Amack led Air Force to a 35-34 overtime win over service Academy rival Navy in Annapolis, Md. He amassed a career-high 23 tackles, including 11 solo stops. In addition, Amack recorded a sack and two tackles-for-loss. His 23 tackles are the sixth-most in school history and most since Brian Hill had 23 vs. Colorado State in 1988. 2011-2012 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (2-3, 0-3 RMAC)

Dustin Bolt (Senior, Wide Receiver, 6-2, 215, Alamosa, Colo./Alamosa HS)

Bolt snagged a career-high nine receptions against the Lopers, netting 98 yards for the Grizzlies, his third highest single-game total at ASC. Bolt also grabbed his fourth touchdown catch of the season in the second half. In six tries, Bolt averaged a career-best 48.0 yards per punt on Saturday, and pinned the UNK offense inside the 20-yard line on two occasions and recorded one touchback.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies held the nation's top offense below its season average of 55.25 points and 644.5 yards per game, allowing 37 and 490, respectively. But despite trailing No. 7 Nebraska-Kearney by just a field goal at halftime, the Lopers pulled away with 27 second half points to claim a 37-14 victory. Adams State rushed 31 times for 65 yards on Saturday, and gained another 225 through the air, and ended with 290 yards of their own offense. The loss was the Grizzlies third, all in RMAC action, after starting the season 2-0. The Grizzlies take to the road next weekend to face New Mexico Highlands, which suffered its first loss of the season against Western State on Saturday by a 15-14 tally.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (1-4, 0-3 RMAC)

Trent deBraga (Junior, Kick Returner/Punt Returner, 6-0, 200, Fallon, Nev./Churchill County)

deBraga had five kick returns for 127 yards (long of 41). He also had two punt returns for 51 yards (long of 26) against Western New Mexico. deBraga registered five total tackles and had one tackle for loss yardage from his defensive back position. He is third on the team in tackles (47) and leads the team with three interceptions (3-99). He leads the team in all-purpose yards, averaging 122.8 yards per game. He has totaled 92 punt return yards, 423 kickoff return yards and 99 interception yards.

Team Notes: CMU registered 372 total yards in a loss against Western New Mexico, the Mavs' second highest total yards this season. CMU rushed for 199 yards and 173 reception yards. It was the first game the Mavs did not have a field goal attempt. WNMU registered five quarterback sacks, the second consecutive game CMU has allowed five quarterback sacks. CMU quarterback Chris Henderson rushed for a individual season high 23 times against WNMU. The Mavericks tied a season high 48 carries against the Mustangs. The Mavs had a season high seven turnovers Saturday. Jake Cimolino leads the team with 87 carries for 394 yards (4.5 avg). Tanner Whaley leads the team with 327 reception yards (15 catches) for a 21.8 average per catch. Caleb Pavy is 15-for-15 on PAT's. Connor Wright leads the defense with 55 total tackles, 22 solo and 9.0 quarterback sacks for 51 loss yards. CMU will travel to Fort Lewis Saturday.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (4-1, 2-1 RMAC)

Clay Garcia (Senior, Quarterback, 6-0, 210, Alamosa, Colo./Alamosa HS)

Garcia led an aerial attack that accumulated 415 yards of total passing against Fort Lewis, including a season-high 31 passes as he finished the game completing 79.4 percent of his passes. He was 6-of-6 and capped off an eight-play drive in with a 16-yard touchdown to Matt Brown. Mines went up 21-0 when Garcia tossed a 54-yard touchdown pass to Jerrod Doucet in the third quarter. His 353 yards of passing pushed him over the 1,000 yard mark for passing yards this season with 1,314 yards and 12 touchdowns in five games. It was also the third game this season in which Garcia has passed for over 300 yards and the second game in which he has thrown at least three touchdowns.

Team Notes: Matt Brown caught two touchdowns and finished the game with eight catches for 91 yards and was 4-of-6 passing for 62 yards including a 41-yard connection with Jordan Ward late in the game. David Pawelek caught six passes for 102 yards. Diamond Gillis caught a team-high nine passes for 55 yards and a touchdown. Jerrod Doucet finished with three catches for 71 yards and a touchdown. Dan Palmer rushed for 57 yards and caught a touchdown pass. Colin Baker kicked a 42-yard field goal. Jarrad McKay finished the game with seven tacksel (five solo, two assisted) and half a sack. Josh Ruff tallied seven tackles on the day. Alex Vigil recorded half a sack while Henry Kaetzer recorded on sack on the day while both recorded a pass breakup. Bunmi Adetutu forced a fumble and Mark Powell recovered the fumble on the play. Ryan Wood added an interception and three tackles. The Orediggers punted just twice and were 4-of-5 inside the red zone. Mines will play CSU-Pueblo on national TV (CBS College Sports Network) on Oct. 6 at the ThunderBowl in Pueblo.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-2, 1-0 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State lost 38-31 to San Jose State on Saturday. They will have a bye week before facing Boise State at home on Oct. 15.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY-PUEBLO (5-0, 3-0 RMAC)

