RODNEY STEWART
COLORADO

SENIOR, TALIBACK, 5-6, 175
WESTERVILLE, OHIO

In Colorado's 48-29 win over Arizona, Stewart rushed 24 times for 181 yards and three touchdowns, caught two passes for 23 yards (204 all-purpose yards), and threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to quarterback Tyler Hansen on a throwback play. He earned 10 first downs (eight rushing/one passing/one receiving). The 181 yards rushing were the 15th most in CU history where the player was not stopped behind the line of scrimmage (with the sixth-most attempts). He missed the entire second quarter with a sprained ankle and had 137 of his yards in the second half with a heavy tape job.

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (6-5, 4-5 RMAC)

Team Notes: Adams State concluded its first winning season since 2006 and retrained the Colorado Classic Trophy for the 10th straight year with a 49-10 victory over Western State on Saturday at Rex Stadium. The Grizzlies 49 points were the most of the season and 467 yards of total offense was the third highest of the season. ASC trailed 10-7 at the end of the first quarter, but reeled off 42 unanswered points, putting up 21 in the third quarter alone. Three ASC receivers had at least 69 yards receiving while two Grizzlies rushed for at least 70 yards. ASC's 6-5 record matches their record from 2006 when they also went 6-5. The Grizzlies ended the season with 4,248 yards of total offense, their second most in a season in D-II era (1992-present) available history.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (4-7, 3-6 RMAC)

Team Notes: The Mavs two game win streak was snapped with an overtime loss at Chadron State. CMU finishes up 3-3 on the road. Redshirt-freshman running back Jake Cimolino nearly hit the 1,000 yard mark, finishing with 974 rushing yards on 207 attempts. He needed 83 rushing yards at Chadron Saturday to hit the mark. The Eagles held him to 57 yards on 21 carries. CMU picked off one Eagle pass, marking the fourth consecutive game with at least one interception. CMU's two touchdown passes ties a single game high. Chadron State's Glen Clinton's 33 rushing attempts is an individual high against the Mavs this season. Defensively Connor Wright and Trent deBraga finished the year with 100+ total tackles. Wright led the team with 106 tackles and deBraga with 103. Wright had a season high 11.0 sacks for a loss of 58 yards and 16 quarterback hurries.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (8-3, 6-3 RMAC)

Team Notes: Dan Palmer became just the third running back in the history of CSM football to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season. Palmer finishes the season with 1,016 yards and 18 rushing touchdowns. Head Coach Bob Stitt currently sits at 84 wins which is tied for the most by a CSM coach in program history. Clay Garcia, who was named as one of the 22 regional finalists for the 2011 Harlon Hill trophy threw, for 238 yards and two touchdowns in the loss to UNK. Alex Laudenslager finished with a game-high 15 tackles against the Lopers. Alex Vigil added 10 tackles.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-6, 1-3 MWC)

Chris Nwoke (Sophomore, Running Back)

Nwoke rushed for 232 yards on 22 carries (10.5 avg.) and had a touchdown in a loss to San Diego State. He had a 63-yard touchdown run that gave the Rams an early 7-0 lead over San Diego State. Later he took a handoff 67 yards to get CSU inside the red zone. Nwoke is the first Ram since 2008 to rush for over 200 yards. He also had one catch for seven yards.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY-PUEBLO (11-0, 9-0 RMAC)

Jesse Lewis (Senior, Running Back, 5-7, 180, Loveland, Colo./Loveland HS)

A Harlon Hill Trophy regional finalist, Lewis recorded his third 100-yard game this season and second multi-touchdown game in the 48-7 win over Western New Mexico. His 87-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was the longest run of his career and second-longest scoring play of his career. Lewis averaged 9.5 yards per carry after rushing 12 times for 114 yards and two touchdowns.

Team Notes: CSU-Pueblo won its first outright RMAC title in school history with a 48-7 win over Western New Mexico, its first RMAC title since 1980 and its second in school history. The ThunderWolves became just the fifth team in RMAC history to finish a regular season 11-0 (2006 & 2007 Chadron State, 2004 Colorado Mines, 1987 Colorado Mesa). CSU-Pueblo extended its winning streak to 15 games (dating back to last season), which following the loss by Division I Stanford Saturday, makes it the second-longest win streak in college football, regardless of classification. In the ThunderWolves' win, quarterback Ross Dausin became CSU-Pueblo's career touchdown pass-leader, now at 28, surpassing current coach John Wristen's career mark of 26. CSU-Pueblo's ranking of No. 1 in the AFCA Coaches' poll marks the highest ever national ranking in the history of the ThunderWolves' football program as well as the modern history of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. It is also the highest in-season ranking by any CSU-Pueblo athletics program since becoming a four-year school in 1963.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (3-8, 2-7 RMAC)

