, the ThunderWolves posted nearly 300 rushing yards against the Buffaloes. Matthews also added 78 receiving yards to make for 231 total yards and two total scores.

Team Notes: CSU-Pueblo won its season opener for the fifth straight season and claimed a win over a ranked West Texas A&M squad for the second straight year, defeating the Buffaloes 44-34. The ThunderWolves accumulated nearly 500 yards of offense and nearly 300 on the ground, led by two 100-yard performances by J.B. Matthews and Chris Ashe. Senior quarterback Ross Dausin was also solid, going 20-for-26 for 222 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions. The ThunderWolves, which entered the week ranked sixth in the AFCA's preseason poll, will look to build upon it when it travels to Northwestern Oklahoma State, which lost its first game to Ouachita Baptist 55-3.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-0, 0-0 RMAC)

Team Notes: Fort Lewis will open their 2012 campaign this Saturday with a home and conference opener against New Mexico Highlands.

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (1-0, 0-0 MWC)

National Football Foundation - Colorado Chapter Player of the Week

Team Notes: In their season and home opening win against Idaho State, Air Force had 403 yards of total offense by half-time, the most since the Falcons had 473 yards at the half vs. Tennessee State last season. AFA is now 9-1 all-time vs. Big Sky. AFA has won 15 straight home openers against unranked teams dating back to 1994. AFA is 36-19-2 overall in season openers, including a 31-8 mark in season openers at home. AFA has won six straight and seven of the last nine with the only losses coming at No. 11 Tennessee in 2006 and vs. No. 13 California in 2004. AFA is 18-9 against non-conference foes under Troy Calhoun, including an 11-1 mark at home. AFA is 24-8 at home under Troy Calhoun since 2007. AFA is 17-0 all-time vs. teams from the Football Championship Subdivision. AFA extended its scoring streak to 234 consecutive games. Air Force's streak is the longest in the MW and the fourth longest active streak in the country. The Falcons were last shutout by Mississippi, 13-0, in the 1992 Liberty Bowl. Idaho State's touchdown in the third quarter snapped a streak of 14 straight games that Air Force had not allowed an opponent to score on the opening drive of the second half.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (0-1, 0-0 PAC12)

Derrick Webb (Junior, Inside Linebacker, 6-0, 230, Memphis, Tenn./Whitehaven)

In a 22-17 loss to Colorado State in Denver, Webb had a career-high 12 tackles (nine solo), with five at our behind the line of scrimmage (three tackles for zero, two tackles for loss including a quarterback sack) and two third down stops in 53 plays.

Team Notes: The 94 degree temperature at kickoff tied for the third warmest in CU history but was the warmest for a game in Colorado, eclipsing the 91 degrees for Washington in Boulder on Sept. 16, 2000. Corner back Kenneth Crawley returned the first punt of the game for 14 yards—matching CU's longest punt return all of last year (by Rodney Stewart); CU had 36 punt return yards as a team (38 by Crawley, minus-2 by Goodson) compared to 56 total last year. Colorado now has at least one quarterback sack in 43 of the last 45 games. Colorado played 13 freshmen in the season opener, nine true: TB Donta Abron, CB Kenneth Crawley, DT Tyler Henington, TE Vincent Hobbs, S Marques Mosley, FB Christian Powell, WR Gerald Thomas, DT Josh Topou, CB Yuri Wright. For just the fifth time in the last 31 seasons, CU started non-seniors across the offensive line; it happened all 11 games in 1982, seven games in 1993, five games in 1998 and all 12 games in 2009. Colorado converted on its first two tries in the red zone, but when it failed to score on fourth-and-goal from the one in the third quarter, its snapped a 19-of-19 run inside the opponent's 20-yard line dating back to the 2006 season opener. WR Nelson Spruce caught eight passes for 64 yards and a touchdown; the eight receptions tied for the most in a first career game by a CU player, first done by WR Scotty McKnight, who caught eight (for 106 yards, touchdown) against CSU five years ago to the day, also in Denver.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-1, 0-0 BSC)

Team Notes: In front of 45,273 fans for the 2012 season opener, the Northern Colorado football team stayed with the University of Utah for the first quarter, but eventually lost 41-0 at Rice-Eccles Stadium. Utah showed throughout the game why its defense has been ranked among the best in the nation during the preseason, holding Northern Colorado to just 114 yards of total offense. Both senior wide receiver Dominic Gunn (Aurora, Colo.) and junior Jace Davis (Lone Tree, Colo.) caught three passes in the game. Davis gained 21 yards, including a 10-yard reception along the sideline for a first down, while Gunn had 11 receiving yards to go along with 58 kickoff return yards. Junior transfer Tromaine Dennis (Jersey City, N.J.) led the rushing game with eight carries for 27 yards, while junior Quentin Hildreth (Aurora, Colo.) had eight carries for 20 yards. The longest carry of the evening came on a lateral from junior quarterback Seth Lobato (Eaton, Colo.) to junior wide receiver Will Jefferson Jr. (Moreno Valley, Calif.), for 14 yards. Lobato completed 10-of-24 passes for 74 yards and was sacked twice, while senior Matt Baca (Chino Hills, Calif.) was 1-for-2 with one interception and his completion was a five-yard gain. Defensively, junior linebacker Clarence Bumpas (Colorado Springs) recorded double figures in tackles for the tenth-straight game with 10 stops. Senior transfer Hervé Tonye-Tonye (Montreal, Quebec) notched nine tackles on the evening, while senior corner Marcel Gibbons (Colorado Springs) and sophomore defensive tackle Lexington Smith (Denver) each had eight. The Bears now turn their attention to Colorado Mesa for the home opener on Saturday, Sept. 8. The game will be a rematch of the first-ever game at Nottingham Field.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE UNIVERSITY (0-1, 0-0 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State Colorado University opened the 2012 football season at Angelo State University Saturday night. WSCU came up short against Angelo State (1-0), losing 42-14. After forcing Angelo State to turn the ball over on downs, WSCU got out to an early lead 7-0 off a 20 yard touchdown pass from Brian Duboski (Jr., Porterville, Calif.) to Vince Delmonico (So., Morrison, Colo.) on the Mountaineers' first drive of the game. It would take Angelo State less than three minutes to drive 92 yards on eight plays to level the score at 7-7. A mere 11 seconds later and Angelo State went ahead 14-7 after blocking a WSCU punt and running it into the end zone. Angelo State didn't look back and managed 42 points in their home opener. The Mountaineers other touchdown came in the third quarter. Duboski connected with wide receiver LA McGee (Sr., Denver, Colo.) on a 15 yard pass at the 1:39 mark of the third. Angelo State's defense held WSCU to only 29 rushing yards for the entire game. The running game is something the coaching staff will look to fix as the Mountaineers try to bounce back after the loss. WSCU will travel back to Texas next week to take on West Texas A & M. Kickoff is scheduled for 5 p.m. (MT) on Saturday, Sept. 8.