Ross Dausin (Junior, Quarterback, 6-5, 230, San Antonio, Texas/Butler County CC/Warren HS)

Dausin had his highest ever single-game quarterback rating with an 18-for-20 performance for 272 yards and two touchdowns at Chadron State Saturday afternoon. He also ran his record as a starter at CSU-Pueblo to 14-2, which is the best win percentage of any quarterback in school history (.875). His 272 passing yards was his second-highest yardage total as a ThunderWolf. Thus far in 2011, Dausin has no interceptions (145.9 total quarterback rating).

Team Notes: CSU-Pueblo ran its Division II-best winning streak to nine games (including last season). The ThunderWolves' win over Chadron State marks the first time since 1995 that any RMAC squad has defeated CSC three straight years (Western State beat Chadron each season from 1993-95). CSU-Pueblo is off to a 5-0 start in back-to-back seasons for the first time in school history. CSU-Pueblo will host Colorado School of Mines Thursday in the first ever nationally-televised football game in school history.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (1-4, 0-3 RMAC)

Team Notes: The Skyhawks dropped a 38-11 decision on the road to Colorado Mines this past Saturday. After two weeks on the road, Fort Lewis will return home to host Colorado Mesa this Saturday in their Homecoming game.

2011-2012 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (3-1, 0-1 MWC)

Brady Amack (Senior, Linebacker, 6-0, 227, Pleasanton, Calif./De La Salle)

Amack led Air Force to a 35-34 overtime win over service Academy rival Navy in Annapolis, Md. He amassed a career-high 23 tackles, including 11 solo stops. In addition, Amack recorded a sack and two tackles-for-loss. His 23 tackles are the sixth-most in school history and most since Brian Hill had 23 vs. Colorado State in 1988. Amack had 13 tackles at halftime and had three tackles on third down that prevented Navy first-down's. He led Air Force to its second-straight win over Navy and the first in Annapolis since 1997.

Team Notes: Air Force has scored in a school-record 224 consecutive games dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the nation and 13th longest streak in NCAA history. Air Force has scored a rushing touchdown in 25 consecutive games dating back to Navy on Oct. 3, 2009. Air Force scored a touchdown on its opening drive to mark the third time in four games this season the team has done it. Air Force's defense allowed its first touchdown vs. Navy since the first quarter of the 2009 game in Annapolis. The touchdown-less streak by Navy covered nine consecutive quarters. The Falcons were forced to punt on their opening drive of the second half vs. Navy. The result marks the first time this season the team has not scored a touchdown on its opening drive of the second half. The overtime game for Air Force is its 10th all-time and first since playing at Utah in 2009. Air Force improves to 6-4 overall in overtime games, including a 1-1 mark at Navy. Air Force improves to 3-1 overall and has won two straight games. Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun improves to 37-19 overall, 12-10 in road games and 16-7 in non-conference games in his fifth season at Air Force. Air Force improves to 52-27-1 all-time in Commander-in-Chief's Trophy games. The Falcons can wrap up their service-academy record 18th CIC trophy with a win over Army Nov. 5 in Falcon Stadium. Air Force improves to 27-17 all-time vs. Navy, including an 8-8 mark at Navy. The Falcons are 24-16 against the Midshipmen in Commander-in-Chief's Trophy games. Air Force has posted back-to-back wins over Navy for the first time since 2001-02. The Falcons' win snaps a four-game road losing streak to Navy and is the team's first win at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium since a 10-7 win in 1997. Air Force improved to 16-7 in non-conference games under head coach Troy Calhoun. The Falcons have now won six straight and nine of the last 10 non-conference games with the only loss at No. 7 Oklahoma last season.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-4, 0-1 PAC 12)

Rodney Stewart (Senior, Tailback, 5-6, 175, Westerville, Ohio)

Stewart had 26 carries for 132 yards and one score. He also caught one pass for 34 yards. Stewart finished the game against Washington State with 278 all-purpose yards (he is also on special teams coverage and had one tackle and one assist). He enjoyed the 15th 100-yard game of his career (now second only to 22 by Eric Bieniemy as he snapped a tie with Rashaan Salaam and Chris Brown). He passed Salaam (3,057) into second place on CU's all-time rushing yards list, closing the game with 3,156 yards; he passed Bieniemy into first place in all-time rushing attempts (718; Bieniemy had 699 from 1987-90). His 34 receiving yards gives him 736 for his career, the most receiving yards ever by a running back at CU as he eclipsed the 725 by Herchell Troutman (1994-97). His 278 all-purpose yards were the 11th most in a single-game in CU history (second most this year, though—Paul Richardson had 297 vs. Cal). Saturday marked the first time he has returned a kickoff as a Buff.