David Ferris (Senior, Defensive Tackle, 6-1, 260, Chula Vista, Calif./Bonita Vista HS)

In his final career game, Ferris had the game of his career with nine tackles (four solo), 3.5 behind the line of scrimmage for 11 yards in losses, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, and one blocked kick. Fort Lewis held New Mexico Highlands to just three points (after they recovered a fumble on the FLC 12) and two first downs. On the final play of the game for the NMHU offense, Ferris recovered a fumble at the FLC 49 to seal the victory.

2011-2012 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (5-5, 1-4 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force's turnover on downs at the Wyoming one yard line on its opening drive snapped a streak of 25 straight trips inside the red zone with points (18 touchdowns, seven field goals). Air Force has scored in a school-record 230 consecutive games dating back to 1992. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the nation and the 13th longest in NCAA history. Air Force has scored a rushing touchdown in 31 consecutive games dating back to Navy on Oct. 3, 2009. Air Force forced a punt on Wyoming's opening drive of the second half. The Falcons have not allowed any points on the opponent's opening drive of the second half this season, forcing eight punts and two interceptions. Wyoming's fourth quarter touchdown marks the first points allowed in the second half by Air Force in the last three games. The Falcons posted back-to-back shutouts in the second half vs. New Mexico and Army the last two weeks.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (2-9, 1-6 PAC 12)

Rodney Stewart (Senior, Taliback, 5-6, 175, Westerville, Ohio)

In Colorado's 48-29 win over Arizona, Stewart rushed 24 times for 181 yards and three touchdowns, caught two passes for 23 yards (204 all-purpose yards), and threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to quarterback Tyler Hansen on a throwback play. He earned 10 first downs (eight rushing/one passing/one receiving). The 181 yards rushing were the 15th most in CU history where the player was not stopped behind the line of scrimmage (with the sixth-most attempts). He missed the entire second quarter with a sprained ankle and had 137 of his yards in the second half with a heavy tape job.

Team Notes: Colorado ends a seven-game losing streak in recording its first win in the Pac-12; the victory avoided CU's first-ever year without a win at Folsom Field (CU was last winless at home in 1920 at Gamble Field, 0-1-2). It was CU's 297th win at Folsom all-time. The wind, averaging 32 miles per hour gusting to 59 at kickoff, peaked at around 3:15 (just after halftime) at 45, gusting to 71. This was the first game CU did not trail in this year and the Buffs led for 55:56. CU now leads the series with Arizona 13-1 (5-1 in Boulder). Colorado's 500 yards were the second most in the series (to the 625 it had in a 65-12 win in Tucson in 1958); ASU's 412 were its second most (434 in 1986). CU's 48 points were its most since a 65-51 win over Nebraska on Nov. 23, 2007. The Buffs are now 24-8 in games in its history when they have a 100-yard rusher and receiver (Stewart 181 rush, Clemens 115 receiving). When Colorado took a 27-10 lead in the third quarter, it marked its largest lead at any point in any game 2011. On that 11 play drive, CU actually just gained two yards on four first down plays but converted all three third downs tries, Colorado came into the game with four interceptions on the year, but made three on Saturday; the last time the Buffs had three pick in a game was in the 2010 season opener. After allowing 200-plus rushing yards the last four games, CU limited Arizona to just 60 overall, an opponent season low and the fewest since Iowa State had minus-6 a year ago. CU's streaks came to an end of allowing over 30 points (seven straight games) and 40-plus (five). Also stopped was an opponent run of five straight games with 500 plus yards. CU had 500 yards for the second time in 2011 (season-high was 582 versus California). Colorado now has at least one quarterback sack in 41 of the last 43 games.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-11, 0-8 BSC)

Patrick Walker (Senior, Wide Receiver, 5-8, 181, Long Beach, Calif./Long Beach Poly)

In Northern Colorado's final game of the season, Walker broke the school single season and career receptions record with his nine catches. He ends his career with five straight games with 100 or more yards in each. Those nine catches give him 178 for his career, one more than San Diego Chargers standout Vincent Jackson (2001-04) had in his four years with the Bears. It also gives Walker 84 catches this year, breaking Jackson's single season mark of 80.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (1-10, 1-8 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State finished its season at Adams State and lost 49-10.