Team Notes: Colorado now leads the series 4-3 against Washington State (WSU leads 3-2 in Boulder). Colorado is now 16-4 in games played on Parent's/Family Weekend and 12-4 at home since mid-1984 when losing by 20 or more points the previous week on the road (CU fell 37-17 at Ohio State last Saturday). CU's three first half scores were a season-high; the 13 points were second to the CSU game where the Buffs led 14-7 at halftime. Since being held to just 168 yards in the '96 game in Boulder, WSU has averaged 459 yards here in the last two games (463 in 2003, 455 2011). Each team had just 11 possessions on Saturday; the last two meetings between the two had 72 (35 in '03, 37 in '04). Colorado ran 62 plays in the game, the fourth time in five the Buffs ran 66 or fewer (exception: 82 vs. Cal). CU is averaging just 64.6 offensive plays per game for the season.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-5, 0-3 BSC)

Dominic Gunn (Junior, Wide Receiver/Kick Returner/Punt Returner, 5-11, 175)

Gunn had a 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the second quarter. It is the 11th-longest return in school history and the second-longest since the Bears joined the Big Sky Conference in 2006. It is the first kickoff return for a touchdown for the Bears since Quincy Wofford had a 100-yard return against Northern Arizona on Sept. 27, 2008. It is also the first special teams touchdown this year for UNC. Gunn ended the game with 152 kickoff return yards, the second-most in school history and he passes his own Division I record of 151 yards from last season against Eastern Washington. It is the fifth time in Gunn's career he has had 100 or more kickoff return yards in a game. Gunn also caught four passes for 55 yards and had one punt return for eight yards giving him 215 all-purpose yards for the game. His 215 all-purpose yards is the new school Division I single game record, bettering Jace Davis' total of 212 yards from last year at Montana State.

Team Notes: The 28 points scored is the most Northern Colorado has ever scored against Montana. The previous high was 27 points in the team's lone win in 1976. In losses, the previous high was 21 scored in 2006. Senior wide receiver Patrick Walker caught nine passes in the game, jumping two spots into fifth on the Northern Colorado career chart. He passes Eric Nelson (1999-02), who had 119 career receptions and George Carroll (1999-02) with 125. The 14-points by Northern Colorado ties for the most scored by the Bears this season in the first half, tying the season opener against Lindenwood. Saturday marked the first game since 1998 the Bears had two fumble returns in the same game. The Bears had two returns for 26 yards, while twice (vs Adams State, at Nebraska-Omaha) the 1998 squad had two fumble returns in a contest.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (1-4, 1-2 RMAC)

Lloyd Tucker (Senior, Punter/Kicker, 6-4, 200, Carbondale, Colo./Colorado Mountain/Roaring Fork HS)

Tucker scored all of Western State's points in a 15-14 victory against nationally-recognized and previously unbeaten New Mexico Highlands this past Saturday afternoon in Homecoming. He made field goals of 32, 22, 47, 38 and 27 yards. He made the final field goal with one second remaining in the game. His sixth field goal attempt of 39 yards was blocked.

Team Notes: Western State used five field goals to pull a 15-14 victory against New Mexico Highlands on Homecoming last Saturday. It was the second Homecoming victory in the last three seasons, and the ninth victory in the last 11 games with the Cowboys in Mountaineer Bowl since 1990. Western State scored on all four red zone appearances, and is second in the RMAC in red zone offense this season. The Mountaineer defense made two interceptions for the first time this season, and posted season-bests in opponent total offense and rushing yards. The 14 points allowed by the defense last Saturday was the lowest in the a conference game since Nov. 11, 2006 (13 points – Colorado Mines). The Mountaineers finished last Saturday with an average drive start at their own 44-yard line, in the best average start since Oct. 2, 2010. Te Mountaineers go on the road Saturday at Western New Mexico. Western State will be going for back-to-back wins for the first time since a three-game win streak in 2009. The Mountaineers have the 12th-toughest schedule in Division II this season based on cumulative opposition.
